Bitter Cold Releases Grip On Talco Area

Bitter cold relaxed its icy grip on Talco and the Northeast Texas area during the New Year's holidays after trying much of Texas in knots through Christmas week. First came the beautiful snow then the freezing drizzle, while skies remained overcast, temperatures dropped to near zero keeping streets and bridges hazardous for Christmas travelers.

With iced over bridges, officials were kept busy answering calls to a number of highway accidents. A rash of accidents were reported in the Talco area with most of them either on the White Oak bridges or the Sulphur River

bridges. Out of all the accidents, only two were taken to the hospital where they were treated and later released. In addition, the icy onslaught brought havoc to the oil field, with bursted pipes and the fear that if the electric lines iced any more it would cause electrical

systems to malfunction. One valve froze, causing a water knock out tank on the Lucy Blackburn least to blow spilling oil to the fire wall level and over the top. Monday, January 2 found many Talco residents hunting plumbers or out replacing bursted water pipes themselves. Most

Weekly Ag Briefs

Now is the time for all agricultural producers to check their projected tax liability, says Dr. Gerald Cornforth, economist-management for the Texas Agricultural Extension Service. All farmers and ranchers can make some adjustments and those using cash accounting may find additional adjustments available.

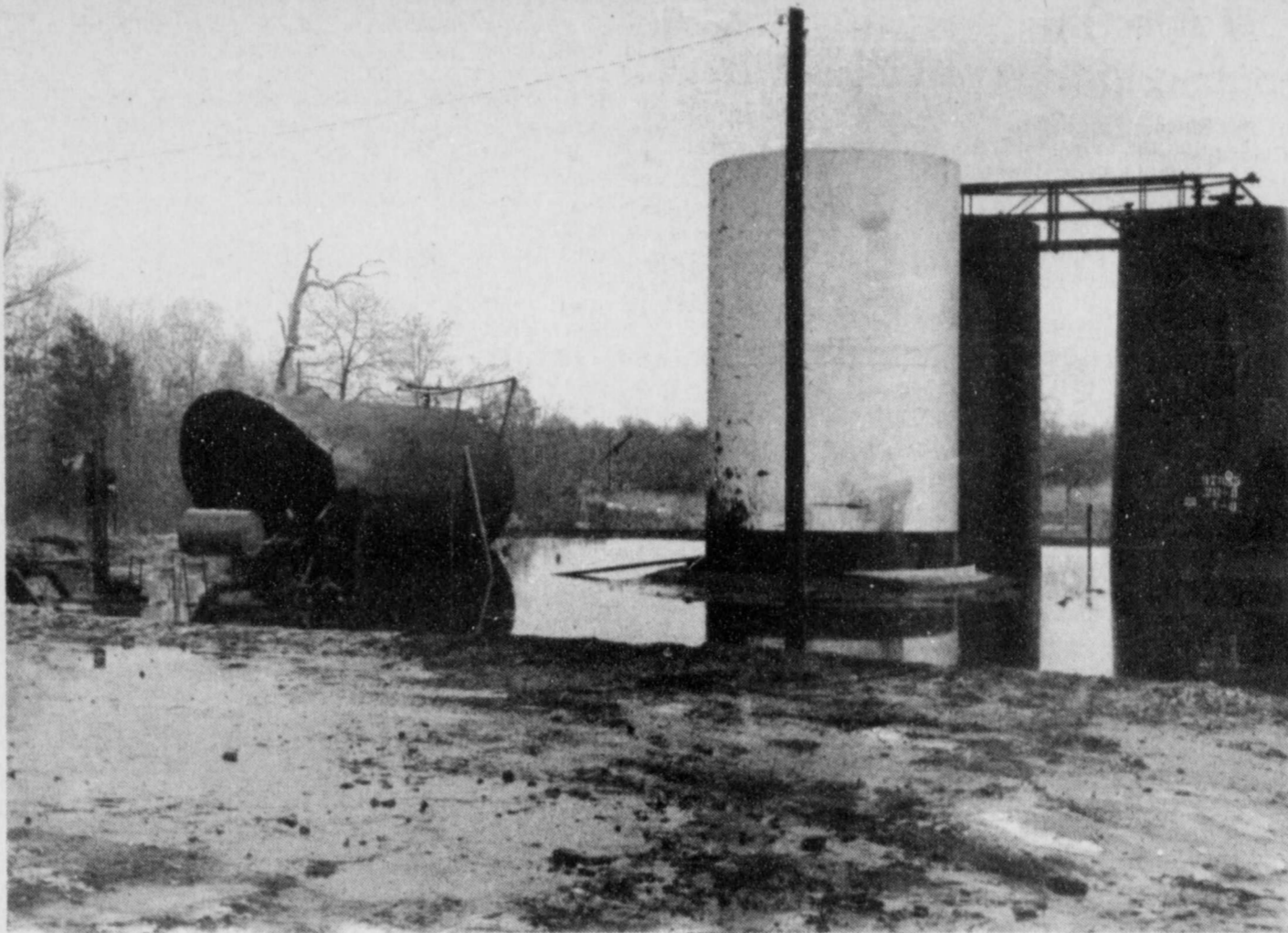
Cornforth says that by managing liabilities, producers can use available deductions and tax credits to lower the tax rate and make their tax liability more equal from year to year. Income can be shifted to next year by delaying sales if the producer is in a high tax bracket. If unused deductions are available, sell extra products during December. Within certain guidelines, expenditures in December count for 1983 under cash accounting.

