## Reconstruction Work Closes Goose Island

The island part of Goose Island State Park will be closed for an indefinite time during reconstruction work now underway there, according to Richard Loden, Regional Parks Maintenance Supervisor. Loden estimated the island will be "off limits" to the public for "about 90 days."

"The contractor bid on the job with the understanding that the island would be closed to the public," Loden said. "His liability insurance costs would be prohibitive if the public had free access to the area where his machinery was working."

Included in the refurbishing job will be new rest rooms, with and without showers, new shade shelters, new water, electrical and sewage systems, and another bridge to supplement the existing one. The heavy machinery used in this work would be a definite hazard to the public and, at the same time, work would proceed much slower if operators had to be constantly aware of this danger.

## RECREATIONAL BILL DUE BY WIETING

A bill will be introduced in the Legislature seeking to create an Aransas Water Recreation Area in the bays of Aransas County between the Nueces and Guadalupe River basins.

The bill, backed by the Rockport Sportsmen Conservation Association, will be introduced by Rep. Leroy Wieting of Portland.

If passed, the area would be administered by the State Parks and Wildlife Department. The bill calls for the area to include all salt waters in Aransas County, including the Gulf of Mexico, which is under state jurisdiction.

All commercial fishing such as trotlines, seining and netting would be prohibited. Shell dredging would be prohibited under the proposed bill.

Ed Teng, president of the association, has said that the bays in Aransas County offer "little inducement for industrial development . . . but offer much to support recreational activities."

A federal agency announced Wednesday that a 37-county area of South Texas (including Aransas County) could create hundreds of new jobs through a sweeping, long range tourist development program.

The Economic Development Agency of the U.S. Department of Commerce reached its conclusions on tourist potential in a report called "Tourism in the South Texas Triangle."

The specific recommendations for the local area was "establishment of bird shooting resorts in the Rockport area in Aransas County." The survey was made by Checchi and Company, a Washington, D.C., consulting firm, at a cost of \$50,000.

### Major Attraction

The report recommends the development of four major attractions. One of them would be located in Houston, outside the 37-county area, to promote tourism throughout the triangle and to help send tourists into the area.

The feasibility of 10 possible projects in the triangle and an overall view of the area's tourism potentials are also included in the report.

The four major projects recommended and their estimated costs are:

"The Beach Club" on South Padre Island, \$250,000; "The House Boat Motel" on Falcon Reservoir, \$2,150,000; "The (continued on page 8)

## From The Pilot Files — 20 Years Ago

### BASIN TO HAVE NIGHT LIGHTING

The Navigation Board has decided to provide night lighting at the basin. Poles will be installed at the end of each pier which are about 35 feet apart. Reflectors will focus the light on the pier and on the water. Each pole will have a light plug at the bottom whereby boatmen and fishermen will be able to use electrical tools and appliances. This additional lighting will enable boatmen to work on their boats at night as well as accommodating night fishermen.

### NEW TANKS AT SERVICE STATION

Two 5,000 gallon gasoline tanks have been installed at Hemmi's Humble Service Station to replace the 2,000 gallon tanks, Urban Hemmi reports. Other improvements include putting the water and air fixtures under ground.

### CEMETERY ASS'N ASKS THAT GRAVES BE MARKED

The Lamar Cemetery Association is being organized so that the cemetery will receive perpetual care.

Warner is a quiet person, not inclined to talk about himself. Some prying, however, brought out that he spent about 20 years as a portrait painter and approximately the same length of time in real estate before retiring.

"Now I can paint what I want, when I want to," he pointed out. "And my wife and I roam around the country, taking it easy, enjoying the scenery, and I do a little painting here and there."

A few years ago Warner read a newspaper article stating that the Salvation Army in Honolulu had acquired a large building and that amateur artists were being sought to contribute their time and talent to paint murals on the walls.

"That sounded like fun," Warner said, "so my wife and I hid ourselves to Hawaii, and I wound up painting 18 murals."

Warner and his wife travel around the country in a "home on wheels," originally an old International school bus which

