# SEN. HITCHCOCK AT ROCKS KNOX RESOLUTION

### Measure 'Futile, Inconsequential and Inimical to Treaty' He Declares.

WASHINGTON, May 12.—Democratic attack upon the republican peace resolution was launched today by Senator Hitchcock of Nebraska, administration spokesman, who declared in address to the senate that the measure was futile and inimical to the treaty of Versailles.

"The mountain has labored and brought forth a mouse," he said. "The peace resolution is before us. It is not exactly still-born, but its feeble character suggests a disturbed gestation and dubious future."

"Great expectations for an act of congress that would force a peace settlement are to be disappointed, high hopes that a resolution could be made to perform the functions of a peace treaty are abandoned. Instead of a peace settlement to be forced by a resolution of the senate, the price of severing commercial relations, we are merely to repeat the declaration, declare the war at an end and invite the president to negotiate a separate peace."

Mr. Hitchcock cited three similar resolutions which he said had been sponsored since last November by Senator Lodge, the republican leader, and Senator Knox of Pennsylvania, author of the pending resolution. The latter, Mr. Hitchcock said, is the fifth peace resolution offered by the republican.

A Zig-Zag Course.

"In reaching this important conclusion," he said of the pending measure, "the supporters of the republican peace resolution have staggered from side to side over a zig-zag course for nearly six months."

Senator Hitchcock denied that congress has the power to make peace, although it has the treaty to enforce war. The states voted unanimously against giving congress peace making jurisdiction, he said.

"Knox's argument that the war was actually won at an end was dismissed summarily by Mr. Hitchcock, who conceded the point and then asked:

"Then why this resolution? Hostilities ceased 18 months ago and our army was promptly demobilized and reduced to a peace basis. Since that time congress has been rearmament. We have sold hundreds of millions of dollars worth of products to Germany and purchased much from her. The war which she abandoned in 1918 is now proposed to end by her resolution does not by his own admission exist. His able argument and historical citations prove that it ended many months ago."

"What the senator from Pennsylvania attempted to do by this measure, which he calls a resolution to terminate the war, he is making an utterly futile and hazardous attempt to make a peace settlement with Germany to take the place of the Versailles treaty declaring peace, he said.

"The Knox resolution declares the war at an end. Thus we have raised the interesting distinction between declaring peace and declaring war at an end, which is a difference."

"The peace resolution adopted by the house last month was denounced especially by Mr. Hitchcock because of its proposals for an embargo against Germany within 45 days in event of German objections to the resolution and its provision for reserving rights under the treaty."

"In the house resolution," he said, "we demand the benefits of the treaty which we have refused to ratify."

Abandoning the course of other peace resolutions Mr. Hitchcock said a previous resolution by Senator Knox was "abandoned by the senate doorstep like its predecessors."

"But the effort to do something to escape from the constitutional method of making peace was not abandoned," he continued. "Something had to be done. Intransigent statesmen who had refused all efforts to reach an agreement or compromise on the peace treaty felt the growing responsibility."

House republicans, Mr. Hitchcock charged were called into conference and the house was arranged, although he declared that the house never had permitted a voice in peace proceedings previously. Upon receipt of the house resolution by the senate, however, Mr. Hitchcock said, there was a sudden change of plans and the present resolution was drafted as a futile plan for republican endorsement.

# PRESIDENT'S SUGGESTION TO SIMS FOR INDEPENDENT THOUGHT AND AUDACIOUS PLANS DISREGARDED

WASHINGTON, May 12.—A confidential cablegram from President Wilson to Rear Admiral Sims in London, sent during the war, was read to the senate, naval investigating committee today by Secretary Daniels. It expresses surprise that the British admiral had failed to use Great Britain's great naval superiority effectively against the submarine menace, and suggested that "independent thought" and without regard to "judgments of any one on that side of the water," the admiral was to be "helpless to the point of panic" in the face of the submarine situation, the message said.

"Every plan we suggest they reject for some reason of prudence," Mr. Wilson said. "In my view this is not a time for prudence but for boldness even at the cost of great losses."

Admiral Sims replied that Secretary Daniels, who presented the president's message in connection with his answer to Sims' charges, was "a long way from the prudence" of what the British admiral was doing.

President Wilson's message to Sims follows:

"From the beginning of the war I have been greatly surprised at the failure of the British admiralty to use Great Britain's great naval superiority in an effective way. In the presence of the present submarine emergency they are helpless to the point of panic."

"Every plan we suggest they reject for some reason of prudence. In my view this is not a time for prudence, but for boldness even at the cost of great losses."

In most of your dispatches you have quite properly advised us of the sort of aid and co-operation desired from us by the admiralty. The trouble with the present situation is that it does not seem to be efficacious. I would be much obliged to you if you would report to me confidentially, of course, what you think the admiralty has been doing and what they have accomplished and, added to the report, your own comments and suggestions, based upon independent thought, of the future developments with regard to judgments of any one on that side of the water."

