The Morning Avalanche Menu for the Day

BREAKFAST — Peaches, cereal, cream, baked French toast, milk, coffee.

LUNCHEON — Ham and veal timbales, creamed carrots, shredded celery, cabbage, apple sauce, cookies, milk, tea.

DINNER — Vegetable plate, fresh cheese salad, fruit cup, milk, coffee.

Ham and Veal Timbales — One cup chopped veal and ham mixed, 1-3 cup steak bread crumbs, 3-4 cup milk, 2 teaspoons minced parsley, 2 eggs, salt and pepper.

Milk butter, add bread crumbs and milk and cook five minutes, stirring constantly. Add meat, parsley and eggs slightly beaten. Season with salt and pepper, the amount of seasoning depending on the saltiness of the meat. Turn into buttered individual molds or custard cups, making three full cups into a pan of hot water, cover with buttered paper and bake 30 minutes in a hot oven. Turn out of molds onto a hot platter and serve.

BRIDGE MADE EASY by W. W. Wentworth

(Abbreviations: A—ace; K—king; Q—queen; J—jack; X—any card lower than 10.)

Declarer's Strategy—3 Another illustration of making a winning trick is by "throwing the lead." When you, as declarer, hold combinations of cards similar to Ace-Queen, additional tricks may be made if you can force second hand to lead up to you, rather than have third hand lead through you. This is readily accomplished by the expert by playing a card from a suit that is sure to put second hand on the lead, so that second hand must lead up to the declarer. This maneuver is often utilized at the end of the game.

An illustration of ruffing, ruffing and finessing in actual play, hearts being trump, follows:

Dummy—spades A K Q; hearts 4 3 2; diamonds 5; clubs 9 8 7 6 5.

East—Declarer—spades J; hearts A Q 2 3; diamonds A 4 3; clubs 5 4.

West—Leads diamonds K. Declarer plans his campaign and takes with the Ace of diamonds. A grand slam may be made by ruffing declarer's small diamonds, stuffing declarer's clubs on dummy's spades and finessing the trump suit.

Juvenile Court Committee of B. C. D. Rotary and Kiwanis Issues Report

Editor's Note: The following report of the Juvenile Court committee of the Kiwanis and Rotary clubs and the Board of City Development was read at a joint meeting of the two civic clubs yesterday at noon. A vote taken after the reading gave it the unanimous endorsement of the combined memberships. See page 1, column 2.

THE COMPLETE REPORT
The Plan in Operation in Dallas Art. 5139 of the Revised Civil Statutes constitutes the Judges of the several District Courts and the County Judge a Juvenile Board, and the District Judges are paid \$1,500 each per annum out of the general funds of the county for their services as members of the Board. The Board has no judicial power but has power to direct a probation officer to file a complaint against any particular child in the county court and has the right to be present at the hearing and participate in the proceedings. It also has power to make recommendations to the court or person having custody of the child if the child has been adjudged to be dependent, neglected or delinquent.

The Board also has authority to appoint not to exceed six probation officers to serve during the pleasure of the Board. It is the duty of the probation officer to investigate cases referred to him by the court and to be present in court and represent the interest of the child when the case is heard, and to furnish to the court and to the Board such information and assistance as the Board may require.

The Lubbock Plan
In view of the expense attached to the Dallas Plan and the fact that by virtue of the statute, the creation of the Board can only be had in counties having a population of 100,000 or more, we recommend the following as a substitute:

Art. 5142 as amended by Chapter 228 General Laws Fortieth Legislature, provides that the County Commissioners Court may appoint one juvenile officer who shall receive not to exceed \$125 per month. The county judge, under the statute, shall select such juvenile officer from a list of three furnished by a nominating committee composed of the County Superintendent of Public Instruction and the superintendents of the two largest school districts in the county.

We would recommend that the County Commissioners Court authorize the appointment and payment of one juvenile officer, and inasmuch as the salary allowed to be paid by the County is small and it would probably be difficult to get the best type of man for the place at that salary, that the City Commissioners of the City of Lubbock be petitioned to appropriate some additional amount per month to supplement the salary paid by the Commissioners Court.

Must Have Strong Officer
The success of handling juveniles, particularly those with no criminal record but who are associating with boys who are known to be criminals, will largely depend on the character of the probation officer appointed. The man selected as a probation officer should be one whose effort is to prevent boys from drifting into ways of crime rather than to apprehend the master they have committed a crime. For that reason, we think the personality of the officer selected is of the highest importance.

