Information On Social Security

If you employ farm workers, either full time or part time, it is necessary that you keep sufficient records to meet the requirements for filing social security returns.

Any farm worker who works 20 or more days during a year for one farm employer must be reported for social security purposes if he was paid on a time basis such as by the hour, day or week. This is true without regard to the amount of wages paid.

Any farm worker who is paid cash wages of as much as \$150 during the year by one employer must also be reported for social security purposes without regard to the length of time worked. The farm employer is held responsible under this law for the total tax due which amounts to 7 1/4 percent of the cash wages paid.

He is authorized to withhold the employee portion which amounts to 3 1/2 percent from the wages paid to the worker. If he fails to do this and the farm worker meets either of the two tests above, he is still required to pay the full tax.

In order to comply with this law and not be unduly inconvenienced financially, a farm employer should withhold the social security tax from any wages paid part time employees as well as wages paid full time employees. If, at the end of the year, the worker was not paid as much as \$150 cash wages and did not meet the 20 day test, the amount withheld must be given to the employee from whom it was withheld.

It is necessary to have the name, address, and social security account number of all workers as well as a record of the time worked and the amount paid in order to comply with all of the requirements of the law. Such records can more readily be made when the individual is first employed.

The social security number should be copied from the worker's social security card. If he has no card, an application for such card can be secured from most post offices.

This form should be completed and directed to the nearest social security office. The postmaster can also furnish the proper address for mailing.

Sometimes a farmer will contract with a crew leader to furnish labor for a certain job. In such cases, the crew leader is generally considered the employer and responsible for the social security tax but it is necessary that the farm operator make a record of the name, address, and employer identification number

Telephone Firms Approve Merger

Common stockholders of The Southwestern States Telephone Company and California Water & Telephone Company today approved proposed mergers with General Telephone & Electronics Corporation. The balloting, which took place at special meetings in San Francisco, indicated that 90.4% and 90.3% of the respective companies' shares entitled to vote favored the proposals.

In New York, stockholders of General Telephone & Electronics Corporation also met today and approved the merger proposals.

On Friday, June 12, 1964, stockholders of two other companies, Western Utilities Corporation and West Coast Telephone Company, sanctioned the merger with General Telephone. Stockholders of the four affiliated San Francisco based companies will receive shares of General Telephone's common stock in exchange for their holdings.

It is expected that the mergers will become effective on June 30, 1964.

Austin. — A study of the recent party primaries and runoff elections reveals that the number of Republican candidates on the upcoming General Election ballot, in the grassroots area, will strengthen the ever-growing trend toward a complete two-party state.

For example, 18 Democratic nominees for sheriff will face Republican opponents in November.

Also, the Republican party is engaged in one county judge race (in Lubbock County); seven races for county attorney; two for county clerk; 12 for county tax assessor; two for county superintendent of schools; and 78 for county commissioner.

GOP also has candidates for most top posts and for more than half of the 150 House of Representative posts. In addition George Bush will carry the Republican banner in the U. S. Senate race against incumbent Democrat Ralph W. Yarborough.

WATER POLLUTION — Atty. Gen. Waggoner Carr's opinion committee on the oil-field-waste disposal question may postpone its decision meeting indefinitely now that Superior Oil Company has filed suit against the Texas Water Pollution Control Board, asking for a declaratory judgment against the agency.

A decision by former Atty. Gen. Will Wilson ruled that the board has jurisdiction over disposal of oilfield wastes under the Water Pollution Control Act passed by the 1961 Legislature.

Railroad Commission asked Carr to issue a new opinion after a group of oil companies raised strong objections to the board's regulatory actions. Superior's filing of the suit may change the picture entirely on any new opinion.

NATIONAL GUARD CONCERNED — Texas National Guard Association expressed concern over reports that U. S. Department of Defense would stop logistical support to the so-called

ed "reinforcing reserve."

These units, said NGAT, would provide a mobilization base on which the country would build its force in event of large-scale war.

Texas' 49th Armored and 36th Infantry divisions are both part of this "reinforcing reserve," as is the 90th Reserve Division.

RAILWAY AUTHORITY — U. S. Representative Henry B. Gonzalez has asked support from Governor Connally, Lt. Gov. Preston Smith and House Speaker Byron Tunnell on his recently introduced bill which aims at creating a multi-state railway authority for Texas, New Mexico, Arizona and California.

Gonzalez told them, "This is truly a states' rights program. States involved would jointly investigate and determine their own needs in the area of passenger rail transportation. He further stated that "In my judgment, passenger rail transportation has not been adequately developed and is not presently competitive with other modes of transportation — particularly in the Southwest."

