BDT Establishes

'Hot Line'

The Texas Beef Development Taskforce (BDT) has established a toll-free "Hotline" to answer questions from cattle producers about the Beef Referendum.

Registration for the long-awaited Referendum is taking place June 6-17 at nearly 2,000 county ASCS offices across the nation. Cattle producers who wish to vote must register before the June 17 deadline. Actual voting will take place back at the ASCS offices between July 5-15.

"Beef producers who have a question about the program can call 1-800-682-4106 weekdays between the hours of 8 a.m. and 8 p.m.," says Texas BDT Chairman J.D. Sartwelle of Sealy.

The Referendum, if approved by two-third of the cattle producers voting, would authorize the first nationwide self-help program for the beef industry. Using the value-added system, each cattle producer would contribute 3/10 of 1% (30 cents per \$100) of the value of each animal sold. This rate would raise \$30 million to \$40 million per year for beef research, education and promotion, says Sartwelle.

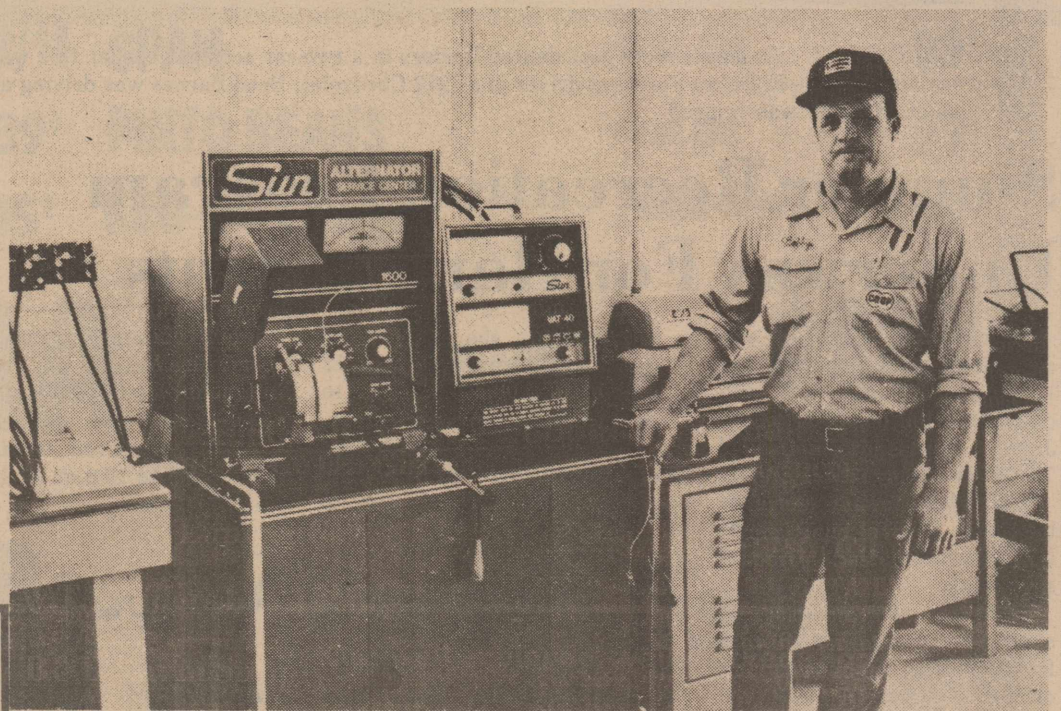

Five Minutes With The Bible

WHY FEELINGS CANNOT BE EVIDENCE OF SALVATION - Part 1

Pardon obtains with God; it does not emanate from man. In other words, man cannot pardon his own sins. Paul said in Acts 13:38-39, "Be it known unto you therefore, men and brethren, that through this man (that is, Jesus) is preached unto you the forgiveness of sins: And by him all that believe are justified from all things, from which ye could not be justified by the law of Moses." Since this is true, certainly then, our feelings cannot be evidence of salvation. Jesus said, "He that rejecteth me, and receiveth not my words, hath one that judgeth him: the words that I have spoken, the same shall judge him in the last day." (John 12:48)

In order to gain a better understanding of why feelings cannot be evidence of salvation, let us analyze word by word the biblical statement, "What must I do to be saved?" "What" - this word suggests that there is something required of man in being saved. He who asks the question understands this fact. "Must" - This word indicates that it is not a matter of option. The word "must" teaches the absolute necessity of the requirement. "I" - It is not what God, Christ, and the Holy Spirit must do, but what "I" must do. All know that the Godhead has a part in man's salvation. God, Christ, and the Holy Spirit have perfectly executed the divine part in man's salvation. But the inquirer is not seeking to learn

functions of the Godhead. The "I" in the question denotes individual responsibility in human redemption. "Do" - It is not what I must get, think, feel or believe. The word "do" suggests activity on the part of the man being saved. Salvation is not a matter of passiveness, but of activity. God saves; still, man saves himself by obeying the gospel, God's power to save (Rom. 1:16; Acts 2:40). Take the word "do" out of Christianity and you destroy it. You never read of an inspired man's telling a sinner that there is nothing for him to do to be saved. "To be saved" - This phrase denotes the purpose of complying with the conditions. "To be saved" is the object of the querist. The phrase also suggests that the saving is done by another. Next week we will examine some definite illustrations and scriptures as to why feelings cannot be evidence of salvation.

