BITTER COLD HOLDS WEST IN SUB-ZERO HUG

RECORDS ARE LOWERED IN SOME CITIES

34 BELOW IS COLDEST REPORTED; EAST ALSO SUFFERS

(By Associated Press)

CHICAGO, Jan. 14.—All that had gone before was nothing compared to the bitter cold that held middle and Northwest America in a sub-zero hug over the weekend.

No relief of consequence is in sight before Wednesday, and the

The tail-end of the norther which gripped the mid-west today was expected in Lubbock tonight or in the morning. A north wind was blowing here at noon, and the official forecast called for fair and colder weather.

weather bureau was not prepared to say if the cold would be dissipated even then.

One of the low thermometer readings of the week-end was at Duluth where a minus 34 was the coldest the Minnesota City at the head of Lake Superior has had in 11 years. Green Bay, Wis., was another frigid spot with 20 below, while temperatures throughout the midwest with hardly an exception skated under the cipher mark yesterday and last night.

10 Below in Chicago Chicago had an official 10 below, with some suburban thermometers showing as low as minus 17. There were three deaths directly attributable to cold, and there were several hospital cases of persons suffering from hands, feet or faces or persons injured in falls on slippery sidewalks and pavements.

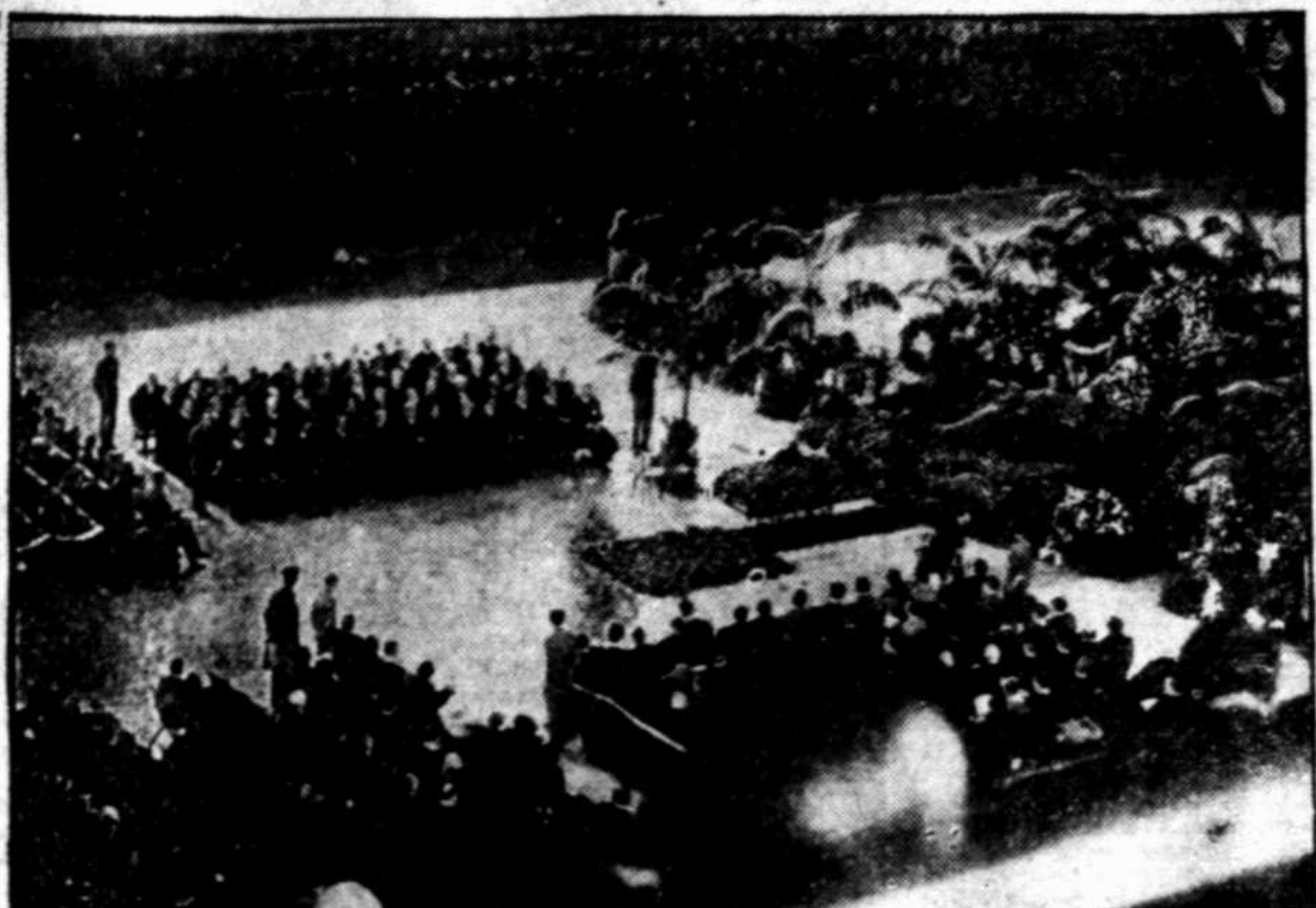
As first lady of Texas during the administration of Governor Hobby from 1917 until 1921, she presided over social functions at the state mansion.

