WE WERE REMINDED this week of a proposal which we believe needs to be brought up again, and this time hopefully see some action taken toward its fruition.

We refer to the suggestion that 14th Street be extended eastward with a paved connection to the Cemetery Road. That way, the funeral procession traffic could be kept off Highway 60, or at least 90 per cent of it could be.

With such an extension, those attending funeral services at the churches north of Highway 60 would never have to have a procession which used the highway. And those funerals at the churches south of the highway could have their processions cross the highway, move to 14th Street, and then to the Cemetery Road, rather than tie up the highway for anything more than the cross traffic.

With the current construction project underway, the need for such an extension is even more evident, as well as the need to keep such traffic off the highway.

It's probably not possible to have a project move so swiftly, but wouldn't it be nice if details could be worked out, and the contractor on the Highway 60 project, just three blocks away, could do the work on an extra cost basis, so we'd have this and our widened highway completed at the same time?

Regardless of when it's accomplished, this is one of those projects which is a real need, and would be wise to have completed before we have a bad wreck involving a funeral procession, to make us think of "hind sight."

SPEAKING OF THE highway construction, it behooves city residents to take extra precaution from now until the highway is completed.

This pertains not only to those driving along the roadway itself, but drivers and residents living, for instance, on North Main Street, will have a much larger volume of traffic during the weeks to come, as city residents use these alternate streets in order to keep away from the highway.

Drivers need to be alert, since residents along these streets are not used to having traffic flow, and residents also need to be cautious when entering these streets, and urge their children to stay off the streets.

SOME OF OUR NEWER residents, who have moved to Friona around the first part of the summer, may have thought they had moved to a virtual desert, due to the prolonged drought.

Such residents were seeing their first appreciable rainfall Thursday evening when this column was being completed. Farmers have had to make virtually their entire crop via irrigation, and it has been a busy and expensive summer for them.

WHERE DID THE ROCKS, of which the Friona Woman's Clubhouse is constructed, come from? School Eyes Bond Issue, Renovation Of Buildings

The Friona School Board has voted to call a bond issue later this year for renovation of the junior high school building, the primary school, as well as improvements at the junior high auditorium and gymnasium.

A study is currently being made, to determine exactly what the board will seek to do, and what the cost, and bond issue amount will be.

For one thing, according to Superintendent of Schools Tom Jarboe, the school is short on classrooms in the lower grades.

"This is primarily due to the increase we have made in special education services. We have used the junior high study hall as a classroom in recent years. Also, when we went to full time kindergarten, this immediately called for two additional classrooms. We have been using the old Lakeview school building, (located behind the permanent facilities) for this purpose," Jarboe says.

The superintendent said that it appeared that there would need to be a fifth section added for the fourth grade by the 1981-82 school year, and an extra room for the fifth grade the following year, based on the size of the current third grade.

Included in the proposed renovation will be changing out all of the lights in the junior high and elementary buildings, which will provide (1) more light, and (2) more

efficient use of energy. The change to fluorescent lighting will pay for itself in four to five years, the school official says.

The proposal also calls for dropping the ceiling in the junior high school, completely rewiring the building, and adding insulation.

Addition of an air conditioning and heating system to the junior high auditorium, which also needs new drapes and stage curtains. A new floor and all new lights, windows and doors would be added to the junior high gym.

These proposals are the ones definitely being considered. In

addition, others under study would include:

(1) renovating the present junior high-grade school cafeteria into classrooms, and building an all-new cafeteria; (2) new lights and more insulation for the grade school building (newest building of the original school complex).

"The architect says that the junior high school building, built in 1931, is structurally sound, the foundation is good, and that renovation would be in order," Jarboe says.

The building was renovated in 1952, and some minor changes were made in 1962.

The school board made a tour of the school facilities recently, and passed judgement on them.

"We realize that due to the economic situation, this may not be a popular time to seek a bond issue.

