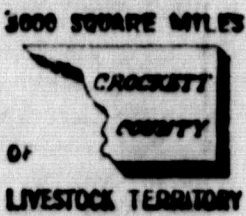

## Annual Fall 4-H Awards Program Set

The annual Crockett Co. 4-H Fall Awards Program will be held next Monday evening in the Civic Center at 7:00 p. m. Some 150 4-H members are eligible to receive some 75 county 4-H awards for project work carried on this past year.

County medals to be presented include the Gold Star award, citizenship, Danforth Leadership, 4-H Record Book awards, Wildlife Conservation, Range Management, Sheep & Goat Awards, Electric awards, Achievement medals, Agricultural awards, Clothing, Natural Resources, County Food Show awards in the four food groups of Milk, Bread, Meat and Vegetable-Fruit; Safety, Swine, Public Speaking, Health, Home Improvement, Home Management, Horse Program, Home Economics, Leadership, Photography, and County 4-H Dress Revue.

Adult leaders in 4-H project work will assist in making the presentations to the outstanding 4-H members. Junior 4-H leaders will assist with the overall program under the supervision of county agent Pete W. Jacoby.

Mary Jane Martinez, daughter of Mrs. Elvira Martinez, and Eugene Vinson, son of Mr. and Mrs. H. D. Vinson, have been named 4-H Gold Star winners for 1968. The winners will receive their medals at the annual Fall 4-H Awards Program in the Civic Center next Monday night, October 28, at 7:00 p. m.

The Gold Star award, the highest award given on the county level through the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, is presented to an outstanding boy and girl each year who have excelled in 4-H club work.

Mary Jane Martinez is a junior in Ozona High School and has been a 4-H member for five years, during which time she has achieved many 4-H honors. She achieved her highest 4-H honor this year when she and former Gold Star winner Enemencia Diaz won two of the four 4-H food show awards in the district food show. ## Doe Permits To Be Issued Here Monday & Tues.

Crockett county land owners are reminded that the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department will issue antlerless deer permits here Monday and Tuesday, Oct. 28 and 29.

Game Warden Raymond Davee has announced that permits will be issued at the courthouse in Ozona from 8 a. m. to 5 p. m. on each of the two days.

Landowners or their agents must be present to obtain their permits during the scheduled periods for permit issuance.

Permits to take one antlerless deer per 100 acres of land may be secured in an area of Crockett County south of Highway 290 and east of 163 north of Ozona to State Highway 29. One antlerless deer per 300 acres will be permitted in the rest of the county except for the segment north of Highway 29 and east of 163, and the extreme western tip of the county from the Iraan-Ranikin road west. No doe permits will be issued for hunting on these areas.

Funeral services for Oliver H. Bailey, 84, brother of Ozonan T. J. Bailey, will be held this afternoon in Eldorado with Rev. Jim Hancock, pastor of the First Baptist Church of Ozona, officiating.

Mr. Bailey died Tuesday night in a Kerrville hospital. He was born in 1884 in San Saba county. Mr. Bailey moved with his family to Schleicher county in the early 1900's, where his father participated in the land rush. His parents were Mr. and Mrs. A. K. Bailey, early Schleicher county settlers.

Other survivors include 3 sisters, Mrs. Mattie Cozons of Midland, Mrs. J. A. Nixon of Ft. Worth and Mrs. Oscar Gibson of Glendale, Ariz.; another brother, Marshall Bailey of Abilene.

