Gatesville Gets "Blow" in Times, Also Geneva, N. Y.

We quote it all, and it was in "Times," September 7 issue. Here it is:

Tale of Two Towns.

Gatesville, Texas (Pop. 3,300) and Geneva, N. Y. (Pop. 16,000) are each having one of the strange experiences which war has brought to U. S. towns as well as U. S. men.

Gatesville people were asked to oblige the army by billeting 285 officer students while a near by camp was being built. The soldiers agreed to pay \$10. a month. for rooms. Mrs. Ercell Brooks provided beds for five (she had to buy new beds at \$20 each and \$40 worth of linen, had to put two beds in the dining room and eat in the kitchen. "They are fine to have in the house, she said. Horace Jackson put up a colonel in his guest room and two lieutenants in the garage. Editor Mat Jones put up a captain and his wife. "We just gave them the run of the house and we got along fine." A negro couple boarded three negro officers. A month of rain turned the ground to sticky gumbo; it became the regulation for the soldiers to take off their muddy shoes before entering the house. They are real gentlemen, the townspeople said. Gatesville gave the auditorium for lectures on tank warfare and women ran the high school cafeteria for the soldiers. In return, the grateful visitors entertained Gatesville at a review, barbecue and dance. Everybody had a good time.

Geneva, instead of having a 10% influx of earnest young Americans learning to be soldiers, had a 100% influx of roughnecks workmen—15,000. men, any sort. of tough riffraff whom contractors could hire at high pay to build a big naval training station on Seneca Lake. All Geneva's spare rooms were let; cots filled the City Hall, an old movie house, a dance hall, hotel corridor. The once quiet orderly town nearly went mad. Busses were so jammed that sometimes drivers had to threaten unruly crowds with wrenches in order to make them let passengers out. Decent bars became clamorous dives. Honest citizens dared not let their daughters go out after dark. More policemen were hired but holdups and disorders mounted. Staid, tradition-loving Geneva felt its life was ruined. Everybody was miserable.

REDS REVERSE NAZIS
Moscow, Sept. 7 (UP).—Russian troops, backed by a citizen's army of men, women and children have driven the Germans out of a number of populated places northwest of Stalingrad and have beaten off all armored onslaughts southwest of the city, the high command announced Monday.

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ROMMEL STUMPED IN EGYPT
Cairo, Sept. 6 (UP).—Allied guns and planes have beaten Marshall Erwin Rommells desert army back to the starting line of his Egyptian offensive which he launched a week ago with proclamation to his troops that "we are off to Cairo," it was revealed Sunday night. He is just "off."

SPENDING TAX GETS STUDY

Washington, Sept. 6 (AP).—Chairman Walter George of Georgia of the Senate Finance Committee pledged "very serious consideration" for the treasury's spending tax proposal Sunday while Senator John Danaher of Connecticut pressed his retail sales stamp plan as a method of raising billions in revenue now and avoiding a slump after the war. Remedy for inflation: Reduce \$10 a week stenographers from \$30 to \$10 a week, and all other labor; take all net profits over 10% for "little business" and 5% for "big business." This can't be any more wrong than some of the things they are trying.

CHINKS GAIN OVER JAPS
Chungking, Sept. 6 (AP).—The Chinese drive northward through coastal Chekiang province has gathered momentum and the Japs are being hit hard in the vicinity of the provisional capital, Kinwha, which the enemy is trying desperately to hold, the Chinese said Sunday.

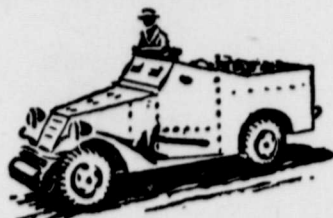

Powledge, who died in the Medical Arts Hospital at Dallas Sunday afternoon, were held at the Hico Methodist Church Monday afternoon at 4 o'clock, August 31, conducted by the pastor, Rev. Floyd W. Thrash. Burial was in Hico Cemetery, under the auspices of members of Hico Lodge No. 477, A. F. & A. M.

Leonard Anthony Powledge was born in Carroll county, Georgia, on June 2, 1859, and was married to Miss Sarah Guthrie in Walker county Ga., on November 29, 1882. They came to Texas in December, 1900 and settled near Old Hico. In 1903 they moved to their present location west of town and made their permanent home. To this union nine children were born, all of whom survive: Miss Frances Powledge, Mrs. W. P. Goar, Russell and Orville of Dallas; Mrs. J. D. Nix, Wichita Falls; L. R. Powledge, Gainesville; Mrs. John O. Potts, Gatesville; and George and Irene of the home. Besides his wife and children, he is survived also by a brother, John Powledge, Moreland, Ga., and seven grandchildren.

