

SYNOD CONTEMPLATES COSTLY IMPROVEMENTS IN ITS MANY COLLEGES

The Texas Presbyterian Synod did not consider the charges against Rev. Wm. Caldwell, the Fort Worth pastor, Friday, but the session was an interesting one and action on several other important matters was taken.

Definite action will be taken by the Synod on the Caldwell case Sunday afternoon at 2 o'clock. It is thought that is the time set for the hearing of the report of the commission which has under consideration the charges against Dr. Caldwell. The commission is composed of R. E. Vinson, J. A. Williams, F. T. Charlton, T. F. Gallaher, I. J. Helzer, W. F. Galbreath, T. J. Bell, P. W. Clement and F. S. Robbins. During the past two days that committee has gone through every detail of the complaint.

Following a stirring appeal from Dr. McFadden, of the El Paso Presbytery, a petition signed by the Synod, was addressed to the State Department at Washington, requesting that it take such steps as may be practicable with the government of Mexico relative to a revocation of the concession granted in that country to race tracks and other gambling devices on the Mexico side of the river opposite El Paso. The following resolution was unanimously adopted:

"The Synod of Texas of the Presbyterian church in the United States, in regular session at San Angelo, Texas, with deep concern of the granting by the government of Mexico to Col. Mat. Winn and others the concession to operate a race track, with gambling accessories at Juarez, Mexico, and inasmuch as this concession, as it has been granted, is plainly an attempt to evade the laws of Texas and detrimental to the best interests of the state as a whole, and destructive of the moral welfare of the city of El Paso in particular, we therefore petition the state department at Washington to take such steps as may be practicable

with the government of Mexico to the end that this concession be revoked, so far as it permits race track gambling."

Dr. McFadden's address was rousing and incited great sympathy for the reform people of El Paso and that Presbytery, who have only recently succeeded in driving the gambling evil out of their city.

A commission, comprised of Revs. E. H. Lyle, A. F. Cunningham, J. E. Green, S. A. McElroy, W. L. Lawrence, R. M. Hammack, C. H. Dobbs, Jr., C. L. Ewing, H. L. Pailsey and Ruling Elders G. A. McCall, E. G. Tenney, J. E. Cooper, D. C. Burkes, J. H. Rogers and E. B. Parden, was appointed to render a decision Saturday in the case of J. B. Long and others against the Presbytery of East Texas.

An ovation is before the Synod that the Presbytery of Dallas be divided into three separate Presbyteries, and this will in all probability be done, as no serious objection has yet been made known.

Morning Session.
At the morning session the following new representatives were enrolled: I. S. Hamilton, W. L. Lowrance, D. C. Burkes, E. S. Lowrance, W. H. Matthews, J. C. Millican, E. B. Barden, J. M. Pedan, J. T. Cunningham, W. P. Lee, Wm. Cliff and Malcomb Black.

At 10 o'clock Rev. S. A. King, D. D., professor of theology in the Austin Theological Seminary, delivered an address on the "Five Points of Calvinism."

A committee will be appointed by the moderator to arrange for a conference between some of the leading business men of the state and a body from the Synod in the interest of the educational institutions of the Synod. Plans were mapped out to better the Presbyterian colleges in Texas, and

YOAKUM MAY BE HEAD OF WORLD'S GREATEST STRING OF RAILROADS

New York, Nov. 19.—Probably the greatest sensation of the year in the world of railroads was sprung this afternoon when the report became general that B. F. Yoakum, the president of the Rock Island railroad system, is soon to resign that position and head the Hawley system of railroads.

Although great efforts are being made to brand this story as a canard, the general public is already giving it credence and official confirmation is expected within the next few days.

Hawley's system is now probably the largest system of railroads in the world. It consists of the Clover Leaf, Iowa Central, Chicago & Alton, Chesapeake & Ohio and the Missouri, Kansas & Texas. Now there is faint rumor—just the semblance of a report—that this new move may mean definite

relations between the Rock Island and the Hawley system.

Behind this great combine of railroads is the overshadowing and protecting silhouette of the Standard Oil Company. Then many other famous capitalists and magnates of the Collis P. Huntington variety are in on the deal.

B. F. Yoakum is a Texan, risen from the ranks by his own personal efforts. He is generally recognized as perhaps the greatest executive force in the history of railroading in America. At all events, he is of the proportions it takes to head such a system as that Hawley.

