FRIDAY, MAY 11, WAS a date most vivid in the memory of the people of our little sister town to the north of Stanton—Lenora—for it was on Sunday, May 11, 1947, at 6 p.m., that a cyclone struck there. It left in its wake many thousands of dollars worth of property damaged and destroyed, and some 15 people injured, some seriously. One was so seriously injured by a wall of the house in which he was a guest, falling on him, he died of the injuries.

The storm visited the Lenora community, following two days of rain falling which amounted to four or five inches. The skies were clearing and the people were rejoicing in anticipation of clear weather for the growing of bumper crops, when an angry black cloud approached Lenora from the west-northwest. From its bosom dropped a demon monster that twisted and squirmed like a mammoth serpent, leaving in its wake smashed homes, demolished business places, school building down, and some 15 persons hurt.

At that time the Martin County Memorial Hospital was located in a building in the block now owned by Bentley's furniture store. The injured were brought to that hospital. News of the cyclone spread rapidly and doctors and nurses from neighboring towns were soon on the scene contributing their services to the injured.

The people of the Lenora community will always carry a warm spot in their hearts for the Martin County Memorial Hospital as a haven that performed invaluable service to the unfortunate victims of the storm on May 11, 1947.

All the property destroyed by the cyclone has been built back. The town is brand new looking, and this progressive little community is back in full swing thanks to the enterprising spirit of the populace.

Martin To Get Another Wildcat

Perkins, Prother Company of Wichita Falls No. 1-A G. H. Cowden, is to be drilled as a Grayburg wildcat in Southwest Martin County, 22 miles west of Stanton.

Operators staked location 660 feet from north and west lines of section 31, block 39, T-1-N, T&P survey.

One of the most important discoveries in the fringe area around Martin County was completed this week.

The strike, Gulf Oil Corporation No. 1-L Scharbauer Cattle Company, depleted Ellenburger discovery adjacent to the south line of Martin County, 24 miles west of Stanton, was finalized as a flowing discovery from the Pennsylvania.

The new field opener was finalized for a 24-hour flowing potential of 336 barrels of 58.5 gravity oil, through an 18/64-inch choke and perforations from 10,414 to 10,495 feet. Gas-oil ratio was 7,441-1, with a gas volume of 2,500,000 cubic feet daily.

Tubing pressure was 2,600 pounds, and casing pressure 1,600 pounds.

The project originally was completed as the discovery well of the Ruth Scharbauer (Ellenburger) field in April, 1955.

Location is 1,980 feet from east and 660 feet from south lines of section 3, block 39, T-1-S, T&P survey.

D. W. Varel No. 2 E. W. Richardson, project in West Howard County, will be drilled to 3,300 feet in the Varel (San Andres) field.

Location is 1,665.6 feet from south and 1,669 feet from west lines of section 8, block 33, T-1-N, T&P survey.

Gas Refund Forms For Fuel Used On Farms Available

Good records will make the job of repairing a claim for a refund on gasoline used on the farm easier, and the farm tractor a more efficient production tool, County Agent Gerald Hanson said this week.

To get a refund, a farmer must file after June 30 and before October 1, a claim with the District Director of Internal Revenue covering the gasoline used during the first six months of the year. After 1956 refunds will be made for a one-year period from July 1 to June 30.

Refunds will be made only on gasoline used on a farm for farming purposes. They will not include gasoline used in cars or trucks used on the highways even though on farm business. The recently enacted law also applies to diesel and other motor fuels, Hanson said.

Regulations relating to the new law will be issued as soon as possible. In the meantime, the local agent advised farmers to keep a good set of records on all gasoline or other fuels; included under the legislation and used on the farm.

Claim forms for refunds are now available at the county agents office in Stanton.

Agent Advocates Early Cotton Control Measures

"Early season control of cotton insects will set fruit that will be the first cotton to open next fall which in turn should bring the best price," County Agent Gerald Hanson said Wednesday.

"I have plenty of information available in printed form in my office and would like to discuss with cotton producers the best way and time to apply insecticides," he continued.

W. L. Owen, A&M extension station entomologist conducted a test in Lubbock last year and found that early season cotton insect control grossed him \$50.44 an acre more than where early season control wasn't practiced.

Owen used only two or three early season methods, Hanson said. The total cost of the three operations will not cost over \$3 the entomologist discovered.