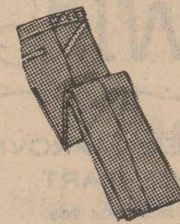

Recipes that they learned while attending Girl Scout Day Camp last week in Plainview are shared this week by two young cooks who moved southeast of Hart two months ago.

Peggy, 11, and Donna, eight, are daughters of Mr. and Mrs. Oscar Walker Jr. They have a little brother, Jeremy, six. Their father is mechanic for Thomas Brooks and their mother is the new manager of The Hart Beat.

Attending Day Camp from Tuesday until Friday, the girls learned to build fires and to cook outdoors. Already they liked cooking at home so the camp experiences were especially fun.

The girls learned to make "buddy burner." Using a number 10 can, two holes were punched at the "back" of the

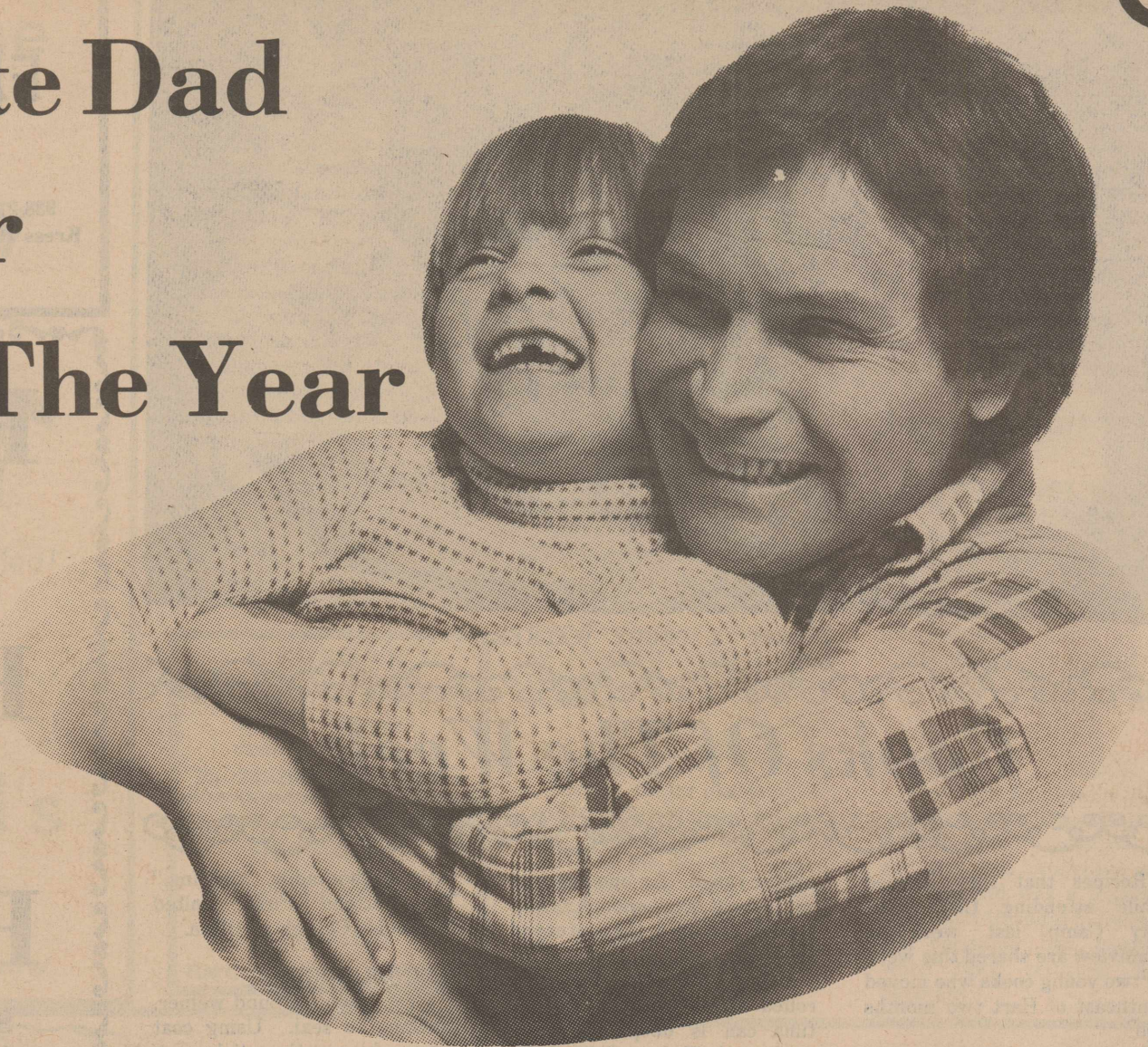

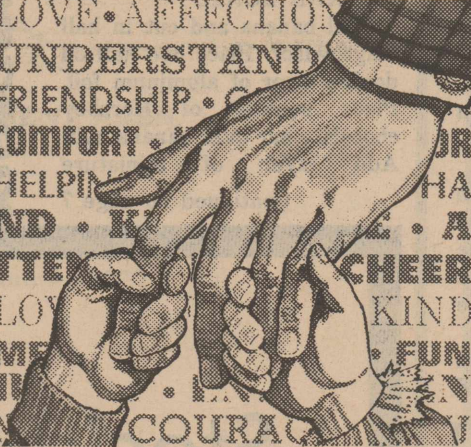

Mother Of Hart Residents Tells Of Visit To Germany

Mr. and Mrs. Roy Byrd, mother and stepfather of Mrs. Mack Davis and Jerry Kittrell, recently visited in Germany. The following is Mrs. Byrd's account of their memorable trip:

We left Lazbuddie April 21 and visited relatives in New Mexico, Arizona and California. May 1 we boarded a 747 Lufthansa German plane for Frankfurt, Germany. Roy's son-in-law, Jerry Esmay, is stationed near there.

The countryside is lovely. There are so many little villages scattered over the hill sides. The streets are crooked and narrow and roofs are steep. There is no wasted land

there, every plot has something growing on it. Vineyards are on such steep hill sides one could not see how they work them. There is such an abundance of fresh vegetables and flowers.

A few shepherds still herd their sheep with dogs wherever there is grass available. Barns are attached to houses or on the bottom floor and animals aren't put out to graze.

Most of the work is done by hand. What tractors we saw were small.

We also spent four days in Holland. Tulips were in full blossom. Acres and acres of every kind and color were being cut and piled up as they grow them for bulbs. It hurt to see the flowers destroyed though.

