Frozen Food Locker and USO To Hold Open House Saturday

Formal opening of the Burk Frozen Food Locker plant will be here Saturday, August 14, from 8 a. m. to 10 p. m. The beautiful new building, corner of Ave. C and Second, is the most modern cold storage plant in Northwest Texas. Owners of the building, Brooks and Carl Morrison, along with representatives of the Fort Worth-Dallas district, J. G. McQuinn, district manager for Frigidaire, and C. A. Jr., Wichita Falls Frigidaire representative, along with Hanson, who installed the plant, will be on hand to show the visitors and show the hard work added to the plant.

USO will dedicate the club here Saturday, on August 14, at 8:00 p. m., it was announced this week by Henry J. Simms, Associate Director, USO, Street Club, Wichita Falls. James H. Allison, vice-president of the club, will be in charge of the ceremony. Frozen Food Locker's general run by a liquid gas plant. As it enters the plant it is a hot liquid. In room it picks up the hot changes into a gas, re-heated room and into a liquid. The gas is received at the plant, weighed on the scales, and then it is brought to the room where it stays for hours. In this air circulates and takes excess moisture from the room but not enough to dry.

it out. The average temperature of this room is 38 degrees.

An ultra-violet ray is used in the second room for tenderizing purposes. For three days the meat is kept in this room where the lamp breaks down the tough tissues. The average temperature here is 50 degrees.

The meat is rolled on the trolley into a third room where it is thoroughly chilled again for 2 days. The temperature will usually be 34 degrees.

From the last chill room, the meat is brought out to the meat block and cut into various pieces, weighed and wrapped.

It is then sent to the sharp freeze cabinet which will range 20 to 35 degrees below zero. It is thoroughly frozen here for 6 to 12 hours. This is the main process, for it prevents the growth of bacteria and the meat will remain good for a year.

The meat is brought out of the locker room and placed into the individual lockers which are kept at zero. Each article is individually stamped with one's locker number, the date and what the package contains; thus enabling one to use the food according to the date it is placed in the locker.

Vegetables and fruits are sent through a similar process. They are placed in waxed containers, weighed, and stamped. Unless they have been chilled at home in the refrigerator, they are placed in the chill room. Then they are placed on the sharp freeze trays where they stay for 6 to 12 hours. After thorough freezing of the article it is placed in the locker.

Fruits and vegetables have to have some type of processing at home before they are ready for the chill room. (Booklets on this processing are available at the lockers). It is not advisable to place the fruits and vegetables in fruit jars because they very often expand and burst. Wax containers are available at the Locker Plant in pint and quart sizes.

Meats, fruits, or vegetables not intended for a locker can be chilled in the locker plant for a nominal charge.

Dr. C. J. Morrison and J. V. Brooks are co-owners of the new plant. Mr. Earl Armstrong from Vernon, Texas, is the manager of the locker plant. Everyone is cordially invited to visit the new locker plant which is located on the corner of Second and Avenue C.

Bill Wood Goes After 'Seeing-Dog'

Bill Wood, prominent young business man of Burk Burnett will leave August 18, for Morristown, New Jersey, where he will enter training on August 23, to obtain a Seeing Eye Dog Guide.

Bill has been unable to see for sixteen years, and he thinks that a dog guide will be of immeasurable benefit to him. The principle service of a Dog Guide is to keep the sightless owner from running over bicycles, wrongly parked trucks and automobiles. Also the Seeing Eye Dog is trained to stop at curbs and wait until his master gives orders before proceeding.

The Seeing Eye, Inc., is a non-profit organization supported mainly by public subscriptions. Membership cards may be obtained by one dollar or more subscription. This is necessary when you consider that one of the dogs which is sold for \$150 costs about one thousand dollars to train.

The Seeing Eye was found in 1923, and the first dogs were trained in Switzerland and shipped back to this country to kennels near Nashville, Tenn. In 1930 a philanthropic individual donated his estate to the Seeing Eye, Inc., at which time the organization was moved to its present location near Morristown, New Jersey.

Since 1930, several hundred Dog guides have been trained and released to the public thereby opening up a new field of human assistance. Many sightless persons have become wholly self-sustaining since they obtained their Guide Dog.

Further stories of Bill's progress while he is at Morristown, will be published from time to time, reporting his progress during the month of training which each sightless person must undergo prior to obtaining his dog.

County School Buses To Be Inspected

Then little Peggy Dot Busby, cousin of the bride, came in dressed in a long white dress, carrying a white parasol and pulling a wagon laden with lovely gifts.

Fat Smith and John Ellis are in Los Angeles, Calif., attending the Olympic games. They report that the United States is well ahead.

Henry Porter was severely injured Saturday morning when he fell from a mast pole in the Northwest Field on an O. P. & G. lease. He had gone to the top of the mast to do some repair work from which he fell about 40 feet, sustaining a sprained back and severe cuts on the neck and the loss of several teeth.