Hanson stated that the time was now ripe in Martin County to start making plans for control.

Too Much Speed Can Be Your Doom . . .

To many of those whose feet like to press hard on the accelerator, Texas highway signs limiting speeds to 60 miles per hour in daylight and 55 miles at night seem to make little sense.

One can hardly venture on the highways but he notices that more cars operate in excess of 60 miles an hour than at or below that speed. Most drivers do not believe in signs. And most drivers seem to take an almost nonchalant view toward highway mortality as something that happens to others but will never happen to them.

But in time the speed demon finds too late that something can and does happen to him. He becomes a statistic. He disappears into a hole in the ground.

It is well to remember that kinetic energy, which is the impact with which an automobile or truck hits something, varies with the square of the velocity. For instance, the speed with which a car would strike an obstacle or another car at even 60 miles an hour as against 40 miles an hour is as 3,600 to 1,600, or more than twice. Thus the higher of the two speeds, although it is only half again as great as the lesser speed, causes an accident twice as disastrous in all of its effects on materials, inert or living.

Moreover, 60 miles an hour is about 90 feet per second, and 40 miles an hour is about 60 feet per second. If a driver barreling along at 60 miles an hour has one second of awareness of an impending accident. He will have traveled half a gain as far by the time he acts. His car thereafter will decelerate only about half as fast.

Only one conclusion is possible. Even at 60 miles, the legal daylight limit in Texas, probability of having an accident is twice as great as at 40 miles, and the impact of collision will be twice as severe as at 40 miles.—Austin Statesman.

The Chamber of Commerce has proposed a general work program to restore Evergreen to the restful spot it has always been. It will take time and money. When you are approached for a donation to this much needed project please respond generously. The small mounds of sand needs to be removed and the foundations of the grave markers and some of the curbing needs to be bolstered. If you can't work actively as a member of the community team to remove the sand then make a contribution for or toward a day's work for a man to help with the program. You will feel better for having done so.

Philosopher Has New Economic Law On Thrift

Editor's Note: The Martin County Philosopher on his Johnson grass farm on Mustang Draw discusses economics this week, which he's as good as as he is anything else. If you follow us.

Dear editor: Everybody is worried about the farmer these days, but that's because they don't understand the long-range situation.

I got to thinking about this after I read in a magazine which I picked up for a few minutes in the drug store in town the other day. I know druggists object to people reading their magazines without buying em but I've seen druggists around looking at my cows without offering to buy any. I figure it's even, at any rate, what I read was an article saying that farmers are whipping the situation they're in by taking jobs in town.

A neighbor of mine says farming has come to a sorry state when a farmer has to work in town to stay on the farm in the country, but I don't look at it that way. That is, while personally I'm not interested in working in town, I'm not even very interested in working in the country. It's all right with me if others want to.

Actually, they're only following one of the laws of economics, which apparently a lot of people don't understand.

The law is that during a depression city people go to the farm to work and stay alive, and during prosperity, farmers go to town to work to stay alive.

There's nothing wrong with this law, but you've got to understand it to get along.

You've got to remember that prosperity for everybody is fine, but prosperity for everybody all at the same time is a reckless sort of thing. It's sort of like having everybody save all his money at the same time. If you're going to get ahead, there's got to be somebody left you can get ahead of. Thrift and economy are fine things, but you get everybody to practicing it all at the same time and business would dry up like a water hole in a long drought.

This country needs thrifty people, but they ought to remember that a certain part of the advantage of their thriftiness is based on the free-spending of others. There's nothing better for the stability of the country than a savings account, but you've got to remember also if everybody saved everything, the lending business would be a tough go. As I see it, this country's economy is based on two things: thrift and the no-down-payment.

True Christian Is More Than Churchgoer

Paul was brought up as a Pharisee in the strict letter of the law. The Pharisees were the party of strict observance. We must not imagine that Jesus thought ill of them or criticized them lightly.

It was precisely because the Pharisees were so devout and earnest that Jesus used them often for illustration, to show that a man might observe all the outward properties of religion and yet lack its inward reality and grace.

If we substitute "church member" for "Pharisee" we might obtain clearer insight into what Jesus meant. Mere membership in a church does not make any man what he ought to be. Some who have been punctilious in all outward observances have often been lacking in the elemental Christian virtues.

