LOANS NOW FOR MOVING CATTLE

**MAY OBTAIN FEDERAL LOAN
TO MOVE CATTLE FROM
EMERGENCY DROUTH
STRICKEN AREAS**

Emergency loans to farmers and stockmen in the emergency drouth areas to pay the cost of moving livestock to new pastures and rangelands from the recently approved

The announcement states that the loans for transporting livestock will be made to the local emergency and feed loan committee in the applicant's county.

The money loaned to pay transportation costs will be limited to a maximum not exceeding \$3.00 per head for farm cattle, \$1.50 for range cattle, \$4.00 for farm workstock, \$2.00 for saddle and pack horses, 50 cents for sheep and 35 cents for goats. These respective maximums

In addition to the allowance for transportation, loans may also be made to pay the cash costs of production, storage, and distribution.

According to the announcement, the loans may be made for the purchase of livestock for which a rate is allowed under the regulations.

International Sunday School Lesson

Church Of Christ

Lesson IX—August 26, 1934
God's Wonderful Love
Lesson Text, Hosea 11: 1-4, 8, 9;
14: 1-9

I. The Golden Text of the Bible (John 3: 16)

This scripture has endeared itself to every Bible lover. From its fountains have issued sermons legion. From its depths have men drunk for twenty centuries. It bursts upon the world like the breath of a flower garden. It is a spring bubbling with exquisite freshness from the Rock of Ages.

"God so loved the world"—The greatest possible motive; "That he gave his only Begotten Son"—the greatest possible gift; "That whosoever believeth"—widest welcome; "Should not perish"—greatest deliverance; "But have everlasting life"—reward of rewards.

God in his wisdom planned, in power executed, and in love offered salvation to the world upon the simple terms of the gospel—hearing, believing, obeying. Heaven gave up its richest treasure, Christ, that the lost world might be reconciled to God.

II Love The Unchangeable

Not only in the present age but in days of the prophets Jehovah loved his people. If Jeremiah was the "weeping prophet of Judah," Hosea was such for Israel. He prophesied during the reign of Jehu, the furious chariot driver. His life and message are pathetic beyond words. His wife, Gomer, became a true picture of Israel the Prodigal. This wife of his heart and mother of his children enticed away from his home and children, becoming again the property of immoral pillage. Then her butterfly days faded into the black night of reward. She was sold into slavery. Hosea still loved her though she had deserted him. So when he learns that she is to be sold, he searches among the slums and finds his prodigal wife, and rescues her from slavery for fifteen pieces of silver and a little barley. How this husband could forgive Gomer and receive her again into his home after her wayward life is a question to puzzle the average man. But God uses the allegory (if such it be) to teach Israel that though she had soaked her footsteps in the mire and pilloved her head in idolatry and crime, he could still forgive her and receive her with open arms.

Jehovah could not forget the innocence of Israel's boyhood days when he was delivered from Egypt. Those memories abode still in the heart of God. Those cords of affection which bound him to his child still tugged at him through the years. With cords of a man and "bands of love" God had led people through the wilderness. So how could he give them up? Surely it must have brought tears to the eyes of Hosea to record these things and foretell the awful fate to befall Israel if they did not repent of their sins. Hosea tells us that the more God's prophets called the people the more they went from them. Balaam had become their god, and incense to him their chief joy.

III. God's Grief for Ephraim

Ephraim especially is mentioned as being dear to Jehovah. "How shall I give thee up?" came the plaintive cry from heaven. The term, Ephraim, one of the largest sections of the country perhaps is here used to denote the whole realm of Israel. As a father hopes and longs for the return of his boy, so God looked for the return of the wandered, Ephraim. Some day the blacksliding of his people would be healed. God's hot anger against them would subside. Instead of a fruitless tree, withered and bruised by the desert winds this prodigal people would become as a blossoming lily. God longed for the day when Ephraim would say, "What have I any more to do with idols?" The lesson concludes by pointing out the goodness of God. His ways are declared to be right and that the just shall walk in them. But with all the forbearance of heaven the text warns that "transgressors shall fall". After all it is left to the person himself whether he will serve God or sin.

