Foes Of Hail Suppression Say Seeding Of Clouds Is 'Dangerous'

Claiming that cloud seeding is "dangerous," officials of the Citizens for Natural Weather are urging a vote against plans to launch a new hail suppression program in four South Plains Counties.

Balloting will be conducted on June 11 in the southern one-third of Castro County and portions of Floyd, Hale and Lamb counties.

Necessary petitions forcing the special elections have been secured by supporters of Plains Weather Improvement Association Inc. of Plainview, which has been under a restraining order for approximately two years.

The PWIA was re-licensed by the state in January and has stated its intention of starting a new cloud seeding program.

The weather modification issue was ordered stopped in 1978 after foes successfully brought the issue to a vote and forced its suspension.

"Citizens for Natural Weather are strongly opposed to the cloud seeding now as in the past," Bennie Claunch of Bula, co-chairman, said.

"Cloud seeders claim to be able to suppress hail and increase rain by applying silver iodide to the clouds," he noted. "But, there are many meteorologists who say that cloud seeding does not suppress hail and that cloud seeding interrupts the rain-making cycle."

Claunch said that statistics help bear out his views.

"During the cloud seeding years which ended in 1977," he said, "weather watchers noted that rainfall in the affected area actually declined 45 inches," he added.

"While meteorologists bicker about the effects of cloud seeding, they are generally agreed on one thing: that cloud seeding disrupts natural weather patterns and affects the weather as far as 150 miles downwind," Claunch noted.

In effect, he said, "A few people who are willing to spend hundreds of thousands of dollars are messing with the weather for their own selfish purposes and affecting all residents of the area."

"The hazy, unscientific approach to cloud seeding has developed without adequate controls, causing real dangers, both economic and physical," the CNW official added.

He said that personal safety may be a factor overlooked in cloud seeding because scientists agree that clouds -- after they are seeded -- change and develop even more violent reactions as they move downwind.

"Silver iodide, the chemical used, can affect the ecosystem adversely as it combines with other substances in the atmosphere, such as lead from automobile exhausts, to form poisons that settle on grasses which are eaten by animals and possibly passed on at the dinner table," Claunch pointed out.

He also noted that silver from the

silver iodide can concentrate in various organisms and thence to man, causing a buildup in the human body to a toxic level and possible respiratory or gastric ailments and cancer.

Claunch urged residents of the affected area of the counties involved to cast a no vote in the June 11 balloting.

Voting will be in precincts 1, 2, 3, 6, 9, 12, 13, 15 and 16 in Lamb County; precincts 3, 4, 7, 16 and 18 of Floyd County; precincts 1, 2, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 10, 12, 14, 15, 16 and 17 in Hale County; and precincts 6, 7, 10, 11 and 16 of Castro County.

Other officers of Citizens for Natural Weather include Nolon Henson of Happy, co-chairman; Lloyd Kurtz of Canyon, treasurer; and Mrs. Clifton Stodghill of Silverton, secretary.

The Department is entering its seventh year in sponsoring the program to honor those who have maintained continuous agricultural production on the same land for 100 years or more.

So far there have been 1,294 families who have qualified. The county farthest west in the program is Howard, Brown said. The Roberts Ranch in Big Spring qualified in 1977.

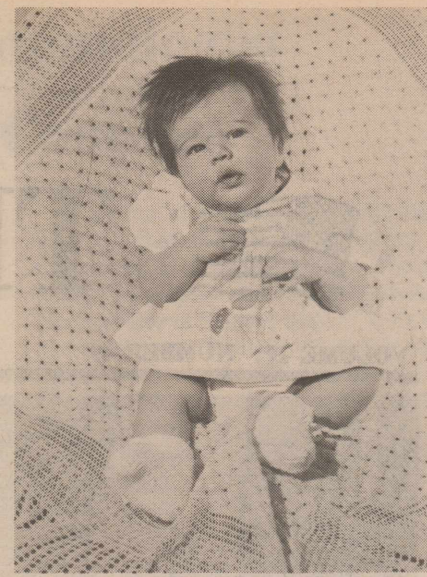

CHERRY DESSERT

Vanilla Wafers
1 stk oleo
1 1/2 c powdered sugar
2 eggs
1/2 c canned milk
1 can cherry pie filling
1 pkg Dream Whip
1 c chopped nuts

Crush enough vanilla wafers to completely cover the bottom of a pyrex dish (about 8x15 inches).

