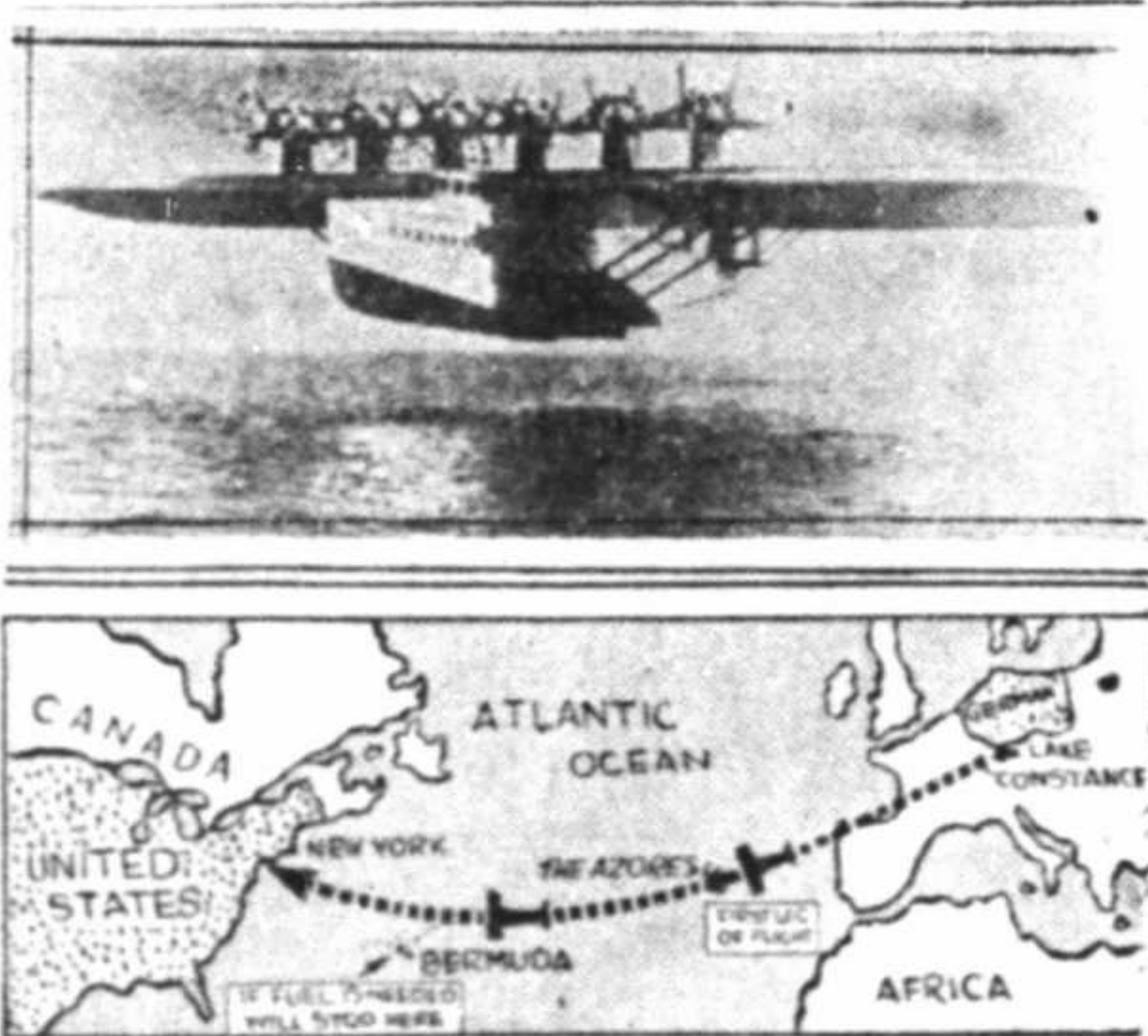

WORLD'S LARGEST PLANE TO DARE ATLANTIC IN SUMMER

The world's biggest plane—Germany's Dornier DOX air boat, pictured below, at top—is being groomed for a one-stop trans-Atlantic flight to America early in the summer. Claude Dornier, shown at left, designer and builder of the huge craft which can carry 175 passengers, may command the ship on its projected sea hop. The map shows the route the super-plane is to follow, from Constance, Switzerland, southward to the Azores, and from the Azores to New York with a possible stop for refueling at Bermuda.