The Dutch windmills and people wearing wooden shoes were interesting.

We saw so many beautiful dairy cattle, but missed visiting a cheese factory.

We played on the beach of the North Sea, but it was cold and windy that day. We visited a couple of museums and watched a silversmith work in Amsterdam.

After returning to Germany, we attended a beer fest they had celebrating the opening of a new brewery. It was very interesting. They had a band playing and everyone singing.

Beer was served in huge mugs holding a liter - a little more than a quart. They also had soda pop!

We toured a castle filled with paintings and statues. It also had marble floors. Parts of it are rented out to families.

May 16 we left Frankfurt for Los Angeles and flew over Greenland. The pilot flew low over Greenland - low enough to point out glaciers and things of interest. It was beautiful. We returned home May 23 and left for South Dakota May 31. I think we are ready to stay put for awhile now.

marshmallows. Top with other half of banana and repeat layers of Hershey and marshmallows. Fold aluminum to completely wrap. Place on camp fire coals about one minute. Turn and leave one minute on second side.

CAKE IN ORANGE PEELS

Cut top off orange and remove insides (reserve them for fruit salad). Mix 1 pkg. yellow cake mix according to package directions and fill orange rinds with batter. One mix will fill approximately a dozen and a half orange shells. Place top back on orange, wrap in double layer of aluminum foil and bake in coals about 30 minutes.

DINNER IN ONE

On double layer of aluminum foil, place hamburger meat patty. Layer with thinly sliced potato and thin slices of carrots. Add onion if desired. Wrap, being careful to seal. Place over coals and cook 35-40 minutes, turning several times.

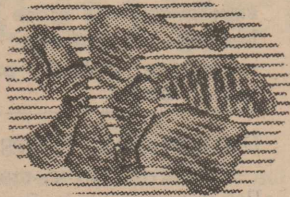

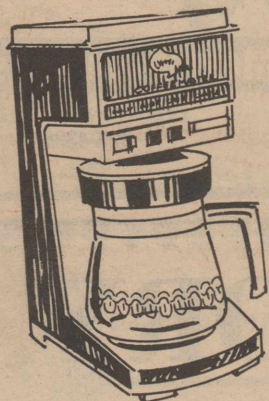
