John Cabaniss Has Case Reported In Texas Law Review

Appearing in the November issue of the "Texas Law Review" is a casenote on Hanks v. Rosser by John T. Cabaniss. Cabaniss, son of Mr. and Mrs. Weldon B. Cabaniss, received his B.A. degree from Rice University in 1963. He is now a second year student at the University of Texas School Law and a candidate of the "Review."

The Texas Law Review is published seven times a year at the University of Texas School of Law. It is comprised of articles by outstanding legal scholars, judges and practitioners, and of notes and comments by exceptional law students, selected to write for the Review. Now in its 42nd year of publication, the Texas Law Review was formed in 1922 by Leon Green, Ira Hildebrand, and Ireland Graves. It has long been recognized as one of the leading periodicals in the country, and its former editors and writers rank among the leading judges, scholars, and attorneys, both in the state and in the nation.

Hanks v. Rosser is a case decided in April 1964, by the Texas Supreme Court. The Court held that a party may be entitled to have a clearly erroneous judgment set aside by equitable bill of review even after it has become final, where the judgment resulted from misleading information given by the court clerk acting in his official capacity. In Hanks, the clerk's error caused the party to file an answer rather than a proper motion for a new trial. This decision is a departure from precedent in that it does not require any fraud or wrongful conduct on the part of the opposing party which led to the judgment. Cabaniss feels the decision indicates a more liberal outlook by the Court in granting relief from judgments clearly erroneous, yet resulting from no fault on the part of the party seeking relief.

Oregon Continues Search For Tuna

The U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service Research Vessel Oregon contains her search for new fish grounds and the Caribbean Sea, and has just returned to her home port of St. Simons Island Ga., after an extensive cruise.

The trip was the first in a series in cooperation with the United Nations Special Fund Caribbean Fisheries Project and a continuation of the general Atlantic faunal survey and fishery resource evaluation started by the Service in 1957.

Preliminary survey coverage was obtained in the general area of the Lesser Antilles and between Barbadoes and Aves islands.

Fishing emphasis was placed on pelagic species like tuna, using surface fishing gear although where possible, the bottom was also explored with trawls and dredges. United Nations observers and trainees from various participating countries were aboard for different phases of the trip.

Day and night long line sets of from 500 to 600 hooks were made at 11 locations in the survey area, according to Harvey R. Bullis, Jr., director of the exploratory fishing and gear research base.

Tuna catches were very poor here. A few yellowfish and blackfin tuna were caught south of Saba Bank and east of St. Vincent Island, and two broadbill swordfish were taken on a night set north of Aves Island.

At other localities, the research chief said, catches of small numbers of white-tip, silky, blue, blacktip, bigeye thresher and mako sharks were made, as well as a couple of oil fish, three barracuda, a pair of dolphins, and three unidentified myxipylids. Two surface feeding tuna schools, tentatively identified as black fins were observed off the coast of St. Lucia.

POST OFFICE HELPS COUNT LIVESTOCK

The rural mail carrier from Rockport Post Office will leave livestock survey cards along his route, beginning Nov. 13.

"Information reported on these cards is used to set the yearly inventory of livestock and poultry on Texas farms," Postmaster Rowan explained. Rural carriers distribute the cards at random in boxes along their routes.

"This means that every box will get a card," Rowan said. "For this reason, it's important for everyone who gets a card to return it filled out so that USDA can get a true sample of the State's livestock holdings."

The carrier assisting with the survey is Mrs. J. D. Heselstine.

Facts and figures secured in this survey are the basis for Texas and National pig crop report and inventories of livestock and poultry on farms as of the first of the year. Stockmen and many others use this information in making business decisions.

Survey results will be widely distributed through Texas Crop and Livestock Reporting Services releases, newspapers, farm magazines, radio, and television.

Girl Scout Drive To Begin Nov. 10

The annual Girl Scout campaign for funds in this area will begin Tuesday, Nov. 10, with a Dutch-treat kickoff breakfast at Corky's, following which workers will start contacting local business men and others for contributions. Parents will be approached through the girls and through other workers, as well as by a letter which says:

"The Girl Scout organization is one of the finest programs we have and in Rockport-Fulton area we have over 125 girls working actively in this program. They learn many fine things. Love of Country, and home, handicrafts, home-making and how to get along with one another. We have some fine leaders working with these girls that give their time and efforts for fulfillment of this program."

"But, a startling fact was brought home to us at our neighborhood Council meeting last Thursday, and that is that the Rockport-Fulton area has not paid their part of the cost of this program for the past two years. The other towns in the council, Refugio, Woodsboro, Aransas Pass, Taft, and Sinton have paid our bills. This was a fact that was shocking to us, because we are mostly new members, and we feel that it is just as shocking to the parents of our local girls. We want to do our part, and we want to pay our part, and we think you do too."

