Lubbock Officers Make Big Liquor Haul Tuesday One Slaton Negro Dies; Another Is Seriously Slashed

Arch Searcy Uses Knife In Killing His Wife Tuesday

Willie Edwards Lies Near Death As Result Of Fracas In Slaton Last Night; Youth May Die

Killer Is Hunted

Dragnet Laid By Officers In County To Prevent His Escape; Murder Attracts Attention

(Special To The Avalanche) SLATON, Mar. 19.—Sarah Searcy, negro woman, was murdered here tonight and Willie Edwards, twenty-year-old negro shine boy in a local barber shop, was perhaps fatally injured in a knife fracas in the backyard of the residence of Chief of Police U. L. George at about 5:30 o'clock.

Arch Searcy, husband of the negro woman, who is charged with the murder and assault was still at large at a late hour last night. A county wide dragnet was thrown out and officers were making an intensive search for the negro in every direction of this city.

Throat Had Been Slit. Lying in a pool of blood, the negro woman was dead when she was found by neighbors. Her throat had been slit. Edwards, known about the city as "Cornbread", ran about 100 yards before slumping to the ground. He was taken to a local physician who last night offered little hope for his recovery. The negro received serious lacerations on his arm, shoulder, and neck, in addition to a bad bruise.

Searcy, an employee of a Slaton company, had been separated from his wife for some time and had threatened to kill her on several occasions, according to neighbors. The knife scrape occurred when he came to his wife's residence, the servants' quarters back of the George home, and found "Cornbread" Edwards there.

The scene of the murder and the undertaking parlor to where the negro woman was taken each saw unusual excitement last night as curious townspeople crowded about. Many wild rumors followed the affair, one report being that a race riot had occurred here.

Rebels Fall Back Deeper In Desert

President Gil Declares Extremism Of Insurgents To Be Sought; Troops Are United Under Calles

(By Associated Press) Without waiting for a new federal offensive to form, the rebel army commanded by General Gonzalo Escobar has fallen back from Escalon to Jimenez, deeper in the state of Chihuahua. Sympathizers in New York termed it "good rebel tactics," which was the same phrase used by General Escobar to describe his earlier retreat from Torreón.

President Emilio Portes Gil, confident that the rebel withdrawal without battle is leading only to the United States border, declared that extradition of the insurgent leaders would be sought on the ground that they are "common criminals and bank robbers."

Seek To Recover Money. The Mexican government also will seek to recover millions of pesos taken from government banks during brief occupation of central Mexico cities and said to be already in, or en route to the United States.

For the first time since the revolt broke out, more than a fortnight ago, the federal armies, which have been operating as five distinct columns converging on Torreón after clearing of rebels the surrounding country, were united under the immediate leadership of General Plutarco Elias Calles, former president and now secretary of war.

Congratulated For Killing Man

GALVESTON, Mar. 19.—(P)—Justice of Peace John Harris today over to the grand jury on bond of \$1 and then congratulated him for his feat in stabbing to death a negro man who was firing at him after Flores, a butcher, resisted an attempted holdup in his shop Sunday morning.

The negro's companion fled when Flores brandished an 18-inch butcher knife. Flores is exhibiting a scalp wound caused by a blow from the negro's revolver.

Here's How The Town Of Elba, Ala. Looked As The Flood Struck It

Thieves Take Body Of Floyd Collins From Crystal Cave

(By Associated Press) HOUSTON, Mar. 19.—The body of Floyd Collins, stolen from its metal and glass casket in Crystal Cave, where it was on exhibition was found in a burlap sack about four hundred yards from the cave here this afternoon.

Blood hounds led searchers, who included the sheriffs of three counties, to the body. No motive for the theft could be advanced by the sheriffs. According to advice received by the county attorney, the body either had disintegrated or had been mutilated.

The seventeen day battle to save the life of Floyd Collins, when he was trapped while exploring San Cave stirred the nation in 1925. Relief workers battled furiously to reach the imprisoned man but before they could release him, Collins died.

Recently the body was put on exhibition in Crystal Cave. When attendants reported this morning, they noticed that a chain barring the door had been sawed; inside they found the casket had been opened and the body removed.

Dr. Thomas reported the theft to the sheriff's office early today. He said that about a year ago the cave had been broken into and some one apparently had attempted to carry off the body, but had been unsuccessful. The body was in a chamber about 600 feet from the main entrance.

BRYAN, Mar. 19. (P)—Mathew Sanders, negro, was indicted by the grand jury here today for attempted criminal assault on a young white girl living at Milliken, Saturday. It was announced the case would go to trial Friday.

Officials Of State Department Find New Worries In Diplomatic Liquor

Information Telling Of Several More Shipments Of Liquors Consigned For Washington Provides New Problem; Jurisdiction Is Questioned

(By Associated Press) WASHINGTON, Mar. 19.—Officials of the state department found new worries over the question of diplomatic liquors today after it became known that several more shipments consigned to foreign missions in Washington are either on the high seas or at foreign docks awaiting shipment to Baltimore.

Equally troubled over the shipments the legations to which they are consigned wondered just what they must do to get the liquor into Washington from the port of entry. The legations to get their liquors to the capital may have to resort to the one means now recognized as not falling within the prohibitions against transportation under the dry laws—that of loading it themselves in Baltimore, hauling it to Wash-

Bonuses For Oil Leases Totalled Over Four Million

Robison Opens Bid For Oil Lands In West Texas; To Announce Winners As Soon As Leases Tabulated

(By Associated Press) AUSTIN, Mar. 19.—Bonuses offered for mineral rights in University of Texas lands advertised for sale in January, but stopped by injunctions, amounted to more than \$4,000,000, it was revealed today when J. T. Robison, land commissioner, opened the bids.

The attorneys in the litigation brought by the regents of the university to stop sale of the leases entered into an agreement for the bids to be opened and checks closed by prospective purchasers returned. The lands were in 18 West Texas counties.

The first sale, advertised for January 2, was stopped by injunction obtained on January 1, and lands offered on further the month were taken from the market when the legislature repealed the land-leasing law.

The bids ranged from \$820,705 offered by Leland Fikes of Fort Worth for a 640 acre tract in Crane county to \$2.50 from a Santa Barbara, California, woman for 160 acres in Ward county. The land commissioner said he would return low bids, retaining high offers until the land leasing litigation has been settled.

Among the greatest amounts offered for mineral lands was \$711,168 offered by Fikes for a section in Crane county, and \$699,338 for the same amount of land in Ward county. The latter sum was offered by B. L. Ryan.

American Mining Man Is Kidnaped; Held For Ransom

(By Associated Press) MEXICO CITY, Mar. 19.—The American Embassy was informed of a kidnapping of an American mining man, J. M. Carnahan was kidnaped last night at La Noria mine, near the town of San Benito, Zacatecas.

At the same time the bandits carried off a Mexican mine official, Dr. Olivera, and presumably were holding both for ransom.

Information received by other mining companies here said that the La Noria mine had suspended operations, leaving 1,000 men without work, pending guarantees of safety of the other employees against outlaw raids.

Headquarters at El Paso. Carnahan was said to maintain headquarters at El Paso, Texas and has a brother, George Carnahan, of the Continental Rubber Company, in New York City.

The seizure of Carnahan makes two American prisoners of outlaw bands. On March 1, Henry Hanson, American resident manager of the San Nicholas Mining and Milling company at Voca, Durango, and J. W. Reid, an employee who is a British subject, were captured and have not yet been released. The United States made representations to the Mexican government in the case.

