COURT HOUSE SINGERS TO MEET SUNDAY

OK PWA Grant To Local School

Is Supplemented By Bond Issue Voted Earlier This Year

Not Know When Actual Construction Is To Begin

Mr. W. K. Crawley, president of the Lamesa School Board, received a telegram from the Regional Director of Public Works Administration Hon. George M. Bull, last Thursday that Lamesa's application for Federal Aid in the amount of \$66,600 had been granted. The follow-up papers are expected soon and the work of providing additional school buildings will get under way. It is not known how much time will be required for preliminaries but all speed possible will be made to have the contracts for additional space let at an early date.

The amount granted together with the proceeds of the bond issue of last March totals \$149,600 to cover the costs of the projects. The detailed plans and specifications for all buildings and work will be prepared as soon as possible after the necessary documents are executed between the Lamesa Independent School District and Public Works Administration authorities. The work will be done under contracts which are to be let after the elapse of the necessary time for publication of a call for bids.

BROWNFIELD RIGHT-OF-WAY IS SECURED

Right-of-way on the Brownfield road is rapidly being secured, according to reliable information released here this week. It is thought that enough will be gotten by August 25th for actual construction to be started.

Sam Richardson, owner of Richardson's Grocery and Variety Store of Lamesa, was born and raised on a farm in Montague county. His first venture into the business world was with S. H. Kress and Company, in Fort Worth and Wichita Falls. He worked with this company until 1917, when he joined the army and served fourteen months in France with the AEF. Upon his honorable discharge from the army he returned to his old position, for a short time, before accepting a position with a wholesale grocery concern, later going to Amarillo, where he was employed with United 2c to \$1 Store. He stayed with this firm until the summer of 1924 when he came to Lamesa and opened the Self Serving Grocery. He has continuously operated this store since that date. In 1933 he purchased the Thornhill Variety Store and moved the stock to North Austin Street, next door to his grocery store. In 1936 he purchased the building which housed his variety store. In April of this year he bought the building next door and combined the two buildings into one, housing both his variety and grocery business and changed the name to Richardson's Stores. The building was completely rebuilt and modernized. They now boast a floor space of 5,000 square feet, together with a basement 25x30 feet.

Mr. Richardson is a member of the Presbyterian church. He has been most active in civic and religious circles. (Continued on Back Page)

Final Topping Put On Stanton Road To Dawson Co. Line

Workmen this week put the finishing touches on the Stanton road from Lamesa south to the Dawson-Martin county line.

This work was done by WPA labor, and officials are proud of the record made by the men who did this work. At the same time the asphalt was being shot on the Stanton road, Hunter Strain, who was in charge of the work, had another job where the contract labor was being used, and in the same length of time the WPA workers put on more asphalt than the men who were working under the contract. This is quite a signal honor for the local men who did this work and tends to justify the faith that WPA workers can, and in many instances, do as much or more work than if they were working under a different set-up.

The completion of this road in Dawson county marks another step in covering the county with hard surfaced roads so that those living in the rural sections may have the advantages of a surfaced road into Lamesa, where their products are marketed.

S.C.S Notes Speakers Aid Mann In Run-off Contest

Dawson county and the adjoining area covered by the CCC-SCS Camp has constructed approximately 300 miles of broad base level terraces during the past three years. Many miles of these were constructed during this past winter and spring and are generally referred to as first year of new terraces.

Breaks occurred in some of the terraces during the recent heavy dashing rains. Most of these breaks were found on the new unsettled terraces, and varied from two feet to as much as fifteen feet in length. These rains in some cases amounted to as much as four or five inches within an hour.

As a safety measure, the SCS technicians do not recommend close-end terraces for the first year. Under that condition, if the terrace is taxed beyond its storage capacity, a part of the water can escape around the terrace ends.

Another protection for the terrace is to have a good cover crop growing, preferably a solid planting of grain sorghums, cane, or sudan.

After the first year, the ends should be closed to hold all the water where it falls. In many cases this year with proper cover on old terraces, water flowed over the tops of the terraces, but no breaks occurred.

Terraces should be properly spaced and of sufficient height to retain all water falling on the ground during ordinary seasonable rainfall and broad enough at the base to permit easy cultivation.