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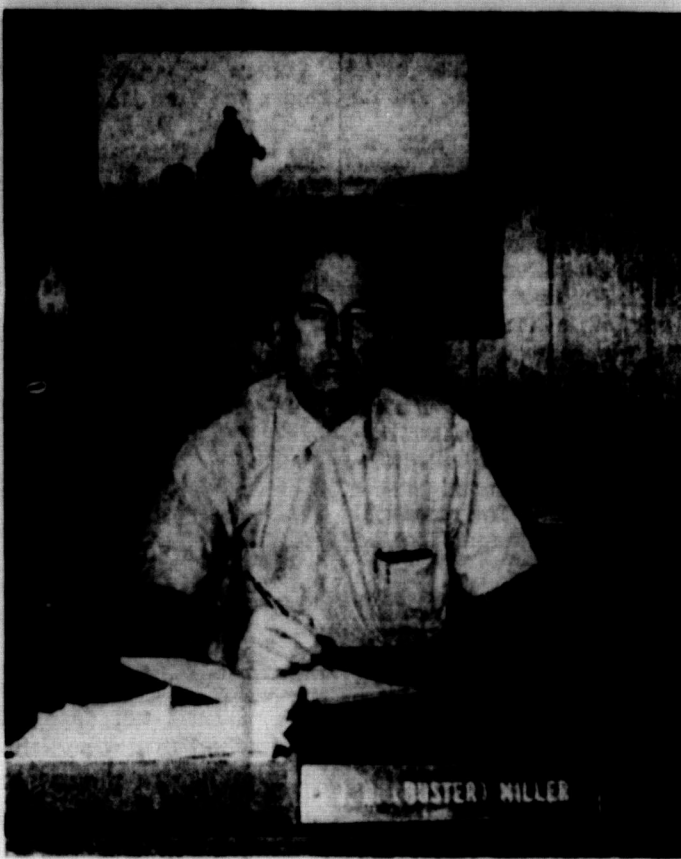
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## Drizzle Brings Little Moisture

The Golden Cranes scored two touchdowns on Lion fumbles and one on an interception to down the Lions 28-12 in a real thriller Friday night at Lion stadium. The game was much closer than the score and the difference was "no mistakes" on the part of Crane.

It was anybody's ballgame in the first half and it looked as if there would be an upset when the Lions took the lead in the second quarter. However, the Cranes came back to score just before halftime to take a 14-12 lead.

Crane scored in the first period when Ricky Andregg hit Tommy Jones for 40 yards and a touchdown. Jones kicked the extra point to give Crane a 7-0 lead. However, the Lions controlled the ball most of the first period and a fumble on the Crane 20 cost them a score.

The Lions roared back in the second period to score twice. Starting a drive on their own 48-yard line, Fleet Coates got loose for 40 yards to set up the first Lion score. A couple of plays later, he hit the middle for the score. The Lions tried to go ahead by passing for the two points, but failed. The next score came when Beto Vargas grabbed a Crane pass on the 45-yd. line and Rodney Pagan broke over for the score on the first play from scrimmage.

pany. Over \$1,500 worth of merchandise will be given in prizes during the three-day opening.

Drawings for prizes will be held every hour and a grand-prize drawing will be held each afternoon at 5 o'clock. Grand prizes include a set of Firestone tires, a McCulloch chain saw and a Yard-Man lawn mower. Guests may register every time they visit the store. J. B. Miller and his sons, Van and Mike, operate the business and have consolidated various business interests in the new building. However, they will still maintain two warehouses in another area of the town.

The Miller Co. has added Firestone products as a new line and the back of the building contains a complete car service department, with three competent service men on duty daily.

As wholesale dealers for John Bean Sprayer, servicing 120 dealers in an area including San Antonio, Odessa and El Paso, the upper floor contains a dealer meeting room, combined with a showroom. The room contains 3,300 square feet and is finished except for carpeting and furnishing.

In addition to Firestone products and the sprayers, the company carries a complete line of Ortho products, insecticides, plant food, etc. Yard man lawn mowers and gardening tools, and McCulloch chain saws.

The store will be one of the main outlets for Wyatt Fertilizers, a subsidiary of the company located in San Angelo. Miller purchased the 30-year-old company last year. Harry Truly manages the San Angelo plant.

Others features of the new building include a carpeted coffee lounge, just off the main showroom; three plush carpeted and paneled offices and a large warehouse off of the service department.

Miller built the Miller Shopping Center in the village, remodeled the old Church of Christ building on Ave. E for office rental space, remodeled the old Crockett Hotel, and has purchased and remodeled many older houses in the town.

### Seeks Young As Recruits Highway Patrol

Man Orvil Perry, of Ozona based patrol unit, said today that the Department of Public Safety is making a special effort to obtain qualified men for the position of patrolman with the Department.

Perry said, "All men between the ages of 20 and 30 who are in sound physical condition, have at least high school education, are intelligent, have vision of 20/40 or better, are at least 5 feet 8 inches tall, and have no criminal record should apply to him or any member of the Texas Department of Public Safety immediately."

