Z. D. Allen Asks To Be Placed As District Attorney

Z. D. Allen, a Democrat, and well known Wichita Falls lawyer and former Assistant County Attorney of Wichita County, this week was in Burkburnett meeting his many friends. He is a candidate for the office of District Attorney of the 36th Judicial District, composed of Wichita, Archer and Young Counties. He has been actively campaigning over the district for sometime.

Mr. Allen is 36 years old and married. He was born in Hill County, Texas, where he lived on a farm and ranch, except while he was away at school, until 1922. From 1922 until 1926 he lived at Cleburne, Texas. While he lived in Cleburne, he was engaged in contracting with his father, doing work for the Santa Fe Railway Company part of that time. In 1926 he moved to Wichita County and has lived here since. He is a member of the church. After being admitted to the bar by the Supreme Court, Mr. Allen was engaged in general practice with P. B. Cox with offices in the Waggoner Building at

Wichita Falls. In the summer of 1932, he was appointed Assistant County Attorney of Wichita County where he served until January 1, 1933. Since that time he has been engaged in general practice of law with offices in the Waggoner Building. He has served as President of the Blackstone Club, and has served as the Secretary and Treasurer of the Wichita County Bar Association.

Mr. Allen has an outstanding record as a trial lawyer which speaks for itself. He has been active in the practice of both civil and criminal law since being admitted to the bar.

In discussing his candidacy, Mr. Allen said: "I have never before been a candidate for public office, and did not decide to enter this race until I conferred with my friends over the district."

"Article 2 of the Penal Code of Texas says: 'The object of punishment is to suppress crime and reform the offender.' Bearing that in mind, I do not think that the penal laws of this state should be so administered with the only purpose in mind to make a record for someone. It is easy for a District Attorney where he tries nothing but cases in which he has a confession of guilt, and refrains from trying the contested cases on the docket. The 'guilty' should be vigorously prosecuted whether or not the defendant signs a confession and pleads guilty or contests his case. It is easier, of course, to take the line of least resistance. I do not believe that the District Attorney should single out one particular offense and lend all of his efforts towards prosecuting the violation of that law simply because it happens to be an offense that is easy to obtain a conviction in, but I believe that in prosecution for the violation of all laws equally. If you elect me your District Attorney, I assure you that the hardened criminal who will not sign a confession and plead guilty will be tried the same as the youthful first offender who does. I desire to state that I believe in the enforcement of the law equally and impartially; if elected to the important office of District Attorney, I assure you that all men will be treated equally before the law insofar as the District Attorney's office has anything to do with it—that the high and low, the rich and the poor, will be prosecuted alike, and in such manner as to do justice to the public and the accused. I assure you further that if elected I will, at all times, be glad to have you discuss matters pertaining to the office, and promise you courteous treatment, and it will not be necessary to send a card in on a silver platter for you to see me. It will ever be my policy as your District Attorney to work with and co-operate with the County Attorney of each of the three counties, and all of the peace officers in the district."

"I believe that the people of this district are entitled to a man in charge of this important office who is mature in age and experience. I invite anyone to investigate my record as to my legal ability and integrity and refer you to those whom I associate with most, and the people who have employed me. They can tell you better than anyone else whether or not I am qualified to hold the high office that I aspire to."

"I am seeing as many people as possible and before this campaign is over it shall be my purpose and desire to meet every voter in the district and make your personal acquaintance, but in case I should miss seeing you, I earnestly request that you investigate me and give me your fair and impartial consideration before you cast your vote."

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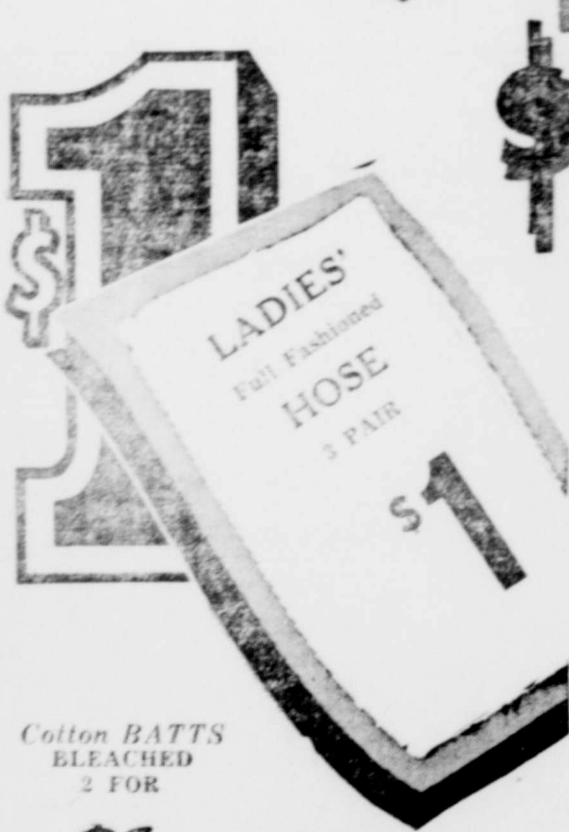

Trapped Deer Sent To New Habitats

With distribution complete, the State Department has distributed 247 deer, mostly does, to various parts of the state this year. This is more, than double the number sent out for restocking purposes last year.

