Physicians said they found nothing indicating foul play.

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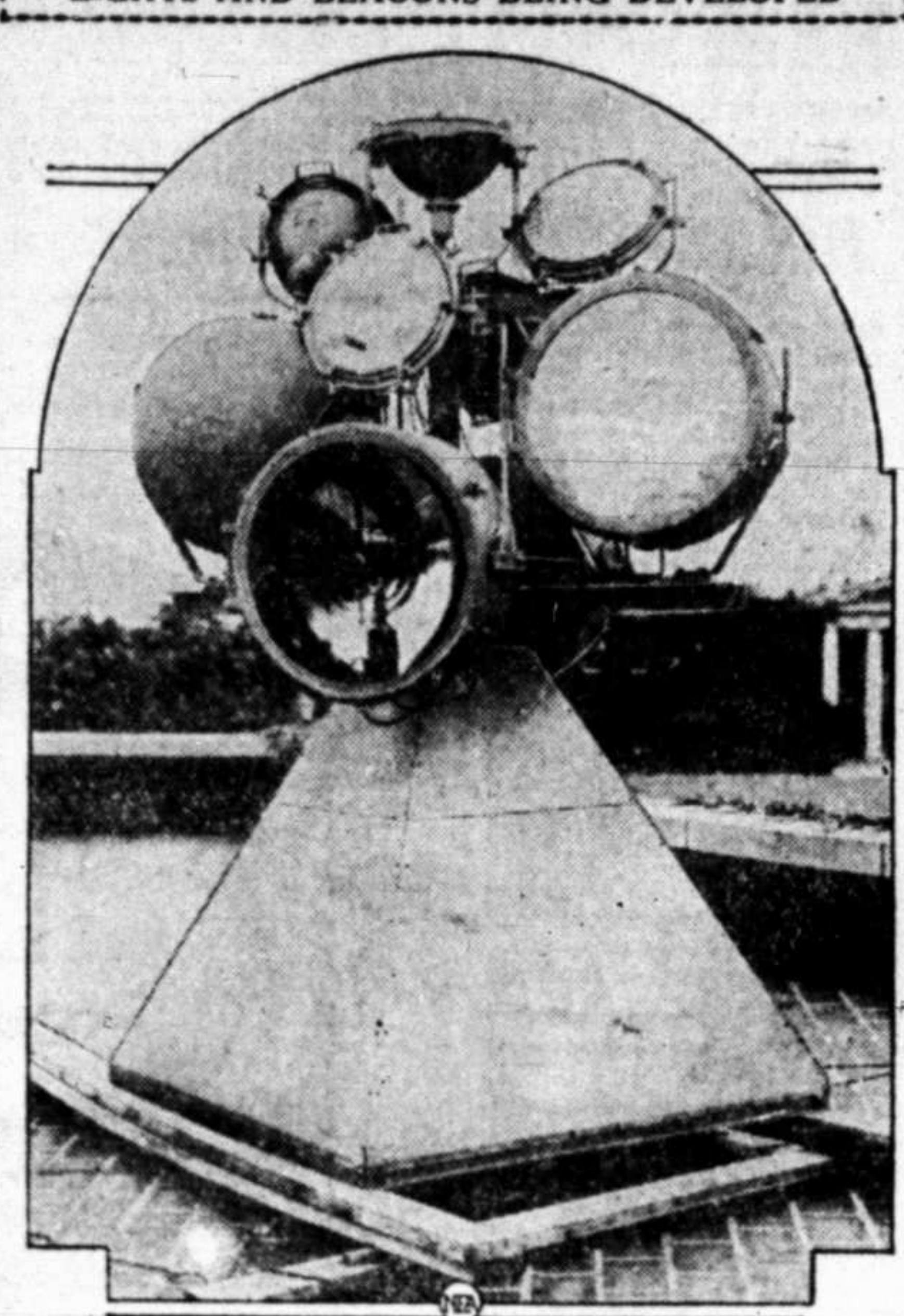
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LIGHTING AIRPORT HIGHLY IMPORTANT

REQUIREMENTS ARE GIVEN—NEW TYPES FLOOD LIGHTS AND BEACONS BEING DEVELOPED

CLEVELAND, O., April 1.—Lighting engineers of the General Electric Company are using the Cleveland municipal airport as an outdoor laboratory for testing their latest developments in the lighting of airports and airways.

As a result of these experiments it can be said that this field is the best equipped in lighting of all airports in the country. Here the problem has advanced so far that what has only recently been talked of as the last word in airport lighting may have been discarded already for something the engineers have found better.

An example is that of flood-lighting of hangars and other buildings on the airport itself. Major John Berry, director of the Cleveland airport, says this field used to be floodlighted with some 8,000 candlepower. Now the buildings are only hazard-lighted, and only 200 candlepower of illumination is being used altogether.