If we think of a man going up to the throne of God and claiming salvation because of what he was or what he had done, we can then, by contrast, understand

what is meant by salvation by faith, which comes to us through the grace of God.

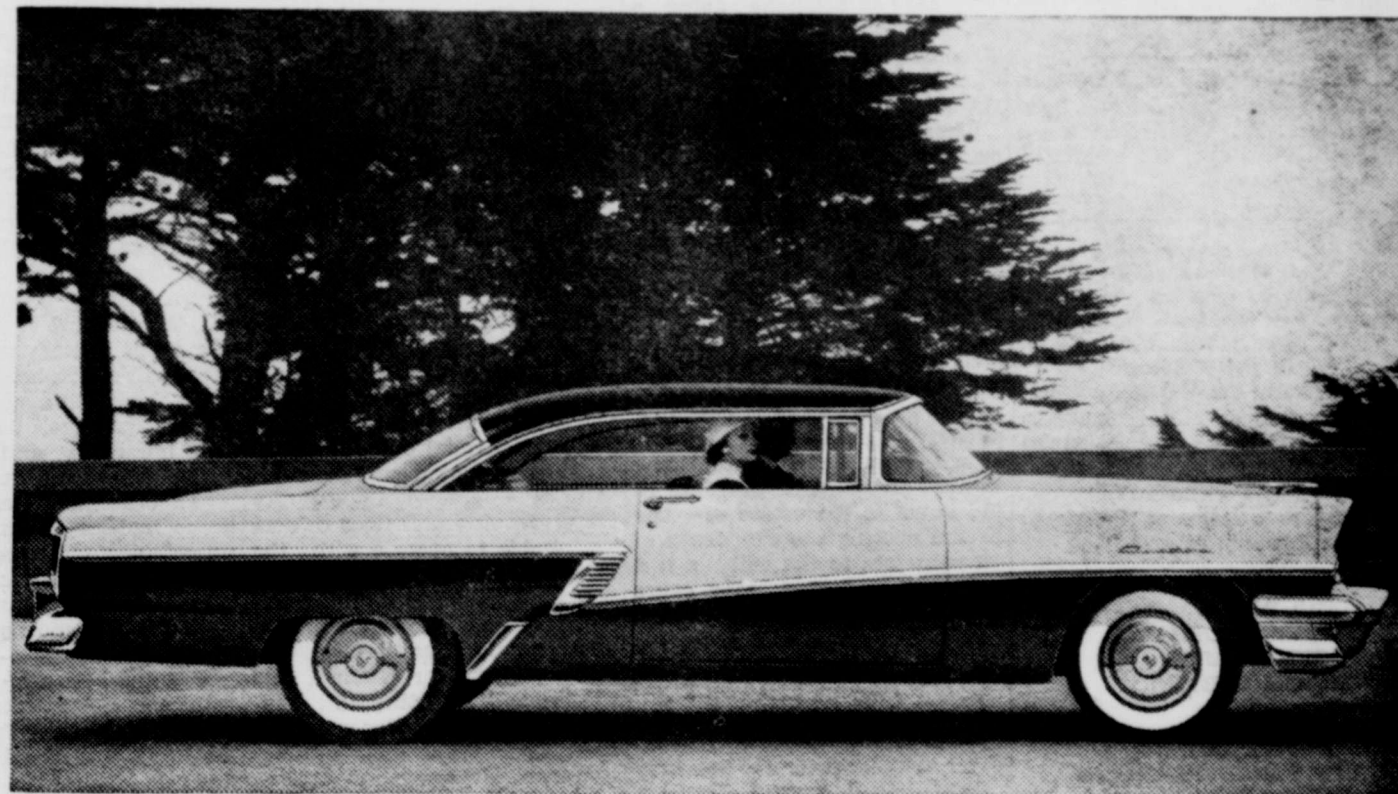

HOW TO CHANGE OR REVOKE A WILL

Changing and revoking wills
has involved many an estate in
litigation because the proper
legal methods were not used
and the statutes were not fol-
lowed.

Take the case of Mr. S. Some-
time ago he went into his law-
yer's office and laid in front of
his attorney a will which had
been prepared for him about a
year previously. He said that he
had made a few changes in it
and wanted to know whether his
attorney thought the change was
all right.

