Ochiltree County Interscholastic league meet will be held on March 15-16, it was decided at a meeting of representatives of the schools of the county held here recently. The meet will be financed by the sale of tickets for the various events.

Opening Thursday evening, March 14, the declamation and extemporaneous speaking contest will be held. Elimination in the other events will be started Friday morning and continue through to the finish on Saturday afternoon.

The complete schedule of events for the league meet will be given later.

Speed Highway Work

Increase Workmen On Federal 83 In Last Half Of Month; 120 Now Employed

Work on Federal 83 is being speeded up for the last half of the month, with the addition of nearly one-third more men on the work relief project. At the present time, 120 men are employed on the new highway, as compared with eighty for the first two weeks of February.

All bridges have been completed on the new route but as yet they have not all been filled in. Work of spreading caliche from the cuts is going ahead as fast as possible with considerable of the work finished.

BIG CROWD TO SEE OPERETTA

HALF OF NEEDED FUND FOR PURCHASE OF BAND UNIFORMS IS RAISED

Approximately one-half of the fund needed for the purchase of uniforms for the school band was raised at the operetta entertainment staged at the auditorium on Tuesday night and enjoyed by the large crowd present.

The musical play, "Up In The Air", was thoroughly enjoyed by the audience. Special scenery and lighting effects added greatly to the beauty of the production.

A total of \$140.49 was received from admissions, all of which will be turned into the special fund created for the purchase of uniforms for the school band. The expenses for the production will be paid out of the music activity fund of the school.

Twenty business firms of the city sold a total of \$76.75 worth of advance tickets, the Stewart Printing company placing first with tickets sales of \$40.50. No second place was given, as no other firm qualified under the rules of the sale contest. Ticket sales at the auditorium and at school added the remaining \$63.74 raised.

FINISH WHEAT LAND MEASURE

WORK WILL BE COMPLETED BY END OF WEEK; CONTRACTS READY FOR APPROVAL VERY SOON

According to reports from the office of County Agent J. T. Stovall, the majority of the wheat land will be measured this week. With a small amount of adjustments the contracts will be ready for certification to the Washington office for payment.

Many inquiries have come in, asking what can be planted on the allotted or rental acres. County Agent Stovall wants to warn all parties against planting these acres expecting to harvest grain of any kind.

According to information received by the wheat allotment office, contract signers will be allowed to plant and harvest forage only, and any crop allowed to mature or ripen will be a violation of the contract.

MARCH 9 FINAL CONTRACT DATE

CORN-HOG CONTRACTS MUST BE SIGNED ON OR BEFORE SATURDAY, MARCH 9

Nearly three-fourths of the corn-hog contract signers of last year have renewed their contracts this spring, a check revealed Wednesday afternoon, the remaining one-fourth having until Saturday, March 9 to sign.

A total of 105 corn-hog contracts have been completed to date, out of a total of 141 last year, or approximately seventy-five per cent. To be included in the corn-hog allotment program, signers must execute their contracts on or before the closing day and are urged to do so as promptly as possible in order to speed up the program.

SEEK HIGHWAY OUTLET SOUTH

PROPOSE BRIDGE OVER CANADIAN RIVER SOUTH OF HERE ON NEW ROUTE

Work on another highway project, one that has lain dormant for several years, was renewed last week with the visit to this city of George Eriggs, manager of the Board of City Development, and Gilmore Nunn, manager of the Daily News, Pampa.

The proposal calls for a north and south highway jointly between Perryton and Spearman on the north and Miami and Pampa on the south, with a bridge over the Canadian river in north Roberts county. Agitation for the highway has been more or less spasmodic for several years, the need being felt but with very little encouragement offered from Roberts county officials or from the state highway department.

According to present plans being promoted by the Pampa highway delegation, it is proposed that the route be surveyed by capable engineers, the cost of such preliminary survey to be paid jointly by the towns interested. W. J. Van London, district engineer, is expected to name an engineer to survey the route, whose findings could be relied upon by the state highway department. It is thought that in this manner the cooperation of the state can be secured for the designation of the new route as a state highway.