OKLAHOMA CITY, Okla., April 7.—Outsmarted by the ingenuity of man, the crafty No. 1 Mary, outlaw tugboat of the south Oklahoma City oil field, today tugged and fretted against the steel barrier that held her giant energy in check.

The well was placed under control late yesterday after 11 days of liberty. During that time the gusher showered the countryside for miles around with an estimated daily average of 48,000 barrels of petroleum.

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THREE THOUSAND WAIT ON LINK; TRAIN IS ONE MILE OF TOWN

HOBBS, N. M., April 7.—Deep within its bosom, mother earth holds the milk of prosperity for Hobbs, the suckling infant of the petroleum parent.

Fifteen derricks stand as silent sentinels over a turbulent stream of wealth, 112 miles southwest of Lubbock.

Three thousand participants of a new field are awaiting the link which will unite them with the industrial world.

Train Nearing Town

Scarcely a mile away arises the smoke of a construction train, building steadily the rails of the Texas-New Mexico railway, which will furnish a transportation outlet to Monahans, Texas, and the main line of the Texas and Pacific.

Other significant outlets, through which will flow the liquid wealth of this field, will be furnished soon by construction of pipe lines into Monahans, Midland and Wink. The Texas-New Mexico line from Monahans, the Dutch Shell will lay a 10-inch line from Wink, and the Atlantic has proposed an 8-inch line from Midland.

The silenced throat of this field will roar when industry is prepared to accept its offering. Hobbs has assumed an attitude of watchful waiting.

United By Huts

Sprawling one mile over this vast expanse of ranch land, Hobbs is united by rows of improvised and unpainted huts, shine with newness.

Among the improvements are a water and ice plant; an electric light plant, six lumber yards and numerous frame business structures. A reproduction of the frontier town of the early days, "Pool Hall," "Theater," "All You Can Eat for 50 Cents," "Room and Board," "Pig 'N' Whistle" and numerous others to the boomer.

Major Companies Here

Companies with holdings in this field are the Mid-Continent, Skelly, Empire, Shell, E. A. Landreth, Texas.

TWELVE BREAK HOUSTON JAIL

ESCAPE MADE BY SAWING A HOLE IN BARS

NIGHTWATCHMAN TIED; FOURTEEN REFUSE TO LEAVE CELLS

(By Associated Press)

HOUSTON, April 7.—

From the seventh floor of the county jail, 12 prisoners, a number of them under penitentiary sentences, escaped today by climbing down an improvised rope of fire hose. They had attacked and tied up Nightwatchman W. A. McClinton after sawing a hole one-foot square in the bars of their cell block.

The other 14 men in the same tier refused to leave and untied McClinton after their mates had fled. Sheriff T. A. Blinford, who said he could not understand how such a "modern jail" was broken, organized a posse, which got out on a search in and about Houston.

An examination of the cell block showed that the sawing probably had been going on for a day or two, while the other 14 went down the hose. Two hacks were found. They presumably were smuggled in on visitors' day.

The night watchman said he remained trussed up for nearly two hours. A Mexican was left to guard him while the other 14 went down the hose. Then the Mexican followed.

Early this morning a man called out from his darkened cell, "come on back, I'm sick." It was the signal for the outbreak.

McClinton said he looked through a "peep hole" and saw four men crouched and ready to spring. He switched on the light, and they pounced upon him.

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MISS ALLRED IS RELEASED

BRALLY ASKS CHARGES TO BE DISMISSED AGAINST WOMAN

(By Associated Press)

PAMPA, April 7.—Miss Beulah Allred, arrested March 26 and charged with possession and transporting intoxicating liquor, was released today after Clifford Bralley, district attorney, asked that charges against her be dismissed when her case was called for trial.

The district attorney said he was not with the grand jury when the indictment against Miss Allred was returned. He said the investigation of the charges and while finding the woman technically guilty "still there is a wholly a lack of actual criminal intent upon the part of the defendant to violate the liquor laws, but rather a misguided impractical idea upon her part that such a course would be a means toward aiding in law enforcement.

CATTLEMAN IS HURT IN FALL FROM HORSE

JOHN G. SARTIN IS NOT EXPECTED TO LIVE HERE TODAY

John C. Sartin, 45, of Seagraves, pioneer cattleman of Texas and Eastern New Mexico, is in a serious condition at the West Texas hospital in this city, following injuries sustained Sunday afternoon at 1:30 o'clock when he was pinned beneath his horse after a fall.