The Manhattan store is preparing to double their floor space. Some time ago H. H. Wichita Fair Cancelled For Fall Of 1942

At a recent meeting of the directors of the Iowa Park Chamber of Commerce, it was voted to cancel the Wichita County Free Fair for this fall, which had been scheduled for the last week in September.

The Wichita County Free Fair was born in Iowa Park in the fall of 1928, in the small tin building on the corner of Park and Jackson streets, and had grown to be and was recognized as the largest county fair in Texas, with exhibits and attendance surpassed only by district and state fairs.

It was with regret that this action was necessary, but in cooperation with the request of President Roosevelt that all county fairs be canceled, where possible, as an aid to the national war emergency, to conserve tire and other war materials, officials thought it wise to cancel the fair this year.

With all probability, plans will be resumed and the fair will appear for the September of 1943.

Navy Needs Men For Radio Work

An urgent call for men interested in radio work was issued today at the U. S. Navy Recruiting Station at Wichita Falls.

Operators, repair and service men and technicians between the ages of 17 and 50 years are especially wanted for enlistment in petty officer ratings with beginning pay ranging from \$78.00 to \$36.00. Inexperienced men between the ages of 17 and 28 years may be enlisted as apprentice seamen with beginning pay of \$50.00 and, if qualified in accordance with standards for entrance in Navy service schools, be assigned to Navy radio school upon completion of recruit training. Men who fail to qualify for or in radio school will be retired in the naval service in rating and pay in which qualified to hold.

All enlisted men of the navy receive 2 percent of total pay receive 20 percent addition to base pay for sea service or foreign duty. Married men are also allowed extra pay for their families.

You can rather imagine that

Thinking back over a quarter of a century of news-gathering: The most exciting adventure maybe was the time that I went along with the police in response to a call of burglars in a house and when we rolled up and got out of the car, the burglar opened fire. I was thin then anyway and I jumped behind a telephone pole ahead of the two officers and told them to hunt another pole and I shrank up so that there was three inches of the telephone pole on each side of me.

Or maybe it was the time that there was a similar call and excited folks told us that the burglar was still in the house. There were three ways that he could get out. So the officers stationed me—unarmed—near one of the exits, telling me to stand in plain view out under the arc light and the burglar, seeing that someone was guarding that way, would make a break for it at one of the other exits and they would nab him. And that's what he tried and one of the officers captured him. But just suppose he had decided to shoot his way out past that sap who was out there in the light!

However, I didn't think about that until afterward.

Like the time I joined in the pursuit of the Santa Claus bandits after they had held up the bank at Cisco. An officer, in taking a riot gun out of a car, was careless and the weapon was discharged and the leaden pellets pattered in the leaves just over my head. It was an hour later that I realized how close a call that was—and I had a chill.

But for sustained, nerve-racking tension, give me—or, rather, don't give me again—a visit to "the port of missing automobiles." The assignment sounded simple enough: A gang was stealing cars from the city where I lived. The thieves ran the autos across the state line to a small, county-seat town and there they chiseled out the engine numbers, switched parts around and sold the automobiles to purchasers who were not too particular.

The editor told me to run down to this town and get the story. Light-heartedly, I alighted from the train and called on the mayor, who greeted me cordially enough until he learned that I was a newspaperman and what my mission was. He looked around in alarm and said:

"Get out of here before they see me talking to you—it would be as much as my life is worth," subdued me in a hurry.

Still I wanted to get the story. So I called on the county attorney. He refused to discuss matters with me at all. Then I drifted around the town, casual-like, talking about this and that and doing some looking for myself and piecing together the information as best I could.

Finally, a couple of grim-lipped men came up and started doing some questioning themselves.

"Ain't you a newspaper man from the city?" one asked. When I said that was true, he demanded, "What are you doing here?"

"I'm thinking about buying a paper here," I said. This didn't seem to satisfy them but they walked off, casting scowls back over their shoulders at me.

Just to make my explanation true, I did buy the paper—or at least I went to the newspaper office and bought one copy for a nickel. It was three hours till the train back to the city would arrive—and they were the three longest hours I ever spent.

P. S.—I did write the story and the ring busted up.

You ought to try newspaper reporting—never a dull moment.

Skilled Artesians Needed By Navy

Another urgent appeal came today for skilled artesians needed at once in the Navy yards at Pearl Harbor, according to the local civil service secretary, at the post office.

Uncle Sam will pay wages from 98c to \$1.40 an hour for aircraft mechanics, aircraft instrument mechanics, blacksmiths, boiler-makers, copper-smiths, aviation electricians, instrument makers, joiners, outside machinists, bomb-sight mechanics, aviation metal-smiths, torpedo ordnancemen, patternmakers, riggers, shipfitters and shipwrights.

Only men between the ages of 20 and 62 years will be accepted, except for helper positions where the minimum age is 18.

First class transportation will be furnished from the home of the appointee to Pearl Harbor. No dependants will be allowed to make the trip.

