GUIDELINES AVAILABLE FOR U. S. TAXPAYERS

District Director Ellis Campbell Jr., announced today that Internal Revenue will again provide guidelines for taxpayers residing in Texas for estimating sales tax deductions for 1963.

The guidelines which will be provided for taxpayers in each of the 38 states with general sales tax laws are set out in tables showing residents' average sales tax payments. Taxpayers who itemize deductions on federal income tax returns form 1040 may use the tables.

Sales tax tables will be available in the District Directors' offices on or about December 1, 1963.

FOUR AUTO ACCIDENTS IN MITCHELL COUNTY IN OCT.

During the month of October Mitchell County had a total of four highway accidents with no fatalities. Fisher County had 7 accidents, 1 fatal. Nolan County had 14 accidents with 1 fatality. Scurry County had 9 accidents with no fatalities. The four county area had 34 accidents with 2 fatalities. The report was broken down as follows:

Fisher County 7 accidents, 2 deaths, 2 injured and property damage of \$13,700. Mitchell County had 4 accidents, no deaths, 1 injured and property damage of \$1,730. Nolan County had 14 accidents, 1 death, 6 injured and property damage of \$5,155. Scurry County had 9 accidents, 3 deaths, 5 injured and property damage of \$4,030. Total property damage for the four county area was \$32,985.

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Cotton Samples Decline In Cotton Office

Completion of the cotton harvest in some localities and rain caused a further decline in sample receipts at the U.S.D.A.'s Cotton Classing Office in Abilene, Texas. According to B. B. Manly, Jr., Officer-in-Charge, receipts totaled 29,656 bales for the week ending November 15, 1963. This brought the season's total to 282,105 bales as compared to 148,031 bales at the same date last season. Mr. Manly estimates the cotton harvest, in the area served by the Abilene Classing Office, to be about 70 percent complete.

The area surrounded by Dickens, Sterling, Runnels, and Jones counties composes District 2. This area accounted for about 21,000 of the samples received last week.

Grades remained about the same as the preceding week, with 9 percent of the cotton classed as White cotton, 86 percent was Light Spotted, and 5 percent was Spotted. Middling Light Spot was the predominant grade, making up 63 percent of the total samples classed.

A slight increase was noted in staple length. Three percent was called 7.8 and shorter; 64 percent was 29.32; 32 percent was 15.16, and 1 percent was 31.32 and longer.

Microaire readings were as follows: One percent, 3.0 to 3.4; 6 percent, 3.5 to 3.9; 41 percent, 4.0 through 4.4; 45 percent, 4.5 through 4.9; and 7 percent, "miked" 5.0 and higher.

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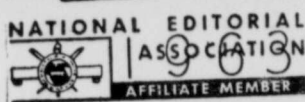

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Farm Facts

Fluorescent powder, a material often used in law enforcement, now is used by scientists in tracking boll weevils.

The technique was developed at the South Carolina Agricultural Experiment Station and with it workers are able to "tag" weevils with a coating of the powder and find them after they are released in fields.

An ultraviolet light is carried at night by workers and any weevil in its glow will light up, allowing researchers to see the insects from as far as 12 feet away. They can even be seen through a young, thin cotton leaf, according to scientists.

Even the path taken by the boll weevils will show up, allowing study of their movements on the cotton plant. The powder has no apparent physical effect and remains effective for more than three months.

Previous methods forced researchers men to search slowly and painstakingly through each plant in making population studies of field-released test weevils. The new technique makes it possible to count the weevils as fast as the workers can walk.

It is a well-known fact among farmers in this area that farmer owned gins are doing a better job for the farmer. We'd like to gin your cotton this fall and every fall.

HEALTH AND SAFETY TIPS

From The American Medical Association On Tapering Off From Football Training

The end of the 1963 football season is at hand for all except the post-season and bowl game players, and thousands of young athletes are soon to be released from rigorous training schedules. Will they end their training with the season? Or will they make their training regimen a pattern for daily living?

Obviously, the football players who wind up the season cannot be expected to keep up the daily hard training grind on their own initiative. But they can be aware of what happens if they suddenly break off exercise and return to a completely sedentary existence for the winter months.

In a comment issued jointly by the National Federation of State High School Athletic Associations and the Committee on the Medical Aspects of Sports of the American Medical Association, the experts point out that a year-round program of physical conditioning should be advocated for all those interested in athletics. Maintaining strength, endurance and ability makes possible high performance levels and protection against injury. It also reduces the necessity of the tryout, early season period of crash-conditioning.

Of course, in many smaller school some of the football players will promptly begin playing basketball at the end of the grid season, and their continued training is automatic. The others can help to keep themselves in shape by regular work-outs in the school gym, by basketball or squash and other indoor winter sports that require considerable activity.

Many football players who halt training abruptly find they are immediately confronted with a sharp increase in weight. This is because they continue the heavy calorie diet consumed during the football season. Regular exercise helps to control weight while tapering off somewhat on the winter diet.

A training schedule is actually a comprehensive health education program, covering principles of personal hygiene, first aid, medical and dental care, rest and exercise, communicable disease control, environmental hazards and preventive procedures. These principles are a sound basis for a lifetime "way of life" as well as good preparation for the next football season.

