FARM BOARD TO MAKE NO EARLY LOANS

REQUESTS FOR MONEY TURNED DOWN UNTIL POLICY IS FORMED

(By Associated Press) WASHINGTON, July 17.—The Federal farm board announced today no loans would be made out of the \$150,000,000 fund available pending determination of policy.

Of the \$500,000,000 authorized by Congress for the use of the board, \$150,000,000 was appropriated and there are indications quite a number of requests are already on hand for portions of the money.

Announcement also was made by the board that when loans are made the board will deal only with officials of the co-operative marketing associations.

British India Has Series Of Floods

LONDON, July 17.—(AP)—Exchange telegraph dispatches from Bombay today said widespread floods were reported in the Sind division of that province. At Sukkur-Barrage—the township was submerged with 12 deaths. In middle Sind hundreds of cattle died from exposure in torrential rains. Miles of desert have been transferred into a huge lake.

TABULATIONS REVEAL VOTE FOR CHANGES

GOVERNOR'S SALARY IS TO BE RAISED AND COURT ENLARGED

(By Associated Press) DALLAS, July 17.—Proposals to increase the Governor's salary from \$4,000 to \$10,000 a year and to enlarge the State Supreme Court from the present three to nine members gained further favorable majorities on tabulation today of unofficial and incomplete returns from yesterday's constitutional amendment election.

Approximately 100 counties, cities or towns were represented in today's final compilation by the Associated Press, which gave the following vote:

For increase of governor's salary, 21,145; against, 10,134.
For enlargement of supreme court, 21,670; against, 9,757.

Most Apathetic

It probably was one of the most apathetic elections in the history of Texas due to the absence of any political questions, and the final result will not be known until announcement of the official figures from Austin. Large cities gave the two amendments great majorities, although the voting was the lightest on record. Most of the opposition came from rural districts, especially in the Panhandle.

In event official returns confirm the seemingly apparent adoption of the increased salary amendment, it would not become effective until January, 1931, at the close of Governor Moody's term. Mr. Moody has

FORTY-ONE MEN MISSING IN TRAGEDY

ALL BELIEVED TO HAVE DROWNED AS SHIP SINKS OFF CHILE

(By Associated Press) VALPARAISO, Chile, July 17.—Forty-one officers and crew of the Chilean Transport Artao were missing today—a apparently drowned—after sinking of that ship yesterday off this port in one of the most violent storms here in years. Only two of its crew of 43 were saved.

At noon the transport radioed an appeal for help which three boats answered, the Flora, the Antartico and the Imperial. The Imperial picked up boatwain's mate, Enrique Aranda, and the Antartico the sailor Francisco Miranda.

Bodies Found
Two others, destroyers, found several bodies among wreckage from the ship. It did not appear likely there are any survivors as yet unreported.

Heavy seas and high winds kept rescue ships outside the harbor today. The storm raged over southern and central Chile all day and was particularly severe off the ports of Valparaiso and San Antonio. Telegraphic communications on land to the south were interrupted partially.

WILD BUYING FLURRY HITS MARKET; CLOUSE IS AT TOP PRICE

(By Associated Press) CHICAGO, July 17.—Another wild outburst of buying carried wheat prices up more than eight cents a bushel today, and December contracts swept past the \$1.50 level in the sensational spurt. Closing prices again were at or near the top figures for the day, with the December delivery at \$1.54 5-8 to 7-8 a bushel.

The day's advance for wheat was from 77-8 to 85-8 cents, and other grains scored strong advances, too. The flood of orders to buy wheat almost submerged the pit as world markets skyrocketed. Fear that dry, hot weather would inflict almost a total loss to spring wheat growers in Canada and the domestic northwest was increased today as reports came of 100 degree temperatures. Prices mounted spectacularly at Winnipeg and at Liverpool as well as in this country, and heavy buying was reported here for export to Europe.