He was brought from his Seagraves ranch to this city immediately after the accident. An operation was performed last night.

Condition Grave

His condition was believed extremely grave last night and little hope was held for his recovery, but he has improved slightly today, physicians announced shortly after noon.

The mishap occurred while Mr. Sartin was driving cattle from his Texas ranch to his New Mexico property. After stepping into a dog hole the horse fell, the back of the saddle crushing the pelvis of the rancher. Broken in four different places, the pelvis bone was torn into fragments with loss of artery, causing serious complications of internal injuries.

Mr. Sartin landed on his face in front of the horse as the stumble occurred. The horse somersaulted with the saddle striking the cattleman.

poseded xylose. Trees and many kinds of plants abound with it. The chemists were informed that xylose probably is the third most widely distributed organic compound in nature.

Little is yet known of its food values. Possibly persons with a sweet tooth may eat all they wish, for preliminary experiments indicate it is not assimilated, but passes through digestive system without apparent effect. A statement from the news service of the society calls it a "non-fattening" sugar.

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JUDGING CONTESTS ARE BEING HELD TODAY; MANY ENTERED

PLAINVIEW, April 7.—

The third annual Panhandle Plains Dairy Show opened here today with 248 animals entered by 85 breeders. Production contests with judging by 4-H club boys and vocational students were on the program for the first day.

Officials declare indications are that the show will be the greatest regional exhibit ever held in the southwest.

Thirty teams were here for the judging when it opened this morning at 8 o'clock.

Ray C. Mowery, Texas Tech professor, is in charge of the judging contests.

Winners of first places in this contest will receive \$25 and second places \$15. A total of \$325 is offered in the two different classes in addition to a gold medal given by Dr. E. J. Underwood, of allie Center, and a loving cup offered by H. A. Ferguson, of Amarillo, and R. C. Nicholl, of Tulsa. One hundred dollars of the premium money is being paid by the First National bank at Amarillo.

The contest will begin at 8:00 a. m. Monday, April 7.

The many exhibits of dairy equipment, feed and farm machinery proved interesting to the large crowd attending the third annual show. Additional entries in the dairy products contest were received before the judge started.

K. M. Renner of Texas Tech was superintendent of that department.

E. W. Thomas, Hall county agent, was in charge of the production judging contest, also held today. The Amarillo Globe-News offered a like sum in the 4-H club judging.

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HAWKS ENDS GLIDER HOP

RECORD HOLDER MAKES LANDING IN NEW YORK SUNDAY

(By Associated Press)

NEW YORK, April 7.—Captain Frank M. Hawks, holder of the east and west transcontinental speed records, enjoyed the added distinction today of being the first aviator to pilot a glider from coast to coast.

Arriving exactly on schedule, he set his small red motorless plane "Eaglet" down in Van Cortlandt Park at 4 p. m., yesterday to complete a flight from San Diego, Calif., towed at the end of a 500-foot cable behind a power plane he made the transcontinental trip in six and one-half days with 36 hours of actual flying time.

A crowd of 15,000 stood in the rain to see the finish of the 3,000-mile glider trip. A fleet of army planes circled in formation above the park as an aerial reception committee.

FARM WORKER SHOOT AFTER FAMILY ROW

MIDLAND, April 7.—

Pedro Agilar, 25, Mexican farm laborer, yesterday shot and killed his father-in-law and mother-in-law, Mr. and Mrs. Matilda Gonzales, at Grand Falls, Ward county, after a quarrel over domestic troubles, and in an exchange of shots with a posseman shot and killed Cicero Dakan, 35, tool dresser, and was wounded himself, officers here today were informed.

Agilar fled after shooting his relatives and a short time later was detected by Dakan, member of the posse, in some underbrush. Both fired their guns and Dakan was wounded fatally and the Mexican slightly wounded.

Encountered By Posse

Later members of the posse again encountered the fugitive and exchanged shots, the Mexican receiving several flesh wounds. He was arrested by Sheriff Dyer of Ward county and lodged in jail at Barrow where a charge of murder was filed against him.

The shooting of Agilar's relatives occurred about 9 o'clock in the morning. He was captured about five hours later after approximately 500 officers and citizens of Ward and surrounding counties had armed themselves and joined in the hunt.

Dakan had resided in Grand Falls for about 25 years.

SAN ANTONIO, April 7.—

Approximately 1,200 men and women, the majority of whom were Mexicans, staged an unemployment parade and demonstration before the city hall here today. The parade got under way at 10 o'clock from a concentration point on Milan square and traversed the downtown streets. It was orderly.

