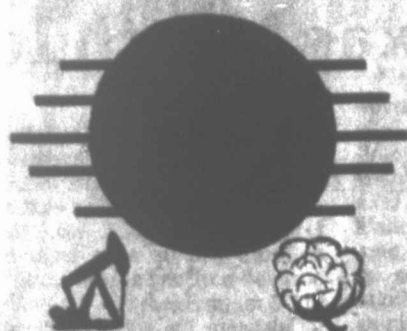

Sales tax rebates total \$41,419

Checks totaling \$41,419.84 have been sent to Colorado City, Westbrook and Loraine in local tax payments.

State Comptroller Bob Bullock Wednesday sent the checks as part of \$131.1 million in local tax payments to the 1,918 cities that levy the one-percent local sales tax.

Colorado City's check for the

period was \$38,436.28, up from \$31,063 for the same period last year. The 1986 payments to date total \$54,289.57, up 17.73 percent from the 1985 payments to date of \$46,133.78.

Loraine's check was for \$1,008.54, down slightly from the \$1,128.33 received for the same period last year. Loraine's 1985

payments to date total \$1,568.63, up 39 percent from the \$1,128.33 for the 1985 payments to date.

Westbrook's check totaled \$1,974.92, up from the \$1,380.78 received for the same period last year. The 1986 payments to date total \$3,447.37, up 42.88 percent from the 1985 payments to date of \$2,417.48.

February checks represent taxes collected on sales made in December and reported to Bullock by January 20, as well as quarterly returns for the last three months of 1985 and sales made by annual filers.

Reward offered in abduction try

Crime Stoppers of Mitchell County is offering up to a \$1,000 reward for information leading to the arrest and conviction of the person who tried to abduct a Colorado City school girl on February 7.

The attempted abduction occurred as the Hutchinson Elementary student was walking to school. The girl was able to break away and run for help.

The suspect is described as 5'5" to 5'8" tall with dark hair and a black mustache and believed to be in his 20s. At the time, he was wearing a white T-shirt with writing on it and blue jeans

with either bleached spots or paint on them.

The girl told police the man was driving a gray or charcoal-colored small car, believed to be a 1986 model because of the third brake light in the rear.

Grammy winners to perform here

The Blackwood Brothers, one of America's top Christian music groups, will present a concert Friday, February 21 at 7:30 p.m. in the high school auditorium.

Winners of nine Grammy Awards, the Blackwood Brothers got started following the depression in rural Coctaw County, Miss. They were poor sharecroppers, but were brought up in an atmosphere of positive Christian faith, which led them to the formation of the Blackwood Brothers Quartet in 1934. Only three of the original members were brothers - Roy, Doyle and James. The fourth member, R. W., was Roy's son.

They first came into national prominence in 1964, when they won the "Arthur Godfrey Talent Scout Show" on the CBS TV and radio network. Shortly thereafter, R. W. Blackwood and Bill Lylee were killed in a plane crash. Upon regrouping after the disaster, they returned to the

"Arthur Godfrey Show" in 1968 and again became a winner.

In addition to the Grammy Awards, they have won many Dove Awards for "Best Male Group," and Gospel Music Association Awards for "Favorite Group."

They have been featured on "The Dave Garraway Show," "The Tennessee Ernie Ford Show," "The Tomorrow Show, with Tom Snyder," "Hec Haw," "The 700 Club," "700 Huntley Street," and most recently "The Barbara Mandrell and the Mandrell Sisters" TV show. They have made numerous appearances with Billy Graham and most recently worked with the Billy Graham Evangelistic team in its Alberta, Canada crusade. Today the Blackwood Brothers take their ministry worldwide, having toured throughout 48 foreign countries.

Candidates seek local positions

Four people have filed for election to four spots on the board of trustees of the Colorado Independent School District while only two persons have filed for election to the three openings on the Colorado City Council.

As of Friday, incumbents Floyd Lee Ritchey, Dwayne Harris and Ronnie Aston along with Brenda Aguilon are seeking three three-year terms on the CISD board. A one-year term, currently held by Ritchey, has not had any takers. Ritchey was appointed to the position to fill the vacancy created by the

resignation of S. L. (Mac) Morris.

Candidates have until midnight, March 5 to file for the April 5 election.

Board president Eddie Piland announced that he will not seek re-election.