FOUR KILLED IN GRADE ACCIDENT

BALTIMORE, Jan. 14 (AP)—Four members of a family of five are dead and the sole survivor, a child, was seriously injured when their automobile was struck by a Pennsylvania railroad train near Parkton, Baltimore county, early today.

Mrs. Diamond Hannigan and two children, Robert, 6, and Diamond, 4, were killed outright; the husband, Diamond Hannigan, Baltimore policeman, was fatally injured and died a few hours later at a hospital. Physicians said that Edith, 9 years, was in a critical condition.

SUIT IS ECHO TO OPERATION

\$35,000 DAMAGES ASKED OF SANITARIUM IN PETITION HERE

Growing out of the death of Ray McCallon last November, alleged to have occurred after an operation for appendicitis on June 18 of last year, a suit of \$35,000 damages was filed against the Lubbock sanitarium in district court here today by Clara McCallon, wife, and Mrs. Almir McCallon, mother of the deceased.

The petition alleged that the patient was "not properly treated." It stated that physicians gave assurance that the operation would restore the patient's health and that he probably would be able to leave the sanitarium within ten days. According to the petition, Mr. McCallon remained in the institution several months for treatment, and was finally released as incurable after a second operation had been performed.

The wife seeks \$30,000 damages and the mother \$5,000.

BANDIT CAUGHT ONLY AFTER GUN BATTLE WITH OFFICERS

(By Associated Press) DALLAS, Jan. 14.—Will (Dagger) Pruett, 23, lay on a jail bed with two bullets in his body today while officers, who shot it out with him in a Southeast Dallas cottage last night with two of their force rescuing slight wounds, prepared to question him about a string of robberies, shootings and sluggings which for days have plagued the city.

Pruett, cornered in the attic of the home of an uncle, started firing when Police Commissioner Clarence Parker, Detective Captain Leonard Pack and Detective Will Fritz entered to arrest him. A bullet hit Fritz in the arm, two others skinned his cheek, and a fourth slug from the attic grazed Captain Pack's head.

The commissioner called for reinforcements. Six automobile loads of policemen, including a machine gun squad, reached the house about the time Pruett was surrendering. He gave up only after being shot twice and having a hunk of his gun knocked off by a bullet from Fritz's pistol.

M. D. Chapman identified Pruett as the man who held him up, forcing him into an automobile and taking his overcoat. Three other holdups on the same night police had taken up with the robber of Chapman, James Walker, negro, declared.

MOVE TO QUIZ LAND OFFICE GAINS FAVOR

IMPORTANT COMMITTEE POSTS WILL GO TO LOSING FACTION

(By Associated Press)

AUSTIN, Tex., Jan. 14.—Proponents of a legislative investigation of the land commissioner's office won the opening skirmish in the senate today when a motion to lay the investigation resolution on the table subject to call passed after nearly an hour and a half of debate.