Mr. S. was attempting to
change two items of his will by
drawing lines through certain
words in these items and inter-
lining, in his own handwriting,
the changes he wanted. He was
not attempting to revoke his en-
tire will but merely trying to
change these two items.

If Mr. S. were to die with his
will in that condition, the prob-
ate court would not recognize
the changes that he had made,
but would probably probate the
will as it was originally written.
Mr. S. was surprised to learn this
and immediately requested that
a new will be prepared.

After the will has been once
executed, changes cannot be
made legally by crossing out
parts of a will and interlining
corrections or additions. To
change a will, an entirely new
will must be written and prop-
erly executed or an addition by
way of a codicil should be ex-
ecuted.

But suppose you want to re-
voke your will entirely. Here a-
gain, the surest and most ef-
fective method is to execute a
new will or codicil.

Since a will does not take ef-
fect until the death of the per-
son making it, the provisions of
the will should be reviewed by
the maker at least once a year
to be sure that changing condi-
tions and circumstances have
not been such as to require a
modification of the will. It is
very easy to postpone doing a
thing of this kind, but failure to
do so may result in the intentions
of the maker of the will being
thwarted to a certain extent.

There are many changing cir-
cumstances which would be
brought to his attention if a
person would review his will at
least in the light of circumstan-
ces at the time.

Such things as deaths among
the legatees or devisees named
in his will, births, marriages or
divorces in the family, accidents
or sickness among the close re-
latives which make it desirable
to increase or decrease the a-
mount given certain ones, sub-
stantial increase or decrease in
the value of the estate of the
person making the will, death of
all witnesses to the will and
many other factors, may cause
a person to want to execute a
new will or add a codicil to his
old one.

Poultry Trends Indicate Larger Flocks In 1956

An increase in the size and
number of commercial laying
flocks in Texas indicates a trend
toward a higher per cent of high
quality eggs reaching the con-
sumer. This means a highly com-
petitive commodity is being pro-
duced in Texas, says John G. Mc-
Haney, extension economist.

A larger and earlier hatch of
chicks for laying flock replace-
ment has developed in 1956 than
was present in 1955. January
hatchery output of replacement
chicks was 26 per cent above
last year, and on February 1 the
number of eggs in incubators
was 21 per cent above that of a
year ago.

Because of the increase in lay-
ing flock replacements, egg pro-
duction after the middle of the
year will probably be increased
over that of 1955. This will prob-
ably bring poultrymen lower
prices in the latter part of 1956
than at the same period last
year, says McHaney.

During the past few years the
number of layers on the farm, as
well as the number of small
poultry flocks has decreased. The
rate of lay, however, has in-
creased, and there has been in-
creasing commercialization of
poultry flocks.

As a number of areas in the
state are developing large com-
mercial flocks, emphasis is be-
ing placed on feeding, manage-
ment, marketing, and other
factors aimed at building a more
efficient operation. This enables
large commercial operators to
produce at a lower cost per unit,
assuring a greater opportunity
for profit. As small flock owners
are unable to operate with the
efficiency of management that
is made possible by a large com-
mercial flock, they are kept at
an economic disadvantage. To
insure volume for efficient and
profitable marketing distribu-
tion, small egg producers will
have to increase their produc-
tion, says McHaney.

Census Bureau Releases Report On Martin Co.

Establishments providing per-
sonal services numbered 8 and
reported receipts of \$95,000. Es-
tablishments primarily engaged
in automotive repair, parking
and other automotive services
numbered 2.

"Personal services" group in-
cludes such businesses as barber
and beauty shops, cleaning and
dyeing plants, laundries and
laundry services, garment al-
teration and repair services, fun-
eral services, photographic stud-
ios, shoe repair shops and shine
parlors, as well as other per-
sonal services.

"Automotive services" group
includes general automobile re-
pair shops, battery service shops,
tire repair shops, body repair and
paint shops, automobile rentals,
storage garages, parking lots,
auto laundries, and other mis-
cellaneous automotive services.

"All other selected services" group
includes business services, mis-
cellaneous repair services, am-
usement and recreation ser-
vices, motion pictures, hotels
tourist courts, motels and camps.