But we have put off some of these needed repairs until the board felt we should go ahead and get them done, because prices can only continue to go up. Fortunately, the interest rate has dropped in recent months, and the board felt it would be wise to attempt a bond issue before the interest started on an upward trend once again," Jarboe said.

Also, the market for school bonds is the best at present than it has been for some time.

The school is in good shape from a debt standpoint. Its current debt will pay out in 1989.

While an estimate on the proposed bond issue is somewhat premature, Jarboe indicated that the renovation project could easily top the \$1.4 million figure which the Friona High School cost in 1964, due to inflation.

Tax Ratio Hike Due By School

The Friona Independent School District will increase its tax ratio roughly 29 per cent for the 1980-81 fiscal year, it was announced this week.

Inflation, which has called for an increase in teachers' salaries, and caused a hike in the school's cost of operation, was the chief factor in the increase, according to Superintendent Tom Jarboe and school board president Floyd Reeve.

The tax ratio will be raised from 61.5 cents per \$100 evaluation to 74 cents per \$100 evaluation.

As a sample of how the school's costs have risen, Reeve pointed out that at the start of the 1979-80 school year, the school's cost of gasoline for

buses and other vehicles was 72.6 cents per gallon. Nine months later, it had risen to \$1.014.

"Everyone knows what has happened in the past few years, if they are keeping track of their bills. Virtually everything has increased in cost," said Jarboe.

The increase will be the first actual tax hike by the school district in about five years. The taxable base properties were re-evaluated two years ago, but the actual tax was not raised.

"We have been absorbing this creeping inflation during the last few years, by dipping into the school's surplus, but this has been all but used up in this method," the superintendent said.

The proposed 1980-81 budget comes to \$2,564,398, it was pointed out, an increase from the budget of \$2,295,029 of last fiscal year.

The school board voted to give each teacher in the system a raise of \$500 per year. Although the state funds a certain portion of salaries, this amounts to only about eight per cent of local teaching salaries.

The school staff will remain virtually the same in numbers as the previous year, Jarboe said.

In addition, Friona Independent School District's pro-rata share of the expenditures in establishing the county tax appraisal office will be \$17,000. This is a new expense not previously budgeted by the school district.

Entries are currently being taken at the Chamber office for Maize Queens and Little Miss contestants. Deadline for entering girls in the contests is August 29.

Area Gets Some Rain

The Friona area received its first general rain of the summer this week, as moisture-laden clouds covered the area much of the week.

Thursday afternoon at about 4 p.m., and then again at 8 p.m. that evening, the city received good showers, amounting to a total of .62 inch. This was the most rain received at a single time since May.

A total of .22 inch had been measured in light amounts earlier in the week, to bring the total for the week and month of August to .84 inches. Of the earlier amount, the measurement early Thursday morning was .11 inch.

The moist spell also helped break the heat wave in the area, as high temperatures ranged from a "cool" 80 degrees on Thursday to 93 on Tuesday.

50 YEARS AGO--AUGUST 1, 1930

John H. Aldridge, Jr. was the winner in the county judge race in the Democratic primary last Saturday, with 759 votes to 529 for Clyde V. Goodwine. J.M.W. Alexander will succeed Judge D.H. Meade as commissioner in the Friona-Black precinct, winning by 250-214. There will be a runoff for county sheriff between W.D. (Bill) Kirk and A.D. (Bill) Hall. Lee Thompson was elected commissioner in the Farwell precinct. W.S. Menefee was re-elected in the Lazbuddie precinct.

40 YEARS AGO--AUGUST 2, 1940

In the Democratic primary last Saturday, David Moseley won the race for commissioner, precinct 1, over L.F. Lillard, 305-272. Charlie Lovelace and D.K. Roberts will meet in a runoff for county and district clerk. Roy B. Ezell won over two opponents, Robert Maddux and W.M. Lloyd, for county treasurer. Lee Thompson, Earl Booth and A.D. Smith were unopposed for county judge, sheriff and attorney, respectively.

