Two Distinguished Native Sons To Attend Homecoming Saturday

Two distinguished native Mills County sons, Hines H. Baker and Rex G. Baker, will attend Homecoming this week Saturday for Goldthwaite ex-students and teachers, it was announced this week by Robert Burdette, program chairman for the occasion.

Both the Mr. Bakers will take part on an informal program to be presented at the Homecoming activities.

They are the sons of the late Mr. and Mrs. John B. Baker and were born in Big Valley. They attended school in Goldthwaite one year before the family moved to Medina, Texas, in 1904.

Both are graduates of the University of Texas and University Law School. They have been active in business, civic and church affairs for many years in Houston and over a wide area.

Mr. Hines H. Baker is a former director, Executive Vice President and member of the Executive Committee of Standard Oil Company of New Jersey.

He joined Humble Oil and Refining Company in 1919 as a member of the Law department. He was named a director of the company in 1937, became director in charge of refining and sales operations in 1940. In 1941 he became a vice president, and in 1945, executive vice president. He was elected president

in May, 1948.

In 1957 Mr. Baker resigned from Humble Oil & Refining Company to join Standard Oil Company, (N. J.) as a director and later was elected Executive Vice President and member of the Executive Committee of that company. He retired on January 1, 1959, and returned to Houston to make his home.

He has been active in St. Luke's Methodist Church, serving as chairman of the Official Board.

Mr. Rex G. Baker joined Humble Oil & Refining Company in 1920. He served as director of Humble Pipe Line Company from 1929 to 1943, when he was named director and general counsel of Humble Oil & Refining Company. Elected vice president of Humble Oil & Refining Company in 1951 where he served until his normal retirement age in 1956.

Active participation in Church and civic work and in professional associations has been a part of Mr. Baker's 40 years in Houston. For many years he was a leader in Baptist Church affairs and served as chairman of the deacons at River Oaks Baptist Church. He served as chairman of the Finance Committee of Houston Baptist College which has raised over three million dollars for the college.