The admiralty was very slow to add to the protection of convoys and it is not now, I judge, protecting convoys on adequate scale within the danger zone, seeming to keep small craft with the greatest care. The absence of craft for convoy is even more apparent on the French coast than on the English coast and in the channel. I do not think the necessary military supplies and supplies of food and fuel oil are to be delivered at British ports in any other way within the next few months than under adequate convoy. There will probably not be ships or tankers enough and our ship-building plans may not begin to yield important results in less than 18 months.

"I believe that you will keep these instructions absolutely and entirely to yourself and that you will give me such advice as you can give me if you are handling and if you were running a navy of your own."

Mr. Daniels also read a letter from Admiral Sims to former Ambassador Page at London, written August 7, 1917, which in part said:

"This attempt of acceptance of everything British," he added, "undoubtedly accounts for his opposition to the creation of an independent American navy in his idea of a combined navy department had been urging from our entrance into the war," declared the secretary. "But even then I do not think that any admiral would definitely decide on a policy, he wrote at once to the secretary of war declaring the truth to be exactly the reverse."

# GERMANY WANTS TO LAY ALL HER CARDS ON TABLE AT SPA CONFERENCE KOESTER SAYS

BERLIN, May 12.—Germany desires to lay all her cards openly on the table at the Spa conference May 25, Dr. Adolph Koester, foreign minister, said in an exclusive interview today.

The German government hopes to clear up the following points, Koester said:

1. Germany's exact economic position.
2. The German financial situation and the food and raw material problem.
3. The necessity for security and internal peace.

Koester expressed hope that Germany would be admitted to the conference with full powers to enter into all discussions. If she is admitted only as a "listener," he said, then she must send delegates instructed accordingly for their sole duty will be to record the accomplished decisions of the allied leaders. But, the foreign minister believed, the Spa conference will mean for the time direct verbal negotiations concerning fulfillment of the treaty of Versailles.

Koester hoped the Spa conference would not be "Versailles over again on a smaller scale."

"We expect to be able to show the entente exactly what Germany's economic situation is, what her financial situation is, and what she needs in the way of food, raw materials and internal security," Koester said.

"As to the latter, I will be quite happy if the entente can show us a way whereby we can maintain order in the way of food, raw materials and internal security," Koester said.

"I hope the Spa meeting will result in a solution for fulfillment of the treaty. We do not expect to go to Belgium with any other idea."

"We do not mean Germany must not suffer in fulfillment of the treaty. We were beaten and we are willing to pay the price of defeat."

"But we do mean and hope the conviction has come to England and France that only on a basis of security and common understanding can the treaty be worked out satisfactorily."

"We mean France must not expect Germany to pay all her taxes, but agree to some basis for Germany to fulfill the obligations she is able to meet. For instance we shall expect the entente to make terms under which it expects us to operate."

It would be absurd to think, Koester said, the entente expected Germany to work any sort of economic plan without a merchant fleet.

# CAR SHORTAGE BECOMES SERIOUS IN MIDDLE WEST

By United Press. CHICAGO, May 12.—Industries in the middle west are being forced to shut down daily because of a shortage of cars for transportation of material, according to reports received by business men here today.

Chicago is losing close to two million dollars a day as a result of the car shortage, according to John M. Glenn, president of the Illinois Manufacturers' Association.

"This is the situation also in the adjoining middle western territory, which is being hit with much of its merchandise," Glenn said.

Railroad men say there is little hope of relieving the present car shortage until more cars are built.

The extent of the nationwide car shortage at present is indicated, Kendall said, by the fact that railroads now are carrying more than 100,000 actual orders for about 80,000 cars per day.

The "outlaw" railroad strike is blamed for part of the car shortage, and a report was being seriously hampered by the car shortage, according to reports of the United States geological survey which show a continuous million now are producing only about 100,000 tons of steel. This is estimated to be three million tons under the demand.

Among the cities where plants are running on a short coal supply are Youngstown, Pittsburgh, Cleveland and Toledo. Switchmen still are on strike in these cities and also in St. Louis and Kansas City, reports here said.

# OLD GUARD THROWS STRENGTH TO WOOD AT INDIANAPOLIS

By United Press. INDIANAPOLIS, IND., May 12.—The republican old guard at the state convention came out flatfooted for Maj. Gen. Leonard Wood as their candidate for the G. O. P. nomination here today.

Addressing the convention in the keynote speech United States Senator James E. Watson declared he was pledged to vote for Wood at the national convention and was authorized to pledge the vote of three regular candidates for delegates at large.

The other three whom Watson named have pledged themselves for Wood are United States Senator Hays, New Gov. James P. Goodrich, and State Chairman Ed Westmuth.

Predicting a republican victory throughout the country and urging a union of factions in the interests of party harmony, Will Hays, G. O. P. national committee chairman, addressed the convention and outlined what was being done to spread the war debt.

Hays urged reduction of taxes and a repeal of taxes which are killing business and spreading the war debt.

"Above all things," he said, "what we need in this country is more men and women in politics, for what they give and not for what they can get."

A republican victory will make certain, he said, that the note of the United States government shall be the note of peace and that there shall be a real effort to develop conditions which shall bring a reduction of the cost of living.