All excepting 78 of the deer were trapped in their native habitats and hence are expected to breed better in their new homes. Heretofore, most of the deer distributed by the department have been partly or wholly domesticated.

Distribution of wild deer was made possible through use of a unique "deer trap," on a 1700-acre ranch between Fredericksburg and Mason, believed the only one of its kind.

Two deer proof fences 300 yards long are built in a "V" shape and at the juncture of the fences is a 12-foot pit floored with sand. Deer were herded in to the fence, caught in the pit, and put into padded trucks for distribution.

The trap was first tried out several years ago, but lack of knowledge in how to manage the animals resulted in disasters. The frightened animals fell against concrete sides of the pit, or were frightened to death, and 60 per cent of all that were trapped died.

privately owned, with the Game Department buying the animals for distribution.

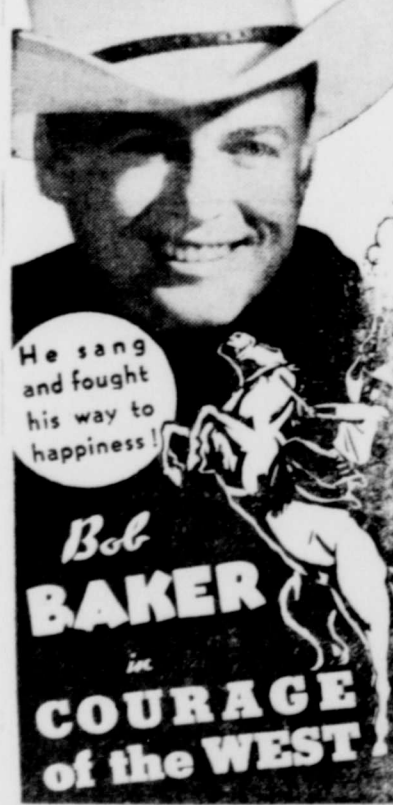

State Officials And Oil Operators Tackle Problems

When, last January, the Texas Railroad Commission invoked Sunday shutdowns of all Texas oil fields, operators imagined no more drastic step could be taken in the fight to hold output in line with demand.

Last week the Commission topped itself, simply, by adding Saturday shutdowns to the Sunday closing.

Insiders say that before taking this step, Texas was assured by Oklahoma's Governor Marland that Oklahoma would follow suit. Regardless of any advance understanding, on the day following Oklahoma did follow suit, with a cut of some 80,000 barrels.

The Texas order was announced by Commissioner Ernest O. Thompson in Dallas. It came as East Texans were protesting Sunday shutdowns, threatening to file suit to test its validity.

Meanwhile the industry waited on reciprocal action from Louisiana.

Texas Independent Petroleum Association President Harold Byrd demanded that Louisiana join in the reduction, complained vigorously in a lengthy statement that Louisiana is a serious threat to the national market. He called a meeting of his board of directors to consider the general situation.

Estimates in Austin of the allowable cut indicate that Texas will lose 4,123,000 barrels in allowable during the month because of the Saturday cut. This brings the total cut for May to 9,380,000 barrels, an average of 319,000 barrels per day.

Developments of the past week point to a stormy statewide production hearing in Austin Tuesday. With East Texas operators clamoring for abandonment of the Sunday shut-down, West Texas hunting for more market, and operators generally uncertain of the results to be obtained by the cuts.

However, because the two-day shut-down has been suggested in the past and has brought no serious opposition from operators, it appears that the plan is likely to succeed, that it will be accepted with no more than grumbling from Texas producers, especially since the program has been bolstered by active support from Oklahoma.

One aspect of the new program should be considered seriously: If the Texas Railroad Commission finds it necessary to continue the Sunday shutdowns throughout 1938, as national conditions seem to warrant, it will be able to toss a sop to producers during June or July by lifting the Saturday closing.

Chief reason for the Saturday closing was to stave off “pipe line proration”—the arbitrary cutting of their takes by pipe line companies. Already Sinclair had cut in KMA, 25 per cent on all wells from which they purchased. Humble was threatening a similar cut in West Texas.

Hence operators of the West Texas fields willingly agreed to a cut in their output at a hearing before the Commission.

With the low total, Gulf Coast

advanced to first place among districts with 49 locations, and Nueces county led the district with 11 wells.

Continued activity in the KMA field was responsible for 41 locations reported from the North Texas area, with 21 in Wichita county.

In West Texas, operators planned 29 new wells, Ector county continuing in the lead with 11 wells.

Only three locations were made in East Texas, two of which were in Gregg county and the third in Rusk.

Southwest Texas operators

planned 26 new wells, county reporting 10 locations.

In the East Central West Central Texas planned eight new wells, Panhandle, ten projected.