In view of the fact that the county judge as the executive officer, having charge and supervision of the administrative business of the county in addition to the trial of civil and criminal cases in the county court, and the looking after the probate work, is necessarily greatly handicapped by reason of lack of time to investigate and study the individual case of the individual boy or girl, we would recommend that the County Judge appoint some four or five men of good character and proven integrity, who are interested in boys, to serve without pay as an Advisory Board, and to assist him by advice and counsel and by individual attention to those boys whom the County Judge believes would be benefited by the advice of such men. This board would of course have no judicial power, but would simply act as assistants to the County Judge in the handling of the various juvenile cases. The County Judge, in a case where he felt that he needed advice or assistance, could call upon the Board or could send the particular boy to some individual member of the Board, for that member to try to reach, and reclaim from his criminal associations.

We believe it will eventually be necessary to establish juvenile courts in the larger cities of this state whose sole duty it would be to handle the juvenile problems, but this could not be done without a constitutional amendment and in the meantime we offer the above plan as at least a step in the right direction towards looking after the juvenile problem.

DAILY MARKETS

KANSAS CITY LIVESTOCK

KANSAS CITY, Sept. 26.—The liberal marketing of unfinished light weight hogs at most points around the 11-market circuit prompted another sharp decline of 35-75c. The day's extreme top of \$11.50 was paid at Chicago. Total offerings were estimated at \$7,500, as compared with 71,923 a week ago and 58,525 the same day last year. Country demand for stocker and feeder steers remained narrow and prices are working lower. Shipments of replacement cattle and calves out of Kansas City, the first two days of the week, approximated 13,500, while the hold-over in dealers pens totaled around 15,000. Choice medium weight steers in Chicago scored \$18.60, a figure equal to the high level of the year.

Fat lambs ruled unevenly 15c-50c lower, while aged stock registered no material change, choice range lambs in Chicago topped at \$14.00, and in Kansas City, a nearby round, choice range brought \$13.85. Aggregate receipts were around 95,000 against 108,732 a week ago, and \$1,790 a year ago.

NEW YORK STOCKS

NEW YORK, Sept. 26.—Organized efforts to extend the recent rallies in stock prices were only partially successful in today's market. Despite the reduction in call money from 7 to 6 per cent, the lowest in a month, which ordinarily would be construed as a bullish factor, the market encountered strong selling resistance probably because of the heavy liquidation inspired by the cautionary advice of some of the leading commission houses. The day's sales ran over 4,000,000 shares for the fifth consecutive full session.

Banks called \$10,000,000 in loans during the morning but the influx of out-of-town funds was so large that the call money rate quickly dropped from 7 to 6 1/2 and finally to 6 per cent.

Private cables indicated that \$5,000,000 of the gold in London today was purchased for American ac-

count, but no details were available here.

Automotive shares again attracted a large speculative following in today's market. Graham-Paige common stock certificates, which have the same equity and dividend rights as the common stock, but without voting power, were a strong feature, climbing 6 points to a new high record at 56, bringing them closer into line with the common, which attained a new top at 61 1/4. Chrysler, Hupp and Chandler-Cleveland preferred also moved into new high ground and General Motors closed 2 1/2 points higher at 214 5/8 after having touched 217, but Hudson, Nash and some of the accessory shares turned reactionary.

Radio ran up nearly 11 points to 211, but lost half its gain. Abraham & Straus, Austin Nichols preferred, Commercial Investment Trust, Johns Manville, People's Gas, Union Carbide and Woolworth sold 3 1/2 to 8 points higher, some of them touching new high records. Other issues to break into new high ground included A. M. Byers, Electric Auto Lite, Electric Storage Battery, Fleischman, Eisenlohr, Leh & Pink and Gillette Safety Razor, but not all of the gains were maintained.

Montgomery Ward, which ran up in spectacular fashion late yesterday, fell back 5 points on profit-taking, and Murray Corporation slipped from an early high of 93 1/2 to 85 1/4, off 4 3/4 net.

Except for a slightly firmer undertone in sterling, which ruled just under \$48 for London cables, there were no changes of consequence in the foreign exchange market.

Cold weather stimulated the buying of wheat and cotton futures, which advanced about 1 1/2 cents a bushel and \$1 to \$1.50 a bale, respectively.