There are four branches of the patrol for which men are being recruited — Driver License and Weight, Patrol and Motor Vehicle Inspection. Trainees assigned to the service which they are best suited to.

At the Academy, he receives a salary of \$500.00 a month while in training. He will be taught such subjects as Texas Highway Patrol, accident investigation, traffic, professional driving, and use of firearms, among other subjects. Benefits afforded patrolmen include: two weeks annual vacation; 12 or more days each year; 12 days sick leave each year; modern equipment; privileges and expense. DPS patrolmen are furnished all uniform and equipment necessary for performance of their duties.

Perry urged interested young men to get their application today and the examination before vacancies are filled.

**New Residents Must Vote In Clerk's Office**

Voters in the coming general election who moved into the county on or after May 5, 1968, must vote in the county clerk's office by November 1, according to information received from County Clerk Leta Powell.

Formerly, persons who moved from one county to another could not vote during the first six months after the change of residence, but a new law enacted last year now permits them to vote on all statewide offices, including President and Vice President, and on proposed constitutional amendments, but not on local offices and issues.

However, instead of voting at a regular polling place on election day, they must vote during a special time period in the county clerk's office in the county of their new residence. This period, which is the same as the period for absentee voting, began on October 16 and will end on November 1.

If the voter has lived in the same congressional, legislative, or judicial district for six months, he may also vote on that district office.

In order to vote, the person must be registered as a Texas voter for the 1968 voting year, and he should have his registration certificate with him when he applies for his ballot at the county clerk's office. However, if he has lost his certificate, he may vote after making an affidavit of its loss.

Zucchini Casserole

1 egg, slightly beaten  
1/2 cup pre-cooked rice  
1/4 cup water  
1 1/2 cups cottage cheese  
1 small onion, minced  
1 tsp. minced parsley  
1 tsp. salt  
few drops Tabasco sauce  
4 medium zucchini, cut into 1-inch slices  
1/2 cup grated parmesan cheese

1/2 pound bacon  
Mix egg, rice, water, cheese, onion, parsley, salt and Tabasco. Layer zucchini and cheese mixture in a shallow buttered baking dish. Sprinkle with parmesan cheese and cover dish with foil. West Texas Utilities Company, P. O. Box 841, Abilene, Texas has applied for an amendment to Permit No. 00961 from the Texas Water Quality Board regarding the discharge and retention of wastewater from its Crockett County generating station. The wastewater will be discharged from the plant lo-

cated adjacent to the Pecos River and approximately 1/2 mile north of U. S. Highway 67 in Section 11, Block 31, H. & T. C. R.R. Survey, Crockett County, Texas via three outlets.

Outlet No. 1, consisting of 37,300 gallons per day of water softener blowdown, filter backwash water, sump discharge, evaporator blowdown, water softener backwash and rinse, and boiler cleaner (20,000) gallons once every one to three years), will be retained in an evaporation pit just southeast of the plant.

Outlet No. 2, consisting of 7,200 gallons per day of septic tank effluent, will be discharged into a drainage field adjacent to the field.