The week before this two American mining men, J. M. Underwood and C. C. Alesthorpe, were executed by their captors in Guanajuato while federal forces were attempting to force their release.

Man Charged In Officer's Death

HENRIETTA, Mar. 19. — (P) — Murder charges were filed today against Paul E. Strickland, 45, after the body of R. Lee Williams, 44, former nightwatchman at Bowie, had been found in a pasture a few miles from Henrietta.

Williams' feet were tied together and he apparently had been dragged about a mile behind an automobile after being shot in the abdomen.

ACCEPTS 99 YEARS Percy Garnett Gets Verdict Of Life Term In Case

SAN MARCOS, Mar. 19. (P)—Percy Garnett, convicted of the murder of Robert Calhoun, ranchman of the Mount Sharp community in July, 1928, today accepted the sentence of 99 years in the penitentiary which a jury in the Hays county district court returned against him Sunday. It was announced by his attorneys.

Lubbock Permits Soar Over Million Dollars For Year

Tuesday Sees \$128,700 In Permits Issued In City; Year's Total Stands At \$1,080,003

Records were again smashed Tuesday, when Lubbock's building permits were boosted, by \$128,700, to reach a new high mark for the month of March and to go beyond the million dollar figure for this year by more than \$80,000. The day's three permits puts March beyond that of last year, which was \$222,823, and of 1927, which was \$127,122, making a total to date of \$298,613 for the third month of 1929. The year's total is \$1,080,003.

In reaching beyond a million dollars, it beat last year's big record in point of time. In 1928 the million dollar figure was not reached until during the month of May.

Poultry Plant Features. Featuring Tuesday's permit was one of \$125,000, issued to the Lubbock Poultry and Egg company, for construction of their new plant and a creamery at Avenue K and Fourth street. Construction on this big plant started Tuesday. W. G. McMillan, being named as general contractor.

An annual capacity of 50 cars of turkeys, 300 cars of chickens, 150 cars of eggs with car capacity being 12,000 eggs, and 20 cars of hides. Two and a half million pounds of butter is to be the capacity of the creamery, a daily production of 1,800 gallons of buttermilk to be had.

The building is to be of two stories and will house the creamery, poultry dressing room, cold storage vaults, See BUILDING, Page 3

Governor Topete Of Sonora Declares He Won't Quit; To Fight To End

"Strong Man" Of Revolution Says There Will Be No Compromise In Sonora; He Is To Fight, Win Or Lose Until The Last; Hurls Defiance

BROWN Associated Press Staff Writer NOGALES, Sonora, March 19.—Fausto Topete, Sonora's "strong man," today hurled a defy at asserted peace making efforts of the Mexican federal government. The general governor of the state which gave birth to the revolutionary "plan of Hermosillo," scoffed at an announcement of the Mexican federal consul at Laredo, Texas, that General Marcelino Carveo, commander of rebel troops under General J. Gonzalo Escobar in Chihuahua, had sued for peace. "I do not believe it," he said "but at any rate in Sonora there will be no compromise. We will fight to the end. I am not the type of man to confer with anyone in hopes of ending a war for what I believe to be right. I will fight, to win or lose."

Topete glared and spat rapid Spanish. "I would execute him."

Red Cross Worker Rides To Warn Of Approaching Flood

Modern Paul Revere Spreads Alarm Through Georgia Of Rise Of Waters From Alabama Rivers

New Areas Flooded

River Junction, Florida, Is Under Water While Fort Gaines, Georgia, Has Highest Waters In History

(By Associated Press) ATLANTA, Ga., March 19.—A modern Paul Revere hurried through the Apalachicola valley in Florida today with warnings of the flood approaching from Georgia and Alabama, which has inundated towns and rich farming sections, made highways impassable and caused the death of more than a score of persons.

Edward H. Calvin, Red Cross worker drove an automobile from Bainbridge southward to beat the crest of the flood and urge inhabitants along the Apalachicola to seek safety on higher ground.

Business Section Flooded. Already River Junction, Fla., at the confluence of the Chattahoochee and Flint Rivers, had felt the force of the waters descending from its northern neighbors. Its business section and part of its residences were already under water and the river there was still rising. It stood at 34.3 feet this morning, a rise of 1.4 feet in the preceding 24 hours.

Fort Gaines, Ga., on the Chattahoochee, had the highest waters in its history. The river was 3 miles wide. The city pumping station was under water, as was the ice and cold storage plant and the Southern Cotton Oil company. School children were transported to and from their classes in boats and mail was brought into the town by boat from Central of Georgia station at Killeen, two miles away.

River Ten Miles Wide. The Alabama river was ten miles wide in places south of Selma, at See FLOOD, Page 3

Probe Of Attack Of Man Being Made

Rangers Investigating Unexplained Injury Of Claude E. Kelley, Welasco; Feeling Running High

(By Associated Press) WESLACO, Mar. 19.—Texas rangers tonight joined local authorities in investigating the attack early today on Claude E. Kelley, 31, prominent Welasco business man, who was beaten into unconsciousness as he slept at the home of his father-in-law, Ed C. Couch, Welasco banker.

Rangers J. W. Aldrich and Wright Townsend were sent here upon the request of City Marshall Galbreath. Feeling was running high and it was thought the state officers were summoned as a precaution against violence in the event the attackers were caught.

Kelley was reported in a semiconscious condition tonight at an Edinburg hospital. His skull was fractured and his left side paralyzed. Attenardo Rodriguez of the law firm of Kelley and Rodriguez, who had slight chance to recover.

Officers so far have been unable to find even the instrument with which Kelley was beaten. Robbery was not the motive, as the house was in order and nothing was taken.

Slaton's Charter Is Changed; Work Of B. C. D. Added

Election Carries By Overwhelming Majority Tuesday; Officials To Be Voted On April 2

(Special To The Avalanche) SLATON, Mar. 19.—By a majority of 225 votes, Slaton's form of city government was changed today to the home rule plan with a mayor and four commissioners and a Board of City Development, supported by a two mill tax, added to the civic organizations of the city. The vote, about one-fourth of the city's voting strength, was 242 for and 17 against.

In the new plan of government, Mayor W. G. Reese's regime will terminate on April 2 and another election held. The charter is to be filed with the secretary of state prior to the election.

The board of city development, authorized by the new charter, calls for a membership of fifteen men to work in conjunction with the chamber of commerce in promoting the welfare of Slaton.

The selection of the members will be made soon after the election next month.

Amarillo Refuses House To Norris

AMARILLO, Mar. 19.—(P)—The Amarillo city commission tonight voted to refuse the Rev. J. Frank Norris, of Fort Worth use of the Municipal auditorium for an address March 22. On "Rome's Challenge to America." Inasmuch as Catholics helped erect and maintain the city's properties the proposed address would be out of line, the commission agreed.

THE largest haul to have been made this year was obtained yesterday afternoon by county and city officers, when they raided a farm, about eight and one-half miles southeast of Lubbock, near the New Hope community, and caught a white man in the act of

"BOOKS" CONFISCATED. "Books" kept by the operator of one of the establishments raided by the officers yesterday, were confiscated and lists of customers, with amounts of whiskey purchased and amount of money due, are in the hands of the county officials.

