WORLD SIGHS IN RELIEF AS PAIR ARE FOUND SAFE

DUTCH TANKER CARRYING GIRL AND PILOT TO AZORES ISLANDS

MANY WILD RUMORS

BACKERS PLAN TO MAKE CASH OF PUBLICITY GIVEN FLIGHT

(By Associated Press) PARIS, Oct. 13. — Ruth Elder failed by a scant 800 miles of accomplishing the feat of being the first woman to cross the Atlantic by airplane.

She and her pilot, Captain George Halderman, were forced down on the waters of the Atlantic by a broken oil pipe and tonight were safe and sound aboard the Dutch tanker, *Barndrecht*, which rescued them. Their plane, *The American Girl*, was estimated to have traveled 2000 miles along its 3000 mile journey.

The plane was destroyed by fire as the tanker was attempting to salvage it, the ship reported. The *Barndrecht* is enroute to Antwerp where the couple is to land the aviators Saturday morning. The tanker is believed to have left port at 12:34 north, 23:30 west, about 25 miles north-northeast of the Azores.

The first news of the flight and rescue arrived here at 11:30 a. m. in a radio message. Mrs. Elder sent to the Paris office of the Associated Press. Most of Paris and almost all of the province of Flanders went to bed tonight, thinking the aviator and her pilot had been killed and were not expected to return.

Relief expressed. Hundreds of relief calls were heard at the same time, saying: "She is safe, she is safe, she is safe." The relief was to be had by a steamship and a rescue.

Most of the news printed in Paris tonight had been relayed back across the Atlantic from New York, where it had been sent by the Associated Press shortly before midnight. At the same time, a direct word from the *Barndrecht* arrived there, saying only the initials of the aviator and her pilot.

HUSBAND RECEIVES WIRE FROM GIRL

PANAMA, Oct. 13. (AP) — Lt. Van Hook, husband of Ruth Elder, pilot of the *American Girl*, tonight said that he had received a telegram from the Dutch tanker *Barndrecht*. "Picked up by the steamship *Barndrecht*, both safe, uninjured. Love, Ruth."

Woman after an all-night vigil tonight appeared happy and drawn but happy at the outcome of the flight, although disappointed that she had failed. "With love," she said.

Cupid Kayoes Royal Restraint As Princess Elopes With Officer

Miners, Entombed Far Below Ground, Rescued Uninjured

SCRANTON, Pa., Oct. 13. (AP) — Between 40 and 50 miners trapped in the Peck mine of the Glendale Coal Company at noon today, were rescued tonight. All were in good condition and apparently suffered but slightly from their imprisonment.

The men were shut off from the outside world when a wall in the lower of the colliery collapsed dropping the heavy steel cable holding a mine cage filled with rock. The cage ran wild down the shaft and became wedged just above the Hudak vein, 200 feet below the surface.

More than 200 workers in two over veins got out through an opening so small that the clothing of some of the stouter miners was torn off. The men in the Hudak vein, however, were forced to wait until the obstruction could be cleared.

SANITY TRIAL IS DECREED MILLIKIN

APPELLATE COURT ORDERS NEW TRIAL TO MAN SET FOR DEATH TODAY

AUSTIN, Oct. 13. — The court of criminal appeals late today issued an order of habeas corpus and mandamus requiring that A. V. Millikin who was to be electrocuted Friday, be brought into district court at Lockhart and tried for his sanity.

Millikin, charged with murdering Mrs. Virginia Petty at New Braunfels in 1925, was denied commutation of sentence to life imprisonment by Governor Dan Moody, who declared that circumstances of the case left no other conclusion than that Millikin did the killing.

The court order today was based on affidavits that Millikin is insane. They were signed by Dr. J. P. York of Houston, Rev. Hugh Finnegan, prison chaplain at Huntsville, and Mrs. L. K. Arrington.

Olga W. Finger, clerk of the court, wired Warden N. L. Speer at the prison tonight, informing him of the action.

Date of the sanity hearing, which will be before District Judge Jeffers, who sentenced Millikin to death, had not been set tonight.

REPRISAL GRANTED BY GOVERNOR MOODY

AUSTIN, Oct. 12. (AP) — A. V. Millikin, sentenced to die just after midnight for the slaying of Mrs. Virginia Petty of San Antonio, was seized tonight from the electric chair tonight when Governor Moody granted him a 15-day reprieve.

The governor allowed clemency after the court of criminal appeals had issued an order of habeas corpus and mandamus requiring that Millikin be brought into district court at Lockhart and tried for insanity.

Millikin, who was denied commutation of sentence by Governor Moody Tuesday, will get another chance to beat the chair mainly because Dr. J. P. York, Houston; the Rev. Hugh Finnegan, prison chaplain at Huntsville, and Mrs. L. K. Arrington signed affidavits that he is insane.

Whether a reprieve was necessary largely after the court had reversed weekly trial could not be learned here.

FAIL BACK FOR TRIAL

Former Secretary of Interior Goes Back to Washington to Again Hear Conspiracy Charge

WASHINGTON, Oct. 13. (AP) — Albert H. Fall returned today to the scene of his labors as a public official to stand trial for a second time on a charge of criminal conspiracy in connection with the leasing of the naval oil reserves while he was interior secretary.

This time his co-defendant will be Hiram W. Sinclair, who last Monday lost his fight in the United States Supreme Court to retain possession of Teapot Dome, and who already is under sentence of four months in the District of Columbia, held for contempt of the Senate for reason of his refusal to answer certain questions in the Senate oil inquiry.

RUMANIA AGOG WITH RUMOR OF COURTROMANCE

ILLENA, LIKE CAROL, CRAVED FREE LIFE, GOSSIP SAYS

(By Associated Press) LONDON, Oct. 13. — The West-End-Gazette's Vienna correspondent forwards a dispatch from Bucharest, Rumania, saying: "Official and social circles in Bucharest are buzzing with the rumor that the 19-year-old Princess Illela of Rumania has eloped with a young naval lieutenant, who was one of the late king's aides."

