... Commencement Speaker

Dr. S. M. Kennedy, Jr., is assistant dean of arts and sciences at Texas Tech.

Kennedy received his Bachelor of Arts Degree from Tech in 1943, after Army duty, he returned to Tech, receiving a Master of Arts Degree in 1946. He joined the Tech government Department faculty.

In 1952, he received a Doctor of Philosophy Degree from the University of Colorado.

Kennedy was acting assistant dean of Arts and Sciences from September, 1952, until June, 1953. He has been the regular assistant dean since 1955. He became an associate professor of government in 1953 and a full professor in 1957.

Kennedy is a member of the American Political Science Assn., Pi Gamma Mu, national honorary social science fraternity; Pi Sigma Alpha, honorary government fraternity; After Dinner Forum, a faculty discussion group; Army Officers' Reserve Assn.; Southwestern Social Science Assn., and Sigma Delta Pi, honorary Spanish fraternity.

He is a deacon of the Broadway Church of Christ, Lubbock. Kennedy married the former Mary Frances Peak in 1946. They have a daughter, Marta Gail, born Sept. 23, 1950.

During his active duty in the Army, Kennedy studied part-time at the University of Nancy, France.

South Korean Engineers Visit Tuco

Last week Tuco was among a few power plants of the Southwest to receive visitors from South Korea. There were 18 engineers from the Korean Electrical Co. visiting power installations in the United States. Mr. Hi Bin Kang (Jack Kang) and Mr. Choong Ho Doh (Kenny Doh) were assigned to the central southwest area of the United States. While in the United States the men chose American given names for identification, thus the reason for Jack and Kenny in parenthesis.

The Korean Electric Power Co. serves all of South Korea. Jack and Kenny are from Seoul, Korea. The object of their trip is to observe the installation of equipment, type of equipment, and operating procedures both in plants and in different systems. After having seen several systems, we asked the gentlemen from Korea what their opinion was of the American installations. They considered most of the American installation as luxury plants. They commented on the clean appearance and well kept grounds around installations in the U. S. They were impressed with the industrial and commercial load which was carried in this country. Their load consists mostly of lighting with some commercial load. Their equipment is practically all manufactured in Japan. They are located in a rich anthracite coal belt so their fuel supply is coal. Their principle agricultural product is rice of which little if any electrical power is used in its production. Some electrical power is used in processing and getting it ready for market.

The visitors were escorted around the Public Service properties by Mr. R. T. Price, former manager at Tuco and now system dispatcher from Amarillo. Mr. Kang and Mr. Doh were to visit the Beaumont and Ft. Worth systems then meet the rest of their group in Denver, where they would board the plane for Korea.

The Church?

Here are several statements that are getting to be pretty common today: "You don't have to be a member of the church to be saved." "The church doesn't save you anyhow." "One church is just as good as another." "They are all heading to the same place."

People who make these statements usually mean well. They want to be bighearted and save everybody they can, so they open the door as wide as they can. However, they are unaware of the fact that they contradict the teaching of the Bible on the subject. Let's try to clear up some misunderstanding about the church.

Body of Christ

The church of Christ and body of Christ are one and the same. The Bible is so clear on this that we cannot miss it. "And hath put all things under his feet, and gave him to be head over all things to the CHURCH, which is HIS BODY, the fulness of him that filleth all in all" (Eph. 1:22-23). That is very plain isn't it? The church is the body of Christ. Paul said again in Col. 1:18: "And he is the head of the BODY, the CHURCH." The church and the body are exactly the same. One is as important as the other, because they are one. There are as many of one as the other, because they are the same.

Do you have to be a member of the body of Christ to be saved? Can you be saved outside of Christ? No. Then you must be a member of the church to be saved, for they are the same.

How many bodies are there? "There is one body" (Eph. 4:4) "one body in Christ" (Rom. 12:5) "yet but one body" (1 Cor. 12:20). By simply remembering that the body is the church, you will notice "there is one church," "one church in Christ," and "yet but one church." The church and the body of Christ are the same.