Requests from Governor Dan Moody that the parade be routed as so as not to pass the Mexican consulate on Houston street was denied by Mayor C. M. Chambers, who told the governor's leaders had given him assurance no untoward demonstration would be staged.

Governor Moody's request was in compliance with one from the secretary of state's office at Washington, following reports received there that a demonstration against the Mexican consulate was planned.

YOUR EYES -----

Do They Function Properly?

Nature has intended that the two eyes function together, and if for any reason some defect has eliminated this ability or it has not developed properly, then a handicap has been placed on that individual which is very detrimental to the performance of his daily tasks.



CROSSED EYES

This is the most apparent defect in a person's eyes. It is one that handicaps the owner more than any of the other defects of the eyes to which one might be subjected. REPORT SAYS MAN FROM HERE SHOT

According to an Associated Press dispatch received today from New Orleans, Palmer H. Bell, said to be an attorney of Lubbock, died Sunday at a hospital from a self-inflicted wound.

A thorough investigation among members of the local bar and judges of the district courts of this city, together with a search in the city and telephone directories, disclosed no information as to identity of Bell.

"It is possible that Bell had lived in Lubbock a short time and was perhaps a licensed lawyer, but I am positive that he did not practice here," said Judge Clark M. Mulligan of 20th district court.

Queries among citizens of Slaton, Levelland and Littlefield revealed no one who knew the man.

Bell's body has been sent to Birmingham, Ala., his former home. The dying man was discovered by a hotel detective, attracted to Bell's room by the sound of the shot.

FOX FILM FEATURE

NEW YORK, April 7 (AP)—Stock prices were irregularly higher at the opening of today's market, with a jump of 9 5-8 points in Fox Film as the feature. Johns Manville, Prairie Oil and Gas and Gillette Safety Razor showed initial gains of a point or more. National Bellas Hess opened with a block of 15,000 shares at 20, up 8 and a new high record. Radio Corporation Common, Warner Brothers Pictures and St. Paul preferred declined a point or more.

Sale of William Fox of the voting control in his theatrical enterprises to Harley Clark, president of the General Theatres Equipment company, brought an outburst of bullish enthusiasm in stocks affected. Fox Film opened with a block of 20,000 shares, but quickly dropped from the opening price of 50 to 45 1-2.

Public Utilities and oils were again in the forefront of the advance. New high records were established in the early trading by American Telephone, Columbia Gas, Consolidated Gas, Engineers Public Service, North American Company, United Corporation, Continental Oil, Sun Oil and Shell Union, the gains ranging from fractions to nearly 2 points. In addition, American Water Works, Simms Petroleum, Atlantic Refining and Houston were quickly pushed up a point or more. J. I. Case jumped 5 3-4 points and U. S. freight 5. The latter touching a new high.

Foreign exchanges opened steady with sterling unchanged at \$4.86.

NEW ORLEANS, April 7 (AP)—Cotton had a slightly irregular opening although cables were better than due and first trades showed 3 points down to 3 points up. Prices soon rallied on trade buying of near months. May advancing to 16.35, and July to 16.40, or 9 to 13 points above Saturday's close. October traded at 15.81 only 6 points above Saturday's close. Towards the end of the first hour the market was quiet but steady and at the high.

The market rallied moderately in the first half of the morning on further trade buying of old crop months. May traded up to 16.64 and July to 16.48, or 23 points above the previous close. October traded only to 15.81, 6 points up from Saturday's close. Toward noon the market eased off to levels 12 to 19 points below the high, owing to realizing, and at noon the market was steady and still tending downward.

COTTON OPENS WITH
ADVANCE IN NEW YORK

Spot houses were buyers of the near months, while there was covering or commission house buying of late deliveries owing to the relatively steady cables. Later deliveries advanced and near positions sold about 10 to 15 points higher, near October advancing to 15.83.