The senate was deadlocked on the motion offered by Joe M. Moore of Greenville, co-author of the resolution, but Barry Miller, presiding officer, broke the 13-13 tie by casting his ballot in the affirmative.

Opponents of the Moore proposal planned to introduce a substitute motion referring the proposed investigation to the senate and house committees on lands rather than to a special joint investigating committee.

Moore asserted that he and Senator A. J. Wirtz of Seguin, co-author of the resolution, wished to make further investigations and to incorporate their findings in the resolution before submitting it to a vote.

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Still Some Cotton Left To Be Picked

With slightly more than 32,000 bales of cotton already ginned in Lubbock county this year, County Agent D. F. Eaton said this morning that there was still a little cotton left over the county.

He stated that the year's total would surpass the 35,000 bale mark, but that it is his opinion it would not be as much as 40,000 bales. He said that the remainder of the cotton harvesting should be cleaned up within the near future.

Kellar Warns Auto Owners To Register

With the 1929 registration of automobiles in this county well above the 6,000 mark, John Kellar, district officer of the state highway department, said this morning that he and Fred Hickman, highway officer of the Amarillo district, had been warning car owners of the necessity of securing the new plates. Arrests for running cars without the new plates will begin with the near future, he said. "We have put our making arrests as long as we can, but all cars must be registered as soon as it is possible," he continued.

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BURGLARS GET ONLY PRACTICE FROM 'HARD LUCK' RAID ON LOCAL BAKERY

Burglars got nothing more than practice Saturday night when they looted the Moreman Bakery, 1312 Avenue I, of an empty safe. Gaining entrance by tearing the screen from a rear window, the "hard-luck" yeggs took the safe and carried it five miles north of the city before an attempt was made to open it. The door of the safe was taken off with a cold chisel and the safe thrown to the side of the road after it was found to have been empty.

Nothing else was taken from the bakery. Sheriff Wade Hardy said this morning that several clues had been discovered and that the department was to concentrate its efforts to determine the identity of the robbers.

OPEN SEASON ON PRAIRIE DOGS

With the stated purpose of ridding Lubbock county of all prairie dogs, a countywide extermination campaign will be launched March 1 by this county in co-operation with the U. S. department of agriculture, it was announced this morning by County Agent D. F. Eaton.

Two plans will be used in getting rid of the animals. Poison grain will be used and this will be followed by a poison treatment in a dust gun. It is planned to work the entire county, one community at a time.

Farmers who are bothered by prairie dogs are requested to file their names with Mr. Eaton who will make arrangements to include them in the proposed campaign. Only a slight charge will be made for the grain used. R. J. Powell, field representative of the governmental department of agriculture, will be in charge of the prairie dog war. At a later date it is planned to direct the campaign against ground squirrels and rabbits.

ENROLLMENT BOOST CITED BY DR. HORN

MOST OF MONEY TO BE USED IN CARING FOR INCREASE

(By Associated Press)

AUSTIN, Tex., Jan. 14.—Requests for \$317,467 in emergency appropriations for Texas Tech, the College of Industrial Arts, and the North Texas Agricultural college were laid before the senate finance committee today by representatives of those schools.

Dr. P. W. Horn of Tech asked \$185,332.45 for his institution, the greater part of which would be used for new equipment and expenses caused by an increase of 400 in enrollment. Of this amount \$50,000 would be spent for new science equipment, \$50,000 for new engineering equipment and \$10,000 for new home economics equipment.

L. H. Hubbard, president of C. I. A. and E. V. White, dean, asked \$112,325 for their institution. Of this \$50,000 would be used for new hospital equipment. Senator Tom Pollard of Tyler, head of the finance committee, received a telegram from the Dallas Woman's Forum, endorsing the proposed appropriations.

E. E. Davis, dean of the North Texas agricultural college, estimated the emergency needs of that institution at \$18,741.22.

the instance of District Attorney Robert T. Bushnell of Middlesex county, declared that there was no evidence that a crime had been committed, the district attorney ordered an autopsy performed and a search instituted for Kinder.