Underwood will continue the nomination to succeed himself. In the four-cornered race for the short term senatorship, the vacancy created by the death of Senator Baughman, Representative Thomas Hefflin and Capt. Frank White were close contenders, unofficial returns to the same newspaper said. These returns came from only about 40 counties and in some cases were incomplete.

# REBEL REINFORCEMENTS UNDER COMMAND OF GENERAL FORRAS HAVE BEEN ORDERED UP FROM COAHUILA, TAKEN UP POSITIONS AT SAN ANDRES AND CHALCUMICULA, SOUTHWEST OF THE SCENE OF TODAY'S BATTLE, PROBABLY FOR THE PURPOSE OF PREVENTING THE ESCAPE OF CARRANZA SHOULD HE SUCCEED BREAKING THROUGH THE LINES THROWN AROUND HIM. REPORTS STATE THE CARRANZA FORCES ARE STRUNG ALONG THE MEXICAN NATIONAL RAILROAD.

General Candido Aguilar, son-in-law of the president and governor of the state of Vera Cruz, has abandoned all idea of escape from the country in an effort to join his superior and share in his fate, says a dispatch to El Diamante. Embassiers from General Aguilar today conferred with General Trevino's chief of staff and asked that their commander be permitted to pass through the rebel lines toward San Marcos. The request was granted, but it was stipulated General Trevino would be accompanied only by his general staff and civilians, all of his soldiers being barred.

# MONTEREY STILL IN HANDS OF FEDERALS

LAREDO, TEX., May 12.—Recent reports that Monterey had been evacuated by the federals and that Governor De los Santos of the state of Nuevo Leon was making his way to Matamoros, were without foundation, according to a telegram received here from American Consul Robertson of Nuevo Laredo. He wrote to Monterey on a railroad motor car. Telegraphing from Lamasos, 60 miles below the border here, Mr. Robertson said he left Monterey at 7:00 o'clock last night. "No disturbances in Monterey," the telegram said. "Generals Ricart, Carlos Osuna, Barrios and Cardenas and Governor Santos (of Nuevo Leon) and Espinosa Mireles (of Coahuila) held conference here yesterday. Newspapers reported that they reached Monterey by plane to the end. Schools and business houses closed Monterey yesterday by order of Governor Santos. Americans all well."

# AMENDMENT MINIMUM WAGE LAW TO BE URGED

AUSTIN, TEX., May 12.—Governor Hebbly will be urged to submit to the coming special session of the legislature May 20 the question of amending the present minimum wage law so as to divide the state into zones and fixing the industrial welfare commission authority to fix minimum wages for women and children for each zone, depending upon the cost of living in the different zones, according to certain employers who favor this change. Recent investigation of the commission revealed that living cost varies throughout the state, and for this reason the commission failed to fix a blanket minimum wage.

NEW YORK CHAMBER OF COMMERCE INVESTIGATING CITIZENS UNION IDEA

NEW YORK, May 12.—An investigation of the "big union of citizens" idea and its feasibility in protecting American communities from possible food or food families during strikes is now under way by ten members of the New York State Chamber of Commerce recently appointed by the president of the organization as a "Committee on Public Welfare."

Revolutionary labor upheavals and strikes designated as "outlaw" walk-outs by union officials and the employment of volunteer Americans in keeping the channels of communication and transportation open, are the object, it is said, of the Chamber's present inquiry.

The committee has received hundreds of responses to blank questionnaires specifying the ability and equipment of the various volunteers. Their occupation, home addresses and telephone numbers together with other similar data are in possession of the committee which, in time of crisis, may be utilized.

At a recent meeting authorizing the appointment of the committee by President Alford E. Marling, passed resolutions in which it said that "civilization is now menaced by false and distorted and political ideas and the public welfare demands that the men and women of the nation who hold to high ethical standards and political conduct, who believe in sound economic principles and in constitutional government, shall undertake more resolutely to fulfill their civic duties."

The resolutions further declared that "the structure of government and society as a whole" was imperiled by the interruption of the normal channels of communication and public service due to "an irresponsible minority of the population of the United States."

It further stated that "the duties of the Committee on Public Welfare should be to draw up a plan of organization and co-operation whereby the public may, by volunteer service, aid in maintaining the unimpeded use of public utilities and assist the duly constituted authorities in preserving law and order."

Many interesting letters accompanied the applications of volunteers. A doctor who formerly was a telegraph operator offered his services in any capacity for "the maintenance of social equilibrium against the rebellious and mischievous minority." He said "that the movement deserved the support of all right-minded citizens who are the backbone of the country."

A Russian refugee, a major-general in the former Russian army, who has suffered the loss of everything he possessed through the bolsheviks, felt in duty bound to offer his services. He wrote: "I am perfectly familiar with the beginning of the bolshevik movement in Russia and their methods and since I am the guest of America and everybody has been so very kind to me, I wish to do all in my power to help America."

A man, a constant engineer, 67 years old, in "fair health and vigor," wrote: "I am fully in sympathy with your apparent theory that the way to combat 'outlaw' or even 'in-law' labor obstructions to public activities is to develop a strong and widespread sentiment among the masses of right-minded citizens against such labor disturbances. Also that the best way to develop this sentiment among right-thinking people is to permit them to take part in combating lawlessness and to aid in the carrying on of public activities which may be interrupted by labor disturbances."