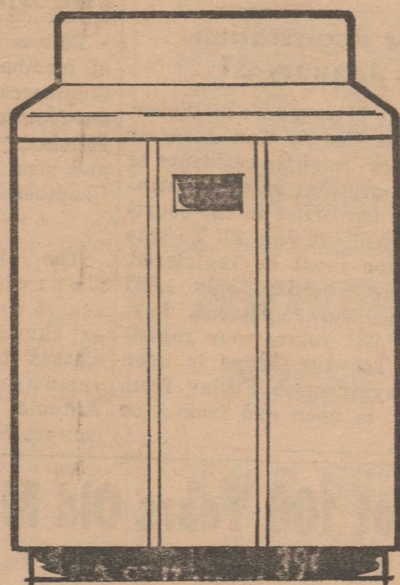

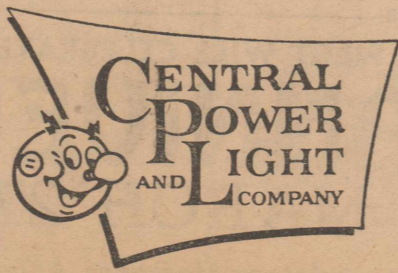

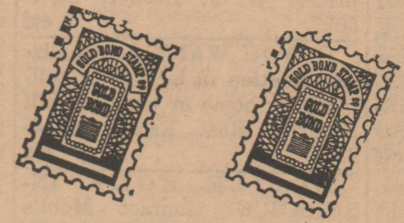

## THE FAMILY LAWYER

**In the Name of Charity**  
To help a worthy cause, you buy a \$5 ticket to a theater party. May you deduct the \$5 on your next income tax return as a charitable contribution?

No, because your payment was not all charity. You received something of value in return: the show itself. If the regular price of tickets is \$3, you may deduct only the \$2—the part that was truly a gift.

This rule has wide application, not only in such frivolous areas as theater parties, charity balls, lotteries, and athletic events but also in such basic areas as health and education.

For example:  
A man claimed a deduction

for money paid to a non-profit retirement home—in return for lifetime care.

A woman claimed a deduction for money paid to a religious society—in her return for her burial plot.

A family claimed a deduction for money paid to a church—in return for their son's education.

But in each case, the deduction was not allowed. For in each case, the payment was held not true charity but simply a purchase of services—like any other family expense.

The mere fact that your payment is in the form of a check made out to a charitable organization does not change it into charity if it really isn't.

And, by the same token, a true gift may be deductible even if it is not in the form of money at all. Thus, contributions or bonds to a qualified charitable organization are deductible.

What about services that you render? No doubt, in the scales of virtue, donating your

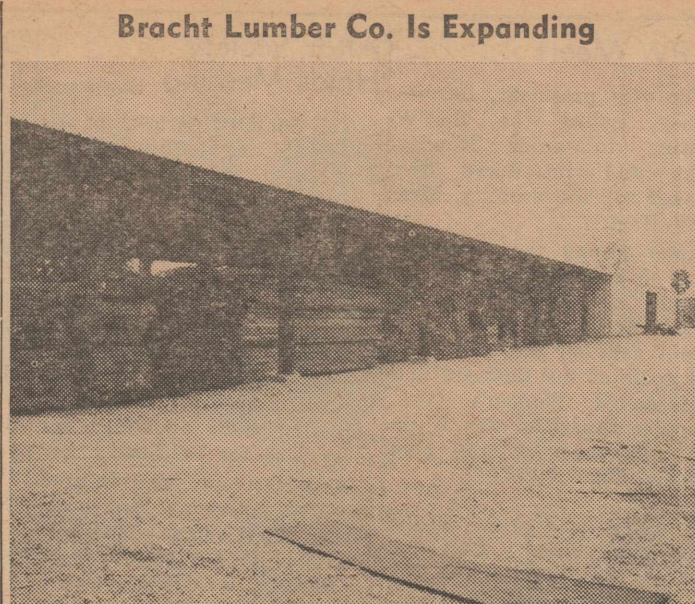
services weighs as much as donating your money or your merchandise.

Nonetheless, services are held not a deductible contribution, perhaps because of the formidable problems of fixing their value. Imagine the difficulties of putting a price tag on the services of Mom to a Girl Scout troop or of Dad to the Community Chest.

On the other hand, if your services require out-of-pocket expenses for which you are not reimbursed, they are generally deductible.

For instance, the costs of driving to a volunteer job at a hospital, or of buying uniforms not otherwise useful, may be deducted. For, in a true sense, you are "giving" this amount to charity.

## OUTDOORS IN TEXAS

Most outdoorsmen, especially hunters, hail their wives as the world's greatest wild game cooks.

If the real truth came to light, it would be learned that these statements are simply to mollify the little lady in the kitchen.

If you could tune in on the typical hunter-wife conversation when young Dan'l Boone troops into the kitchen laden with game, it would run something like this:

"Don't bring that in here! I'm not going to stink up my kitchen cooking it. Give it away. Let someone else cook it."

Admittedly some hunters do bring smelly messes into the kitchen, and they are to be chastised for so doing. But there's another side to the coin. Often the wife is at fault. Sometimes she scolds young Dan'l simply to cover her ignorance in not knowing how to cook the game.

This ignorance, both on the part of the hunter and the housewife, can be eliminated by a little book "learning."

Most cookbooks contain recipes for cooking game and fish, but generally they are quite sketchy. There's a new book out — Shooter's Bible Cookbook by Geraldine Spindler—which should be a must in the library of every outdoorsman.