However, the market stiffened again later, and active months showed net advances of 8 to 24 points at midday. 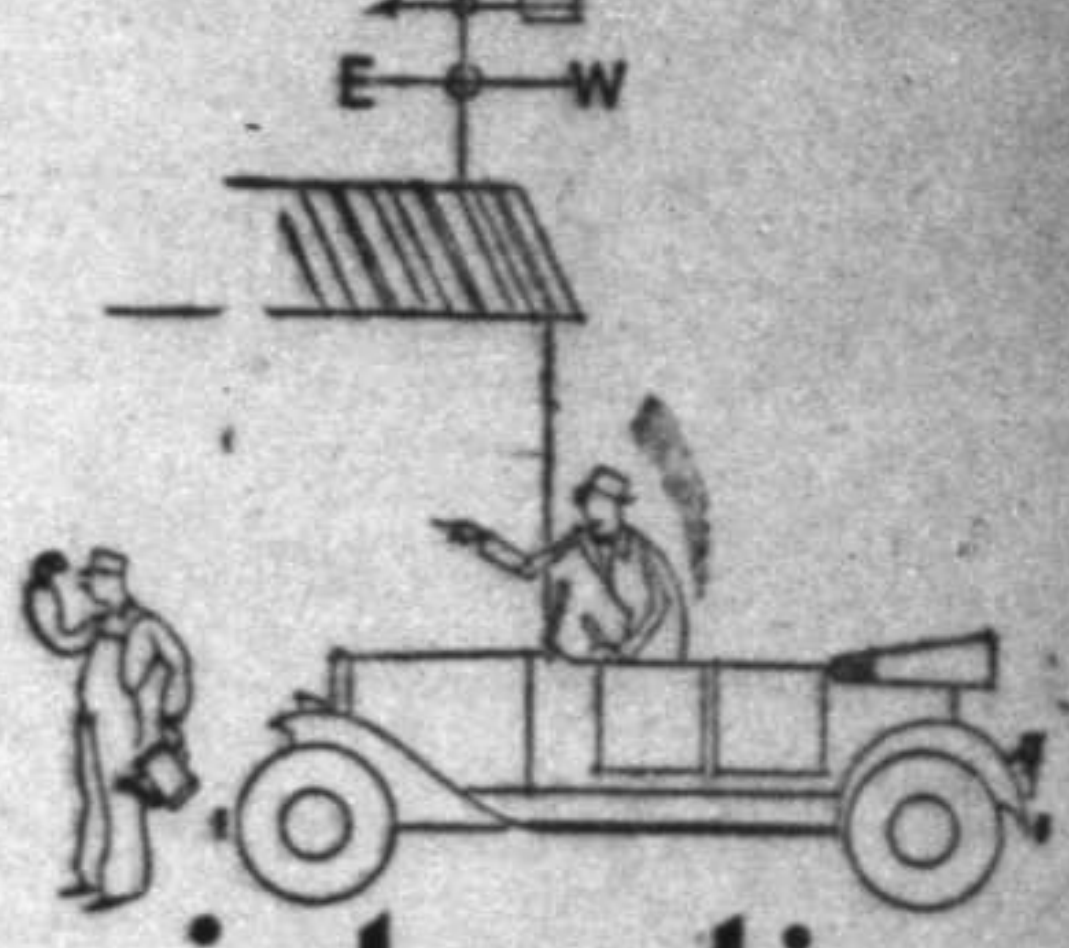

Just 10 days after he delivers the commencement address at Texas Technological college, Walter Williams, dean of the school of Journalism at the University of Missouri, will become acting president of that university.

He will be inducted into office as president of the University of Missouri December 31.

The founder of the first school of Journalism, which was established at Missouri in 1908, is not a college graduate. He was born at Booneville, almost within the shadow of the school he will head.

Quite A Journalist

Dean Williams, internationally known in journalistic circles, began a newspaper career when 15 years old and he became editor of the Booneville Advertiser before he was old enough to vote.

In 1920 he was sent to Spain as commissioner to the European press. That same year he presided over the North American section of the Press Congress in Switzerland.

For several years he was president of the Press Congress of the world and during that connection he travelled into various foreign countries. This fall he will go to Buenos Aires.

Urged As Candidate

Frequently Dean Williams has been urged by friends to enter the race for governor of Missouri and once he was petitioned to become a candidate for the Senate, but each time he declined, expressing a desire to remain with the school he founded.

Boonville, home of the president-elect of the University of Missouri, is also the home town of Dr. Paul W. Horn, president of Texas Technological college. The two have been life-long friends.

Dean Williams, who is 66 years old, will succeed Dr. Stratton D. Brooks, whose resignation was demanded by the board of curators.