New highs were scored for this upward movement. Early prices were lower on poorer cables than due but once the early selling was taken care of, the market shot up rapidly to 18.45 for Dec. New Orleans and in New York. December bulged through the 19 cent mark. The government weekly summary was bullish and caused buying. The selling in the last hour that brought prices back about 20 points from the top was credited to hedge selling. Norman Mayer & Co., wired "Weekly weather and crop review shows further deterioration probably forecasting a smaller bureau estimate October 8. Weather outlook is unfavorable. We advise buying."

Weekly Weather and Crop Review
WASHINGTON, D. C., Sept. 26.—High winds did much damage to cotton in the more eastern portion of the belt, especially in the Carolinas and in Southeastern Georgia where the crop deteriorated steadily with much shedding, bolts rotting and seed sprouting. In the central states of the belt the week was generally fair and mostly cool, and while the coolness retarded development in some places, the crop in general opened rapidly and picking and ginning made good advances under the prevailing favorable weather for field work. Bolt rot continues in portions of this area. In Oklahoma the week was rainless and cotton made fair to good progress. It is opening nicely but promaturity in the dry western areas. Picking and ginning advanced rapidly in the central and eastern portions and is well under way in much of the west. In Texas there is little change in the general situation except for deterioration in the northwestern districts. The crop is

made in the east with top crop prospects poor while cool cloudy weather retarded opening in the western portion. Dryness, following early rank growth has caused excessive shedding in the northwest. Picking advanced well until stopped by rain the middle of the week.

SHELBY, N. C.—Light frost last night.

LINDSEY, Okla.—Picking of cotton has made fair progress although there has been some interference by showers. Weevils have been numerous and the crop is short.

CHERRY, S. C.—No top crop here and cotton 40 percent open. Rains have interfered with picking.

DEVEREAUX, Ga.—Compared with last season, cotton ginning is

three weeks late. This section will not make as much cotton as was produced last season.

NEW ORLEANS, La.—The average price of middling spots yesterday at the designated markets was 17.92 cents against 21.19 same day last year.

The average price of middling cotton in southern markets was 18 points lower than the day before.

The total of spot cotton sales in southern markets Tuesday was 64,695 bales against 57,324 same day last year.

NEW ORLEANS—Domestic cotton markets report more business.

On some days the volume of hedge selling has been conspicuous by its absence. The New York Journal of

Commerce offers the following comment: "The falling off in the supply of hedges has been remarked upon. In parts of the South the cotton is taken by the mills so promptly that hedging is, of course, needless."

Weather—At noon the western cotton belt reported much cloudiness. The eastern cotton belt was mostly clear, and the central belt was part cloudy to cloudy. Western forecast: Louisiana, Oklahoma, and East and West Texas mostly cloudy with occasional showers. Arkansas mostly cloudy and slightly warmer. Eastern forecast: North Carolina fair and cooler, light frost in west and north central portions. South Carolina fair and slightly cooler. Georgia, Mississippi and Alabama mostly cloudy with probably showers. Florida mostly cloudy with showers in south portion.

UNJUST CRITICISM

A successful physician is a modern medicine man. He practices magic and charges well for it. Don't waste your time on poor patients. Get yourself a practice among wealthy, fashionable people, is the advice of a man quoted by Lloyd Morris in his "Composite Portrait" which he calls "Mammon, M. D." in the October Harper's Magazine. "A fashionable doctor is the only kind who makes money. Don't ever do anything simply. Never forget that the patient is a layman and likes to be impressed by mysteries. Furthermore, patients dislike being dismissed with a simple remedy, however efficacious. It flatters their vanity to be persuaded that their maladies are complicated."

"Use as many instruments, as much equipment as you can, always. Fill your office with the latest and most complex scientific devices. These are the equivalent of the medicine man's incantations and magic. Don't be at the beck and call of your patients. The more difficult it is for them to see you, the greater your prestige with them. If you give an impression of being very busy, if you make them believe that you are doing them a favor in seeing them, your practice will grow. Success in these days is largely the result of humbug."

This excerpt is typical of a modern trend in writing, which is to catch the eye with startling statement and hold it with sensational charges. Medical men, when they are not going out in the rain or cold or keeping nerve-racking hours at some bedside, are coming in for this sort of thing in print. No body of men is more misrepresented and caricatured.