35 YEARS AGO--AUGUST 3, 1945

In view of the long continued drought from which this territory has been suffering since last September, a serious feed shortage is one of the most apparent conditions with which

our farmers are now confronted. There will apparently be no cotton grown this year. Farmers had their soil in fine condition in the spring for planting row crops, but realizing the futility of planting before rain came, they simply waited for that rain, and are still waiting.

30 YEARS AGO--JULY 29, 1950

Over 1600 Parmer County voters went to the polls last Saturday in the Democratic primary. In county races, A.D. Smith held his office with 1015 votes to W.L. Edelman's 545. Henry Ivy unseated present Precinct 4 commissioner W.S. Menefee, with a 178-vote total to Menefee's 81. County voters followed the general pattern of other Panhandle counties, swinging to Mrs. Altawene Clark for Congress, Harold LaFont for state representative and E.A. Bills for district judge.

25 YEARS AGO--JULY 29, 1955

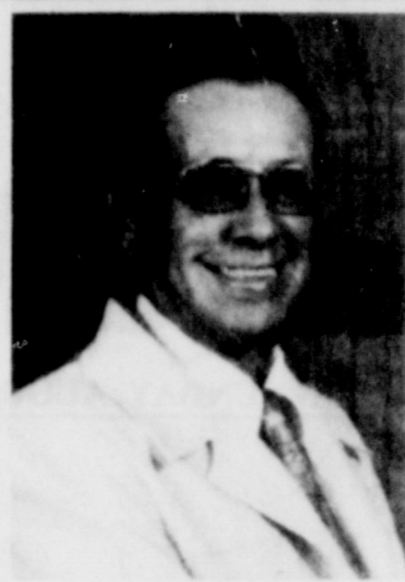

Burial was in Friona Cemetery under the direction of Parsons-Ellis Funeral Home.

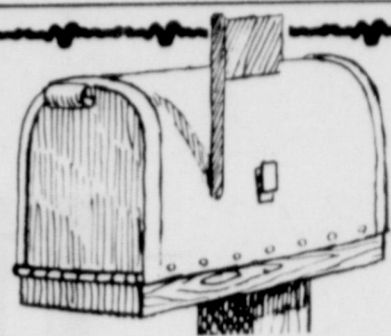

Parmer County Implement was defeated by both the Kool-Kats and Friona Fertilizer and were forced to settle for third place.