Ruth Prostrated
Ruth was prostrated by grief when he arrived in Boston. From his hotel suite he gave a brief statement to newspapermen:

"My wife and I have not lived together for the last three years. During that time I have seldom met her. I have done all that I can to comply with her wishes. Her death is a great shock to me, that is all I can say now."

But Ruth, through his friend and legal adviser, John P. Feeney of Boston, immediately took steps to see that a new certificate was issued that the dead woman might be buried as Mrs. Ruth rather than as Mrs. Kinder.

Feeney and members of Mrs. Ruth's family decided to go to Wellfleet, where the Babe's nine-year-old daughter Dorothy is a student in a private academy, and break the news of her mother's death.

Identified By Photo
Discovery that the supposed dentist's wife was Mrs. Ruth came with the publication last week of a picture found in the house. A friend of the Ruths identified it.

Mrs. Ruth's sister, the Misses Catherine and Nora Woodford of South Boston, were summoned and established identification.

Kinder, who was attending a boxing exhibition last Friday when his house caught fire, was paged at the show and returned to identify the dead woman as his wife and to make funeral arrangements. His whereabouts since then constituted a mystery today.

The dentist's father, William F. Kinder, and a brother, William F. Kinder, Jr., said they believed the couple had been married in Montreal about two years ago.

Ruth first met Helen Woodford shortly after he became a member of the Boston Red Sox in 1915. The girl had been a waitress and was employed at the time in a Back Bay restaurant near the ball park.

Late in 1915 or early in 1916 they were married and in September 1922, they announced that 16 months previously a daughter had been born but they had decided not to announce it earlier. That the path of their marital life has not been a smooth one in the past few years has been generally known to their friends.

Is This Cruelty To Husband, Or What

Because his wife filed a complaint and had him arrested while he was on a business trip in another city, a husband filed a petition for divorce in district court here today.

The petition states that at the time of his arrest he was visiting in the home of a business associate and that he was greatly embarrassed and humiliated. Besides that, the petition continues, he was not guilty of the charges on which he was arrested.

ADLOCK ON KELLOGG PACT

OPONENTS TO SPEEDY PASSAGE OF BILL HOLD GROUND

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, Jan. 14.—An omni-
bus deadlock, unyielding to White
house concern, gripped more tightly
Kellogg anti-war treaty in the
Senate today, threatening both the
treaty and the cruiser construction

Fortified with a "Round Robin
petition" bearing 24 signatures, the
publican-democratic group, de-
claring an interpretation of the
treaty in connection with Ameri-
can adherence decided in a Sab-
bath day conference to hold their
ground against efforts to limit de-
lay.

This decision was reached despite
obvious opposition to the proposi-
tion for an interpretation by Presi-
dent Coolidge who called in on Sat-
urday night Senator Bingham, rep-
ublican, Connecticut, one of the
sponsors of the petition.

Concerned by the Round Robin
petition for the interpretative re-
solutions by the foreign relations com-
mittee on the treaty, Chairman
of the committee, prepared
to renew his request for limitation
debate on the treaty.

The "internationalists" have an-
nounced that request will not be al-
lowed. This means more delay on a
vote of ratification but Senator
McNary realizes also it means more
delay in getting to the cruiser con-
struction bill in which he is not so
much interested but which the "in-
ternationalists" almost to a man,
are very anxious to get to. So the
treaty advocates were content to
hold against the interpretation and
let things take their course.

Meanwhile, the president, who is
concerned for both ratification of
the treaty and passage of the cruiser
bill is doing the worrying.

HIGH AND DRY

Sightseers Are Marooned Atop Woolworth Tower

NEW YORK, Jan. 14 (AP)—
Six sightseers, one a young woman,
were marooned in the obser-