It was reported that even though terrace breaks occurred, the retarded flow of water up to the breaks permitted sufficient moisture absorption by the soil to more than offset the slight damage by water erosion at the breaks. Even though breaks occurred in some instances, the total erosion was generally considerably less than on unterraced fields with the same soil type and slopes.

Due to the sandy nature of most soils of Dawson county and the adjoining area, a longer time is required for the terraces to properly settle and they are more susceptible to washing if the water goes over the top. Terraces could be built large enough to take care of the exceptionally heavy rains that fall in such short periods of time, but the initial cost would be excessive and the added advantages would not justify the extra expense of construction and disadvantage in cultivation.

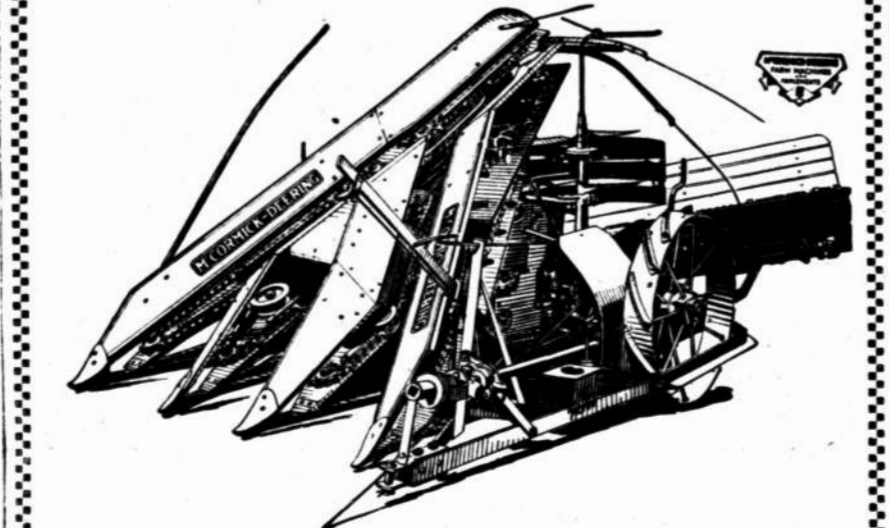

HOUSE JOINT RESOLUTION
 proposing an Amendment to Article XVI, Section 1, of the Constitution of the State of Texas; changing the form of the oath of office for members of the Legislature and all officers of the State of Texas; providing for an election upon such Constitutional Amendment, and making an appropriation therefor.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article XVI, Section 1, of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended to hereafter read as follows:

"Article XVI, Section 1. Official Oath. Members of the Legislature, and all officers, before they enter upon the duties of their offices, shall take the following Oath or Affirmation: I do solemnly swear (or affirm), that I will faithfully execute

the duties of the office of _____ of the United States and of this State; and I furthermore solemnly swear (or affirm), that I have not directly nor indirectly paid, offered, or promised to pay, contributed, nor promised to contribute any money, or valuable things, of the State of Texas, and will to the best of my ability preserve, protect, and defend the Constitution and laws of or promised any public office or employment, as a reward for the giving or withholding a vote at the election at which I was elected. So help me God."

Sec. 2. The foregoing Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to the electors of this state, qualified to vote on Constitutional Amendments, at an election to be held throughout the State on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1938, at which election each ballot shall have printed thereon the words:

"For the Amendment of Article XVI, Section 1, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, changing the form of the oath of office for members of the Legislature and all officers of the State of Texas."

"AGAINST the Amendment of Article XVI, Section 1, of the Constitution of the State of Texas, changing the form of the oath of office for members of the Legislature and all officers of the State of Texas."

Each voter shall scratch out with pen or pencil the clause which he desires to vote against so as to indicate whether he is voting for or against said proposed Amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor of this State is hereby directed to issue the necessary proclamation ordering an election in conformity herewith to determine whether or not the proposed Constitutional Amendment set forth herein shall be adopted, and the Governor shall have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State.

Sec. 4. The sum of Five Thousand Dollars (\$5,000), or so much thereof as may be necessary, is hereby appropriated out of any funds in the Treasury not otherwise appropriated, to pay the expense of such publication and election.

