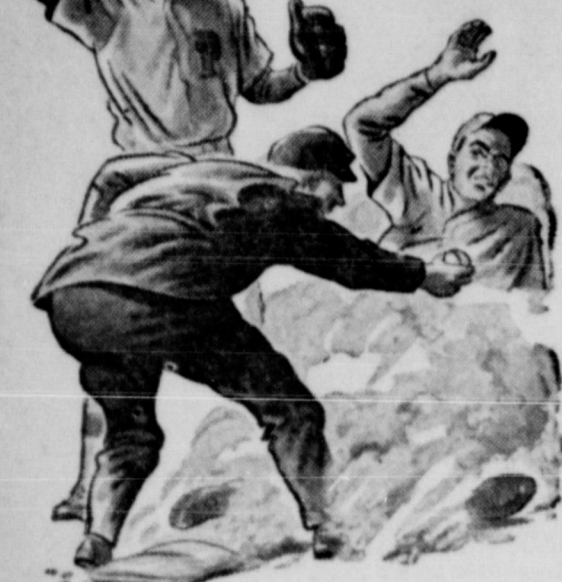




"HOW'D THE UMP GET IN THE GAME?"

Letters From Servicemen

(The following letter is from Pfc. Geo. Wall to his parents, Mr. and Mrs. H. E. Wall of Knox City. George is an airplane propeller specialist with the 16th Bomb Squadron, VH, stationed on Guam. The 16th Air Force of which his squadron is a unit, is equipped with B-29 Superfortress bombers).

On Guam, June 12th
Dear Mom and Dad:

I got my birthday card today and thank you all very much. It was a lovely card and you were very thoughtful. Remember last year on my birthday I left the infantry to come back to the Air Corps. This year I moved again—to here. And the year before I left the Air Corps for ASTP on my birthday. So maybe next year on my birthday I'll leave the Air Corps again—this time to being a full-fledged civilian.

Our payroll clerk's birthday is on the 9th too, and I ran across him that afternoon when I was on detail. Neither of us knew it was the others' birthday. He turned to me and told me he was taking off work because it was his birthday. I told him it was mine too, so we both took off—celebrated by going to the PX and having a coke and a bar of candy. Came back and made everyone in the barracks sing us the birthday song!

Sunday I went over to see Johnny (John Elbert Smith). It sure was good to see him and we talked for quite a while. A buddy of mine went over with me and we stayed for supper. They have a real nice place. And John said that he was very much in on the building of it!

I met several of his mates and saw a picture of his girl friend. She is very nice. Paul Hoge had been by a little while before. However, his (censored)—and he is headed back. (I don't know whether that is well known or not—if not the censor will cut it out. However, we had a bulletin on it here).

After Mac (my buddy—a different Mac) and I left Johnny, we hitched a ride with a Marine corporal who was a jeep driver for his colonel. He had about two hours off and said he would take us on a tour of the island. He really knew his way around. He was with the Marines when they landed here and has been here ever since. He showed us the beachhead and where he came ashore. Right across from the beachhead is the Marine cemetery, at the foot of a cliff. He took us through the town of Agaña—the largest—and it had been shelled to an almost complete ruin. I don't think he missed a thing. We have a nice beach where we can swim and really, the set-up isn't bad at all. I've managed to get quite blistered, but I expect to get a good sun tan before it's over.

There are still a few Japs here and the favorite story that the "veterans" tell us newcomers is about a Marine sergeant who was

driving a jeep and stopped to pick up two G. I. elad hitchhikers. He went down the road a piece and picked up another hitchhiker—a native. Pretty soon they came to a cross-road and the native hitchhiker said, "This is where I get off—I don't know where those two Japs are going." Well, I'm no Marine and haven't seen any yet—nor do I believe half of their tales.

Did I tell you that Tommy Burns is here too. He was my roommate at Carleton. I haven't been over to see him yet—but will go over as soon as I have time.

Our lantern is going fine now. We have gasoline now! We should have the lights in here before too long. Our area is shaping up day by day. Guess you noticed too, that I can tell you I'm in Guam. You probably know more about its history, etc., than I do. There are coconuts all over the place—bananas and lemons too. There are lots of shade trees, including palms, which I think are very pretty. There is a rubber tree right at the corner of our barracks.