Outlet No. 3, consisting of 864,000 gallons per day of cooling tower blowdown, will be discharged from the plant via a twelve inch pipe into the Pecos River adjacent to the West Texas Utilities Company property. A public hearing on this application will be held in the Auditorium of the Water Development Board, 301 West 2nd Street, Austin, Texas at 9:30 a. m. on November 19, 1968 to determine the conditions, if any, under which the permit may be granted. 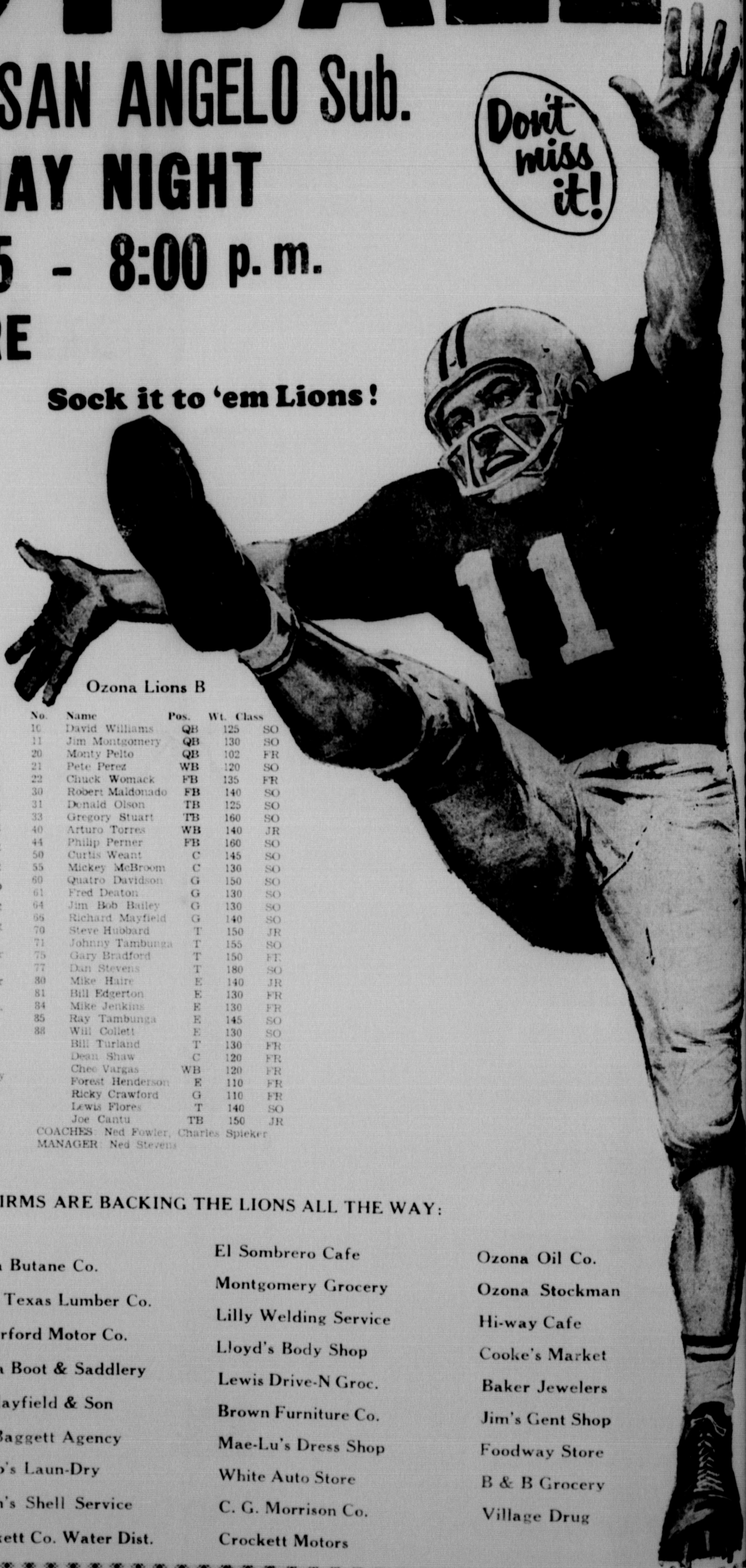