FIRE INSURANCE — After July 1, it will be illegal for an insurance company to charge less than 6 percent interest per year on delayed premium payments for fire insurance, a new State Board of Insurance ruling decrees.

Several years ago, the board issued this same rule, but withdrew it when an objection was made by a company which charged no interest at all for deferred payments. An attorney general has held on two previous occasions that the board has no authority to set minimum interest rates on delayed payments, but Attorney General Carr has advised the board to take a new tack.

However, litigation is entirely possible on the part of insurers who would prefer to deviate from the ruling by charging less than the new minimum.

TRIAL PUBLICITY EXPLOR-

ED — Representatives of Texas' four major press associations met here with State Bar officials for the first of a series of discussions about news coverage of trials.

Texas Press Association, Texas Daily Newspaper Association, Texas Associated Press Managing Editors Association, and United Press International Managing Editors Association participated.

Talbot Rain of Dallas served as chairman of the panel.

Future conferences on the subject will be conducted for radio and television broadcasters and law enforcement officials.

COURT CASE ARGUED — The State of Texas has asked the Texas Supreme Court to reconsider its decision that the Sunday closing law does not prevent customers buying any article of merchandise on Sunday if they sign emergency certificates.

EMPLOYMENT PICTURE — Texas Employment Commission reports that in April total unemployment declined for the third straight month some 39,300 jobholders increased the employment total to 3,590,700.

Farm employment rose 17,800 to reach 300,700 by mid-April as seasonal workers were hired to plant a variety of row crops. This brought the total of seasonal workers to 105,800, or 3,500 more than at this time in 1963.

SHORT SNORTS — The State Board of Education voted to extend to one year the State's six-month program to combat school dropouts. Twenty-one of the 2,500 elderly persons who have signed up for "Texas 65" health insurance coverage so far this month are over age 90. Measles cases are four times more numerous than last year, State Health Department reported. A 25-member Texas AFL-CIO Committee on Job Safety, Compensation and Liability has held its first meeting. The committee will conduct a series of sessions to recommend changes in the state workmen's compensation and job safety laws.

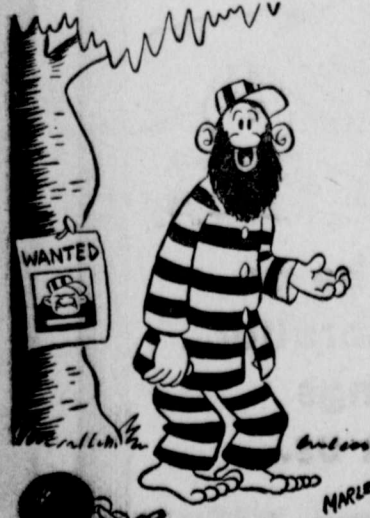

Ideas for Interiors

Wallcovering and Carpet Colors Provide "Color Lead"

Today we see a dramatic new color
 image in interior design. Brilliant
 dimensions of function and beauty
 created by adroit use of color in
 two major areas—the walls and
 floors. Imaginative styling, new
 designs, dimensions, textures and
 techniques in manufacturing have
 resulted in a whole new concept of
 wallcoverings and soft floor cover-
 ings, which help create the "ele-
 gant look" in today's home fur-
 nishings.

Where traditional design forms are
 used, they are as authentic as pos-
 sible. When modern or contem-
 porary designs are called for, they
 are good art. Consumers are shy-
 ing away from sloppy designs and
 questionable coloring—especially
 in home furnishings. They want
 good design and clear colors.

While wallpaper sets the mood or
 establishes the "feeling" of a room,
 the carpet or rug forms the founda-
 tion upon which all furniture
 and accessories are placed. Wall-
 paper and carpets or rugs are al-
 most always selected first by color,
 and then by pattern and/or tex-
 ture. If the wallpaper has a dra-
 matic or bold pattern or design, or
 a strong color ground, a solid rug
 or carpet usually is best. If the rug
 or carpet is to be the dominant
 color or design in the room, then
 the wallpaper selected should have
 texture or be a solid color, prefera-
 bly one in the rug design.

Wallpaper and carpet styles
 change more slowly than fashions,
 but change they do. Colors change
 much more readily than styles.
 Today the major interest in color
 centers around olive greens, deep
 golds, rich reds, russet, beautiful
 clear blues, and vibrant blue
 greens. Bronze and copper tones

are worthy of note. Beige tones
 are still strong but on the wane.
 Combinations of blues and greens
 are important in home furnishings.

Area or accent rugs because of
 their versatility and portability are
 often the choice for a rented apart-
 ment or home. Attractive and
 unique, area rugs reflect the own-
 er's individuality much as a paint-
 ing does.