It is thought that it may all be gossip arising from the fact that the young couple are old friends and were recently seen together at a Black Sea resort. The ministry of interior at Bucharest, in response to the inquiry of newspaper men, officially stated that nothing was known of any kind of elopement being undertaken by the Princess Illela.

Some color was left in the story however by the fact that the minister of the household issued a decree Thursday forbidding Rumanian newspapers to publish anything concerning the present whereabouts or trips being undertaken by any member of the royal family.

It always has been thought that Princess Illela had yearnings toward a free life than was possible under the restrictions of the court. It had been suggested that her brother Carol was not the only member of the Rumanian royal family possessing a strain of romance. Princess Illela during the last two or three years, it is recalled, has been betrothed by rumor, although not actually to a member of foreign princes.

'DAWN' PLANS TAKEOFF

Mrs. Grayson Charged by Prospects of Yet Being First Woman to Make Successful Flight

OLD ORCHARD, Maine, Oct. 13. (AP) — After a day in which the elements did their best to spoil the projected flight to Copenhagen, the crew of the Sikorsky plane, "The Dawn," made fresh plans tonight for a start at low tide tomorrow morning.

All seemed greatly pleased with the manner in which the amphibious plane came through its two-hour ordeal when an unusually high tide augmented by strong southeast winds tore at the ship and buffeted with high rollers.

Mrs. Frances W. Grayson, the woman who now expects to be the first to set foot on European soil after trans-Atlantic flight, especially in view of the fate of the "American Girl" said tonight:

"We have gained fresh inspiration and added reliance by today's experience. Our weight expert, T. Harold Kinnahan, says the motors were untouched by moisture. The plane itself is unscathed, and we are certain no water reaches our gasoline tanks."

GOMEZ NOT LOCATED

Child Killed When Explosion Rocks W. Virginia School

MORGANTOWN, W. Va., Oct. 13. (AP) — A child was killed and several others were injured, some seriously, when a charge of explosives was set off near the Everettsville school house, near here late today, according to information received here from the state police detachment at Everettsville.

The blast was set off by a construction firm which was building a road near the school house. Information reaching here said a large stone thrown into the air by the explosion fell through the roof of the one room school house where about 20 children were congregated.

Mary Russell, 12, was killed, she was the daughter of Harry Russell, miner, who was killed in the Everettsville mine explosion of April when more than one hundred men lost their lives.

AMENDMENT MADE TO GAS ORDINANCE

ANY PROPERTY OWNER MAY MAKE CONNECTIONS IF INSPECTION PASSES

In reply to complaints by Lubbock property owners against alleged high prices charged by plumbers for piping of houses for gas, the city commission in session yesterday afternoon passed an amendment to the gas ordinance previously passed.

The amendment allows any property owner in Lubbock to pipe his house for gas, or hire any workman to pipe the house.

The only requirement made of the property owner is that the work comply with the city's inspection and that the permit fee of \$1.50 be paid.

The commissioners also voted to allow the use of rubber tubes for gas appliances, only on condition that one cut-off be used, that attached to the pipe.

A committee from the American Legion headed by H. D. Woods, who appeared before the commission in the interest of a constitutional amendment, were assured that the commission would do all in its power to bring this to a reality.

The mayor and city secretary were authorized to make application for permit to have a gas line run to the city incinerator.

Army Chief Summoned to Capital For Conference On 1928 Budget System

FEAR CAPTURE FOR FLIERS LOST IN NICARAGUA

AVIATORS CRASHED IN MOUNTAINS; NO WORD HEARD SINCE

BANDITS KILLED

MARINES FORM BAND TO SEARCH FOR MISSING PAIR OF FLIERS

(By Associated Press) MANAGUA, Nicaragua, Oct. 13. — Two American aviators who crashed while on patrol last Sunday are missing and marine headquarters fears that they have been captured by bandits and held as hostages.

The aviators, Second Lieutenant L. A. Thomas and Sergeant Frank E. Dowell, at first were reported to have reached Jacinto after the crash, but General L. M. Gulek, today said that this report was erroneous.

The aviators while patrolling the Quilich district in the department of Nueva Segovia, crashed into a mountain near Mount Chipote.

MARINES KILL BANDIT CHIEF

WASHINGTON, Oct. 13. (AP) — American marines have killed the Nicaraguan bandit leader Santos Lopez and captured seven of his men, Admiral David F. Sellers reported today to the navy department.

A second patrol of marines and Nicaraguan gendarmes, the admiral said, is being organized at Managua to search for Lieutenant Earl A. Thomas, of Richmond, Ind., and Sergeant Frank E. Dowell, of Cardinale, Ind., marine aviators missing following a crash several days ago near Quilich.

U. S. BRIDGE GUARDED

Mexico, Place Extra, Guards At Rio Grande Bridge At Halt Fleeing Refugees

DEL RIO, Oct. 13. (AP) — Extra guards have been placed on the Rio Grande by the Mexican government with orders to shoot to kill all persons trying to cross into the United States without using the international bridge.

Many refugees from the revolution and Americans from the interior are coming daily to Del Rio, all telling of disturbed conditions.

American officers said today that orders placing the extra guards is of great help to them in curbing liquor smuggling and crossing of aliens in violation of the quota law. The river is low, and many have been wading across.

TRIO ACQUITTED ON COURT OF SWINDLING IRIQUOIS

MONTREAL, Oct. 13. (AP) — Orrin J. Kellor, his wife, Mrs. Laura Cornelius Kellor and Chief W. K. Cornelius were acquitted late today of the charge of conspiring to obtain \$15,000 by false pretense from Canadian Iriquois. The jury deliberated for twenty minutes.