Pioneer Woman Passes

Funeral Services For Mrs. W. H. Richardson To Be Held Thursday Afternoon

This entire community was grieved Tuesday morning when news spread of the passing away of Mrs. W. H. Richardson, 83, one of the county's true pioneer mothers. Funeral services for the deceased will be held Thursday afternoon at 2:30 o'clock at the Christian church.

This grand old woman lived to be 83 years, 4 months and 27 days old and her days were numbered with deeds of love and kindness. Her home instincts were strong and her affection for friends and relatives was tender and abiding.

The Richardson family are among the true pioneers of this county, having made their home since October 1901, living on a farm southwest of Ochiltree for a number of years, later in the town of Ochiltree and then moving to Perryton with the opening of the townsite.

United in marriage to Mr. Richardson on October 21, 1868, this happy couple had been blessed with many pleasant, peaceful years together, only last fall observing their 66th wedding anniversary. They moved to Texas about 1878, from Brownville, Mo., having lived in this state ever since.

The deceased was the mother of five children, four of whom survive her, along with her husband. They are J. W. Richardson and Mrs. J. S. Talley of this city, Mrs. W. T. Edlison, Amarillo; and Mrs. W. M. McMillen Lindrith, N. M.; all of whom will be in attendance at the funeral services. One daughter, Mrs. Fannie Cheatham preceded her in death. She also leaves fourteen grand children and thirteen great-grandchildren and a host of loving friends to mourn her passing.

As a leader of song, for a number of years before entering the preaching field, Evangelist Kellems was known as the outstanding song director of the Christian church. A large children's choir, and a large adult choir are singing nightly.

Mrs. Kellems is acknowledged to be one of the best chalk artists in the country. Each night she produces a finished picture before the eyes of the audience, and each night the picture drawn the night before is given absolutely free to the person in the audience having present at the service the largest number of people not there the night before. As a soloist Mrs. Kellems has a pleasing contralto voice, and is already exciting much favorable comment in Perryton. Tuesday, she and her husband appeared before the Lions club. Thursday they are invited to sing at the high school assembly.

Miss Culbertson is already making many friends by her genial disposition and fine work at the piano. She will have meetings of young people at frequent intervals during the campaign, and will help them with their life problems.

RANGERETTES HOLD UNDEFEATED CONFERENCE RECORD FOR BASKET BALL SEASON

For the third consecutive year, Coach E. D. Kelley and his Rangerette sharp-shooting basket ball team captured the sectional championship this week and maintained an undefeated conference record for the season.

The deciding game was played at Borger last Friday evening when the local cage stars nosed out the Borger girls by a scant one point margin, winning 26 to 27, clinching the title. Borger taking their second defeat at the hands of the Perryton delegation.

The final game of the conference was played at Spearman on Monday night, the Red and White team maintaining their 100 per cent standing by crushing the Spearman girls under a 20 to 10 score. This win was the fourteenth consecutive victory over the Spearman girls squad, since the local team was taken over by Coach Kelley, three years ago.

The Rangers did not fare so well on the two closing games, losing to Borger 11 to 18 and to Spearman 11 to 21. The Borger Bulldogs won first in the section in the boys division.

Goodnight won their section title on Monday night when they defeated Panhandle 34 to 35. They have one more game on the schedule, playing Pampa this week but the outcome will not interfere with the Goodnight-Perryton games or affect the standing of the Goodnight team.

International Sunday School Lesson

By A. C. Williams, Minister Perryton Church of Christ

Lesson VIII Feb. 24, 1935
PETER AT THE BEAUTIFUL GATE

Memory Verse: "Then Peter said, 'Silver and gold have I none, but such as I have I give thee'"

—Acts 3:6a

Lesson Text: Acts 3:1-10; 4:8-12
I. Jerusalem, The Temple, And The Hour of Prayer (Acts 3:1)

Throughout the history of the Jews from the time of Solomon, Jerusalem was regarded as the central place of worship. David had planned the temple, Solomon had built it, and the Jews had ever regarded its sacred spot a hallowed shrine. Jerusalem was the religious capital of Palestine, and thither thousands of the children of Israel journeyed to observe the great annual feasts and attending ceremonies. It was here that Jesus was brought and presented before the Lord. It was here that the priesthood officiated and offered sacrifices for the people. With the coming of the gospel no city was more fitting as a beginning place than beloved Jerusalem, made rich in Israel's history by the lives of her prophets, and tragic by the multitudes of her crimes against heavenly messengers.

