First National Bank of Portales Announce New Unusual Service

The first National Bank of Portales has been issued its certificate of membership in the temporary Federal deposit insurance fund through which deposits up to \$2,500 are insured by the government. The local bank has complied with the requirements of the Federal Government in this new banking phase.

Official notice was received by the local bank the first, authorizing them to proceed under the provisions of the Banking Act of 1933.

Walter J. Cummings, chairman of the Federal Insurance Fund corporation, under which the insurance system is set up, termed the insurance of deposits "the most constructive plan ever devised for the protection of bank deposits."

This act will have a tendency to return monies to the banking channels which has been going into the postal savings deposits, returning this money to the channels of trade.

This will give the depositors assurance of the safety of their funds and enable the banks to enlarge their usefulness to their respective communities.

The First National Bank of Portales has long been considered one of the strongest financial institutions of the state, and they have weathered the banking crisis of past years with safety to depositors and credit to the directors.

C. M. Compton Jr. Appointed as Assistant D.A.

C. M. Compton, Jr., has been appointed assistant district attorney, vacated by E. M. Grantham who resigned that office to become law partner of Senator Hatch.

C. M. Compton served eight years as district attorney of this district and during that time made a splendid record.

With C. M. Compton Jr., as assistant to District Attorney J. C. Compton, the affairs of the district are in safe hands, as both of these figures stand high in the legal profession of the state, and with a good record in the district attorney's office of this district.

NORTH CENTRAL ASSOCIATION COMMENDS LOCAL SCHOOLS

The following letter from the North Central Association of Colleges and Secondary schools should be of great interest to all of the patrons of the Portales schools.

Mr. Floyd D. Golden, Superintendent of Schools, Portales, New Mexico, Dear Mr. Golden:

It is a source of wonder to me that you can continue to operate such a good school under the severe financial handicap which you have.

What a school has been well organized, has a good staff, and is operating smoothly. Its momentum will carry it along for some time under very adverse circumstances. Such circumstances will, however, slow it down eventually. Your community should realize this fact and should at-

tempt to make more adequate provisions before such injurious results become serious. It is entirely unreasonable, for example, for your well equipped high school teachers to receive a salary of \$800 a year. Skilled labor is receiving better pay than this under some of the government projects which are now in operation. Under one of these projects skilled labor receives a dollar per hour, or \$30 per week, a basic pay of \$1560 per year, practically twice as much as your poorly paid teachers. I do not believe that the association will overlook this condition this year. I sincerely hope that your community will be able to make a better showing next year.

Livestock Association Meet Jan. 10, Albuquerque

The convention of the American National Livestock association will meet in Albuquerque, January 10, 11 and 12 and will probably have record attendance.

More than 1,500 cattlemen from all parts of the west are expected to attend this meeting and the conventions of the New Mexico Wool Growers' association and the New Mexico Cattle Growers' association.

These two state associations will meet jointly January 10 to petition for the formation of a Federal Production Credit agency for the state with \$1,000,000 capital. Floyd Lee, president of the Wool Growers' association, declared that formation of the credit agency, which will handle all federal livestock loans in the state, depended upon the presentation of the petition to the farm credit administration, a representative of which will outline functions of the new agency at the convention.

Livestock men are being urged to attend the national convention, iron out conflicting claims and present a united front in demanding a recovery program for the cattle industry which is facing a great crisis, due to over-production and poor market prices.

A plan recommending the prohibition of all imports of canned meats in the United States for a period of two years and that the Federal Government purchase \$75,000,000 worth of beef for distribution among the needy, recently endorsed by the New Mexico and Texas Panhandle associations' executive committees, will probably be among the major resolutions to come before the convention.

The annual membership drive for the national association will be climaxed at the coming meeting. To date, more members have paid their annual dues and more applications for membership have been received than had been received at the same time in 1929.

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New Mexico Farmers Back Cotton Plan

New Mexico cotton growers are strongly backing the 1934 cotton acreage adjustment plan, says L. H. Hauter of the New Mexico State college, who, with W. L. Elser, director of extension, has been conducting a series of preliminary meetings in the cotton producing counties of the state to explain the general cotton situation and the 1934 plan adopted by the government.

Almost without exception, after becoming thoroughly familiar with the present situation and the 1934 plan, farmers have expressed themselves in favor of the plan and have indicated that they would sign acreage reduction contracts when they are presented.

Those who are afraid that a reduction in the cotton acreage would materially stimulate the production of alfalfa and other feed crops and thus demoralize the alfalfa hay market were assured that the land that is taken out of production is rented to the Secretary of Agriculture so that it can not be used to produce crops that will either directly or indirectly be used to compete with other crops harvested for sale. The object of the Agricultural Adjustment Administration is to take land out of production and not simply to change from one kind of production to another.