worth building for ten minutes
yesterday, their escape out of

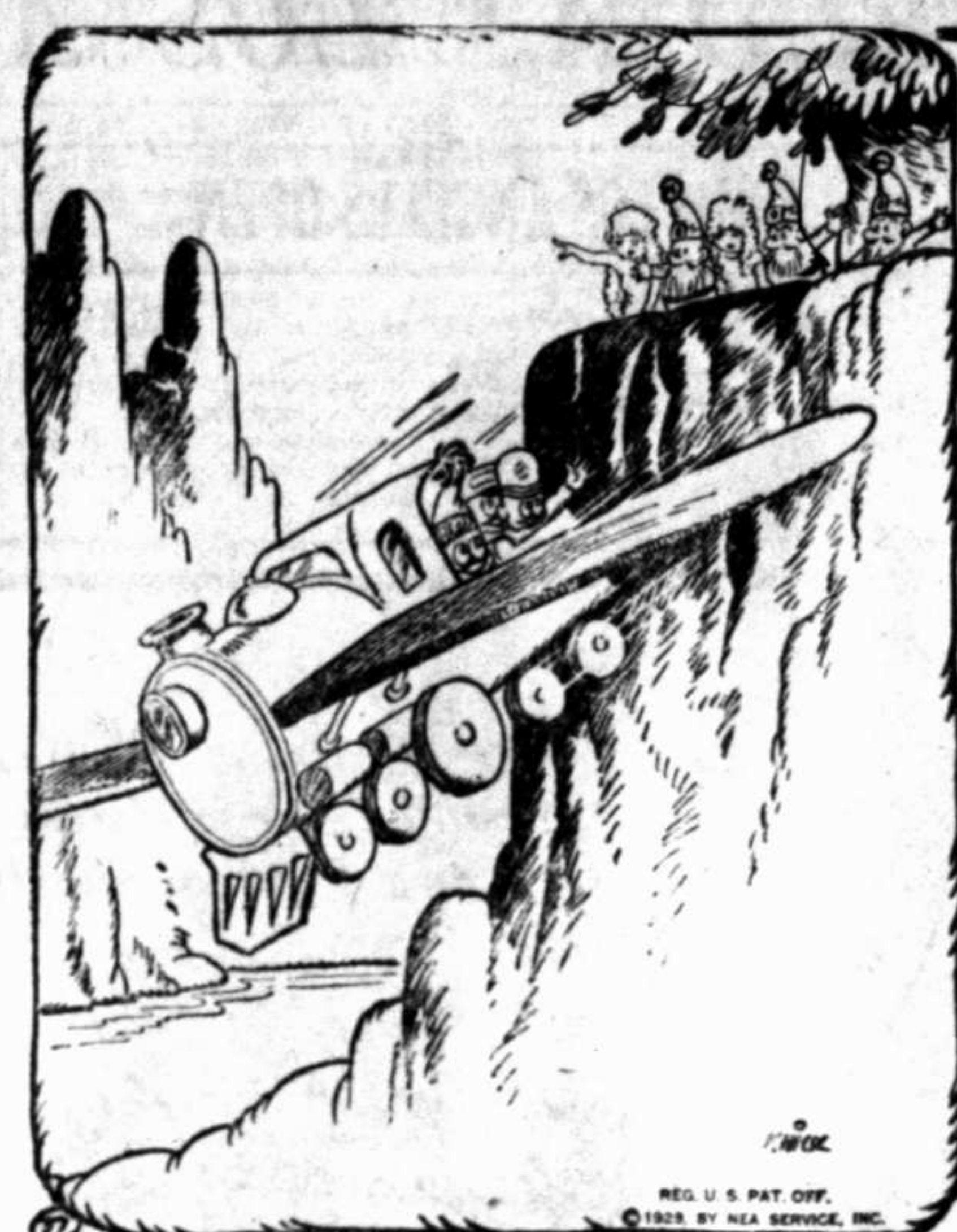

FLOYDADA IS
SWINE CENTER
ONE HUNDRED CARS OF
HOGS SHIPPED IN
PAST SEASON
FLOYDADA, Jan. 14.—Floyd
county probably produced and
shipped to market one hundred car-
loads of swine during the year of
1928, figures for the market for
Floydada would indicate. During
the year 100 carloads were shipped
from this point, and while figures
from other shipper points of the
county are not available, it is prob-
able that an equal ration of hogs
were shipped from them.
According to the present outlook,
the shipments of swine from this
section in 1929 will see a consid-
erable falling off from the figures of
1928. A very simple and logical
reason is given for this by hog dealers
who point to the fact that hogs are
cheap while feed is high, and a
large percentage of the swine grow-
ers are cutting down their produc-
tion plans for the spring season at
least, at the same time disposing
directly on the market of the feed
that would otherwise be held for
their feeding. However dealers plan
to have a year round market in this
county for hogs, the Floydada mar-
ket long having been one of the
most consistent in the state.