Testing whiskey at a fifty-gallon still, which was in operation. Later in the afternoon, five other arrests for liquor law violations were made in this city, two of which were negro porters at a downtown hotel. More than 700 gallons of mash, contained in 15 barrels, eight of them 30-gallon and seven 50-gallon capacity, and other receptacles, about 15 gallons of whiskey, a complete still, with several containers, were confiscated or destroyed by the officers.

The white man arrested at the still, gave officers the name of Luther Bradley. Officers making the raid included Deputy Sheriffs O. B. Conley and Will Earnest, City Officers C. E. Luce and George Eubank, and State Highway Inspector John C. Keller.

As the officers approached Bradley, at work testing the liquor, the still being located in a deep dug-

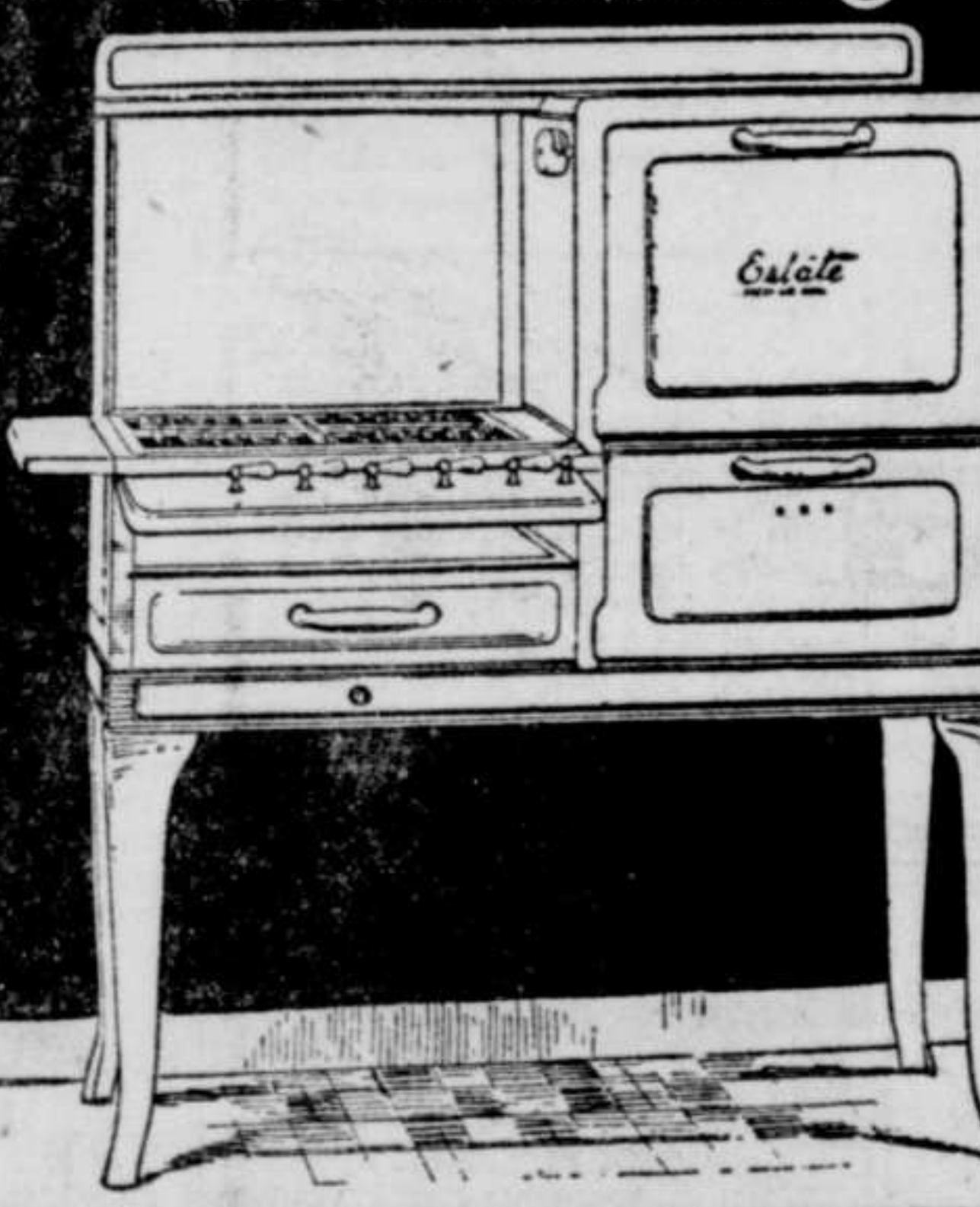

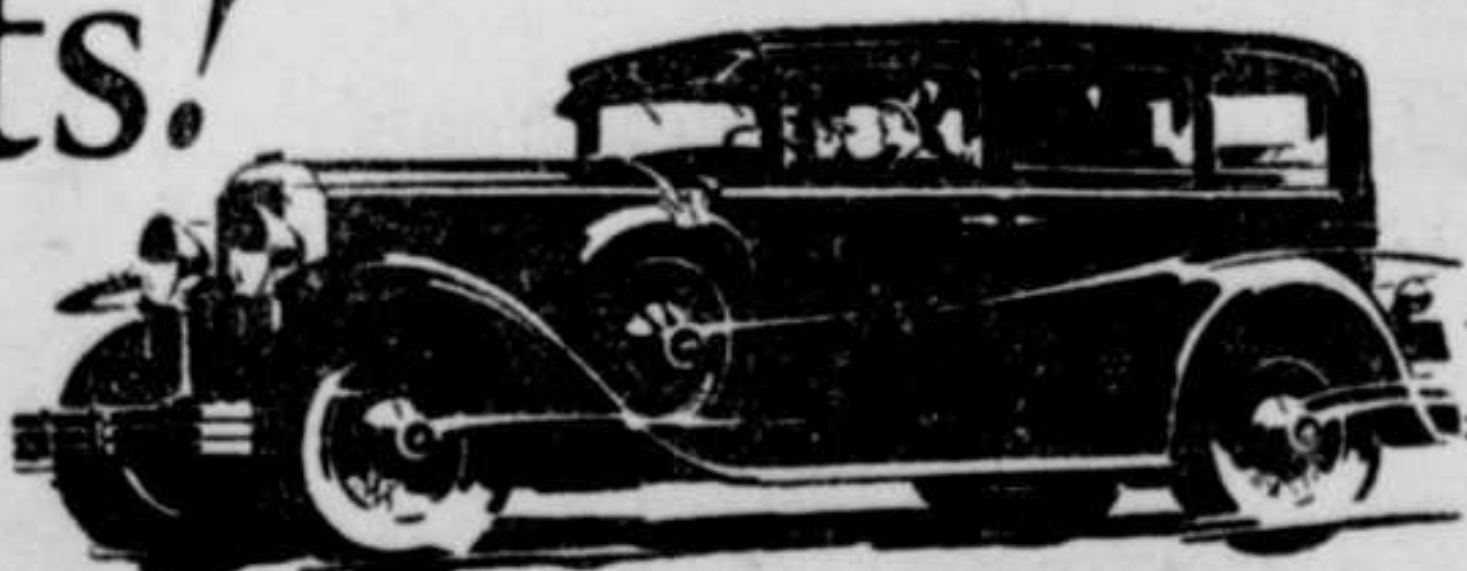

CARE OF LITTLE JOE
Five-year-old Joseph Logan of Tavistock, N. J., a town with a voting population of 19, is the only child of school age in the town. Since it seemed unnecessary expense to build and support a school just for Joseph, the town voted a \$150 appropriation for his tuition in a nearby town.