Stirring constantly, slowly cook until

thick, the oleo, sugar, eggs and milk. Pour this mixture over wafer crumbs. Next spread the cherry pie filling. Add a layer of chopped nuts and top with prepared Dream Whip or whipped cream. Sprinkle a few wafer crumbs over top.

ONION PATTIES

(Easier and quicker than onion rings)

3/4 c flour
2 t baking powder
1 T sugar
1/2 t salt
1 T cornmeal
1/2 c powdered milk
Cold water
2 1/2 c finely chopped onions
Fat for frying

Mix first six ingredients together. Stir in enough cold water for thick batter. Mix in onions and drop by teaspoons into deep hot fat. Flatten patties slightly as you turn. Fry to golden brown.

CRANBERRY SALAD

2 - 3 oz boxes cherry gelatin
2 c hot water
1 - 15 1/2 oz can crushed pineapple and juice
1 - 16 oz can whole cranberry sauce
1 c sour cream
1 c chopped pecans
1/4 c mayonnaise

Dissolve gelatin in hot water. Set aside till it thickens slightly. Mix pineapple, cranberry sauce and pecans well. Mix mayonnaise and sour cream, adding a small amount of juice from fruit mixture, and blend until smooth. Mix fruit and cream; blend well. Stir in gelatin. Chill overnight. Serves 10 to 12.