Colorado City Council incumbents Tom Lovell and Robert Hoback have filed for re-election to two-year terms on the council, but mayor pro-tem Jesse Munoz has indicated he will not seek re-election to the post. February 19 is the filing deadline for that election.

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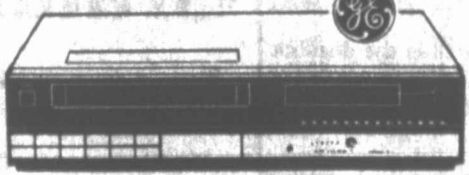

Music and dominoes were enjoyed by those present. Refreshments of cookies, punch and coffee were served to members and visitors from Big Spring and Sweetwater.

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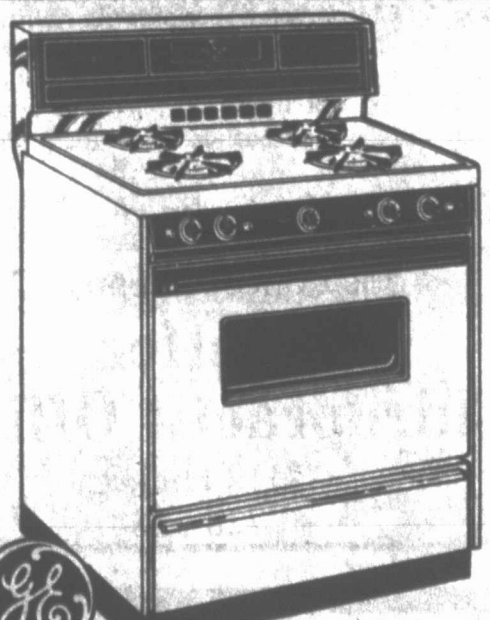
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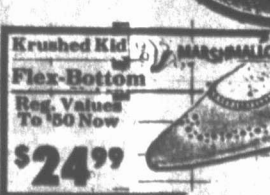

Franco shares Mexican recipes

Helen Franco was ten years old when she and her sister began cleaning house and cooking meals for her great-grandmother. "The only experience I received was when I was over at my great-grandmother's house. My mother cooked all of our meals and would not let anyone in her kitchen. All of us did the house cleaning and kept it in order while she did the cooking. I learned to prepare rice really well because my great-grandmother liked it."

Being a mother of three children and working full time, it doesn't leave me much time for cooking. I like to cook and my children are easy to cook for. They like almost everything I prepare except roast. My children, Gracie, an eighth grader at Middle School, James, a fifth grader at Hutchinson and Joshua, a third grader at Kelley, all enjoy eating venison and I prepare it quite often. They like it prepared with gravy and just lately I have learned to prepare good gravy. Every time I used to prepare gravy, I would call my mother and ask her exactly

what to put in it. It always turned out lumpy and the children would absolutely not touch it. Now their favorite meal is the venison with my gravy."

I'm going to share some of my favorite recipes with RECORD readers today."

CHORIZO BURRITOS
One link of chorizo is approximately 4 eggs
Eggs to scramble
Flour tortillas
Cook chorizo in skillet until done. Then scramble eggs and add to meat. Fill flour tortilla with meat and egg mixture and this makes a great breakfast burrito.

FLOUR TORTILLAS
6 cups flour
1/2 cup shortening
2 teaspoons salt
1 1/2 teaspoons baking powder
Combine all the ingredients together and add enough warm water to make a soft dough mixing well. Mix until dough forms a ball. Knead about five minutes on lightly floured surface. Cover and let stand 29 minutes. Shape to form balls and roll out each ball on lightly

floured surface to form 6-7 inch circles. Cook on very hot ungreased skillet 30 seconds. Turn and continue cooking one minute. Turn and continue to cook 15-30 seconds. Once cooked, tortillas should be soft and pliable.

MEXICAN SPAGHETTI
1 pound ground beef or venison
1/2 bell pepper, chopped
1 onion, chopped
1 can tomato sauce

Salt and pepper to taste
3 teaspoons chili powder
1 package long spaghetti
1 cup garlic cheese
Grated cheese
Brown meat, pepper and onion, then add tomato sauce and 1 cup of water and all seasonings and cook for 10 minutes. Cook spaghetti in salted water and drain. Place in casserole dish and bake at 350 degrees or until cheese melts.