Mr. Yoakum has neither affirmed or denied the rumor of his accession to this pinnacle of railroad fame, and his very reticence leads many to give all the more credit to the rumor.

VOLCANOES.

STILL SEARCHING FOR ASTOR YACHT

NO TRACE OF THE MISSING FINANCIER AND SON.

HOPE IS HELD OUT

Nourmal Not Only Vessel Lost in the West Indian Hurricane Recently.

New York, Nov. 19.—Scores of boats are engaged in the search, but no trace has been found of the yacht, Norhahal, in the West Indian waters, and as all but a small part of the water where it would have drifted has been thoroughly searched, it seems certain that the boat went down in the recent hurricane, carrying all its passengers, including John Jacob Astor and his son.

That the yacht was lost in the storm there can be no doubt, but hope is held out that it may have become disabled and is yet on the surface of the water somewhere near the West Indies. The search will not be discontinued for weeks unless trace is found sooner. Other boats were lost in the hurricane, which raged for two days, and dozens of vessels are now scouring the seas in that vicinity in search.

CATTLE TICK
REAL SUCKER

WHILE ON CATTLE IT DRAWS
MORE BLOOD THAN ITS WEIGHT

Washington, Nov. 19.—A cattle tick that has reached the engorged stage weighs about 5 grains, and about 1,500 such ticks weigh a pound. As cattle in the tick region often carry many thousands of these blood-sucking parasites, and as each tick during the period of its attachment to an animal draws considerably more than its own weight in blood, it can be seen that these ticks constitute an enormous drain on the cattle which they feed. This accounts for the fact that under such conditions it is impossible to fatten cattle even on rich pasture and with an abundance of good food. A large part of the nourishment that should go toward producing beef and milk is consumed by the ticks. In addition to the loss of blood and nourishment there is the never-ceasing irritation caused by the ticks, so that the existence of the infected cattle is beset with continuous suffering and this, of course, also tends to keep them in poor condition.

The shrinkage in the milk production of a cow harboring many ticks will average one quart a day, and the loss occasioned thereby at 3 cents a quart for the 875,000 ticky dairy cattle out of more than 4,000,000 below the quarantine line, would amount to \$26,250 a day. Counting 300 milking days for each cow to the year would make the loss from this cause \$7,875,000 per annum.

Weeping Girl-Wife Regrets Self-Slain
Bank Robber.

St. Louis, Nov. 19.—Convicted at
last that her husband was the desper-

that she had no regret except for his
untimely death.

regret marrying him, poor, poor fel-
low."

Slander was married less than two
months ago.

When the police found her, Mrs.
Slander not only believed her husband
was guiltless of any crime, but also

doubted the statement of police of-
ficers that he had killed himself when
arrest was imminent.

LAUGHS AT "SPOOK" THEORY.

Portlan, Nov. 19.—Prof. William

was staying, wrecked itself most mys-
teriously, sets aside all the theories
relative to "spirits," "electricity," and
"earthquakes," which have been ad-

PARLIAMENTARY CAMPAIGN FUNDS BEING RAISED

Dublin, Nov. 19.—The news of the
success of T. P. O'Connor, M. P., in
his efforts to raise funds for the par-
liamentary campaign in Ireland is
most gratifying to the Nationalist
leaders here. It is felt that with a
well filled war chest the Nationalists
will come out of the next campaign in
a position to dictate so far as the
House of Commons is concerned on all
matters of legislation relating to Ire-
land. While it is firmly believed that
the House of Lords will find itself so
badly crippled at the finish of the
campaign that it will have no disposi-
tion to make another fight against
the House of Commons, even with an
Irish parliament as the bone of con-
tention. From the news received of
Mr. O'Connor's mission, it seems al-
together probable that the war chest
will be well filled with American dol-
lars.

Most Reverent Patrick McKenna,
who was consecrated as the new Bishop
of Clogher, in the Cathedral, Mon-
aghan, recently, made some interesting
statements in reply to addresses. In
the course of these he expressed his
wholehearted support of the Irish party
and declared the imperative need for
the maintenance of the party and a
solid national organization. He de-
scribed the Irish party as a "great
party," and pointed out that the "sil-
ver lining" in the cloud of Ireland's
sorrow came with the advent of an
Irish parliamentary party.