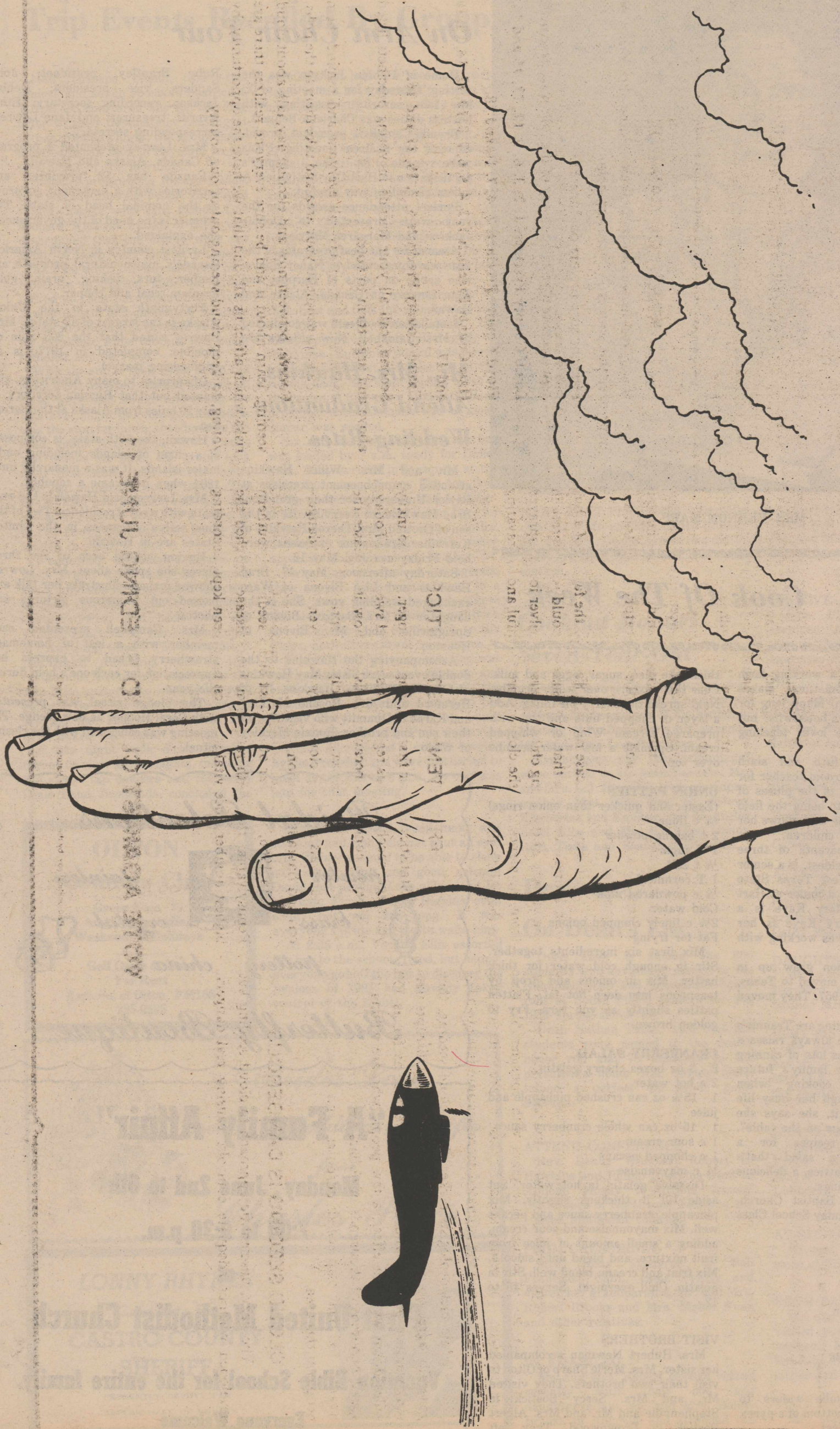

HERE'S WHY YOU SHOULD VOTE AGAINST
CLOUD SEEDING IN THIS COUNTY, JUNE 11:

After years of cloud seeding, the people of this county and surrounding area voted against cloud seeding and the practice was ended in 1977.

Now, Plains Weather Improvement Association of Plainview has secured necessary petitions to hold another election in this county on June 11, to try to reinstate cloud seeding operations over several precincts.

Cloud seeders claim to be able to suppress hail and increase rain by applying silver iodide to the clouds. But there are many meteorologists who say that cloud seeding does not suppress hail and that cloud seeding interrupts the rain-making cycle.

During the cloud seeding years which ended in 1977, weather watchers showed that rainfall in this area DECLINED 45 inches.

Evidence that cloud seeding DECREASES rainfall comes from five American experiments, according to the Tri-State Natural Weather Association. These five randomized experiments were conducted with unchallenged reliability over a number of consecutive years with considerable care and foresight. The results are a decrease in precipitation due to cloud seeding and the estimated decreases amounted to 53%.

While meteorologists bicker about cloud seeding, they generally agree on one thing: that cloud seeding disrupts natural weather patterns and affects the weather as far as 150 miles down wind. In effect, a few people who are willing to spend hundreds of thousands of dollars are "messing with the weather for their own selfish purposes" and affecting all the people in this area.

CLOUD SEEDING IS DANGEROUS

The hazy, unscientific approach to cloud seeding has developed without adequate controls, causing real dangers,

both economic and physical. Our agriculture depends on being able to consistently predict natural weather trends from year to year, and cloud seeding upsets this ability.

Personal safety may be a factor overlooked in cloud seeding, since scientists agree that clouds, after they are seeded, change and develop even more violent reactions as they move downward.

The chemical, silver iodide, can affect the ecosystem adversely as it combines with other substances in the atmosphere, such as lead from auto exhausts, to form poisons that settle on grasses which are eaten by animals and possibly passed on to the dinner table.

Silver from the silver iodide can concentrate in various organisms and thence to man, causing a buildup in the human system to a toxic level and possible respiratory or gastric ailments and cancer.

A recent court case ruled in favor of the family of a boy with asthma, ordering that cloud seeders could not operate in the vicinity of the ailing child because the silver iodide sprayed from the planes into the clouds were harmful and aggravating to the child's illness.

FRIGHTENING STATISTICS

Statistics are our first warning of danger. Not too many years ago, saccharin was regarded as a good sweetener. Today, it is being controlled because statistics show it increases the chances of bladder cancer. Similarly, the spraying of poisonous chemicals into rain clouds may be proven later as dangerous and flagrant pollution.

In 1966, the year of heaviest cloud seeding in southern Pennsylvania, the death rate from lung diseases reached the highest number since vital statistics have been kept, according

to the Pennsylvania Department of Public Health. This fact was reported by the Tri-State Natural Weather Association in a recent article in Acres, U.S.A.

The article also said that silver iodide crystals combine with auto emissions to create other serious poisons.

THE FUTURE?

And what of the future? Management of the clouds for weather purposes could later be organized into taxing districts, like we presently have for rivers, lakes, irrigation and drilling ... levying taxes on all of us for this district management of our clouds!

WHAT YOU CAN DO!!

If you feel as we do, that cloud seeding should not be done over this county ... you can help:

First, be sure to vote on June 11.

