WASHINGTON, Sept. 9.—The condition of Mrs. Warren G. Harding was still a source of much anxiety on the part of those at her bedside late today. Altho is was officially stated that the complications noted yesterday were less threatening, those watching over her are free to say that her condition is yet the cause for much apprehension.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 9.—Mrs. Warren G. Harding, who is ill at the White House, and who was reported to be in a serious condition yesterday, passed a fairly good night and her condition is as favorable as can be expected today, according to White House physicians.

Girl Leaps from Window of Fast Passenger Train

TEMPLE, Sept. 9.—The young woman who leaped from the window of the West bound passenger train near Goldthwaite about 8 o'clock last night was brought here on Train No. 92 arriving about midnight, and placed in a hospital. She is suffering from a fractured skull and other serious injuries.

According to the railroad employees and passengers who were on the train the young lady attempted to destroy everything that might disclose her identity before she leaped from the train, but an envelope was found which she had thrown away. The envelope was addressed to R. B. Evans, Box 49, Route 4, Belton, and was sent from Atlanta, Ga. Inside the envelope was the name Mrs. Mary Evans, and a man has been sent to the address at Belton to see if the party can be located.

The woman boarded the train at Belton, and was said to have been en route to Lubbock. She is described as being about twenty years old, low, and of medium weight, with light bobbed hair. She was still alive today but is said to be unconscious and in a serious condition.

Hunting Season Opens



(By Associated Press)

CHICAGO, Sept. 9.—An air of secrecy cloaked the conferences of the union chiefs and railroad executives here today as the crucial hours of Monday draw nearer. On Monday Federal Judge Wilkinson is due to hear Attorney General Daugherty's application to make the government's strike injunction permanent.

The policy committee of the six striking shop crafts is also scheduled to meet Monday.

The strike entered the eleventh week today with conditions generally quiet throughout the country, and both sides apparently awaiting the outcome of the conferences and injunction proceedings scheduled for Monday.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 9.—A temporary injunction restraining Federal Marshal Snyder from interfering with a meeting of the International Brotherhood of Electrical Workers, one of the striking shops crafts, and from doing anything to prevent the strike activities "in excess of the Chicago restraining order," was issued today by Justice Bailey of the Supreme Court of the District of Columbia.

CHICAGO, Sept. 9.—A motion to vacate the government's restraining order against the strikers, so far as it applies to B. M. Jewell, head of the railway employees' department of the American Federation of Labor, and John Scott, secretary, was filed in the federal district court here today.

Such action was begun by Attorney Donald Rieberg on behalf of the railway employees' department and is based upon three general allegations: "that the government failed to make out a case against the strike; that the relief asked for and obtained on temporary order is prohibited by the Clayton act, and that the relief sought was obtained with ulterior objects and under misrepresentations."

DENISON, Sept. 9.—Rumors that Gov. Pat M. Neff is to soon visit Denison and review the strike situation with the military and civil authorities, has been current here for several days. It has been known here for some time that a suspension of the civil court and the substitution of a military court was under contemplation.

A statement from Austin to the effect that Gov. Neff was considering steps for the removal of certain local officers was the first report of that nature to reach here as a result of a meeting of the Chamber of Commerce executives and military authorities, in which Col. Charles Nimmon, martial law commander, advised the citizens to "clean up" the city.

A tentative citizens law enforcement organization has been formed to work for the improvement of conditions. In the conference recently held Col. Nimmon told Chamber of Commerce executives that the city and county authorities were not co-operating

with each other or with the military forces for law enforcement and that there was a general laxity in law enforcement.

AUSTIN, Sept. 9.—Governor Neff denied the reports that he will go to Denison to make an investigation of the strike situation and regarding the laxity of law enforcement in that city. He said that no action towards removing any Denison officials had been planned.

Rev. A. R. Holten, a former Ballinger citizen, and now president of the Thorp Springs College, will preach at the Eighth Street Church of Christ tabernacle Sunday night. The public is invited to hear him.

Stuart L. Williams left for Dallas Saturday afternoon, where he goes to accompany Mrs. Williams home. Mrs. Williams has been in a Dallas hospital since an operation for appendicitis.