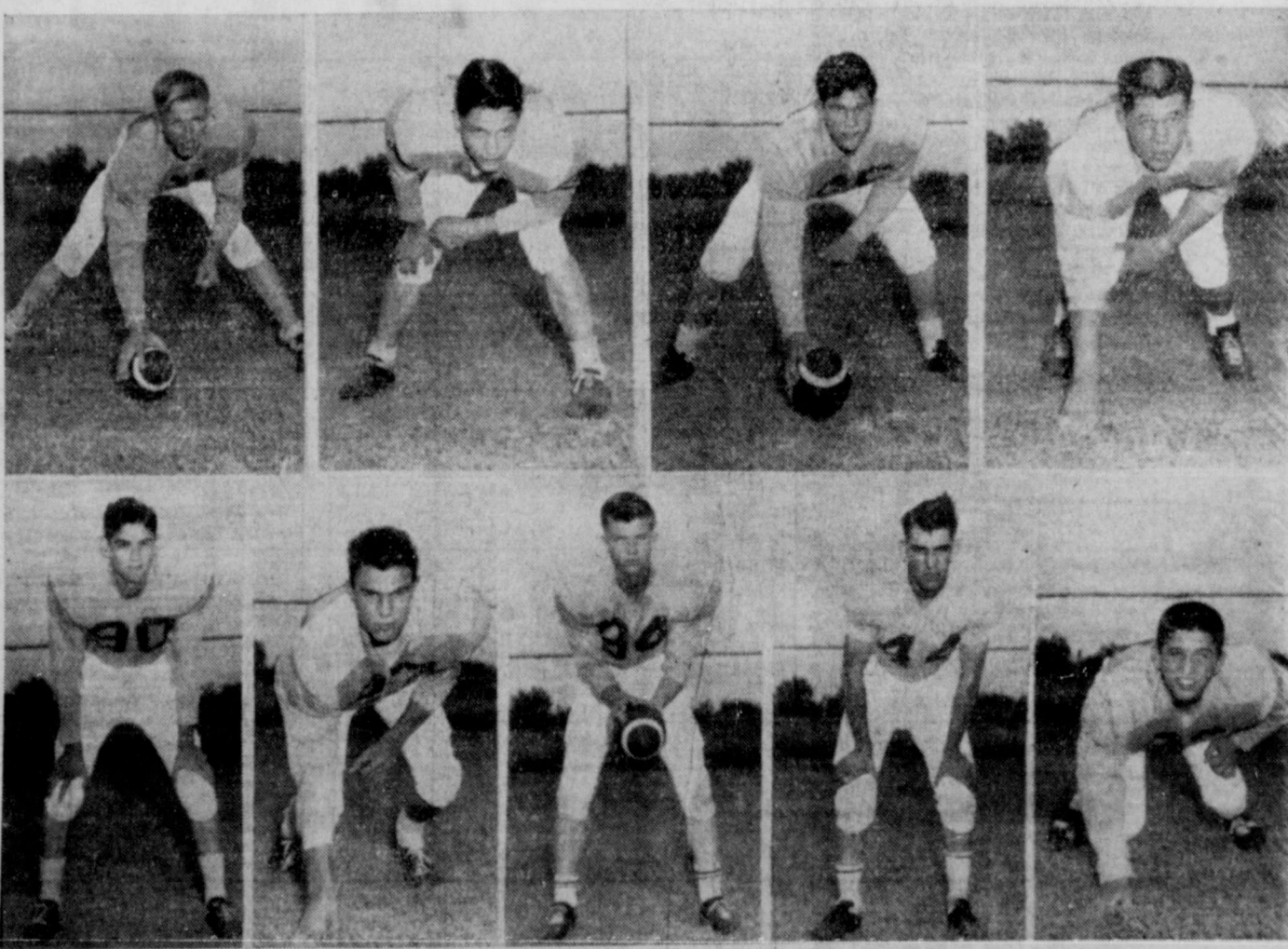

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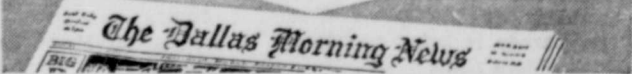


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WHEN THE OLD BIRD WAS YOUNGER