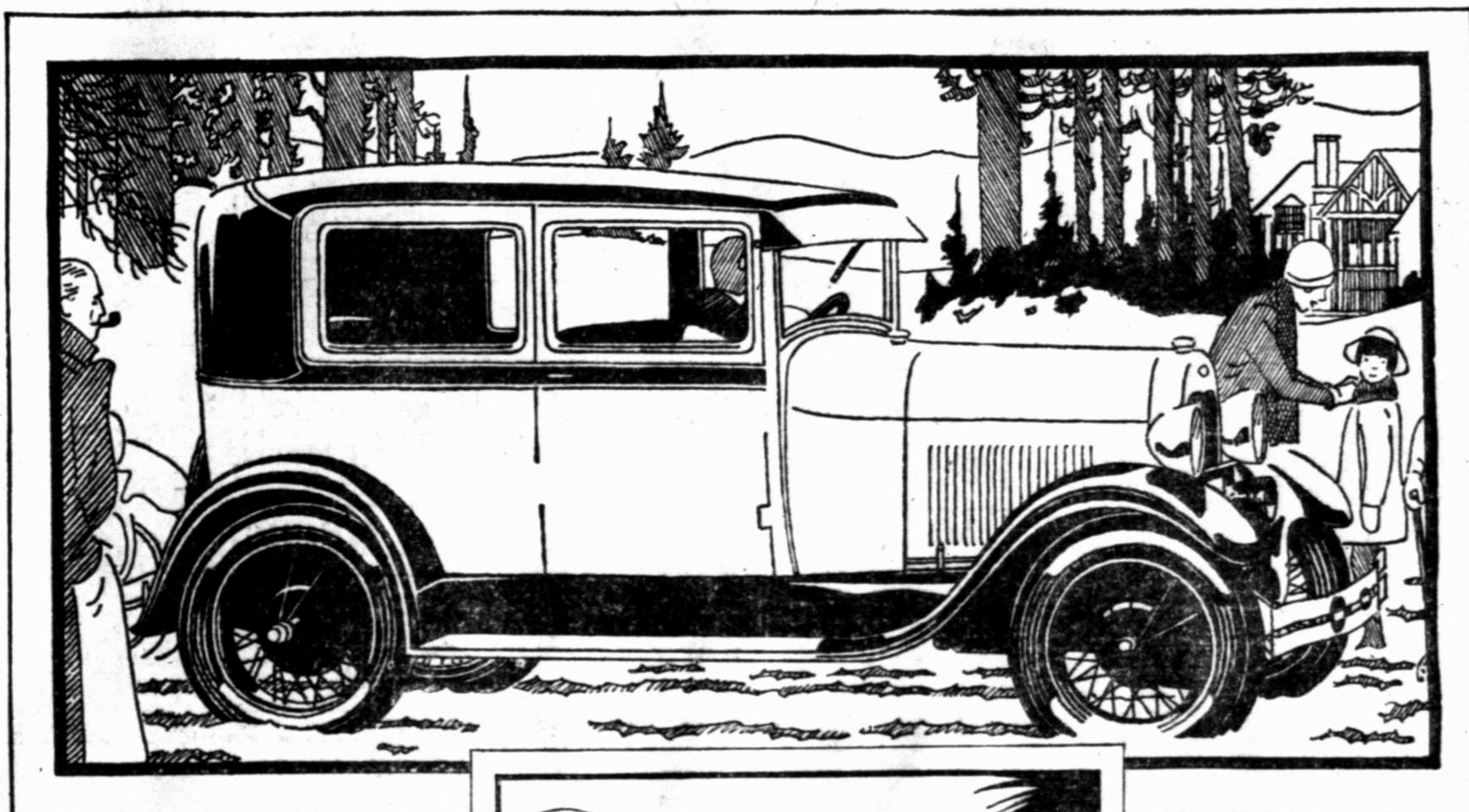

