LEGION PAYS TRIBUTE TO FALLEN BUDDIES

(By Associated Press)
PARIS, Sept. 17.—On the slopes of Mount Valerion overlooking Paris and surrounded by marble crosses, marking the last resting place of 1,500 comrades who gave their lives on the battlefield, General John J. Pershing and Legion Commander Howard P. Savage today paid the tribute of the American Legion to their fallen buddies.

It was drizzling rain at times during the short ceremony at which General Pershing, Commander Savage and Marshal Foch made the only addresses.

Commander Savage spoke directly to the dead rather than to the living audience.

YOUTH MAY BE FATALLY HURT

WINTERS, Sept. 17.—An accident which may prove fatal occurred west of Winters Thursday, when Guy Atkins, 18-year-old son of Mrs. Lee Atkins, was dragged from a truck loaded with cotton, by a telephone wire.

Young Atkins with other boys were riding upon the baled cotton which was placed too deep when the wire caught him under the chin, resulting in precipitating him to the ground.

The truck was moving at about 20 miles per hour when the accident occurred. Several ribs were broken and other internal injuries which may prove fatal inflicted. The young man was carried to a local sanitarium.

NOT A CANDIDATE W. G. M'ADOO



(By Associated Press)

WASHINGTON, Sept. 17.—William Gibbs McAdoo has informed his friends that he will not be a candidate for the Democratic presidential nomination in 1928.

McAdoo's decision has been communicated to George Milton, publisher of the Chattanooga, Tenn. News, in a letter sent in response to a request from Milton that he announce his candidacy.

Declaring that his chief concern was the supremacy of Democratic principles and progressive policies, McAdoo said, "Perhaps I can do more to advance these subjects as a private citizen than as a candidate for the presidency."

IS UNDER BOND AFTER KILLING

BRECKENRIDGE, Sept. 17.—J. A. Robbins is at liberty today under \$5,000 bond, awaiting grand jury investigation in the death last night of B. A. Mason, 34, who was shot five times.

Mason and Robbins were formerly partners in the automobile business. They are said to have quarrelled.

He criticised both the Republican and Democratic parties for their lack of progressive principles and leaders, in a statement of policies made public here today.

HUMBLE BUYS OIL FROM SILLIX WELL

The first oil run ticket ever issued in Runnels county was received by the owners of the Sillix et al McMillan No. 1, this week, when gaugers for the Humble Pipe Line Company made out a ticket for 180 barrels of 43.8 gravity oil that was pumped into the two-inch pipe line from the storage tanks at the Sillix well late Thursday afternoon.

The line, about six miles long, running from the well to Benoit on the Santa Fe Railroad, holds about 180 barrels of petroleum and was filled Thursday evening after it had been completed to the tracks.

Cranes have been installed and the oil will be removed from the field as rapidly as possible. It is believed that there is between 1,750 and 2,000 barrels of oil in storage at the field.

The flow from the well has been continuing at intervals, by heads. In twelve hours, Thursday night, it flowed about 70 barrels, according to the gaugers' readings, Mr. Sillix said Saturday afternoon. The readings of the last 12 hours up to noon Saturday had not been learned, Mr. Sillix said.

The well flowed 135 barrels in 14 hours Wednesday night, and Thursday morning the hole was bridged again.

Cleaning Nearly Completed

Cleaning of the mud from the hole was said to be almost completed Saturday afternoon, as the casing crew had little more than 100 feet of casing to run Friday afternoon, before the top of the mud was reached.

A packer was on the end of the string of casing, Mr. Sillix stated, and this would stop cave-ins and flows of water that were coming into the casing from a higher level.

John Hoffer of the Railroad Commission, did not order the drillers to run this casing, Mr. Sillix said.

Sillix asserted. "The report that he did was false. We had the casing purchased and already racked before that report was started and as far as we know, Mr. Hoffer has not been to the well this week and has not conferred with any of the owners of the well."

"We are taking our time in cleaning out the hole and believe we are doing it in the right way. Mr. Dutton is in charge of the production of the well now and it is he who is supervising work in the hole. Mr. Dutton is an experienced driller and knows what he is doing."

"When we deepen it will be only a few inches at a time for we might ruin the hole. If the gas and oil is strong enough we will let the well blow itself in after it is cleaned out, but if not we will send the bit deeper only a few inches at a time."

Storage Tanks Full

The storage tanks at the well are full and something must be done with the oil, Mr. Sillix said. It is estimated that the storage capacity at the well is between 1,750 and 2,000 barrels.