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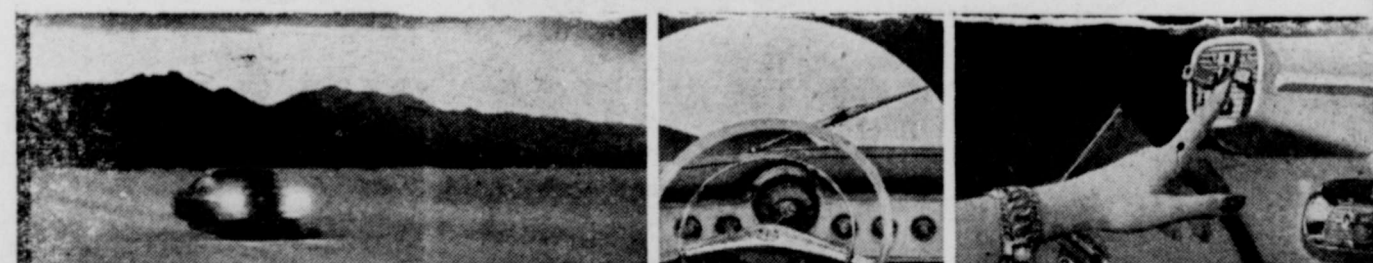

AUSTIN, Tex.—Two outstanding Texans, who have contributed greatly to the cultural and educational life of Texas, were honored by the Texas Heritage Foundation.

Miss Ima Hoeg of Houston received the Texian Woman of the Year award.

Texian Man of the Year honors went to H. H. Coffield of Rockdale.

Awards were presented by Foundation President Paul Wakefield at a banquet where Governor Shivers, honorary chairman of the Foundation, was principal speaker.

Miss Hoeg is the daughter of the first native Texan to serve his state as its Chief Executive. Said Wakefield "She has lived and furthered her great family tradition of service to humanity that was passed on to her by her illustrious father."

Of Coffield he said: "After graduating with highest honors from the university of adversity, in the rural area of Milam County, Pete Coffield lingered on the campus at Rockdale to become his native city's first citizen. His genius for multiple affairs and love of people soon spread his horizon to the borders of his state and beyond."

Stock Fraud Charged

Two Austin companies are defending themselves in district court here against charges of fraudulent stock selling.

A temporary restraining order is sought by the State against American Guaranty Underwriters, Inc., and the Karisch Company, Inc.

Calvin C. Huffman, American Guaranty president, denied the charges. His company was issued 25,000 shares of Karisch stock to cover a \$9,500 loan, he said.

"No stock of the Karisch Co. was sold to the public," said Huffman. "Nor have any of the officers named received a ny commissions."

In its allegations the state accused American Guaranty of collecting "gross and exhorbi-

tant commissions" on stock sales.

Insurance Change Sought

Just how valuable are treatments with fire-resistant chemicals, when it comes to reducing insurance risks? This question will be decided by the Texas Insurance Commission.

Texas Chemical Fireproofing Co. has asked that insurance credit on chemically fireproofed public buildings be extended from 15 to 25 per cent. Sen. Grady Hazlewood of Amarillo, representing the company, made the application.

A group of casualty companies, represented by the Texas Insurance Advisory Association, opposes the change.

Election Law Change Viewed

A movement to insure reporters the right to cover precinct conventions may be spearheaded by the Texas Press Association.

Under the Texas Election Code only a qualified voter in the precinct may "vote, be present at, or participate in, the business of such a convention."

TPA President Russell W. Bryant has suggested deletion of the words "be present at" from the law. He indicated the matter would probably be considered at the TPA convention in Amarillo next month.

Three precinct chairmen in Travis County refused reporters admission to conventions this year.