"When you are contacted for a donation to this fine organization, and then you will remember that you have not been asked for a donation for two years, give all you can and let's pay our part this year and keep our Girl Scout program moving. This way you can show the workers who are giving their time that you will do your part by giving your fair share of the cost."

"The money the girls make on nut and cookie sales goes mostly to the cost of operating Camp Copano, and the dime each week are used in their own troops for refreshments, handicraft, supplies, etc. The Girl Scout Little House has to be maintained, insured, and the utilities paid each month, and these are the costs that we have not been paying our share on, and this year, let us do that."

"Help us this year to keep the Scout program going and show that Rockport-Fulton do pay their share."

He had lived in San Antonio about 45 years, where he was an attorney and insurance agent for many years.

He was a member of Christ Episcopal Church in San Antonio; a 32nd Degree Mason; and for many years was quite active in the Sons of the American Revolution and was one of the early members of the St. Charles Bay Hunting Club.

He is survived by his wife, Dorothy, of 208 East Lullwood, San Antonio; two sons, A. C. McDavid, Jr., San Antonio, and John M. McDavid, Rockport; a daughter, Mrs. C. L. Witherspoon, Jr., also of San Antonio; seven grandchildren and two great grandchildren.

Services were held Monday in San Antonio at Porter-Loring Funeral Chapel, conducted by Rev. Samuel Capets, of Christ Episcopal Church.

Interment was in Mission Burial Park North, San Antonio.

Veterans Payroll Is a Good One For County Economy

The Veterans' payroll in Aransas County amounts to about \$10,000 per month, or as much as a small industry, according to Jimmy Hunt, county service officer.

This represents an increase of almost three times that of a year ago, with roughly five months yet to be recorded. Between January and December, 1963, Hunt said, total payments made to veterans in Aransas County amounted to \$25,400.

In the seven months from March to September, 1964, inclusive, payments have already totaled \$70,962. The increase has resulted from new pensions obtained and increased payments due to review of benefits being received by the Veterans Administration. These reviews, Hunt said, have shown that a number of pensioners were entitled to larger checks than they have been getting.

Calls on Hunt during the month rarely average less than 100, and some times reach an even higher figure. He expects still more once the new pension measure sponsored by Sen. Russell Long, La., and Cong. Olin E. Teague, Tex., goes into effect.

Hunt says that an estimated 1,331,872 veterans, widows and dependents of World War I, World War II, and the Korean conflict will benefit under the new law. Specifically, Hunt said, all veterans now drawing a pension are entitled to a 10 percent exclusion of any retirement income aside from their veteran's pension, in computing annual income for purposes of income tax.

Under this bill, Hunt said, a veteran would not need to have shown any degree of disability nor any unemployment to qualify for a pension after 65. However, this provision was eliminated after the budget bureau objected.

Added at the insistence of the Senate was a provision for veterans to re-apply for National Service Life Insurance for a period of one year. This provision applies only to those who have a disability connected with the service and to a limited group of non-service connected veterans, generally rated unemployable or who can obtain service only at substandard rates.

The new law also provides that of any veterans of World War I, World War II or the Korean Conflict who is receiving a pension and who needs regular aid and attendance may be furnished by the government, drugs or medicine ordered on prescription of a duly licensed physician.

Also provided is an increase in the rate of a veteran who is in need of regular aid and attendance, to \$100 per month, as against the present payment of \$70 monthly.

Other provisions of the bill cover circumstances where the veteran is entitled to further compensation.

Rockport In 20-16 Victory

Aransas County scored a 20-16 victory over the Flour Bluff Hornets here Friday night behind the outstanding play of halfback Martin Garcia averaged over 10 yards a carry while gaining 225 yards.

After a scoreless first quarter, the Pirate's Charlie Picton passed to end Gary Stryker for an 80-yard touchdown play. Rockie Sanders kicked the PAT. After kicking off and regaining possession of the ball, the Pirates scored again on an identical play, this time for a total of 42.

Still in the second period, Robert Staley, the Hornet quarterback, passed to slotback Larry McLain on a 9-yard scoring play. Staley passed to end Jimmy Barta for the conversion.

In the third period, Garcia ran 81 yards up the middle for a touchdown, and Sanders booted the PAT. Late in the quarter, the Hornets' Bobbie Turnbull carried over from one and Staley again passed, this time to Eddie Gowens for the conversion.

Students Tag Butterflies

Each year about November or a little earlier, Pearsall students, members of the Camp Fire Girls, cooperate with the University of Toronto in Canada to catch and band the big yellow monarch butterflies that migrate through here, hanging in great clusters at night on tree branches.

Next spring, some of these same butterflies will return through Pearsall and lay their eggs on milkweed plants to raise a new crop.