The Protestant Archbishop of Dub-
lin in his address to the Kildare Dio-
cesan Synod, said that every diocesan
fund except two showed a falling off
in amount. The total decrease amount-
ed to 336 pounds. In a year and a
half from the present time the census
would be held, and they would know
the exact number of their Protestant
people. He was afraid that it would
be found that they had decreased in
number. Discussing the financial po-
sition of the church, the Archbishop
said that the social condition of Ire-
land had undergone a change which
amounted to little less than a revolu-
tion and the means of many Protest-
ants had been greatly diminished. He
feared that these were cases in which
people thought that the diminution of
income was a sufficient excuse for
not contributing as largely as they
might to their church's end.

"A selection from the Writings and
correspondence of Charlotte Grace
O'Brien," edited with a memoir, by
Stephen Gwynn, M. P., is the title of a
book which will be published shortly
by Maunsel & Co., Dublin. Miss Char-
lotte Grace O'Brien, daughter of Wil-
liam Smith O'Brien, the only one of
his children who shared his national
opinions, was the authoress of a novel,
"Light and Shade," dealing with the
Fenian movement, and of two volumes
of verse, as well as many scattered
contributions through English and
Irish periodicals. She possessed re-
markable gifts as a writer, but to the
public at large she was chiefly known
by her work in connection with emi-
gration. In '81 and '83, when the rush
was most appalling, she set herself
to reform the conditions of steerage
passengers and accommodation for
the emigrants, both in Queenstown
and New York, opening a common
lodging house in Queenstown, and her-
self crossing the Atlantic as a steer-
age passenger. This public work,
added to her private connections,
brought her into contact with some
leading personages on both sides of
the Atlantic, and the history of her
career, as well as a sketch of her origi-
nal and striking personality, has been
given in a full memoir by her nephew,
Stephen Gwynn, who has selected for
the volume those of her essays and
verses which seemed of special merit.

One of the last links in connection
with the visit of Father Matthew to
County Wexford, Ireland, has been
sundered by the death, in his eighty-
eighth year, of George C. Roberts, of
Summer Hill, Enniscorthy. When
Father Matthew went to Enniscorthy,
April 7, 1840, he was met by a fairly
large body of total abstainers, with their
president, Joshua Roberts, accompan-
ied by the Presentation convent, where
Father Matthew administered the
pledge, and by his side were Josua
Roberts and his son. His memory
was keen to the last, and he had many
thrilling tales of the famine period. He
was fond of telling his recollections

of Father Matthew, Gen. Cloney and
Daniel O'Connell.

Great interest has been excited here
by a statement concerning a Mormon
crusade in Ireland published in the
newspaper, "Sin Fein." "We have it
on the most reliable authority," says
"Sin Fein," "that the Mormons have
paid several visits to houses in the
suburbs of Dublin, for the purpose of
inducing young women to go to the
Mormon colony in Utah, in the United
States.

"Their method of procedure is to
hold out promises of farms and com-
fortable homes to young women of
whom they expound the doctrines in a
most plausible manner. Mormon lit-
erature is being extensively circulated
in various parts of the city."

It will probably surprise many read-
ers of Irish history to learn that as
late as eighty-five years ago an Irish
Catholic could not open a school with-
out the license of the Protestant bishop
of the diocese in which the school
was situated. Yet that such is the
fact is evident from a most interest-
ing document printed in the current
issue of the Waterford Archaeological
Journal, from the pen of Rev. Patrick
Power. From this document it ap-
pears that Rev. Garret Connolly was
licensed by the Protestant bishop of
Waterford and Lismore, on April 2,
1819, "to teach youth and keep a
boarding school in our diocese afore-
said." At that date Father Connolly
was president of St. John's College,
Waterford, whence he was promoted
in 1820, to the pastoral charge of Dun-
garvan, whence he was transferred to
Lismore, in 1828.

ANSON RETURNS.

Suffolk Hares Not Exhibited at San
Antonio.

Billy Anson has returned from a trip
to the San Antonio fair, where he had
several Suffolk Punch mares, one suf-
folk Punch colt and several Steeldust
stallions. These horses did not ar-
rive in San Antonio at the opening of
the fair and Mr. Anson was not per-
mitted to exhibit them. He had difficulty,
in fact, in securing stable room at the
fair grounds. Incidentally Mr. Anson,
who has attended all sorts of fairs in
his time, is not overly impressed with
the greatness of the article served at
San Antonio.

