shopping events in Colorado City's recent history.

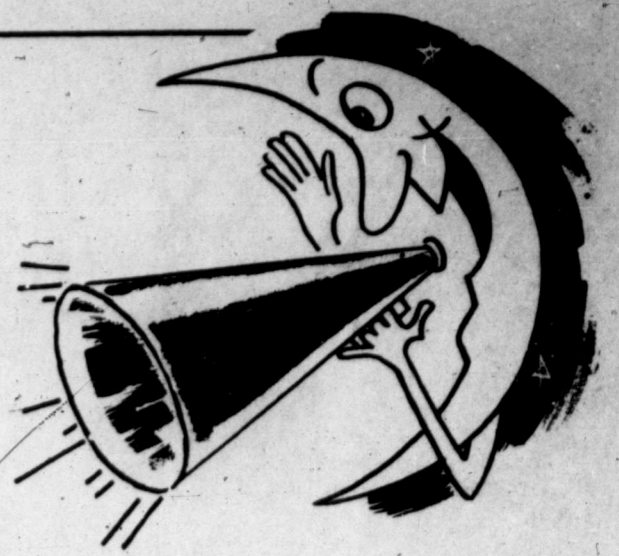

Crane Defends Lone Wolf Title

Officials Are Named

Show Moves Up To Jan. 1 Date

Mitchell County 4-H & FFA stock show has been moved up on the calendar to Jan. 1, 2 and 3.

The new dates were set Monday night at a meeting of show directors to avoid conflict with revamped dates for major West Texas Shows.

Two community stock shows, Loraine and Westbrook, will precede the county show.

Loraine's annual show will kickoff the series Dec. 20. Following Dec. 31 and Jan. 1 will be Westbrook.

Westbrook's show will be concluded in time Jan. 1 for exhibitors to move their animals into county show barns before the county's deadline.

With Mitchell County 4-H & FFA Show switched to Jan. 1-3 from a previous schedule

of Jan. 16-18, directors revised rules for the swine competition.

Swine must be between 155 and 240 pounds. Previous weight range had been 170 to 240 pounds.

Weight requirements are being changed for the 1970 show to allow for those exhibitors who bought animals with a target show date of mid-January instead of the new, earlier Jan. 1-3 dates.

Six weight classes for the county swine will be in two weight classes, light and heavy, for three divisions -- Durocs, Hampshires, other breeds and crossbreds.

Jimmy Moody will be general superintendent for the county show. Other officials will include J. D. Hill Jr. and Dr. Bill B. Bridgford, steer superintendents; C. A. Northcutt, superintendent, and J. W. Boyd, assistant superintendent, sheep; Bob McClure, superintendent, and Harry Dockrey, assistant, swine.

Weights superintendent will be Eddie Braswell.

Judge for swine will be Paul Gross, Howard County agent, and for sheep, Fredigo, Sterling City vocational ag teacher. Arthur Barleemann Jr., Sterling County agent, will be sheep classifier.

Beef judge had not been named Wednesday.

Finances still were arriving slow for the 1970 show, according to John Tiller, chairman. More than \$700 had been collected at the last report meeting, but a total of \$2,000 is necessary to meet minimum requirements.

Firms and individuals should contact Tiller, County Judge Elmer Martin or other show officials to complete their contributions, Tiller said.

4 Elected New Chamber Directors

Business leaders from the fields of radio, banking, grocery and insurance will be new members of Colorado City Chamber of Commerce board.

The four directors, who officially begin their terms in January, were announced Wednesday by Don Benson, Chamber president, after a canvas of ballots.

They are:

Drew Ballard, owner of Radio Station KVMC.

Vernon Lewis, owner of E-Z Way Superette.

Wayne Shawn, vice president of City National Bank.

Dick Wistrand, partner in G. D. Foster Insurance and Investments.

They were elected from a field of eight nominees in voting that counted a total of 112 ballots.

"The enthusiastic response of the membership in returning marked ballots is indicative of the new 'Go' attitude of our community," Benson said.

"Voting was close for all four board positions," the president continued, "and this reflects the membership's respect for the abilities of all eight candidates nominated for the ballot."

The four new members will succeed Jimmy Harrison, Trevlyn Kelley, Dr. Elton Berkman and Truman Bodine, whose three year terms expire next month.

They join seven holdover directors for 1970 -- J. C. Britton, Joe Morren, Arlene Morris, John T. Merritt, Dr. H. Jene Steakley, Travis Turner and Benson.