TURKISH-GREECE IN BATTLE ROYAL

(By Associated Press)
CONSTANTINOPLE, Sept. 9.—A movement for the dethronement of King Constantine of Greece, and the establishment of a republic, was reported in Greek newspapers today, and it was said that the movement was well underway on the islands of the Grecian Archipelago.

ATHENS, Greece, Sept. 9.—The city of Smyrna is being evacuated amid scenes of great disorder, according to twenty-two hundred refugees who have arrived here. Panic reigned in the city as the Turks approached, and the Greek soldiers battled with civilians for places on outgoing ships and airplanes.

The Turkish Nationalists are bombarding the town and confusion reigns. The new Greek cabinet supplanting the cabinet which resigned yesterday, is expected to be completed by tonight.

DISRESPECT FOR TRAFFIC LAWS

An iron handed traffic cop, devoting all his time to the enforcement of the traffic laws, and who would crack down without fear or favor, could pick up a handsome salary in fees alone in this city.

The laws governing auto driving are being flagrantly violated open and above board, every day and every night on the streets of Ballinger.

Especially is the speeding law and the law governing lights being violated. The writer saw two cars without lights pass up 8th Street Friday night, and speeding on Eighth and Broadway is a common practice.

It may be possible for an auto driver to hatch up some excuse for running his car without lights occasionally, but speeding is inexcusable.

The speed fiend abuses the rights of careful drivers, and endangers human life every time he violates the speed law, and he should be dealt with as the law directs.

Next week is fair week in Ballinger. The streets will be crowded and it behooves every one to be careful, for it is better to go slow than to be sorry; and then for the week following, and for every week, the same precaution should be practiced.

The auto driver who has no respect for the traffic laws and the rights of others who try to be careful, should be taught a lesson in traffic obedience, and then the public will have more respect for him or for her, if it should so happen to be.

BROTHER BRINGS BROTHER TO JUSTICE IN GRIM SCENE

A tale that bespeaks volumes for the rock-ribbed code of the Royal Northwest Mounted Police, came out of the snow country recently when it was ascertained that Corp. Bob Fitzgerald tracked his own brother and brought him back to justice.

According to reports, the younger Fitzgerald, also of the Royal Northwest Mounted Police, fell from grace and after being admonished by Sergt. Georges Mardeux, proceeded to ignore authority and further entangle himself by coqueting the wife of the inspector. 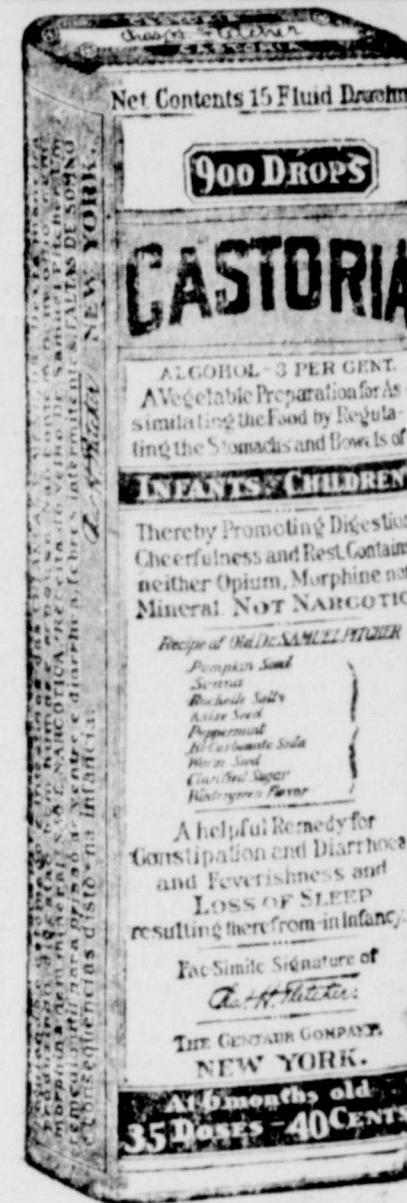