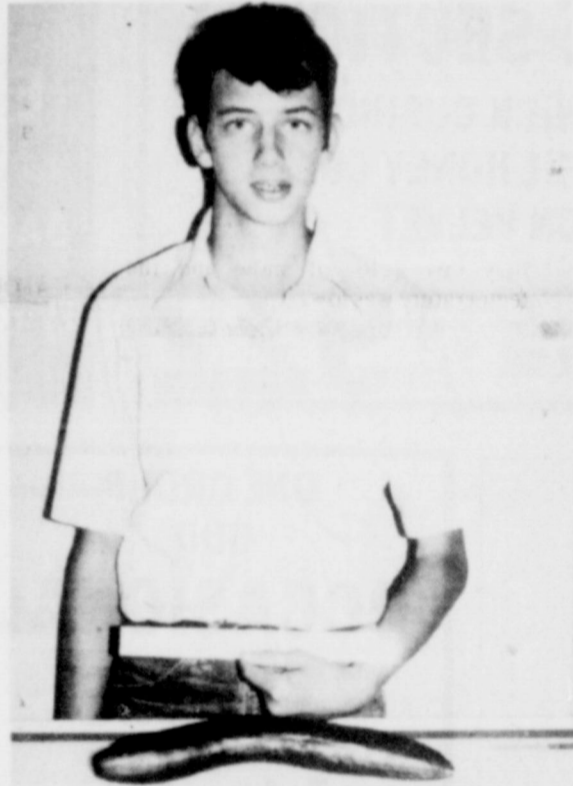

ORDINANCE No. 454

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING CITY ORDINANCES #87, 1 Dec '52; AND ORDINANCE #95, 2 Nov '53; and ORDINANCE #323, 3 Jan '61; AND ORDINANCE #343, 3 Jan '61; AND ORDINANCE #424, 7 July '69; PROVIDING FOR A NEW CONSUMER WATER RATE; ESTABLISHING A NEW WATER SERVICE DEPOSIT FEE; PROVIDING FOR A NEW WATER SERVICE TAP FEE; DOUBLING THE CONSUMER WATER RATE FOR CUSTOMERS OUTSIDE THE CORPORATE LIMITS OF THE CITY; PROVIDING PENALTIES IN ANY AMOUNT NOT TO EXCEED TWO HUNDRED (\$200.00) DOLLARS, AND ESTABLISHING AN EFFECTIVE DATE AFTER PUBLICATION.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE CITY COUNCIL OF THE CITY OF FRIONA, TEXAS:

SECTION 1. That Section 1 of Ordinance #424, 7 July, 1969, is hereby revoked, cancelled and rescinded and said section 1 shall henceforth read as follows:

Each water consumer shall put up a meter deposit at the city office in accordance with the following rates or schedule, to wit:

Renters of residential properties	-----	\$25.00
Leasees of Commercial properties	-----	\$50.00
Owners of residences or commercial property	- - -	No Deposit

The above deposits may be applied to the payment of any unpaid bills and when so used the deposits shall be restored to the original amount. Any unused portion of the deposit shall be refunded at any time the account or service is discontinued.

SECTION 2. That Section 2 of Ordinance #424, dated 7 July, 1969, is hereby revoked, cancelled and rescinded and said section 2 shall henceforth read as follows:

SECTION 3. A water tap fee is hereby established in the amount of One Hundred, Ten (\$110.00) Dollars for a standard 5/8"x3/4" inch sized service. The fee shall be payable with the building permit for a new installation and/or at the time of the request for service.

The charge for the installation of an oversized (larger than the standard size above) water service shall be the actual cost of the meter, parts, and labor for making the service.

SECTION 4. That from and after the publication and effective date of this Ordinance any person, firm, partnership, association of persons, or corporation, or any agent or employee thereof, who shall violate any of the rules, regulations or provisions of this ordinance, or any part of it or portion thereof, by any act either of omission or commission or cause the same to be done, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and upon conviction thereof shall be punished by a fine in any amount not exceeding \$200.00 for each and every such violation. Each violation or each part or any part of this Ordinance shall be and constitute a separate offense and where such violation is a continued act, each day such violation is continued, or permitted to continue shall be and does constitute a separate offense and be punishable accordingly.

SECTION 5. The effective date of this Ordinance shall be after its approval, publication thereof, and upon the 1st Day of October, 1980.

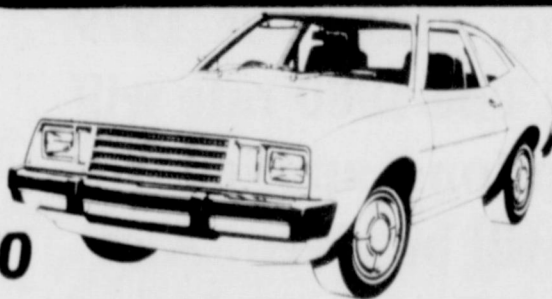

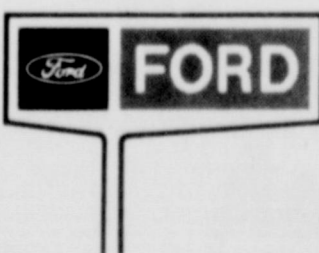

The Happy Homemaker

Most homemakers keep close tabs on family finances and seem to be finding it more and more difficult to keep from overspending whether we're buying groceries, clothing or other necessities.