Distributed by the Stoeger Arms Corp., 55 Ruta Court, South Hackensack, New Jersey, the book tells how to take the "game" out of wild game and make every dish a gourmet's delight.

This 208-page paperback book (\$3.95) covers the game from hunt to dinner table. And it's written by a woman who appreciates hunting. She and her husband hunt regularly, and her hunting arsenal consists of shotguns, hunting and target rifles and handguns.

Opening chapter of the book can get young Dan'l off the hook for it adequately covers field dressing and storage. Remember hunters bag the game . . . and they also ruin much of it through improper field dressing, storage and care.

If young Dan'l becomes an expert in field dressing, he can leave most of the stink in the field and eliminate those cold stares and sarcastic words from the better half when he roams into the kitchen with evidence of his hunting skill hanging over his shoulder.

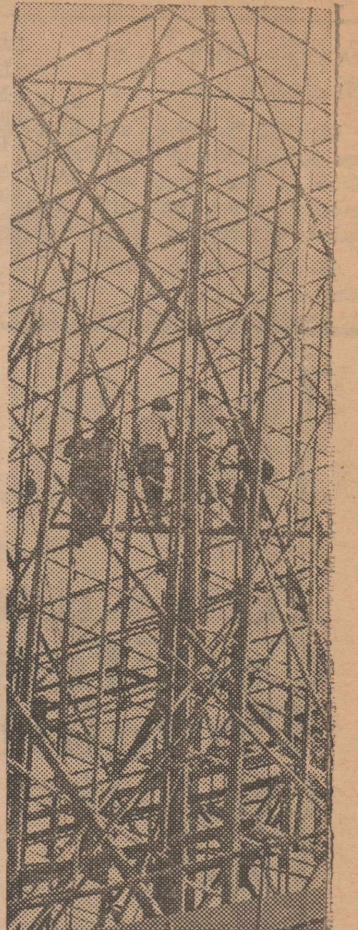
Well prepared game is tasty, but there is no denying that at times some game will cause pungent odors in the kitchen. And, of course, young Dan'l's wife is going to air objections about that.

But if the housewife studies the recipes in the Shooter's Bible Cookbook, she'll discover how she can turn out some real fine game dinners with none of the "gamey" smell hanging like a thundercloud in the kitchen.

The book contains chapters on cooking big and small game, fish, fowl and game soups. Also what to do with all the game "burger." Additional chapters cover the preparation of saucers, stuffings, and side dishes that can turn the game meal into the proverbial seven-course dinner.

This book is a little gem that bring "peace" within the household of the hunter. And who who knows? It might even get the little lady interested in going hunting herself. And that is the opening wedge—a big one—in getting a smiling okay for some additional hunts.

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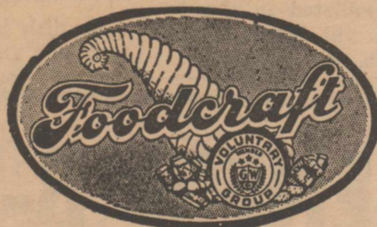

Other Projects

The 10 other tourism projects which the report covers are:

- 1. A souvenir store near the King Ranch in Kleberg County.
2. The development of the beaches of North Padre Island and Mustang Island in Nueces and Kleberg Counties.
3. Use of recorded messages to outline Texas history. Speaker units would be installed in key tourist areas of the triangle.
4. A special tour program at Gonzales in Gonzales County.
5. Establishment of bird shooting resorts in the Rockport area in Aransas County.
6. Use of outdoor restaurants in the Castroville area of Medina County.
7. Promotion of the health spa potential of Leaky in Real County, and establishment of convalescent hospitals in the community.
8. Promotion of the historic appeal of the border community of Eagle Pass in Maverick County.
9. Development of a camping site near Kickapoo Cave in Kinney County.

The report says that taken together, the 9 projects would offer tourists traveling through the area a variety of attractions and activities. Requested

EDA made the survey at the request of the Lower Rio Grande Valley, the Coastal Bend Economic Development District and the Southwest Texas Economic Development District. These districts were created to serve.

EDA officials said now the report will be turned over to the districts and the next move on implementation is up to them. Presumably the districts could seek further federal money for development of the projects recommended.

Low Borden of Corpus Christi is chairman of the Coastal Bend Economic Development District.

"Eventually tourism will be a big industry in the South Texas Triangle," the report says.

Underdeveloped It added that aside from the oil industry and cattle production, the area of 1,200,000 residents is basically underdeveloped.

The report says the three major projects recommended for the triangle counties would eventually attract 59,000 tourists annually pump more than \$3 million into the area economy and create a minimum of 225 assets of the triangle, including 200 miles of beaches on the Gulf, 240 miles of "international border favor," year-around fresh and salt water fishing, wildlife refuges, mild winter climate and a abundance of local history.