Bride of Christ

According to Bible teachings, the church that Christ built is also His bride. (see Rom. 7:4; 2 Cor. 11:2; Revelation 21:2, 9). The Lord employs terms of this earthly relationship to help us see the importance of His church. Notice what the church, His Bride, means to Him: "Husbands, love your wives, even as Christ also LOVED THE CHURCH, and GAVE HIMSELF FOR IT" (Eph.

5:25). Could anyone love his bride more than this? There is no greater love (John 15:13).

Friend, what do YOU think about the church? Jesus loved the church and gave Himself for it! We ought to be ashamed to say the church is unimportant, non-sentential, and not necessary to salvation.

Kingdom of Christ

Did you know that the church of Christ and the kingdom of Christ are the same? It is a spiritual institution (John 18:36). It does not spread its power by weapons of carnal warfare, but by the sword of the Spirit, which is the Word of God (Eph. 6:17).

In Matt. 16:18-19, Jesus used the same terms "church" and "kingdom," interchangeably in referring to this institution. "Upon this rock I will build my CHURCH; and the gates of hell shall not prevail against it. And I will give unto thee the keys of the KINGDOM of heaven." Christ is the head of the church, and the king of the kingdom. It is the same position because it is the same institution. He is Lord and Christ (Acts 2:36). All who are members of His church are also citizens in His kingdom. "I, John, who also am your brother, and companion in tribulation, and in the kingdom and patience of Jesus Christ" (Rev. 1:9). "Who hath delivered us from the power of darkness, and hath translated us into the kingdom of his dear Son" (Col. 1:13). This kingdom or church is that "which cannot be moved" (Heb. 12:28).

Conclusion

Do you have to be a member of the church to be saved? Since the church of Christ is the body of Christ, the bride of Christ, the kingdom of Christ, what other answer could you give except "yes"? Does the church save you? No. Christ saves you IN THE CHURCH. (Acts 2:47; Col. 1:13-14). Is one church as good as another? No. A church built by man is not as good as the church built by Christ. A church with a human creed is not as good as the church which has the Word of God as its creed. A church that has its own acts of worship is not as good as the church that worships according to God's pattern of worship. Are they all heading for the same place? Read Matt. 15:13.