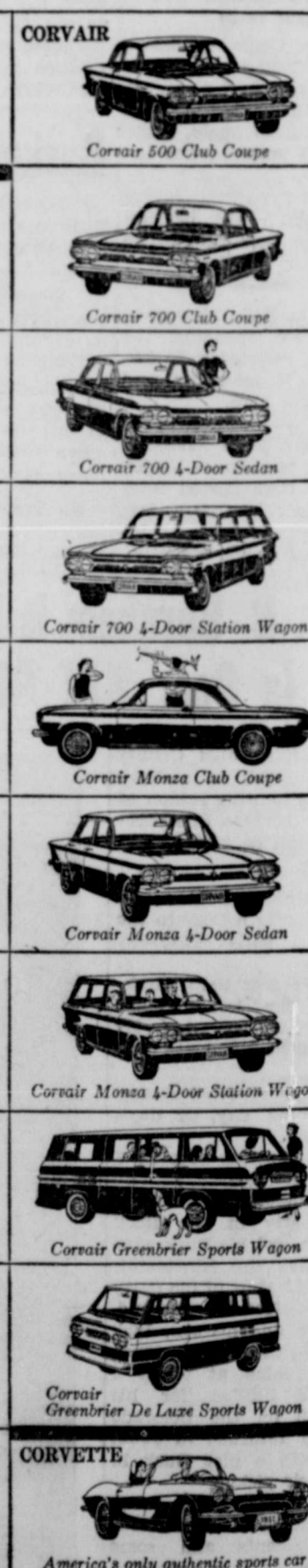

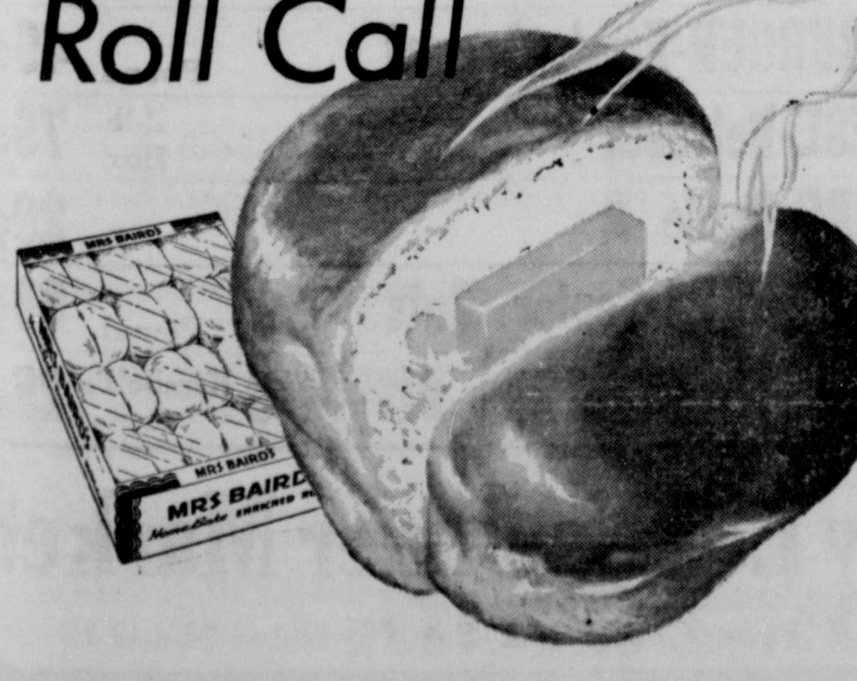

Loans Available To Farmers For Development Of Water And Soil

Loan funds are available to eligible Mills County farmers who wish to develop water supply systems for irrigation, household use and livestock; to drain farm land; and to carry out soil conservation measures; reports Willie Marwitz, chairman of the local Farmers Home Administration County Committee.

Mr. Marwitz points out that these funds can be extremely useful in developing the water and land resources of the community and otherwise supporting rural area development. Each dollar used wisely in developing and conserving water and land resources helps prevent crop failures, boosts farm income and increases the value of local property.

Funds used in developing water and land resources stimulate local business activity.

Mills County farmers may ob-

tain water development and soil conservation loans, to drill wells and otherwise improve their water supply systems for home use and livestock; purchase pumps; purchase water stock or membership in an incorporated water users association; construct and repair ponds and tanks, ditches and canals for irrigation; dig ditches and install tile to drain farm land; make other related improvements.

Loans may also be obtained to clear and level land; carry out basic land treatment practices including liming, fertilizing, and seeding; subsoil or sod land; purchase posts, wire, other fencing materials; plant trees; establish permanent pastures.

In addition loans may be used to build dikes, terraces, waterways, and other erosion control structures; and to obtain plans and pay fees for legal, engineering, and other technical services.

Farmers pay 5 per cent interest on water development and soil conservation loans, according to Mr. Marwitz. And he said that loans to individual farmers in Mills County are usually scheduled for repayment over a period of five to ten years but that loans may be made payable over periods up to 40 years if necessary.

Loans to individual farmers in Mills County will vary considerably in size Mr. Marwitz said because of the wide range in the needs of borrowers. However he said that a farmer may borrow up to \$60,000 depending on how the funds are to be used and the property available for security.

To be eligible for a water development and soil conservation loan, a farmer must be unable to obtain the necessary credit on reasonable terms from private and cooperative lenders.

Further details about water development and soil conservation loans may be obtained from the Farmers Home Administration office located on the second floor of the Chamber of Commerce Building, 201 N. Fisk, Brownwood, or any Tuesday morning between the hours of nine and twelve o'clock

Mr. Marwitz said that Farmers Home Administration also makes loans to purchase and develop farms, buy livestock and equipment and pay farm and home operating expenses, build and improve rural homes and essential farm service buildings, build housing for farm laborers, develop watersheds, and to meet emergency credit needs of farmers suffering from a natural disaster such as hail, flood or drought.

kill or not to kill is the question!

