Band Director Fox Resigns

Milton Fox, Tahoka High School band director who brought the Bulldog Band to possibly its highest level of excellence ever, has resigned as band director here to take a prestigious job as band director in San Antonio Alamo High School.

In the last two years, Fox has fielded a vastly improved band which had done well in both marching and playing. His move to a larger school and higher-paying job was noted as the Tahoka school board accepted his resignation last Thursday night.

"We certainly hate to lose Mr. Fox, but could hardly stand in his way for advancement to such a good position," said Supt. Jim Coulston. School board members voted to

hire several new teachers and accepted one other resignation, that of Vivian McAfee as third grade teacher. Hired were James Carter as high school math teacher, Mrs. Ruthie Henry as migrant teacher for grades four through six, Mrs. Nan Adams for fifth grade, and Mrs. Donna Stone for Title I, kindergarten through third grade.

Approved by the board were a minimum competency policy for North Elementary, increase in the local travel allowance from 22 to 23 cents per mile, and \$500 annual increases for four non-teaching personnel.

Purchase of a 1981 GMC pickup formerly leased by the agriculture department and a 1978 Oldsmobile from a private citizen were approved, as well as the lease of a new Pontiac from McCord Motor Co.

It was voted to encourage, but not require, continuing education for the professional staff.

There was considerable discussion of the upcoming budget, and a public hearing on the 1982-83 budget was set for 7:30 p.m. Thursday, Aug. 12. The tax rate will be set and budget approval will follow at the regular meeting starting at 8 p.m.

Coulston: Quality Is School Aim

"Social" promotions are a thing of the past in the Tahoka schools, and no longer will graduation diplomas be issued students who do not meet new and higher standards in reading writing and mathematics.

These were among statements made by Jim Coulston, Tahoka superintendent of schools, in a talk at Rotary last Thursday noon on "The State of Your Schools."

Coulston indicated stricter attention to basics in the local schools is already paying off. In the state-wide basic skills tests conducted locally, Tahoka students have scored higher than the state average. These tests are made in certain grades each year. For example, tests in reading, writing and arithmetic in the third

Former Tahokan Is Top Fisherman, Rod Builder

Q.T. Brian is Abilene's most notable fish catcher and story teller and has spent the last six years in custom rod building. The 76-year-old retired farmer from Tahoka, who has gained national attention for his custom rodmaking, was in Tahoka last week.

His custom rods made the cover of the Nov. 1981 issue of Fishing Tackle Retailer. He uses a graphite blank rod shell, exotic pine wood handles, snakeskin leather, and colorfully-stitched pictures and whatever else that is desired depending on what the rod buyer requests.

Brian began building rods as a hobby, but now it's a full-time business, one which has developed to the point where he can't even begin to keep up with the orders, he said. More and more anglers are buying custom rods -- and they're

willing to pay premium prices for them.

Why do anglers want custom rods? A big reason is utility. According to Brian, buying a custom rod from a competent craftsman is an angler's one sure way of obtaining the very best rod for his type of fishing. Another reason is individuality-- "they have status appeal."

Brian does his custom work from his workshop at home and spends anywhere from 15 minutes to 21 hours in one setting. "I work when I want to work," says Brian. "I really don't care if I ever sell a rod, I've got enough money in my life. I do it for pleasure." The average price for one of his rods is around \$200.

Brian had never fished before the age of 66. He had 3200 acres of cotton and maize in Lynn County. He retired about 10 years ago, and for the first time in his life he had nothing to do, nowhere to go. So, he decided to take up the angling

hobby. He read books and watched fishermen and he learned how to fish.

Brian has caught a 120-lb. sailfish in Mexico and a bass in Florida. And he did it all beginning at age 66.

"I guess the story I have to tell more than anything else is that there's a big world out there with lots of secrets. Anyone can do it if the desire is there. The desire is everything. The secrets will fall into your hands if you want them."

COTTON TODAY

Views Sought On Cotton Program

The U.S. Department of Agriculture is asking for comments on provisions of the 1983 upland cotton program by Sept. 14.