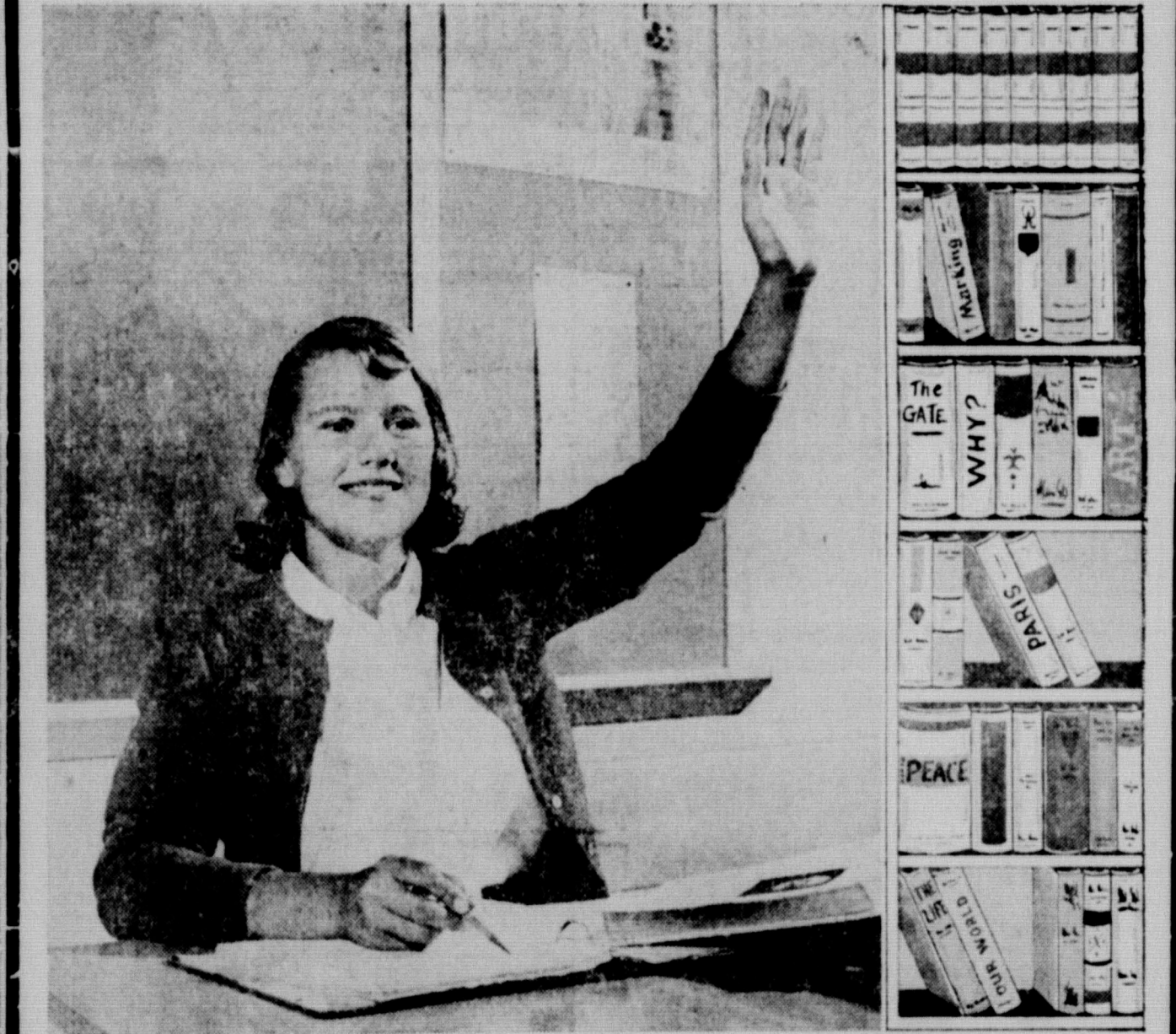

Another pass to Jones got the score and the kick was good, giving Crane a 21-12 lead. Ozona drove down to the Crane 30 and fumbled again. Crane set up their last score on two long runs, the first time they had been able to move on the ground. Andregg hit Pettit for a first down on the Lion 1-yd. line and Crane fullback L. V. Tension powered over for the score. Jones kicked the extra point and ended the scoring.

The Lion defense was outstanding and held the Cranes to 136 yards on the ground. They were very tough in the first half and batted down several Crane passes, which could have easily been turned into

scores for the Cranes.

Fleet Coates was the outstanding player for the Lions carrying the ball 32 times for a big 206 yards for a 6.4 average. He returned a kick-off for 55 yards, scored a touchdown and punted 4 times for a 29 yard average.

Rodney Pagan carried 16 times for 66 yards and a 4.1 average, caught one pass for 6 yards, scored for the Lions and returned a kick-off for 10 yards.

David Huff carried the ball one time for 11 yards, and completed 7 passes out of 16 for 54 yards. Carlos Sanchez carried 3 times for 4 yards, returned 2 kicked-offs for 43 yards and returned two punts for 20 yards. Beto Vargas carried once for 6 yards. Donald Huff caught 4 passes for 37 yards. David Pagan caught 2 passes for 11 yards.

Johnny Barbee headed up the defense with 17 tackles, followed by Tony Wheeler with 15.