Wistrand, Lewis, Shawn and Ballard were elected from a ballot which also included John Billings, Murrell Blessingame, Bob Chalkey and Leonard Morris.

The new directors will convene with the current board soon to elect top officers for the Chamber's 1970 program, according to Benson.

New officers and directors will be recognized at the organization's annual membership in January.

More than 125 students from Colorado High and Junior High will participate Sunday afternoon in 21st Annual Christmas Concert by Colorado High School's Department of Vocal Music.

The vesper-time program will be free to the public beginning at 4 p.m. in Colorado High Auditorium.

City Offer Chops Gas Rate Request

City Council has answered Lone Star Gas Company's request for a rate increase by proposing 8.64 per cent less than the utility asked.

The trimming comes with Lone Star's own figures, according to the City Hall dads.

Figures have a way of changing, of course, with formulas and Lone Star officials in Dallas haven't indicated they like the way Colorado City has handled theirs.

Farm Credit Agency Nominees Announced

Farm Credit Administration, supervisory agency for the Co-operative Farm Credit System, has announced results of the elections for nominees to be considered by President Nixon in filling two positions on the Federal Farm Credit Board.

The Federal Board, which sets national policies for the banks and associations of the system, is comprised of 13 members. Twelve of them, one from each farm credit district, are appointed by the president for six-year staggered terms. They are not eligible for re-appointment. The 13th is named by Secretary of Agriculture and serves as his representative.

Following a system of rotation prescribed by law, nominating polls were held this year in the Houston and Louisville Farm

Credit Districts. The Houston district encompasses the Texas while the Louisville district consists of Indiana, Ohio, Kentucky, and Tennessee. In each of these two districts, Federal Land Bank Associations, Production Credit Associations and Cooperatives holding stock in the District Bank for Cooperatives have designated nominees through elections.

Houston District nominees are Grady Shepard of Hale Center, E. G. Schuhart II of Dalhart and Wilmer Smith of Wilson. Nominee of Production Credit Associations was Shepard, nominee of Federal Land Bank Associations was Schuhart and Smith was nominated by the Cooperatives holding stock in the Houston Bank for Cooperatives.

In the Louisville District, the nominees are: John H. Dunlap, Jr. of Williamsport, Ohio; Thomas C. McMillan of Wilmington, Ohio; and Kenneth M. Probasco of Columbus, Ohio. Dunlap was nominated by the Production Credit Associations, McMillan by the Federal Land Bank Associations, and Probasco by cooperatives in the four states.

The 37 Banks and 1,100 local associations which make up the Co-operative Farm Credit System are owned by nearly a million farmers and 3,000 of their cooperatives. Farmers and cooperatives borrowed \$10 billion through the system last year and had \$13 billion in loans outstanding at the end of the year.

Initially capitalized by the government, the banks and associations are now completely owned by farmers and cooperatives and have a net worth of \$2 billion.

CONVERSATION CORNER



SEE BY the papers that the organization calling itself NOW (National Organization for Women) is on the rampage again after a three day meeting of directors in New Orleans.

NOW's avowed objective is to bring absolute equality for women on every level from the low bar to the high bar—that is, from cocktail lounge to the Supreme Court.

Directors, led by woman writer Betty Friedan, also announced after the New Orleans weekend, plans for filing formal charges of discrimination against women by the National Aeronautics and Space Administration.

NOW leaders suggest that the President of this country should send a woman to the moon.

Goodie. Know just the woman. Why not Maureen O'Hair—provided she's willing to take time off from filing suits claiming her rights as an atheist have been invaded by prayers from male astronauts in outer space?

Course she might have competition from any number of wives generously offered for the project by their husbands.

No woman in her right mind would offer herself. Those space suits and moon shoes are too unbecoming. And what of the hair—do?

MEMBERS of NOW began their campaign by staging sit-down sessions in New York City bars which bar woman. They didn't get served—which served them right.

But Judge Hughes happens to be the one who administered the oath of office to President Lyndon B. Johnson on that awful day in Dallas and Senator Edward Kennedy would naturally organize opposition to her approval before you would say Massachusetts.

The President has troubles enough without another fight on his hands.

THIRD point of the strategy announced by NOW and its head woman who wrote "The Feminine Mystique" is aimed at the Hurricane Center in Miami, Florida.

NOW wants the center to stop naming hurricanes feminine names and wants them to stop it RIGHT NOW.

Now something must be wrong either with the writer named Mrs. Friedan or with this little town writer. The year the first granddaughter was born, named Elizabeth Ruth and called Betsy, it was a point of personal pride to the whole family when the hurricane which coincided with her birth was christened Betsy. It was thoughtful of the Miami Center to extend national congratulations that way, I thought.