In the frock at the left of the sketch, tiny triangles create an animated and youthful design. In a two-piece belted model of green on a creamy ground, the attractive handling of the pleated skirt, and the double breasted closing of the blouse jacket, introduce new and timely features for both sports and town wear.

In the center sketch is shown a practical ensemble of good looks in the typical American manner. The design of the print replaces the more obvious checks of recent seasons in a particularly effective handling of design and color, in softly blended red and black on a beige ground. It can be worn with either black or beige kid shoes, and sunburn hose.

The model at the extreme right shows the handling of the bordered fabric in a simple straightline coat frock. The border is in an irregular red design on a rose beige ground, and is so manipulated that none of it is wasted. It borders the frock and forms the lower part of the sleeves, with the overplus cuttings used for a tie. The colors in the frock tone are best with pinkish beige kid shoes and sunburn hose. A red turban and red leather belt give added touches of color.

YOUR CHILDREN

Under all the new teaching of greater liberty for children we must not lose sight of one great truth. We are creatures of habit.

The parent of 25 now may not see it. It is the man or woman of 40 who is able to get a perspective on his own life and who will soberly tell you that he is what he was taught to be as a little child.

The habits trained into him then have stuck.

I should make certain things very rigid in a little child's program. First of all he should learn what the little clock on his table means. It means business, does that little clock! When his hands point to 7:30—he must learn to get up then. Not five or ten minutes later. That little habit of hitting the floor on the dot is going to be the keynote of a hundred good character traits later on.

So many parents don't realize the importance of it until the bad habit of sleeping-in is formed. It is not only the fast that getting up early starts the day right for everybody; that is true, but isn't all the truth. The other thing is that it takes morale to hop out of bed at a given time—morale and courage. It is the best starch I know of for that poor filmy thing we mis-name our "will."

And—"Early to Bed"

The twin of this little habit, of course, is going to bed right on time. One is as necessary as the other.

Another habit is work. We seldom grow into liking it when we are older if we don't learn to accept it and like it when we are very young.

No matter how much money we have, or haven't, we should teach the children to work. Far be it from me to see them imposed upon, as children too often are. That is the thing I am trying to warn parents against every day, and so it is with trepidation that I touch on the subject.

But the fact remains that there is a big job ahead for all of our children. The world must be run when we are dead and gone, and the push-button age has not yet arrived. And I hope it never will. The child brought up with-out the habit of work of one kind or another cannot possibly amount to much.

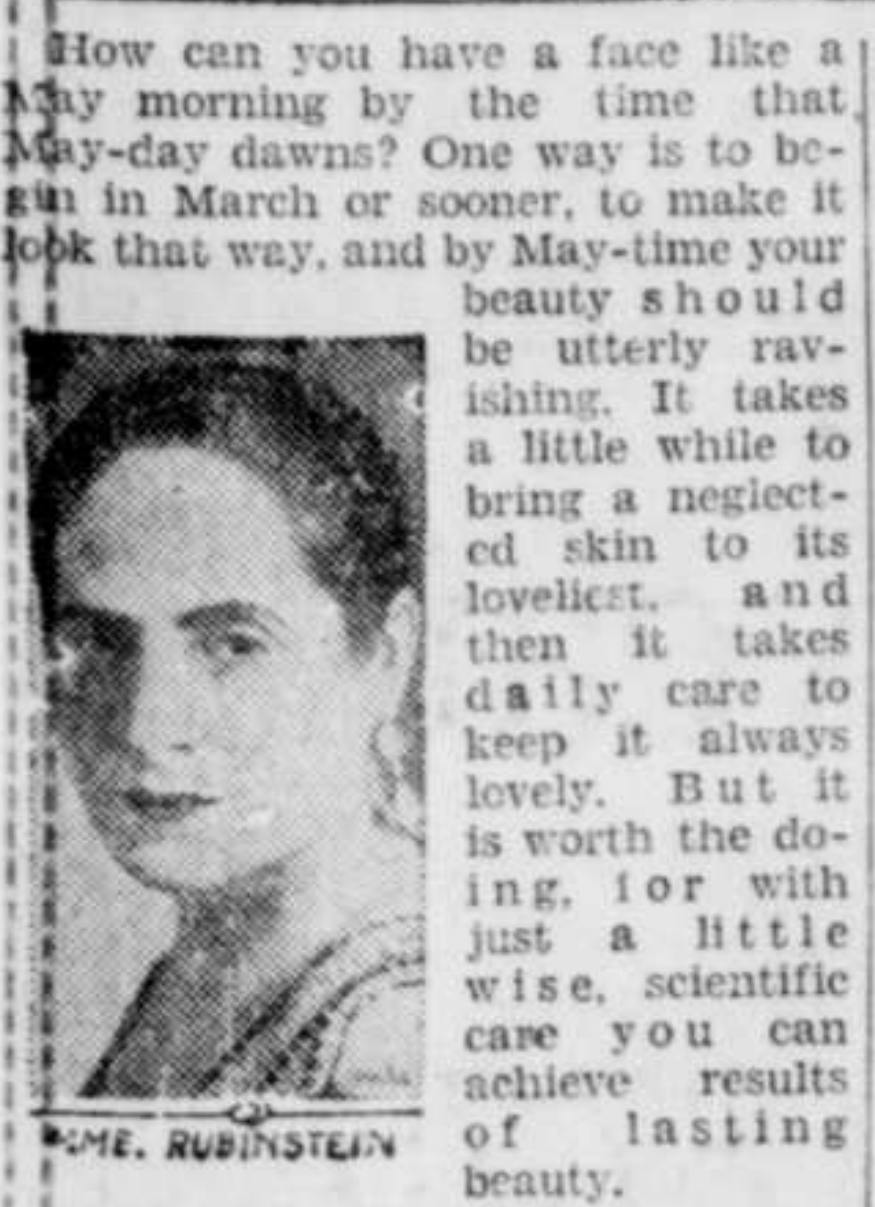

How to Achieve Beauty

How can you have a face like a May morning by the time that May-day dawns? One way is to begin in March or sooner, to make it look that way, and by May-time your beauty should be utterly ravishing. It takes a little while to bring a neglected skin to its loveliest, and then it takes daily care to keep it always lovely. But it is worth the doing, for with just a little wise, scientific care you can achieve results of lasting beauty.

When you look at the stock of your young assets and liabilities—there were some liabilities, were there not?—you found that your skin was a little yellow, perhaps a little faded and dry, with tiny lines appearing in it, especially around the eyes and mouth. And it may be that you discovered the beginnings, or the endings, of a double chin, and some redness on your throat and a general sagging among your facial contours. If you did not find these tell-tale signals of neglect—splendid! You have so much less work to undo. But if you did discover them, do not despair, for you can correct them with the proper creams and treatments.

First in importance comes the cleanser. A penetrative, pasteurized cream for the normal or oily skin, an oilier cream for the dry. Cleanse at night and morning with this cream and as often as necessary in between and if you have blemishes or black-

heads—ugly words, these, but necessary, often—use a penetrative washing preparation, made of almond meal and other effective cleansers, better than soap at any time, but especially good at this season when you need a thorough cleanser.

If your skin is young and normal you will want, besides your cleansers, a clearing, beautifying skin food, and a tonic, finishing lotion. These three preparations used night and morning will give you a splendid beauty treatment.