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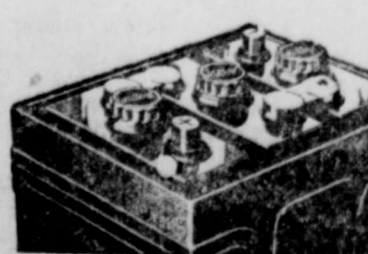

Definition Of Storage Lockers

By F. K. WARNER
Extension Meat Specialist

A cold-storage locker is a "safe-deposit box" or unit in a room maintained at a temperature of nearly zero Fahrenheit, where families may freeze and store food supplies that have been grown at home or bought. Meats, poultry products, butter, fruits, and vegetables are stored successfully in these units, sometimes for as long as a year. Lockers of about 250 pounds capacity each rent for about \$5 to \$12 per year, with or without an additional service charge for preparing packaging, and freezing foods.

Ten years ago there were a few scattered locker plants in 3 or 4 states. Today there are over 1,800 in 38 states. The expansion is continuing. The early locker plants were places where a patron could store his bundle or basket at temperatures that were usually below freezing. Today many locker plants are complete food handling units where all kinds of foods are processed and sold as well as stored at carefully maintained temperatures, usually about zero F.

These plants often provide additional facilities for dressing and curing meat, precooking market eggs and berries, storing game, butter, ice cream, and box food, and for protecting fur coats in summer. Also the plants serve as distributing points for commercial quick-frozen foods.

Cold-storage lockers and the continuing adaption of their equipment to local needs are but natural steps in the progressive steps of bringing refrigeration closer to the farm home. Locker plants do not replace household refrigerators, pressure canners, or curing barrels. They are a supplementary means by which a family may maintain an adequate food supply at all seasons of the year.

Families use cold-storage lockers because they enjoy adding fresh frozen products to the regular diet of canned and salted foods. Village patrons find that they can buy from the farmer or wholesaler a better quality of food, especially beef, than the local retailer often can afford to carry. Sportsmen use lockers for storing fish, venison, and birds.

All patrons can have foods from the locker at a lower cost than the generally prevailing retail prices.

Broadly speaking, families can have a 12 months' supply of fresh frozen retail cuts from their own animals at a cost that varies from less than the wholesale cost of a similar carcass. The local locker manager thus earns an income on each pound of meat put through the plant and still saves the consumer most of the normal retail markup.

Families using cold-storage lockers are also able to buy and store quantities of chickens, eggs, garden products, and meats at the seasons when those products are relatively cheap. Foods that are canned or cured at home are cheaper than frozen products provided the equipment, containers, and fuel are available and there is no loss through spoilage.

Home-Grown Foods Cheapest

The satisfactory use of a locker depends, in a large measure, on having an ample quantity of desirable foods for storage in it. Growing those foods at home is the cheapest way of providing them. On many farms it is the only way. Incomes on these farms are insufficient to purchase all the family's needs and such money as is used for buying food must curtail the amounts spent for other necessities. Through the use of family labor and existing land and equipment, foods can be produced at home with only a minor additional cash outlay. With a home-raised food supply on hand fluctuations in prices and income do not greatly affect the family's diet. What the family has to eat thus becomes more dependent on its own efforts and less on the current price of wheat, cotton, or livestock. There is the same food value in a pound of butter, or a can of peas or a roast of meat, regardless of the market price.

With a home-grown supply of lean meat, dairy and poultry products, fruits, and green vegetables, families have available the essential proteins, minerals, and vitamins reported as deficient on 40 percent of the farm tables. Cold-storage lockers are an economical means by which these rather seasonal foods can be preserved and used throughout the year.

Facts About Freezing Foods

By Grace I. Neely, Ext. Specialist in Food Preservation

Freezer lockers are important to the farm family's food supply because:

They preserve foods in a more natural state.

Add variety and interest to other home-conserved food.

Retain more of the needed vitamins in the home food supply.

Provide the needed food elements in a cheaper form.

Make easier for the family the work of conserving the home food supply.

Enable families to plan and plant vegetables for use when fresh products are not available.

Select Foods for Freezer Locker Storage Like This

A frozen product can be no better than the raw material used in its preservation. This statement applies to meat as well as to

fruits and vegetables. All kinds of meats which are edible can be preserved by freezing. The length of time they can be stored varies with the quality type, previous preparation and handling before freezing, and the temperature of the sharp freezer and locker storage rooms.

Fruits and Vegetables

Select only kinds and varieties of fruits and vegetables which respond satisfactorily to freezing.

The following are recommended: Fruits: Berries of all kinds, cherries, figs, plums, peaches and rhubarb.

Vegetables: Asparagus, lima beans, snap beans, brussels sprouts, sweet corn, mushrooms, english peas, sweet peppers and greens.

Some varieties are better quality than others. Care should be taken in choosing varieties.

Vegetables and fruits should be frozen quickly after they are prepared in order to retain the vitamins, flavor and color. These preparations are too expensive to pay others to do, but can be done easily by the family with very little supervision by the plant operator.