Prune Shade Trees While Dormant

Everett E. Janne Landscape Horticulturist Extension Service College Station, Texas

The major pruning on shade trees should be done during the winter months, while the trees are dormant.

What are the purposes of pruning? First and foremost is to maintain a strong framework for the future development of the tree.

Unless pruning can be justified for one of these reasons it is better to place the shears and saw in the shed and obtain the desired exercise by spading a flowerbed.

Some of the general principles that apply when pruning shade trees include the removal of all dead or diseased wood, broken limbs, and weak growth.

Never stub back limbs or branches. Rather, cut back to

a main branch or trunk so that there will be no stubs remaining. The so-called "stubbing back" or topping large branches will result in a proliferation of sucker growth and leave a wound that is impossible to heal.

To protect pruning cuts and prevent the entry of disease and insect organisms, all cuts over one inch in diameter should be painted with a special tree paint obtainable at all garden stores or nursery sales yards.

If there is evidence of disease in the tree or shrub being pruned, it is important that after each cut the pruning equipment be dipped in a disinfectant to kill the disease organisms to prevent their spread to other portions of the tree or even to other trees.

1040 U.S. Individual Income Taxpayers Ask IRS

This column of questions and answers on Federal tax matters is provided by the U. S. Internal Revenue Service and is published as a public service to taxpayers.

Q—I received my tax forms in the mail but my son didn't. Why is that? He started working last summer and taxes are being taken out of his wages.

A—A tax return is mailed to everyone who filed a return for the previous year. Your son would therefore not receive a tax form if he started working in 1968 as you indicate.

Copies of the 1968 tax forms and instructions are available at local IRS offices as well as many post offices and banks.

Q—If I file my return by the end of January can I forget about the fourth installment of my estimated tax?

A—Yes, if you file your 1968 return by Jan. 31 paying any balance due at that time. But don't forget that 1969 declarations must be filed by April 15.

Q—Last year I sold some stock I had received from my father's estate. Do I have to pay tax on this money?

A—You will only have to include in income any increase between the value of the stock at the time your father died and what you sold it for.

The amount of the increase will have to be reported as a capital gain on Schedule D. However, if the stock decreased in value the loss may be used to reduce any other capital gains you might have to report for 1968.

Q—I got married last year and my wife and I both received 1040 tax packages.

Game Violation Fines Are Highest Ever

Austin—The \$53,133.18 received by the State of Texas in December for game, fish, and water safety violations is the most the State has ever received in any month, according to J. B. Phillips, law enforcement coordinator for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department.

The 1,694 citations issued by game management officers in December 1968, represents a 49 per cent increase over the 1,136 citations issued for the same period the year before.

Of the 1,094 hunting citations written in December, 175 were for hunting at night, 118 were for possessing an untagged deer, 95 were for no hunting license, and 88 were for killing or possessing a deer in closed season.

There were 177 fishing violations in December, 159 of these being "no fishing license."

Commercial fishing violations totaled 25, water safety violations totaled 92, and miscellaneous violations totaled three.

Disposition of other cases include: Juvenile, 54; dismissed, 74; served time in jail, one; fine suspended, seven; transferred to lower court, one; not guilty, seven.

If we file a joint return, whose label should be put on the form, mine or hers?

A—On a joint return the account is primarily identified by the husband's social security number. Therefore, file the return with your label adding your wife's name to it but be sure also to enter your wife's social security number on the return in the space provided for it.

Q—Are farmers subject to the new surcharge?

A—Yes, they, like all income taxpayers, are subject to the tax surcharge.

Q—I can't find the W-2 form I got from my summer job. What should I do?

A—Contact your former employer and ask him for a duplicate copy of your W-2 statement.

Q—Is it true that if I have less than \$100 a year in dividends I don't have to report them on my tax return?

A—All the dividends you receive should be reported but generally the first \$100 in dividends is not subject to tax.

Don't Forget W-2's

Tax refunds cannot be paid without required W-2 withholding tax certificates and credit cannot be given for taxes withheld, according to Asa L. Crow, administrative officer of Internal Revenue Service, Corpus Christi.

Taxpayers were also reminded that in preparing a joint 1968 return, where both parties worked, W-2's for each must be attached. And when either or both parties filing a return held more than one job during the year, All W-2s must be attached.

A taxpayer who has not received his W-2 Form should contact his employer before checking with IRS. If the employer has gone out of business, the taxpayer should contact him or the present owner of the business. If the Form W-2 is still not available, then the taxpayer should prepare his income tax return from the best information at hand, file his return by the April 15 deadline, and attach a note explaining why the Form W-2 is missing.

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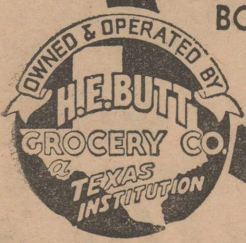
