## Students Drink Much Milk At University

University of Texas students are doing their part to keep the Texas dairy industry booming, a recent 30-day check revealed.

The survey of patrons eating at the Commons, University cafeteria, disclosed 73 milk-drinkers out of each 100 customers at lunch and dinner, 54 out of each 100 breakfast eaters, Dr. Jet Winters, University home economics professor, said.

About 4 percent of the men's trays checked carried more than one half-pint bottle of milk for breakfast, 14 per cent at lunch and dinner, while during the whole month's survey only one girl called for a second bottle. Students are more milk-conscious than are the faculty members, their trays indicated.

All Dawson County farmers and other interested parties attention should be called to the final date of filing assignments of payments under the 1940 Agricultural Conservation Program. This final date was October 31, 1940. No assignment of payments under the 1940 Agricultural Conservation Program will be recognized by the AAA unless part I of the assignment form on which such assignment is made is executed and filed in the office of the County Agricultural Association on or before the above date, except to secure payment for services rendered after October 31, 1940 in carrying out the following practices: (1) construction of terraces, (2) construction of reservoirs and dams, and (3) construction of ditches. The same closing date and regulations apply to assignments made under the 1940 Range Conservation Program.

All assignments for assignments under the 1940 Agricultural Conservation Program are required to be made immediately prior to the time application for payment is made. It is required that all assignment forms be attached to the application for payment. In the event that any part of the indebtedness covered by part of the assignment is paid in full, the amount should be reported to the county office and properly accounted for on the assignment form.

No information is at present available with reference to make 1941 assignments. It is therefore, not permissible at this time to make any assignment for the 1941 crop year.

