JUDGE GOODWIN RETURNS HOME

Judge Jno. W. Goodwin returned to his home at Brownwood Wednesday morning to be with his father, who is very low and not expected to live but a few days. There was little doing in district court, the non-jury docket being pretty well worked up and the criminal docket continued until the third week. Judge Goodwin will not return to Ballinger until next Monday, unless the grand jury announces ready to report, in which event he will return the last of this week and discharge them.

TICK ERADICATION TO CONTINUE HERE

A number of parties appeared before the commissioners court on Monday of this week, and asked that they suspend cattle dipping in this county until next spring. The court entered into a discussion of the proposition immediately and announced that the commissioners had no authority to take such action, and could not suspend dipping in the county.

"We are only co-operating with the State Sanitary Livestock Commission in the tick eradication work," said Judge Kieberg, "and the only thing we could do would be to get rid of the inspectors we have employed, and then it would be up to the commission to take such action as they saw fit."

This was practically the same view of the proposition as expressed by other members of the court. Some were of the opinion that the Sanitary Livestock Commission would withdraw from the county if the inspectors were suspended.

Before passing the question up the commissioners court placed the matter before the State Sanitary Livestock Commission. Dr. Wallace, chief inspector for the commission, happened to be in Brownwood and was communicated with and came to Ballinger and discussed the proposition with the court.

Dr. Wallace advised the court not to interfere with the work at this time, and said that the cattle which were in such condition as to be damaged by dipping should be fed and put in condition. He stated that the poor herds of cattle in this county which were infested with ticks could be handled in such a way as not to suffer a hardship on them, and that no inspector would be allowed to compel a man to dip his cattle if they were in such condition that dipping would kill them.

Dr. Wallace stated that to suspend dipping at this time would remove the restriction which has been placed around the stockmen who had cleaned their cattle of ticks, would cause the state to withdraw its support from the county and undo the work that had been done.

After hearing the question discussed, and being advised by the state authorities, the court declined to take any action in the matter, which means that the law stands in this county and tick eradication will be carried on, and acting upon the advice of the state inspector no man will be compelled to dip his cattle if they are too poor to dip, so long as he keeps them on his own premises and takes proper steps for preparing the cattle for dipping by feeding.

Perplexing Question Confronts Court.

It was reported to the commissioners court Wednesday morning that a horse was on the line on the Ballinger-Coleman road, a few miles from town, and that the horse was infested with ticks. It seems that some one traveling through the country had left the horse by the side of the road to die, after the poor animal had got down and could not get up. It was not known who the owner of the horse was, and the court was confronted with the problem of what to do in the case. It is probable that the court will have the horse killed and carcass burned to get rid of the ticks.

SEEKING PASTURAGE FOR CATTLE.

Jake Stubblefield and Lottie Farris returned from a trip thru several counties south of Ballinger in an effort to find pasturage for cattle. They report pretty good grass in some sections of the country where they visited, but say they failed to get a lease on anything. Unless some of the stockmen can find grass they will be compelled to feed through the winter, which will prove rather expensive at the prevailing price of feed.

PURCHASE OF SEWER SYSTEM POSTPONED

The city council was in session Tuesday for the purpose of taking up the proposition of buying the sanitary sewerage system of this city, which is now owned by a private corporation. Most of the aldermen agree that the city should own the sewer system and are in favor of buying same.

It seems that a new law governing the pollution of streams goes into effect on the first of January, and in order to comply with this law certain improvements have to be made in the local plant, and it will cost considerable money to make the improvements. The city can not take the plant over and deduct the cost of making the improvements from the purchase price, as the city will have no cash with which to make the necessary improvements.

The owners of the sewer plant propose to sell the property to the city without a dollar cash, and accept payments on time to be made from the revenue from the system, and extend the payments in such way that the sewer system would pay for itself. This is a fair proposition, and one the city, we believe would readily accept, if they had the cash to make the improvements necessary.