You can vote if you live in any of the following precincts:

Lamb County Precincts 1, 2, 3, 6, 9, 12, 13, 15 and 16.

Floyd County Precincts 3, 4, 7, 16 and 18.

Hale County Precincts 1, 2, 4, 5, 6, 7, 8, 10, 12, 14, 15, 16 and 17.

Castro County Precincts 6, 7, 10, 11 and 16.

Second, call all your friends in voting precincts listed above and urge them to vote.

Third, on election day call everyone and remind them to vote. Pick up people in your area and take them to the polls.

Fourth, between now and election day, talk about cloud seeding, learn about it and be sure everyone realizes there are risks which affect us all, and that we have the opportunity, by voting, to keep cloud seeding out of our county.

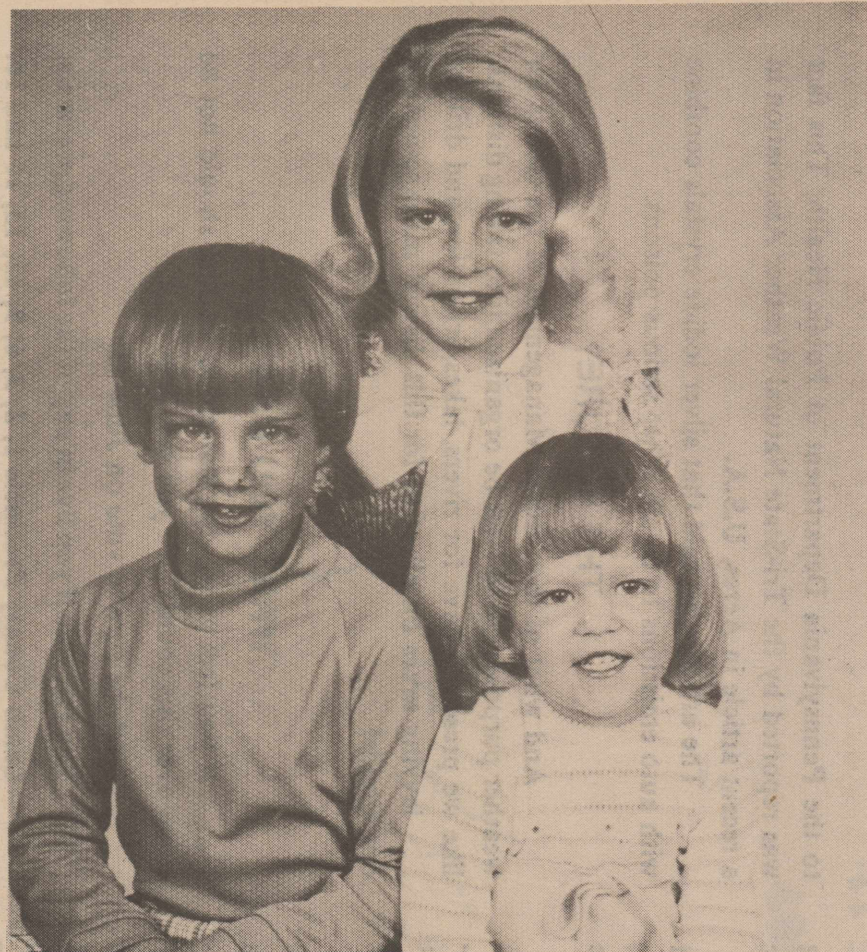
Monty Upton decided it was time for a sermon and in humorous antics, delivered the message with much applause and "preach-on, brother."

state ceremonies and receive a certificate and a copy of the Family Land Heritage Registry, in which are printed old photographs of the family and homes as well as a brief history of the land.

We have had excellent cooperation from county historical commission chairpersons and from county judges who have helped to locate people in their areas who might qualify," Brown said.

Basic requirements include the following: Continuous agricultural production on the same land for 100 years, ownership of the land remaining in the same family, complete operation or supervision of the farm or ranch production by family members, and a size of at least 10 acres with a minimum of \$250 income from farm or ranch products. If all of the land has ever been rented out, the property is ineligible. Timber and recreational leases do not qualify. The Texas Department of Agriculture is the final judge of eligibility.

Persons who meet the basic qualifications and wish to enter the program can obtain an application from the county judge, county historical commission chairperson, the nearest Texas Department of Agriculture district office, or they may write the Department. P.O. Box 12847, Austin, Tx. 78711.