BECAUSE the feminist organization wants to be fair to the men by letting them be equal to the women, they are on record as preferring names of animals or flowers for future hurricane warnings.

Hurricanes are pretty serious business. How does NOW know that the whole animal kingdom might not resent their naming a hurricane Hippopotamus?

Names of flowers for hurricanes wouldn't work out either. The world is full of women named Violet, Lily, Iris, Rose, Daisy, Pansy and so on. There are probably girls and women named everything from Geranium or Carnation to Geranium and Chrysanthemum, too. So the flower category is out.

WHY NOT, if we just have to have a change, start naming hurricanes for men who sought to wreck havoc in this world?

What's the matter with Cain, Herod, Pontius Pilate, Ivan the Terrible, Alexander, Nero, Napoleon, Adolph, Stalin... take it from there.

For that matter, half the women in the world could come up with a suggestion for calling hurricanes by masculine names reminding them of some blow-hard they've known.

Anyhow, it strikes some of us as pretty funny that the hands that rule the cradle could ever find time to rock the world.

Mrs. B. R. Whitson Presents Hesperian Daughters' Program

A discussion of "Woman Goes Traveling Then, Now and Tomorrow" by Mrs. B. R. Whitson last Thursday highlighted a meeting of Hesperian Daughters Study Club in the home of Mrs. Curtis Erwin Sr.

Mrs. Whitson traced various modes of transportation from the time man first appeared.

"He has spread wider than any other species on earth," she began. "He has increased his speed from a four miles an hour walk to many thousand miles an hour through space."

In 1800, she explained, it often took a person a month to travel by sailing ship from London to New York City. Today you can travel by jet airlines in only a few hours.

"In 1890 Americans traveled an average of only 200 miles a year from their home communities. Today Americans travel an average of about 4,000 miles a year - 3,600 of them by automobile."

In speaking about modern day travel by jet, Mrs. Whitson described an imaginary trip with a woman in the moneyed fashionable "placesetter" group.

And she emphasized the importance of the placesetters in establishing new resorts, restaurants, hotels, beaches, ski lifts, etc., "and by blazing

the trails to far off places the placesetters make it possible for many with limited vacation time, if not vacation funds, to arrive at destinations that a few years ago were only dreams."

In her report the speaker told of the revolution in transportation - the electrically powered car that follows its programmed route on the auto-

mated "guideway" and the "people capsule" equipped with a dial to take a person from his car to any where in a city by the fastest route.

"Far fetched?" she asked in closing. "Not at all."

"Every element of that fantastic people-moving system is already within range of our scientists' skills."