Mr. Powledge was converted at the age of nine and united with the Methodist Church in Georgia, living a faithful member of the church for 73 years. He has served as steward, district steward, district trustee, Sunday school teacher and trustee of the church. In August, 1941 the Hico Methodist Church observed Pioneer Day, honoring its members and Mr. Powledge was among the members honored that day as being a faithful and useful member over so long a period.

Of pioneer stock, and imbued with a progressive spirit, courage of his convictions, and untiring energy, Mr. Powledge had made his home a happy one, and held a place in the community that commanded respect and encouraged enduring friendship among young and old. He never lost interest in the things that were going on about him, and was active, seldom complaining, to the end which came with his recent sudden illness. He has left a monument to himself in the respectful memory in which he was held throughout this section of the state, in the progress and development of which he was always interested.

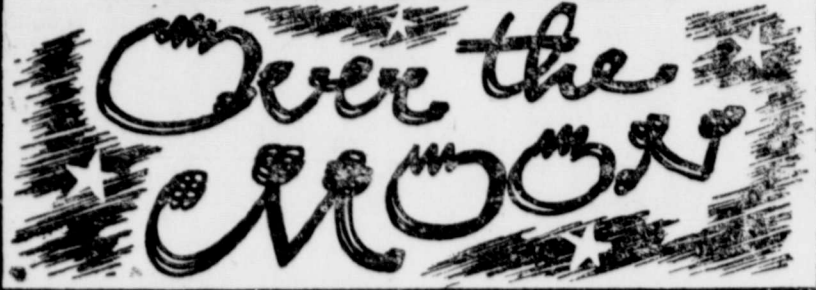

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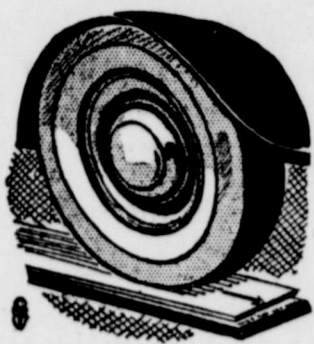

WOODEN SAILING SHIPS

When Undersecretary of Commerce Wayne C. Taylor was flying to Rio for the Inter-America conference, he remarked:

"Our toughest problem is shipping. We have to find something that will give us the most cargo space, using the least critical material. That's the formula."

Then he looked out of the plane window and saw a tiny sailing vessel below. "You may laugh," he said, "but we may even come to that."

That was last January. What Taylor had said on an impulse stuck in his mind. At Rio he talked it over with Brazilians who were worried about moving their coffee crop. He was sure he had the answer to the submarine campaign—ships requiring no critical materials, ships that would coast along in shallow waters and keep alive the trade among the Americas.

But he struck a snag in Washington. The Maritime commission was not interested. Skeptics said it was a reversion to the "horse-and-buggy days" of the sea. Three times Taylor worked up his project in revised forms, but each time it failed to click.

Then he tried another tack. He published an account of the project in a trade weekly of the department of commerce. Immediately it struck fire. Boat builders all over the country wanted to take part in the enterprise. Official interest was kindled.

Result was that RFC allocated \$10,000,000, with which the Rockefeller Office is setting up a corporation to build and acquire wooden sailing vessels for inter-American trade.

Two designs have been completed, one for a shallow draft vessel and one for a heavy sea vessel. Yards have been selected in Latin America, and contracts are being let.

There will be an endless belt of 300-ton sailing ships, making long and short voyages, using auxiliary engines when necessary, but saving fuel by using, most of the time, the trade winds that made the Caribbean famous in the days of Clipper ships.

VICE PRESIDENT'S RECREATION

On a hot August morning, when residents of the Wardman Park hotel had fans turned on full blast, they looked with surprise to see four figures come out on the tennis court. They looked a second time. It was the vice president and a party of friends out for a set of doubles.

Henry Wallace took off a pair of slacks, threw them into a corner, and trotted out onto the court in white shorts and a white sports shirt. It was eight o'clock as the game began.

Wearing no hat or eyeshade, and wielding the racket in his left hand, Wallace entered into the game with the gusto of a high school boy. It was not tennis of professional quality, but it was high class amateur play. Frequently the ball was returned eight or ten times in a single exchange. Once when Wallace was at the net, he made five returns in succession, finally won the point.

At 9:05 the set ended. Wallace retreated to the corner of the court, pulled on his slacks, headed back to his apartment for a shower.

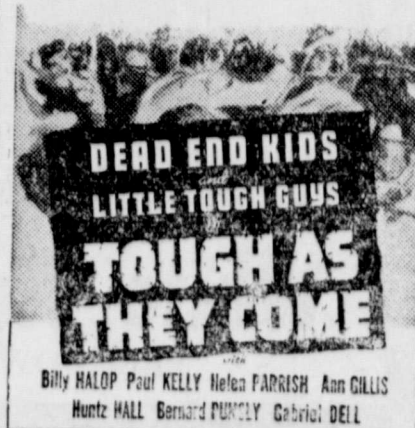
