City clean-up project viewed

Mrs. Virginia Fuller will be heading a committee of the Colorado City Chamber of Commerce to spearhead a clean-up campaign.

The appointment of Mrs. Fuller to chair the committee came after chamber manager Penny Solomon explained the proposed campaign to the chamber directors during their meeting Monday night.

Miss Solomon said the Governor's Community Achievement Awards program is designed for Texas cities to clean up their towns. She further explained that Colorado City could be eligible for up to \$30,000 in prize money to be used to beautify the entrances into town.

The clean-up campaign will be a chamber sponsored event in cooperation with the city, said Miss Solomon. She said a similar program in Monahans proved successful with the city fire department burning down old vacant buildings and the city enforcing strict ordinances against junk and trash.

Miss Solomon also informed the directors that Bob Duckworth, executive vice president of the Monahans Chamber of Commerce, will conduct a priority planning meeting at the July 1 meeting. Purpose of the meeting will be to help set priorities for the chamber in the coming year.

In other action, the board decided not to renew its contract

2 burglaries investigated

The Colorado City Police Department is investigating two burglaries which occurred sometime early Monday morning.

Police chief Bobby Sparks said the Col-Ex station at the corner of Hickory and Second streets was discovered broken into about 2:45 a.m. Monday. Intruders had entered the building by removing an air conditioner at the back of the business. There was \$407 taken from

an unlocked safe.

Snow's Exxon, located on Interstate 20, was also burglarized, station employees discovered at the open of business on Monday morning. Intruders there gained entry by using something to pry open the front door. Once inside, a cutting torch was unsuccessfully used to attempt to open a floor safe. Instead, the burglars took an undetermined amount of change, mostly quar-

ters, from the office area. The intruders locked the front door as they left.

Sparks warns local business owners to secure their property and not to leave large amounts of money overnight, especially in unlocked safes or cash drawers.

"Don't make it easier for the burglars," said Sparks. "Merchants should lock up what they've got if they want to keep it."

Play provides entertaining evening

"The Member of the Wedding," the latest Colorado City Playhouse production, could have taken place anywhere, anytime.

However, the poignant story of a gawky, motherless girl on the verge of becoming a young woman, is set in a small southern town in August of 1945.

The time element does provide an excellent opportunity to showcase the set design, and the southern accent used by the characters is charming, although at times difficult to understand.

The three-act play by Carson McCullers and directed by Terry Revis takes place in the kitchen and backyard of what one might assume to be a typical southern house of that era.

A grape arbor on one side, a back porch with a screen door that makes a sound only a screen door can make when slammed shut as the actors come and go from the kitchen, sets the stage.

Frankie Addams, played by Stacie Smith, is the 12-year-old who decides that when her brother Jarvis, played by Tracy Womack, marries Janice, played by Angie Selvera, she'll move to the Army camp to live with them because she's the "we" of nobody.

Regina Green plays Berniece Sadie Brown, the combination cook, housekeeper and surrogate mother, who tries to keep Frankie in line as well as her own son, Honey, played by Kevin Norman, who does indeed have trouble with the law.

Ruben Hurt as John Henry West, Frankie's cousin, wins everyone's heart as the delightful, bespectacled youngster in cut-off overalls who tries his best to try everyone's patience.

Other able members of the cast include Jack Starr as Mr. Addams; Amy Moore as Helen Fletcher; Linda Hearin as Mrs. West; Evelyn Smith as Doris; Patricia Jones as Sis Laura; Philip Jerome Thompson I as T. T. Williams; and Jacob Mikow as Barney.

TEXAS GARDENER TIPS

Crepe Myrtle: A Tree For All Seasons



The crepe myrtle, a deciduous shrub or small tree with striking blooms in the spring and summer, has become one of the most popular and beautiful plants grown in Texas. Few plants can offer the gardener so much for so long and yet demand so little.

It is easy to care for and can grow in nearly every type of soil. Sometimes called the "Lilac of the South," crepe myrtle gets its common name from its crepe-like, crinkled and ruffled petals and the resemblance of its leaves to the true myrtle.

The crepe myrtle makes outstanding contributions to a landscape in each season of the year. The flowering season begins in June or July in most of Texas and continues through fall. Each bloom, or panicle, is composed of hundreds of red, pink, white, lavender or purple flowers. In the fall, leaves turn beautiful shades of yellow, orange or red. And in the winter, when the leaves fall, the crepe myrtle's bark and shape take on the look of a living sculpture. The trunk and branches have an attractively gnarled, twisted character. In spring and early summer, the bark exfoliates to reveal new bark ranging in color from light pink to pale green.


Crepe myrtle can be planted nearly year-round when using container-grown plants. Balled-and-burlapped plants, however, do best when planted during the dormant season or in very early spring.

Deep watering is required during dry spells in summer when it is growing and flowering. Insufficient watering may result in premature leaf drop.