After considerable discussion the mayor announced that a committee would be appointed to handle the proposition, and instructed to act in harmony with the requirements of the state sanitary law. The city will be compelled to make the improvements if the city buys the plant in its present condition, and the present owners will be compelled to make the improvements if they retain the sewer system and continue to operate same. As we understand the proposition the laws governing the pollution of streams must be complied with regardless of who the owners of the sewer system are, and no transfer of the property will take place until this question is settled.

V. M. Ehlers, sanitary engineer of the state board of health, was here Tuesday conferring with the city council and with the owners of the sewer system. Henry E. Elrod, an engineer from Dallas, was also here to appraise the property, and make an estimate on the probable cost of necessary improvements.

WHAT CATTLE TICKS COST THE SOUTH

WASHINGTON, Oct. 10.—The Texas fever cattle tick lays from 3,000 to 5,000 eggs a year.

Ticks suck as much as 200 pounds of blood a year from a 1,000 pound steer.

Tick reduce a cow's milk 18 to 42 per cent, a loss of 7 to 15 cents a day to the farmer.

Ticks get the benefit of part of every pound of feed, hay, and concentrates, infested cattle eat.

It costs the South \$50,000,000 a year to board the ticks on cattle.

Driving cattle through arsenical dipping baths kills Texas-fever ticks and lets the animals grow.

Louisiana and Mississippi have made ticks illegal by requiring every county to dip all cattle.

Two hundred and ninety-four thousand and fourteen square miles of territory have been freed from the cattle tick by dipping, but 434,529 square miles remain to be freed.

Tick eradication is proceeding rapidly in Runnels county because people would rather have nickels in their pockets than ticks on their cows.

CIVIC LEAGUE GETS BENEFIT AT QUEEN

The regular program to be given at the Queen Theatre Friday night will be supplemented with a home talent program, and fifty per cent of the receipts for this show on this occasion will be donated to the Civic League. This arrangement was perfected between the ladies of the Civic League and the managers of the moving picture house this week.

Ballinger has some excellent entertainers, and for this occasion an attractive program will be arranged, including several musical numbers. The price of admission will remain at ten cents, and in addition to the extra program. You will be helping to create a fund for the Civic League that will be used in promoting the work of that organization. The show will begin promptly at seven o'clock and at least two shows will be given in order that the large crowd that is expected can be accommodated.

MAY SHIP ANOTHER CAR OF PAPER

The ladies of the Civic League are considering the idea of gathering a car of old papers, magazines and catalogues, having them baled and shipped to the paper mills. While one car of old papers has been gathered here, it is believed that it would be an easy matter to get up another car, and if the ladies of the town will co-operate with the Civic League, the old papers that are going to waste could be converted into cash and used to a good advantage.

29 AUTOS REGISTERED FOR THIS MONTH.

For the first ten days of October, twenty-nine autos were registered with the county clerk, or almost an average of three cars per day including Sunday. Up to the night of Oct. 10th, 1017 automobiles had been registered in the county, and quite a number of auto owners are using the same number for two cars. The best day for the auto business so far recorded this fall was last Saturday when seven autos were registered. Most of these cars were sold at Ballinger.

NEW YORK, Oct. 11.—It is reported here that British aeroplanes, operating out of Halifax, are sweeping the Atlantic for many miles searching for German submarines. The aviators are using Halifax as a base, and will keep a close lookout for belligerent submarines.

It is also reported here that British officials have intimated that submarine nets will be spread in every direction from Nantucket. It is believed that the German undersea craft will attempt to find unprotected allied shipping further southward and will make an attack on merchant ships bound out of southern ports.

American Ports Open to Subs.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 11.—The text of the United States note answering the allied governments on the subject of treatment of belligerent submarines in neutral ports reads:

The government of the United States has received the identical memoranda of the governments of France, Great Britain, Russia, and Japan, in which neutral governments are exhorted to "take efficacious measures tending to prevent belligerent submarines, regardless of their use, to avail themselves of neutral waters, roadsteads and harbors."

These governments point out the facility possessed by such craft to avoid supervision or surveillance or determination of their national characters and their power "to do injury that is inherent in their very nature," as well as "the additional facilities" afforded by having at their disposal places where they can rest and replenish their supplies.