ATTENDING SYNOD.

Judge John I. Gulon of Ballinger, in
the City.

Judge John I. Gulon of Ballinger, is
here attending the Synod. Judge Gulon
is one of the speakers on the program
for the West Texas Development Con-
gress. He declares that Runnels
county will send a big delegation here
for this meeting. Judge Gulon also
attended school with Judge Lurton,
who has frequently been mentioned as
the possible successor to Judge Peck-
ham on the United States supreme
court.

"Judge Lurton was a gangling, awk-
ward country boy at Lebanon," says
Judge Gulon, "but he was as bright
as a basket of chips. He is a sturdy
thinker, a great worker and has made
a great record on the bench. But as
a boy no one ever picked him for such
distinction, but we all regarded him

RESCUING PARTY WORKING IN MINE

HUNDRED DEAD BODIES FOUND HUDDLED AT FOOT OF SHAFT.

FLAMES ARE SUBDUED

Many Bodies Identified, But Others Found Are Charred Beyond Recognition.

Publishers Press.

Cherry, Ill., Nov. 19.—A hundred dead bodies were found huddled close together at the foot of the shaft in the St. Paul mine today by a rescuing party, which brought five dead men to the surface this afternoon and continued the work under difficulties tonight. Chicago firemen arrived today and are at work in the mine, where they have the flames subdued, but not yet extinguished.

Crowds around the mine are greater than ever, and when the dead bodies were brought out it took a force of three hundred soldiers in keeping them back, the greater part of which is composed of relatives of the miners.

Some of the bodies recovered were identified, but many others were merely the charred remains and recognition was impossible.

While many have volunteered service as rescuers, the party which is entering the mine is composed chiefly of soldiers.

Each talker impressed the Synod with the necessity of converting the immigrants, Mexicans and others in America into the Protestant faith, and cited instances to prove their statements.

All the delegates were in attendance at noon Friday in the dining room of the church, where they were tendered a banquet by the ladies and deacons of the church.

Among the visitors at this gathering of the Synod are Rev. C. L. Voss, a missionary of Africa, Dr. H. H. Sweet, Secretary of Ministerial Education and Relief of Louisville, Rev. TWO COUNTIES ADDED TO LIST

TARRANT AND BEXAR GIVEN A VOICE IN CONGRESS.

BIG CROWDS COMING

Orient Gives No Satisfaction About Special Sleeper—Santa Fe May Be Selected.

At a meeting of the general committee having charge of the preliminaries of the West Texas Development Congress, which will hold its initial meeting in this city on December 6 next, held Friday afternoon, it was decided to take in Tarrant and Bexar counties and permit them to be a part of West Texas. This action was taken as the result of demands from Fort Worth and San Antonio. These two cities set forth that they are a part and parcel of the West and that they just had to have a voice in matters that concern them so vitally. Both these cities will send big delegations to the Congress. Chairman Bartholomew Friday received advice from Hon. Charles H. Jenkins of Brownwood, to the effect that he will positively be present at the Congress and that he will address the gathering on the subject of "Our Relations With North, East and Central Texas, and How They Can Be Improved." Judge Jenkins is thoroughly qualified to handle this topic and his address should contain food for great thought.

J. M. Radford, one of the real capitalists of industry, whose home is in Abilene, and who has large mercantile establishments over a large portion of West Texas, writes that he is in full accord with the movement, and that it is his intention to be present when the Congress meets. Appointments of delegates from Floydada, Briscoe county, Canyon City and Borden county were received Friday. In fact, names of delegates appointed are now fairly pouring in. As soon as these names are received Secretary Dalley, who is keeping abreast with this work in a manner that marks him as being just the man for the place, promptly writes the gentlemen named to be delegates and outlines the objects of the Congress. In this manner an interest is aroused in the work that will be reflected by a large attendance when the Congress convenes.

The Press-News is yet unable to announce whether or not the Orient (and will be able to secure a sleeper for the Abilene trip. The Orient officials have not supplied the information. In the event the Orient can't deliver the goods in this respect, then the Abilene trip will be made over the Santa Fe, leaving here at 2 o'clock Sunday afternoon and reaching Abilene just before midnight the same night. Returning it is thought that arrangements can be made to get back here by Tuesday morning, but in the event this cannot be done, it is certain that the people going can get back not later than Tuesday afternoon on the Santa Fe. Fair notice, however, is given that those who have agreed to go on the special sleeper will be expected to go over the Santa Fe in the event the special sleeper can't be secured.