Coping with depression

Depression can strike anyone, but never comes without reason. It can start with sadness or ordinary "blue" feelings, feed on itself and deepen rapidly. At the onset of depression, a person may feel lonely, isolated and not in control of his or her own life. The death or loss of a person, goal failure, or low self-concept seem to be prime triggers for depression. The depression of one family member will affect others in the household. That's one reason

why the family's help is a necessary part of the recovery process.

If you or one of your family members experiences depression, consider the following strategies for coping:

- Have a physical examination. Some depressions have biochemical causes.
- Keep physically fit by eating properly and exercising regularly.
- Face problems at home and at work realistically. Worry only about the things over which you have control.
- Get adequate sleep and allow for regular rest periods and vacations.
- Get your life in order. Routines and organization are often lost during depressed periods.
- Work on your appearance. During depressed periods, you may have "let yourself go."
- Have fun and laugh.

By taking some of these actions, the depressed family member can begin to move off high center and feel more in control.

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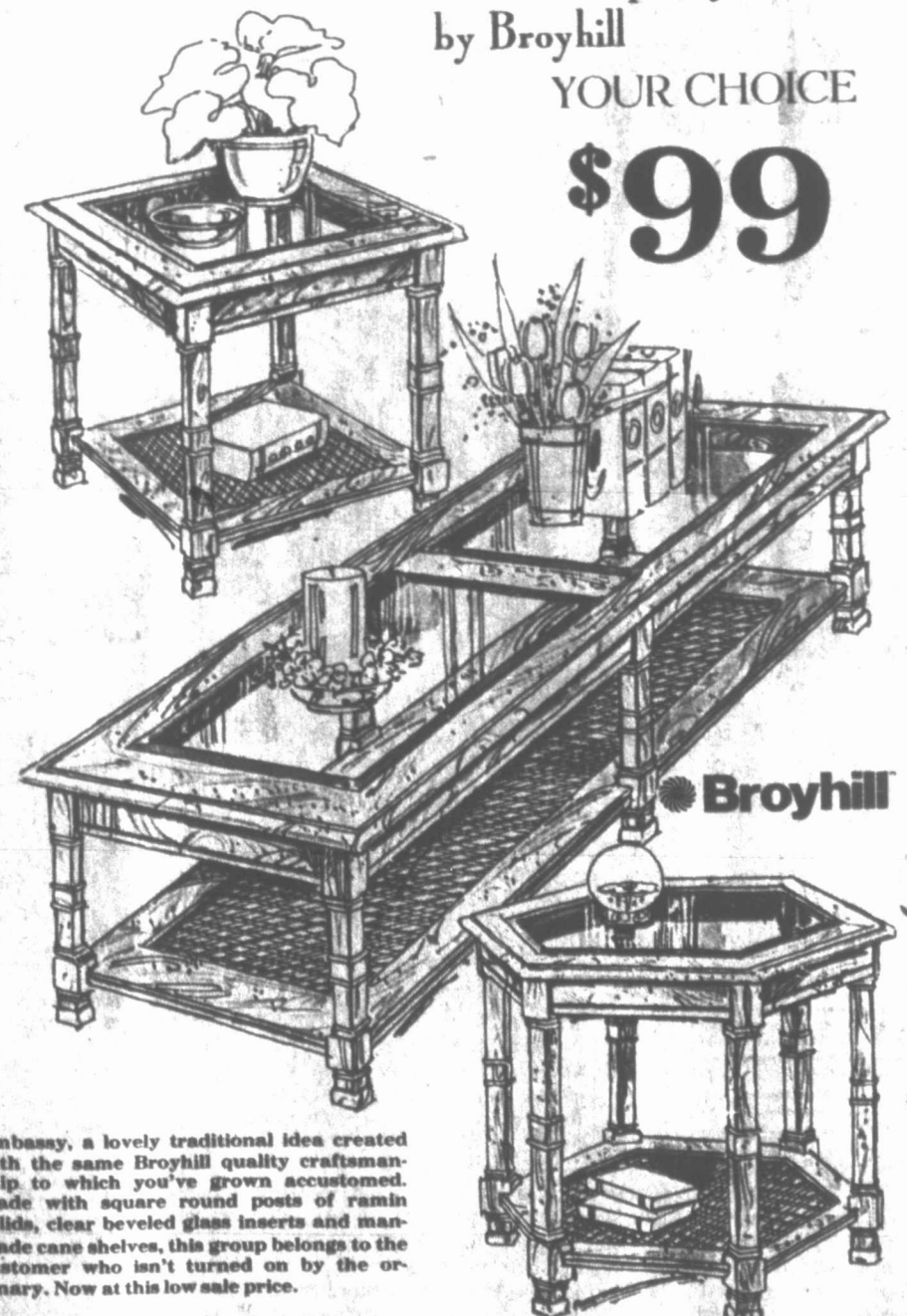