Smith for Re-election

Lon A. Smith Gives Many Reasons
Why He Should Be Elected
to Rail Commission

AUSTIN, AUG. 21—Under the chairmanship of Lon A. Smith, the Texas Railroad Commission in the past three years has done more to bring about orderly commercial traffic on the highways and insure low carrier rates to farmers and ranchmen than ever before in the history of the state.

These facts were being taken to East Texas this week by Chairman Smith in a vigorous campaign for re-election.

"My opponent's ignorance of the job he seeks," Smith declared here, "is shown in his speeches and his printed platform."

"Purely for vote-getting purposes he proposes lower freight rates, when it is a matter of fact and a record that rates are lower now than ever before. He promises to do something the Railroad Commission already has accomplished."

"Deceit is a mild word for my opponent's campaign utterances."

"First, he says he should be elected because he is an oil man and, presumably, would be better qualified to regulate the oil industry. It is an ancient principle in this democratic government that no man should be financially interested in any subject upon which he must pass judgement. Would you allow a defendant in a law suit to serve on his own jury?"

"Then he discards whatever merit there may be in his first contention by proposing that the present oil control of the Texas Railroad Commission be discarded. That admittedly leaves him with not a single qualification for the office."

"Now we come to what must be either ignorance or downright deceit, either of which is poor qualification for the office of Railroad Commissioner. This man proposes to take over the powers of the Texas Highway Commission and the Legislature and center them in himself—if he is sincere in what he says."

"He would, he says, widen all roadbeds of state highways to 18 feet. But how would he persuade the highway commission to do that? That's purely a highway commission function. Moreover, by carrying out this pledge so lightly given, he would double state expenditures—for building highways is an expensive proposition. Next, he would increase the present limit of trucks from 7,000 to 12,000 pounds, thus usurping a legislative duty the legislature having prescribed the present load limit. Finally, he would lower automobile license fees. That would be fine. I would like to pay less for license, too. But nobody but the legislature can give you that relief."

"You might think, from reading this absurd platform, that this man was running for governor."

"The only other thing his platform discusses is lowered freight

rates, which I have already discussed. That's the sum total of what he offers. No wonder that in his speeches, and particularly in his radio addresses, he has pitched his campaign on a basis of personal slander.

"It is a fact worth noting that while he charges the Commission with failing to stop hot oil in East Texas, he offers you no remedy. Do you want to know why he doesn't condemn this evil? Look at his record in the oil business and you will know. Mr. Pundt is not going to cast the first stone, at the hot oil thieves. It may be true that a few barrels of hot oil are run in East Texas, where a staff of 200 men can't possibly keep up with 15,000 oil wells, but no member of the Texas Railroad Commission ever ran a barrel. Ask Mr. Pundt if he can truthfully give you the same testimony."

"A man who willfully attempts to deceive, by promising things utterly beyond his authority to fulfill, is a dangerous man. If he cannot be trusted before the election, how can he be trustworthy afterwards?"

"The Commission has held steadfastly to the principles laid down by the immortal James Stephen Hogg and the Commission's first Chairman, John Reagan, who believed that a state as mighty as Texas should control its own industries. We have fought in defense of that principle in Austin and in Washington and that fight has led to the present attack upon us. Don't be deceived, this is a fight to overthrow the Railroad Commission because it has upheld the sovereignty of the state of Texas."

NEW PLAN FOR CLASSIFYING WORKERS FOR RELIEF

Austin, Aug. 21—A new plan for classifying budgetary workmen from relief rolls was announced today by E. A. Baugh, chief engineer of the Texas Relief Commission.

Any workman will be classified as a skilled workman when he produces at least two letters from former employers who state in those letters that he has worked for them as a skilled laborer in a certain craft and that his work as such was satisfactory. In lieu of such letters, evidence of paid up membership in a recognized labor organization will be accepted as evidence that the workman is entitled to a classification as a skilled mechanic.

The new procedure developed because many counties reported difficulty in classifying workers as to

VOTERS SWING ING TO ALLRED

STORY APPEARS CERTAIN FOR YOUTHFUL ATTORNEY GENERAL OVER RICH OIL MAN

Fort Worth, Tex., Aug. 20.—James Allred, recruiting voters from all corners of Texas to his program for betterment, brought his campaign for governor to Ft. Worth last week, mid-point in a week's itinerary that carried him from the Panhandle deep into Central Texas.