Former Residents Of Jack County To Gather In Lubbock

The scene of the event will be in Lubbock. Mr. Southard said that all former citizens of Jack county, are invited to join in this gala occasion. Picnic lunch will be the order of the day and all are requested to bring well filled baskets, he said. This is an annual affair which has been held each year for the past several years and according to advance information a larger crowd is expected this year than ever before. If you formerly lived in Jack county, plan to attend this event and meet old friends again.

ADVANTAGES OF ABILITY TO SWIM ARE EXPLAINED

With 7,000 death-by-drowning warrants signed and sealed delivery awaits only the right combination of sweltering days and careless swimmers, according to the American Red Cross life saving service, which has done more than any single agency to reduce the annual occurrence of water accidents. Last year approximately this number of drownings were reported in the United States.

Leslie C. Pratt, chairman of the Red Cross life saving service in Dawson county, suggests the following tips to prevent drownings during summer months:

"Do not dive into water that is muddy or of unknown depth without first exploring the bottom with your feet.

"To keep the feet from sinking in a vertical position when floating, relax elbows and knees and open arms and legs to sides. As the arms are brought sharply to the side and held there, the legs should be pressed together, forcing the water out. If this is done slowly and smoothly, it is possible to stay afloat for hours.

"When wading breast-deep in a stream, go against the current and not with it to avoid being swept into deep holes. If you lose your footing, swim with the current, making for the shore at an angle, instead of fighting the stream.

"If you come up beneath a float, hold your breath and open your eyes. There is probably ample air space there and if you don't give way to panic you will be all right.

"It is best to wait at least an hour and a half after eating before going into the water, to insure against cramps.

"When boat or canoe overturns, stay with it. Any rowboat has the buoyancy to support its regular load of people whether right-side or bottom up. Bottom up it furnishes a floating air chamber that will sustain the heads of more people above water than could have possibly been in the boat before it capsized. Right side up and full of water the boat will sustain the heads of its passengers above water if they will sit on the floor and not try to rise as the water creeps toward their chins.

"Do not try to show off skills which

you do not possess. Statistics show men and boys are usually at fault here. About ten males drown for every female. No one is superior to safety regulations.

"The once stable canoe has become ticklish to handle because paddlers insist on sitting on seats with their knees in the air and three quarters of the weight of the body several inches above the water line. A kneeling pad for bow and stern paddlers makes all the difference in the world. A pad of sponge rubber from the dime store, or salt bags stuffed with cotton, will do.

"A non-swimmer can save a drowning person nearby if the former keeps his head. Throw out a ring buoy or a life line, use a row boat or canoe."

To train experts who train life guards and swimming instructors, Leslie C. Pratt, said the Red Cross conducts during the summer months 14 aquatic schools in 13 states, each with an enrollment of more than 100 persons. Students range from novices to trained swimmers, he added. Many are people responsible for the public safety at swimming places, while others are the safety directors at parks and waterfronts who have already qualified as experts.

Numbered among Red Cross instructors at the school are former Olympic swimming champions. Mr. Pratt added. The majority are men with an impressive record of Red Cross experience in teaching others the safety measures and skills found most effective by the organization during nearly a quarter-century of "waterproofing" America.

Dr. Cox Says:

Austin, Aug. 8.—The mean dog that suddenly becomes friendly may transmit hydrophobia or rabies, states Dr. Geo. W. Cox, state health officer in refuting the timeworn belief that rabies must be spread by a frothing "mad dog."

"In the first stage of rabies," Dr. Cox states, "the disposition of the dog changes entirely. A happy, playful dog becomes dejected, creeps away and hides. An ordinarily vicious dog may become friendly. If he licks his master's hand, he may spread rabies through cuts and abrasions on the skin. The dog may be mean at times, and at other times apparently normal."

According to Dr. Cox the phrase "mad dog" is associated with the second stage of rabies. This is the irritable period in which the dog becomes restive, sometimes jumping away and returning hours later, worn out from fighting other dogs. Rabies may be suspected especially if the dog was not formerly in the habit of leaving home. Because of irritation the dog may snap at everything it approaches and will run amuck in crowds, often biting people. The dog's bark changes to a throaty howl in this, the most dangerous stage.

