GUEST EDITORIAL

The following is a printed comment of one individual, and does not reflect the ideas of the editors, or staff of the Hart Beat. This is an editorial of the Memorial Day Services held at the Hart Cemetery last Monday.

The usual decor was present at Arlington National Cemetery in Washington, on Memorial Day, 1979. Thousands of tiny U.S. flags symbolically marked the resting place of those who gave the ultimate sacrifice for their country's freedom.

The traditional playing of taps, the armed salute, and flag raised to half mass announced the period of self given respect rightfully presented to these American heroes.

And so the tradition continued throughout the nation on Memorial Day . . . but there was an exception at one cemetery.

Bearing the remains of 19 service men, a crowd of 75 stood in silence at the Hart Cemetery on Memorial Day in commemoration of those who had served their nation.

There was no color guard, no armed salute, no flag at half-mass, no grave markers, not even a bugler to sound taps . . . nothing.

The moderate crowd stood in prayers led by Roy Shave, Minister of the Hart Church of Christ. Had not the people of Hart come to honor the dead, there would have been no memorial of any sort in Hart for 1979.

Where was the American flag? Where were the grave side flags . . . the bugler playing taps? Above all else, why did the American Legion of Hart fail to appear, or send one representative in uniform to the ceremonies? How could the Legion, which boast of honor to live and dead service men, forget or refuse to honor these who have served their nation so well?

Tears filled my eyes, and those about me must have wondered my condition, being I was of no relation to any one laid there. But I am of relation. Brother to each and every one of them. Even those born, and passed on before my time. I am not speaking from my Christian point of faith!

I am a ROTC Cadet, training under the established branch at WTSU, due for commission in the Spring of 1981. I am of one of the four branches of armed services these men participated within. I am of their services, their duties, and their beliefs. I am a soldier! A soldier who honors as brothers all those who have fallen in the line of duty, or passed onto the Father in other means.

My tears were not so much in sorrow, rather the fact the agony choked me. The thought of my brothers not being given the rightful respect due them.

Where were you Legionnaires? Where was the flag my brothers fought under, and protected? Why were their spirits denied the right to see "Pride and Glory"? You failed to even represent yourselves at the ceremonies. What, has this tradition died in Hart too?

My brothers lie unhonored, except by their families. They came as far away as Oklahoma and New Mexico to pay their respects. But where was the

American Legion of Hart? Where was the American flag?

Perhaps Memorial Day had its high point in the speech delivered by Roy Shave. His remarks brought a candid feeling of memorial purposes to me.

"The nation on this day honors more than a million veterans. We here render honor where honor is due," Shave said.

"Among this nation we should remember the price of what was sacrificed. But how quickly so many have forgotten within this nation. May we here resolve never to do so as to forget," Rev. Shave concluded.

That resolution was solidly founded prior to the ceremony by Mrs. Myrt Loman.

"As long as I live and have half mind, we will always have a Memorial Day service of some kind here at Hart," Mrs. Loman commented.

Of such are promises made of, and I have personally vowed to see Mrs. Loman's statements are fulfilled next May, even if I must render volunteers from Canyon to do so myself!

So listed then are the nineteen names of those who are beyond us. Maybe the Legion will save a copy of this editorial and purchase some grave side flags next Memorial Day, 1980, for the following as listed:

Nina Hart Jones, 1945; Rich Henderson, 1952; Albert Roland, and Charles Sanders, 1959; Clarence Keenom, 1960; Cecil English, 1961; Jim Height, 1964; T.C. Ray, 1965 and Lewis Wakefield, 1967.

Include also, O.D. Dinwiddie, 1969; Duard D. Harris, 1971; Lynn Alford, 1972. Our Brothers in Christ, Mart Daniel Booe, C.C. Hanes and J.C. Jackson, 1972; E.N. Carter, 1972; H.H. Sullivan, 1974 and Cesarios Chapa, 1975.

At this time our country is at peace, but history has proven within itself that war is inevitable. My request is . . . should I ever be called away to defend my great country, its government and liberties, and come back within a coffin, bury me as a proud soldier of the United States Army.

Once a year I would be honored if the community would have but one small child place a flag beside my tomb, a cast of flowers upon my crest, and that I'd be given the privilege of seeing the red, white and blue of "Old Glory", waving proudly in the midst of an early morning summer breeze.

Cook Of The Week

A visitor from Oklahoma who was born and reared in Hart and reared her own family here shares recipes this week with Hart Beat cooks. Nell and Sam Swopes came from their home in Vinita, Okla. to visit with their daughter and family, Louise and Cecil Ray Jones and their sons, Charles and Dan.

