



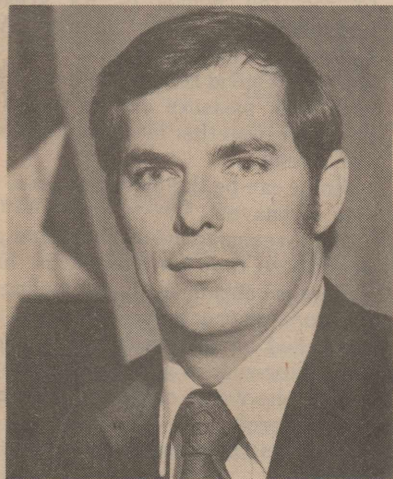

Bill Sarpalius Seeks State Senate Post

Hereford's Bill Sarpalius has authorized The Hart Beat to announce his candidacy for state senator, District 31, subject to the May Democratic Primary.

Sarpalius lived at Cal Farley's Boys Ranch for seven years and after graduating in 1967 he attended Clarendon Junior College. In 1968 he was elected State President of the Future Farmers of America and traveled over 76,000 miles in the State of Texas representing the 50,000 members of the FFA.

During this time he spoke to approximately 140,000 people. After serving as President of the FFA Bill was married and returned to Clarendon College and graduated in May of 1970.

He was President of the Student Body at Clarendon College, received Who's Who in American Junior Colleges, and served as Chairman of the Youth Advisory Committee to the Selective Service, being appointed by the Governor. Bill graduated from Texas Tech University in 1972 with a degree in Agriculture Education.

In 1972 Bill was selected as an Outstanding Young Man of America and went to work for Cal Farley's Boys Ranch where he worked for two years as Assistant Director of Admissions and taught vocational agriculture in high school at the Ranch for three years.

In May of 1978 Bill received his Master's of Agriculture Degree from West Texas State University. Bill worked as an Assistant to Bill Clayton, Speaker of the Texas House of Representatives, for more than two years.

While working for Bill Clayton he traveled throughout the seven-county district and helped people with problems or who needed advice about state government operations as well as helping with community problems. In addition to helping people with their problems, Bill worked with the Speaker during the legislative sessions.

Bill is currently employed as Field Representatives for Center Plains Industries, Inc., and has one son named David.

Farmers Union Threatens Suit

Delegates to the Texas Farmers Union annual convention have threatened to pursue legal remedies, presumably a lawsuit based on economic damage and filed through class action, unless President Carter

immediately acts to increase farm price supports on all commodities to 90% of parity.

The farmers and ranchers, nearly four hundred of them from across the state who gathered in Corpus Christi for a three day meet, said that the "President's action to bail out the grain companies by purchasing contracts still leaves the question of protection for farmers unanswered."

A sharp statement indicating serious problems for the Carter Administration in the farm sector of Texas stated

additionally, "Failure to immediately raise loan rates for all commodities and/or the government's use of surplus crops to create a ceiling above prices now or any time in the future will be viewed by this organization not only as further abandonment of the farmers of this nation, but also as a misguided policy that will further add to record farm debt, stagnate the general economy by arresting farm income and purchasing power and lead to continued devaluation of the dollar."

Specific demands of the official representatives of the ten thousand member general farm organization called for emergency action to set a price floor on all commodities at 90% of parity by using the existing structure of farm law that combines storage of crops with a non-recourse government loan using the stored crop as collateral. Parity is the formula that measures farm income against

Clayton Asks Return To Office

State Rep. Bill Clayton of Springlake said today that he will seek re-election to the District 74 seat he now holds in the Texas House of Representatives.

The district includes Bailey, Castro, Cochran, Deaf Smith, Lamb, Oldham and Parmer counties.

In making his announcement, Clayton said it has been a distinct honor to serve the people of this district the past several years.

As a member of the House of Representatives, Clayton has established a historical first by serving three consecutive terms as Speaker of the House.

"Serving as state representative for District 74 and as Speaker of the House of Representatives, I have worked double duty at addressing the needs of the citizens of this area in their dealings with government.

"I have attempted to maintain a direct line of communication with all the people of our seven counties and as a result a great many of the problems we have faced have been resolved.

"We have been successful in dealing with short-term problems of energy for agriculture, in helping with improvement of our roads and highways, with providing tax relief for both homeowners and farmers and ranchers, and providing an economic climate that is conducive to bringing new business and industry to Texas."

"In the upcoming session of the Legislature it is imperative that through redistricting we see that the strong voice of our area is not diminished in Congress, the State Senate and the House of Representatives," Clayton said.