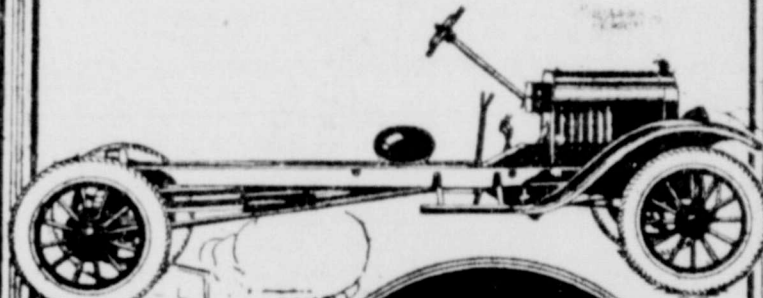

CHINESE NOW CLAIM HONOR

Buddhist Priests Said to Have Discov-
ered America Long Before
Day of Columbus.

Legends common to the literature
of both China and Japan relate that
about the year 499 Hwai Shan, a
Buddhist missionary, in company with
five brother priests, found a large
many miles to the eastward of China,
which he named Fusang. They sailed
along the Chinese coast to Kamchat-
ka and thence along the Aleutian is-
lands to Alaska. The description of
the peoples they found fits the Aleuts
and the Eskimos as they are today.

From Alaska, which they called
Great Han, they sailed along the coast
to Fusang. Hwai Shan describes the
dwellings made of blocks of sun-dried
mud, which housed many people, a
description which fits the pueblos of
ancient America. He mentions a plant
used in making cordage and paper,
which afforded vegetable milk and
which yielded tender edible sprouts.
The magney plant also answers this
description.

He also describes a plant and its
fruit which is the species of cactus
commonly known as the prickly pear.
From the Chinese records, therefore,
Fusang was very like Mexico.

A few years ago the Chinese gov-
ernment directed its historian to make
a search of the Imperial records, and
from them came the foregoing ac-
count.

PESSIMISM NEVER IN ORDER

Present Time Always Just as Good a
Time as Any, if One Will
but Consider.

Our age is bewailed as an age of in-
troversion. Must that needs be evil?
We, it seems, are critical; we are em-
barrassed with second thoughts; we
cannot enjoy anything for banking

side by side, and adult of being com-
pared; when the energies of all men
are searched by fear and by hope;
when the historic glories of the old
can be compensated by the rich possi-
bilities of the new era? This time,
like all times, is a very good one, if
we know what to do with it.—Ralph
Waldo Emerson.

Origin of Polka Dot.

Silvered with the dust of decades is
the polka-dot pattern in men's scarfs.
Fashions may appear and disappear,
but the polka-dot is peerless and dis-
appearanceless. As regularly as sunrise
and the seasons, this design brightens
windows and wearers. It is one-and-
invisible with the fine art of dress
alike in America and England.

To the polka-dot is ascribed an odd
ancestry. Its name, of course, is de-
rived from the polka, an old-fashioned
round dance with three steps to the
measure. This dance, introduced in
Europe by a Bohemian, round about
1830, spread to the United States at
the time that Polk was a candidate for
the presidency. The polka-dot was
bracketed with Polk's name by politi-
cal admirers, and polka-this and polka-
that, from shirts to shoes, became a
bit of fashion in merchants' windows.

Wood Has Bad Reputation.

Elder is of olden since Judas
they say, hanged himself thereon, yet
it has the virtue of beauty in the days
of wild roses and honeysuckle. Elder-
flower-water is good for complexion,
say rustic maids, and old-time farmers
claim for elderberry-wine that it is
"a pretty tidy tippie."

Though the elder-wood is a dank,
weed-infested place, it is to the liking
of rabbits, that always seem to abound
there.

Such woods cumber the ground, but
here and there the superstition holds
good that to cut or burn elder is to
arouse the wrath of the trees' dried,
and so they are spared.

GINS HUMMING;
COTTON MOVES

Prior to Sept. first of this year
603 bales of cotton had been
ginned in Rannels county, ac-
cording to the government gin
reporter. Up to Friday night 677
bales had been ginned in Ballin-

put in the fields.

Up to Friday night 680 bales
had been received at the local
yards, and considerable checked
in at the warehouse, and Farm
Bureau cotton shipped out. With
the price riding above the twenty-
cent mark, it is believed that the
bulk of the crop is being sold as
fast as picked. The market
showed a slight gain Saturday.