Crepe myrtle requires little pruning to maintain its naturally graceful form, but you should tip prune to remove old flower clusters and promote more growth. Small, twiggy growth should be thinned out from underneath the canopy to keep the trunk clean and to allow free air circulation.

Another big plus for the crepe myrtle is its high resistance to insects and disease. In fact, it can be one of the most pest-free landscape plants available when located in a good growing site.

Beware of weight loss program claims

Many Americans feel the need to lose weight. Some people turn to weight loss clinics, hoping that a special program will provide the help they need to get those extra pounds off. Unfortunately, some of these businesses are designed to take more than just pounds—they want a good portion of your money also.

You may have seen advertising that promises "Lose 20 pounds for only \$69." My Consumer Protection attorneys tell me that in some cases the \$69 you pay is only the beginning. In order to stay in the program, the would-be thin person is required to make weekly payments for various unnecessary products, such as "protein drinks." These products are frequently very costly to the consumer, having been marked up by 300 percent or more by the clinic. In addition, some of the products have no nutritional value.

If a weight loss program uses

the word "medical" in its title or advertising, then it should have a doctor on call for consumers at all times. A drastic change in your eating habits may cause fatigue, headaches, or worse symptoms. It is best, in fact, to ask a doctor what kind of diet is best for you. Unfortunately, most commercial weight loss establishments do not tailor the diet to the individual. The diet that helped your next door neighbor may not be the right one for you.

Be especially wary of weight control programs that are new in town. Or, if a particular clinic has recently changed its name, you should try to find out what happened to the old clinic. Are the same people still working there? What happened to the customers from the previous operation?

Before you sign a contract with any weight loss organization, ask what the company will do if you do not lose weight or if you are dissatisfied with the

program. If there is no refund policy, look elsewhere. If there is a refund policy, get it in writing. Find out how long the company has been in business and whether it has more than one location. Ask your local BBB or the Attorney General's Office if they have any unresolved complaints about the company.

If you have had a problem with a weight loss clinic or other kind of weight loss program, you may get help from the Attorney General's Consumer Protection

Division. We also offer a free brochure on selecting a health spa, and many other consumer brochures.

If you need more help or information on this or other consumer problems, contact your nearest Attorney General Consumer Protection Office (in Austin, Dallas, El Paso, Houston, Lubbock, McAllen, and San Antonio). The Attorney General's Office is the people's law firm. We're here to help you.

Educator blasts legislature

AUSTIN—The president of the Association of Texas Professional Educators (ATPE) charges that the 69th Legislature slammed the door on education when it failed to address the crucial issues of classroom discipline and bureaucratic paperwork.

Calling for the Governor to open the special session to education, Sue McGarvey, a government teacher from Hallsville and president of the 42,000-member association, said, "Texas teachers can't wait two more years. We are more frustrated today than we were at the beginning of school."

"How can we be expected to meet the expectations of the public when current law allows students to come to school drunk, to curse a teacher, or to sell marijuana without fear of expulsion?"

McGarvey said that teachers have worked under "untenable conditions" for nine months.

"We trusted state leaders when they promised relief from bureaucratic paperwork that prevents us from fulfilling our mission—to teach," she said.

ATPE Executive Director Mike Morrow said, "The legislative process is not working as far as education is concerned. Educators met their commitment and made every effort to work with the leadership to alleviate proven problems in HB 72. If the Governor does not take action to correct these oversights, then Texas education cannot reach the excellence that it seeks."