He ended the first week of the campaign with a major victory over his millionaire oil man opponent, Tom Hunter of Wichita Falls, in a bitter dispute over Hunter's proposal for a sales tax.

Allred declared that Hunter had proposed a sales tax, and is now advocating it under the new "blended tax" to further burden tax-oppressed farmers, home owners, and business men. He offered as proof a letter Hunter had written, then forgotten. Hunter said he never advocated a sales tax, and demanded the proof.

Allred obligingly allowed a Hunter representative to photograph the letter. The oil man denied having written the letter. "But he does not and cannot deny having written it," rejoined the Attorney General. "I did not charge it was his signature on the letter," Allred reminded voters here. "I said he wrote the letter and that it was signed by Tom F. Hunter by H. G., with the initials stand for Hilda Grew, his secretary. If he denies having dictated the letter I will show a specimen of her signature to prove she signed it at his dictation," Allred declared.

Allred opened this week's campaign with a double-barrel attack on Hunter's tax program. The oil man's demand for abolition of the ad valorem would not relieve the average home owner and farmer in Texas, but would remove taxes from oil corporations and would benefit Tom Hunter personally. Allred pointed out that the Hunter oil Corporation, of which Tom Hunter is vice president and general manager, was chartered in Delaware "for the purpose of evading the corporation laws of this State."

"Mr. Hunter and his oil corporation own seventy oil wells and have received more than half a million dollars in the last three and one-half years. Yet Mr. Hunter has made a demagogic appeal that he wants to help the poor man by taking the ad valorem taxes off his own oil wells and those of his Delaware corporation," Attorney General Allred pointed out.

Hunter now occupies the same position in this campaign that C. C. McDonald occupied before the primary—"that of the crown prince of the Ferguson administration, whose election would carry on the Ferguson dynasty," Allred asserted.

"I can just see Comrade Tom now Ferguson dynasty," Allred asserted.

"I can just see comrade Tom now as he begins to select his super-cabinet of seven members. At the head of the table will be Chancellor Tom Hunter. At the right will be seated Prime Minister Charley McDonald, the deposed Crown Prince of the Ferguson dynasty, who has now been supplanted by Dictator Tom."

"On his left will be Minister of Finance (without portfolio), old honest Jim Ferguson, who will continue in the department of Forest and Streams (wood and water totting), you remember. Next in order will be Minister of Highways and Roads, Frank Denison, who built the most costly Eighth Wonder of the World, invisible road between Temple and Belton.

"Across the table, decorated with his badges, will be Minister of War Jake Wolfers. At Jake's warm side is seated Minister of Propaganda, S. W. Adams, mud-slinging, slanderer, editor of the late Gladewater Journal and of the anti-Roosevelt Adams Journal of Austin.

"At the opposite end of the table will be two of a kind, Minister of Oil and the Interior, Charley Francis, attorney for the American Petroleum Institute and the oil companies in the anti-trust suit, and Minister of Monopolies and Special Privileges, pipe-smoking T. H. McGregor, attorney for the Humble Oil Company.

"In the waiting room outside,

"Seriously, my friends, the people of Texas know that T. F. Hunter has not been able to gather around him this galaxy of political support without having incurred political obligations which will hamstring and hamper him. Texas citizens who are determined to end the old political rule by supporting Allred were increasing in number each day. R. T. Craig, Editor of the Athens Review announced that his paper and the Ma-bank Banner and the Wood County Record, which have supported the Fergusons for years assisted the candidacy of C. C. McDonald in the first primary, had declared for Allred in the run-off. Craig said that the Kemp News, which also supported McDonald, is now for Allred. Similar reports came from all sections of the State.

TO MAKE SURVEY FOR FUEL NEEDS OF RELIEF WORKERS

Austin, Aug. 21.—County administrators today were asked to conduct a survey relating to the problem of fuel for relief clients during the coming winter.