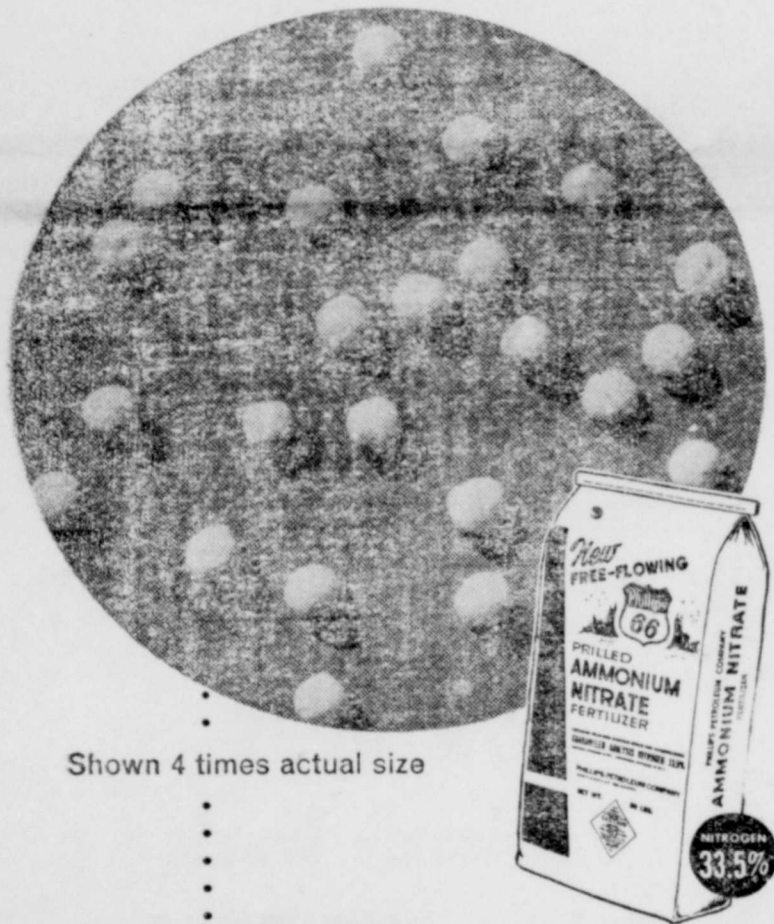

Advise Farmers To Watch Prices Of Loan Soybeans

Growers who have soybeans under 1957 price-support loans should watch market prices closely during the next few weeks.

J. Earl Laney, chairman, Hale County Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation committee, reminds farmers that frequently they can get a better price for their soybeans by paying off the Commodity Credit Corporation loan and selling the crop on a market. Since soybean loans mature on May 31, however, any re-

demption of beans must be completed before that date.
As of May 5, 1958, Hale County farmers had 985 bushels of 1957 crop soybeans under price-support loans.

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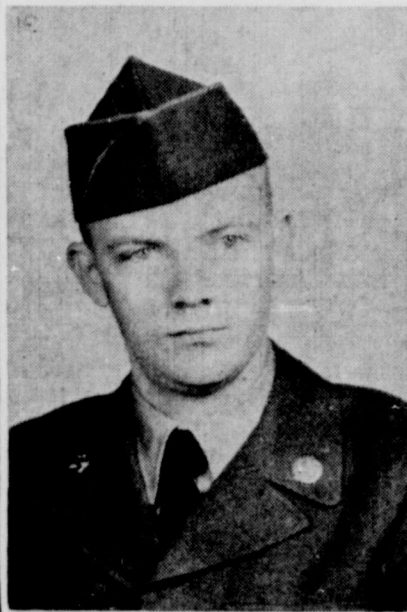