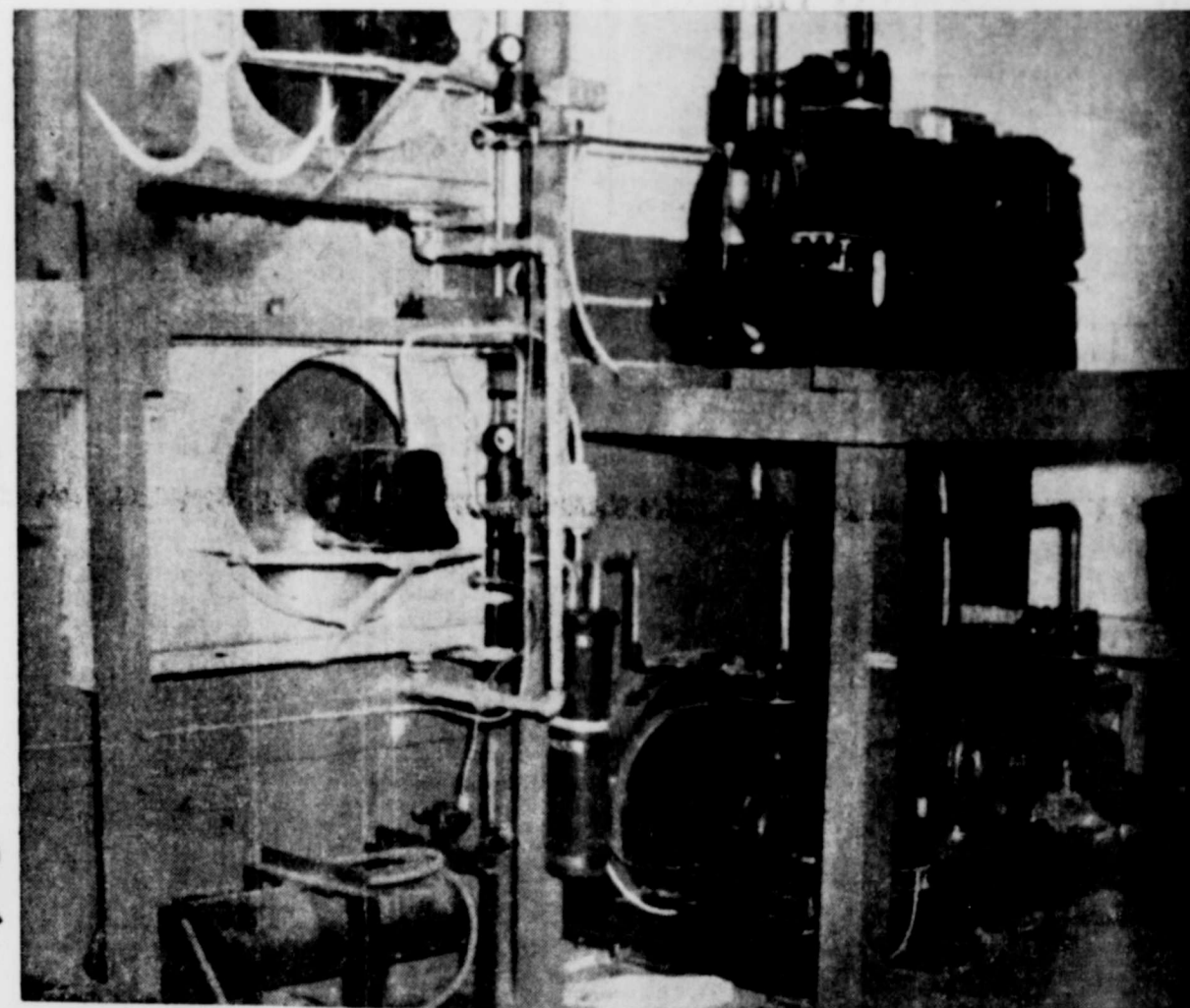
AGEING ROOM FOR MEATS



Meat is weighed and tagged and brought to the chill room where it stays for three days and nights. It is then transferred to the second room where ultra-violet rays treat it for tenderizing. It is then moved into the third room where it is thoroughly chilled. This process takes two days. It is then ready for cutting and storing in the private lockers.

Preparation of Meats To Be Frozen

Beef

In meats as well as in other products that are to be frozen it is true that the quality of the thawed product depends largely on the quality of the fresh material that was frozen. Best cuts of meat come from animals that have a good covering of fat.

The locker plant manager will provide for the wholesale purchase of beef in quarters of the patron does not have a source of supply.

Preparation

Beef should be hung or aged in the chill room at 33 degrees to 36 degrees F. for a period of three days to three weeks. A quarter of beef will be best if allowed to hang in the chill room for a period of three weeks. A lean front quarter of beef should be hung in the chill room for

about three days. The variance between the two may be determined by the patron or plant manager. This aging process is actually the determining factor of the flavor of the meat. Accordingly, this process must be varied to suit individual tastes. Extended aging produces a flavor that is somewhat unlike ordinary meat. It is a very desirable flavor and for which a flavor must be acquired. Most people have acquired a taste for market fresh meat and this same flavor may be obtained in frozen meat by shortening the aging period. Freezing does not produce a noticeable change in the flavor of the meat, but does have a tenderizing effect that is highly desirable. After this aging period and before freezing, the meat is removed from the aging room and cut into pieces, as requested by the patron and wrapped well in a special tough moisture-proof paper recommended by the plant manager.

