



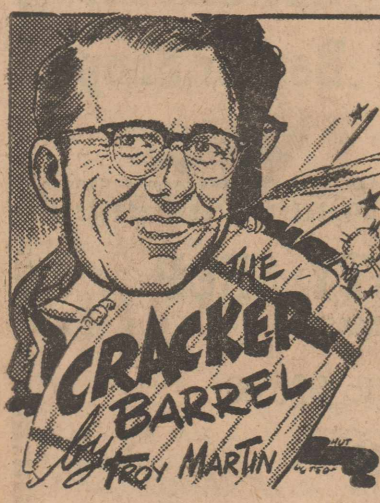

## More Than 1,000 Swim First Week ORC Pool Open

If you wondered why you couldn't find anyone home in Olton last week, here's one explanation:

At the brand new ORC swimming pool alone, something like 1,062 people were found during an eight-day period from Sunday, June 29, through Sunday, July 6.

July 4 was the biggest day, with 214 swimmers registered, according to Joe Turner, pool manager. Next highest day was July 1, when 185 youngsters and adults registered.

Low day was Saturday, July 5, when only 50 persons braved the chilly weather to go swimming.

"We are more than pleased with the interest," Mr. Turner comments. "Three life guards monitor the pool during every open hour. They are Linda Franks, Sandra Hamby and John Jefferies. Each guard has one day off each week, but otherwise is on duty from 2 to 8 P.M. in addition to the time required for cleaning the pool and appointments. They also teach swimming lessons in the mornings."

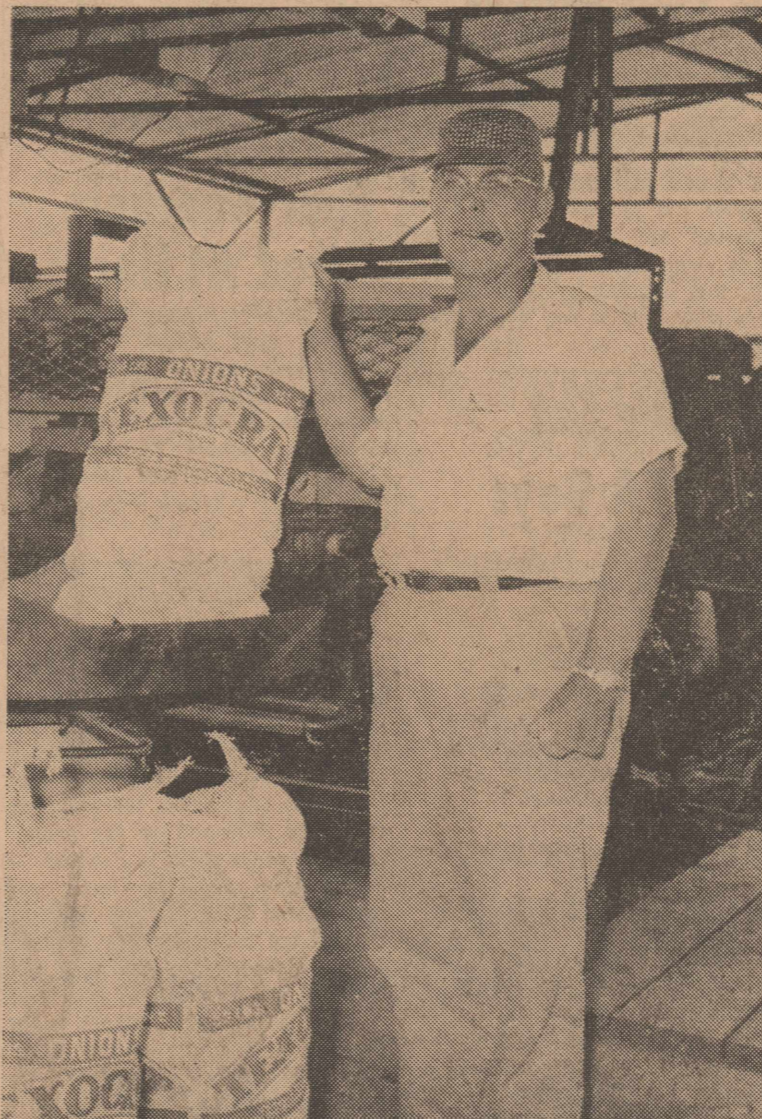
# Crop Prospects Never Brighter Say Farmers After 2-Inch Rain

## Harvesting Of Vegetables On

Crop prospects looked good this week. Farmers who grow wheat have just finished harvesting a bumper crop. Potatoes and onions are coming off.

Grain sorghum and cotton crops were never better and farmers seem to have insects a little more under control than a few days ago.

Estimates placed the rainfall here Friday and Saturday nights at a little more than two inches. There was no report of hail damage.

Olton community was invaded over the weekend by the harlequin cabbage beetle. Strangely, the beetles covered certain varieties of trees particularly in Hillcrest addition of Olton and steered clear of other varieties nearby.

Don Spain at Olton Farm Supply said this particular beetle is very choosy and thrives most upon cabbage as his name implies.

Lygus Build Up There has been somewhat of a build up of lygus bugs the past few days. These insects puncture the squares and knock off bolls. There is some fleahopper infestation. It was not believed to have reached serious stages early this week, however.