Veterans News

QUESTIONS AND ANSWERS
Q. Is there an age limit after which a war orphan may no longer be eligible for Educational Assistance by the VA?
A. Generally, the age limits are between 18 and 23 with exceptions allowed in certain cases but in no case may the schooling assistance be continued beyond the 31st birthday of the beneficiary. Certain war orphans under 18 may also be eligible—for example, those who are handicapped.

Q. Children of a deceased veteran may have some pensions rights to they forfeit these rights when their mother (the veteran's widow) remarries?
A. No. Eligible children of a deceased veteran retain their pension rights after their mother remarries until they become 18, or if they are going to school.

Q. How can I still be liable for GI home if I have sold it to another party?
A. You are not liable for the one but for the GI loan which is guaranteed to the lender by the VA in your name. To avoid his responsibility, a veteran selling a GI home should arrange to have the buyer assume the liability. Consult your lender or the VA.

WHAT TO LOOK FOR IN A READY-TO-COOK TURKEY

College Station, Oct. 31—It's almost gobbler time again and every homemaker should know some of the basic rules for buying turkey, says P. Z. Beanblossom, poultry marketing specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service.

The first consideration when buying ready-to-cook turkeys is the amount of turkey to buy and whether to buy a whole turkey or a turkey roll, says the specialist. Whichever the choice, the homemaker should consider cost on the basis of the edible portion of the pounds bought to get a true picture of the cost of each, he says.

When deciding the amount of turkey needed, she must also take into consideration the number of people to be served and whether she wants to have left-overs. When buying whole turkey allow about 1/2 to 3/4 pound per person, and about five to eight ounces of uncooked turkey roll or five to six ounces of cooked roll per person, explains Beanblossom.

Quality and wholesomeness is the next consideration in buying turkey, he says. The bird should have a broad breast, large drumsticks, and bulging thighs, be well covered with fat over the body and be fully fleshed. It should be free of defects such as torn skin, bruises, and broken

bones, and should be free of pinfeathers.

Wholesomeness means the condition of the bird as to cleanliness, freedom from disease and completeness of processing, says Beanblossom. If processed under USDA supervision, tags on the wings of the birds will show their grade and that they have been inspected for wholesomeness, he adds.

Beanblossom explains that turkeys vary in price from one to another because of the differences in quality, wholesomeness and in some cases because of special sales at holiday seasons.

HEALTH AND SAFETY TIPS From The American Medical Association On Leukemia

Leukemia has become one of the most dread words in the English language in recent decades. Leukemia—cancer of the blood manufacturing organs—is incurable, and it is increasing. It is usually thought of as a disease of children, but it affects even more adults.

Leukemia today still cannot be cured, but it can be attacked much more effectively and directly, says Today's Health, the magazine of the American Medical Association. With modern drug therapy, more than two-thirds of the acute attacks of leukemia now can be slowed down. The chances of giving many active and comfortable years to the sufferers have been greatly increased.

In addition to new drugs, physicians also sometimes use blood transfusions and x-ray therapy in treating leukemia. The best results usually are obtained in management of the acute phase of the disease in children. There has been relatively little improvement in the over-all rate in adult patients.

Researchers are, of course, seeking other more effective methods of treatment for both the acute and chronic types of the disease. One line of investigation is replacement of the patient's diseased blood marrow with healthy marrow from a donor. This approach thus far has sharp limitations. There is no proof yet that marrow transplants will last.

Leukemia is not contagious like measles, but it has occurred in small "clusters" in various parts of the country. Eight cases were

recorded in one relatively small suburban area near Chicago.

Researchers are cautiously optimistic in the outlook for finding the answer to leukemia. Accomplishments thus far are limited, but much has been learned about the disease and its course.

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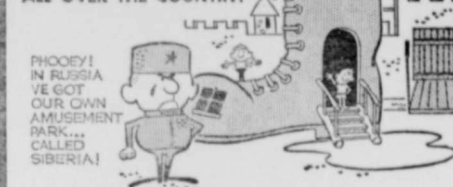

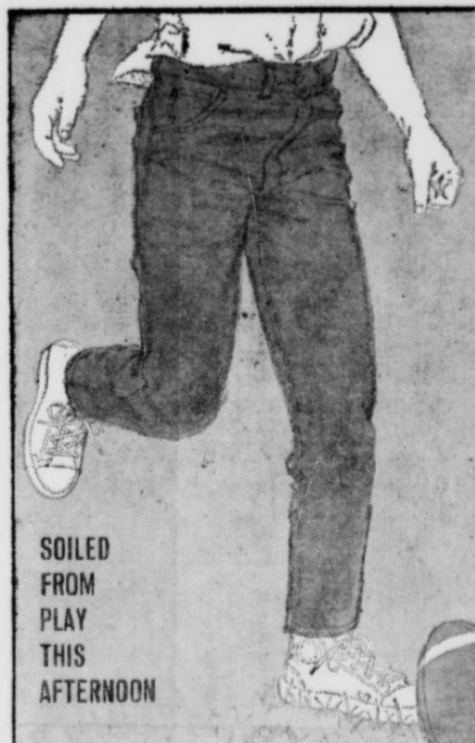

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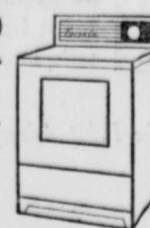