Oil paper or cheap ordinary paper will not be satisfactory and will not prevent undesirable drying. Some plants have adopted double wrapping; parchment paper next to the meat and ordinary wrapping paper over this. The packages of wrapped meat should then be placed in the freezer room and for the quick freezing process. These packages are generally stamped with the name of the cut on the wrapper and in some plants the patron's locker number is also stamped on every package. This service is taken care of by the locker-room attendant and butcher at a very small fee. Beef may be satisfactorily stored for a period of 8 months.

The system of private maintenance of game preserves pioneered by Texas has been so successful as a factor in the protection of wildlife that it is now being widely employed in other states.

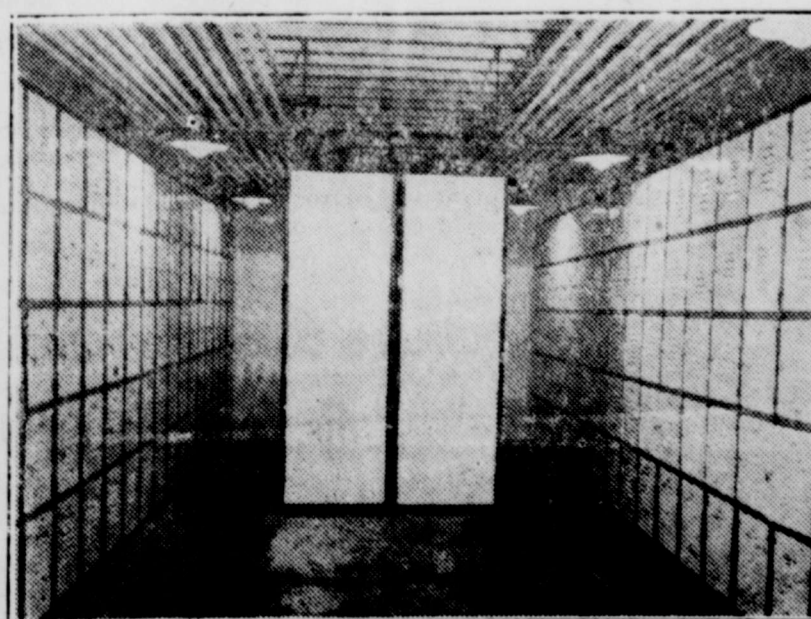

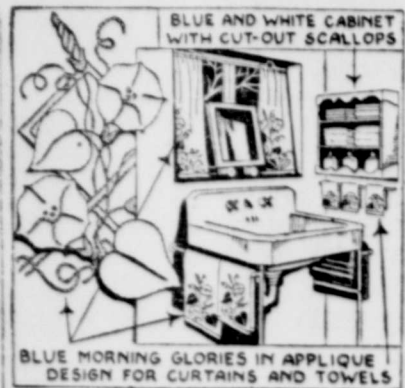

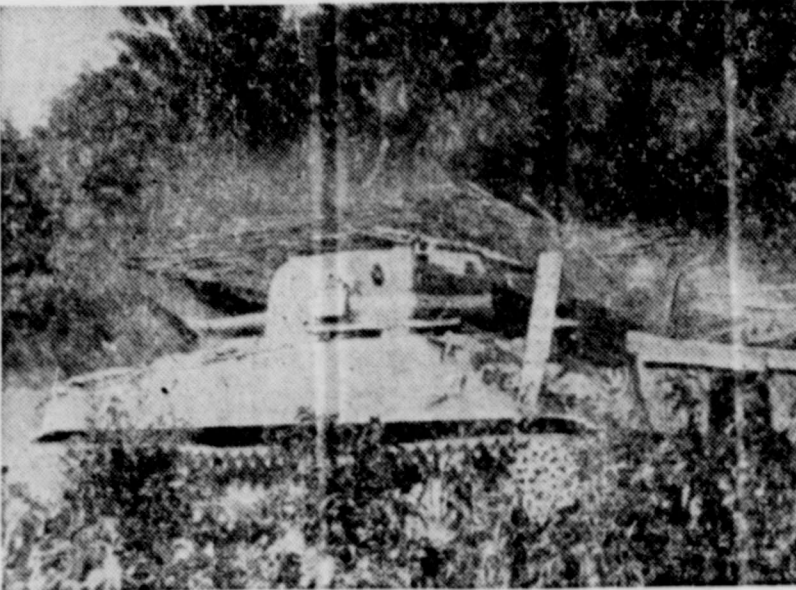

WEEKLY NEWS ANALYSIS

Red Communiques Admit Grave Peril As New Flank Attacks Harass Nazis; CIO President Proposes Peace Plan; Cargo Planes Get Qualified Approval

RUSSIA:

Flank Tactics

While Moscow's official radio was telling the Germans in their own language that the United States and Russia had come to their agreement on the creation of the second front in 1942, Soviet troops were busy with flank attacks on the Nazi forces all along the 300-mile Don river front.