Rabies, according to many authorities has a 100 per cent mortality in man unless Pasteur treatment is instituted. Pasteur treatment, however, is nearly 100 per cent effective in saving lives when properly administered. Rabies must be considered with every dog bite and the history of the dog should be studied to determine the possibility of rabies infection. The dog which bites a person must be caught and confined for ten days observation. If the dog develops hydrophobia it should be killed and the dog's head sent by express, packed in ice, for a laboratory examination. See your family doctor immediately after any dog bite.

The state health department maintains the Pasteur Institute in Austin, where the heads of dogs suspected of rabies are examined. Your family

doctor will immediately avail himself of this service if he has reason to suspect the dog was rabid. Treatment for hydrophobia is supplied by the Pasteur Institute.

Control Water Run-Off For Maximum Benefit

Farming practices that control run-off water also help farmers to get the maximum benefit from rainfall during periods when they need moisture most, according to E. E. Reynolds, conservationist of the Soil Conservation Service erosion control demonstration area near Lamesa.

Since a vegetative cover is necessary on the land at all times to prevent both wind and water erosion, and much of the rainfall comes in heavy downpours of brief duration, any practice which troling erosion.

This is exactly what the practices being demonstrated in the Lamesa area are designed to do.

Properly constructed terraces and contour tillage operations prevent run-off on cultivated land, while contour furrows and ridges, diversion structures and water spreading systems serve the same purpose on range land. Each provides a mechanical barrier which slows the flow of water or impounds the rainfall, thereby permitting the moisture to soak into the soil to become available for plant use.

When water is permitted to run off the land during the period of heavy rainfall, this moisture is lost for plant use on the land upon which it fell. Mr. Reynolds points out. However, he says, if water is available by mechanical structures and stored in the soil, the moisture is available to alleviate the

damage to crops or grass during the periods of extended drouth.

"Evidence of the value of conserving moisture may be seen on contour-tilled and terraced farms and on contour-furrowed pastures in this area," Mr. Reynolds says. "Where moisture has been conserved, fields usually have an even crop stand, and pastures have a denser growth of grass along the furrows.

Controlled Grazing

Amarillo.—Controlled grazing is doing much to improve the grass stand on Texas Panhandle range land which has been subject to damage from the drouths within recent years. Soil Conservation Service range examiners report.

Ranchers have observed that where the range is overgrazed and trampled by livestock the pastures are unproductive and the grass stand remains poor. On the other hand, many ranchers are finding that their pastures are improving rapidly where grazing is rotated and the grass is allowed to seed.

Where the grass is permitted to go to seed every two or three years, ranchers are observing that the plants are being strengthened and become more dense.

Dense grass growth is being found effective in preventing loss of water by run off, checking of gullies, and stopping loss of soil. vaccinated against smallpox or show evidence of having had that disease and parents and guardians are advised to have their children vaccinated before school opens that there may be no interference with early starting.

Children of six years of age before September 1, 1938, will be admitted. Accredited schools are not permitted to receive children who are younger than six excepting in kindergarten and no room is available in the Lamesa schools for this service.

Mr. McCollum of the high school will desire to have a personal conference with each high school pupil before school opens and will soon announce a schedule for such conferences.

A credit in General Mathematics, taught by Mr. R. H. Huddleston, has been added to the list for Lamesa high school to bring the total of credits now held to forty-one and one-half. The units now held are as follows: English 4; History 4 1-2; Civics and Economics 1; Contemporary Social and

Economic Problems one-half; Mathematics 5; Latin 2; Spanish 2; Sciences 5; Home Economics 4 1-2; Commercial Subjects 5; Music 4 and Diversified Occupations 4.

The subject offerings in the high school grades are listed as follows:

First Year, Eighth Grade
Required—Algebra, history, English. Optional—Home Economics; General Science, General Mathematics, Latin, Choral or Instrumental Music.

Second Year, Ninth Grade
Required—Algebra, English History. Optional—Home Economics; Biology Latin, typing, choral or instrumental music.

Third Year, Tenth Grade
Required—English, American History, Plane Geometry.

Optional—Home Economics, chemistry, typing, secretarial training, Spanish Diversified occupations, music.

Fourth Year, Eleventh Grade
Optional—Home Economics, physics, economics Texas history, English History, C. S. & E. P.; Spanish, music, secretarial training, bookkeeping, solid geometry, trigonometry.

Sixteen units or annual courses are required for graduation from the high school. Of these units five and one-half are in the optional lists.