I'll write Elmer and tell him where I am just in case he heads this way. But for now I must close.

Cotton Congress To Have Limited Show

The nation's "No. 1 War Crop," cotton, will make a further contribution to the united war effort through the 1945 Cotton Research Congress in Dallas July 12-13, which will comply with government requests to reduce use of transportation facilities during the period of heavy movement to the Pacific war zone.

D. T. Killough, College Station, exhibits chairman, is notifying exhibitors of the cancellation of all plans for displays at the Congress which was scheduled to be the largest exhibition of cotton machinery ever assembled. Last year's Congress exhibits attracted wide attention and many new types of equipment and other displays were already promised for the meeting this year.

A full program of authoritative discussions of cotton subjects will be presented at the meeting, published and distributed to educational institutions throughout the country. C. H. McDowell, College Station, has announced. Attendance at the meeting, however, will be limited to local residents and 50 out-of-town delegates.

200,000 CARS STOLEN DURING YEAR 1944

More than 200,000 automobiles were stolen in the United States in 1944, according to a recent report released by the FBI. The report shows that in the average day of 1944 there were 28 killings, 20 cases of rape, 120 persons robbed, 555 stolen automobiles, and 749 homes or business were burglarized.

There are only 1,103 strictly Texas Indians left, according to the 1940 census, and only one distinct settlement, located in eastern Polk County.

Of the foreign born white population of Texas, natives of Mexico lead, numbering 159,266, in 1940. Those from Germany are second, totaling 17,970.

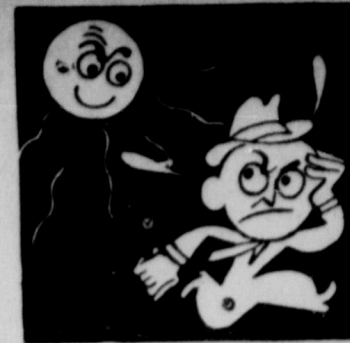

Helpful Hints For Homework Offered By H-D Agent

Upholstered furniture should come in for its share of refreshing when housecleaning time rolls around, and for this job try dry suds, which works like magic, says Lucile King, County Home Demonstration Agent. Satisfactory results are obtained by a simple and effective method.

To make the suds, dissolve 1/2 cup of neutral soap flakes, beads, chips or bar soap shaved in small pieces in one quart of hot, soft water. To test the soap to see if it is neutral, put a bit of it on your tongue, and if neutral it will not bite or sting.

When the soap solution has cooled to a jelly-like consistency, beat it with a rotary egg beater until it looks like cake icing. When suds die down, repeat them.

Remove the dust from the upholstered furniture with vacuum cleaner or whisk broom. Before shampooing the fabric with dry suds, test in an inconspicuous place to see whether it is washable. If so, then apply the dry suds to a small area with brush, sponge or cloth. Use a light circular motion. Scrape off the soiled suds with a spatula. Rinse with a sponge or cloth wrung from clear lukewarm water using a circular motion. Rinse several times. Be sure no soap remains in the material. Use as little water as possible so that the foundation will not become wet. Work quickly and wash a small area at a time and let each new area overlap the last one a little. Place furniture in an airy place to dry, but not in the sun.

If fabric has a nap, brush after it is thoroughly dry so that the threads will be in the right direction. Leather covered furniture can be washed with suds in much the same way.

Winter woollens which have not been stored for the warm weather months should have attention at once. The danger period for moth damage increases with warm weather, and in these days of wartime shortages, proper care of woolen garments is increasingly important, says Miss Lucile King, Home Demonstration Agent.

Storing winter garments properly not only saves them from moth damage, but also helps to prevent mildew, fading and decay. Cleanliness is, of course, the first rule on how to store articles of clothing successfully. All spots and stains should be removed, and all crime and dirt cleaned from the material, with special attention to the dust that might have accumulated in cuffs and pockets. They should be brushed well.