Loraine girls win runner-up spot in District 12A

A new force has emerged to represent district 12-A in the state basketball playoffs.

For quite a while Roscoe and fellow Nolan County school Highland, have dominated the league in both boys and girls hoop. Roscoe won first place this year and Highland came in second. However, the Hornets found themselves having to share the runner-up spot with the Loraine girls—also 7-3.

Tuesday night at Bronte, the two schools played to determine who would represent 12-A as the runner-up in bi-district action against the Motley County Matadors. The Loraine Bulldogs won

the game 43-34 and were to have been in bi-district action Friday night at Aspermont.

Loraine coach Sandy McSpadden credited the win to defense. "Our defense rose to the occasion in the third quarter."

Loraine held the Hornets to two points in the period while scoring 12 points to increase a 19-13 halftime lead to 31-15. The Hornets employed a strategy to outscore the Bulldogs 19-12 in the final period, but the comeback came late and too short.

"I thought coach Kincaid had an excellent strategy," said McSpadden. "They were driving and trying to force fouls and then fouling us." The Bulldogs responded by making six of nine free throws in the period to quell

the Hornets comeback bid, which did bring them within four points at one time.

"We went into the game very nervous," said McSpadden. Rightfully so since the Hornets had made the playoffs the past three years and twice advanced to the regional finals—including last year against a top Nazareth team.

"We went inside as much as we could but we were nervous and it showed at first. We must've missed 35 points on first-half layups. The girls have become more aggressive. Highland pulled within four at one time, but the girls pulled away again. Two months ago they would've folded. Today they were more aggressive and de-

termined. If we're not overly matched we'll play a heck-of-a ballgame."

"Defense is the name of the game. We try to play it well and let the points take care of themselves. We never worried about scoring—just keeping them from scoring."

McSpadden's "outstanding group of young ladies" is allowing a meager 28.1 points a game. The victory marked McSpadden's fifth trip to the playoffs in 11 years of coaching girls hoop and raised an already impressive record to 204-89. His secret? "I believe motivation generates motivation. Show you're with them and they'll respond."

"We had a pretty good turnout—particularly from the young

people. They need to see their school mates in the playoffs. It's enthusiastic for them. It's contagious and that's what we want." Loraine finished third in the district last year.

"The five starters went the whole distance," said the coach. "Terry Munoz played some and Cheryl Alvarez went in for good when Beverly Griffin fouled out."

Bearcats overtake Wolves Tuesday

The Ballinger Bearcats, who finished second to Crane in the first half of the district 7-AAA boys basketball race, shook off a determined Colorado City team in the fourth quarter for a 66-50 victory here at "The Pit" Tuesday night.

Ballinger's win evened the Bearcats' second half record at 2-2—same as the Wolves, who had a 1-4 first half record. Ballinger took sole possession of second in the first half race with a 4-1 record behind 5-0 Crane. Friday night the Bearcats were to have played the Ozona Lions, also vying for a playoff spot. A Ballinger victory would have assured the Bearcats of a playoff spot while a victory by the Lions would give Ozona second place in the second half and force a third game between the two teams to determine 7-AAA's runner-up.

The Colorado City Wolves were to have ended the season Friday at Crane.

Tuesday's game at the "Pit" saw the Wolves and Bearcats battle back and forth until Ballinger pulled away late in the fourth quarter.

Colorado City led as late as 40-30 with three minutes left in

the third period, but the visitors scored the last four points of the period to lead 43-40 going into the final quarter and the Wolves never got closer. Colorado City trailed by only 54-48 with two minutes left in the game, then made one of only five more goal attempts.