The survey will ascertain the cost of fuel last winter and the estimated cost of fuel necessary to furnish during October, November, December, January, and February next. Administrators also were requested to estimate the average cost of fuel per family and the number of families for whom fuel will have to be provided.

Results will be compiled and forwarded to Washington, C. Z. Crain, director of Commodities distribution, said. The survey is expected to determine on what basis fuel will be supplied during the winter.

WOODWARD FOR STATE LAWYER

WEST TEXAS LAWYER IS BET-
TER QUALIFIED FOR AT-
TORNEY GENERAL THAN
HIS OPPONENT

FARMERSVILLE, Aug. 20.—Senator Woodward's exposure of his opponent for attorney general, William McCraw of Dallas, as the lobbyist and attorney for a grocery chain of 3,200 stores owned by out-of-state capitalists has caused a reaction against McCraw which is sweeping away McCraw's support in the small towns of Texas.

The exposure of McCraw as lawyer for a chain is about to go into a combination of 14,000 stores, making it necessary for the attorney general to pass on the legality of the combine and whether it is a conspiracy in restraint of trade, has disqualified McCraw for attorney generalship.

It is necessary that an independent lawyer like Walter Woodward be elected attorney general so the farmers can be protected against conspiracies to lower buying prices, consumers against conspiracies to raise selling prices and independent merchants against unfair competition.

McCraw also was exposed by Woodward as the Dallas County district attorney who filed 13,978 tax suits during hard times against Dallas County people who could not pay their taxes. McCraw was paid a fee for every tax suit filed and he filed thousands of them and got a big part of the \$125,000 he made out of the district attorney's office as his own personal pay in this way.

Woodward was introduced by civic leaders as a member of the senate finance committee which with the house committee cut state expenses \$12,000,000. He was one of the leaders in passing the moratorium bill which gave home owners a period of grace when they were threatened with foreclosures. He also was for giving more time to pay taxes and cutting auto license fees. He put the bill through the senate which allowed the public schools to get \$17.50 per capita in state aid instead of \$4.00.

McCraw was also exposed by Woodward for misrepresenting his stand on prohibition by telling the crowd at Taylor on July 1 he was an anti-prohibitionist and the crowd at Terrell on July 4 he was a prohibitionist. A man like McCraw

who would tell one bunch he was wet and another he was dry does not deserve the support of the wets or the dries, Woodward said.

Woodward has been a qualified civil lawyer for 25 years and has represented 16 small Texas counties as state senator for 10 years. He studied law under a kerosene lamp in a baggage car while working as an express messenger. He has always stood for the people while serving in the state senate.

McCraw was connected by Senator Woodward to an insurance company which owes the widow of a Port Worth Union printer \$1,000 on an insurance policy and which has never offered to pay her more than \$4.00. The husband of this woman was killed in a street car accident. He carried a policy in the company McCraw is connected with and the company will not pay off, although the widow has a court judgement.

Senator Woodward has always done much to get money for the schools so the teachers could be paid good salaries and the children well educated, according to the people who know him best.

Although the Klan is not an issue in the attorney general's race, McCraw has forfeited all respect of the people by denying to South Texas leaders that he ever belonged, while appealing to former Klansmen for support because he was the man who rode the big white horse in Klan parades in Dallas and Port Worth.

McCraw was grand orator of the Klan and was in the district attorney's office at Dallas when 60 people were whipped by the Klan and

Wichita Falls and got a job as stenographer in a law office in order that he might read law in his spare time. Carefully saving his money, he went to Cumberland University which has provided Texas with many distinguished jurists.

Upon graduation he returned to Wichita Falls and entered a law office at \$50 a month. His ability and sincerity later attracted the attention of Governor Pat M. Neff who appointed him district attorney of the Wichita Falls district, comprising four counties.

In 1924 he was elected to the office he had held by appointment. Two years later he resigned to make his first race for statewide office. In the campaign of 1926 Allred proved himself to be the most forceful and winning campaigner of modern Texas politics. He lost to Claude Pollard of Houston by only 4,000 votes out of more than 700,000 cast.