Apparently, on these grounds the allied governments hold that "submarine vessels must be excluded from the benefit of the rules heretofore accepted under international law regarding the admission and sojourn of war and merchant vessels in neutral waters, roadsteads or harbors; any submarine of a belligerent that once enters a neutral harbor must be held there," and therefore the allied governments warn the neutral powers of the great danger to neutral submarines attending the navigation of waters visited by the submarines of belligerents.

In replay the government of the United States must express its surprise that there appears to be an endeavor of the allied powers to determine the rule of action governing what they regard as a "novel situation," in respect to the use of submarines in time of war, and to enforce the acceptance of that rule, at least in part, by warning neutral powers of the great danger to their submarines in waters that may be visited by belligerent submarines.

In the opinion of the government of the United States the allied powers have not set forth any circumstances, nor is the government of the United States at present aware of any circumstances concerning the use of war or merchant submarines which would render the existing rules of international law inapplicable to them.

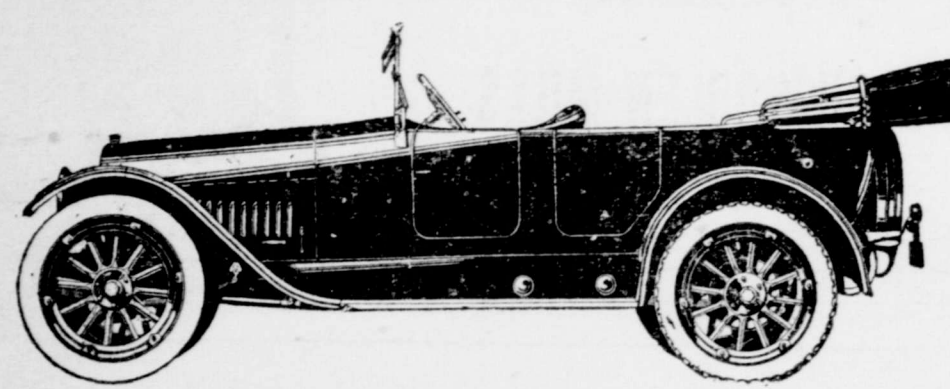
In view of this fact and of the notice and warning of the allied powers announced in their memoranda under acknowledgment, it is incumbent upon the government of the United States to notify the governments of France, Great Britain, Russia and Japan that so far as the treatment of either war or merchant submarines in American waters is concerned the government of the United States reserves its liberty of action in all respects and will treat such vessels as in its opinion becomes the action of a power which may be said to have been the first steps toward establishing the principles of neutrality and which for