A lawyer wrote enrolling his name "as a member of your organization which has for its purpose the preservation of the national life. No other country," he added, "gives to its citizens and others so large an amount of freedom and privileges as does America, yet many of those within our borders fail to appreciate that with liberty also comes responsibility toward others. It is high time that the true American citizen awakens to the conditions that threaten and rallies to the support of law and order."

The committee on public welfare is expected to make a report of its investigations and progress in the near future.

**PRESIDENT MEANT WHAT HE SAID TUMULTU WIRES**  
PORTLAND, ORE., May 12.—President Wilson's projection of the league of nations into the campaign as a paramount issue was reiterated in a message from J. P. Tumulty, secretary to the president, to the state democratic state chairman.

President Wilson meant just what he said, Tumulty wired Smith, in answer to Smith's query as to whether the president's message should be construed as "an attack on Senator Chamberlain or merely as a statement of party policies."

**MACHINE GUN ACCIDENT BEING INVESTIGATED**  
AUSTIN, May 12.—An accident wherein a machine gun, exhibited here by aviators from Kelly Field, San Antonio, was discharged, the bullet narrowly missing a woman and passing through two automobiles, was being investigated here today.

Aviators believed some one outside the party placed the ball cartridge in the ammunition.

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PRESSURE BROUGHT ON FEDERAL COMMANDER AT MATAMOROS TO SURRENDER

BROWNSVILLE, TEX., May 12.—With 500 revolutionary troops within striking distance of Matamoros, pressure from many quarters today being brought to bear on General Rafe Colunga, federal commander, to bring about surrender of the garrison without bloodshed.

Headquarters of the rebels was definitely located at Rio Bravo, 45 miles west of Matamoros, on the Mexican National Railway.

United States army airplanes scouting along the border reported there were no visible troop movements on the Mexican side. This was taken as an indication that the threatened rebel attack on Matamoros which caused quite a flurry on both sides of the boundary yesterday, would not be made for at least 24 hours.

The revolutionist force is under command of Ysidro Valdesquez, a prominent citizen of Reynosa, which surrendered to rebels several days ago. The revolutionist force and Mexican residents in Matamoros are citing Valdesquez's reputation as an argument in efforts to cause General Colunga to give up without a conflict. Colunga previously had been quoted as saying he would not turn Matamoros over to "riff raff."

**BILL TO POSTPONE ADVANCE IN SECOND CLASS MAIL RATES**  
WASHINGTON, May 12.—Existing second class mail rates were to be continued until July 1, 1921, under a bill ordered reported favorably today by the house postoffice committee. The measure would be postponed for one year each of the two authorized automatic increases in rates scheduled to become effective July 1 and one year later.

**PIRATES GET MILLION DOLLAR LOOT FROM STEAMER**

**UNION LABOR CANDIDATE RUNNING CLOSE RACE**  
BIRMINGHAM, ALA., May 12.—In complete official returns to the Birmingham News from 35 of the 67 counties in the state early this afternoon gave Senator Underwood a lead of 6750 votes over L. B. Muegrove, the union labor candidate, in yesterday's democratic primary for nomination to the United States senate.

Estimates from 21 counties give J. Thomas Heflin a lead of approximately 5,000 over his nearest opponent, Emmett O'Connell, in the contest for nomination to fill the unexpired term of the late Senator Baskette.

Unofficial returns indicated the renomination of the five members of congress who were opposed in yesterday's primary.

W. B. Bowling on the fact of unofficial returns, appears to have been nominated to succeed Representative Heflin in the fifth congressional district.

Clement, president of the Texas Grain Dealers' Association and chairman of a committee representing five growing states, told the Illinois Grain Dealers' Association in convention here today that the fixing of the price of wheat by the food administration of the United States during the war was both confiscatory and discriminatory.

Mr. Clement declared the grain dealer and the farmer should have compensation from the government for these losses and advocated a bill providing for the repayment by the government for the losses sustained.

TRINITY RECEDING AT FORT WORTH TODAY

FORT WORTH, May 12.—The Trinity river flood waters had receded to 24 feet this morning, after attaining the record mark of the past five years Tuesday afternoon, 28.8 feet. At few points this morning was the water touching the levees. Also the high water on the Dallas-Fort Worth pike had disappeared and the low lands were free of the flood. All danger is now believed ended.

**PRESIDENT BEGINS RECEIVING DIPLOMATS**

WASHINGTON, May 12.—President Wilson today began his long delayed reception of foreign diplomats, meeting the Belgian ambassador and the minister from Uruguay.

Other diplomats, some of whom have been waiting eight months to see the president, are expected to be invited to the White House soon.

**JAPAN JOINS CONSORTIUM OF FOUR GREAT POWERS**  
TOKYO, May 11.—Official announcement by the government that Japan has become a member of the consortium of the four great powers to finance China has been made.