We hear more and more about inflation and would like to do something about it, but really don't know how to go about it.

The following eight rules were designed by an insurance company, whose agents and employees in the United States are supporting the industry's anti-inflation program.

1. Join in the fight against waste...waste of private resources, waste in our defense program, waste wherever it occurs.
2. Buy only things that are essential. Let the non-essentials wait.
3. Make better use of the things you have...don't be a part of the throw-away economy.
4. Try to increase your savings. The capital thus formed helps to fight inflation.
5. Conserve energy: there are many ways to cut back and save.
6. Don't live on credit. Keep your spending within your income...just as you'd like the Federal government

to do.

7. Discuss your opinions on how to fight inflation with people you know and organizations to which you belong.

8. Let your elected officials know how you feel about inflation. Write them and vote.

There has been an adage with us a long time which says, "As goes the home, so goes the nation."

Perhaps it would be a good idea if homemakers everywhere joined in the fight against inflation and encouraged our friends and neighbors to do likewise.

For local homemakers, now is the ideal time to keep our food bills down by eating fresh produce from gardens and fields. Then, when we can, preserve, pickle and freeze the surplus, we will be helping out on winter food costs, too.

If your family enjoys casseroles, there are numerous recipes for tasty nutritious easy to fix dishes, which could be made early in the morning to avoid heating the kitchen later in the day.

The following recipes should make a nice addition to any collection.

Broccoli Casserole
12 oz. fresh broccoli
(or 10 oz. pkg. frozen)

6 eggs
1/2 cup milk
dash pepper
2 Tablespoons butter
1 can condensed cream of chicken soup
1 Tablespoon melted butter
1/2 cup cream style cottage cheese
1 Tablespoons flour
1/2 teaspoon dried oregano
(crushed or tarragon)
1/4 cup soft bread crumbs

Cut broccoli into spears, splitting stalks to flowerettes. Cook covered in boiling, salted water, just til tender. Drain. In 10x6x2" baking dish, arrange broccoli, stems toward center. Set aside. In blender or electric mixer, combine eggs, milk and pepper. Cover and blend well. In large skillet, heat 2 tablespoons butter and pour in egg mixture. Reduce heat to low and cook til set, but still glossy and moist, lifting and turning cooked portions with spatula. Spoon eggs on top of broccoli. In blender, combine soup, cottage cheese, flour and oregano. Cover and blend til smooth. Pour into small saucepan. Cook and stir til thickened and bubbly. Pour over eggs and broccoli. Combine bread crumbs and melted butter.

Sprinkle over top. Bake uncovered for 20 minutes in 350 degree oven.

Justine's Squash

1 1/2 lb. yellow squash, or zucchini
1 large sliced onion
dash pepper
1/4 teaspoon salt
dash pepper
1/2 lb. grated cheese
1/4 stick butter

Slice squash and cook in salted water until slightly underdone. (Do not cook til soft). Fill buttered casserole in layers of: sliced squash, raw onion rings, salt, pepper. Dot with butter and grated cheese. Repeat until casserole is filled, ending with cheese. Bake in 400 degree oven until it bubbles, about 15 to 20 minutes. Do not overbake.

Eggplant Casserole

2 medium eggplants, sliced and salted
6 Tablespoons oil
1 onion, chopped
2 tomatoes, peeled and chopped or
1 1/2 cups canned Italian style
2 cloves garlic, crushed
1 Tablespoon basil
dash black pepper
1 1/2 cups cooked ham, diced
1/2 lb. Mozzarella cheese, sliced
1/4 cup grated Parmesan cheese

Sprinkle eggplant slices with salt and let stand about 30 minutes to

draw out juices. Rinse and dry on paper towel. Brush with oil. Place on baking sheet and bake in moderate oven, 350 degrees, for 15 minutes. Turn over and brown the other side. In a skillet, fry onion in 2 tablespoons oil until soft. Add tomatoes, garlic, basil and seasoning. Simmer until thick, stirring occasionally. Add ham. In a casserole, layer the eggplant slices with Mozzarella cheese and the tomato mixture, ending with a layer of eggplant. Sprinkle top with Parmesan cheese and bake in 350 degree oven for 25 to 30 minutes, or until browned.