The National Cotton Council reports that comments are requested on: (1) the loan rate; (2) target price; (3) whether USDA should establish an acreage reduction program, and, if so, the level of such reduction; (4) the appropriate national program acreage and the voluntary production percentage if no reduction program is announced; (5) whether USDA should establish a paid land diversion program and, if so, the percentage of diversion and level of payment; and (6) the loan rate for seed cotton.

NCC Submits Testimony: In a recent statement to the Senate Agriculture Committee, National Cotton Council President Ed Breihan urged passage of legislation to amend the Federal Insecticide, Fungicide, and rodenticide Act (FFIFRA).

The bill would streamline the registration process and provide increased incentives for research and development.

The Council also expressed opposition to a proposed amendment giving any individual the right to bring suit in any district court against farmers for "alleged misuse" of pesticides.

Breihan pointed out the provision is unnecessary. Rather than enhancing protections under the act, the practical effect will be merely to encourage such suits. As such, farmers and others will be threatened with endless costly and time-consuming litigation, he said.

Textile Imports Rise: Cotton textile imports in May were equivalent to

163,740 bales, up 17 percent from the average of the first four months of 1982.

Exports of cotton textiles were only slightly higher than the four-month average. This meant a widening of the trade deficit for the first five months to an annual rate of 1,168,000 bale equivalents.

grade, students tested as good or above state requirements in 8 of 11 cases.

"Tahoka has a very fine faculty," he said. As an example of forward movement, he declared the computer program initiated by Mrs. Jaquess is one of the best to be found anywhere.

He also cited the decline in enrollment of Tahoka schools the past five years from 1,054 in 1977, a loss of 279 through 1981.

As a result, there has been a loss in state funds, but the teaching force has been cut from 65 to 57. To get qualified teachers, salaries have been forced up and the annual bud-

get increase has been 5.7 percent a year.

Property valuations on the 370-section district have increased to \$99,399,000. Current tax collections have reached 93.4 percent. In face of increased school costs, however, he said there will be no raise in property taxes this year.

Supt. Coulston said he thinks Tahoka district citizens are getting good return on their investment in quality education for their children. Ladd Roberts arranged the program.

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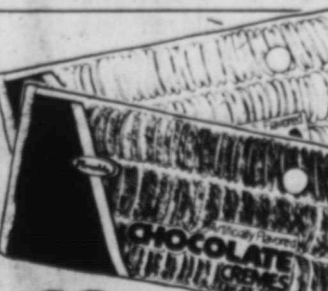
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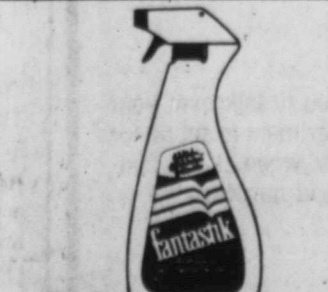
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The first unit of Roy Tolk Station, Southwestern Public Service Company's new coal-fired generating plant near Muleshoe, Texas, will begin manufacturing electricity this month. The unit has the capacity to generate 561,000 kilowatts of electric power—it's Southwestern's largest. A second unit, the same size as the first, is being built next to the one which will be fired up this month. The units cost more than \$200 million apiece. They can each provide enough electricity to supply a city of 225,000 people.

Ben Green, Plant Manager, Muleshoe.

Tolk Station will burn coal — ground as fine as talcum powder — to produce electricity. The coal SPS uses comes from mines near Gillette, Wyoming. It is a low-sulfur coal. Tolk Station Unit No. 1 will burn approximately 315 tons of coal per hour. That's about 7,560 tons per day. The coal is delivered by 110-car trains directly from the Wyoming mines. Coal-fired plants are significantly more economical to operate than natural gas-fired plants.

Morris Rantz, Fuel Administration Manager, Amarillo.

The "stack" at Tolk Station is 400 feet high. The "smoke" it emits, however, is "smokeless." Although burning coal naturally produces "smoke" (flue gas and fly ash), our state-of-the-art environmental protection equipment cleans up the emissions long before they get into the air. The protection system, called a baghouse, contains 13,000 fiberglass bags. They filter the boiler's emissions and remove the ash residues, making the coal "smokeless."