An individual needing extra 1983 deductions can trade equipment and take

depreciation on the old equipment and investment credit and depreciation on the new equipment. Investment credit and accelerated depreciation for equipment purchased in December are at the full 1983 rates.

If a producer has long term capital gains in 1983 or exempt interest income, he needs to watch for the alternative minimum tax. Normal year-end tax management strategies do not work with this alternative minimum tax, Cornforth says.

Producers should estimate their tax liability now while there is some time left for tax management.

BUDDY'S WORKSHOP Energy Saving Year-Round Effort

What went wrong if the energy-saving projects (caulking windows, added insulation) you completed last spring weren't reflected during the winter by lower heating costs? Heating costs were up in most parts of the country. You'll have to figure in rate increases to get a true and complete comparison of costs for the past two winters. If this is done and you still don't see any appreciable savings from your efforts last spring, you haven't touched all the bases. You may have sealed around windows very carefully. That brought energy savings. But, you forgot to have the furnace or water heater checked for winter and faulty operation nullified your gain. Real energy savings come from a package that includes total preparation and constant attention. If you have energy loss problems, it will probably pay you to have an energy specialist examine your home during spring or summer so you may plan a winterizing program. He can spot the trouble spots and spell out energy conservation practices that will be helpful throughout the year.

Foster Parents Needed In Red River County

The increases stress on families caused by the declining economy is resulting in more children being abused and neglected. Families facing crisis day after day due to losing their financial stability become less able to cope with the demands and frustrations of children, especially children who have adjustment or behavior problems.

The result is an increased number of children who are neglected, abused or unwanted. A large number of these are teenagers and children who have behavior problems. While the Texas Department of Human Resources has an adequate number of foster homes accepting pre-school aged, white children, the greater demand for foster homes is for black children, teenagers, and behavior problem children.

The Texas Department of Human Resources reports that there is an urgent need for foster homes for black children, teenagers and children with behavior problems. Red River County has only two foster homes.

Teenager and behavior problem children do require more time, attention and special parenting skills than other children in foster care. When there is no foster home for these children locally, they must be moved away from this area and often into more restructured placements. The homes in our area that do accept these children are kept full due to the high need. The

Texas Department of Human Resources reports that there is a large demand for homes for teenagers and behavior problem children because these children are frustrating to parents, and therefore are often the victims of abuse and neglect. Also, there is a great need for black foster homes. Few black families ever apply to become foster parents. (In this county there are NO black foster homes.) This can result in an additional hardship for black children placed in foster care because they have to leave their familiar surroundings and school as well as their family.

Foster parents do need to have special attributes to handle the needs of foster children. Among these attributes are love of children, time to spend with foster children, lots of energy, high tolerance for frustration, the ability to deal with stress, and being able to love and then let go when it is time for the foster child to move into a permanent situation.

Foster parents work with the Texas Department of Human Resources social workers to help the child's family improve so that they can have their child back, or when this is not possible, in making plans for another permanent home for the foster child.

For those who wonder what qualifications are needed for foster parenting, the Texas Department of Human Resources offers

these guidelines:

Stable marriage, or single

Over 21
No educational requirement

Stable, self-supporting and must love children
experience with children
fire inspection of home is required.

environmental inspection of home is required
tuberculosis test for each family member
willing to submit to interviews

attend a seven week training session that is taught by a social worker and a foster parent.