The school offers the courses required for entrance to specialized schools such as engineering, or nursing and pupils who expect to enter college for specialized training should select their courses in line with the entrance requirements of the institution to be attended. This information can be obtained from the principal's office.

The number of credits offered and the variety of subjects compares favorably with similar subjects in the larger high schools of Texas.

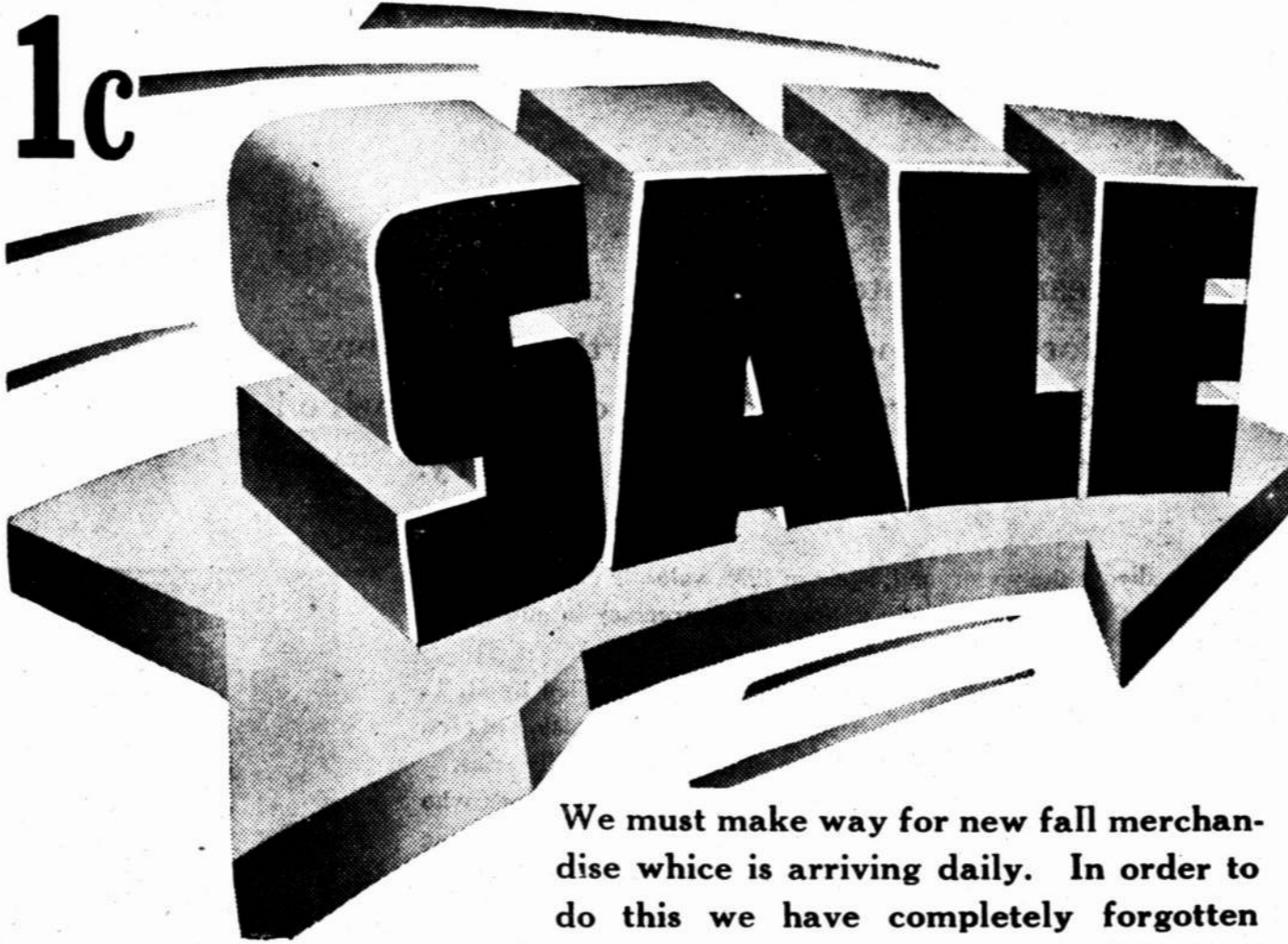