Sophomore Ken Woods led the Wolves in the early going by scoring six of Colorado City's 12 first period points. His last goal of the period made the score 10-10. Two consecutive lob passes to Tommy Saucedo gave the Bearcats a 14-10 lead. The visitors then got a couple of steals, penetrated into the lane and all of a sudden led 19-12 after one period. The Wolves committed nine turnovers in the period and made only six of 16 goal attempts.

Colorado City had its third quarter in the following period with 18 points while limiting Ballinger to 11 for a 30-30 halftime score. The Wolves caught the Bearcats a 26-30 on a free throw by junior Terry Jackson, who with Ruben Rivera had a team high 11 points. Albert Rivera scored six points in the period.

THE COLEMAN Ranch carried out 1,476 acres of Brush Management. This consisted of 526 acres of mechanical control and 950 acres of chemical control. Brush Management along with Deferred Grazing has allowed the rangeland on the ranch to make excellent recovery following the previous two years of drought.

Coleman Ranch receives award

The Coleman Ranch owned by Alice Goodridge and Preston Burchard of Sacramento, California, with David Scott, foreman, was selected by the Mitchell Soil and Water Conservation District as the District's Absentee Conservation Rancher for 1985. The Coleman Ranch was selected because of its dedication and belief in soil and water conservation.

The 8,593-acre Coleman Ranch is located in the northwest corner of the Mitchell Soil and Water Conservation District. The ranch consists of 8,350 acres of rangeland and 243 acres of cropland. The Coleman Ranch has a base cow herd of 125 mother cows with stocker cattle bought as additional forage becomes available. The Coleman Ranch has been a District cooperator since August of 1968.

In 1983, the Coleman Ranch came to the Mitchell SWCD for assistance in making improvements on the ranch to increase rangeland productivity and reduce erosion. From this meeting, the Coleman Ranch entered into a Great Plains Conservation Contract with the District and the Soil Conservation Service to make necessary improvements.

The main problem for the ranch was the declining productivity of their rangeland. Encroachment of brush had severely reduced their carrying capacity while creating critical eroding areas. To solve this conservation problem, the ranch performed 1,476 acres of brush management. Brush control included 526 acres of tree dosing mesquite and juniper, 816 acres of applying tebutharion on shin oak, and 134 acres of aerial spraying mesquite and prickly pear. The ranch followed the brush control with Deferred Grazing to allow the better grasses and forbs to produce seed and regain their vigor. Grasses and forbs on the treated areas have made excellent recovery.

Spot grazing was another conservation problem for the ranch. To solve the problem, several of the larger pastures were cross fenced and livestock water developed to initiate a Planned Graz-

ing System. The initiation of a Deferred Rotational Grazing System has allowed the grasses to reestablish and virtually eliminate erosion. Last year the ranch built 17,883 feet of cross fences, constructed 15 ponds, laid 2.5 miles of livestock pipeline and carried out 8,350 acres of proper grazing use with a planned grazing system.

The cropland also presented problems with severe wind and water erosion. To eliminate this problem, the ranch terraced two of the cropland fields and sowed one field to native grass. Twenty thousand six hundred and forty nine (20,649) feet of standard terraces and twenty four thousand five hundred seventy five (24,575) feet of parallel terraces were installed on two fields to stop water erosion. The ranch also changed from cotton to forage sorghum and wheat. This has virtually eliminated wind erosion while furnishing additional forage to graze, allowing the rangeland to rest. Last year the Coleman Ranch rested 8,350 acres of rangeland and performed 243 acres of a Conservation Cropping System and Crop Residue Use.

The third field was very sandy and was sown to a mixture of Sideoats Grama, Kleingrass, Plains Bristlegrass, and Green sprangletop. This mixture was used to provide additional grazing and provide food and cover for wildlife. Seventy-seven acres of marginal cropland was seeded back to grass.

The Coleman Ranch is also interested in wildlife. With the initiation of a Planned Grazing System, the ranch has allowed their range grasses and forbs to produce food and cover for wildlife. During brush control, oak motts and brush along the creeks and rivers were left for wildlife. They also manage their cropland fields to allow sorghum and wheat to produce seed for food and cover. Last year the ranch carried out 8,593 acres of Wildlife Upland Habitat Management.

DEVELOPING Livestock Water is very important to a Planned Grazing System. Last year the Coleman Ranch built 15 ponds and installed 2.5 miles of livestock pipeline.