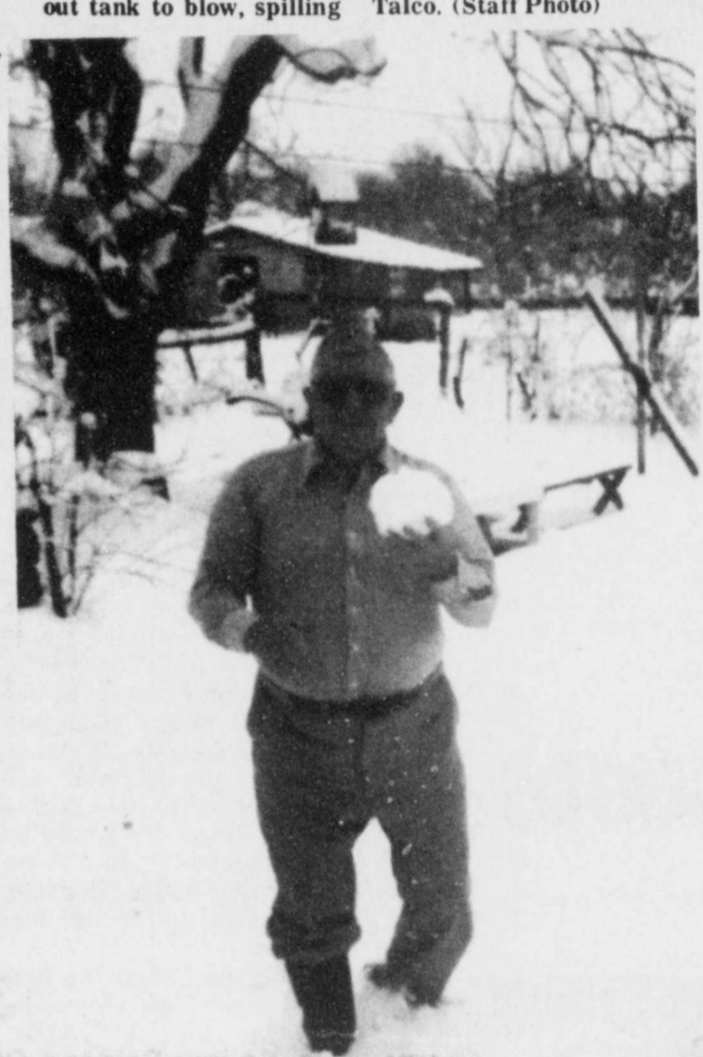

Southwestern Pecan Bread

2 1/2 cups flour
1 cup chopped pecans
3/4 cup chopped pitted dates
1 tbsp. freshly grated orange peel
1 tsp. baking powder
1 tsp. baking soda
1/4 tsp. salt
3/4 cup sugar
1/4 cup butter, softened
1 egg
1 can (8 1/4 oz.) Dole Crushed Pineapple in Syrup, undrained

Combine 1 tbsp. flour, pecans, dates and orange peel. Combine remaining flour, baking powder, soda and salt. Cream sugar and butter until light and fluffy. Beat in egg until blended. Beat in 1/2 flour mixture until blended. Beat in 1/2 undrained pineapple until blended. Repeat, ending with flour. Stir in floured fruits and nuts. Turn into well-greased 9x5x3 inch loaf pan. Bake in 350°F oven 60 to 70 minutes until cake tester inserted comes out clean. Stand in pan 5 minutes. Turn onto wire rack to complete cooling. Makes 1 loaf.