**VICE PRESIDENT MARSHALL ADDRESSES SOUTHERN BAPTISTS**  
WASHINGTON, May 12.—Vice President Marshall in an address opening the Southern Baptist convention characterized the church as "one of the anchors of the republic," but warned against entry of the church as an organization into politics.

Mr. Marshall was introduced by Dr. Gambrell.

Vice President Marshall declared he hoped that the church would not lose its influence for peace by "preaching the doctrine of the congress of the United States." Admonishing the convention "not to go out and beat a brass drum in a political procession," he declared there was enough for the church to do "without trying to reform congress."

Vice president-elect included Judge D. H. Harrison of Fulton, Mo. Other officers were re-elected.

Rev. J. J. Muir of Washington asked the delegates to use their influence with their members of congress in order that the national congress might have a law which would close theaters and prohibit baseball on Sunday.

Dr. Gambrell told the convention that the call to the Baptists all over the world should be "Baptists get together."

A letter from Premier Lloyd George of England expressing his regret at not being able to attend the convention was read.

**REGION OF TERROR STAGED AT JALISCO, GUADALAJARA**  
EL PASO, TEX., May 12.—A reign of terror during which many Oregon sympathizers were imprisoned and some shot recently was staged in Guadalupe, capital of Jalisco, under orders of Governor Castellanos and General Diegues, Carranza leaders, according to a bulletin today from Luis Montes de Oca, revolutionary consular representative at El Paso.

The bulletin said that the defeat of Colonel Luis Gayou had been confirmed and that he had returned to Guadalupe with only one-third of his forces.

Some Figures About Crude Oil.  
The production of crude oil is on the increase. In 1917, according to the government geological survey, 341,000,000 barrels were marketed. In 1918, an increase of fourteen million barrels was reported. ### SUGAR PROFITS ARE LIMITED TO 1 CENT A POUND BY PALMER

WASHINGTON, May 12.—Telegrams were sent by the department of justice today to all United States attorneys reiterating the department's policy of holding the margin of profit of sugar sales to one cent for wholesalers and two cents for retailers.

BOSTON, May 12.—Attorney General Palmer today set the margin of profit to be allowed on sales of sugar at one cent a pound for wholesalers and two cents a pound at retail. In a telegram to United States District Attorney Thomas J. Boynton, the attorney general ordered that steps be taken immediately to prosecute persons taking larger profits.

Simmons of Houston, editor of the Longhorn Magazine; Miss Marjorie Thibault of Taylor, chairman of the women's council; Miss Minnie Giescke of Austin, secretary of the Students' association; Thomas Hayden of Moran, chairman of the men's council.

### SELECTING JURORS FOR TRIAL JAMES CALLAN

FORT WORTH, May 11.—With the state's motion for a continuance in the James Callan murder trial at Llano overruled, examination of veniremen continued this morning with every prospect of completing the jury by Thursday. The state asked for a delay in the trial of the former president of the Texas cattle raisers because of two witnesses, said to be material, being absent. The defense opposed any delay and District Judge Stubbs examined them, with the result that the examination of the veniremen was taken up Tuesday afternoon. Callan, prominent ranchman, is accused of killing Victor Billings in Menard county last November.

The death penalty will be asked in the case as indicated by District Attorney Christian's questions. The latter, too, is asking each venireman if he is a member of the Texas Cattle Raisers' association, and if a mysterious man has approached them regarding the case. The last question was finally objected to and the objection sustained by Judge Stubbs today as insinuating.

### JOHNSON REPRESENTS ELEMENT OF DISLOYALTY DR. ATKINSON CHARGES

WASHINGTON, May 12.—Dr. Henry A. Atkinson of Boston, Mass., addressing the southern sociological congress yesterday, attacked the candidacy of Senator Hiram Johnson for the republican presidential nomination, declaring that "Johnson represents all the forces and elements of disloyalty that fought the United States during the war." Such elements, Dr. Atkinson asserted, had rallied behind Senator Johnson because of his attacks on the peace treaty, the league of nations and President Wilson.

Pounds case which went to trial in the district court here Wednesday morning rendered a verdict Saturday night at 10:30 finding the defendant guilty and assessing his punishment at 10 years in the state penitentiary. Pounds was accused of killing his wife at their home in Rochester in March, 1919, with a claw hammer. No one saw the killing, but a strong chain of circumstantial evidence was brought in by the state.

### MEXICAN PLANK IN REPUBLICAN PLATFORM TO DEMAND PROTECTION

LITERARY DIGEST'S POLL.

No marked changes occurred in the relative standing of the various presidential candidates in the Literary Digest's poll published the week of May 8, although the total now includes 716,578 votes. On the democratic side the order is unchanged—McAdoo, Edwards, Wilson, Bryan, Cox, Clark and Palmer.

Governor Lowden of Illinois seems to be out of the running altogether except as a favorite son, but his gain in the Digest's poll was the most spectacular of the week, in percentage, as he more than doubled his vote of the previous week. At that, however, he is still in fourth place and with only about half the vote of Johnson in second place.

WET HOPES GLIMMER.