Use flakes, sprays or balls to discourage moths and carpet beetles. If you leave the woolen in a closet make it as airtight as possible so the gas from these preventives cannot escape. Since fumes from the flakes and balls go downward, it is advisable to put some of them on a top shelf, or tie them in a cloth sack and hang from a high hook of the ceiling.

Putting new life into rugs is a process which can now be done successfully at home and though this particular task is not often necessary, there come times when rugs wrinkle easily, become limp and without body, and are hard to keep straight on the floor. The re-dying process requires the right glue, which may be purchased in a hardware or department store.

Plan to do the re-dying in a room where you can leave the rug to dry thoroughly, at least 24 hours. Lay the clean rug—nap side down—on the smooth floor. Tack it at intervals so it will stay straight.

Make a half-gallon of the re-dying mixture by adding 2 quarts of boiling water to a quarter pound of flake glue. Dissolve the glue well, and apply to the back of the rug, either by sprinkling it over the back surface or brushing it on with a brush. A white-wash brush, a paint brush or a whisk broom will serve this purpose. Use the glue sparingly, for if it penetrates through the back of the rug it will stiffen the pile.

With this home process, the rug will take on new life and look like new.

All forms of unmanufactured cotton fiber, cottonseed, lint, linters, seed cotton, cottonseed hulls, cake and meal, along with bagging, containers, and wrappers of cotton and cotton products or any commodities fouled with such products also come under the quarantine regulations.

The area now under regulation comprises 78 Texas Counties in the central and western part of the state, the Lower Rio Grande Valley and Coastal Bend area; southern and south-central New Mexico and Arizona, and two parishes and part of another in Southwest Louisiana.

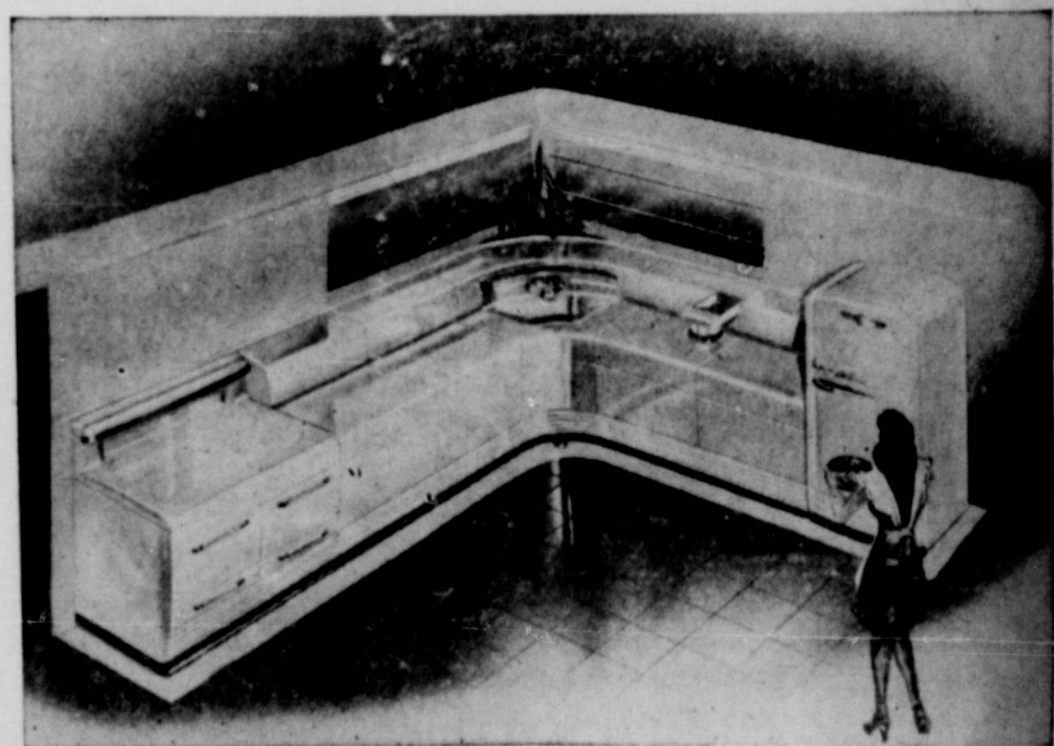