The New Fan Beacon
Engineers of the National Lamp Works of the General Electric Company in Cleveland have devised a new sort of beacon—which provides a powerful fan of light to guide approaching pilots to the field. One-half of this fan is white, the other half red. Rotation of the beacon provides alternate red and white guide lights to the pilot.

This beacon has nine lights in all, five of one intensity and the other four much more powerful. One of the smaller five at the top is red, two of the remaining four being red and the other two white. Two of the larger beam lights are red and the other two white, and are practically floodlight projectors.

Placed on the roof of a central hangar, this new beacon is being tested for visibility as against the confusing city lights nearby and for fog penetrability.

Frederick C. Hingsburg, chief engineer of the aeronautics division of the Department of Commerce, enumerates these lighting requirements for a modern airport:

- 1—A rotating beacon.
- 2—A boundary lighting system.
- 3—Red obstruction lights.
- 4—Green lights to point out safe approaches to the airport.
- 5—A lighted wind-indicator to show the direction and velocity of the wind.
- 6—A ceiling light and height indicator.
- 7—Floodlights illuminating the landing area with proper brilliancy without glare.

The beacon atop the Cleveland airport hangar is being tested as the latest development in this type of lighting. Revolving at the rate of about six times a minute, it furnishes approaching pilots with a system of recognizable white and red flashes which can easily be discerned from a distance and picked out of any complexity of city lights.

The boundary lighting system at the Cleveland port consists of a series circuit of white lights easily visible from all angles and set 200 feet apart.

In this series are green lights marking the cardinal points of the compass. Each light has a brilliancy of 600 lumens, or 60 candlepower, with a current of 66 amperes.

Red obstruction lights of the same intensity are placed on all telegraph posts, buildings and other objects that constitute dangerous obstacles to pilots.

The "Landing Tee"
When the new administration building is completed, there will be a neon "landing tee" like a miniature airplane atop its tower, indicating the direction of the wind, while neon signals will furnish other necessary information to arriving pilots before landing. Until then the wind indicator, or "stocking," is floodlighted.

A ceiling light is one that throws a strong beam at a 45-degree angle toward the clouds so that the height

RAID LEVIATHAN

Big Ship's Mail Bag Again Loses To Thieves

LONDON, April 1.—The steamship Leviathan's mail has suffered from thieves again.

When the mail for the ship from London arrived at Southampton Saturday one of the registered mail bags was found to have been left open and a small package taken.

It was reported, also, that several registered letters were taken. Some said the package taken was consigned from a London diamond merchant to a firm in Bogota, Colombia.

It was assumed the theft took place in London. Bonds, jewelry and money estimated in some advices at \$100,000 to \$200,000, but said by the government to be not more than \$12,000, were stolen from the mail of the Leviathan while it was at sea between New York and Southampton and Cherbourg last June.