Nell is a good cook. She has been cooking for Sam more than 50 years. They celebrated their golden wedding anniversary here last fall. They were married Oct. 17, 1928 in Olton and made their home here until June 12, 1960 when they moved to Vinita.

A retired farmer and rancher, Sam grins when he says they moved to Oklahoma because he "gave out carrying irrigation tubes." They discovered, after moving there, that Sam had several first cousins in that area that he did not know were there. He was born and reared in New Mexico.

Nell's parents, the late Mr. and Mrs. J.C. McLain, came to Castro County in 1904. Nell's own children, Louise and a son, Truman, were born in the same room of the same house in which Nell was born. Truman died in 1975.

Nell's favorite "hobby" are her four grandkids - Charles and Dan Jones and Gregory and Kristi Swopes of Chelsea, Okla. She also savors visits back home in Hart with Louise's family and her brothers' families.

Nell and Sam have taken some of Vinita's senior citizens under their wings - a couple in their 80's who live out in the country from Vinita and an elderly lady who lives in town. Nell helps clean their homes and she and Sam take them on errands.

Members of the Baptist Church, Nell served for years on the food committee of her church. Whenever someone in the church family lost a loved one, the committee gathered to plan and prepare the meals and were responsible for contacting other members. Nell still is among the first to help.

The devil's food cake recipe she shares is one that she's used "a hundred years" and continues to bake because it's a family favorite. She also shares two tasty sounding casseroles.

6 pieces celery, chopped
1 cup mushroom soup
sliced almonds

Combine above, then heat 6 cups water to boiling and add $\frac{3}{4}$ cup, brown rice and 2 packages Lipton chicken noodle soup. Let cook about 45 mins. then add the sausage mixture with the rice and soup mixture. Bake at 350° for 30 mins.

CHICKEN & RICE DISH

Melt one stick oleo in a deep pan. Place cut up chicken pieces in oleo and sprinkle with salt and pepper. Combine one can cream of mushroom soup, one can cream of chicken soup, one can cream of celery soup and one cup long grain uncooked rice. Mix well and pour over chicken and let bake 2½ to 3 hours in moderate oven.

NELLS DEVILS FOOD CAKE

1½ c sugar
½ c butter
2 c flour
1 c sour cream
½ c hot water
½ c cocoa
2 eggs
1 t soda
1 t vanilla

Cream sugar and butter. Add soda to cream. Put cocoa in hot water. Add cream and soda to sugar and butter. Add flour then cocoa to water.

ICING
2 c cream
⅔ c cocoa
3 c sugar
1 t vanilla
1 T butter

Cook this until it forms soft ball in cold water, let this get cold and beat. Put butter and vanilla in when it gets partly cool.