"Wet" hopes of a light wine and beer plank in the platform of either major party have gone a-glimmering, according to information from the headquarters of both parties, says a Washington dispatch, which says that there has been a checking up of wet and dry strength in the conventions by the republican and democratic leaders within the last few weeks with the result that the wets have been advised of the hopelessness of their cause so far as the presidential contest is concerned and nationwide action by either of the parties. The democrats made a minutely careful survey of the situation, the fact that it has both Governor Edwards of New Jersey and Governor Cox of Ohio seeking the nomination on a moist platform adding to the necessity for exact knowledge of the real situation. They found, according to the dispatch, only sixteen of fifty-six members of the Resolutions committee would be in favor of a wet plank if they represent the real wishes of their constituents, and we are wondering where they got the sixteen unless they included the Philippines, Hawaii and other experimental possessions. The democratic leaders consequently have warned the "wet advocates" to "lay off" unless they want to help the extreme dries incorporate a plank in the platform that will be "as strong as horseshoe" and they want that so they may persuade W. J. Bryan to abandon his fight for a straight-out endorsement of the Eighteenth amendment and the Volstead enforcement law. What Would We Do Without... Women? (Houston Post).

At Hillsboro and other points where he has spoken, former Senator Bailey mentioned the "sissies" who had to call the women in to help them run the State.

But wouldn't the man in trousers, as Mr. Bailey regards himself, have more or less difficulty in running the State without the aid of women?

Mr. Bailey probably had in view the State's government, but since government is but an incident of the State, we may as well take a glance at the entire situation, omitting consideration of women's duties in the home.

Here in Texas, for instance, about 400,000 women and girls work in the fields a great part of their time, helping their "sissy" men relatives to make the crops. Take the women and girls out of the fields of Texas, and agricultural production would shrivel for there is no way to supply their places. The "sissy" farmers, calling upon their wives and daughters to help in crop-making, have ever found ready and effective assistance.

In the factories, shops, offices and other activities of the cities and towns of Texas, there are about 900,000 women and girls aiding in carrying on the State's business. Men find them indispensable and invaluable in their various undertakings.

In the hard work of the hospitals, the women play a vital part. Indeed, dispense with them and most of the hospitals would probably close.

Looking at the State government, we find that its greatest, most important and most expensive function is to school more than 1,900,000 children. Of nearly 27,000 persons en-

gaged in that great work, probably 12,500 are women. Suppose the "real" men were to take over this branch of the government, and not further impose such duties upon women? What would become of the schools and what would become of the children?

Womankind in Texas and everywhere else in this world is an essential working part of human society. It may be admitted that conditions of civilization would be more ideal if the work of women were confined to those activities for which they are best fitted by nature and temperament. But that the world can not dispense with their work, and that men—"sissies" or Senator Bailey's kind—can not dispense with their aid, is not a debatable question.

If they are servicable in a vital way on the farms, on the battlefields, in the school rooms, in the hospital, in the factories, in the offices, in the shops, what is there about government that they may not aspire to serve even in that?

Of course, there are some men who parade and strut around like turkey gobblers, arrogating to themselves superiority and privileges where women are concerned, considering themselves masters, and women but creatures, subject to the whim, caprice and direction of their betters.

But at the same time, who is it that, in the school rooms, in the hospital, in the kitchen, in the sweatshop, in the terrid fields of midsummer, or in the school rooms at starvation wages—well that's all different—these irreconcilable relics of a vanished past are to be pitied, for though they are alive, nevertheless they are dead, and always will be.

Whatever may be the course of the proposed Nineteenth amendment this year, 17,000,000 American women are already voters. So are the women of the greater part of the civilized world. Human progress is irresistible. The small group of fretting and censorious malcontents, who smart at the great move, are merely creating unhappiness for themselves. The world has no need of their counsels. Humanity may pause a moment to pity them.

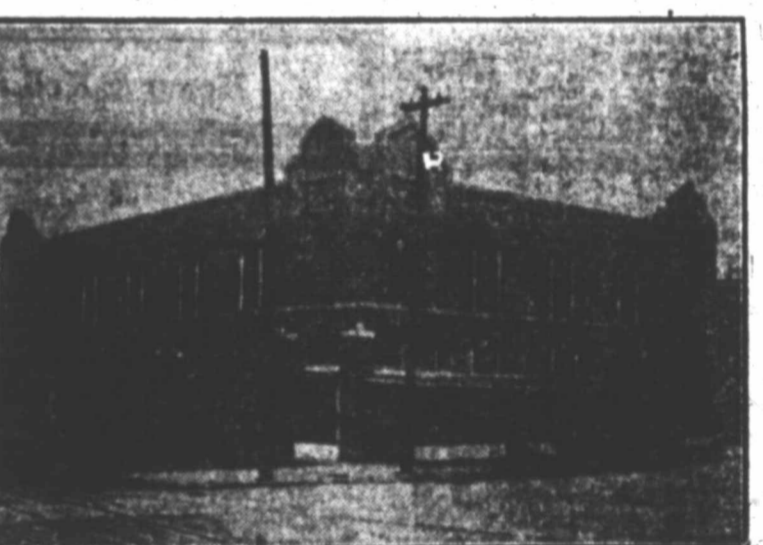

The job is still open, for it is considered possible that some member of the Rotary club may for the honor and glory of his clan step out at the Thursday luncheon and produce a bigger bonus for the privilege of ramrodding the action. To date, however, no offer, topping that of Mr. Weaver has been recorded—that is, over the whole route. Martin Rowe is alleged to have offered \$25 to ramrod one round of the affair, but it is asserted that he refuses to go any further than a single round at any price.