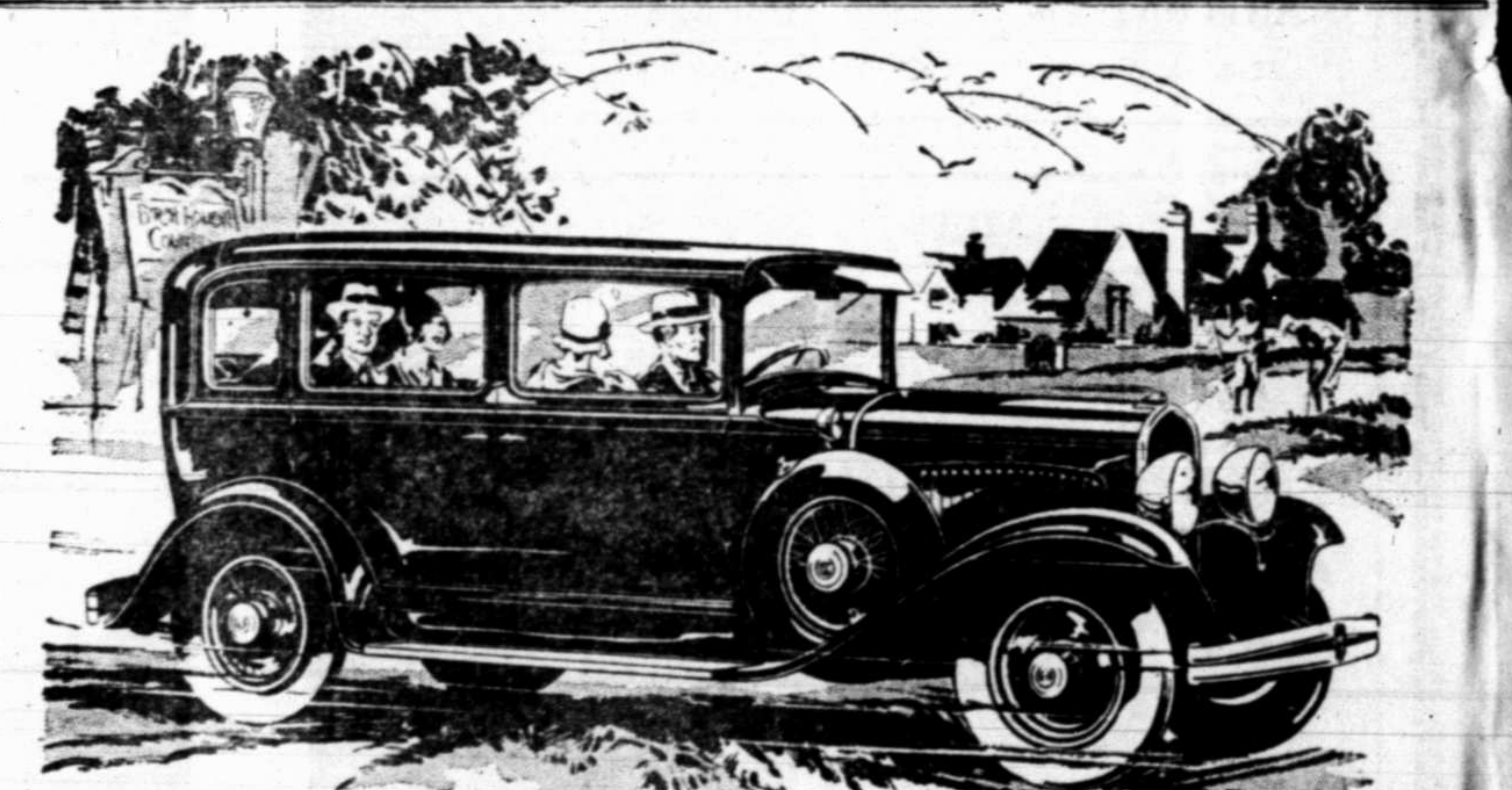