Texas Ranger Editor Given Suspension

AUSTIN, July 17.—(AP)—Publication of questionable material in the "Texas Ranger," University of Texas humorous publication, resulted today in the placing of prohibition for one year of John Canaday, acting editor of the comic during a period of last year.

H. V. Crowder, who succeeded Canaday, was relieved of his duties by the faculty discipline committee more than a month ago. He has announced he will not return to school this year.

Faculty members condemned the Ranger for publishing jokes termed too risqué.

Rumania Has Raging Oil Well; Two Die

BUCHAREST, Rumania, July 17.—(AP)—A raging fire in an oil well at Moreni has defied the efforts of workmen and firemen to extinguish it for forty-two days. Two men were burned to death last Saturday in an attempt to choke the well.

The fire was believed to be the greatest ever reported in any oil field in the world, and the damage so far is put at \$1,000,000.

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FLIERS ON FIFTH DAY

JACKSON AND O'BRIEN GOING GOOD; ONE PLANE LANDS

(By Associated Press) ST. LOUIS, July 17.—Dale Jackson and Forest O'Brien, piloting the "St. Louis Robin" of the Curtiss-Robertson Airplane Co., started the fifth day of their endurance flight at 7:17 a. m. today. At that hour the fliers had been aloft 96 hours.

USE OF PERFUME IS AN ART

French women are past masters in the art of using perfume and one of these is Lily Damita, who has recently come to America and the movies.

There are two general methods of using perfume, Miss Damita ex-

plains: "Some women like to use one odor at all times, thus identifying their personalities with the single fragrance, while others prefer to choose many different odors, one to suit each mood. But whether a woman uses one or many, she should use only one odor at a time and her bath salts, powder and perfume should all be the same."

"Bath powder and toilet water are refreshing supplements to a bath. Particularly invigorating is a toilet water rub down after a tub. As for the use of perfume, it should be applied to the hair, behind the ears, at the base of the throat, and on the hands."

"Sachets are used extensively by French women to impart an elusive fragrance to their clothes, and are sewed into the hems of their frocks and into their hair linings as well."

WASHINGTON, July 17.—Proponents of both the wet and the dry viewpoints have found something to their liking in the suggestions bearing on prohibition contained in the letter of George W. Wickersham, chairman of President Hoover's law enforcement commission, as read to the governor's conference at New London, Conn.

Comment was withheld in some quarters pending a clearer interpretation of his remarks on the subject. Among the dry spokesmen who did comment, the suggestion that prohibition enforcement responsibility be divided between the state and federal governments received the greater emphasis, while the wet apparently were more impressed by his remark about the possibility of modification.