German drives had pushed far beyond Rostov, toward the Caucasus, but the Russians were claiming that their new flank attacks were netting a terrific toll of Nazi tanks and men. At Voronezh, northern anchor of the Don front, the Russians had been holding out doggedly while their columns were being pushed back in the other sectors.

If Germans in the homeland had been listening to the Russian radio tell of the coming of the second front, they heard too that their country would be confronted with 15,000,000 men, 85,000 tanks, 100,000 guns, and 50,000 airplanes. But this was brave talk for even the official Russian communiques admitted the gravity of their nation's peril. Most feared was a Nazi breakthrough in the center of the Caucasus front. This would more than likely mean that the so-far orderly Russian retreat would stand a chance of being turned into a rout—a result that would be disastrous for the cause of the United Nations.

Soviet officials had other troubles, too. There were reports out of the Don valley that large rings of fifth columnists had been uncovered. Many of the spies in these groups were quickly executed as they were caught trying to co-operate with Nazi parachute troops who were dropping behind the Soviet main lines.

Meanwhile, through England and the United States the cry was getting louder for military officials to establish the much-discussed second front. From widely diversified groups and sections came the urging. There was considerable agitation for this move for many people feared the United Nations would suffer a most severe blow should Russia fail to last the year on the European side of the Ural mountains.

ALEUTIANS: 10,000 Japs

Breaking an official silence, a navy spokesman officially estimated that the Japanese have succeeded in putting "not more than 10,000" troops into the Aleutian island area and at the same time announced there was no evidence that the Pribilof island to the north had been occupied by the Nipponese.

The statement came in answer to a report made by the Alaskan delegate to congress, Anthony J. Dimond, that between 20,000 and 25,000 Jap troops were on the Aleutians and that the Pribilofs had been occupied.

Questioned about Dimond's reports, the spokesman said that "we believe that not more than 10,000 Japanese are in the Aleutians, probably one-half ashore and one-half 'float'."

The Japs gained a foothold in the Aleutians on June 3. So far, the navy has confirmed the presence of Japs only on three of the islands: Attu, Agattu and Kiska, at the western end of the chain. The Pribilofs are in the Bering sea, and consist of four islands: St. Paul, St. George, Otter and Walrus. The latter two are small and uninhabited.

PETRILLO SAYS 'NO': To Davis Plea

"I cannot grant your request to cancel the notice that the AFM members will not play for transcriptions or records."

With those words, James C. Petrillo, president of the American Federation of Musicians, refused a request by Elmer Davis, director of the Office of War Information, to rescind his ban against the making of new phonograph records or radio transcriptions for commercial purposes by union members.

PEACE PLAN: For CIO-AFL

A proposal that the Congress for Industrial Organization and the American Federation of Labor "initiate discussions regarding possible establishment of organic unity" was made by Philip Murray, CIO president, in a letter to William Green, AFL chief.

Peace proposals between the two organizations have been discussed for several months as a step toward speeding war production. In his letter, Murray proposed the establishment of a committee composed of representatives of both organizations, with an impartial arbitrator, to settle all jurisdictional disputes between the two groups. Murray named a committee of three to discuss the problem of "organic unity." He named himself, R. J. Thomas, president of the CIO United Automobile Workers, and Julius Emspak, secretary of the United Radio and Machine Workers union.

BEEF: Two Varieties

In butchershops from the Bronx to Boise there was considerable beefing about beef. Beef was high. Beef was hard to get. What was the trouble?

President Roosevelt told his press conference there were three main reasons for the current meat shortage: (1) this is the off-season for beef; (2) people have more purchasing power now, with which to buy better cuts of meat; and (3) around 4,000,000 men under arms are now eating much more meat than they ever ate on their own dinner tables at home.

Meanwhile Agriculture Secretary Claude Wickard reported that there may be some relief in the temporary beef shortage this fall when more cattle are brought in off the range. But other sources looked with disfavor on what effect this would have on the normal spring beef market.

GIANT PLANES: From Shipyards

There was a new answer to the shipping problems of the United Nations looming on the horizon. It was an unofficial agreement from the War Production board to give the "green light" to plans of Henry K. Kaiser, West Coast shipbuilder, to build giant cargo and troop transport planes in nine of the nation's shipyards.

First hitch to be overcome in the suggested set-up was the granting of authority by military officials to release engines and other parts needed in the building of aircraft for the army and navy.

Donald Nelson, WPB head, appeared to be willing to proceed with the plan if these materials could be obtained without hampering the war effort. This came as a surprise as WPB first voiced skepticism on the plan.

Kaiser's idea calls for the conversion of three shipyards on each coast to produce 5,000 flying boats a year. The ships would be of 100-ton design fashioned after the 70-ton flying boat Mars, now in active use. Support of Glenn Martin, Baltimore bomber builder, Tom Girdler, steel magnate and all others with knowledge of production problems of plane building would be sought, according to Kaiser.

