George Storrs Norris was born
at Wine, Iowa, on March 27,

June 23, 1903. To this union

Old Newspaper Found

Mr. and Mrs. J. M. Bull Have Issue
of New York Herald Dated
April 15, 1865

Mr. and Mrs. J. M. Bull have in
their possession an issue of the New
York Herald of April 15, 1865 telling
of the assassination of President
Abraham Lincoln. The paper was
brought to light recently when
Compton Bull, son of the owners,
read where an Eastern collector had
placed a value of \$1,000 on an issue
of the New York Herald of the same
date. Upon asking his mother re-
garding a collection of old papers
she had, a search of an old trunk
revealed she had a copy of the same
issue. The paper has been in the
Bull family since 1905, being given
to them by an old Confederate sol-
dier, who it is said brought the pa-
per with him to Texas from Virgin-
ia, carrying it in his saddle bags
all the way.

International Sunday School Lesson

THE SON OF GOD BECOMES MAN

John 1:1-51

I.—The Uniqueness of John's Gospel

John, the son of Zebedee and Salome (19:25) was a native of Bethsaida, Galilee. As "the beloved disciple," it was his lot to give us "the heart of Christ." Clement tells us that John "wrote a spiritual gospel." According to Gregory Nazianzen, "Matthew wrote the wonderful works of Christ for the Jew; Mark for the Roman; Luke for the Greeks; John, a herald, who reaches the very heavens for all." Irenaeus says that "for sixty years after the ascension (John) preached orally till the end of Domitian's reign; and after the death of Domitian having returned to Ephesus, he was induced to write (his gospel) concerning the divinity of Christ . . . in which he refutes those heretics, Cerinthus and the

Nicolaitans." The great purpose of the book was to present unimpeachable testimony to the divinity of Jesus, "that ye might that Jesus is the Christ, the Son of God; and that believing ye might have life through his name." (20:31). Matthew takes us back to Abraham, Luke takes us back to Adam. But John, spanning the centuries, with one mighty sweep of trenchant pen, takes us to the "beginning . . . before the world was," back, back, to Eternity's morn bathed in the virgin dews of that mighty Past.

II.—The Pre-Existence of Christ
Christ's life on earth was preceded by an existence from the beginning with God. The great work of creation was molded by his power. In every planet of the spangled heavens his handiwork is seen. Since he had such a vital part in the creation of the worlds and in the making of man, he knew the great need of redemptive work essential to the

saving of a lost people.

III.—The Mission of a Messenger
John, the Voice in the wilderness, came to herald the approach of the Redeemer. It was his work to prepare the way for Jesus, to tear down the exalted places and build up the low, to get things in readiness for the highway of holiness over which men and women might tread to reach heaven. But John was not the Christ. He founded no church, he performed no miracle. His work was introductory. He was a means, not an end. Sent to bear witness of that Light, he was content to prepare a people for Christ and "decrease" when his mission was accomplished. Great prophet that he was, his greatness consisted in his simplicity and humility coupled with a determination and a courage to tear the mask from Pretension and hypocrisy and throw their tattered shreds at the feet of their trembling victims. John called upon his people to return to the commandments of God.

IV.—The Word Made Flesh

In the fulness of time Christ took upon himself a physical body. His glory was as that of the Only Begotten of the Father, full of grace and truth. It was he who would fulfill the law of Moses and give us the gospel. To his cross would be nailed the old covenant (Col. 2:14). He was truly "the Lamb of God who taketh away the sin of the world." The sign by which John recognized Jesus was the descent of the Spirit upon after John had baptized him in the Jordan. So John saw and bore witness that this was the Son of God.

One day as John stood with his disciples, Jesus passed that way. The Forerunner pointed him out to these men as the "Lamb of God." The two men who stood with John were Andrew and the writer of this gospel. These two disciples of John followed Jesus and abode with him that day. To the eternal credit of Andrew it is said that he first found his brother Simon and brought him unto Jesus. On the morrow Phillip became a disciple of Jesus and in

turn induced Nathaniel to follow the Lord. When Jesus told Nathaniel he had seen him under a dense tree, Nathaniel was amazed at his great knowledge, and said "Thou art the Son of God; thou art King of Israel." But greater things than these awaited the disciples. They would "see heaven opened and behold angels of God ascending and descending upon the Son of Man."

"Banjo On My Knee"

Barbara Stanwyck and Joel McCrea
Have the Leading Roles in Picture Showing Today

Analytical observers, visualizing the trend toward residential auto trailers rolling gaily over the broad highways of America, quite logically predict that this country may soon become a land of footloose homes, but Darryl F. Zanuck, production head for Twentieth Century-Fox, insists, and proves that mobile houses provided homes for Americans long before the automobile became an established institution.

"I refer to the shanty-boats of the lower Mississippi," Mr. Zanuck declares. "These are not vacation retreats nor are the quaint and colorful fisher-folk who inhabit them nomads. The people are born, live and love work and play, and end their days on their ramshackle shanty-boats."

In preparing the Twentieth Century-Fox picture, "Banjo on My Knee," for production, Mr. Zanuck collected many photographs and much descriptive material on Mississippi shanty-boat life. Generally, "Banjo on My Knee" may be said to possess the locale of "Tobacco Road" and the atmosphere of "Steamboat Round the Bend."

In casting the picture Mr. Zanuck was literally inspired in his decision to star Barbara Stanwyck and Joel McCrea in the leading roles, as well as in his selection of supporting players.

In the interests of realism Mr. Zanuck, quite wisely, determined to reproduce as nearly as possible the individual music, peculiarities of speech, and the unconscious and, sometimes, near-rowdy humor of the true shanty-boaters; their distrust and open dislike of "land-folks" whom they regarded as outsiders; their rigid adherence to their own standards of conduct and their hallowed traditions.

Especially effective are the melodies written for the picture by Jimmy McHugh and Harold Adamson, several of which are played by Walter Brennan on his one-man band "contraption." Certainly in both theme and treatment "Banjo on My Knee," which opens today at the Ellis Theatre, should be classed as a distinctly different picture.