Damage Suit Echo To Insurance Plot

BENTONVILLE, Ark., April 7 (AP)—The widow and two children of William Robert Pearman of Columbia, Mo., found dead near Gravette last Saturday with three bullet wounds in his head, today filed a civil suit for \$200,000 damages here against Dr. Andrew J. Bass, 55, retired dentist of Columbia, charged with murder in connection with the slaying of Pearman in an alleged insurance conspiracy.

INJUNCTION GRANTED

AUSTIN, April 7 (AP)—A temporary injunction restraining the department of agriculture from interfering with the importation of citrus nursery stock from Florida by the Black Nursery company of Donna was granted Friday in district court by Judge George Calhoun. The injunction prohibits the importation of plants unless they have been inspected both at the point of shipment and at the points of receipt.

The injunction was granted on the ground the state legislature does not have the right to confer legislative powers on an executive officer.

QUARANTINE LIFTED

AUSTIN, April 7 (AP)—Quarantine restrictions of Arkansas against sweet potatoes grown in Texas have been lifted. J. M. Del Curto, chief entomologist of the Texas department of agriculture has announced. Lifting of the ban will permit the shipment of sweet potatoes from the pest free area of Texas into Arkansas immediately.

LIONS TO MEET

AUSTIN, April 7 (AP)—More than 1,200 Lions are expected to invade Austin May 12 to 14 for the annual convention of Texas Lions clubs. Each of the 240 units has been invited to send delegates to the session and plans are being formulated to make it the banner event in the history of the organization.

BRISTOW MAY BE KILLED

BANDITS SEND WORD FOR TROOPS TO WITHDRAW

(By Associated Press)

MEXICO CITY, April 7.—A dispatch from Tepic to Excelsior today said the situation resulting from the kidnapping of J. R. Bristow, Texas oil man, who has been held captive by bandits near Tepic for three weeks, was becoming increasingly serious.

While several hundred federal troops are gradually closing in on the small band of ten or 15 brigands holding Bristow, the bandits have declared that unless the government forces are recalled the prisoner will be executed.

McCAMEY, April 7 (AP)—Pete Pedell, oil field employee, was attacked by a coyote while working on a lease near Imperial, Blackie Colburn, a fellow worker, cut the coyote's throat and stopped the fight. The incident occurred early in the morning when the wolf ran into the man in front of the camp while chasing a dog which had sounded the alarm and which unwillingly led the coyote a chase into the camp.

Henry Drummond was once waited upon by an old lady, who informed him that her husband was in the hospital, deaf, dumb, blind, and paralyzed. "What can I do for him?" inquired Mr. Drummond. "You can just go and stand by his side," was her earnest reply. That was sufficient.

Sympathy

This means that you enter fully into my feelings and experiences. A philosopher once said, "The way to be universally interesting is to be universally interested." Mr. Field said, "Sir, speaking of dogs, you have aroused my interest in the subject, and if you will indulge me I would like to ask you if you could imagine a dog as large as the House of Parliament." "Well, indeed, Mr. Field,

you really astonish me with such a strange question, but I could imagine a dog as large as that."

Mr. Field then asked: "Can you imagine a dog as large as London?" The Englishman eventually replied that he could imagine a dog as large as London. Mr. Field again asked: "Can you imagine a dog as large as England?" "Well, I suppose I could imagine a dog that large with a stretch of my imagination," "Indulge me in one more supposition. Could you imagine a dog as long as from Liverpool to New York?" The gentleman finally agreed. Then Mr. Field said: "The dog that I am trying to get you interested in is a dog that, when you pinch his tail in Liverpool, will bark in New York." Needless to say Mr. Field secured the financial assistance which he desired from English capitalists, and for the reason he entered into the lives of others. There are so many opportunities for you and me to enter into the lives of suffering and sorrowing humanity.

There is a saying to the effect that when two people share a joy it is doubled, and when they share a burden it is halved. I read the other day of an old lady whose opportunities for service were few. Each night it was her custom to gather up the daily papers after they had been thrown aside. Taking them to her room, she would cut out the death notices and laying them before her, would kneel and in prayer commend those in sorrow to the gracious help of her Father in heaven. What a marvelous gift of sympathy she had.

It is said that when the Queen of Sheba visited King Solomon she gave him a beautiful emerald box. He filled it with elixir, one drop of which would restore health and restore life. A dying criminal begged for a drop of it, but Solomon

refused. A dying mother with loving children asked for a portion of the fluid, but was refused. Finally the king himself came to die, and he asked that the vase be opened and the contents applied, but to his surprise the servants returned and reported that the liquid had all evaporated. So we can sit around in our selfishness until the vase containing the precious fluid of sympathy will be dried up.