Allred turned the defeat for Attorney General into a personal victory by marrying one of his most ardent supporters, Joe Betsy Miller of Wichita Falls, a talented musician who was then graduating from Southern Methodist University.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 13

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:
Section 1. That Section 3 of Article VIII of the Constitution of the State of Texas be so amended as to hereinafter read as follows:
"Section 3. Taxes shall be levied and collected by general laws and for public purposes only, and the total amount of revenue which the State shall be authorized to collect during each biennium from taxes, licenses, permits and fees, (except fees paid by students to state educational institutions, and except rentals, bonuses and royalties obtained from public lands and other public property) shall not exceed a sum reasonably estimated to equal the product obtained by multiplying the number of the inhabitants of this State by the sum of Twenty-two and 50-100 (\$22.50). Dollars, provided, however, that the amount of such revenue which may be so collected, shall be reduced by the amount of any surplus funds or unexpended appropriations remaining at the close of the preceding biennium. The expenditures of the State government of funds derived from the sources above referred to shall never exceed during any biennium a sum equal to the product obtained by multiplying the number of inhabitants of this State by the sum of Twenty-two and 50-100 (\$22.50). Dollars, provided, however, that the amount of such revenue which may be so collected, shall be reduced by the amount of any surplus funds or unexpended appropriations remaining at the close of the preceding biennium. The expenditures of the State government of funds derived from the sources above referred to shall never exceed during any biennium a sum equal to the product obtained by multiplying the number of inhabitants of this State by the sum of Twenty-two and 50-100 (\$22.50). THE HERALD PICKS A TICKET FOR THE RUN-OFF PRIMARY

In response to many requests the Herald is presenting its choice of candidates for state offices in the run-off primary. We are offering our recommendations after giving careful consideration to the qualifications of the different candidates.

JAMES V. ALLRED is our choice for governor over Tom P. Hunter. We consider him head and shoulders above the Wichita Falls oil man. Allred's record in public office, as a county, district attorney, and attorney-general speaks for itself. Of all the bitter accusations hurled against him in this campaign, he has never once been accused of any dishonest act. While he is young in years, he is old in official experience. He is a patriot and he showed his love of the state and nation, when in 1917, at the age 19 and under the draft age, he volunteered his services to his country and served during the World War for \$30.00 per month while his opponent, who was of draft age, stayed at home and rolled up millions in the oil business. From our viewpoint this is an outstanding comparison of the "sense of public duty" of the two candidates. Allred is a poor man, he has the interests of the common people at heart, and this we

do not believe to be the case with Hunter.

WALTER F. WOODUL of Harris county for Lieutenant Governor is opposed by Joe Moore of Hunt county. In the first primary, Woodul lacked but a few votes of being nominated with out a run-off. Woodul has been a friend of West Texas during his many years of service as State Senator and in our opinion the Panhandle should support a man who has stood by West Texas even though he lives at Houston.

WALTER WOODWARD, Coleman, a West Texan, will receive our vote for Attorney-General. He is opposed by William McCraw, a young lawyer from Dallas, whose actual experience in the practice of law has been limited to the criminal courts, and even in this limited sphere of action has not been particularly successful. McCraw's connection with a giant chain store syndicate would eliminate him from our consideration, even though we did not consider Walter Woodward a much abler man to represent the State of Texas as chief legal representative. Woodward is an experienced attorney with thirty years of active and successful practice back

of him. He is a West Texan, a man of integrity and dependability and his bitterest political enemies cannot challenge his good faith and honesty in either his private or political life.

LON A. SMITH, at present a member of the State Railroad Commission, is our choice for State Railroad Commission. Smith's record as a member of the Commission, in our opinion, entitles him to re-election, over John Pundt, another unknown quantity. Pundt received some rather unfavorable publicity in the recent "job selling" scandal of the present Ferguson administration.

JOHN H. SHARP, running for Associate Justice of the Supreme Court, against Judge H. S. Lattimore, is, to our mind, the much better qualified. Judge Sharp has had years of experience on the supreme court. His decisions have been found to have that degree and merit, that when written, they are adopted as the decisions of the court of final resort. Lattimore comes of a politically minded Texas family and the name of "Lattimore" undoubtedly secured for him many votes in the recent primary.