FIVE PRISONERS PARTICIPATE IN WILD DASH FOR FREEDOM, LED BY MAN CONVICTED HERE FOR CRIME

GOOD SENT UP WITH TOM ROSS FOR KILLING TWO CATTLE INSPECTORS IN HOTEL AT SEMINOLE; WAS SECOND BREAK

(By The Associated Press)

HUNTSVILLE, Oct. 13. — Five or more prisoners are believed to have participated in a prison break here this afternoon led by Milt Good, under life sentence from Lubbock for the murder of two cattle inspectors at Seminole a few years ago. All of them including Good, were recaptured immediately.

Mrs. M. L. Speer, wife of the warden, discovered the men escaping through a tunnel they had dug under the wall and tried to halt them with a gun, but did not succeed. Warden Speer and E. A. Jones, charged by on the outside of the wall to intercept Good and Roy Weight, sent up from Galveston for 15 years for robbery.

The break occurred about 2:30 p. m.

Good was convicted with Tom Ross for the murder of two inspectors for the Texas and Southwest Cattle Raisers' association at Seminole and had escaped before.

GOOD HAS RELATIVES IN THIS VICINITY

Milt Good, with Tom Ross, was sentenced in 1923 for the murder of two livestock inspectors. It was charged that the inspectors were seeking Good and Ross for the theft of cattle.

Both Good and Ross have relatives in this vicinity.

The prison break related in the above dispatch was the second, perpetrated by Good since he entered the penitentiary. On the other occasion, Ross made good his escape, but Good was recaptured in Oklahoma.

ALL OF ESCAPED MEN RECAPTURED

HUNTSVILLE, Oct. 13. AP — All of the men who escaped from the state prison here today were back under the walls tonight.

W. M. Smith and Jose Gonzales, the two remaining men of the five, were recaptured without resistance on Harmon Creek, five miles from Huntsville, after only a brief period of liberty.

The two men were trailed with dogs from the prison. Apparently when they heard the hounds baying in their rear, the men separated. A part of the pack with Warden Speer took a trail of one and the rest of the dogs with Dog Sergeant Tim Cauthon hurried after the other. Both men were caught a short distance from the point where they had separated.

REBELS SLAIN IN FLIGHT

Rebel Chieftain and Thirteen of Followers Slain in Combat With Federal Troops

MEXICO CITY, Oct. 13. (AP) — A rebel chieftain named Vazquez and 13 of his followers have been killed by the militia forces of the Orizaba region in a battle near Huasteca in the state of Vera Cruz. The region where the battle occurred is about 40 miles from Perote where federal troops are pursuing General Aranda Gomez.

The reports of the battle which occurred Wednesday morning do not give the number of rebels and militia engaged but say that Vazquez who is a bandit leader in the Orizaba region is supposed to have assembled a small force to support the Gomez revolutionary movement.

BUT HE DIDN'T COUGH

Fugitive From Justice Throws The Laugh on San Angelo Officers By Luring Them Astray

SAN ANGELO, Oct. 13. AP — Had J. S. Barrow, charged with swindling and jail breaking, coughed he might have been lying in jail at San Angelo awaiting return to the San Angelo jail from which he was a fugitive but he did not cough and today was being sought by the officers whom he subverted.

Barrow told officers here that he knew the hiding place of F. W. Ritter, bank robber and Frank Harrison, alleged robber. The officers took the prisoner and walked five miles through timberland and arrested another man on their stomachs when Barrow said: "Wait here until I cough!"

The officers waited for an hour and then came back. They neither had Barrow nor the two prisoners who had escaped jail several weeks ago.

BREAKFAST—Baked peaches, boiled rice with chopped chicken, creamed potatoes, baked apples, banana milk, coffee.

LUNCHEON—Creamed chicken, soup, lettuce, bread, peach compote, apple sauce.

DINNER—Lamb chops, creamed rice, baked potatoes, green beans, milk, coffee.

Hot watermelon is cut in balls and put in French dressing for one hour. Cream cheese is combined with chopped nuts and olives and made into small balls and chilled for one hour. The melon balls and cheese balls are then served on lettuce with French dressing poured over the whole.

Lamb Pie.
Sixteen small white onions, 1-2 cups of cold roast lamb, 2 medium sized tomatoes, 1 teaspoon salt, 1-4 teaspoon pepper, 1 tablespoon butter, 1 tablespoon flour, baking powder, onion dough.

Peel onions and cook uncovered in slightly salted boiling water until tender but not broken. Drain and put into a buttered baking dish. Remove meat from lamb bone. Cover lamb with cold water and bring slowly to a boiling point. Simmer for 20 minutes. There should be 1-2 cups of broth. Cover onions by baking dish with meat and cover meat with a layer of peeled and sliced tomatoes. Sprinkle with salt and pepper. Rub butter and flour together and sprinkle over tomatoes. Pour over lamb broth and cover with a sheet of dough about 2-4 inch thick. Bake 30 minutes in a hot oven and serve from baking dish.

CHICAGO GRAIN
CHICAGO, Oct. 13 (AP)—With the wheat market at a low level, and reports that most wheat arriving there is of tough quality, wheat prices here advanced today. Export business, chiefly United States spring wheat, was active. Closing quotations on wheat were firm 3-5 cents to 1-2 cents higher. Corn finished 1-2 to 1-3 cents down, provisions varying from 15 cents decline to a rise of 15 cents.

All deliveries of corn touched a new low price record for the season. Weather conditions were favorable, and a government forecast said cattle feeding this winter is expected to be considerably less than last winter in the corn belt and in western states as well. Cattle averaged lower, sympathizing with corn.

Most of the provision list is higher, owing to an advance in hog values.

NEW YORK COTTON
NEW YORK, Oct. 13 (AP)—Early declines were followed by a sharp recovery in the cotton market today on trade buying and covering by recent sellers, influenced by reports of unfavorable weather in the south over the holiday and talk of probable large figures on domestic mill consumption for September.