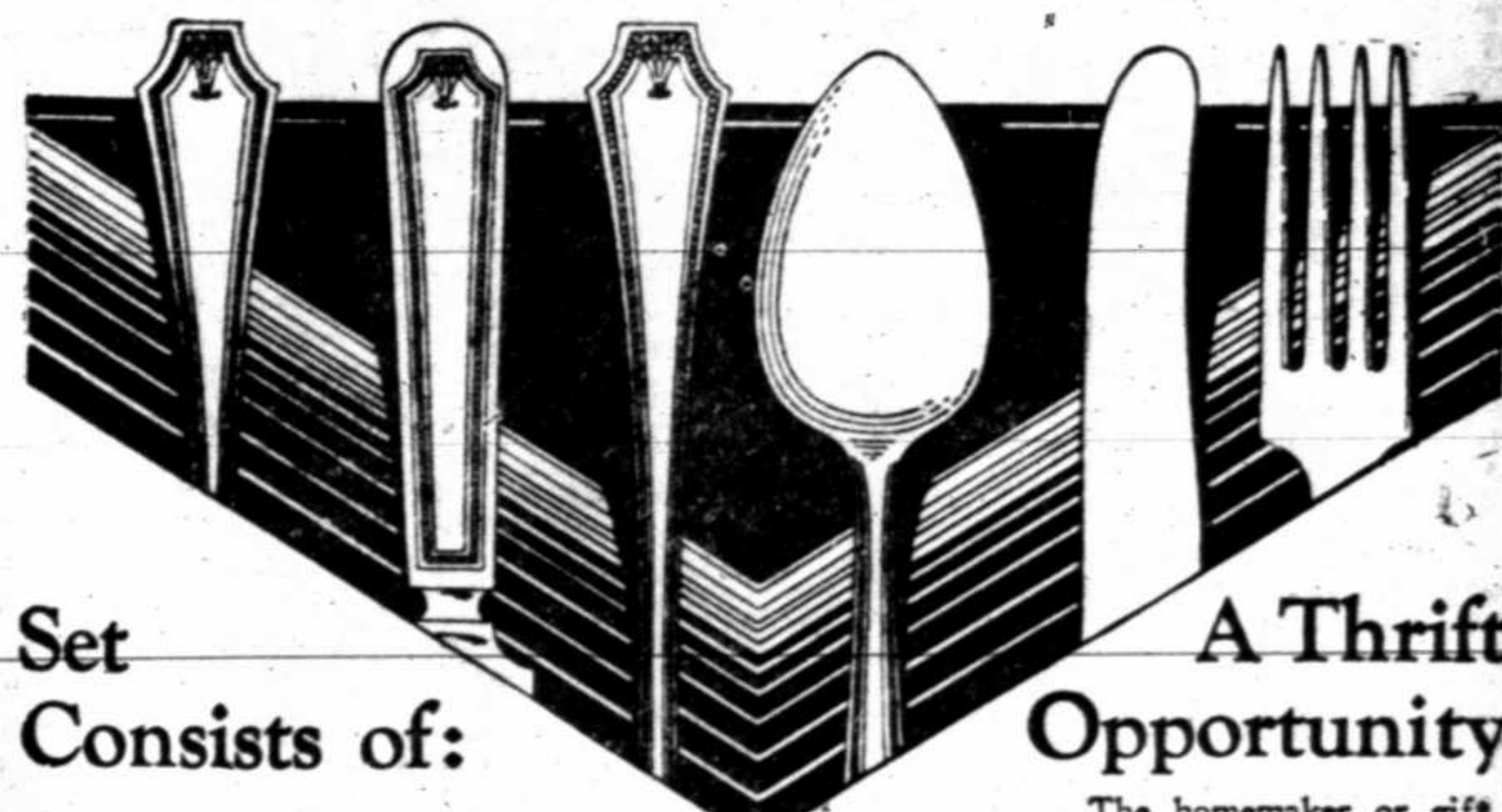

LEGISLATURE
NEARS CLOSE
OF SESSIONWORK IS PRACTICALLY
OVER FOR THIRD
CALLED MEET

(By Associated Press)
AUSTIN, July 17.—Although the adjournment has been put off until Saturday noon, the third special session of the 41st legislature had virtually completed its work today.

With all appropriation bills, totaling \$47,792,935, having gone to the governor, as well as the meas-

ure withdrawing from the market unsurveyed public school lands and beds and channels of rivers, only minor business remained unfinished.

Coltrin Bill Up

The senate had the Coltrin house bill making it more difficult for condemned prisoners to obtain a hearing before a district court on a plea of insanity. Under its provisions an affidavit of a sheriff, county physician or warden or physician of the penitentiary would be necessary to obtain a sanity trial for a prisoner. Under the present law any individual could make oath that he had reason to believe the prisoner insane and the court be compelled to order a hearing.

The house had cleared its deck and adjourned until 2 p. m. today.

Adjourn Saturday

It will be almost solely a matter of adjourning from day to day until Saturday in order to have bills introduced yesterday and today from the constitutional inhibition that they be not considered if in-

troduced within three days of final adjournment.