Clayton added that he intended to continue every effort possible to keep him in daily contact with all areas of the district.

School Board Meets Monday

Jim Blair, delinquent tax attorney, met Monday evening with the school board to discuss the renewal of a contract for the collection of delinquent school taxes.

Board members voted approval of renewing the contract with Perdue, Brandon, Blair, Sheiver and Fielder for another two years.

Elementary reading teachers, Elodia Rodriguez, David Fanning, Debra Carlton and Francis Burrus met with the board and reviewed the remedial reading program.

Trustees voted to extend Superintendent Ted Averitt's contract one year to July 1, 1983, making a three year contract.

Recommendation to order a new school bus for route two for the 1980-81 school year was approved.

The board voted to transfer teacher's aide Gloria Diaz from the Manpower training program to Title I migrant. Applications from 15 persons for the position of athletic director was reviewed. A meeting was called for Wednesday night to interview applicants.

Superintendent Averitt reported enrollment in Hart school is 588.

DeWayne Brown, Bruegel Attend National Briefing

DeWayne Brown and Fred Bruegel Jr. were the Texans invited to attend breakfast last Friday in the State Dining Room of the White House and a briefing session which followed.

Representatives of some 15 or 16 country elevators across the Nation were asked to attend the event attended by President Jimmy Carter and cabinet members including the Secretaries of State, Commerce, Energy and Agriculture.

Brown said the meeting pertained to the "breakdown of the Iranian-Afghanistan crisis and the grain situation and the steps taken - explaining the embargo."

"We were allowed to ask questions of cabinet members - the President wasn't questioned."

"Of course, the embargo was our concern. The President said he realized the economic sacrifice to agriculture and said he'd do 'everything possible to scatter that sacrifice among the total U.S. population, making minimum sacrifice to each one.'"

Brown added, "To this date, there's been an announcement of any program to scatter such sacrifice."

"There's no question, the blunt end is on agriculture."

Brown said that four million metric tons of wheat have been isolated and removed from the market for food security purposes. Ten million metric tons of corn, slated for shipment to Russia, were cancelled and as yet, is

Higgins Named Director Of Cotton Farmers Ass'n.

A group of concerned cotton farmers met Jan. 10 in Lubbock, to form an association, which they named the Cotton Farmers Association, for the purpose of improving the existing research and promotion program under the Cotton Research and Promotion Act of 1966. The need for improvement and changes in the present program was revealed through a recent study of the activities of the Cotton Board and Cotton Incorporated by the Office of the Inspector General, U.S. Department of Agriculture.

The Cotton Board is a quasi-governmental agency made up of members appointed by the Secretary of Agriculture from individuals nominated by approved cotton producer organizations. The Board functions to administer the provisions of the Cotton Research and Promotion Act and to collect federally mandated assessments of about \$2.00 per bale from cotton producers to fund the program.

Cotton Incorporated is a private marketing and research company incorporated in Tennessee. Cotton Incorporated carries out the research and promotion program under the Cotton Research and Promotion Act through a contract with the Cotton Board. The Cotton Board and the U.S.

Department of Agriculture are responsible for overseeing and approving the activities of Cotton Incorporated.

The study by the Inspector General of the activities of Cotton Board and Cotton Incorporated raised numerous questions which are of great concern to a large group of cotton producers according to Joe Rankin, president of the newly-formed association. Mr. Rankin pointed out that all cotton producers have a stake in seeing that the present program is carried out effectively and efficiently as it is funded by assessments paid by the producers themselves. Mr. Rankin stressed that the purpose of the new association is not to tear down or destroy the existing program, but to effect changes to improve the program, where needed. An equally important goal of the association, stated Mr. Rankin, will be to make the present program more responsive to the needs and desires of cotton producers, and to make more democratic the process by which the directors of both the Cotton Board and Cotton Incorporated are selected.

The Cotton Farmers Association plans to undertake its own investigation of the issues raised in the Inspector General's report. It plans to discuss its concerns with key officials at the U.S. Department of Agriculture, Cotton Board and Cotton Incorporated.

production expenses in order to continuously adjust for inflated costs and is a part of permanent federal law. Ninety percent of parity on a few major crops is currently \$5.54/bushel for wheat, \$3.86/bushel on corn, \$9.36/bushel on soybeans and \$.92/pound on cotton.

- a paid diversion of at least 20% on all crops. This amounts to a cutback of 20% from each farmers official acreage with a direct payment made to compensate for income lost by not using productive acres. Losses would also be suffered by most Texas wheat and feedgrain farmers who have already invested heavily in the preparation and planting of full acreage which would be plowed back. Without a cutback of the 1980 crop, surplus conditions caused by the Soviet embargo would depress prices for the long term.