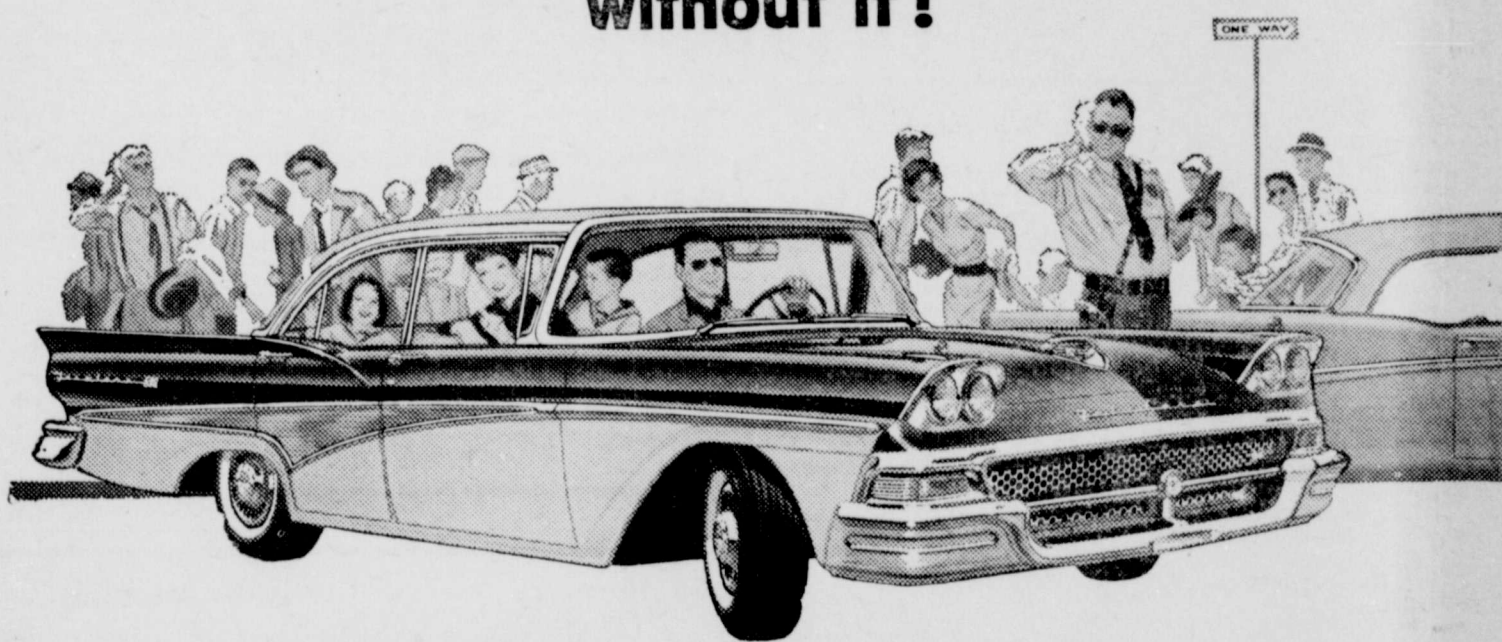

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Farmers Report On Conservation

The Hale County Agriculture Stabilization and Conservation office has received reports of completion of conservation work from 50 farmers.

All the practices in the 1957 ACP had to be completed by the last day of the year, but farmers had until January 15th to report. J. Earl Laney, Agriculture Stabilization and Conservation committee chairman, said that these figures indicate that about 500 farmers in Hale County used ACP conservation cost-sharing to help them make needed advances in their own conservation programs during 1957. That compares with 520 farmers under the 1957 program.

Here's some of the conservation accomplishment put in with the help of ACP cost-sharing last year: Installing underground irrigation pipe, \$135,919.00; control of bindweeds, \$17,943.00; leveling irrigable land, \$6,206.00; growing winter and summer legumes, \$1,200.00; the total amount of cost-shares earned under the 1957 ACP was \$185,995.00. This compares with \$161,215.00 which was allocated to Hale County under the 1956 ACP Program.

The average amount of the cost-shares received by farmers under the 1957 program was about \$320.00.

Requests for cost-sharing under the 1958 ACP will be taken for the 3rd quarter between June 2 and June 20, 1958. If you need cost-sharing, we suggest you come to

the Hale County ASC office located at the corner of 6th and Ash St., Plainview, Texas, between the above dates.

ASC Will Accept Applications For Wheat Allotments

A farmer on land on which no wheat was seeded for any of the years, 1956, 1957, and 1958, may apply on or before July 1 for a "new farm" wheat acreage allotment for the 1959 winter wheat crop. Chairman J. Earl Laney of the Hale County Agriculture Stabilization and Conservation Committee.

Even if wheat was produced on the farm in 1958, the farm is still considered a new wheat farm if it did not have a 1958 allotment, and the farmer must apply at the county office as a new producer, Laney said.

An important requirement for obtaining a new allotment is to file a written application before the July 1 deadline. This application may be made out on forms which can be obtained in person or by mail from the County ASC Office.

The chairman pointed out that factors considered in determining whether a farmer is eligible for a new farm allotment will include the tillable acreage type of soil, and topography of the farm. The operator's farming system is studied and the extent to which his

livelihood depends on his farming operations. He is also asked the reason wheat was not planted on his farm in past years.

Last year applications were approved in Hale County for 64 acres of new farm wheat allotment.

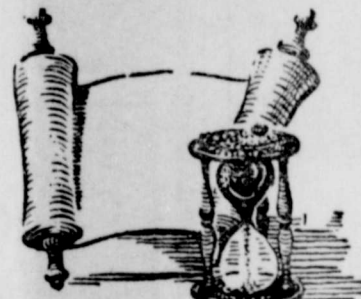