But if your skin is sluggish, dry or oily, believe your age, and if you have a suggestion of lines or sagging contours, you need stronger treatment. A liquid stimulant, one of those that sting like liquid fire—you get to enjoy the sensation after a second using—will restore youthful circulation in almost no time at all. And you will want, too, a bleaching cream, not to use immediately after the stimulant, but to sleep in at night.

In addition to these the more mature woman should have a contour jelly or an even stronger balsam lactee to put into her chin and throat and wherever her facial contours show a tendency toward drooping. As well as a nourishing or bleaching cream for her massage.

Every woman needs a nourishing cream to put in around her eyes, and warm herbal packs and warm extract to use as compresses when her eyes are tired. These, with an astringent lotion to refine and close the pores and a proper cream powder for a complete preparation which she should have to rejuvenate her skin for spring.

Does it seem difficult? Then remember this simple formula. Cleanse, stimulate, tone. Accent the stimulate and add the other functions of clearing, tightening, nourishing as you need.

Cheese Good Food

Cheese is often chosen as a meat substitute and is served with the proper combination of foods offers an excellent and comparatively cheap source of protein.

The hard American cheese made from whole milk contains most of the protein and fat and a large part of the line of the milk from which it was made. It's really a concentrated form of milk and has great food value. This type of cheese adds the vitamin necessary for growth to one's diet.

In planning menus in which cheese is to play a part as a meat substitute, keep in mind the necessity of serving plenty of vegetables, both raw and cooked, and a simple dessert. Apple or any fruit topped with a pudding served with "liquid" sauce in place of cream offers a suggestion for a dessert.

When cheese is to be cooked, care must be taken that it is not overcooked. Over-cooking of cheese makes it tough and splits the fat, making it difficult to digest. Cheese is sufficiently cooked when it is just melted. An excellent way to use cheese is in a cream sauce but it must not be added to the sauce until the sauce is thoroughly cooked. Then the cheese is melted before serving.

CHEESE FONDUE OR SOUFFLE

One and 1-2 cups bread crumbs, 2-3 cup milk, 1-2 cup grated cheese, 4 tablespoons butter, 1-2 teaspoon salt, 1-2 teaspoon pepper, yolk 2 eggs, whites 3 eggs.

Use crumbs from soft part of loaf. Cook crumbs and milk until hot and smooth, stirring constantly. Add butter, salt and pepper and cheese and cook until cheese is melted. Remove at once from heat and add yolks of eggs beaten until thick and lemon colored. Fold in whites of eggs beaten until stiff and dry. Turn into a buttered baking dish and bake 25 minutes in a moderate oven. When firm to the touch the fondue is done. Serve at once. The temperature of the oven should be 350 degrees F.

The recipe will serve four persons.

The following menu will suggest other combinations.

Brown rice croquettes with cheese sauce, buttered string beans, lettuce and tomato salad, baked apple dumplings with lemon sauce, milk, coffee.

The Italian way of serving gratin cheese with soup has much in its favor. Potato, tomato and spinach cream soups gain much nourishment if grated hard cheese is added.

When served or passed at the table. The combination of flavors, cheese and these particular vegetables, is good. Cheese must not be added to a soup during cooking.

There are many varieties of cheese, both domestic and imported, and for classification purposes they are conveniently divided into three groups—hard, semi-hard and soft.

All varieties of cheese should be kept in a cool place, the hard and semi-hard varieties wrapped in paraffin paper to prevent drying. Cottage cheese is high in nutritive value but low in vitamins and fat since it is made of soured skimmed milk. Freshly soured milk is desirable for making cottage cheese since too many bacteria will develop a bitter taste.

Cottage as well as the other soft cream cheeses are excellent in salads or with fresh fruits. Carefully stewed dried fruits combine well with cream cheese for a salad or dessert. Crisp, toasted crackers should accompany either.

NEW YORK, Mar. 19. (P)—The east already has fair warning of another powerful invasion of far western talent in quest of college laurels.

It's close to an all-year-around menace now. No one has forgotten how Stanford and Oregon Aggies mopped up on the gridirons of New York last fall, after Stanford and California had taken eastern rivals for a ride in the big rowing and track classics of the year.

The echoes of performances already under way on the Pacific Coast forecast the establishment of Stanford as the favorite again to ramp off with the intercollegiate A. A. A. championships at Philadelphia in May. At the same time, California's world championship crew has started preparations for the defense of the intercollegiate title at Poughkeepsie in June. The Bears will be favorites there, especially if they overcome Washington on the coast next month.

Stanford and California have most of their 1928 power on hand to start with, plus the advantage of early opportunities for training while most of their eastern rivals are still indoors or just beginning to break through the ice outdoors.

In National League circles, the Phillies and Yankees have become what synonyms in recent years. The Phils have occupied the cellar position six times in the last nine seasons. They haven't been in the first division since 1917 and they won't land there this season unless a miracle is performed, but the situation at least has taken a turn for the better.

Critics who have scanned the hopefuls in the regard the Phils as one of the most improved clubs in the league with an infield that may be rated with the best when the actual returns are tabulated. With Hirst, Thompson and Whitely ball bearing the stamps of youthful stars at first, second and third bases, the Phils appear to have struck gold in picking up Tommy Thevenow for the shortstop job.

Marionettes Are Entertaining To Lubbock People

The same amusement that delighted the Egyptians thousands of years ago yesterday thrilled hundreds of Lubbock school children and grown-ups at the matinee showing of Tony Sarg's Marionettes at the Tech college gymnasium.

The earliest known form of these miniature acting dolls has been uncovered among other priceless relics in ancient Egyptian tombs. In one form or another, the puppet dolls have figured a form of entertainment throughout various stages of history.

Critics record that the puppet show played an important part in the early development of the European drama. For a number of years the puppet shows enjoyed a sweep of approval throughout Europe. They were virtually unknown in America, the nearest substitute being the "Punch and Judy" acts seen in circuses.

Sarg Brings Them Here
It remains for Tony Sarg, celebrated comic artist, to bring the acting puppets to America and adopt them for American entertainment.

In the origination of the "Marionette" puppet, Sarg produced dolls of unusual complications and uncanny actions. The Marionettes which were shown here each contained from nine to thirty controls and were operated from above by a corps of show attaches. The puppets were made to walk, make gestures, eat, drink, dance, and act so humanly that it was sometimes for the audience to realize that it was not viewing living actors from a distance.

Mr. Sarg did not accompany the company to Lubbock. This show was not a regular number of the Tech College course but was secured here by mere coincidence. College authorities did not sign for the show due to its unusually high cost, but the company later discovered that it had an open date while in this section and agreed to show here for a price which was accepted by the college.