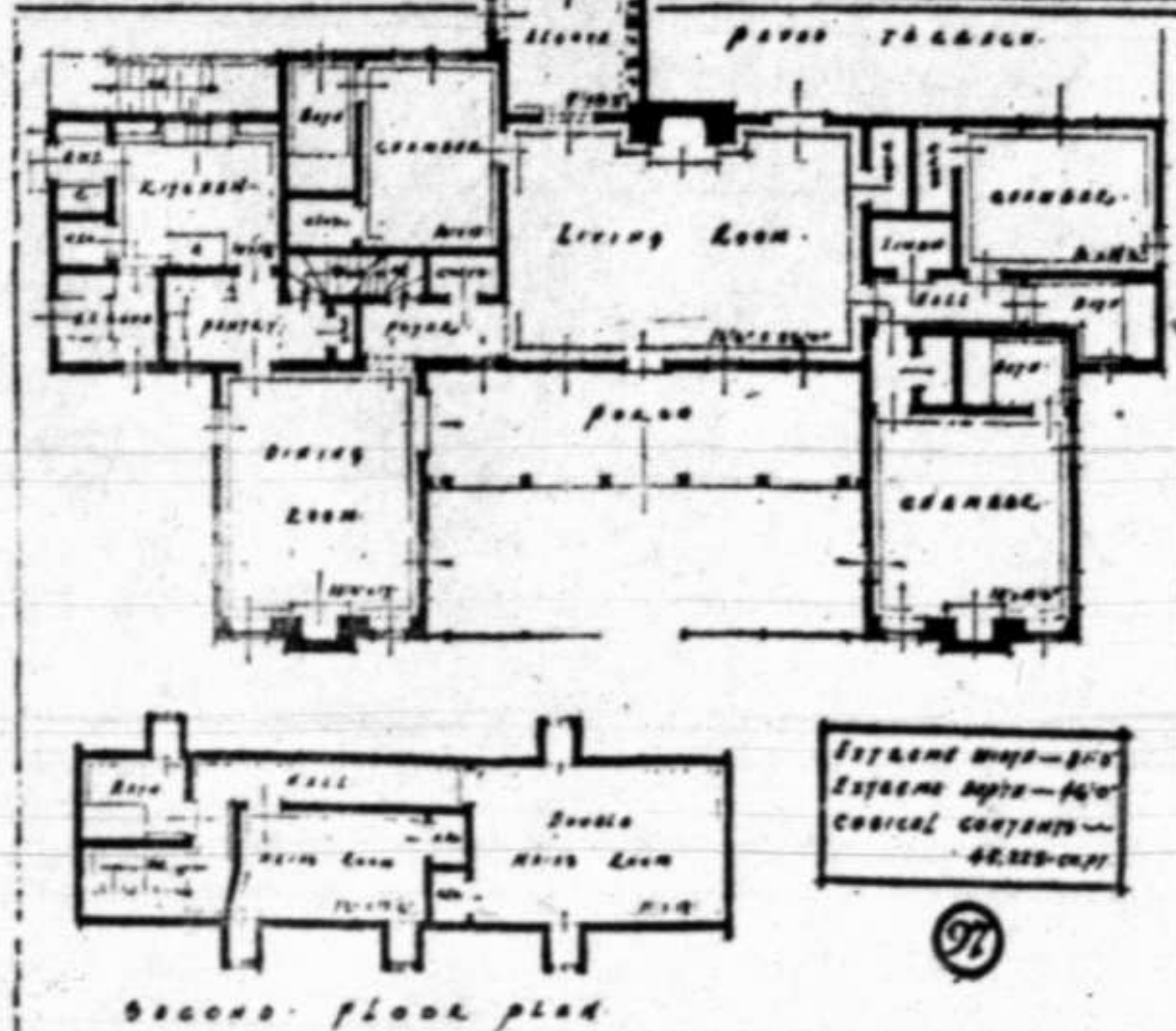

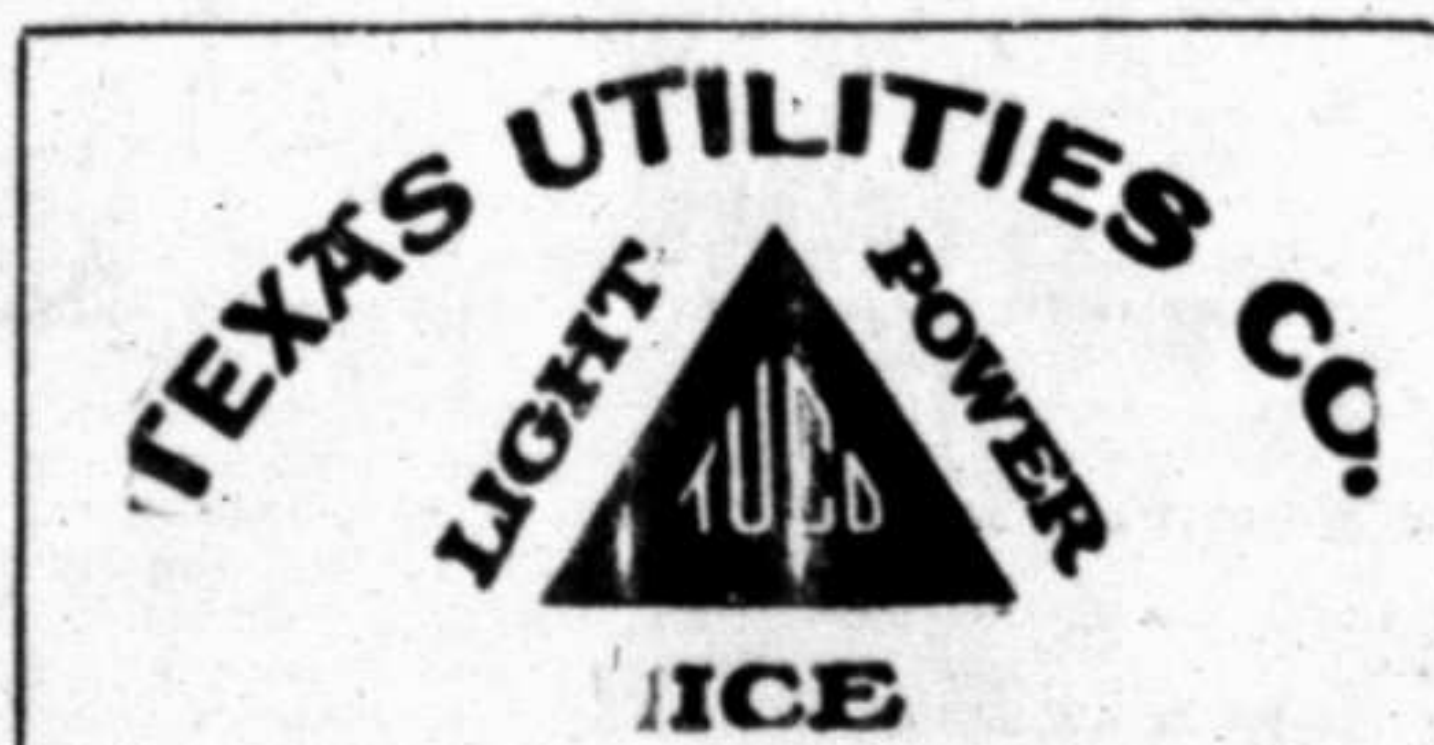