Three fibers are used today in
 large quantity in carpets and rugs
 . . . wool, nylon and acrylics. Wool
 is the standard of comparison, and
 in proper construction, is durable,
 beautiful and relatively easy to
 maintain. Wool imparts a luxuri-
 ousness that no other carpet or rug
 fiber has yet achieved. Nylon is
 the strongest fiber used and spot
 cleans well. Acrylic carpets and
 rugs wear about the same as wool
 and spot clean easily.

Easy care of carpets and rugs, as
 of wallpaper, is an important "buy-
 word" especially for a home where
 youngsters' accidental spilling and
 spotting must be reckoned with.
 Washable wallpaper and easy-care
 carpets and rugs minimize redecor-
 ating problems because of ex-
 tended "wear-life."

Manufacturers who are members
 of the American Carpet Institute
 and the Wallpaper Council are
 continually striving to upgrade
 and upstyle design and quality in
 soft floor coverings and wallpa-
 per. Today, both the budget con-
 scious homemaker and the custom
 trade connoisseur can find attrac-
 tive and durable floor and wall-
 coverings to fit their taste and
 requirements.

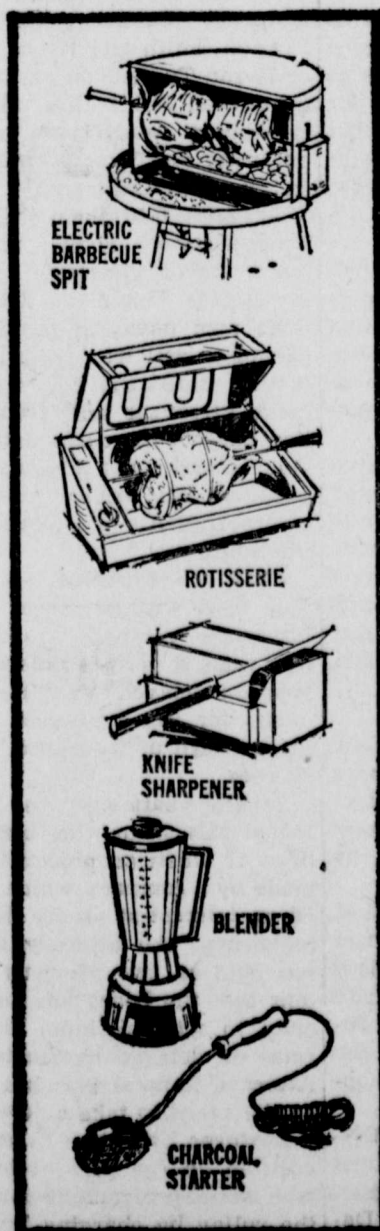

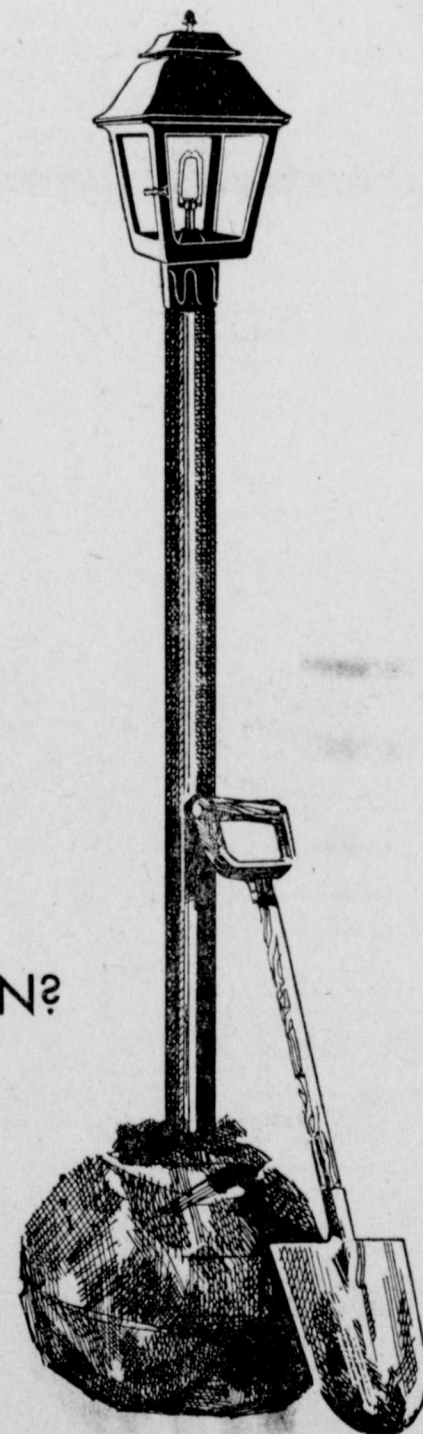
