Effort To Remove Provision Beaten By Vote Of 47-44

Inclusion Of Plan Said To Complicate Legislation For Relief, Administration Leaders Declare

Hoover Opposing

Republican Independents Join Solid Democrat Vote On Resolution; Victory Foreseen For Bill

(By Associated Press) WASHINGTON, May 8.—Despite President Hoover's emphatically expressed objections, the senate today voted 47 to 44 to retain the debt moratorium plan in its farm bill.

Thirteen republican independents joined an almost solid democratic vote in defeating an attempt by administration forces to eliminate the moratorium provision.

The bill already passed by the house does not provide for debt moratorium, and inclusion of the plan in the farm bill is considered by many as a concession to this unusual situation.

Under the plan, the government would guarantee the interest on the loans made by the Federal Farm Loan Administration, and the government would guarantee the principal of the loans.

Representative Tamm of Connecticut, the majority leader, predicted today that the house would never accept the debt moratorium plan which was approved by a senate ballot this afternoon.

The senate measure was held by its sponsors tonight to complicate administration of farm relief legislation. Republican leaders, however, contended the measure would not be passed in view of the president's position.

Yet To Vote On Bill. They were confident that it would be eliminated ultimately by the senate committee of senate and house members which must adjust differences between the two measures, but were concerned over the possibility that it might take to settle the controversy. The senate has yet to vote on the bill.

Only two democrats left their line-up to join with administration republicans in the elimination of the measure. They were Wagner of New York and Randall of Louisiana.

Aims to Boost Prices. The debt moratorium plan aims to increase the price of farm products by guaranteeing the interest on the loans made by the Federal Farm Loan Administration.

Big Spring Area Has Rain Deluge. (Special To The Avalanche) BIG SPRING, May 8.—A deluge of rain, accompanied by hail, fell in the Big Spring area Wednesday afternoon between 2 and 3 o'clock.

South Plains Area Scout Activities Have Good Growth

An encouraging increase in membership and a substantial reduction in indebtedness are revealed in a recent report of the South Plains Area Council, Boy Scouts of America.

Nine new troops, including 126 new members, and a decrease in the past three months of \$3,000 in debts are shown in the report. The debts have been decreased from \$9,300 to \$2,300.

The report was signed by L. G. H. Williams, president of the council; P. A. Norman, treasurer; and K. N. Clapp, commissioner, and was the first to be made by the new administration.

Announcement was made in the report that E. B. Yates, of Dallas, has been employed as temporary chairman from June 3 to September 15 to direct the summer camp and conduct other council affairs.

Man Escapes After Shooting His Wife

Woman Is Found Near Elevator Shaft; Husband Runs Through Crowded Lobby Scantly Clad

DETROIT, May 8.—Dashing partially clad through a crowded lobby, and shouting "there's trouble on the fourth floor," a man believed to be Ronald Clarke, Detroit, escaped last night after fatally shooting his wife.

Four shots were heard a moment before the man, shoeless and shirtless, dashed through the lobby to the street.

The woman was found lying near elevator shaft on the fourth floor, her coat smoldering where it had been ignited by powder.

Letters Are Found

Police at first believed the man was J. L. Codman, of Chicago or St. Paul, for in the couple's room were found letters signed with that name and declaring he long had planned to kill his wife. They also had registered as Mr. and Mrs. Codman.

In one letter the writer had declared he hoped to kill John L. Ault, Evanston, Ill., president of the Silverplate Company, of Chicago. The letters were written on the stationery of the Lowry Hotel, St. Paul.

Scientists Gather For 4-Minute Peek At Total Eclipse

(By Associated Press)

MANILA, May 8.—Five groups of scientists who have spent months of time and thousands of dollars and traveled thousands of miles for a four-minute look at the total eclipse of the sun tomorrow were overjoyed today at the prospects of fair weather for their observations.

The eclipse will appear at sunrise in the far southwestern corner of the Indian ocean and will be visible over a slightly curved streak of the earth's surface almost from the eastern coast of Africa to a point near mid-Pacific, just south of the equator. This streak, which will be about 100 miles in width, will be darkened as the moon partially blots out the light of the sun.

At Iloilo, in the central part of the Philippine Archipelago, five scientific groups have gathered. The largest is the United States naval observatory expedition, headed by Commander C. H. J. Keppeler. Another group is from Johns Hopkins university, headed by Dr. Reginald L. Waterfield and Dr. Wyndham E. B. Lloyd, of London. A short

distance to the east, on the island of Cebu, the University of Hamburg expedition, headed by Dr. Walter Beade and Dr. Bernard Schmidt awaits the phenomenon. A group of observers from the Manila observatory also are at Iloilo.

