WHIT CHAPMAN PROMOTED TO LIEUTENANT COLONEL

15TH AIR FORCE IN ITALY — Wilson A. (Whit) Chapman, 30, son of Mrs. Anna Mae Chapman of Quitaque and formerly of Abernathy, who has been serving in Italy as operations officer of a P-51 Mustang fighter group, is now wearing the silver leaf insignia of a lieutenant colonel.

Lt. Col. Chapman began his overseas service as a fighter pilot in the South Pacific where he flew on missions from bases in Australia and New Guinea during 1942.

After his tour of duty in that theatre, with 57 missions and three Jap Zeros to his credit, he returned to the states where he was a P-38 pilot instructor until March of this year, when he again went overseas, this time to the Mediterranean theatre.

Lt. Col. Chapman graduated from the high school at Lubbock, Tex., in 1933 and from Texas Tech at Lubbock in 1940 with a major in petroleum engineering. He was employed as a petroleum engineer with the Shasta Oil Co., at Midland, Tex., in 1940 when he enlisted in the air corps. In March, 1941, he completed his pilot training course at Kelly Field, Tex., and was commissioned a second lieutenant.

During his flying service in the South Pacific he won the Silver Star award for gallantry in action against the Japs and also received the Purple Heart when wounded in action there.

FOUR MEMBERS OF BENN FAMILY INJURED IN WRECK

Four members of the Benn family of Abernathy and two Slaton residents received treatment in a Slaton hospital following a car wreck near Slaton Saturday morning.

Only one person, Mrs. Chris Benn, 47, of Abernathy, was considered to be in serious condition, hospital officials said. She was moved to a Lubbock hospital. Mrs. Benn suffered fractured ribs, lacerations of the face and severe shock.

Mrs. W. L. Holloman, 39, of near Slaton, also suffered severe shock.

Others injured were: Chris Benn, 65; Mrs. Clyde Benn, about 26, and Susan Benn, 4, all of Abernathy; and Mrs. Holloman's daughter, Edith, 7.

Most of the victims suffered cuts and bruises and a lesser degree of shock. Capt. N. R. Smith and Sgt. John Hollyfield, both of the Lubbock district office of the Texas Highway Patrol, investigated.

They said the crash was a quarter of a mile north of Slaton's city limits; that Benn was driving southward from Lubbock into Slaton, and Mrs. Holloman westward off a lateral road on to U. S. highway 84. Neither car was overturned, but the Benn machine was almost demolished, the investigators said.