Tuna-Cashew Casserole With Chinese Noodles

1 six ounce can Chow Mein Noodles
2 seven ounce cans tuna
2 cans mushroom soup
1/2 cup cold water
1/2 cup milk
2 cups diced celery
1/4 cup diced onion
1/2 diced green pepper
1/4 cup pimento
8 oz. cashew nuts (optional)
Saute celery, onions and pepper in 2 tablespoons butter.
Mix other ingredients. Add to celery, onions and pepper and bake 20 minutes in 350 degree oven.

Tech To Have Women's Softball

Cynthia Carleton, assistant softball coach at the University of Oklahoma during the 1979-80 season, has been named head coach of a first-ever women's softball team at Texas Tech University, Women's Athletics Director Jeannine McHane announced Monday.

Carleton, one-time professional softball player for the Buffalo Bisons, attended Western Illinois University from 1972-76 and received the master's degree in physical education from the school this summer. Carleton, 26, is a native of Moline, Ill.

She served as assistant coach last season and helped guide the

University of Oklahoma's women's softball team to the AIAW Women's College World Series. The University of Oklahoma women's softball team was one of 16 teams to qualify for the national tournament, with a season record of 50 and 29.

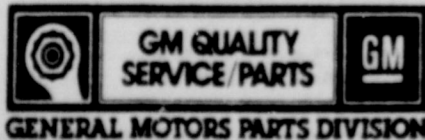

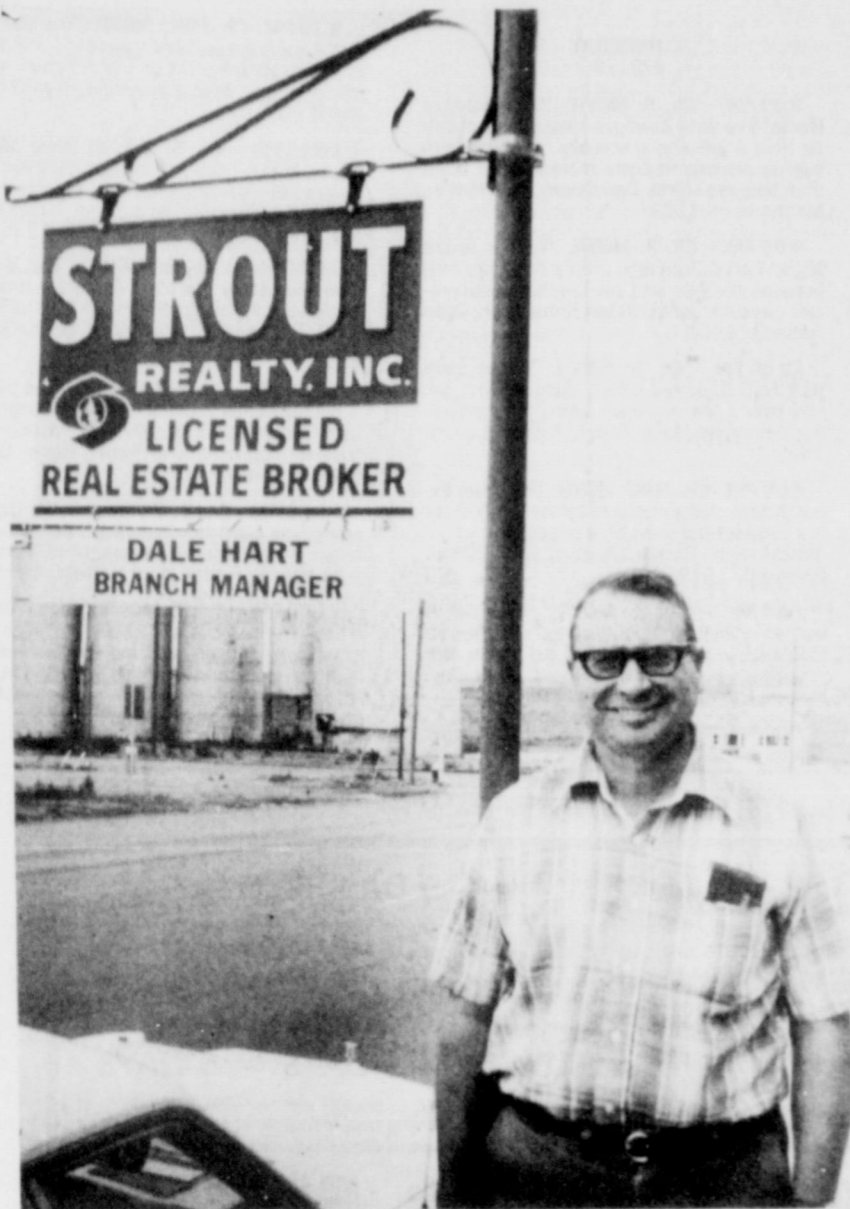

Around The Farm

Each year between June and September, Texas livestock producers can effectively control costly cattle grubs by applying livestock insecticides, says Seth Ralston, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

Grub control can be achieved with a variety of treatments which includes sprays, dips, pour-ons, spot-ons and feed mixes.