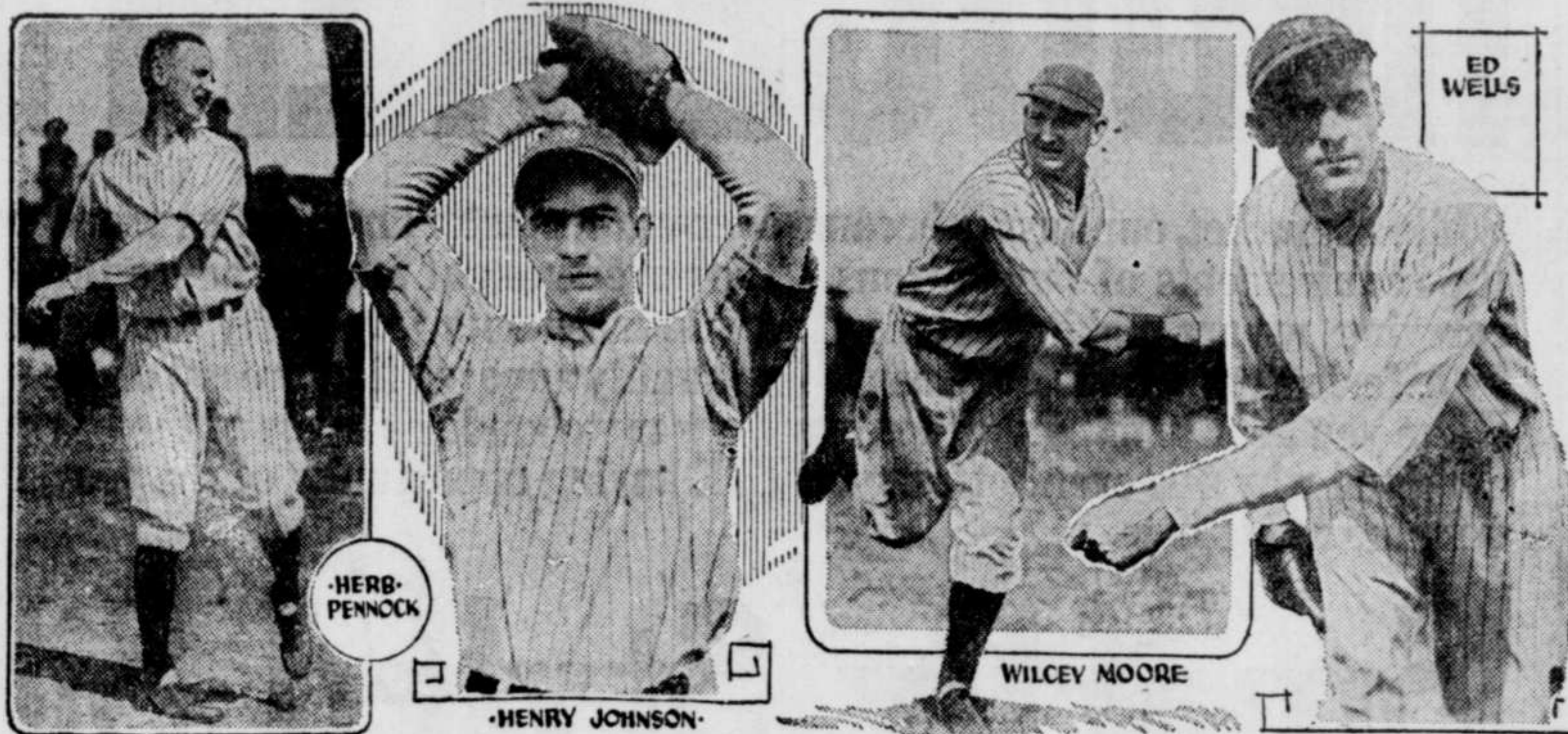

Marrs Addresses Tech Students In Program At Gym

In addressing the first convocation of the spring term of Texas Technological college, held in the college gymnasium yesterday morning, S. M. N. Marrs, of Austin, state superintendent of public instruction, declared that the principal purpose of education is to produce first class American citizens. All other results are incidental, he added.

Dr. Paul W. Horn, president of the Tech, announced before Mr. Marrs' speech that the year's enrollment was 2,061, only a little less than double the enrollment at the college its first year, and predicted that the first year's enrollment would be more than doubled by the end of this week. M. H. Duncan, superintendent of the Lubbock public schools, and Miss Mae Murfee, county school superintendent, were also introduced to the student body and visitors present at the convocation.

Schools Important.
"Our system of public school education is the most important institution giving support to American democracy," Marrs said. "Tech is only one unit of this vast 'citizen factory' and all of West Texas is contributing its part in advancing the cause of education."

The speaker was a member of the locating committee that selected Lubbock as the place for the Texas Technological college. He explained in his address that, although the state of Texas was thirty-seventh among the states of the Union, in educational standing, it is the leader among all the Southern states. The low rating of this state, he stated, is due to the survey of all children, from five to 17 years of age, while in Texas the school age requirements have been seven, excluding many children below seven who were counted in the survey by the government.

"Because the South is an agricultural section, attendance is cut down. Because the compulsory attendance law is not enforced as it should be, also cuts down attendance records. Especially is this lax enforcement prevalent among the under-privileged class of negroes and Mexicans. School districts are not dealing fairly with these classes."

Tuition Payment Flayed.
"In a democracy there should never be a case where a patron of the public school system should have to pay tuition, regardless of conditions. The legislature has

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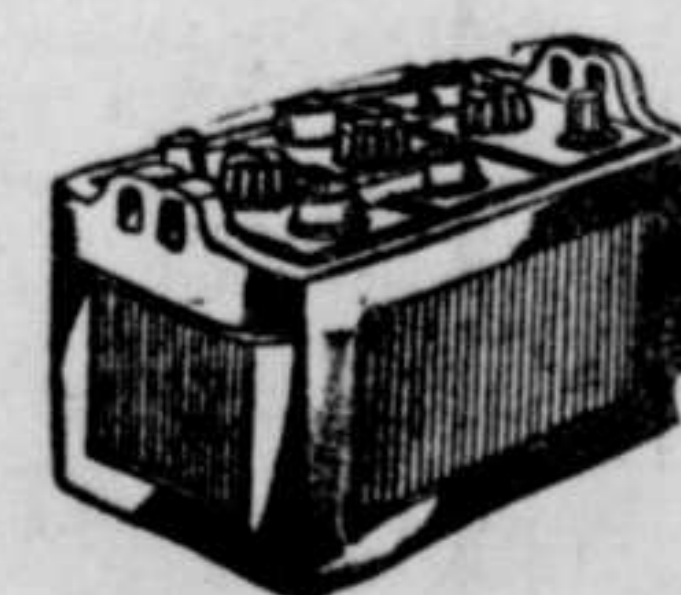
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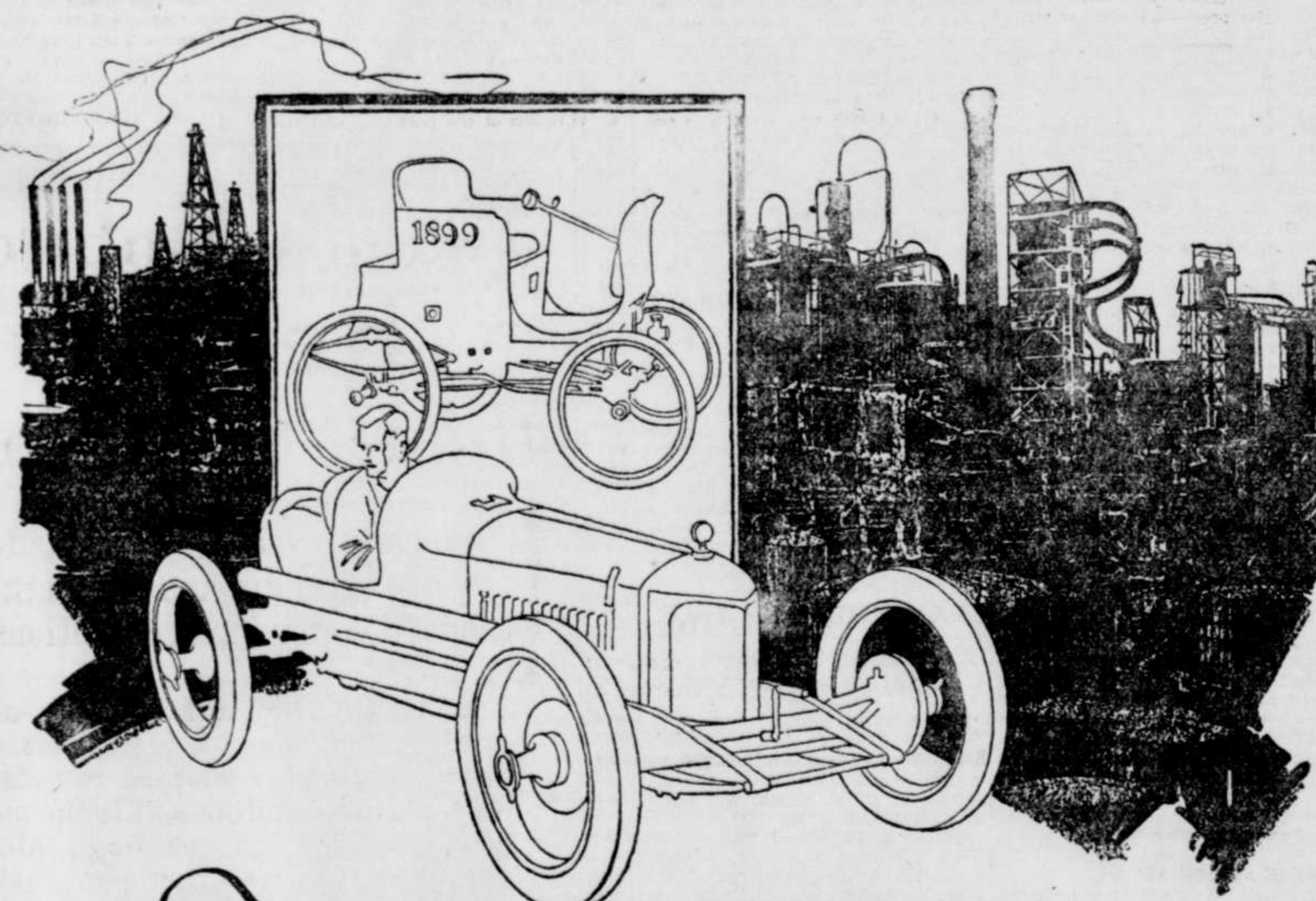