September contracts advanced from 20.45 to 21.45, or 42 points above last Tuesday's final quotations and closed at 21.00. The general market closed very steady, at net advances of 35 to 42 points.

The market opened easy at a decline of 7 to 11 points under selling which appeared to include an over holiday accumulation of southern biddings and some further liquidation. October eased off to 20.35 and March to 20.75, net declines of 15 to 18 points, but offerings were absorbed by covering and trade buying at these figures, the market turning upward later in the day.

It looked as if the early buying had left a comparative scarcity of contracts, while the covering movement was stimulated by the detailed weather reports for Wednesday showing cold rains over a good part of the belt. The forecast for light frosts in the Carolinas, Georgia and Alabama may have contributed to the advance, although today's details showed more favorable conditions in the southwest, and the impression prevailed in some quarters that the cold snap was passing without killing temperatures except possibly at a few points in the northwest. Talk of probable figures on domestic consumption for September, was another factor mentioned on the advance, and there may have been some covering in anticipation of such a report from the census bureau tomorrow. Some Wall Street buying was reported during the afternoon, and local buyers said trade buying to fix prices was more active today, particularly on the early decline.

The first born of the crown prince and his Swedish bride weighed seven pounds.

Congratulations Pour In
This afternoon she was christened Christiane Charlotte Louise Harriet Elizabeth Astrid. Tonight all of Belgium is drinking her health and from all over the world messages are pouring into Brussels from kings, presidents and many others of low as well as high estate. They bring congratulations to the parents and also to King Albert and Queen Elizabeth, who have now achieved the status of grand parents.

PLANS TO BEAUTIFY PARKS BEING MADE

PROPOSED PROGRAM WOULD MAKE LUBBOCK CENTER FOR PLAINS PARKS

Plans are now being worked out by civic leaders which, it is estimated, will make Lubbock the center of the most beautiful park on the South Plains.

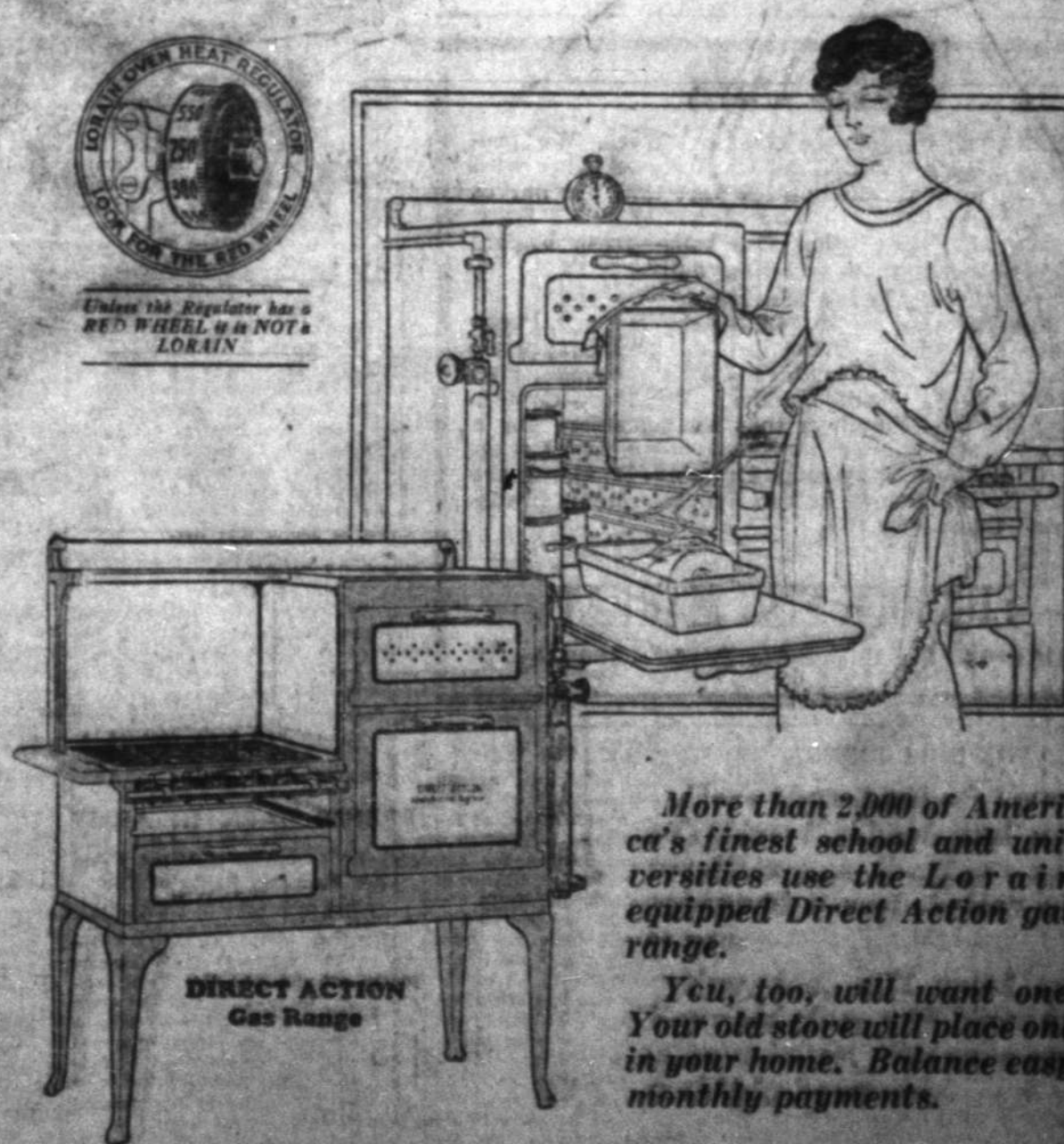

"The message sent from the tanker Barendrecht, which picked up Miss Elder and her co-pilot, Captain George Haldeman and released by the steamer Barendrecht reads: "We are safe and no one any worse off. Landed by steamer Barendrecht. Wire you plans later. Love Ruth."