During late fall and winter, grubs appear on the backs of livestock. It's too late to begin control measures then since most of the damage has already been done.

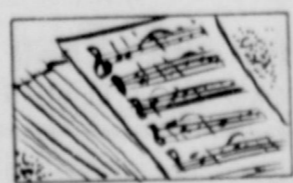
In addition to controlling cattle grubs, an insecticide used now will also provide contact control of horn flies for two to three weeks. Ralston says this makes the overall cost of treatment favorable.

Insecticides suggested for grub control include coumaphos (CO-Ral), cruformate (Ruelene), phosmet (Prolate), trichlorfon (Neguvon), famphur (warbex), fenitron (Tiguvon), and ronnel. Read and follow directions on the insecticide label before treatment. Cattle that are sick or under stress should not be treated.

The cattle grub is the larval stage of the heel fly. The adult fly has no mouth parts, so it causes no pain to the cattle. However, it frightens cattle, making them difficult to manage. Animals often seek relief by standing in shade or shallow water.

The life cycle begins when the heel fly lays its eggs on an animal. The eggs, glued to hairs, hatch within a few days, and larvae (worms) enter the skin at hair follicles. The immature stages then migrate through the animal's body for six to eight months and reappear in the animal's back in the fall and winter, forming knot-like marbles or cysts.

Cattle grub losses are affected in a variety of ways. Besides damaging meat and hides by their feeding activity, they lower beef cattle gains and reduce milk production throughout the year. Profit losses are estimated to cost the Texas cattle producers \$8-\$10 million each year.