Interest In Dairy And Poultry Work Increases In Area

"More and more farmers of the South Plains are raising poultry and dairy cattle, particularly," declared Claude Tatum, of the Economic Milla. "They are bettering their practice pays them well. They are carrying books, too, and are using their gaze to it. Shelter business methods in all of poultry production and states the various hatcheries over the ship-in every detail. There's Art In A Wedding Cake

NEW YORK, May 7.—This is rush season for Madame Blanche, wedding cake architect for two generations of social celebrities of two continents.

This little Frenchwoman does not bake just ordinary wedding cakes. She builds edible edifices, from bungalow types to sky-scraper designs.

And so sentimental is she about the importance of the wedding cake on the day of days that she makes every one by hand!

Many Notables Her Customers

She made Alice Roosevelt's wedding cake. So beautiful did the Roosevelt family consider it that design five times for weddings in the Roosevelt family. She made President Wilson's daughter's wedding cake, taking it to Washington in a private car. Listed among her clients are the Stuyvesant Fish family, the Pierpont Morgans, the Armours, the Rockefellers, Carnegies, and ambassadors to England and Spain.

Sometimes Madame Blanche's wedding cakes cost \$1,000. But that is when the bride happens to be a horsewoman, an aviatrix, or something else special and wants her cake's decoration to be appropriate to express her interests. One of Madame Blanche's cakes had a whole hunting scene in the rotunda of the ten layer. A heron of a hunt ran around the base of the cake. Another one, a low, sprawling one-story type, depicted a yachting scene on the top of it, sugar sails bending to the wind as the little boats rounded the sides.

Watches Marriage Views Change

"Brides usually want the old, traditional decorations," Madame Blanche assured us in her quaint, broken English for she still seems very French after 40 years here. "Times change and there are many divorces, but brides still have high hopes when they marry. They want orange blossoms, Cupids, wedding bells, wedding rings, and other symbols of luck and happiness."

Madame Blanche herself has deep sentiment about her wedding cakes. Scientific mixing of ingredients and baking are not enough, she holds. One must put a bit of her heart into a wedding cake before it is good.

Madame Blanche's home is her shop. On the third floor of an old brownstone home in the 50's, she lives and works, with her daughter

and a little French maid helping her. The old-fashioned parlor, with its plush and gilt furniture, has fancy cakes in glass cases in every corner. Here are dozens of boxes of "mous" cakes she has made. Other boxes hold samples of guest cake boxes, and samples of decorations.

She's a Busy Artist

She mixes 25 pounds of fruit cake daily, sometimes 50. Every cake bakes six hours in an old-fashioned coal range. A temple of love or some other kind of sky-scraper wedding cake may take a whole week for herself and her artist daughter to decorate. Most fancy wedding cakes are the bride-groom's fruit cake and not the white cake for the bride. That goes in individual boxes to guests.

Scientific care and real heart throbs must go into every success. Madame Blanche insists, whether it is creating a cake or a building. The importance of one's work must be felt or she cannot do her best.

Looked to America's Favor

Madame Blanche illustrates her philosophy, perfectly. She brought from the old country some fine old English recipes for dark fruit cake and for bride's cake. She experimented, scientifically, until both the cakes suited Americans. Then she became interested in the real significance of the wedding cake itself.