- farmers be allowed to graze livestock on set-aside acres rather than plowing up that which is already planted or laying fallow 20% of that not yet planted.

- a strategic government reserve of the surplus that could be utilized by the government by discretion, but not released upon the market at any less than 110% parity. The release price is set above full parity in order to protect markets. Commodities dumped by the government at less than a protective price would depress markets and act as an unfair ceiling.

The Texas Farmers Union delegates stated that "the nation as a whole cannot afford the strain brought to bear on the balance of payments and the entire impact on the economy should farmers be left to flounder without sufficient price supports."

In other actions taken in the adoption of an official policy statement for 1980, TFU renewed its opposition to a mandatory, value-added tax that would be assessed all cattle producers in order to collect \$60 to \$100 million dollars annually to conduct research and promotion of beef. Cattle producers will be asked to vote in a referendum on the tax by registering Jan. 28 through Feb. 6 and voting Feb. 19 through Feb. 22.

The farm organization added harsh words for Cotton, Incorporated, a similar assessment program, in existence since 1967. Cotton, Inc. was recently investigated by USDA and its governing board found guilty of squandering farmers' money, using highly questionable accounting practices, and failing to conduct oversight responsibilities and provide accountability to producers who fund the \$17 million program.

Texas Farmers Union President Jay Naman of Waco, head of the organization since 1961, was re-elected without opposition as was Vice-President Joe Rankin, a cotton farmer from Ralls.

Doug Higgins attended the TFU Convention and represented Castro County Farmers Union.

"unsettled and thus far, definitely not isolated from getting back on the market, thus further depressing local corn prices."

"One million metric tons of soybeans seem to be totally ignored by the USDA," Brown added.

"There's talk in Washington," he said, "of a paid diversion program to producers for the 1980 crop year. The diversion will probably be only minimal and not sufficient to secure our immediate problems."

"The gasohol program was announced Friday afternoon while we were in Washington but construction of facilities for the production of gasohol are too distant in the future to aid our immediate market prices."

"There has been an announcement of

a raise in the support prices - 10 cents per bushel for corn and 15 cents on wheat - for the 1979 crop. These are only insults to the producer and by no means will this minimal rise in support prices play a part in the correction of problems in the markets."

Brown said he believes "some action definitely needs to be taken to protect the farmer from such a depressed market situation meeting Wednesday morning with Dr. Hathaway, Under Secretary of Agriculture.

Friday found the team losing 12-26 to Springlake-Earth. Robert Gonzales led the scoring with 4.

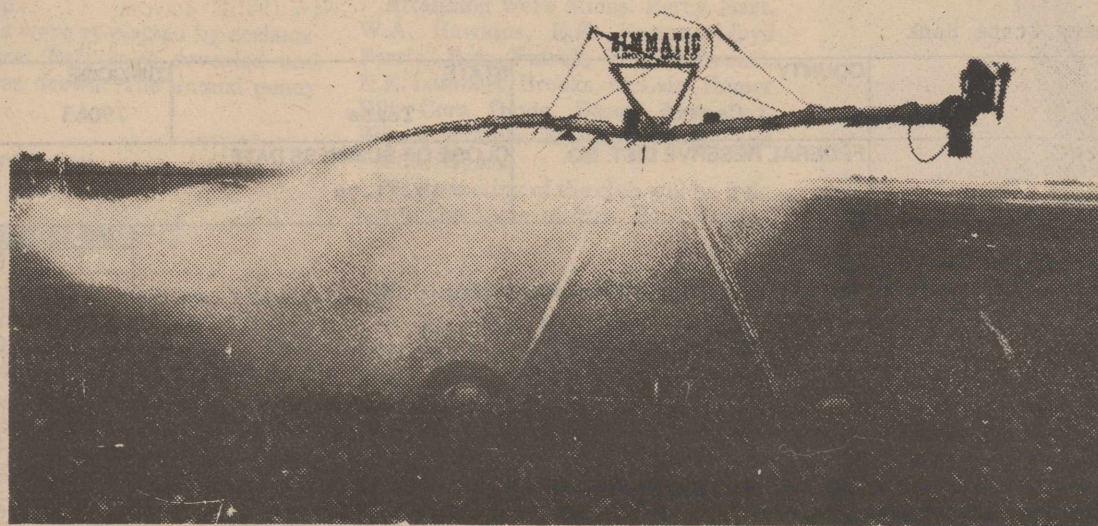
Muleshoe defeated the team 51-23 Saturday. Arthur Finch and Robert Gonzales scored 7 points each.