PROMOTERS PLAN TO CASH IN ON FLIGHT

NEW YORK, Oct. 12 (AP)—Promoters of Ruth Elder's attempted flight to Paris are at a meeting to "cash in" on the venture. J. H. Cornell, of Lakeland, Fla., one of the promoters, decided to cable Miss Elder instructing her to send a dispatch to American newspapers describing her flight. The story of the flight, Cornell said, had been sold to a syndicate and anything that Miss Elder might send to any other newspaper would run the commercial value of her story down.

"We're going to keep this thing bottled up until we sell it," T. H. McArden, another of the promoters, told newspapermen who were seeking information. "I don't mind telling you that the fliers were instructed to talk to no one until they heard from us."

"Anyone would be dumb not to know there is money in this and we would be dumb if we didn't take it."

HOME TOWN GOES WILD OVER NEWS

LAKELAND, Fla., Oct. 12 (AP)—The home town of Ruth Elder and George Haldeman, outdid itself today in wild jubilee over news that the trans-Atlantic fliers had been picked up at sea.

It mattered not that the "American Girl" had failed to reach its destination and thus achieve for its fair young pilot her ambition to be the first woman to fly from New York to Paris. Ruth Elder and George Haldeman, cheerers of raillings crowds who thronged the streets throughout the day and well into the night demonstrated the home folks' appreciation and gratitude.

Virtually all normal activities here had been suspended for two days while word of the flight was awaited.

ON TO PARIS ORDER OF GIRL'S BACKERS

WHEELING, W. Va., Oct. 12 (AP)—"On to Paris" was the terse, clear-cut message of instruction to flight from Wheeling backers of the American Girl trans-Atlantic flight to Miss Ruth Elder, daring aviator, and her co-pilot, George Haldeman, now safe aboard a Dutch junker somewhere near the Azores. Captain Haldeman requested instructions from the sponsors of the flight after he and Miss Elder had been snatched aboard the steamer from the tossing ocean surface. The message was relayed by radio from the tanker Barendrecht to the Paris office of the Associated Press, and then by cable to Joseph D. Halloway of Wheeling, one of the sponsors. The reply was transmitted through the Associated Press to Paris and then by radio to the air at sea.

"Miss Elder wanted to go to Paris," said Halloway in explaining the instructions given Haldeman. "She tried hard to get there by plane, and to turn them back now would be cruel and indicative of lack of appreciation. Let her on by steamer and reap the glory which is justly due her."

WIFE OF PILOT SAYS SHE IS HAPPY

NEW YORK, Oct. 12 (AP)—Mrs. Virginia Haldeman, wife of the pilot of the American Girl, was "all right, just happy as a queen" today when she was told by the Associated Press that her husband and Ruth Elder had been rescued at sea after a broken off pipe had forced down their plane.

REBELS BACK IN ARMY

800 of Them Who Mutinied Again Are Placed in Ranks of the Mexican Federal Force

MEXICO CITY, Oct. 12 (AP)—About 800 soldiers and twenty junior officers who left their garisons in Mexico City and the state of Vera Cruz and went into a fifteen-day revolutionary movement and who surrendered to federal troops after Sunday's battle at Ayacucho are being incorporated again in the federal army.

FLIER THRILLS FAIR CROWD WATCHING COTTON DUSTING

TEXAS, Oct. 12 (AP)—Thousands watching an airplane race at a demonstration during races at the state fair of Texas here today were thrilled when the plane flew low and broke the barrier with its landing gear, thinking it a stunt on the part of the pilot, Lieutenant Ponoy of Los Oak.

Ponoy later said the breaking of the rope was unintentional and admitted he had had a narrow escape from a serious accident. Had the propeller struck the rope it might have been disastrous, it was declared.

day printed a special dispatch from Bucharest declaring rumors were prevalent in the Rumanian capital that Princess Helena had eloped with a young naval lieutenant, aide de camp to the late King Ferdinand, her father.

The cable to the Evening Post read: "Princess Carol's youngest sister, Princess Helena, has been the cause of worry in governmental circles and the subject of gossip in society circles. Rumor has it that Princess Helena, following Carol's example in defiance of all court etiquette and custom, has thrown overboard the Rumanian King's son and all other suitors for her hand and has eloped with a young naval lieutenant whose beauty and courtly manner caused him to be selected among thousands of eligible officers as late King Ferdinand's aide de camp.

Young Lieutenant Won. "The lieutenant didn't have much to do around the palace so he improved his time by cultivating Princess Helena and succeeded in winning her hand."

"For many days, being hasn't been seen in Bucharest and everyone was wondering what had happened to her until the story leaked out. As was done when Carol fled from the machinations and intrigues of premier Bratianu so it was with Helena. The government did its utmost to prevent the elopement becoming known. The master of the royal household issued a decree forbidding the Rumanian newspapers to print any story concerning "The journey of any member of the Royal Family." The spokesman of the Ministry of the Interior said he knew nothing of any journey of Helena.

SEEK TO LINK HOLDUPS

Police of Two Cities Attempting To Connect Other Robberies With Eddy Theft Suspect

TEMPLE, Oct. 12 (AP)—Police of two cities are attempting to connect M. C. Woodson, arrested here yesterday in connection with the robbery of the First National Bank at Eddy, with other bank holdups. Sheriff John R. Bigham was asked to return the prisoner to Shawnee, Okla., if the serial number of Woodson's automobile corresponded to a set sent by the chief of police of the Oklahoma city. Sheriff Bigham said the numbers corresponded.

The sheriff of Hayes county requested the suspect be held for investigation in connection with the robbery of the Buda bank. Woodson was taken to Waco this morning.