MRS. DIRK'S CAKE

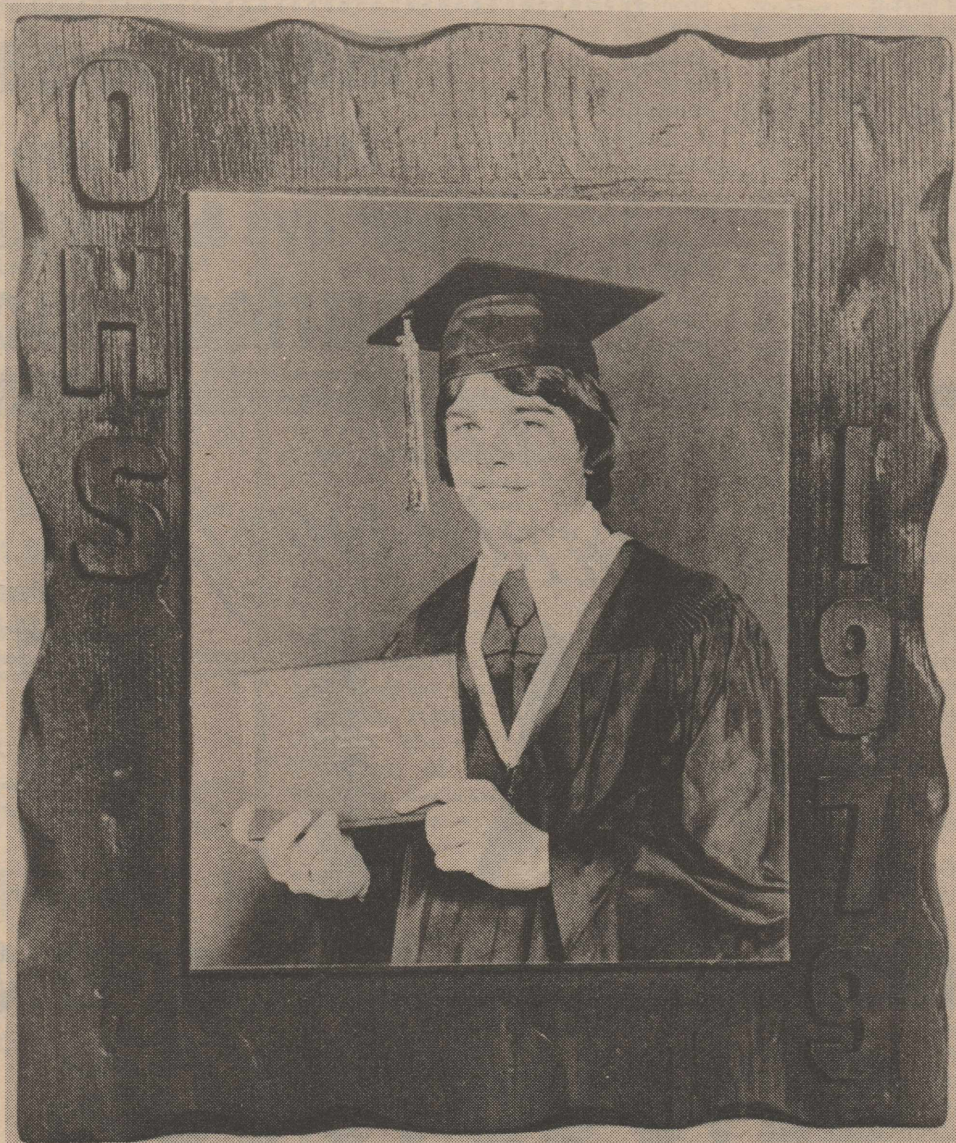
3 T lard (do not substitute)
3 t cocoa
1 c sugar
2 eggs
1 t soda
1 t vanilla
1 c buttermilk or sour milk
1 c flour
1 t cinnamon
1 t allspice
1 t cloves
1 c raisins
1/2 c nuts

Put everything together and mix well. Add nuts and raisins. Pour in greased and floured 8x8 pan. Bake in 300° oven for 40 mins. (Double recipe for 13x9 pan.)

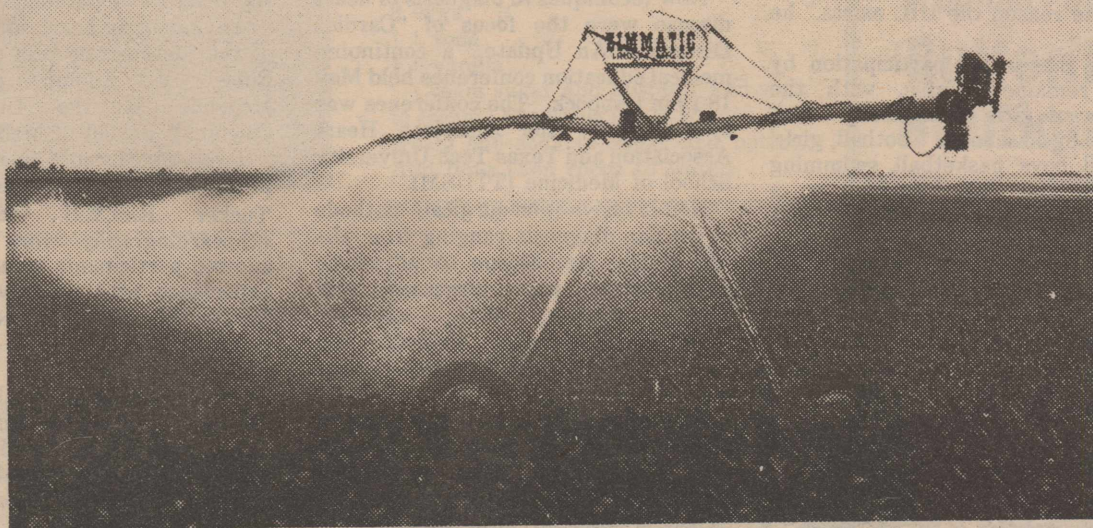
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Participation In UIL Events Continues On Increase

The current energy shortage apparently does not apply to Texas high school students involved in University Interscholastic League activities.

Participation in the athletic, literary and academic, and music programs reached record highs in 1978-79, reinforcing the long-standing contention that one of two graduating seniors in Texas has taken part in a UIL activity during his high school career.

"Certainly, the UIL has had its problems the past year, with the numerous court cases and occasional one-sided press coverage," said Dr. Bailey Marshall, League director. "But I would be remiss to emphasize the negative and overlook the positive aspects of our programs.