The fact that there exists quacks among M. D.'s, fellows who are treacherous to the great oath of Galen, impostors and bric-a-bracs and panders, no more invalidates the medical profession than an occasional scandal in the ministry invalidates religion. For some strange reason, the exceptions to a rule are advertised with glee; the loyal, patient practitioners of it are left out of the picture. The vast body of doctors are not wealthy men; they are, they must be, self-sacrificing and they are usually the last to get paid. Aside from the ministry itself, no profession is so anxious to keep itself free of charlatans and quacks; in refusing generally to countenance false hopes and panaceas, in remaining honest with science, doctors have often paid the penalty in lost patronage.

One may recognize the good and true in any system of cures. Nature is complex and can be approached in some matters in various ways. But the intelligent and fair-minded man grows a little tired sometimes of the peculiar attack upon doctors. The average doctor is in fact, in fact a friend to the poor, and as for humbug, he is constantly warring with it. He does not claim infallibility, he is human. It would be a real calamity if doctors as a body followed the advice offered above. And it is very unfortunate if people generally allow themselves to be misled by irresponsible journalism.

STRAW VOTES

The device of the straw vote sometimes forecasts the result of an election and sometimes it does not. The method of sending out postcards to some great stratum of the electorate can fall of its purpose because of many factors. In the last election year the Literary Digest straw vote indicated with remarkable accuracy the defeat of Davis. But no straw vote was needed to indicate that; it was expected by everybody with any knowledge of country-wide sentiment. The Democratic nominee was the inheritor of the Madison Square Garden hurrah, and the country was overwhelmingly Coolidge-minded anyway.

This year, on the other hand, it is granted by many observers whose opinions are worthy of respect that the remaining weeks before election are full of possible breaks; the situation is charged with currents and cross-currents unlike-

any of recent history. Two of the foremost liberal journals of the country, whose editorial columns represent the thought of fully a million voters, have definitely indicated their support of Smith, and call for intensive work in his behalf on the part of liberals. The La Follette vote was quite a surprise in the last election, and much of it is leaning Smithward. The power question, so long hushed up, is likely at any moment to receive full recognition by one of the candidates, and there may begin a shifting of votes on that account. In short, it is entirely probable that there is a bigger undecided vote at this moment than in any campaign in the memory of men now living. How it will go is the great question and that may not, probably will not, be apparent in any straw vote taken at this time.

RACKET

Probably very few people really know what this stuff about racket is all about. Some time ago this paper called attention to this Chicago Racket and it seems as it goes on down the line and spreads and gets into other towns and cities that it is a close kin to the old Italian Camorra. It described the network of criminal activities which until recently in Italy challenged the very existence of government and law. The Italian organization levied taxes upon the people for "protection"; the racketeer does precisely the same thing. The Italian blackmailer, kidnaper and cutthroat organized to such an extent that minor-officers were subject to him and in some cases his power ramified up to men in high position. It took almost the entire militia to round the scoundrels up when the country decided no longer to tolerate them.

Now it is increasingly evident that the thing that terrifies Chicago and some other cities is reaching into the country. A cancer will always spread. In the face of a bland, puzzled people there is rising law and the protection that law is supposed to furnish decent citizens that is assuming the character of a wholesale attack upon civil society. There may be no connection between attempts at extortion like that at Waco and any organization in Chicago, but there is not the slightest doubt that the increasing number of such dastardly affairs in the country at large is inspired by the success in Chicago. Nor shall we have to wait long for a "hook-up." Unless there shall be in this country very soon a quicker and harsher justice, we are in for conditions unparalleled in all our history. An authority says that the people do not understand the long wait between a crime like Hickman's and its punishment. They certainly do not. Nor does anybody with the slightest conception of what law is for understand it. There can be but one result of the present messing around with criminals and the muttering about lynching shows the way the wind is blowing. Civilized society that gives up its private arms, forswears private vengeance and pays taxes to have the law enforced by proper representatives, sees in this day a muddling that lets crime rise by the minute. We need less twaddle about prison reform and more justice that is not too squeamish to break a few necks.