NORFLEET

The Manhunter's Own
True Story

As told to Gordon Hines



WHAT HAS BEEN TOLD:

Frank Norfleet, a North Texas ranchman, goes to Dallas on business trip. He meets an outpost of a swindling organization and, within a short time, he is swindled out of \$45,000 by the old stock exchange game. Norfleet, at first, is too stunned to know what to do, but his mind clears and he resolves to destroy the ring. His wife urges him to let the courts avenge his wrongs. His anger cools and he sets about the task of trailing his men. His clues are very vague but he finally recalls a little red memo book that tumbled out of the pocket of Stetson the leader of the gang. It draws on Norfleet that this was the sucker list. He remembered that a man named Cathey, of Corpus Christi, was on the list. He starts for Corpus Christi, stopping off at San Antonio. He learns, here, that a man resembling Stetson had registered at a hotel under the name of J. Harrison. He visits the police station and, while there, a little shaggy fellow is charged with the theft of a fur coat. She tells Norfleet she sold it to a man in 113 at the St. Anthony. Norfleet finds that J. Harrison occupied 113. He lets that clue drop for the time and goes to Corpus Christi where he finds that Cathey has gone to California.

It was while discussing the many angles of the tangled problem with my wife that I decided to go to California. It happened in an unlooked-for manner.

Mrs. Norfleet said to me: "You know, Frank, while you were in San Antonio and Corpus Christi, I was thinking of this Spencer's good deal. He traveled a considerable bit, didn't he?"

I said that his tales to me would indicate that he had knuckled up the deal in several states.

"When he left our house after his visit, I knew more about the geography of the United States than I ever learned in school. Sometimes I have wondered if he had really been in all the places he told about."

The pretty little valley town, nestled at the foot of Arrow Head Mountain, was in holiday dress. Festoons of green draped the doorways and windows of the little store homes. Wreaths pressed their wide red ribbon bows against the panes of the small shops.

I thought of the cozy fires and my family back home and was depressed by loneliness. I felt so lost and alone that I was willing to take a hopeless mission. I was struck by the feeling of panic which seizes one who has made a hasty decision and who wonders if he regrets it. I thought of the insanity of coming so far, simply because five men

had never mentioned California in their conversation.

What reasoning! I had been a fool, jumping at foolish conclusions for no sound reason at all. I felt like ducking for home before anyone found out what a fool I'd been!

I walked alone through the silent streets. Outside, all was quiet as I passed down an avenue of beautiful Spanish-type homes. Inside were gay lights and happy moving figures.

I sighed. In the rosy glow of lights inside the houses, I could see dolls, doll carriages, tiny doll houses; bright colored horns that suggested a riot of noise in the morning; and drums in add to the glad pandemonium; rocking-horses to be ridden across living-room "rungs," where wild animals and whooping Indians lurked beneath davenport and behind portly chairs. Figures moved stealthily about, arranging the things that would gladden the kiddies' hearts in the morning. One young father caught his better half beneath the mistletoe and kissed her soundly. They laughed and scuffled slightly, as if afraid of waking the young offspring.

I wondered what sort of Christmas the folks at home were planning. They would probably find something amiss, about the old place, for never before had a Christmas passed with one of us away.

Home! What a word that is! What a chord of emotion it strikes in us when we are away at such a time as Christmas.

The Nation's Backbone—Home! Yet one man will destroy another's home to humor the whims of his own household.

Any one of the men I sought might at that moment be the center of just such a happy group as those I had been watching. I tried to picture some of them that way, with wives and children, distributed Christmas cheer among them. But my sense of humor got the better of me. I could see Spencer and Stetson squabbling down a chimney and making a general clean-up of toys and gifts, hastening up again before the man of the house could stop them and bring their thieving necks. Figuratively, that's exactly what they had done to my children, except that it was much more serious than the mere loss of a few children's toys. The loss of our modest wealth had deprived our children of the education and the shyness in life which we had shared for years to give them. It may take another generation or two of poverty and

hard work in the Norfleet family to build up what these men have torn down.

I wondered what I would do if I should come upon one of my men in the midst of a happy family. Could I carry out my resolve and tear him away from them? I disliked the thought. Perhaps the fear that I might have such a decision to make caused me to end my rambling walking and thinking.

In the morning, I went immediately to the sheriff's office. I had often heard of Sheriff Walter A. Shay, but I was not prepared for the kind of interest and co-operation he gave me and, especially, for the surprise I got.

If all members of the country's law-enforcement machinery were one little whit as considerate, conscientious and willing to cooperate in the administration of their duties as Walter A. Shay, America's crime problem would cease to exist. My several years of observation proved conclusively to me that crime only flourishes where law enforcement is lax or weak.

Shay was on duty. I introduced myself and stated for whom I was looking.

"I have a hunch the gang I'm looking for may be in this state, somewhere, and I figured this was as good a place as any to make a start," I said. "And Sheriff, I'm depending on your help. I'm green in this business."

"I'd sure like to help you a little, maybe I can," he drawled and I thought I caught a twinkle in his eyes. "Of course, I don't make a practice of giving every stranger in town a Christmas present, but, seeing it's you—" and he stopped, leaving me wondering.

He got up slowly and motioned for me to follow him. I hardly knew how to figure him out. He was acting strangely. Maybe he was going to lug me for the nut I probably seemed to be!

He led the way to the cells and I followed. My heart beat like a trip hammer against my ribs.

"Look in there, Norfleet!"

I pressed my nose against the meshed iron cage and peered searchingly through the dim light. I could make out two figures in adjoining cells, but could not identify them.

BIG SPRING WELL HITS OIL IN LIME

STRIKE BEARS OUT THEORY HELD CONCERNING FORMATION

(Special To The Avalanche)

BIG SPRING, Oct. 12. — The Marland Oil company Clay E. 1, located in the southeast quarter of Section 13, Block 22, W. & N. W. Survey, Howard county, about three-fourths of a mile from the Hyer discovery well in this field encountered oil in lime at 2484 feet. The fluid began rising and was reported to be standing within 200 feet of the top at the end of the week.