Poisonous snakes, although they do play a beneficial role in the wildlife scene, should be destroyed. They are a constant source of danger to man and domestic animals.

Non-poisonous snakes, however, should be left unmolested.

Snakes, both poisonous and non-poisonous, play a key role in keeping rodent populations from running wild. Rats and mice, both carriers of diseases that can be passed to humans, constitute the bulk of the diet of most snakes. Eliminate all snakes, and the fields soon will be overrun with rodents.

There are four kinds of poisonous snakes in Texas — rattlers, copperheads, cottonmouth moccasins and corals. All are deadly, but not to the same degree.

Rattlers constitute the greatest danger because they are the most plentiful. They are also the largest snakes found in the state.

Texas has a number of species of rattlers, ranging all the way from the big diamondback — the largest — to the smaller-size canebrake rattler.

Moccasins and copperheads come next in abundance.

While the coral snake ranks last, numerically, that doesn't mean that the coral is the least deadly. Fact of the matter is, the coral snake's poison is much more toxic than that of the other species.

Because of the construction of the coral snake's mouth and jaws, it has great difficulty in biting anything much larger around than a finger or a toe. Furthermore, it injects its poison not through fangs but by chewing on the victim.

It would take far too much space here to describe each of the poisonous snakes and list their general areas in the state.

However you can get an excellent description of them in a booklet published by the state. We'd suggest you write for it. This booklet has pictures of the many species of snakes in

Texas. It lists their characteristics and includes maps showing the counties they inhabit. You may obtain one free by writing the Texas Game and Fish Commission, Walton Building, Austin 1, Texas.

Everyone who roams the woods or waters should be constantly on guard against snakes. Naturally one's chance of coming upon a snake is much greater in the warm weather months than in winter.

However, don't let your guard down in the winter.

Snakes are supposed to den up and hibernate in the winter. But I've come across some lively rattlers and moccasins on near-freezing days. So be prepared for the nonconformist!

Information About Screw-Worm

A local committee which recently named to assist Southwest Animal Health Foundation with research on the proposed control program for the screw-worm in this week presents some information about the pest.

SYMPTOMS OF SCREW-WORM ATTACKS

Screw-worms have been found to infest practically all types of wild and domestic animals, including poultry, and man, but are commonly noticed in cats, dogs, deer, sheep and goats. The screw-worm maggots do not attack cold-blooded animals and cannot live in decayed matter. Maggots found in the wounds of animals are usually the result of common blow flies. The primary screw-worm fly lays eggs on cuts, scratches, abrasions, or insect or tick bites on living animals. If the

host animal dies before the primary screw-worm maggots are one-half grown, the maggots do not survive as they cannot compete with bacteria and other maggots that invade the carcass.

DAMAGE CAUSED BY SCREW-WORMS

The female screw-worm fly lays eggs in shingle-like masses on the edge of a wound. Newly hatched larvae crawl into the wound to feed and during the feeding process they destroy tissue with their mouth hooks.

Larvae from one egg mass can destroy enough muscle tissue to make a hole the size of a lemon.

Screw-worms from a one egg mass in the navel of a new born animal may be sufficient to cause death.

An infested wound increases in attractiveness to the flies, and by the time the first larvae are 1 or 2 days old, other flies have deposited eggs on the wound.

Infestations in wild or neglected domestic animals frequently are fatal within one or two weeks.

L. B. Burnham, chairman of the Mills County committee, said that additional information about the problems facing Texas stockmen and proposals for an effective control program will be presented during the coming weeks.

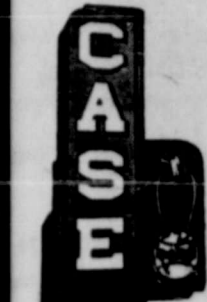