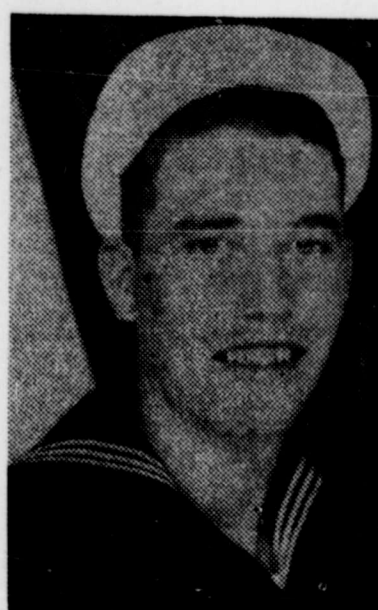

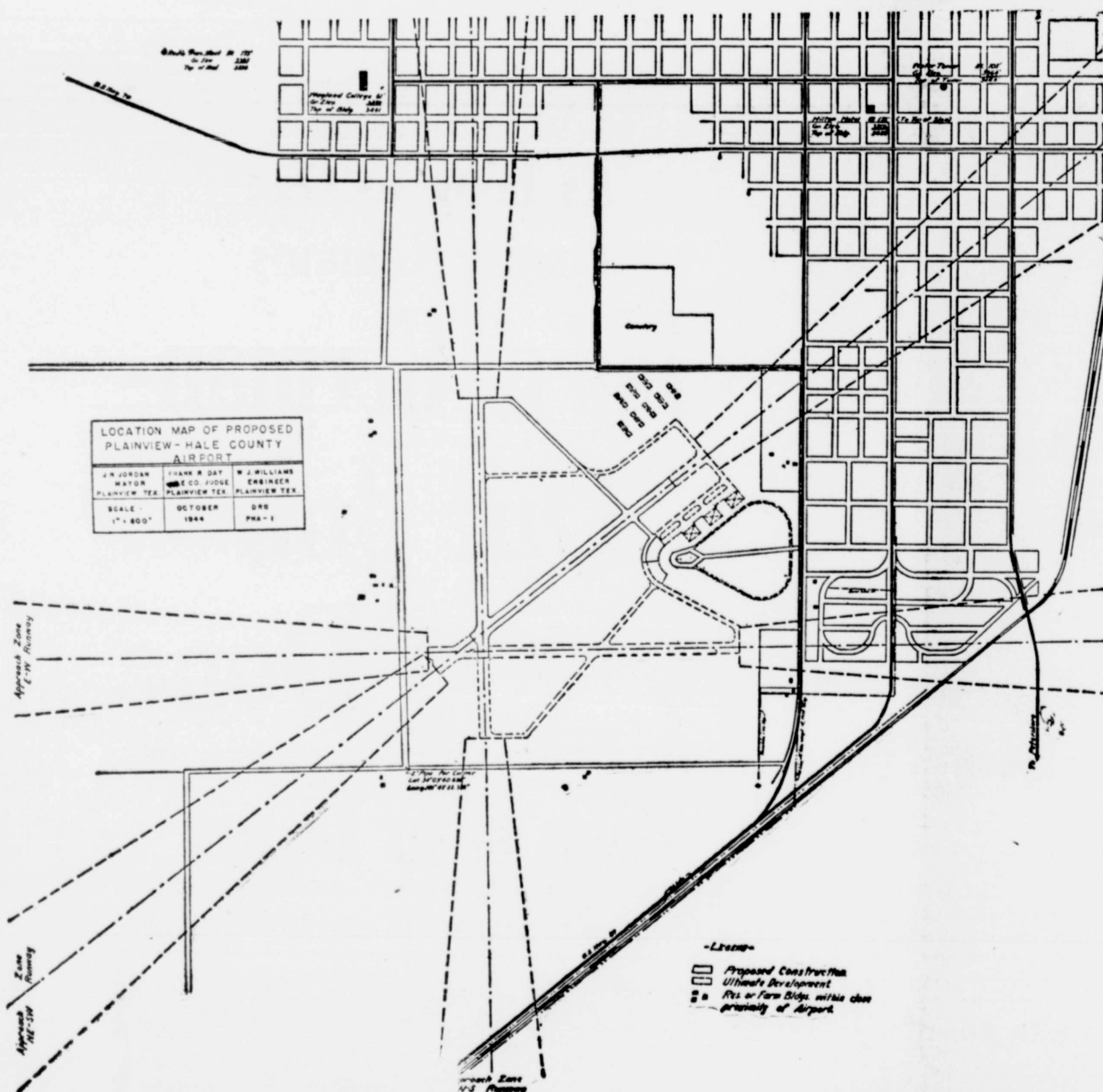


The Civil Aeronautics Engineers say the County-City airport plan is ideal. We do now what we need and can add to the port as our needs expand.

Holland, 14 Oct. 1944.

Hi, Buford: Guess you think I've forgotten about Abernathy, but not quite. Have been pretty busy and it looks like I'll stay that way for a while. Have a pretty quiet job but, at times, it's rather noisy. For sure, when Bed Check Charlie comes over about 9 o'clock every night and brings his cousins... Everything has been rather quiet around this part of the world for the past week, and we are all hoping it changes soon, 'cause every mile is a mile closer home. And, now, they are rather hard, slippery, stumbly miles—and no one knows what is underfoot on the next step... Was kinda hoping we would go south for the winter, but no such luck. I've seen some picture postcards of the little city near here in January and the snow looks to be only three or four feet

deep. Some of the English speaking natives say it stays on the ground only about two months. Hope it doesn't stay any longer. Rains almost every day and is pretty cold now... We have one thing we like, plenty of fruit. We are in an apple and pear orchard and the apples and the pears are just now getting ripe. Really are good, too... There is not much here a man can tell about, so keep the old town alive, Buford, and I really enjoy the papers. They are coming in every week now. As ever, Lt. Travis E. Lutrick.

France, 10-11-44.

Dear Buford: It has been quite some time since I have written you. Sorry I waited so long, but there isn't much time and paper is very hard to get... This French language is very hard to understand, but you can learn enough to get eggs, bread, apples, plums, grapes, etc... I was surprised to see the people eating so well, especially those in the villages

and cities... I have been to Isigny, Arranches, Argentan, Bor La Due, Chalon Sur Marne and Cardonville... The people left Argentan on bicycles. They returned the same way. They would take a look at what had been their home and go back the same way they came. It was pitiful, but even then they always had a wave or a smile ready for you. The center of the town is nothing but a heap of stones and dust... One lovely Catholic church had one side standing. In that side was a beautiful Mosaic of the Mother Mary. It's strange—in all that ruin the section with Her picture was intact... I'm sorry — must get some sleep if the artillery doesn't send too much outgoing mail "to the Jerries."... Hoping to see you and Abernathy soon, I remain, A friend, Heavy. (Pvt. Hiram P. Watts.) P. S. Be seeing you boys in the Pacific when these goose-stepping supermen are no more.