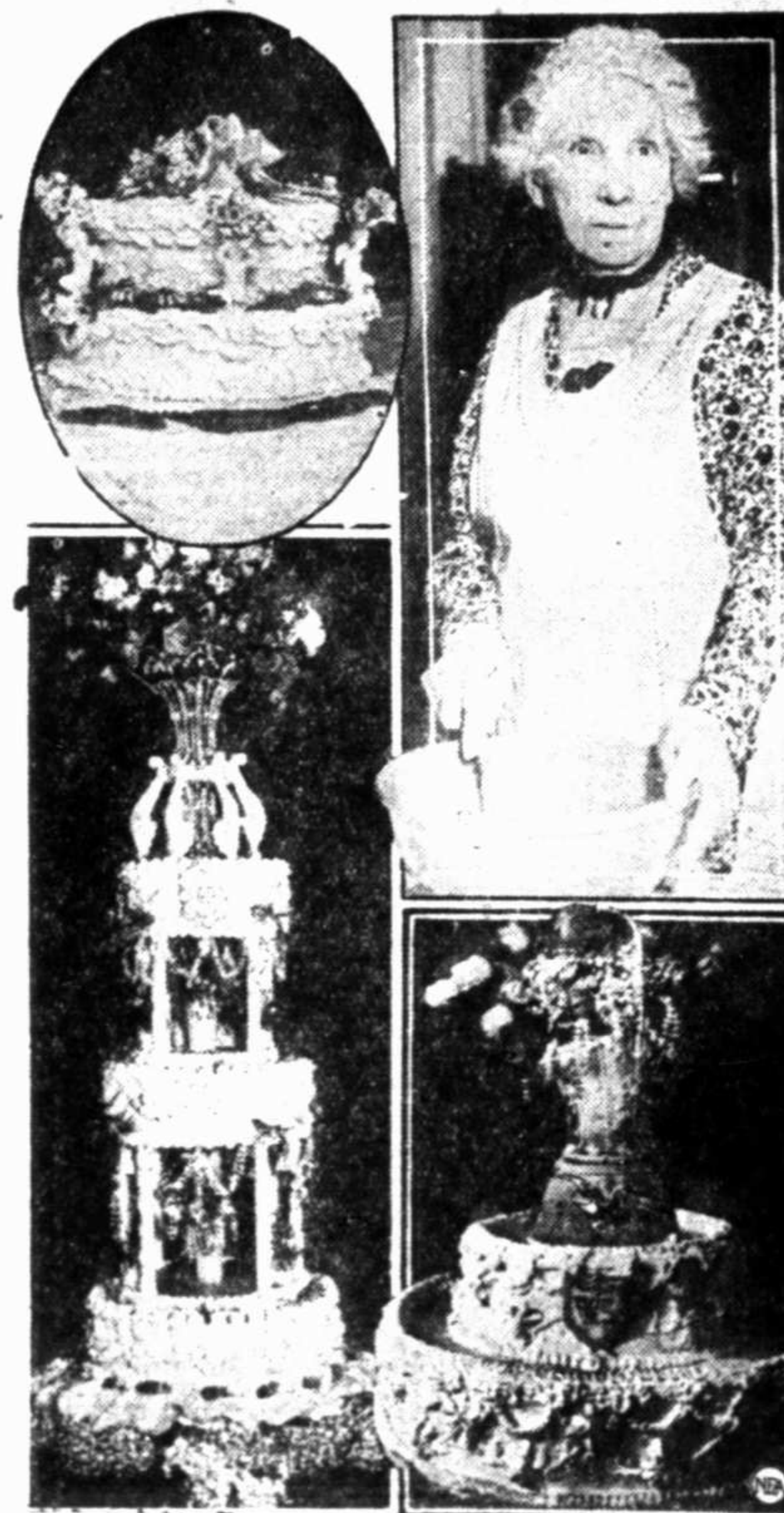
Two years of research were put in, digging up ancient customs, trying to find the origin of wedding cake. "Wedding cakes are as old as marriage," Madame Blanche concluded. "In ancient Egypt, natives made crude little cake, patties of ground weed meal, goat's milk and honey baked on hot stones, for wedding guests to eat. The idea of a large ornamental cake came with civilization. But the tradition of wedding cakes is so deep-seated that the importance of the wedding cake is second only to the bride and groom. No care can be too great to create a beautiful symbol of the joining of two families."

Former Texas League Moundsman Humbles Pittsburgh Sluggers As Mates Pound Out 11 To 0 Win

First No-Hit Performance In Majors Since Feat Of Ted Lyons Against Red Sox On August 1, 1926; Three Errors Committed Behind Hubbell

NEW YORK, May 8. (AP)—Carl Hubbell, star left-hander of the Glant staff, entered the hall of baseball fame at the Polo Grounds today by pitching a no-hit, no-run game against the Pirates. The Glants pounded Jess Petty, Fred Fussell and Remy Kromer for 12 hits and 29 bases, including two home runs by Melvin Ott and one each by Chuck Fultz and Andy Cohen. The home team won easily up behind Hubbell's fine effort, 11 to 0.

Hubbell's performance was the first no-hit game in the majors since August 1, 1926, when Ted Lyons of the White Sox let down the Red Sox without a safety.

THE NEW PAVED ROADS CAMPAIGN

A representative group of Lubbock business men will meet with the County Commission next Monday afternoon in an effort to inaugurate Lubbock county's belated paved highways campaign. After careful consideration, members of the Lubbock County Good Roads association have decided that through the formation of independent road districts alone can paved highways be put over in the county and that plan is to be followed.

The position of The Avalanche in regard to paved roads is no secret. This newspaper favors roads for Lubbock county—and the world at large, for that matter—at the earliest possible date and if the creation of independent road districts is the only way the campaign can be carried to a successful climax then The Avalanche favors that method.

Efforts of Slaton and Lubbock leaders to get together on a paved highway project for the entire county have thus far failed. Where the fault lies is no matter. The fact that co-operation appears to this date impossible is the big thing. Sponsors of the new campaign to get Lubbock county out of the mud and the chert and to form an independent district which leaves out the southeast part of the county in which Slaton is located. Such action, they believe, will give at least a part of the county a portion of the paved highways which it undeniably needs and will leave Slaton to solve its own road problems as it best sees fit.