After Kaiser had discussed the idea with Nelson he appeared before a senate military subcommittee to testify and Nelson later issued a statement stating that the WPB was willing to "co-operate to the limit in any practical way for increasing the effectiveness of our transportation systems."

At the same time, James H. R. Cromwell, former U. S. minister to Canada, was proposing that Kaiser be made "czar of air transportation." He said: "If we can't get supplies to the fronts by air transport we are going to lose this war."

AIR MONSTERS:

Things to Come

Reading like a tale from the pen of Jules Verne, the story of two super-gigantic cargo planes was unfolded in Washington by aviation engineers. Senate committees heard the stories.

Details of a huge plywood plane were disclosed by Dr. W. W. Christmas, technical aviation engineer. The plywood carrier, weighing 1,120,000 pounds, would be both a cargo and battle plane. It would be a 60,000 horsepower, two hull plane with 400 foot wingspread and with wings 16 feet thick, with a speed of about 350 miles an hour. It would carry 3,000 men. It would carry a rack of torpedoes weighing 20,000 pounds. Dr. Christmas pointed out that the torpedoes would have a striking force of 19,000,000 pounds when dropped. "A battleship deck would be like wet paper when one of these bombs hit it," he said.

The second plane was a revolutionary type of amphibian flying cargo plane, which would be lifted and propelled by a combination of engines, helium gas and air tunnels. The engineers are Horace Chapman Young and Eric Langlands of the Aerodynamics Research corporation.

A single wing combination cargo-fighter-carrier, the plane would have a flying deck of approximately 200 feet, from which 12 fighter planes could take off. It would carry enough helium gas to lift 36 tons and with its engines could lift 70 tons. Four tunnels would run through the wing. Engineers in these tunnels would create a semi-vacuum, whose suction would supply pulling power while the propellers gave it thrusting power. Its speed would be about 200 miles an hour.

LADIES:

Of the Navy

"Waves" is not a new word to U. S. navy men but in the future sailors will have to think twice before using it. For this is the name being given to the Navy's woman's auxiliary, counter-part of the army's WAAC.

Now officially organized, the Waves plan to enlist 10,000. First call was for 1,000 women, preferably bachelor girls, to volunteer as officer candidates. Miss Mildred McAfee, 42, president of Wellesley college, Wellesley, Mass., is being chosen head of the feminine navy unit and will hold the rank of lieutenant commander.

While there appeared to be a preference for single girls, married women are not prohibited from volunteering. Unmarried women will have to agree not to marry while in training—a one-month period. Waves will be assigned to desk or administrative jobs to release men for active sea duty.

Rationing Student

MISCELLANY:

COUSINS: Conklin Mann, New York genealogist who discovered last month that President Roosevelt and Prime Minister Churchill are eighth cousins once removed, announced that he had found the President to be a sixth cousin once removed of Gen. Douglas MacArthur.

MARKETING: U. S. farmers in the first half of 1942 marketed products totaling \$5,773,000,000, according to a department of agriculture estimate. This compares with \$4,012,000,000 for the same period in 1941.

FATS: The Office of Price Administration has set a ceiling of four cents a pound on waste kitchen fats now being sold by housewives to retail meat markets in the national salvage campaign.

GASLESS: Pleasure driving is practically a thing of the past in Britain. As of August 1, gasoline is sold only to business and professional automobiles.

DEATH: Maj. Gen. Julius von Bernath, German tank expert, was killed in action on the Russian front. It was announced on a Nazi broadcast.

Improved Uniform International LESSON

ISAAC PRACTICES PEACE

LESSON TEXT—Genesis 26:18-31. GOLDEN TEXT—Blessed are the peacemakers: for they shall be called the children of God.—Matthew 5:9.

To talk peace in a warring world seems almost futile, and so it is, unless it be the peace of God. In a world largely dominated by the philosophy that might makes right, and in which men demand what they call their rights, taking them even by lawless and violent methods, it is increasingly difficult to proclaim the truth that patience and meekness are not weakness, but are Christian virtues worth emulating.

The story of Isaac is interesting from beginning to end. He was an ordinary man, one of the common people. He had come through varied experiences of victory and defeat before the time of our lesson. Fearing a famine, and apparently not trusting God at the moment, he had gone down from the promised land to the country of the Philistines, there redigging the wells which his father Abraham had dug. The result was that he prospered. Ere long, however, envy on the part of his enemies taught Isaac that—

I. Peace in This World Is Temporary (vv. 18-21).

Isaac had prospered, but he was still out of the promised land, and while he was in the land of Philistines he could expect no permanent peace.

We are in the world. We long for peace, and would throw all our influence and service into the cause of bringing a righteous peace to the troubled peoples of the world. But let us not be misled by that desire into the support of unscriptural and impossible peace programs. This world is a sinful world, and as long as that is true, there will be strife and war, that men (as James puts it) may have the gains thereof for their own pleasure.