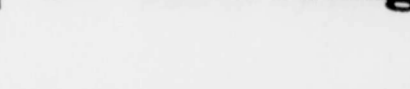

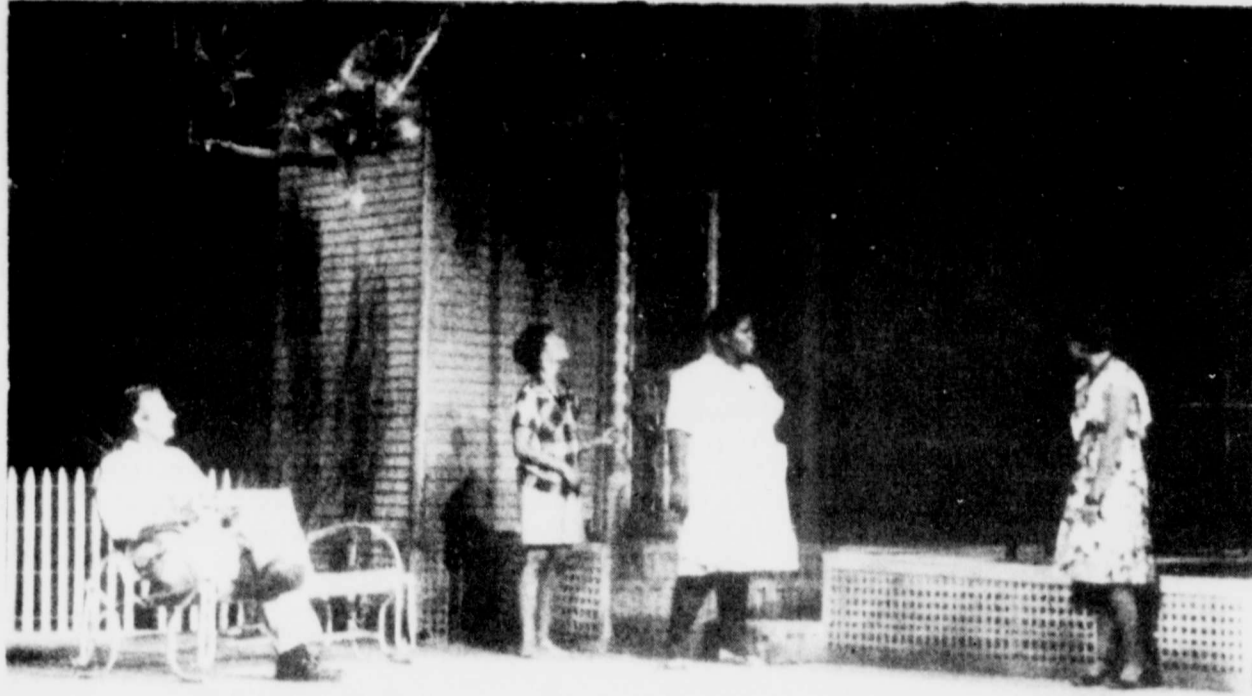

Dairy products are important to health

June, designated as National Dairy Month, brings to mind the importance of the dairy industry and its products to our everyday lives. Aside from the fact that dairy products are a necessary portion of our daily diet, osteoporosis has come to the foreground as another reason for adequate calcium intake.

About a year ago this was a much talked about subject. Perhaps a few reminders about what the disease is and does, coupled with some suggestions for eating habits, would serve as a reminder that this is a serious condition and measures should be taken for its prevention.

Osteoporosis has been called "the silent epidemic." A weakening of the bone structure, it is a condition that develops over time. A woman may not know she is developing this condition until she develops a "dowager's hump" or experiences broken bones from even minor falls in her later years.

The best prevention for osteoporosis is an adequate supply of calcium daily over the lifespan. Yet research studies show that most adult women are consuming less than the recommended

two servings a day of dairy products.

Nutritionists are also concerned about the future of the growing number of teenage girls who drink carbonated beverages rather than milk with meals and snacks.

No matter what your age, it's not too late to change your eating habits so you can get the calcium necessary for strong bones throughout life. Here are some ways to add more dairy products to your diet:

-Drink milk at meals and for snacks.

-Eat cheese as a snack or add it to other foods like sandwiches.

-Eat yogurt.

-When you make creamed soups, use milk instead of water.

-Serve calcium-rich desserts, such as ice cream, custard or pudding.

-Add powdered milk to soups, casseroles, sauces, and beverages like cocoa.

While increasing calcium intake is the key step in preventing osteoporosis, there are also some other things you can do: regular exercise, getting enough vitamin D, eating a nutritionally adequate diet and stopping smoking will also keep your bones strong.



Offshore production up

AUSTIN—State offshore leases produced 144,407 barrels of crude oil during March, compared to 121,189 barrels in the shorter month of February, according to Railroad Commission Chairman Buddy Temple.

Gas well gas production from state leases amounted to 8,985,742 Mcf (thousand cubic

feet) in March, against 8,895,604 Mcf in February.

Casinghead gas production totaled 336,537 Mcf in March, compared to 256,412 Mcf in February. Casinghead gas is natural gas produced from oil wells.

Condensate production from state leases amounted to 36,839 barrels in March, against 36,379 barrels in February. Condensa-

tes are liquid hydrocarbons produced from gas wells.

In March, offshore crude production was about 0.2 percent of total estimated crude production in Texas. Offshore gas well gas production was approximately 2.5 percent of the estimated state total.

Offshore production in state waters was reported in March from 48 oil and 444 gas wells.

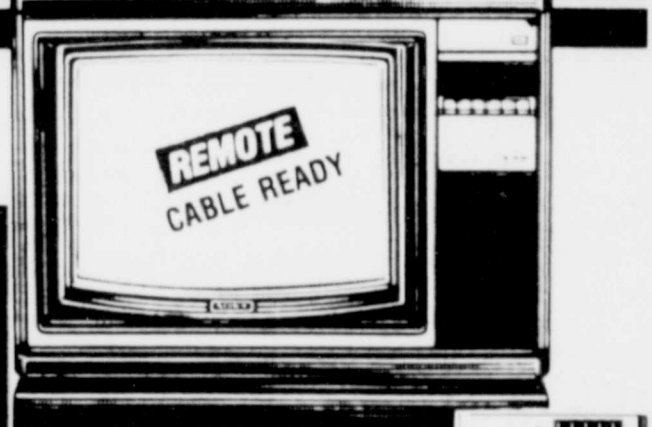