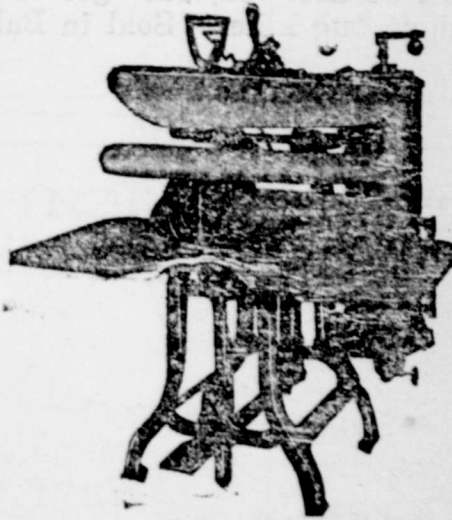

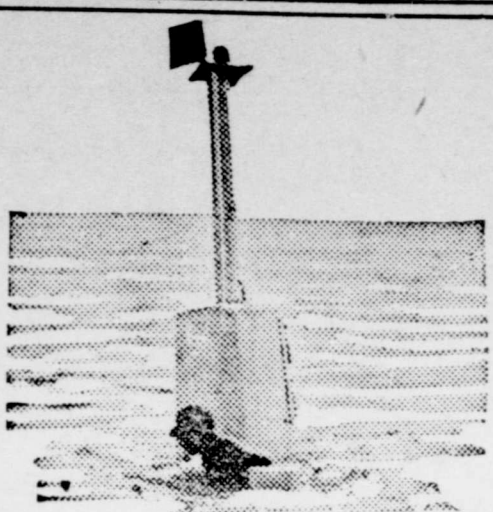

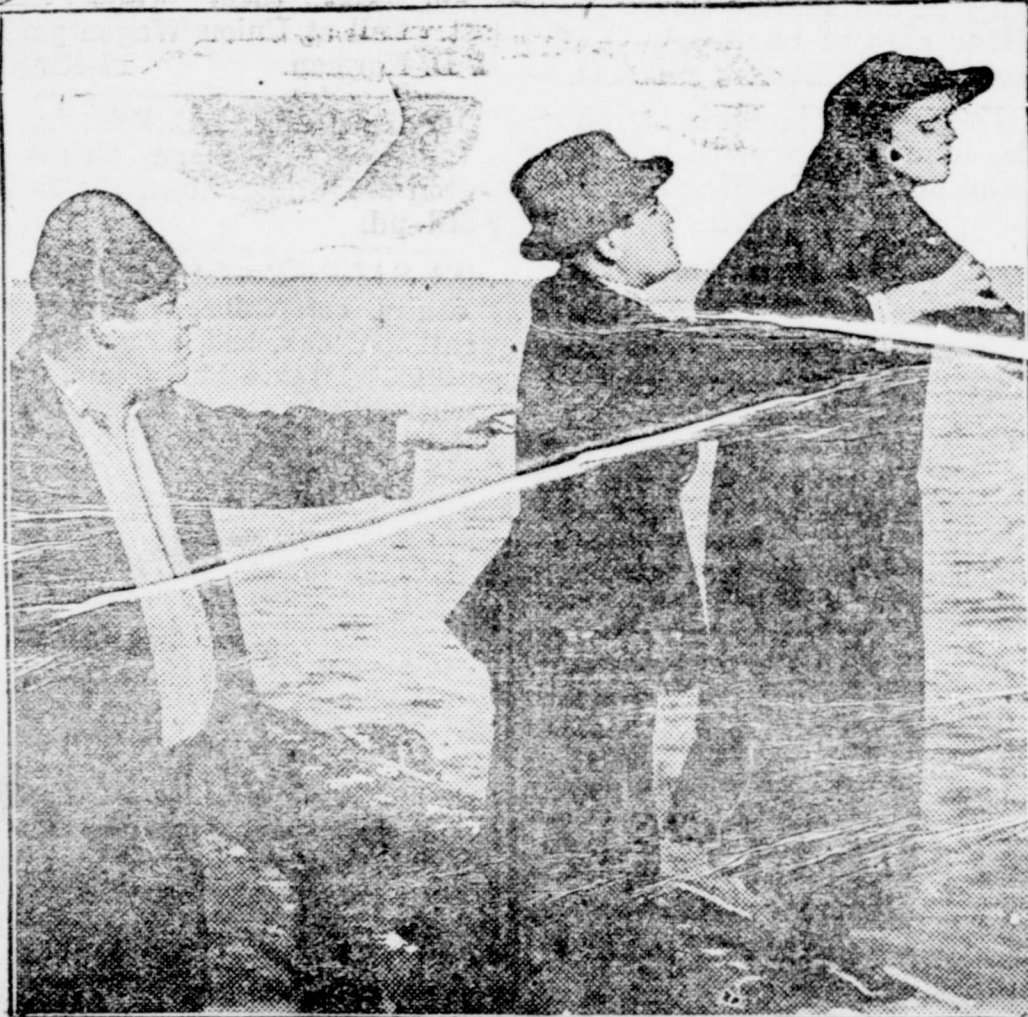

Over a century has maintained those principles in the traditional spirit and with the high sense of impartiality in which they were conceived.

In order, however, that there should be no misunderstanding as to the attitude of the United States, the government of the United States announces to the al-

lied powers that it holds it to be the duty of belligerent powers to distinguish between submarines of neutral and belligerent nationality and that responsibility for any conflict that may arise between belligerent warships and neutral submarines on account of neglect of a belligerent to distinguish between these classes of submarines must rest entirely upon the negligent power.