"THOU SHALT NOT STEAL"

Cotton Sells Up But Breaks Later On N.Y. Exchange

NEW YORK, Mar. 19. (P)—Early advances on relatively firm Liverpool cables were followed by rather nervous and irregular fluctuations in cotton today. After selling up to 20.97, May broke to 20.77 under renewed realizing or liquidation, but recovered part of the loss, closing at 20.82. The general market closed steady, net 9 points higher to 1 point lower. Near months were relatively firm.

The opening was steady at an advance of 4 to 12 points on the firm showing of Liverpool. There May also have been some buying on expectations of bullish features in the weekly report of the weather bureau tomorrow. The opening advance met sufficient cotton to cause some irregularity, but the market soon steadied. March advanced to 21.01 and the new October contract to 20.31 during the middle of the day on covering and buying, which was supposed to come from the trade and local or Well Street sources.

The advance was attributed partly to a feeling that comparatively full ginning figures from the census bureau tomorrow probably had been discounted.

The advance met renewed liquidation in the later trading and for a time offerings were heavy. March declined to 20.85, or within 5 points of yesterday's closing quotation, while the new October sold off to 20.12. The market then steadied on covering. There also appeared to be some New Orleans and trade buying in the late trading. Closing prices showed rallies of 4 to 5 points from the lowest on old crop positions, but the new crop closed at about the lowest, and within a point either way of yesterday's final quotations.

Texas Livestock Receipts Small

FORT WORTH, Mar. 19. (P)—(U. S. D. A.)—Very small receipts of cattle and calves posted for today's trade here. The day's cattle supply consisted almost entirely of slaughter yearlings and mixed butcher classes. Slaughter steers were lacking.

Several divisions of the cattle market presented a nominal appearance but enough business was transacted in slaughter yearlings to outline fully steady values. An active demand existed for little cattle of the better grades and supplies made a good early clearance. One load of choice fat yearlings averaging around 600 pounds made a top of 13.25 and other carlot sales slaughter yearlings reported at 12.00 to 12.80. The yearlings that sold at 12.10, were light weights on the heavy calf order. She stock and other classes cattle listed at steady rates, although the market very poorly tested. A few good fat cows reported up to 6.50 and all-butter cows sold in the 4.00 range. Low-cutters sold around 5.25 to 5.50. Bulls and stock cattle too scarce to permit test of values.

Slaughter calves drew a good demand and sold at firm prices. Some package lots of good to choice heavies up to 11.50 and weighty averages in the plainer grades around 9.50 to 10.50; cull sorts on down to 8.00 and less.

Hogs made a good early clearance at prices five to fifteen cents lower. Best rail butchers topped at 10.85, bulk of medium to good 1801240 pound rail hogs at 10.60 to 10.85. Truck hogs up to 10.40; bulk desirable 175-250 pound truck hogs at 10.00 to 10.25. Packing sows and feeder pigs remained steady, packing

sows mostly at 8.50 to 9.50. Good butcher pigs up to 8.75, or unevenly higher.

Hoover Is Moving With Caution Is Choosing Officers

Personnel Of Enforcement Commission Being Selected With Care; Members Not Decided Upon

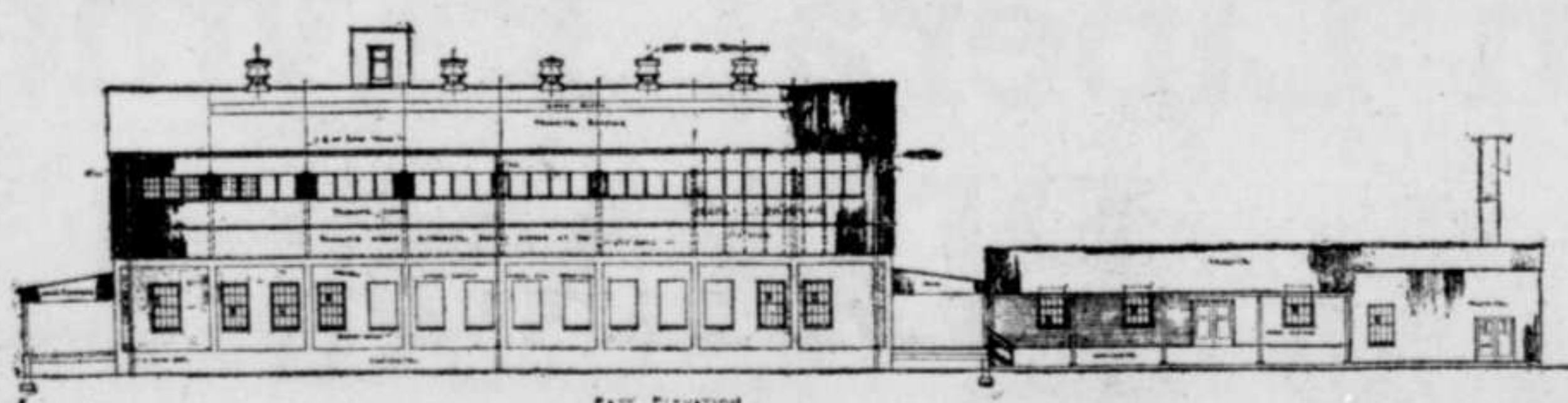

WASHINGTON, Mar. 19.—President Hoover is moving with caution in picking those who are to compose his law enforcement commission, and the best information available is he has not yet definitely decided on a single member.