So far \$1,900 has been taken in through the sale of boxes for the game at \$100 each. The price of admission to the game is to be \$1, and it is hoped to make the affair net an even \$5,000, all of which goes to the benefit of the Kemp public library, which is badly in need of the money. Under the new city charter the needs of the library after the current year will be taken care of by the city, and the amount above mentioned is the amount needed by the board to carry it until this provision of the charter becomes effective.

Runnels, where more than 1,200 visitors were recently reported. In addition to the regular course of studies in home economics, she has been identified with the movement for girls' sewing clubs, having just completed organization of a remarkable club at Haskell.

Since she entered this line of work five years ago she has organized over 15,000 girls of Texas in home economics clubs. She has given canning and cooking demonstrations in many regions and headed state meetings of girls. Over 100,000 quarts of fruit and vegetables have been canned through the clubs organized by her.


Prominent speakers, including General J. J. Pershing, have addressed clubs organized by her. During the war her clubs aided in Junior Red Cross work and made blankets for the soldiers. In all her club demonstrations she places cooking on a high pedestal, stressing the essential in all girls knowing how to take their places in the home after marrying.

### SUPREME COURT REVERSES EMPIRE EXPRESS CASE

AUSTIN, TEX., May 12.—The supreme court today reversed judgments of the court of the civil appeals and of the district court and rendered judgment in favor of the defendant in the case of the Missouri, Kansas and Texas Railway Company and the American Express Company against the Empire Express Company, from Hunt county. The Empire Express Company sought a writ of mandamus

### LAST ROLL CALL IS ANSWERED BY OLD CONFEDERATE

That "thin, gray line of heroes" is one veteran less today in Wichita Falls, "taps" being sounded on Tuesday evening for W. G. Carroll, aged 81, soldier of the Confederate army through the entire war. Mr. Carroll, who until rheumatism made him a victim, had been active in the Confederate organization, and took especial pleasure in the various affairs of the veterans. His death, which occurred at his home 301 Lee, Tuesday resulted from a complication, brought about by the severe attack of rheumatism, it is said.

### JUDGE JONES WILL NOT ACCEPT PLEAS OF GUILTY INDISCRIMINATELY

Wholesale pleas of guilty such as have followed many raids carried on in Wichita Falls, are being received not favored by County Judge Jones who takes the stand that gross injustice is often done persons who merely enter pleas of guilty because such a course appears to them as being the cheapest and quickest way out of the matter. Judge Jones has on two or three occasions refused to accept pleas of guilty from persons who attempted to plead guilty to an offense with which they were charged and which they were willing to plead guilty in order to escape the rigors of the fact that they were not guilty. Judge Jones indicated that in the future no pleas of guilty would be received unless the facts indicated that the defendant was really guilty and not merely pleading guilty in order to escape the embarrassment of going to trial.

The practice long followed here of peace officers accepting bond from persons taken in raids will no longer be permitted, it was learned Wednesday. All persons arrested in raids or similar campaigns will be taken to the court house where complaints will be drawn in compliance with the statute and filed upon the county record books. Pleas of guilty must be entered before a magistrate and fines received by him.

It was announced Wednesday by Mayor Walter D. Cline. Dr. Reed has always taken an especial interest in the various city parks and the cemetery, and the existence of the parks and the removal of the Riverside cemetery from its former state of neglect to its present state is probably due more to Dr. Reed's efforts than any other. Dr. Reed will advise with members of the city council in connection with this work, and is preparing a schedule of recommendations for work in this department to be submitted to the council at an early date.

### FREIGHT CONGESTION IN NEW YORK SERIOUS

NEW YORK, May 12.—The full force of the tie-up of freight movement due to the "outlay" strike of railroad men and the strike of the longshoremen was felt in New York today. Thousands of loaded cars stood idle in the terminal yards, while industries suffered from lack of fuel and raw materials. Food supplies were running low.

### LOWER COURT REVERSES W. R. STOCKTON CASE

AUSTIN, TEX., May 12.—In reversing and remanding the case of William R. Stockton against the State of Texas, from Brazoria county, the supreme court today held that citrus canker is not specified in the statute as a contagious disease of citrus fruits. The case is sent back to lower court for a new trial on facts.

In the opinion of Chief Justice Nelson Phillips, who wrote the opinion, the commissioner of agriculture is not given unlimited power and is not clothed with such arbitrary authority in the destruction of citrus trees alleged to be diseased. It is held by Chief Justice Phillips that "under the contest made by his pleadings, before the property of defendant could be summarily destroyed, he was entitled to a judicial hearing and decision as to whether it ought to be destroyed. As applied to such a case, nothing less would amount to due process of law without which the bill of rights declares no citizen shall be deprived of his property."