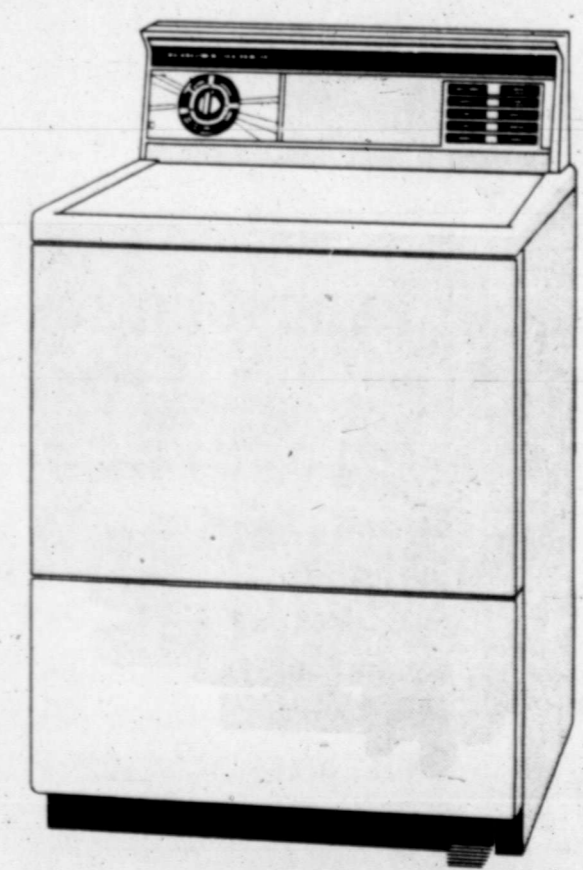



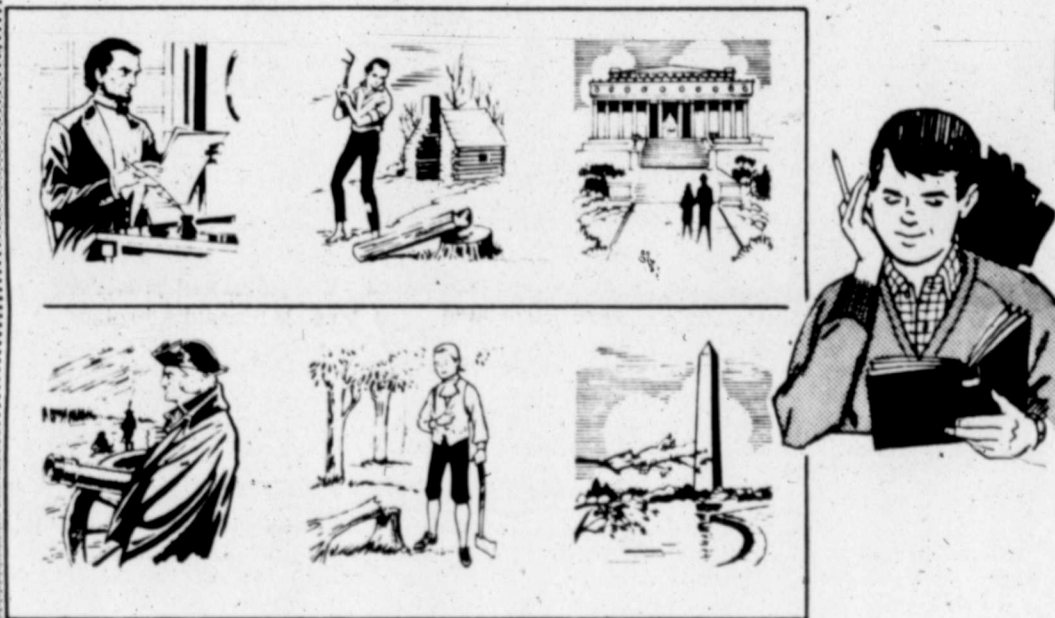

Self Culture Study Club Has International Affairs Study

Home of Mrs. Earl Brown Friday afternoon was setting for an International Affairs program for Self Culture Club.

Hostess for the meeting was Mrs. E. L. Tiller, Mrs. L. A. Keith and Mrs. A. H. Jackson presented the afternoon program.

A letter from Big Spring State Hospital was read thanking club members for their recent cash contribution.

Mrs. L. B. Elliott presented a report of the last Mitchell County Federation of Women's Clubs report.

Mrs. Keith's discussion concerning international affairs was "International Policy" in which she explained that the role which the United States plays in the world today - the global nature of our interests and responsibilities - derives from our economic strength and dynamics of our technology, from security considerations and from dedication of our

people to human freedom and humanitarian causes.

"It is clear that our involvements need constantly to be reviewed in the light of current conditions and availability of our resources," she continued.

Mrs. Keith discussed major problems of Middle East and Vietnam explaining that the President has already made clear our firm resolve to achieve an honorable peace in Vietnam.

She listed national objectives for the solutions and said, "The sum total of our combined position is clear and compelling. Thus we believe that the South Vietnamese, the US and our allies are offering a reasonable and honorable outcome."

"It is our hope that the other side will soon put polemics aside and begin in good faith to negotiate an end to this tragic war."

In concluding her talk, Mrs. Keith discussed the current

administration's efforts in developing normal and mutual beneficial relations with Eastern European nations.

Mrs. Jackson, in beginning a report of "The Role The US Plays in World Affairs," explained that her paper was based on thoughts and ideas taken from President Nixon's address to the United Nations and from the address of Elliot L. Richardson, Under Secretary of State, and Blake Clark's article, "US Diplomacy No. 1," in December's Readers Digest.

She said that the policies of any administration reflects the philosophy and temperament of the one who is president, and "of course the pressures and requirements of the times in which he leads."

The speaker quoted President Nixon as saying "We cannot learn from one another until we stop shouting at one another - until we speak quietly enough so that our words can be heard, as well as our voices."

Club members heard a report of US dimension of responsibility for peace from the 1950's to current economic and political developments.

She quotes the President's tribute to Peace Corps in helping many countries, but "he especially welcomed the consideration of the UN itself, which it is now giving to establishment of an international volunteer corps, and that we would give it our full and enthusiastic cooperation."

Mrs. Jackson spoke of the president's concern of pollution of air and water and man's venture into space.

Following the club program refreshments were served to 15 members attending.