This find is considered of exceptional significance by the oil fraternity here as it proves the theory long held by many geologists that there was oil in the lime below the sands which have been heretofore producing in the Clay, Chalk and Settles areas. This belief was founded largely upon the fact that oil has been encountered in smaller quantities in the Deep Rock, O'Daniel and other wells in this well-known trend to the northwest toward the Westbrook field. Relatively speaking the lime was encountered in this new well at a much higher point structurally than these other tests.

Some operators are already planning to carry wells which are now small producers in the shallow sands to the newly discovered horizon and are watching with much interest the completion of the Marland Well. This well has not been shot nor has all the pay formation been drilled to this time. The Magnolia company has a deep test pany has a deep test in progress in the southwest quarter of Section 136 in this same block which should be down to this depth within the next few days. Until drilling is completed the well given a to estimate the production, however many experienced operators are guessing around 1000 bbls.

S. C. P. Vosper, professor of architecture at the University of Texas will also serve as a committee member. Other members of the committee will be Mrs. Spoons, Mayor P. G. Lovinskiold, Robert Driscoll, Russell Savage and City Engineer H. Levinson.

The initial meeting of this committee was held Tuesday afternoon October 11. A general discussion of ways and means to improve the bay front to the best advantage was the most important feature of this conference. Their next meeting will be held on October 16.

According to the plan that is now under consideration, approximately 16 city blocks which are now under water will be reclaimed. This reclamation will be accomplished by constructing a bulk-head 310 feet out in Corpus Christi Bay and filling in the space to the present shore line.

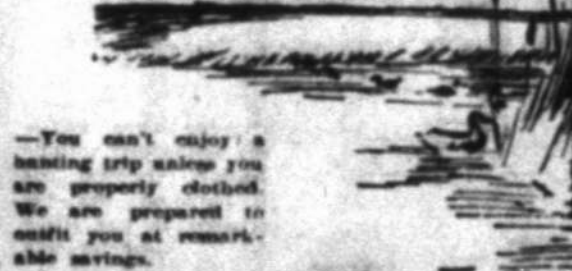

RECORD BOOK FOR GRAZING IS URGED

ACCURATE ACCOUNT OF ALL BENEFITS IS NECESSARY, AWARD ASSAYS

COLLEGE STATION, Oct. 12.—As an aid to the farmer in determining the most profitable winter grazing crops for each section of Texas, a record book for keeping accurate account of the benefits accruing from different crops in different counties and under different soil conditions, has been prepared and will be supplied to those who desire to keep such a record. C. H. Alvord, director of the Extension Service, A. & M. College of Texas has announced.

Specialists of the Extension Service have pointed out that experience has revealed Texas has a winter climate that permits the growing of green crops for pasture purposes and that livestock may be made to play an increasingly important part in a profitable farming program through the utilization of such crops. The grazing record book in question has been prepared to assist the farmer in keeping a check on the crops that prove most valuable in his section. Those interested should talk to their county agent or write the Extension Service, Director Alvord has announced.

Scores Hurt In Chinese Riots

FOOCHOW CHINA, Oct. 12 (AP)—Scores were injured in a battle today between Peking students and soldiers of Tang Hsuehling, the provincial military officer. The students were demanding the immediate expulsion of Tang Hsuehling, following upon the latter's demand for a million Mexican dollars for leaving. He is accused of wholesale graft.

The populace have paid a half million and refused to pay more. Tang Hsuehling has fled to a monastery in the countryside and there came further reprisals against the district unless the balance is paid.

FERRET OUT FLOGGERS

100 Indictments in Alabama Probe Promised as Prosecutor Clamps Down Lid of the Law

LIVERNE, Ala., Oct. 12 (AP)—More than 100 indictments that will result in "at least 100 convictions and prison sentences" will be returned by the special grand jury investigating masked floggings in Crenshaw county, Attorney General Charles C. McCall said today. He indicated that the jury probably will report to Judge A. E. Gamble tomorrow.

Today's session of the grand jury was marked by the appearance of four men said to have been members of whipping parties in Crenshaw county, J. P. Williamson, Shelby Gregory and Mable and Phaxton Miller were taken into custody in Montgomery and brought to Liverne today to testify before the grand jury.

Agriculture Head Lauds Howard Co.

(Special To The Avalanche) BIG SPRING, Oct. 13.—Assistant Chief Evans of the U. S. Department of Agriculture spent Monday, October 10, in Big Spring and Howard county inspecting the county with reference to its agricultural possibilities. THROCKMORTON TO VOTE ON BONDS

PETITION IN CIRCULATION AND ELECTION TO BE CALLED SHORTLY

THROCKMORTON, Oct. 12.—Movement underfoot here for voting a road bond issue of \$500,000 for hard-surfacing designated highways which pass through Throckmorton county. The issue will be voted on within the next month or so, as a petition is already in circulation and is being widely approved.

Throckmorton, long noted as the wealthiest town in the county, has enjoyed marked improvement in business and commercial life following announcement of the extension of the Glaco and Northwestern Railway to that point. Grade work on the extension has progressed rapidly and the line is expected to be in operation by March 1.