Some three thousand had become Christians as a result of the great meeting on Pentecost. But that was not the end of the great work there. There were many who still needed the benefits of the blood of Christ, and every opportunity must be used to speak for the resurrected Messiah.

So Peter and John go up to the temple at the hour of prayer—not to observe the traditions of the Jews, nor even the Mosaic law itself, but to gain a hearing for the word of God (Acts 3:2).

II. A Helpless Cripple (Acts 3:2)

This man was daily laid at the Beautiful Gate that he might receive alms from those who were entering. The affliction of this victim was real. It was no mere mental affliction. Resigning himself to his fate, he hoped only to keep from starving while he went through his remaining years of handicap. That he expected other than to receive alms is without proof. To say that he was a believer in Christ before he was miraculously healed is with out Scriptural foundation.

III. A Plea And A Reply (Acts 3:3-6)

The cripple asked Peter and John for alms. He did not ask to be healed. But there was a pleasant surprise in store for him. Instead of receiving money, he obtained that which was far superior—health. It came about this way: Peter told the wretched man, "Silver and gold have I none; but such as I have, I give thee". This message was significant. Peter possessed something unusual. Great Power had been given the apostles (Acts 1:8). Mighty miracles confirmed—proved—the words they spoke (Heb. 2:3, 4; Mark 16:17-20; Acts 2). This was essential to the establishment of the New Testament and proving that the apostles were divinely commissioned to represent heaven and give the gospel to the world. The miracles of the New Testament were to produce faith in the hearts of those who witnessed them and learned of them through recorded testimony (Acts 2:22; John 20:29-31; Romans 10:17). The Apostles could lay hands upon others and confer in a limited measure certain miraculous gifts (Acts 3:17; 19:6; 2 Tim. 1:6; Rom. 1:11) but these could not be passed on. Hence, when the last person died who possessed them they passed away according to the prophecy of Paul (1 Cor. 13:8-13) because the perfect law of liberty, the gospel, was then fully confirmed for all time (James 1:25). To claim the practice of miracles in this age would be to admit that the gospel still needs more proof for confirmation, which would be erroneous. It is not a question of what God CAN do. It is a question of what He is willing to do about that concerns us.

IV. An Outstanding Miracle (Acts 3:7, 8)

Peter took the man by the hand and raised him up, and immediately the feet and ankle bones of the victim received strength and he was able to leap for sheer joy and gratitude in his new-found nimbleness. What a great power had been used upon him. How wonderful the ability of Christ. What a demonstration to those many people who swarmed about him! No mistake in this miracle. The rulers could not deny it (Acts 4:16). It was calculated to be convincing evidence of the

Messiahship of Jesus. The man had not been healed just because he was a cripple. He was only a small part of the picture. The gigantic motive behind the whole performance was to exalt Christ and convince men that he was the Son of God and that his ambassadors were preaching His message.

The miracle was instantaneous. It was sudden and complete. No waiting, nor calling upon the man to have more faith. There was no need to ask the man if he was healed. It was a demonstration so complete in itself that even the most doubtful were compelled to admit it.

V. The Rejected Stone (Acts 4:11)

Jesus, the Stone, was rejected by the Jews when He was delivered up to be crucified. This Stone must be tried before it could be laid as the foundation in the church. Hence the church was not established until after the trial of Jesus, the burial and resurrection.

V. The Saving Name (Acts 4:10-12)

Peter had the opportunity to preach to the multitude gathered at the temple. He pointed out that it was the name of Jesus that was responsible for the great miracle. The thing had been performed "in the name" of Christ. To do a thing in the name of the Lord is to do it by His authority. It therefore possible to do in His name only those things He has authorized in His word.

There is much in a name, especially if it is Christ's. Peter reminds the waiting multitude that there is no salvation out of it. He insists that those who live in harmony with Christ must honor and revere that name. Two things are necessary to accomplish this end: First, we must wear Christ's name (Acts 11:26). The church, as a good bride should wear her Husband's name. Second, we must live worthy of that name. Let us not blot nor blur it in any way. When people know us, let that knowledge never depreciate their regard for Him whom we claim to serve. We never like to see the names of our community, family, parents, nor friends besmirched. Then we ought to live in such a way that the name of our Messiah will always be kept clear of the mire.