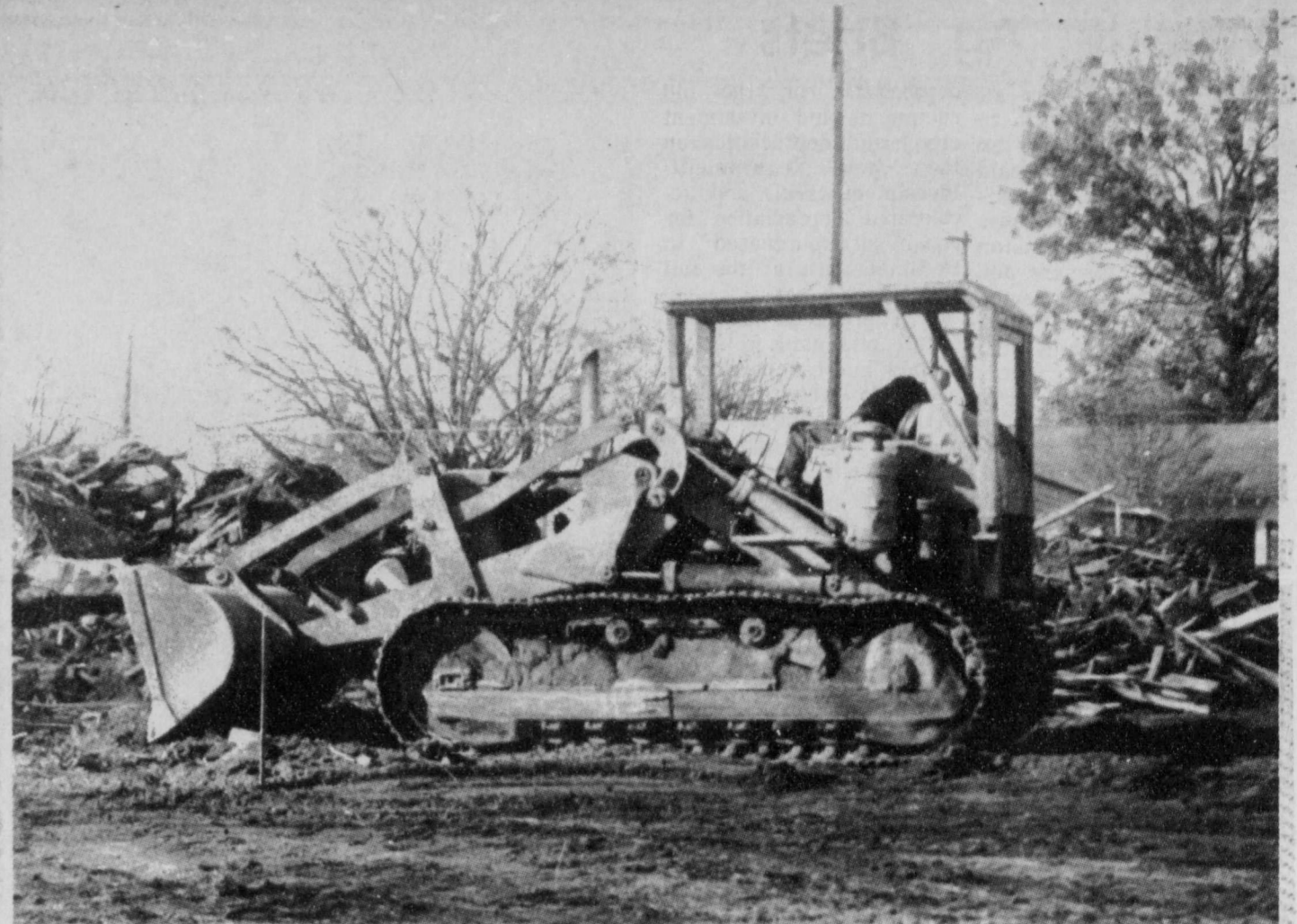

History Of The Early Days Of Bogata

This is the third installment of the "History of Bogata" as written in the 1930's by Jack Rodgers. There will be more to come each week, so if you are interested in history, especially on a local level, here is some more! Anyone with old photos of Bogata who would like to share them with everyone can leave them at the Bogata News Office. They can be reproduced in the newspaper without damage, and returned to the original owners.

Buffaloes, when the first settlers arrived, seemed to have been plentiful, but they rapidly disappeared until at the time of the Civil War, when one was brought to the southern edge of Blossom Prairie near Maples Springs it was such a curiosity that everyone from far and wide

went out to see it. The buffalo, enraged at its sudden popularity, became dangerous and had to be killed.

The first store was built about 1865 and was operated by Albert Howison. It was a small frame building about sixteen feet square, built of rough boxing planks, but it was the pride of the community. The store-keeper handled different groceries that were needed by the people and one not so much needed but which sold and was asked for more frequently than any other product—whiskey. Most all early settlers needed their whiskey as regularly as their meals, and the strange thing about it all is that a person was seldom seen in an intoxicated condition.

About this time Al Farmer ran a saloon in the vicinity

of Bogata. He sold whiskey at so much per, and a glance at his accounts would show that he ran a charge account, charging his whiskey as merchandise. Some of the "merchandise" accounts ran as high as sixty to seventy-five dollars. At a later date, 1875, whiskey was voted out of Bogata by local option and no saloons have been here since then to contaminate youth and corrupt morals.

An event of the life of the early settlers that afforded them much joy and which is well worth noting was the arrival of the mail. Mail came only as often sometimes as once in two or three months. The first mail route was a Pony Express route that ran from some point in Tennessee to the, then as now, metropolis of San Antonio. A young boy, fourteen years of age, a relative of Mrs. Neil Howison, was the carrier on this route at one time. When told that he was likely to be captured by the Indians he replied: "Maybe not. I hope not, anyway".