NO NEED FOR ALARM

The Maltheusians who began some years ago to frighten people with the bogey of overpopulation and undernourishment are getting to be a little old-fashioned; and there is nothing so old-fashioned as old-fashioned scientific theory when it is not scientific. Some of the professors still chant the alarm, but it is growing monotonous; applied science is busy with discoveries that are lessening the shadow of starvation for the planet we grace by our presence. New food reservoirs are promised; the great seas, for instance, are teeming with life that could be turned to man's sustenance; synthetic foods are already a prospect. And besides that the area already possible of cultivation is only half used. One by one the evidences are piling up that the Creator did not establish a moral law that would conflict with His providence. The proposal of race suicide as a solution of the food problem is a little premature, to say the least about it. There will always be room on this globe for a race of men who use their intelligence. For instance, at this moment it is brought to our attention that Africa is almost entirely undeveloped. The great mother of continents contains one-fifth of the land of this planet and sustains only a twelfth of its population. It has untold wealth and commercial possibilities, not to speak of its soil, and with modern methods of conquering the wilderness it will eventually be brought to terms. Romantic writers may describe the jungle, but applied science has only to be challenged to find ways and means. Soon or late Africa will be a great food reservoir.

And after that? Well, we can no more imagine the discoveries of the future than our forebears could imagine the radio, or airplane. Little faith is needed to assure us that world-wide starvation is not a likelihood. There will be unforeseen famines here and there as there always have been, but the much-advertised calamity of a world famine is remote. Can't the prophets of woe think of something new to worry us?

Hundreds of witnesses, he said, would be necessary to present the case.

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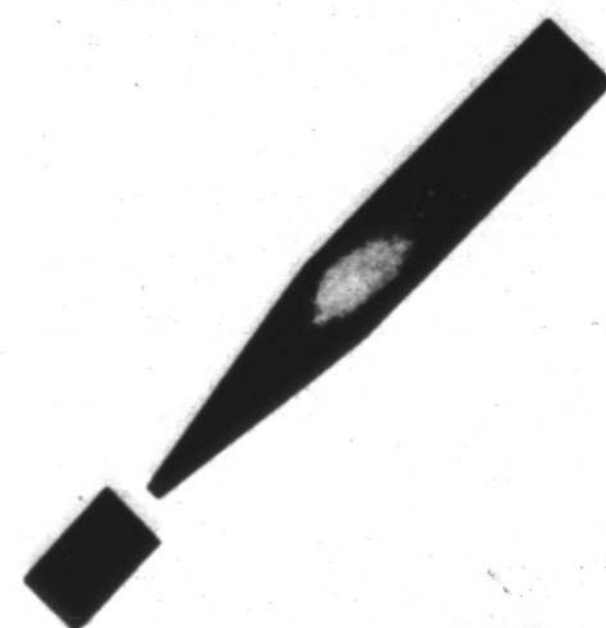

on four major violations of the law.

Reference was made to the Monday night speech of Rev. J. Frank Norris, Fort Worth Baptist pastor, Judge Mullican giving a scathing rebuke in claiming that Norris slandered Governor Alfred E. Smith, "boasting false witness against a man whose shoe laces he is unworthy to tie."

The first speaker from out of town was L. M. Kenyon, state representative of Galveston. He stated that Rev. Norris and Rev. John Roach Straton, "are making votes for the Democratic nominee," and called upon all loyal party members to stand behind the party.

Mrs. Helen B. Moore, in beginning, said she felt the day had not been well spent if she had not said something in behalf of the common people of America than any governor of any state in the Nation's history. He is being attacked because he has the courage to come out and say what he believes on questions before the people.

Enforcement Is Question

"Prohibition is not a serious problem. Senator Holbrook declared, "Herbert Hoover's travels while he was in the employ of the Standard Oil company, from the time he was 21 years old, until Woodrow Wilson selected him as food administrator in Belgium. Prior to that time Hoover was an engineer, working for Standard Oil."

Holbrook then charged that Hoover, while in China at the time of the Boxer rebellion, doing engineering work for Standard Oil in inspecting coal and oil lands, made application for English citizenship papers. "He saw an opportunity in those Chinese coal lands. But, when he found out it would take too much time to become an English citizen, Herbert Hoover got a bunch of Englishmen to form a corporation for the purpose of developing those coal fields. These same Englishmen later were convicted by English courts, because of this shady deal, and the court said that Hoover was just as guilty as they were, but they couldn't touch him because he was an American citizen."

Hoover Is Rich

The owning of two palaces, one at Palo Alto, Calif., and one in Washington, D. C., by Hoover was cited by Senator Holbrook as evidence that the republican nominee was a very rich man.