LUTHERAN CHURCH ITEMS

Ex-Christian

We honor the ex-mayor, ex-congressman, or ex-President as perhaps equal to the present incumbent. But ex-Christian does not strike us favorably, because there is no possibility of the Christian having served out his time. He has not been elected for a year, two years, or four years. The terms of his discipleship are that he be faithful unto death. And even death is not a resignation from his name and office. If he dies a Christian, he will be raised a Christian; he will be a Christian in the Day of Judgment and will enter heaven as a Christian. For the whole redeemed family in heaven, as well as on earth, is named after Christ. Consequently the ex-Christian has not been honorably discharged, but has forsaken the Lord.

Holy Communion will be celebrated in the morning worship next Sunday at 10:30. The sermon topic for that hour will be, "The Great Sin Of Rejecting God's Word." Sunday-school and Bible classes will meet after the service. Our

semi-monthly German service will be held at 3 o'clock Sunday afternoon. There are quite a number of people in Perryton and vicinity who prefer hearing a German sermon to an English one, but who have not attended a German service for years. 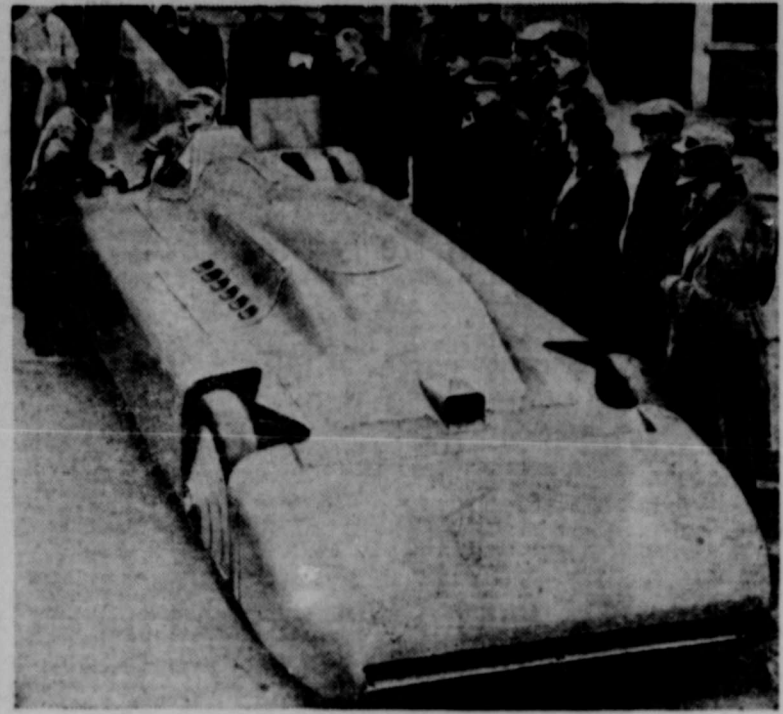