At a later date mail was brought from Clarksville by a carrier and left at the home of some prominent citizen for distribution to the addressee. Later still the mail was brought to Rosalie, three miles away, which had been designated as a United States post office.

As Rosalie was a rather

unhandy distributing place for the Maples Springs territory, Mr. J.E. Horner asked the United States government for a post office to be situated at a convenient place in Maple Springs. The request was granted, but Mr. Horner was advised that the name of the town must be changed to a less common name. Bringing his knowledge of geography to his command, Mr. Horner selected the name Bogata from a town by that name in Columbia, South America. Mr. Horner, however, made his second o similar to an a, or so the post office department took it to be so, and thus the town was named Bogata. Although authentic dates are not available this seems to have been about 1885.

Thus the little town grew and prospered and was becoming known far and wide as an educational and as a religious center. Smaller settlements were coming into existence within the trade territory of Bogata. Salem, later Johntown, was about five miles southeast; Walen, later Rosalie, a few miles east; McCrury and Halesboro both west of Bogata, and Line Branch and Center Point a few miles North.

"One remarkable fact about the citizenry of Bogata and which explains the steady growth of the

community, is that at least four-fifths of the population is permanent. The greater part of the people of Bogata are direct descendants of the first settlers.

"Before the coming of the railroad and highway to Bogata there were times when it was impossible for the people to reach other people from there. There were days at a time when roads to and from Bogata were impassable. Old Timers recall one instance when the town was in darkness for a few days, except for those who were fortunate enough to have a supply of tallow candles. The roads were impassable and the entire stock of kerosene was exhausted. One of the citizens went to Johntown and bought five gallons of oil, and it is said that upon returning to Bogata he was stopped at nearly every house to lend some of the oil.

"This same spirit of neighborliness remains even though Bogata now has a railroad and surfaced highway. It is a matter of pride with the citizens of the town that no worthy object of charity has ever failed to receive the necessary aid upon coming to Bogata. They also point with pride to the fact that no person has ever remained in the town than six months without becoming self sustaining and a useful citizen."

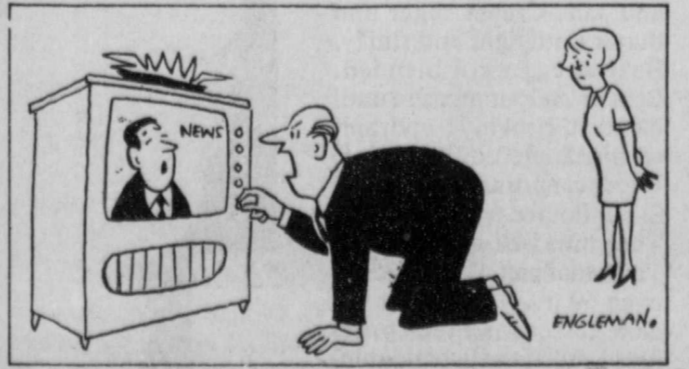

Heavenly Angel Cake Surprise
This old-fashioned cake has a surprise pineapple cream filling.

- 1 pkg. (14.5 oz.) angel food cake mix
 - 1 can (8 oz.) Dole Crushed Pineapple in Juice
 - 2 1/2 cups whipping cream
 - 1/2 cup chopped maraschino cherries
 - 1/4 cup toasted chopped almonds
 - 1 tbsp. sugar
- Prepare cake according to package directions. Drain pineapple well, pressing out excess juice with back of spoon. Whip 1 cup cream. Fold in pineapple, cherries and almonds. Slice and reserve a 1-inch thick layer from top of cake. Cut cake around outer sides and inner sides, leaving about 1-inch thick border. Remove inside cake with hands; break in chunks. Fold into pineapple cream. Spoon pineapple mixture into cake hollow. Cover cake with reserved top. Whip remaining cream with sugar. Spread over cake. Refrigerate 2 hours, or overnight. Makes 8 to 10 servings. *Reserve juice for beverage.

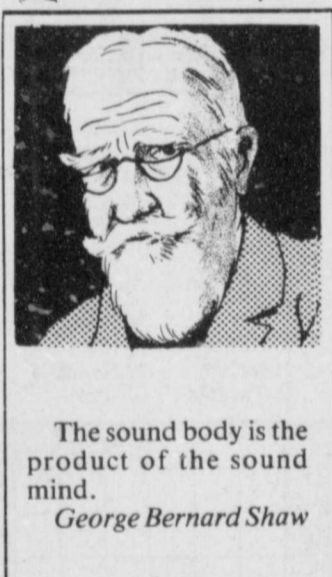