Scores of names have been presented for his consideration, but many of these already have been eliminated for one reason or another, and he now is described as literally scouring the country in the effort to find suitable men who will be willing to undertake so gigantic a task.

Carefully Scrutinized
The personnel of this commission probably will be more carefully scrutinized by the country than any that has been named in many years because of the fact that an investigation of the enforcement of the prohibition amendment is to be included in its work.

This phase of the whole inquiry will be the one to attract the greatest public attention and probably will require more exhaustive study than any other. Leaders of the organized wets and dries as well as many others will be heard and the testimony of many present and former prohibition enforcement officers will be taken.

There are to be increased efforts at enforcement of the Volstead and other dry acts. Enforcement officials appointed or retained by Mr. Hoover are regarded as friendly to the prohibition cause, and it is expected they will be given a free hand in the effort to dry up the country.

May Be Transferred
President Hoover has not yet announced precisely what enforcement activities now carried forward by the treasury will be transferred to the justice department, nor is it clear whether he holds such transfer can be made without an act of congress.

Mrs. Mabel Walker Willsbrandt is in charge of prohibition enforcement in the justice department, and it is understood that when the transfer is made the scope of her duties as assistant attorney general will be considerably enlarged.

Because of the very nature of the work it will have to do, the president's law enforcement commission is expected to be composed largely

of not entirely of lawyers. Mr. Hoover wants to select outstanding men who have had broad experience in studying the general subject of enforcement.

Social Welfare Workers Meeting

One Hundred And Fifty Are Present At Convention In Fort Worth; Problems Are Studied By Group

FORT WORTH, Mar. 19.—Six sessions held today by the Texas Conference of Social Welfare workers, and discussions ranged from the early training of children to prevent juvenile delinquency to the correction of young men and women who have entered into a life of im-

moral or illegal conduct. The sessions also dealt with the improvement of health and social conditions of communities and migration and immigration problems.

Many persons are confused over the proper meaning of social welfare work, Dr. Max S. Handman, faculty member of the University of Texas, told one of the group meetings. He said that people too often believe social welfare work to be merely the reforming of criminals or the providing of assistance to subjects of charity.

"Social welfare does not merely mean the picking up of persons who have gone wrong and have violated the rules of society," he said. "It means more than that. Through the proper administration of a social welfare program persons can be taught the proper way to enjoy life, education, sociability, and beauty."

Governor Is Not Peeved At Solons Defeating Bills

Moody To Submit Anew Some Of Legislative Program In Special Session; Has Hopes Of Better Work

AUSTIN, Mar. 19.—Governor Dan Moody is not peeved at the legislature which just adjourned. When it reassembles under his call within a few weeks he will submit anew to it some of the legislation he recommended at the start of the regular session, but which the lawmakers failed to enact.

While some governors would probably be inclined to mount a "high horse" and say things about a legislature which turned its back so readily upon a chief executive's program as did the 41st, the present occupant of the office is inclined to forgive. He refuses to only forget.

Kids About Defeat
In the closing hours of the long session, the governor did a little "kidding," but it was good natured. Commenting upon the fate of the things he so much hoped would meet with approval at the hands of the legislature, he told the membership he had in a way evened the score, when he vetoed a number of "local" bills raising salaries of tax collectors, assessors, sheriffs, constables, county judges and other officials.

"I am sorry that I could not have been here on the floor when those veto messages were read to see the reaction reflected in the faces of those who had hoped to get them over," he said.

But, revenge for the treatment given his measures is not a wish of the governor. He firmly believes that it is an evenly-balanced, smart and safe legislature. He said so, after the evacuation.

To Have Definite Purpose
He believes the membership, having had time to reflect during the regular session, and having heard from the folks at home, will return with a more definite purpose and its mind more nearly made up as to what it wants to do about serious problems facing the state and which it failed to solve on first trial.

The governor realizes that the membership of both houses this time was made up of almost half and half old and new lawmakers. It was reported in the capital that more than half of those who remained until the last were new members who had confessed that their only reason for staying on the job through sine die adjournment was one of curiosity—just to see how a legislature came to a stopping point.

Governor Moody believes the large number of new members had much to do with the defeat of some proposals he desired to succeed. He is of the opinion they will return to the special session more or less "seasoned" and prepared to look with a new slant on some of the measures they opposed before.

CLUBS ARE ORGANIZED

Interest Is Shown In Club Work In Howard County

BIG SPRING, Mar. 19.—Six girls and women clubs have been organized in the county by the home demonstration agent since February 1. Each girl has a selection of gardening or poultry. They will also be instructed in foods and clothing in the different clubs, according to Mrs. Allgood. Seventy-five girls have been enrolled in the different clubs. Three of the girls enrolled in the 4-H clubs were awarded 50 baby chicks each at the Farmers Short Course recently held in Big Spring. Four additional women clubs will be organized during the next week and all day meetings will be held at Vincent, Luther, Lemah, Highway, and Center Point. Poultry and gardening will be the principal projects of the women clubs.

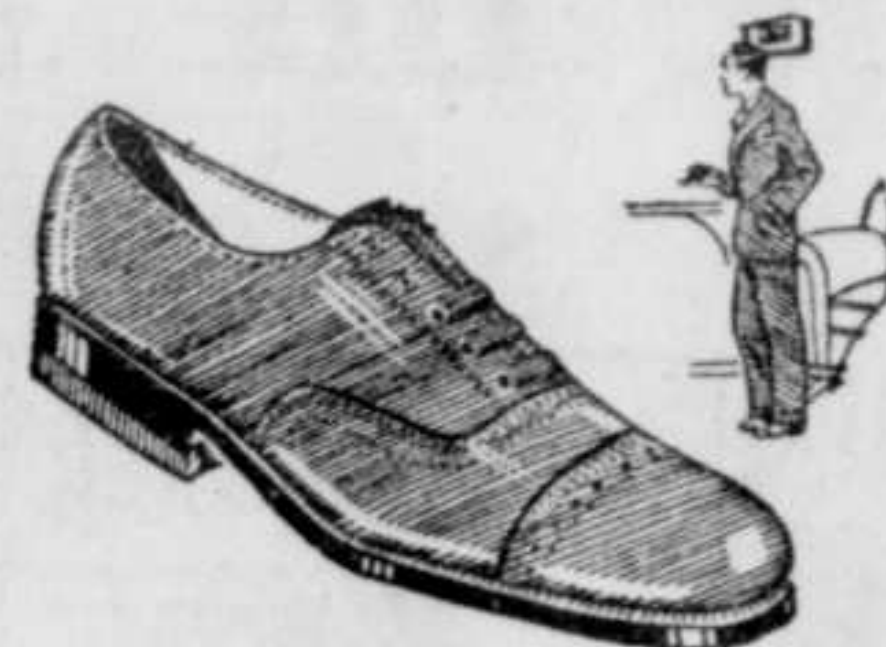