"More students were involved in UIL activities this past year than ever before and this participation by students on a fair and equal basis has been and remains our ultimate goal: This is the reason the UIL exists," he added.

Across the board, participation by schools remained stable, with the exception of girls' basketball, which increased by 55 schools. Football, girls' volleyball, boys' basketball, swimming and track and field remained on a per-school participation basis near their 1977-78 marks.

Individual participation, however,

continued its upward surge, with more than 42,000 playing football, 30,000 and 23,000 in boys' and girls' track respectively, and 23,000 and 19,000 in boys' and girls' basketball respectively.

Elsewhere, participation in boys' baseball neared the 16,000 mark, while more than 20,000 took part in boys' and girls' tennis. Approximately 8,000 participated in boys' golf and 4,000 in girls' golf. Swimming figures reached 3,500 for the boys' and 2,500 for the girls', while cross country boys' and girls' totals sped near the 600 plus mark.

In the UIL music program, some 71,000 took part in choral competition while 40,000 participated in the solo

and ensemble contest, and a whopping 215,000 joined bands and orchestras in UIL contests.

Participation in the UIL literary and academic contests was equally as impressive:

Speech: Debate, 5,000; Informative speaking, 17,500; Persuasive speaking, 15,000; Poetry interpretation, 17,500; Prose reading, 15,000; and Oral reading, 18,000.

Others: One-act play, 20,000; Journalism, 24,000; Number sense, 55,000; Picture memory, 25,000; Science, 22,500; Slide Rule, 20,000; Shorthand, 15,000; Typewriting, 16,000; Ready writing, 55,000; Story telling, 12,500; and Spelling, 80,000.

"The University Interscholastic League embraces more than a half-million participants and anytime you're working with a program having the scope this one has, you must operate under a system of uniformly enforced rules and regulations," Dr. Marshall said. "The school administrators and educators of Texas have voted for and support rules governing inter-school competition. To abandon these rules would be detrimental to the educational benefits of the overall program.

"It is wise to keep in mind that Texas school people, with the support and counsel of their local patrons, have built the UIL into the most outstanding organization of its kind."

Diagnosis Of Heart Disease Focus Of Conference

New techniques in diagnosis of heart disease were the focus of "Cardiac Disease - An Update," a continuing medical education conference held May 18-19 in Lubbock. The conference was sponsored by the American Heart Association and Texas Tech University School of Medicine (TTUSM).

Non-invasive (non-surgical) methods of cardiac diagnosis ranging from the use of the stethoscope to ultrasonic sound waves were discussed, said Wayne Cooper, M.D., assistant professor of Internal Medicine and chief of Cardiology at TTUSM. Cooper was conference chairperson.

Nuclear cardiology was discussed by Mary Strang, M.D., assistant professor of Radiology at TTUSM. In nuclear cardiology, a low dosage radioactive tracer is injected into the patient's bloodstream. As the tracer moves through the patient's bloodstream, a scintillation camera coupled with a computer data system follows the tracer and produces an image of its route on a television-like screen.

Cooper and Robert Wey, M.C., a Lubbock cardiologist, made a presentation on echocardiography. Echocardiography uses high frequency sound waves transmitted through the chest wall to produce an electronic image and graphic recording as the sound waves bounce off the various internal tissues.

Pratap Reddy, M.D., director of Clinical Electrophysiology at the University of Kentucky College of Medicine, discussed electrophysiology. Electrophysiology, a study of electrical currents produced by body tissues, allows the physician to detect heart blocks and arrests early and to assess

the need for a pacemaker.

An update on heart sounds and uses of the stethoscope was presented by Robert J. Adolph, professor of Medicine at the University of Cincinnati School of Medicine.

Two concurrent workshops was presented at the conference. John B. Tucker, R.D.M.S., conducted an echocardiography work shop which allowed participants actual "hands on" experience with an echocardiograph. Tucker is the only certified echo technologist in Lubbock and is chief echo technologist at the Health Sciences Center Hospital.

Cooper, Reddy, William Gordon Sr., M.D., professor of Family Practice at TTUSM, and Robert H. Mitchell, M.D., clinical professor of Internal Medicine at TTUSM presented a workshop on electrocardiography (EKG). Electrocardiography is the tracing and graphing of electrical currents in the heart.

In addition to the new diagnostic techniques, the conference presented new information on the rehabilitation of cardiac patients. Exercise stress testing was discussed by David T. Deutsch, Ph.D., director of the Cardiac Rehabilitation and Cardiopulmonary Laboratory at TTUSM. Jogging and the heart was presented by Michael Bobo, Ph.D., associate professor of Physical Education at Texas Tech