Governor Moody has indicated he would accept the appropriation bills as re-passed with totals more than \$3,000,000 under the measures disapproved by him at the end of the second special session on July 9. He intimated he would veto some items from the bills to reduce the total of all appropriations authorized by the regular and special sessions of the 41st legislature to approximately \$50,000,000.

Our first impression was that the spectators had mistaken our name for Lynch, but when the howl changed to "Hang the Umpire," the point went over.

For the safety of these noble officials we suggest a solid steel armor and head gear. The city must be made safe for umpiring as well as democracy. Hill has been the star of the season since he recently developed into a promising receiver and with the advantage of a powerful arm may be able to make the grade in professional baseball. LOCAL MAN NAMED TO
STATE BOARD OF
EDUCATION

Tom Garrard, of Lubbock, who was appointed one of the nine members of the newly created State Board of Education, according to announcement late Tuesday, began his career in service of the public when in 1912 he was elected county attorney of Ector county.

Subsequently, was elected district attorney of the Midland district, the largest in the state of Texas, in 1914 and served in that capacity until 1920. From 1923 to 1925 he served as assistant attorney general of the state of Texas, and in 1925 he was appointed from Governor Pat Neff. When his time had been completed in the attorney general's office he moved to Lubbock where he again took up the practice of law. In the early part of this year he was appointed to the state textbook commission.

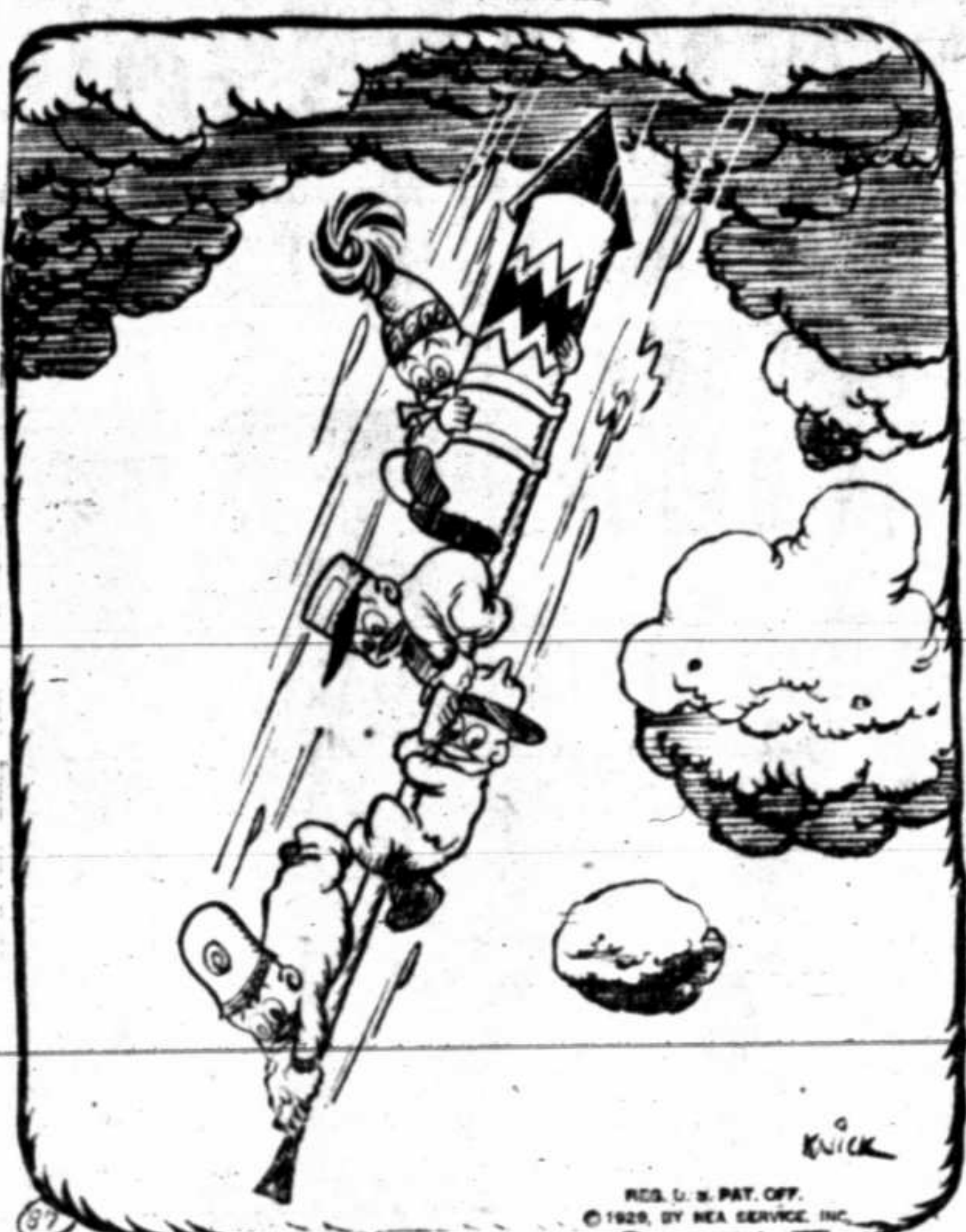
Continue Practice Here
"I feel sure that my duties on the board will not interfere with my present professional activities and I will continue with my practice here," he said. "I am very happy of the opportunity to serve the people of Texas in this capacity and will do my best to study the system and needs of the educational institutions of the state."