Thus to the reader the "cat's out of the bag" why the reprint of the message in this issue of The Reporter. It is due to the fact the present editor wanted to say something to the graduates and didn't know how to say it until this editorial loomed. Here it is:

Ever since the day we shot the first paper wad at the school teacher and it took effect on the back of her neck, we have had a most warm and lasting feeling for the students of the school. The shooting of the wad warranted an occasion that wanted a life-time remembrance of the school room for as the days passed beyond the goal from which the paper wad took its effect, we sat down with a considerable degree of delicacy and precaution—as perchance there were eggs in our seat, and we were on a wager we could sit on them without as much as cracking a shell of one. Then, we remember when we put gum in the head of hair of our classmate who sat in front of us, and how we laughed the next day he came back to school with a patch of baldness on his head where mother had taken the shears and cut out a swath of hair in order to remove the "glueiness" of our handiwork. Little thought of the "crime," except the fellow upon whom it was perpetrated, when we were given permission by the teacher to leave the room during study hour and we slipped into the dinner bucket of our classmate, ate his big red apple and a slice of peach buttered bread. Across several seats sat the little blue-eyed (we never cared much the color of her eye, just so she was pretty), girl we thought was an angel sent down from heaven and we passed her a note, and she attempted to send us an answer when the teacher intervened, and we, manlike and courageous, we talked the teacher into believing we were all to blame, and accept the application of the smarting peach tree limb which was administered after school. These were halcyon days for this scribe when he went to school.

You Seniors didn't indulge in those pastimes while coming up through your school days. We've just wondered if you aren't smarter than the school children back in our day. For instance, we deemed it a treat to ride in a buggy drawn by a high-stepping horse on Sunday, or any other day. A 60-mile travel in a day by horse and buggy was considered a mark of speed and distance set to shoot at. Now a day's travel by airplane will take you from coast to coast. A little slower method of travel is by automobile—60 to 80 miles per hour. You don't have to carry in the wood—you cook with electricity and gas. You ring the bell to a telephone and the girl at the other end says "yes" or "no," whichever her attitude may be toward accepting your company, for a date. For complexion we used cold water wash for the face and Bay Rum for the hair. We shined our shoes and boots with stove polish and greased them with hog tallow. Now when you shine your shoes and wear them a few times you lay them aside for a new and more up-to-date pair. We courted our girl in the parlor, and the time limit set by the boss of the household was never beyond 10 p.m. and you better never have waited for the second command. Now the courting is in automobiles, and no limit is set for the hour to refrain from the practice. Then you helped mother wash the dishes, sweep the floor, and make up the beds. Now lipstick, rouge, looking glass and many solutions of perfumed skin water, have taken their place.

So, we say, we wonder with the speediness of the times, if it hasn't brought a change in the minds of the present day students, in that they are more alert and grasps things more rapidly than in days ago. There are 31 Senior graduates of the Stanton High School this year. They have finished all the high school requirements, fitting themselves to enter the higher school of learning to equip themselves to start their battle in the world of hard knocks.

This writer has no suggestion or advice to give, unless it be to warn the graduate there will be no silver platters with gold bullion handed to them. The start up the ladder to reach success will be from the first rung.

to fight and provide for itself. The eagle, not the oyster, was chosen as the symbol of America.

Watkins said that all are influenced by heredity and environment but are free to choose whether to be lazy and take it easy or to buckle down; to tell the truth and accept responsibility or evade responsibility, to lose one's temper or to behave.

"We are descendants of those who said 'Give me liberty or give me death,' but many of us have just cut it down to 'Gimme.'"

Watkins told the group in explaining that many believe the world owes them a living, that they can earn without effort. "The best contribution you can give to the world is yourself at your best," Watkins said. "But to be at your best you must have discipline." He went on to say there are two kinds of discipline—restraint and cultivation and that we mature as we accept responsibility and apply discipline to ourselves.

He closed by saying "The best thing others can say of you is 'you came to us just when we needed you most.'"