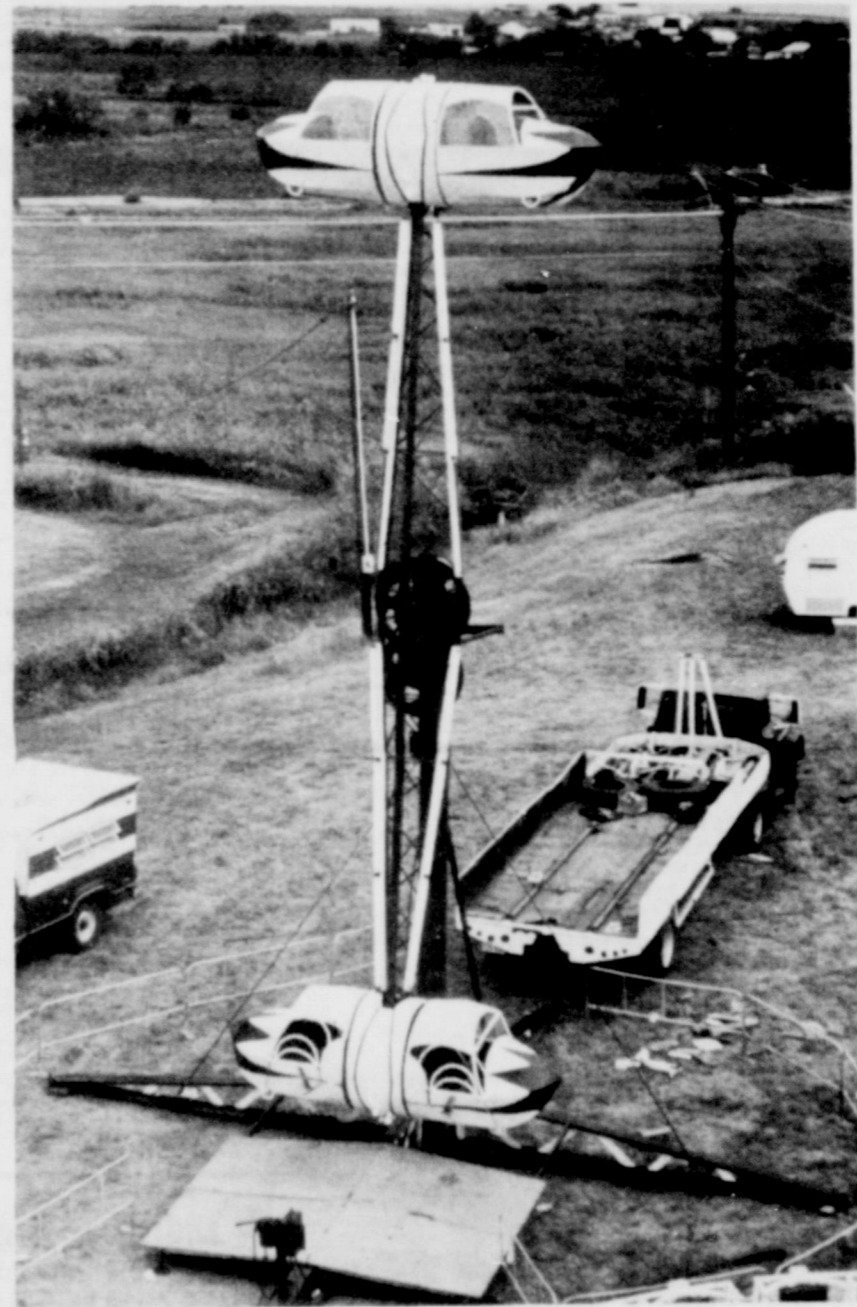

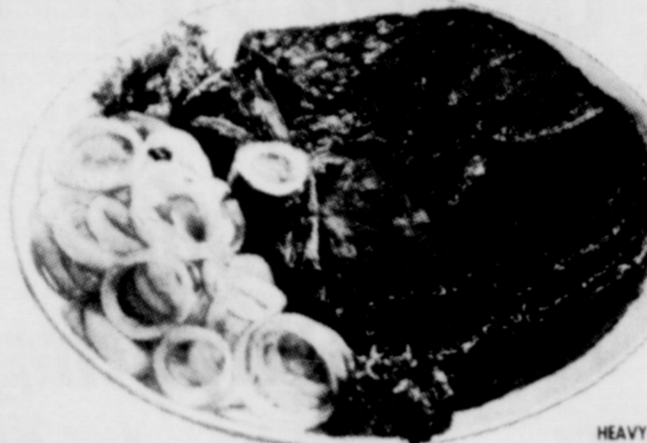