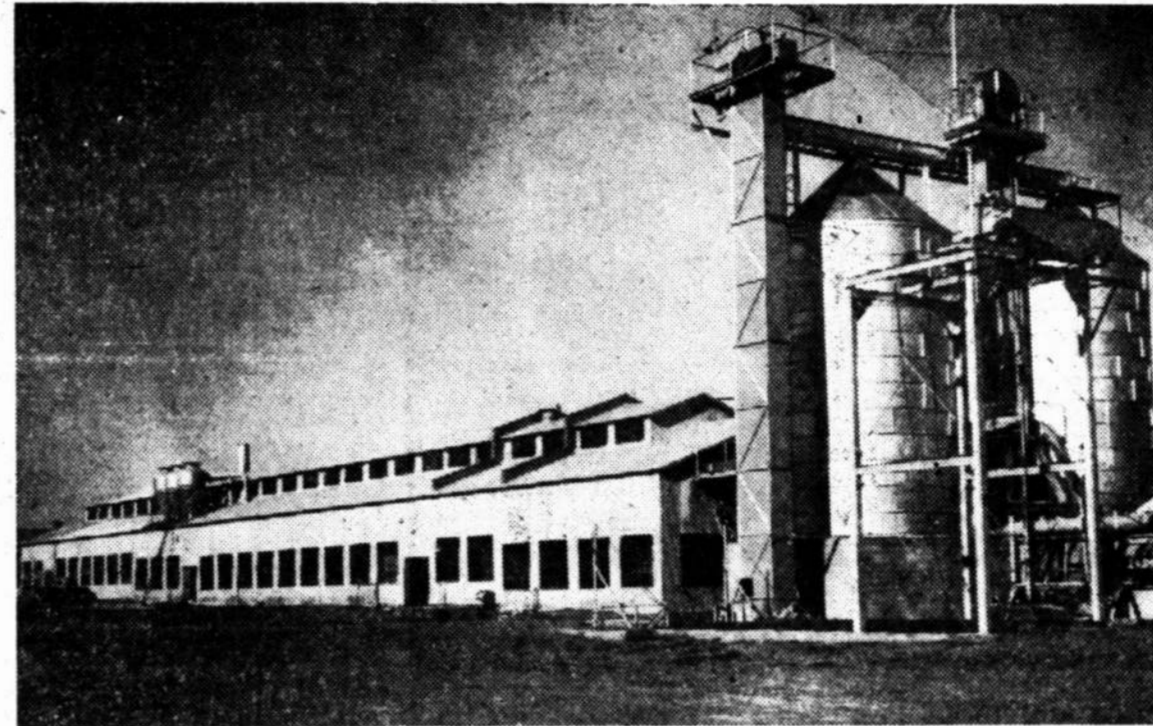

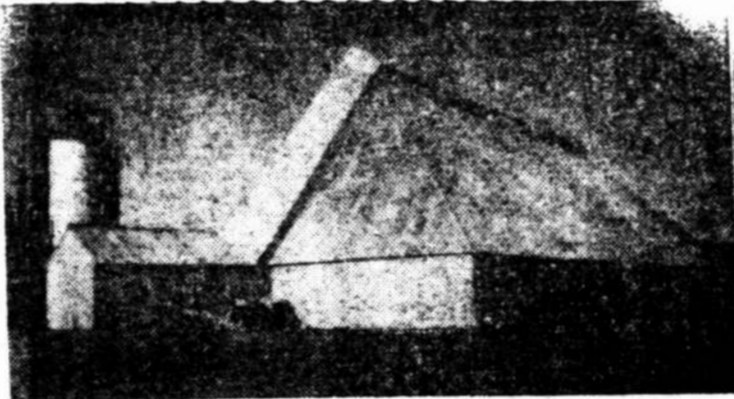

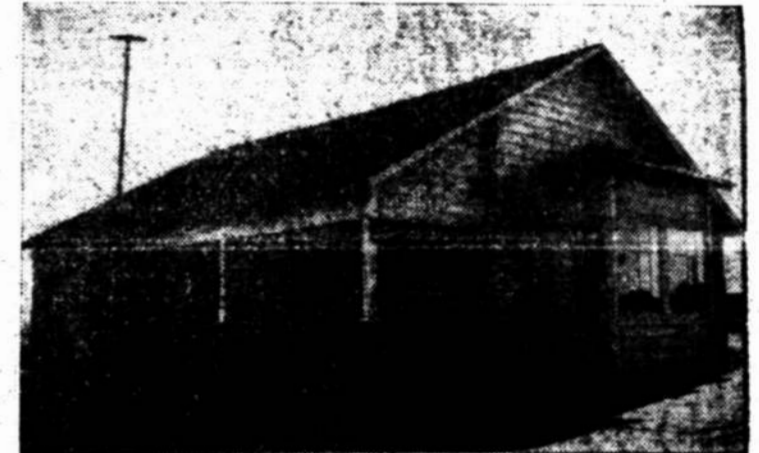

 The seed are elevated into a large tank which holds one-hundred and fifty tons of seed. From here they travel through a sterilizer, which has a chart showing the degree of temperature at all times. This is a part of the Pink Boll Worm requirements.

From the sterilizer the seed go direct to the 7,000 ton seed house, where they are held until needed at the mill.

The seed then travel to another large tank, going from there direct to the mill. The purpose of the second tank is to keep a steady flow of seed going to the mill at all times.

The first unit in the mill proper is the cleaning room, where all foreign substances are removed from the seed, and pneumatically cleaned of all dust.

They then go to the linter rooms, where there are twenty-five linter machines, to remove the lint from the seed. In a small adjoining room are the saw sharpeners, used for sharpening the linter saws. It was stated at the mill, that for the best service these saws should be sharpened every ten to twelve hours, and without this equipment, it would be impossible.

This is the point where all lint is separated from the seed, leaving them completely slick. The lint is sent to the pressers and baled into bales of lint. Ordinarily a ton of seed yields approximately 150 pounds of lint.

The delinted seed then goes to the huling and separating machines where the hulls are cracked, with the meat going one way and the hulls another. This is the final operation for the hulls, while the kernel, or meat, continues on its way through the mill.

The meat then goes to the crushing roll, which breaks down the fat cells of the kernel. From there it goes to the cookers.

Here there are two routes which the meat may take, one to the Hydraulic press and the other to the Expeller presses. In this connection the Lamesa mill is different from any mill in the United States, in that it is the only mill known that has both types of presses.

The products from the Hydraulic press and the expellers then converge to one machine to be made into meal or pellets.

A decided factor in the speed and ease with which the seed will be handled, is the fact that from the time they leave the seed house, clear through to the finished product, they travel in practically a straight line.

The mill will handle approximately 150 tons of seed daily, working twenty-four hours.

The buildings are fire proof construction throughout and there is not a single piece of wood used in the buildings proper. Besides that, as an added precaution against fire a six inch water main has been laid around the entire property with convenient fire plugs at strategic places.