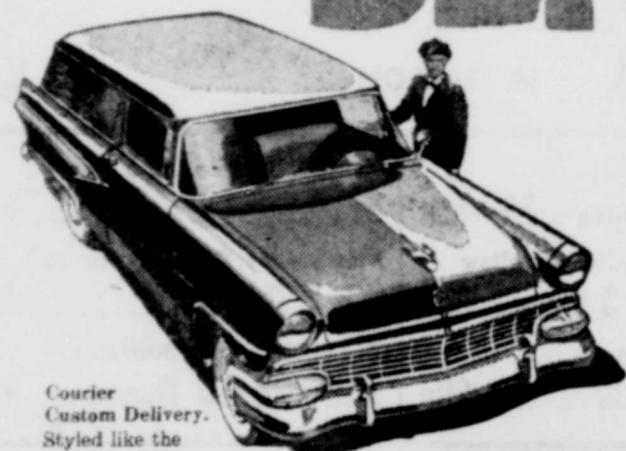

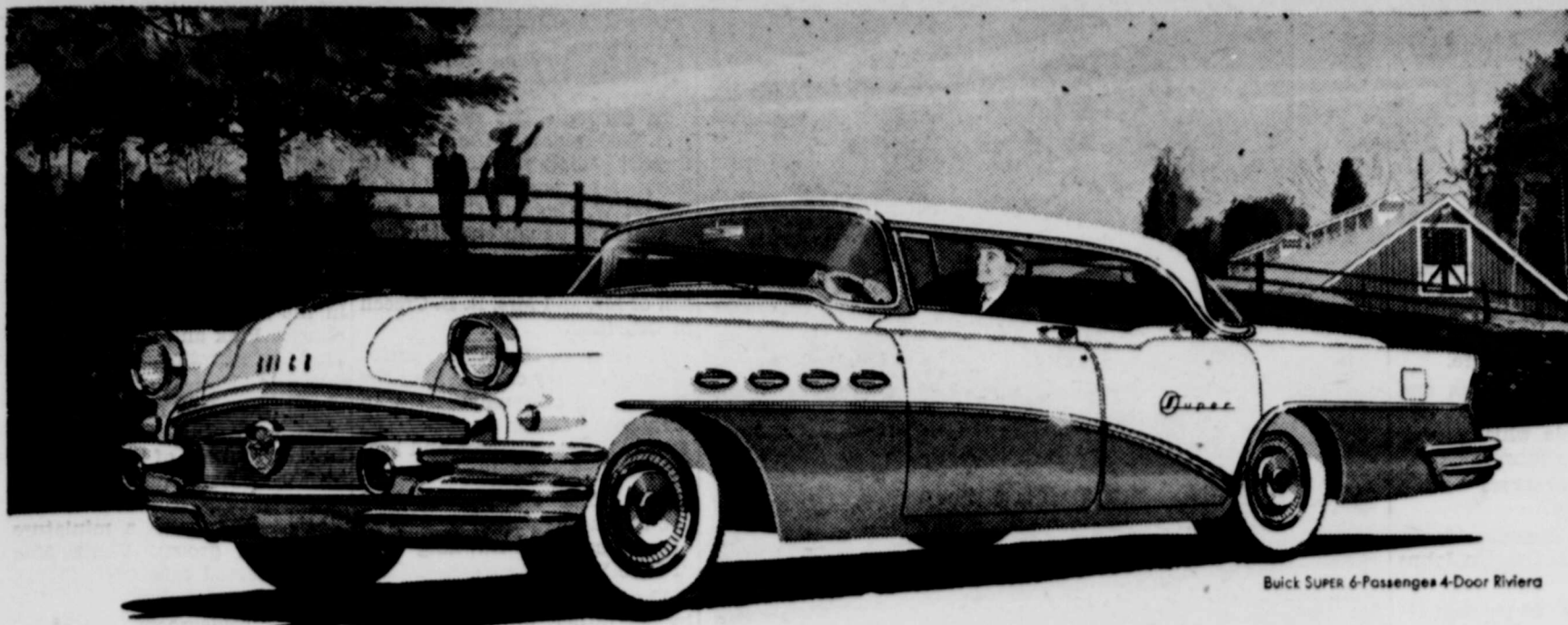

Continuing response to the offer of free booklets and ad reprints from the program has swelled to 28,000 letters and postal cards received from all over the United States and several foreign countries. 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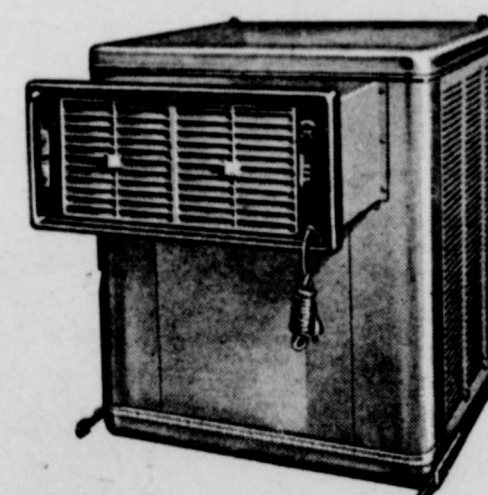
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