The outlook for the success of the Congress could not be brighter.

WHITE RABBIT
IS PICKED UP
IN MID-GULF

Galveston, Nov. 19.—A white rabbit picked up in a box in mid-ocean more than 400 miles from land, was brought into port by the fishing schooner, Mendocino. It was more dead than alive when rescued from the sea. Marks of the wooden box indicated that the bunny was shipped from some point in Pennsylvania to Liverpool, and that it evidently sailed from New York aboard some ship about October 1. Mariners calculated that the heavy box containing the rabbit followed the ocean currents along the Atlantic and striking the Gulf stream, had about completed the circuit and traversed about 2000 miles before rescued by the merest chance. The rabbit evidently had been out of food for many days, but was suffering more for the want of water. The schooner's crew will keep it as the boat's mascot.

NEW MEXICO DAM
WORLD'S BIGGEST

TREATY WITH MEXICO BEING
CARRIED OUT.

FORTY MILES IN LENGTH

Great Project Will Have Capacity of
Holding Three Years' Flow of
Rio Grande.

Publishers Press.

El Paso, Nov. 19.—The United States Senatorial Irrigation Committee headed by Senator Carter, spent the day at the Elephant Butte dam site, located north of here, in the territory of New Mexico. This is the greatest irrigation project in America and it is even larger than the Assouan dam in Egypt, which makes it the biggest in the world.

Eight million dollars will be expended on this project, and eight years' time will be consumed in its construction. It will be forty miles in length and will have a capacity of holding three years' flow of the Rio Grande.

Built between two banks of solid rock, the dam will irrigate 225,000 acres of land in New Mexico, Texas and Mexico.

A treaty of obligation is being carried out with the government of Mexico in the building of the dam. That country compelled for twenty years against the stoppage of the flow of the Rio Grande by denuding the Colorado watershed and the matter was finally settled by treaty.

NEW JOB FOR WOMEN.

St. Louis "Whisk Broom Club" Takes Work of Cleaning Cars.

St. Louis, Nov. 19.—The woman's "Whisk Broom Club" again turned out to help clean the Spring avenue cars. Men and women from all walks of life did a most thorough job. Calculated to shame the United Railways Company.

They boarded the cars by twos, armed with whisk brooms and dusters, and escorted the passengers to their seats with much pomp and ceremony. Each seat was carefully dusted before anyone was allowed to sit down.

They even dusted the clothing of passengers before they alighted, and apologized for the condition of the cars to strangers. The windows were cleaned and the platforms and floors swept.

The women in the party were forced to abandon their efforts to board the cars after an hour's work because the crews had evidently been given orders not to stop where whisk brooms, feather dusters or brushes were in sight. So the task was left to the more agile men.

MILES SECURES WATER SYSTEM

CITIZENS VOTE A BOND ISSUE AMOUNTING TO \$20,000.

WELLS FURNISH SUPPLY

Pipes Will Be Extended to All Parts of the City—Mayor Graves Comments On City's Growth.

Miles, the growing town on the Santa Fe, has at last solved the water problem that has confronted it for many years. The citizens held an election Wednesday for the purpose of voting \$20,000 worth of water bonds in order to give the city a water system. The election was carried in favor of the bonds, in a vote of 103 to 50.

Work on laying the pipe and building the necessary houses for the water works will start immediately. The whole city, residence and business section, will be furnished with water

pipes. About three and one-half miles of pipes will be laid.

"The water will be obtained from wells," said Mayor Geo. S. Graves, who is in the city on business. "The first well that will be used is one dug by the Sunflower road. It is a fine one and has clear, sparkling water. There are several more good wells in the city, and in a course of time all of them will be put into use.

"Miles is simply on a boom. Now that we have a sure prospect of getting a good water system, that means a world to the town.

"We have San Angelo beat this year in cotton. As well as I remember, something like 3500 bales have been ginned in the town, and about one thousand bales are in the yards ready for sale. The cotton crop around Miles this year is very short, but in comparison to other places, it is mighty good.

"Several new buildings are going up. Those that were burned in September are about ready to be put in use again. They will be much finer houses than before. The building operations I might say are very rapidly progressing and are keeping pace with West Texas. That is pretty fast, you know."