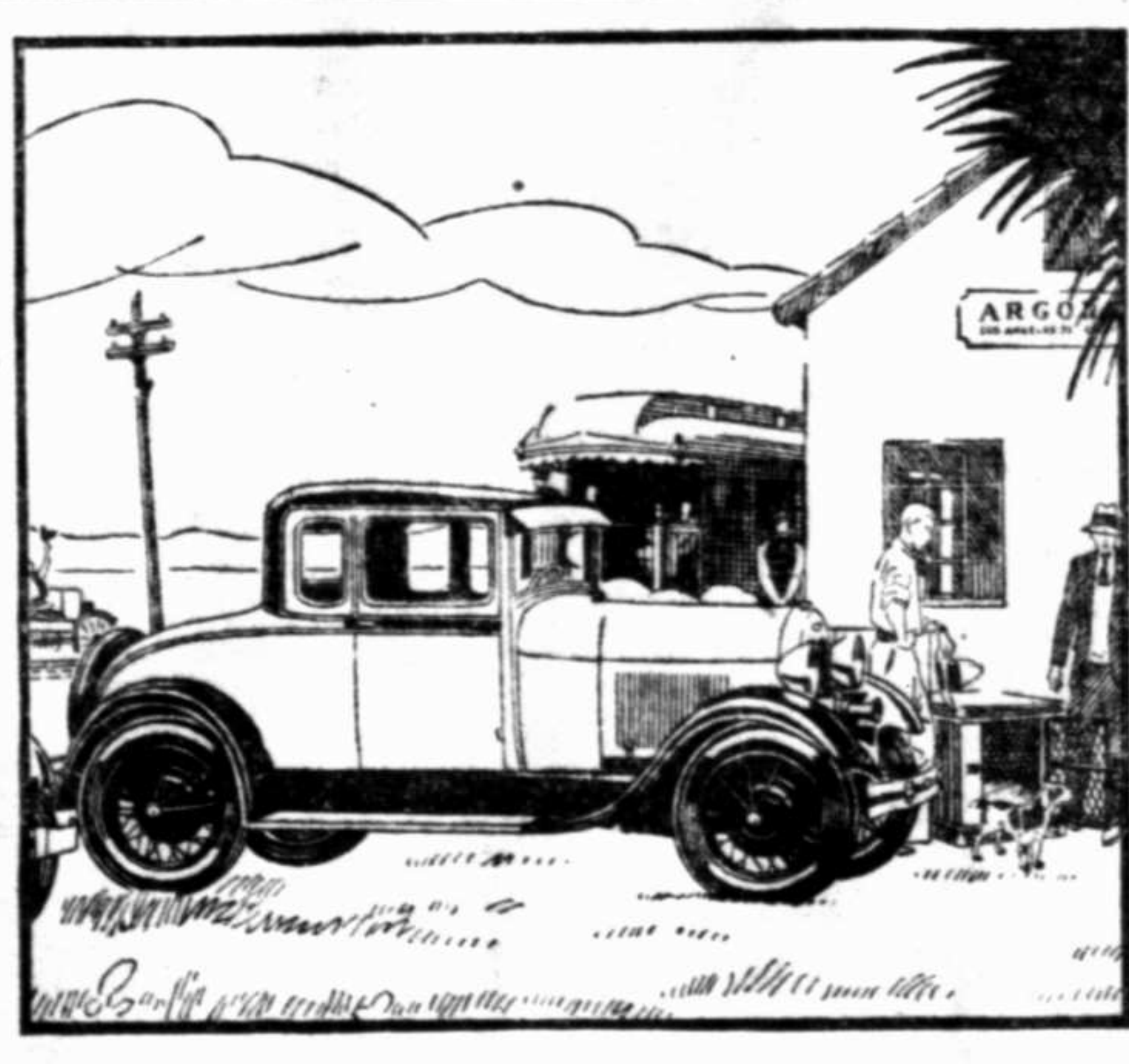