A Woman Serves

It remained for a woman to serve him in the most significant manner of all, in this the crucial hour of his life. True she built no cathedral, performed no miracle, founded no mission. Yet prompted by a love that was deep, tender, and full, she gave to him all that she had, and that to him is "earth's richest gift."

The man with the plate came down the aisle to the end. With fine courtesy he stopped and passed the

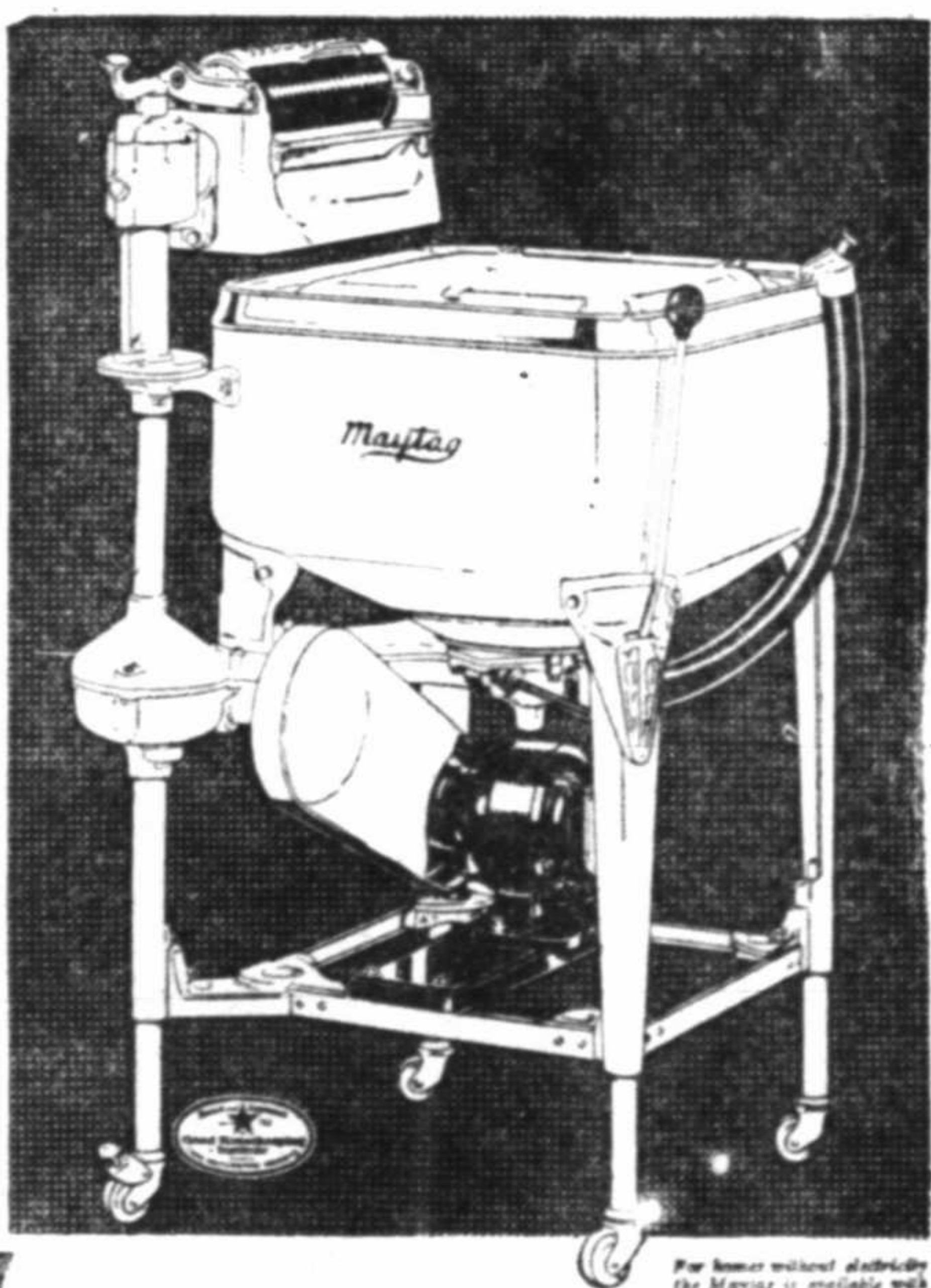