Board Newly Created
The newly created board of education was passed in conformity with a constitutional amendment voted last summer. The duties of the board will be wide and varied. The financial needs of the public free schools of the state will be studied and a report made to the governor, who in turn, will report to the legislature. It also will consider the financial needs of the state institutions of higher learning and submit recommendations to the state board of control whose budget will embody the recommendations. Formal recommendations also will be made by this body for all proposed new institutions in the state for education. The board will make a careful study of the scope of the work and the purpose of the higher institutions and will make a written and statistical report if they desire. It will recommend such changes in the course of study of the higher institutions as the needs of the state may warrant, with special reference to needless waste of duplication work.

All of the duties of the former state textbook commission will be taken over and performed. It will fairly consider the athletic necessities and activities of the public schools and biennially and in advance of each session of the legislature a report will be made to the governor for proper and legal disposition.

Coroner Says Stultz Was Not Intoxicated

WESTBURY, N. J., July 17. (AP)—Wimot Y. Hallock, coroner of Nassau county, today made public a verdict that he had found no evidence that Wilmer Stultz was intoxicated on the day that the flier crashed in an airplane with two passengers. The three occupants of the plane were killed.

RECALL CAMPAIGN FOR

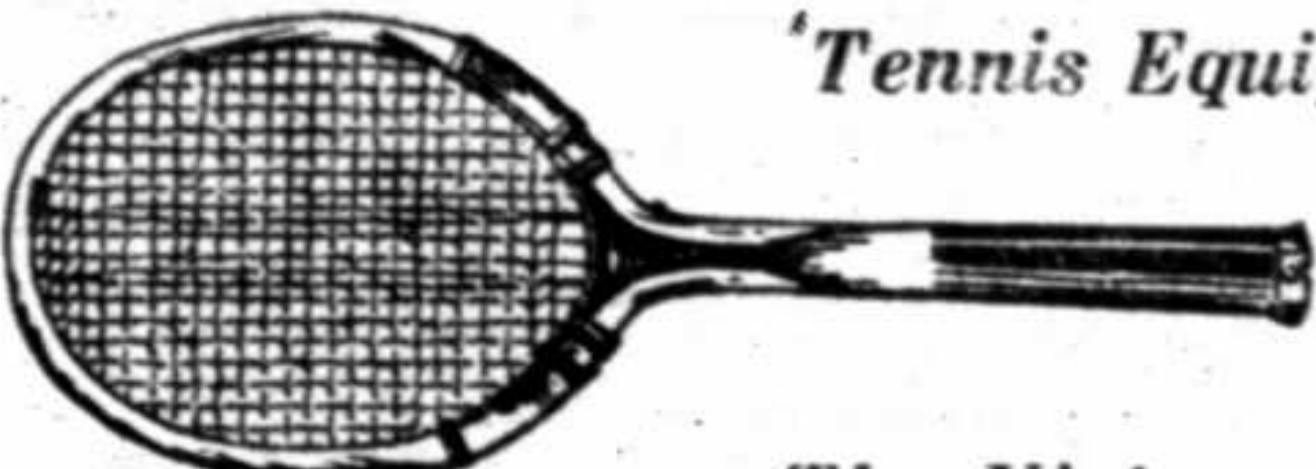

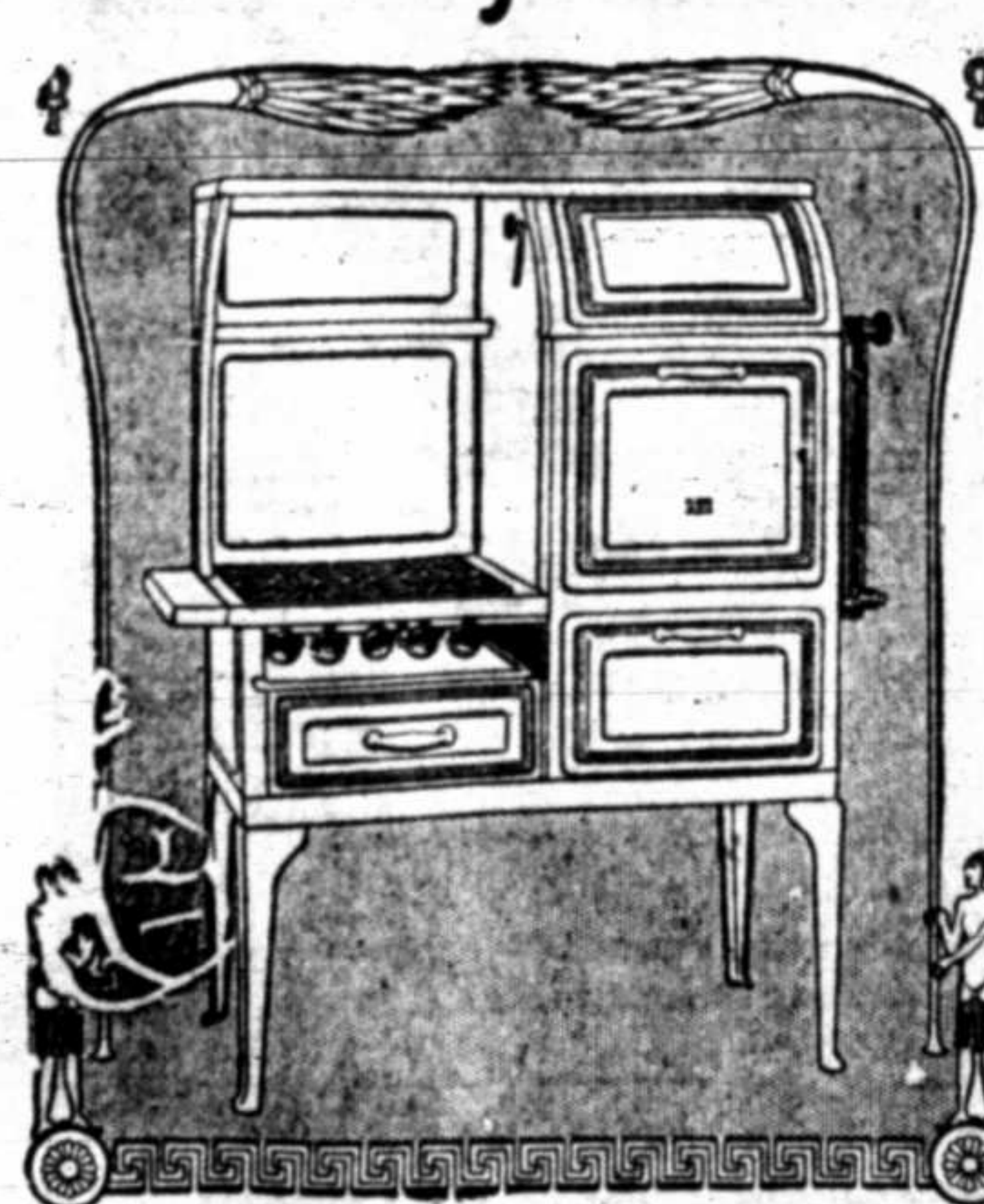

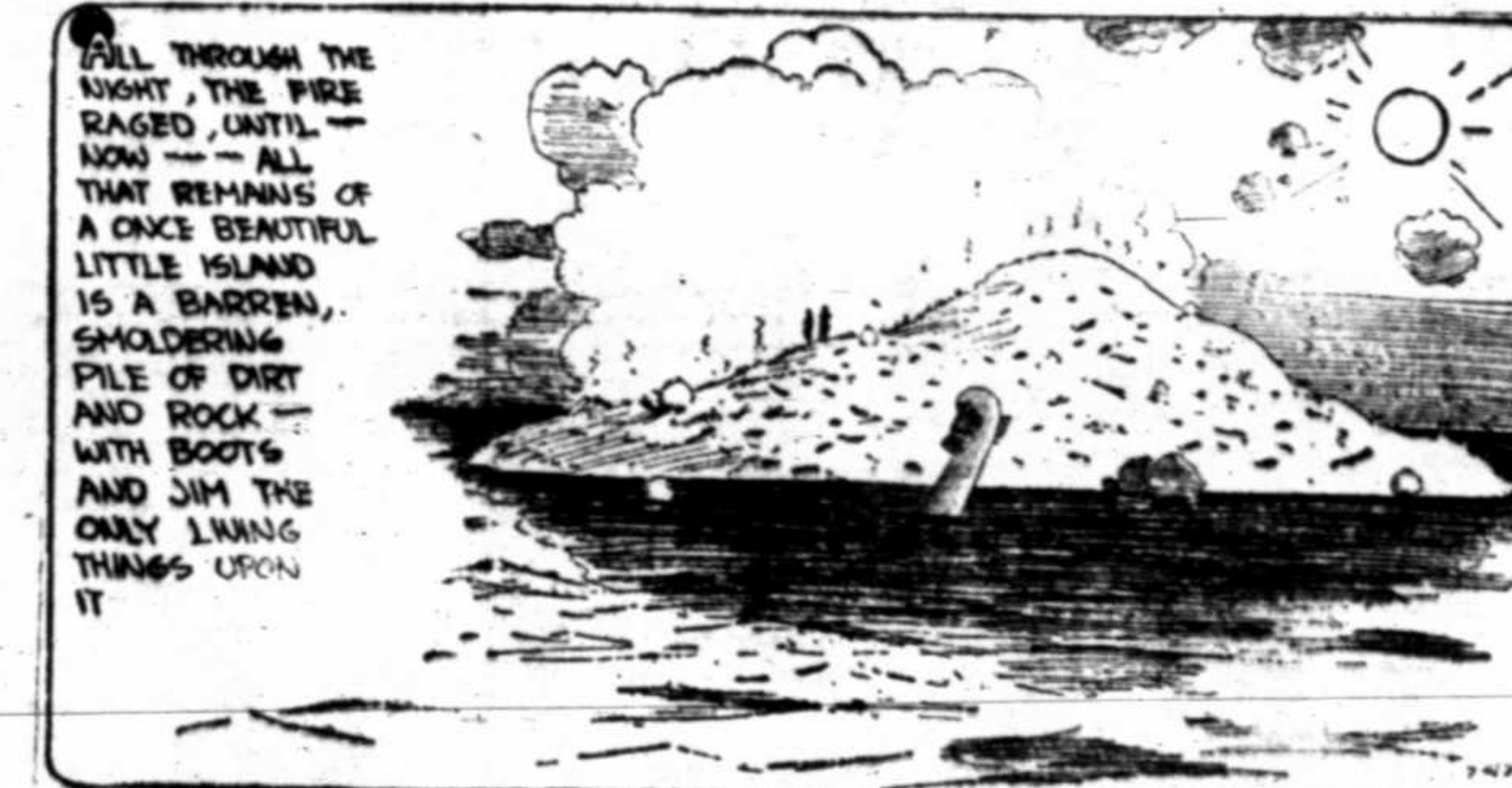

BOARD AIMS AT SLASH OF MARKET COST

NATIONAL GROUP WILL BOOST FARMERS' RETURNS

(By Associated Press)
WASHINGTON, July 17.—Reduction of the marketing costs of agricultural products will be sought by the federal farm board as a means of boosting the farmer's returns without adding a corresponding increase to the consumer's expense.

To accomplish this objective, the board has set itself to the task of organizing the farmers' marketing facilities on a gigantic national scale, working all the time "with and through established groups of farmers who are organized or who may be organized on a basis of specific farm commodities."

To Attend Meeting

Declaration of this policy was given in a statement by the board with an announcement that the members would go to Baton Rouge, La., July 20, to attend the meeting of the American Institute of Co-operation, during which they expect to confer with national leaders in co-operative marketing.