It is probable that more storage will be necessary when the hole is clean and the oil flows like it did before the hole bridged, or better.

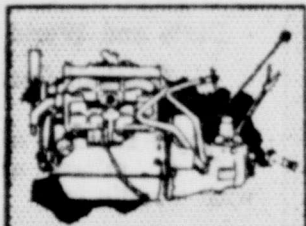

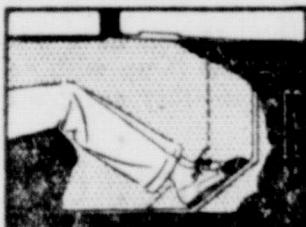

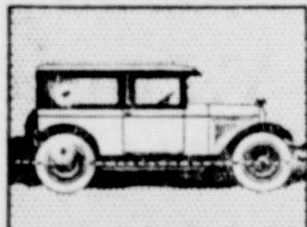

BEARCATS WIN FIRST GAME

After a wobbly take-off from the center of the field the Ballinger Bearcats settled down at the close of the first quarter to play good football and win from the Howard Payne reserves by a score of 3 to 0, here Friday afternoon in the first game of the season for local grid fans.

The Bearcat offense in the first part of the first quarter was weak, but after the reserves had made their one and only first down of the game, the Bearcats started playing football and with the breaks that came their way were able to come out with three more points than the Jacket reserves could obtain.

In the beginning, Nail kicked off for the reserves. It was what might be termed an on-side kick but the Bearcats were unable to keep their hands on the ball and a reserve lineman recovered it on about the 45-yard line. The reserves made one first down right quick and that was all they could manage during the entire game.

The Bearcats started playing football and taking the breaks as they came. The entire line together with the backfield kept their eyes on the ball and the end-runs that made the first first down were stopped for only slight gains each time. The Bearcat line and backs were getting through and downing. Nail, Bailey, Garmes and Harold on such plays, many times being thrown for losses.

It was at the beginning of the second quarter that Doy Smith, right tackle for the locals, got thru the line and recovered a fumble for the Bearcats. After a buck or two in an effort to get thru the line, Jimmie Parrish, Bearcat quarter, called Arthur back to kick. He did, it was a very pretty spiral down the left side of the field. The reserves soon had the ball on their own 20-yard line and then another break came that partly accounted for the three points registered by the Bearcats. A Bearcat recovered a bad pass from center on the Jacket's 12-yard line. After two or three bucks there came a signal for a field goal. Jimmie called it and Middleton passed the ball back to Arthur who was standing on the Jacket's 15-yard line. He took his time and drop-kicked a perfect field goal, the pigskin passing squarely thru the uprights for three points.

The collegians kicked off again and the ball was returned to the center of the field. After making no gains, Arthur punted. The kick was out of bounds. The reserves did the same thing, no gain and then a kick. The quarter ended with the Bearcats in possession of the ball.

In the third quarter, neither team came very near scoring until the close when the Bearcats got the ball near the reserves' goal line. The locals made one first down in this period.

In the fourth period, the Bearcats made a couple of first downs and came near scoring again but the whistle cut them short. The Ballingerites endeavored another field goal in the latter part of this period but it was low and went across the goal line. As the final whistle was sounded, the Bearcats were throwing a reserve back for a loss of about ten yards after a bad pass from center, which was frequent during the entire game.

Few kicks were made, no passes were tried—nothing but end runs and cross bucks. The game was slowed up quite a bit on account of the hot weather.

The Bearcat pep squad was out and furnished the fighting spirit for the team. Miss Lucibel Taylor, teacher of expression at the Senior high school, is in charge of the pep squad and is ably assisted by the four students appointed by the students.

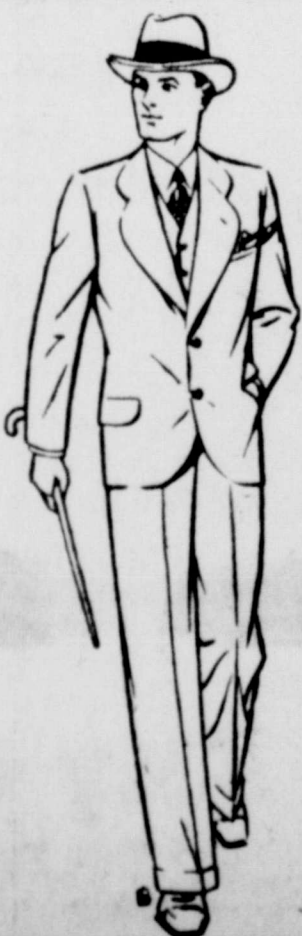