And it was also Senator Holbrook who charged that, "everywhere in Texas, the leaders of the Anti-Smith organizations are the rundown remnants of the Ku Klux Klan, except a few political preachers who think more of prohibition than of saving souls."

Frances Smith's Work

Reviewing Governor Smith's record, Holbrook cited that when he first became governor of New York the school teachers were getting \$600 a year average salary, and now they are getting \$2000 a year average. The state's yearly appropriations for education jumped from \$11,000,000 to \$86,000,000, "and yet they charge that because he is a Catholic he is opposed to the public schools."

John Darrouzet, Galveston attorney, who represents interests who own extensive lands on which rich potash deposits have been discovered, stated, "we have spent tre-

mendous sums of money here in seeking to develop these giant resources, and the reason these properties are not developed is because the republican party says it is not properly protected."

"One lake we own, the chemists tell us, will supply the world with enough potash to keep it going for 25 years, but our hands are tied because the republicans will not protect us."

Darrouzet said that the Democratic party should be supported if for no other reason than "Oscar Budweiser Colquitt" is a leader of the opposition, charging Colquitt with being the brewers' "angel" in Texas, "back in the part of the state where I come from." He then reviewed Tammany Hall's history as a friend to the South in the days when it was struggling with republican carpet-bagger rule.

In speaking of the "bottlers he said: "They are just like if you and I were playing marbles and I won all your marbles. Then you would say you wanted your marbles back because you wasn't playing for keeps."

At the close of the meeting Judge Mullican announced that Congressman Sam Rayburn, of Bonham, and Congressman Quinn Williams, of Decatur, who speak here next Monday night, would be provided with loudspeakers in order that the crowds expected could hear all they would have to say. A suitable outdoor place for that night is being sought.

The report of the committee was read by Judge Mullican. The plan used by Dallas was included in the report which was adopted by the meeting.

Local Plan Expanded

The Lubbock plan pointed out that since the state laws vest power in juvenile matters in the County courts of the state, it is impossible without a Constitutional amendment to establish a practical and working juvenile court here or elsewhere in Texas. Since this is the case, the report read, it is the committee's opinion that Pink L. Parrish and Carl Rountree, senator and representative-elect from this state district, should introduce in the next session of the Legislature a Constitutional amendment to permit the founding and legal operation of juvenile courts in Texas.

To Employ Officer

For the present, the report advocated the employment of a probation officer whose duties it shall be to prevent juvenile delinquency in this city and county rather than apprehend youthful lawbreakers after they commit crimes. The probation officer, it was recommended, should be selected from a list of three men, nominated by a committee composed of the county superintendent of public instruction, and the superintendents of the two largest independent school districts in the county. It was also recommended that the county judge, under whose control all matters of juvenile delinquency rest under the law, appoint an advisory committee of some four or five men, who without judicial powers and without salary, would aid the county judge in any matter which he reported.

With the adoption of the report it was also decided that the resolution for the appointment of a probation officer be placed before the city county commissioners. The complete report, see page 11, paper.

In the Jersey department of the fair, because of the fact that premiums in this division were increased this year by 65 to 75 per cent over previous years, it is predicted that many more local animals will be shown than ever before.

Workmen are preparing final arrangements for the exposition at the fair grounds, putting buildings and grounds in order and arranging for the coming of the exhibits which will begin to pour into the industrial and agricultural buildings during the latter part of the week.

The track for the dog and rabbit races is being placed in condition and bleachers are being constructed around the track so that thousands may witness an innovation in fair sports here.

Boy Scouts Have Busy Time In Fair

Boy Scouts and what boy scouts are being trained to do, with evidence of what they are and have been doing, will be available to every fair visitor next week in the space located between the Woman's building and the Industrial building. The space to be used by the scouts is about 100 feet square in size.

If the sketch of the proposed layout for this area is any indicator, this district will be every bit Boy Scouts and their evidence. Warren P. Knox, scout executive for the South Plains area council, stated yesterday that the space is being prepared now in every minute detail.

At one end of the plot of ground, a flag and a totem pole is to be placed. Directly behind these there will be two small Indian tipis, with a larger teepee back of these. At one side in the rear will be a string of tents, a birch bark wigwam, an army tent, a Boy Scout tent, a Pongee tent, a Tarpaunt, and an Igloo. An African grass hut, a loom, a lean-to, grace a portion of the ground, near where Mr. Knox will give demonstrations of ten different ways in which to erect a tent.