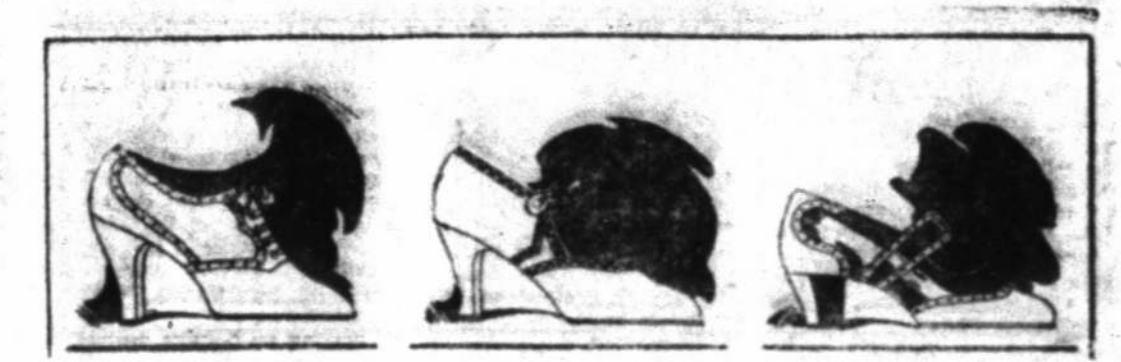

PLAN NEW STATION IN CITY FLOYDADA

**FUTURE NEEDS TO BE GIVEN
CONSIDERATION IN PLANS
QUANAH RAILROAD**

(Special To The Avalanche)
FLOYDADA, Oct. 13.—C. H. Sommer, president of the Quanah and Pacific Railway company, this week in a letter addressed to Judge L. G. Matthews, attorney for the Quanah line in the county, for the information of Mayor W. D. Smith and the city council, definitely commits this railway company to their proposal to construct at the Mississippi street intersection of their line the station, which is proposed to be built several days ago.

A sketch of the station in colors is in preparation and will be here for inspection by the city council and other citizens interested, Mr. Sommer advised Mr. Matthews.

"We are figuring on the future of Floydada," Mr. Sommer wrote in referring to the building of the station, "which would probably be larger than the immediate needs would demand. We feel that with the advent of the Quanah line Floydada will grow rapidly and need much larger facilities than at present," he said.

Dimensions of Station.
Referring to the dimensions and the cost of the building, Mr. Sommer states that the building and the platform will be in excess of 200 feet in length. The general waiting room will not be less than twenty by thirty-five feet, possibly a little larger.

There will be a separate negro waiting room, both rooms to be equipped with separate lavatories, and with a ticket office between, and a baggage office on the other side of the negro waiting room. This will complete the passenger department, except that on the outside of the building, to the south, the building will have a porte-cochere, and while the present plan shows the shelter approximately seventeen by twenty-five feet wide.

The tiled roof shed will likely be extended so that during the hot weather there will be room for the passengers on the outside. Extending north from the baggage room will be an express room followed by a freight room, and at the extreme north end will be a freight platform.

The building is estimated to cost around \$35,000, which does not include outside platforms and other extras, which will add considerably to the cost.

The vote on the matter of closing the street will be held on Monday, October 21, the election for the purpose, having been called by Mayor Smith last week, upon receipt of petition from the railway company and a number of interested citizens.

Building Program In Big Spring Once More Has Interest

(Special To The Avalanche)
BIG SPRING, Oct. 13.—The building program that has been taking place in Big Spring for the last two years has shown a renewed interest during the last few weeks.

The Lyle investment company of Fort Worth, who have put on a number of city additions in West Texas are soon to place on the market 250 lots in Edward Heights, a restricted residential district. This site is southwest of Big Spring, overlooking the golf links.

The Crawford hotel is nearing completion and according to Calvin Dinkin, manager of the hotel, this building will be ready for occupancy on or about November 1.

The Douglas hotel at the corner of Main and East Third is well under way. This hotel will contain 30 rooms in the first unit, with seven store buildings. According to Mr. Douglas, builder of the hotel, as soon as the building is completed, many new residences are under construction in every part of the city.

Littlefield Gets A New Warehouse

(Special To The Avalanche)
LITTLEFIELD, Oct. 13.—The West Texas Congress and Warehouse company is today beginning the erection of the first unit of a very large concrete warehouse here at Littlefield. Surveying is being done for the laying of the tracks from the main line of the Santa Fe and work will be under way on this large development in a short time.

The company being erected by the Underwood interests is being rapidly completed. It is one of the largest and best in West Texas. It will be ready to begin compressing cotton next week.

The erection of a company here and the building of a bonded warehouse shows the importance of Littlefield as a cotton market. With continued dry weather cotton is beginning to open rapidly and prospects have increased tremendously during the past two weeks. It is now expected that Lamb county will ship 20,000 bales of cotton this year.

ORIENT RAN SOUGHT Canadian Political Party Seeks To Have Law Passed Excluding Chinese and Japanese.

**BRANDING OF POULTRY TO BE
STARTED AT ONCE BY
FARMERS THERE**

TULIA, Oct. 13.—A two-fold emphasis was stressed by the speakers at a gathering of more than 200 poultry raisers here Saturday afternoon when they perfected the organization of the Swisher County Anti-Theft association. It was the consensus of opinion that every member of the association start at once to brand all his poultry; and that legislative enactment be sought to require all produce dealers and buyers to register the brands and identification of all fowls purchased. During the meeting more than 150 paid up membership fees for one year and others are reporting. It is believed that over 250 will join the association.

The officers elected to the association were: Emmitt LaRoe, president, Tulia; Seth Whitman, vice-president, Happy; Harmon Benton, secretary, Tulia; Mrs. G. A. Hall, treasurer, Tulia; executive council J. E. Bowman, Kress and John H. Adams, Houston community, with J. G. Bass, Tulia, and John Burgess, Happy, alternates. The secretary has ordered a large supply of tattoo markers and soon all poultry in Swisher county will be branded, and a record will be kept with the secretary of the association of every brand, and owner. It was believed that chicken and turkey stealing would be largely minimized at once. However, it was the opinion that the efforts will be greatly assisted by other counties forming similar organizations, and the legislative enactment protecting the poultryman—similar to that of the cowman. Foster and Randall counties have formed similar associations and other counties are taking up the work. The next meeting of the association will be held at Tulia on October 22.