The board's announcement was expected. It was revealed that several appeals are pending from agricultural groups, but no hint was given as to the probable disposition of the \$150,000,000 which the board already has available out of the \$300,000,000 loan fund.

Rate Reductions In Orleans Announced

NEW ORLEANS, July 17.—In order to meet demands of cotton merchants for rates comparing favorably with charges at other Gulf ports, reductions in handling charges ranging from 8 to 45 cents here were announced today.

Announcing the reductions in behalf of the dock board, Colonel Marcel Garsaud, general manager, expressed belief that the new rates would be acceptable to the cotton trade. No comment was made by Oscar P. Gerren, president of the New Orleans Spot Cotton Merchants association, pending a digest of the new tariff.

The spot cotton merchants association recently protested that high handling charges at the public warehouses were responsible for increased cotton trade at New Orleans but this was denied by the dock board.

The present cotton tariff imposed at Galveston and Houston, Colonel Garsaud said, "and with the reduction it means that the trade at New Orleans has quite an advantage over the trade at Galveston and Houston in the handling of cotton."

Mr. Colquitt declared, the paper says, that an "anti-Tammany" democratic candidate for governor will be elected next year.

TO OPEN ROAD

CIUDAD VICTORIA, Tamaulipas, Mex., July 16.—Work is to be commenced August 1 on a road connecting this city with Matamoros.

It is hoped to have the road open to traffic within a year, giving automobile tourists from the United States access for the first time to this state capital.

The road is to be built by an American concern which has received a contract from the state government.

URGE MODESTY

Catholic Women Ask For More Clothes

SALEM, Ore., July 17.—A resolution urging women to wear dresses of sufficient length to cover their knees when sitting as well as when standing was adopted last night by the Catholic Women's society in its national convention here.

Birth control and the new freedom for women were dealt with in other resolutions. Preceding the adoption of these,

Dallas Education Body Protests Bill

DALLAS, July 17.—The Texas senate's passage Tuesday of Senator Thomas B. Love's bill setting up within the state insurance commission a bureau to provide a system for insuring all public school property in the state brought from the Dallas board of education a strenuous protest.