In the trial court the defendant was denied a hearing "evidently upon the theory that it was competent for the legislature to invest the commissioner

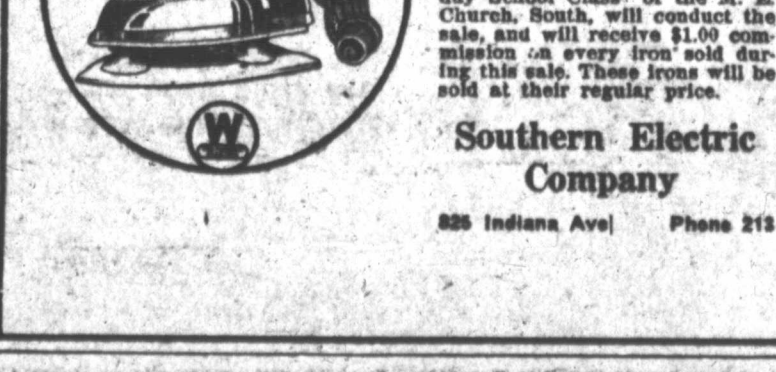

### TEXAS CHIEF WELL OFFSETTING A. B. A. H. FLOWING OVER 1,000

Drilled four and a half feet into the sand the Texas Chief No. 1 Mungler, one location west of the Art-Roger-Ard-Haynes, is Wednesday morning reported flowing at a rate estimated from 1,000 to 2,000 barrels, marking it an equal if not better producer than the first of the big producers on the west end of the tract. The casing is set at 1,741, according to the reports, with the total depth 1,746, a greater depth into the sand than any of the other producers in this territory with the possible exception of the Art-Roger-Ard-Haynes.

Pipe line connections to the Bill Rowe Oil company No. 1 Mungler, just to the west of the Texas Chief, reported flowing at the rate of 500 barrels from two feet into the sand, as being made by the Gulf Pipe Line company.

Casing is being set in the No. 3 of the Cline Oil company on the 24-acre lease, just to the south and west of these completions. This will probably be finished today, and the test bailed down Wednesday afternoon or Thursday morning. The No. 2 of the same company on the 50-acre lease purchased from the Kemp-Munger-Allen company is drilling at 1,739 and is expected to get the sand late Wednesday or early Thursday. The No. 1 on the same lease is almost the same depth.

Fishing for the bailer was still in progress on the Boger-Ard-Mace test in Block 41, a mile to the south of the Kemp-Munger-Allen, according to Wednesday reports. This work was held up for several days through inability to secure fishing tools, but the necessary tools have now been secured and it is expected that the bailer will be recovered in the immediate future and the test bailed out the second time.

Rapid progress on the second hole of the Alberta Oil company on the Ferguson, still further to the south, is reported. The test drilling at a depth between 500 and 600 feet.

Wichita Valley Making Flows. Reports from the test of the Wichita Valley Oil and Development company on the Griffin ranch, four and a half miles west of the Kemp-Munger-Allen district and near Dundee, are to the effect that the test has made a number of flows. Both the well and the lease on which it is located are reported to be well guarded, however, and little definite information can be obtained.

### ARREST EXPECTED NEWTOWN MURDER TUESDAY MORNING

The murderer of S. D. Johnson, oil field worker, is believed to have fled across the Red river into Oklahoma town gambling resort shortly after midnight Tuesday, according to advices received from Burkburnett. Earlier reports of the shooting gave the dead man's name as "Oklahoma" Davis but a memorandum book found in his pocket bore the name of "S. D. Johnson" together with several addresses and notations from which it is assumed that Johnson was an oil field worker at Ranger until a few weeks ago when he went to Fort Worth and secured employment in the Northwest extension field through the services of a Fort Worth employment agency.

The condition of Everett Sawyer, also shot during the affair is reported as grave. He was brought to the Wichita General hospital following the shooting and is suffering from two bullet wounds. Sawyer told newspaper men that he knew Johnson in Ranger having worked in the Eastland county oil fields with him. Sawyer came to Waggoner City several days ago in search of work. According to his story, he and Johnson went to a gambling resort early Tuesday morn-

ing where a dispute arose and a man said to have been "banking the game" arose and began shooting. Johnson was killed almost instantly and Sawyer fell to the floor wounded twice.

"I fell to the floor shot twice and was sure that my time had come," Sawyer said. "A big fellow came rushing toward me, revolver in hand, as if to shoot me again. As he approached nearer he seemed to recognize me and called out 'that fellow's alright, I know him in Ranger.' A doctor was called and dressed my wounds. Meanwhile the big fellow who had killed my companion and wounded me escaped through the crowd and could not be found."

Sawyer said he recently came to the northwest fields from Ranger. He is a "well-shooter" having been employed as a nitro-worker by an oil concern at Ranger prior to coming to the northwest field. Sheriff Bob McFall said that he is on the "hot trail" of the man believed

guilty of the shooting and that an arrest is expected to be made shortly.