This is possibly the largest single structure in Dawson County. The seed house alone is 90x220 feet

 son for this is that the end of the fiscal year is November 30 and full time will be allowed for carrying all the allowance for the farm. It is expected that approximately 60% or more of the Dawson County farms have earned the maximum soil building allowance for the farm. The allowance for a farm is determined by the amount of neutral land (government land) and the grassland. By allowing 55c per acre for the neutral land plus 10c per acre for grassland, the total allowance is determined. This amount of money is earned by any of the various soil building practices such as cover and grass manure crops, contouring, terracing, construction of tanks, etc. certain rates of payment being allowed for the particular soil building practices. Attention should again be called to all interested tenants, landlords, as well as sharecroppers that regardless of the time of signing the application for payment, the application cannot be submitted until the end of the fiscal year, unless all the full soil building allowance has been earned for the farm. The County office is taking all signatures on all applications as fast as they can be made in order to be ready with as many of the applications as possible as the end of the fiscal year.

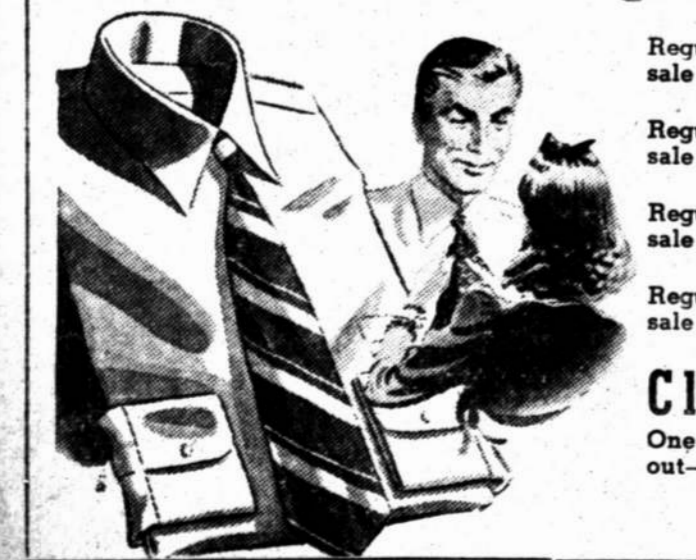

## Seminole Bank To Open For Business Friday

The new Seminole State bank will open for business Friday to provide Seminole with banking facilities for the first time in more than nine years.

Local men interested in the bank who have subscribed stock, have been advised from Austin that a banking department man will be there. Previously he was to have been there Oct. 25 but was unable to make the trip.

Meantime a temporary location has been secured in the A. L. Duff, Jr. building in the first block south of the courthouse square. The bank will operate there until a proposed building on the opposite side of the street, can be completed and occupied.

Stockholders will meet with the banking officials and start off the bank. Officials and directors will be named and then deposits will be received. Capital stock of the bank is \$25,000, with a paid-in surplus of \$5,000.

The former state bank here closed its doors March 6, 1931. Since then approximately 44 per cent of the depositors money in the bank at the closing had been paid by a receiver. It is hoped that the depositors will receive a full 100 per cent payments if oil leases held by the bank, can be developed into production.

The actual construction of the mill in an engineering capacity, was in the hand of Charley Campbell, who was employed by the local firm for his full time, to superintend the actual construction.

Besides those listed above the mill will employ approximately seventy-five mill hands in the operation of the plant.

**Public Speaking Tourneys To Be Streamlined**

Streamlining state public speaking tourneys, a series of new rules have been announced by University of Texas Interscholastic League officials.

Revised as a result of two years of research conducted by the league, several of the more important rule changes are as follows:

Junior declamations, formerly the speaker's choice, must now come from a prescribed list of poetry which lists 1361 pieces. Improved judging standards have also been set up.

Maximum length of senior declamation has been increased from five to seven minutes. Students may use original work.

Extemporaneous speech topics will now center on current events rather than on phases of the yearly debate question—this year, the resource tax problem.

**Microfilm Being Used To Film Whole Volumes Of Rare Books At University**

University of Texas librarians—constantly on the look-out for new and cheaper ways to collect valuable documents and books—have turned to the candid-camera movie.

They are building up a collection of microfilm—film so tiny that six average-size books can be reproduced on one small reel and an entire library can be stored in a single filing cabinet.

Already the University Library has accumulated more than 50,000 feet of this microfilm, or 400 reels containing the equivalent of 2,400 volumes.