Corn looks like a coming crop in the Olton and South Plains irrigated belt this year. The Olton community alone is estimated to have an acreage at least approaching 5,000 acres.

There is about 2,000 acres of pinto beans in the community. The community has about 1,500 acres of sesame.

Cotton is in very good shape for this time of year. It is fruiting in profusion. Grain sorghum also is in top shape. It is very early this year and much of it already is heading.

Potatoes Back to potatoes, J. B. Williams, who operates a potato shed north of Circle, is processing. He said potatoes are bringing a little more than \$3.00 per sack.

Cucumbers Cucumber harvest is expected to start in about ten days. Olton has some 250 acres of cucumbers this year. It is the community's first year in pickle production.

The grader is already here and will be located at Straw-Burrow Gin Company.

In the meantime, Russell Grimes, secretary of Olton Chamber of Commerce and Agriculture, has been searching for bees of the honey-making variety.

Cucumber experts say the cross-pollination done by the bees will almost double the cucumber yield.

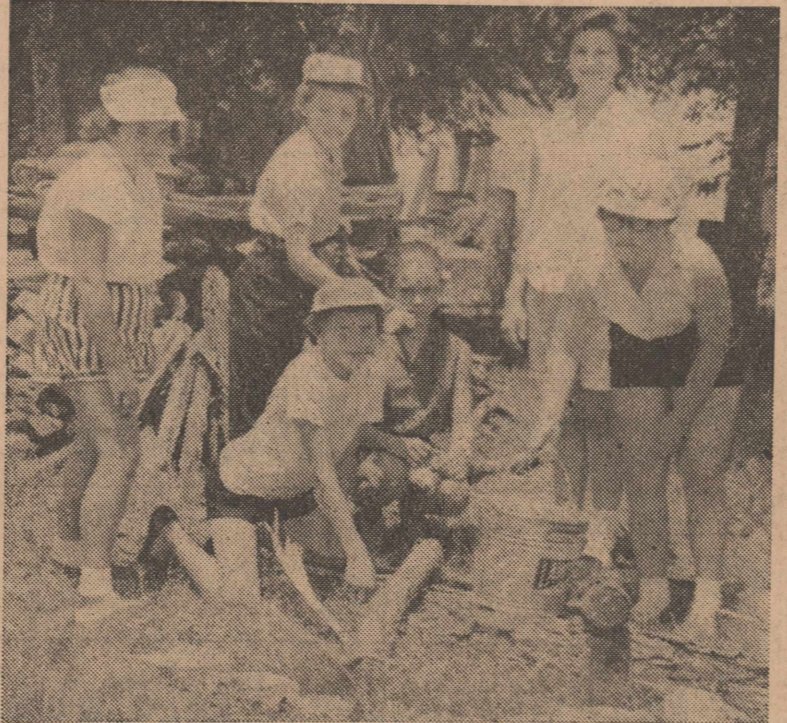

## —Swimming Pool Rules—

1. No running any place.
2. Do not talk to life guards on duty.
3. Shower before entering the pool.
4. Dive off straight.
5. Only one person on the diving board at a time.
6. Swim where your ability is within means. (12 year olds—stay out of the baby pool.)
7. Follow the life guard's instructions if he, or she, tells you to do something.
8. Don't water fight.
9. Stay off the life line.
10. Keep all inner tubes in 4-foot water.
11. Do not push anyone in, or otherwise be rough.
12. Always check your baskets in the shower room before entering the pool. Do not leave towels or other personal possessions on the bench.
13. Do not throw ANYTHING into the pool.
14. Do not take glass bottles or plates to the pool area.
15. Don't double-jump on diving board.

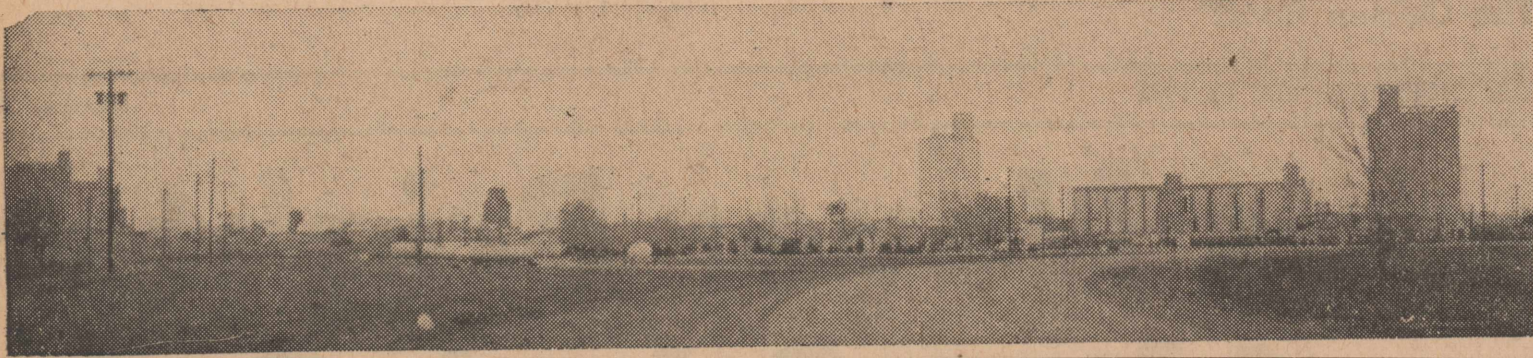