Our business in such a world is to preach the gospel of grace, winning men to Christ, that they may become men of good-will. Isaac was such a man, willing to yield even what seemed to be his right, rather than cause contention.

Undoubtedly there are times when one must defend his name and his possessions, but all too often those who do "stand for their rights" have wrecked homes, churches, and nations, and have gained nothing but an empty victory.

The peace of this world is temporary. Is there then no real abiding peace and joy?

II. Abiding Joy Is Found in Fellowship With God (vv. 22-25).

When Isaac came up into Canaan, the land which God had promised to him, he found real peace and an abiding joy in renewed fellowship with God. Even so, the Christian man and woman who will step out of a spiritually destructive fellowship with the ungodly world and come over wholeheartedly into the spiritual Canaan of full consecration and separate living, will find true peace and satisfying communion with God.

Our thought, however, has wider application—one much needed today. There is to come a time when this world will have true and abiding peace which shall cover the earth like the waters cover the sea. When the One who has the right to reign, the Lord Jesus Christ, returns to take His throne, then, and not before, will there be true peace.

We await that day with longing which grows more intense as men grow more violent in their hatred. But is there nothing more we can do? Yes, we learn from Isaac's experience that—

III. A Godly Life Is a Testimony to Warring Men (vv. 26-31).

These men were wicked men, even speaking falsehood in their claim of friendship toward Isaac (v. 29). Now that they perceived that God was continually blessing Isaac in spite of their repeated injustice toward him, they decided that it would be well to make a covenant of friendship with him. Even those who follow the way of war and aggression cannot deny the effectiveness of true Christian testimony.

Observe also that by his patience and kindness Isaac ultimately made friends out of his enemies. "It is better to turn enemies into friends than to beat them, and have them enemies still." And so this man with the patient, self-sacrificing spirit brought peace not only to himself, but to those about him, because he believed and trusted God. "When a man's ways please the Lord, he maketh even his enemies to be at peace with him" (Prov. 16:7).

What can we do to bring peace today? We can pray that God will help America and her allied nations to turn to Him in repentance of sin, and in a desire to so honor His name that He may be able to give His blessing. When Hezekiah spread before the Lord the threat of his enemy, God undertook for him in a mighty way, because his heart was right toward God (Isa. 37:14-20). Will he do less for us?

A JOINT RESOLUTION
proposing an amendment to the Constitution of the State of Texas authorizing the Legislature to appropriate Seventy-five Thousand (\$75,000) Dollars or so much thereof as may be necessary to pay claims incurred by John Tarleton Agricultural College for the construction of a building on the campus of such college pursuant to deficiency authorization by the Governor of Texas on August 31st, 1937.

Be It Resolved By The Legislature of the State of Texas:

Section 1. That the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended by adding a new section, as follows:

"The Legislature is authorized to appropriate so much money as may be necessary, not to exceed Seventy-five Thousand (\$75,000) Dollars, to pay claims incurred by John Tarleton Agricultural College for the construction of a building on the campus of such college pursuant to deficiency authorization by the Governor of Texas on August 31st, 1937.

Section 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at the next general election or be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A. D. 1942, at which all ballots shall have printed thereon: "For the constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to pay for building constructed for John Tarleton Agricultural College;" and "Against the constitutional amendment authorizing the Legislature to pay for building constructed for John Tarleton Agricultural College."

Each voter shall scratch out one of said clauses on the ballot, leaving the one expressing his vote on the proposed amendment.

Sec. 3. The Governor shall issue the necessary resolution for said election and have the same published as required by the Constitution and laws of this State. The expenses of publication and election for such amendment shall be paid out of proper appropriation made by law.

Draft Groups To Be Reclassified

Draft boards will reclassify 3-A and 3-B registrants into class 1-A if it is necessary to fill quotas, Maj. D. M. Perkins, chairman of draft board No. 1, said Tuesday afternoon.

Major Perkins said the first effects of a new ruling will be felt in late September or early October. An increase or decrease in the calls would change the situation, he said.

No report has come from draft Board 3, but it is presumed that the same ruling will apply to all boards.

The first dip into class 3 ranks is expected to take men with secondary dependencies and the second group will include men who maintain a family, supporting a wife, but having no children. Men with a wife and children are expected to be called later.

The new order also authorizes reclassification of men engaged in war work if it becomes necessary to fill calls.

The order, which came from Maj. John D. Copeland, man power division of state selective service headquarters at Austin, said in part:

"The national emergency is such that we must fill all calls in their entirety. The minimum time from day of classification to day of induction must be 22 days.

"When necessary to anticipate filling a call, your local board is authorized under national headquarters memorandum 1-416 which was amended July 11, 1942 to reclassify class 3-A and 3-B into class 1-A for purpose of filling calls for induction. Again we repeat, all calls must be filled in their entirety."

"Credit on calls will be allowed for registrants who enlist after they have been mailed an order to report for induction. Credit on calls will not be allowed on registrants enlisting prior to the mailing of an order to report for induction."