The film is projected upon a screen which enlarges the book of manuscript page to at least normal size. The reader then reads from the screen just as if he were scanning the original, turning pages by passing successive frames of the film before the projecting lens.

Three reading machines or projectors are already in use in the University Library by students who read the film-books, and a darkroom in which films may be developed has been set up on the campus.

It cost only \$20.00 to prepare a reel of microfilm, or some \$3.50 per volume. Until microfilming was invented, photostating was the cheapest process available for copying rare books or manuscripts—at about \$18.75 for a single 250-page book.

Simplicity is the secret of the inexpensive process, Mr. Coney, explained. A miniature camera or even a candid camera is the only equipment needed to photograph a printed page or document.

The University was the first educational institution to embark on a microfilm expedition when in 1937 it sent Mr. and Mrs. Barnes Lathrop on a two-year jaunt over seven states from the Atlantic seaboard to the Mississippi delta.

The obtained such "finds" as documents on the John Brown raid; 5,000 pages of Col. E. M. House's papers dealing with his political activities in Texas prior to 1912; all dispatches in the National Archives touching on the Confederacy; all records of the Confederate State Department, now in the Library of Congress; and papers of Jefferson Davis.

Soil Conservation districts are providing permanent assistance to the farmers in carrying out soil and moisture conservation programs on their farms. The following article is an example of the procedure used in creating a district:

**DODGE CITY, Kan. Oct. 21**—The Pawnee County Soil Conservation District has just been notified that the U. S. Department of Agriculture has approved a formal agreement with the U. S. Department of Agriculture in order to receive continued aid from the Soil Conservation Service, according to W. E. Connel, area conservationist of the Service.

The soil conservation district was created in December, 1939 by a 79 per cent favorable vote of the land occupiers of Pawnee County. Its affairs are directed by a board of supervisors composed of Chester R. Beer, A. M. Wagner, J. O. Lane, Lewis M. Boyd and Clarence Cauffman, all of whom are farmers of the county. This district includes headquarters at Larned.

In accordance with the request of the district supervisors the recent agreement provides that the Soil Conservation Service will make surveys, develop conservation farm plans, furnish engineering and other technical assistance, and provide limited amounts of grass, tree and shrub planting stock for farmers of the county who request such help through the supervisors.

The Pawnee district was formed as a result of the farmers and landowners of that county attempting to cooperatively control soil erosion and bring about better use of the land. Although erosion is not as serious in Pawnee County as in some other sections of Kansas, the farm leaders felt that proper protective measures were necessary if the agricultural resources of the county were to be maintained.

A complete program and work plan for the district was drawn up by the supervisors in consultation with various farm groups of the county and with various representatives of the State Extension Service, Soil Conservation Service and other state and federal agencies.

Crop yields on most lands of the county have been gradually decreasing since 1915, according to the supervisors report. Severe erosion, either by wind or water, has occurred on more than 15 percent of the land in the county and an additional 45 per cent of the land has suffered moderate erosion.

Siltation above dams constructed on Pawnee Creek also is a serious problem. One dam on this creek which originally had 16 to 20 feet of water in it, now has a depth of only three feet because of the silt

**Student Loan Fund Mounts**

Loan funds to help University of Texas students cut financial corners while getting their degree now total approximately \$289,000, records here show.

About \$70,000—interest from large endowments—is administered thru the dean of men's office while \$190,000 in straight loan funds and a combination \$25,000 loan and scholarship fund is available through the the University Ex-Students' association, Dean V. I. Moore said.

Interest rates range from four to six per cent, payments falling due within one year. Students receiving loans must have attended the University and show a good scholastic average before they can make application.

**New Highway Tags For '41 Have Arrived Here**

County Tax-Assessor and Collector, R. W. (Buster) Herndon, announced this week that his office has just received the new 1941 automobile license plates for Dawson County.

The passenger car plates for next year will be black background with gold numerals. The numbers will be different than those used here for the past several years. They will begin at 343-701 and run to 347-350. It will be recalled that the numbers for 1940 were about ten thousand less than the 1941 plates, or in the 330,000. A total of 3,549 passenger plates were received.

Commercial plates will begin at 359-001 and run to 359-550, while farm plates will begin at 131-601 and run to 132-000.

The plates are made at the Huntsville penitentiary through the summer, so that the enamel used will have plenty of chance to harden before the plates are actually put in use.

It is pointed out that the plates cannot be used until March of 1941.