The girls capture and tag the migrating butterflies, and even raise them from caterpillars. A similar service has been performed in this area by Mrs. Jack Hagar, national-known birdwoman.

Last year, more than 14,000 Monarchs were tagged and released in the U.S. and for several years the girls have tagged several hundred locally.

Although Pacific Grove, Calif., is a famous wintering spot for these spectacular insects, there are wintering trees in South and West Texas, at places like the Texas Parks and Wildlife Fish Hatchery at Uvalde and on ranches around San Antonio.

Big migration month is October, when golden clouds of Monarchs cruise southwesterly at about 11 miles an hour, many of them coming all the way from Canada.

Years ago a University of Toronto professor started tagging Monarchs to find out where they went, and some of these tagged butterflies have been recovered in Texas. To further aid the study, butterflies are caught and tagged in Canada, then sent air mail to the Pearsall students, where they arrive in good condition and are released.

Already this year Pearsall fourth graders have released more than 1500, all with tags on their right wings.

They ask everyone to be on the lookout for the big brown and black fellows and if one has a tag, write down the number and notify the University of Toronto.

Editorial

While Chief of Police Bob Hewes compliments teenagers and elementary children of the area for their sane celebration of Hallowe'en, we must not forget there is always the exception that proves the rule.

Vandalism in the cemetery has broken our again, unconnected with Hallowe'en, with some morally-degraded and senseless person or persons desecrating the graves of the dead.

No one, not even the most thoughtless teenager, can do things of this kind without knowing they are against all decency.

Cars have been driven across graves; plants and shrubs that have just been planted were dug up and thrown aside to die; gravestones have been damaged by cars; containers on some of the graves have been stolen; trash and litter of all kinds have been thrown out to render the cemetery unsightly; holes have been shot in the signs that asks drivers to use the streets outside the cemetery, and to refrain from using the roads through it as thoroughfares.

This may come under the heading of good clean fun to some people, but to most it reeks of immaturity, meanness, bad manners, lack of morals and near idiocy on the part of the person or persons responsible.

Members of the Cemetery Association, who devote long hours of their time for no pay to making the burying ground a dignified and beautiful place for the community dead to rest, have appealed to those responsible, asking that they stop and consider their actions, in the hope they will cease this desecration.

Others, with less forbearance, hope that the officers will catch up with those who are doing the damage and that they will be made to realize that this sort of thing is frowned on by decent citizens.

Recently, an Alice judge was reported to have found a punishment that would be particularly fitted for this type of offense. Tired of the fact that most youths caught breaking the law suffered no penalty that reached them, he has begun sentencing such offenders to work out their fines on the streets for the betterment of the community.

We doubt that much work is done, but at least it is possible that being exposed to public view, so that everyone can see who has been breaking the law, may have a deleterious effect on potential offenders.

The practice of most newspapers of refusing to print the names of young offenders is one that many judges throughout the state have deplored. There may, or may not be something in state laws that prohibit this in some cases, but there's apparently nothing that is against the sort of public recognition Alice offenders are getting.

land in the Grenadine group, Bullis said, and dwarf herring and silversides were densely attracted so that during one hour 150 pounds of these little fish dipped from the sea with a net, to be frozen and used as chum for the long line sets.

While steaming between stations, one yellowfin tuna, nine Little Tuna, 4 common dolphin, 5 great barracuda, and one kingfish were caught on trolling lines.

Twenty-four trawling and 38 dredging stations were occupied near Barnadoes Tobago, Los Testigos, and the western side of the Windward and Leeward Islands, from Grenada to St. Christopher.

Catches of 5 to 45 pounds of 10 to 16 (heads off) count brown shrimp were made per hour long drag with a 40-foot trawl on new grounds discovered off the southwest coast of Tobago, Bullis stated. In depths of from 200 to 340 fathoms north of the same island, various species of shrimp, some potentially valuable commercially, were made. These included royal red shrimp, scarlet prawns and striped shrimp.

The best drag produced 120 pounds of royal reds of two species and ten pounds of lobsterettes.

SOCIAL SECURITY NUMBERS FOR ALL

Many young children need social security cards, according to Arthur L. Finck, assistant district manager of the Corpus Christi Social Security office. "Some teachers have undertaken class projects to have all of their students apply for account numbers," he said.

Some students do part-time work while they are in school, and of course, they need account numbers now. Many others, who receive divided or interest income from savings accounts in their names, must have social security numbers for tax purposes.

Since almost all students will have need for them sooner or later, now is a good time for them to apply for account numbers, Finck explained.

Early this year the local office received hundreds of requests for account number cards from parents who needed to furnish numbers for their children to banks, stock companies, and savings associations. "File now and avoid delay," is Finck's advise.

Application cards for social security numbers may be obtained from any area post office or from the Social Security Administration, 1802 South Staples Street, in Corpus Christi.