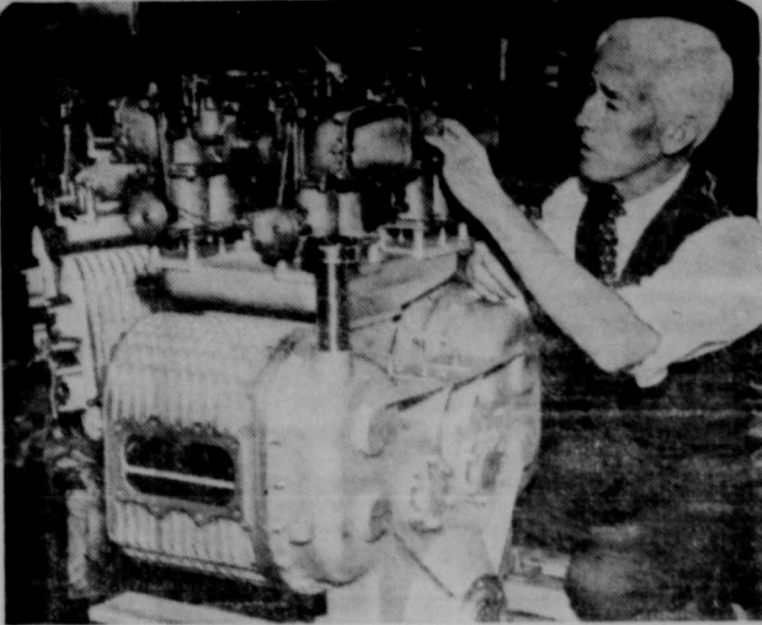

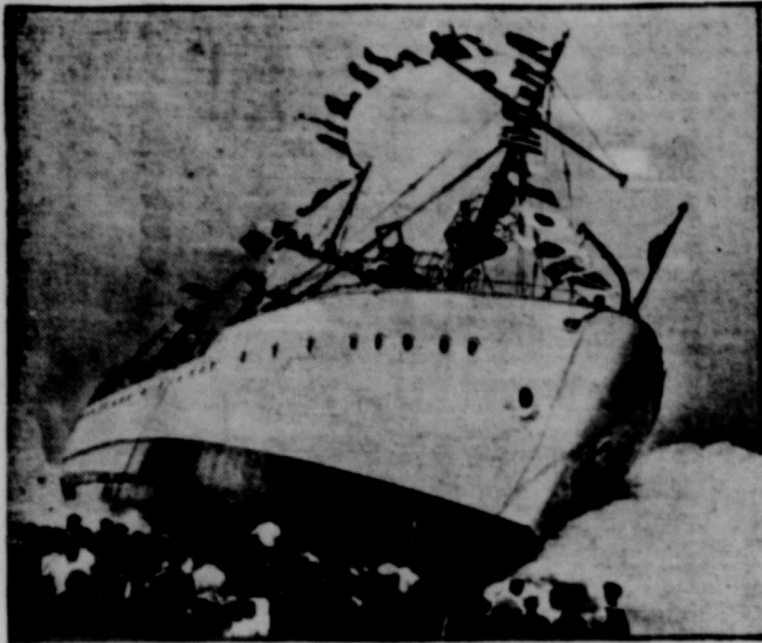

Tuning His Motors for Record Try



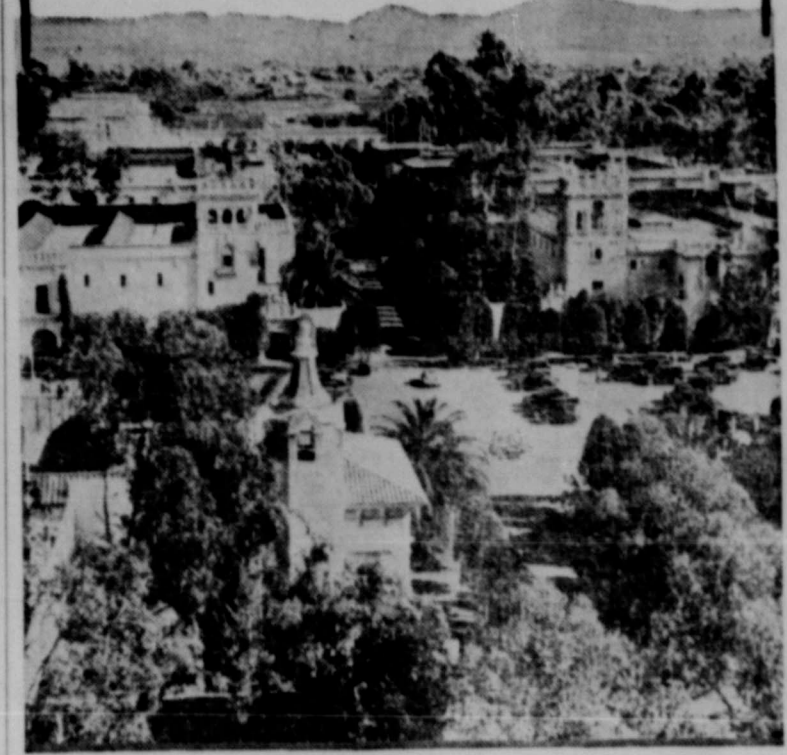
