### The Cause And Prevention Of Blackleg.

AN IMMENSE LOSS is sustained every year by owners of cattle from a disease called the blackleg. This loss is a mong young cattle. Much money and scientific investigation has been expended to find a remedy for this disease, with no pronounced success. Like all great discoveries they are made by some one who lives close to nature, rather than one who is a student of books, for books are sometimes misleading. Mr. W. H. Parks, a close observer and practical cattle raiser of Plemons, Texas, has written an article to a leading farm paper, in which he expresses the opinion and gives some practical experiments to show that the heel-fly causes the blackleg.

Having studied this trouble some fly for thirty years from nature, more than from books, I am prepared to endorse his opinion, which I wish to emphasize in this article and give my reasons for so believing.

In the first place we must be convinced of such a fly and know its true history before we can take intelligent steps to combat its ravages. Much to do, is being made about the tick and its eradication, which is all well enough, but the heel-fly is by far the most destructive pest. A tick remains on a cow for a few days while the larvae of the heel-fly remains under the hide of a cow for ten to twelve months. The tick is comparatively local, the heel-fly is universal. Hence ravages and losses from the heel-fly greatly exceeds that of the tick. These losses in a single year is estimated by the Year Book, issued by the U. S. Department of Agriculture for year 1912, to be more than \$173,000,000, from the heel-fly independent of any loss from the blackleg. This same article, however, found on page 388 of above issue, is very misleading in its life history of the heel-fly. It teaches that the fly lays eggs on the cow's hairs, which gets into the mouth when licking her self, where the grub hatches in the throat or stomach and bores through the muscles to its nest under the hide in the back. I will pay \$5 for every heel-fly egg laid on the hair of a cow and I made this offer fifteen years ago, but no one has claimed as much as a single \$5.00 yet. I must drop this discussion for want of space and go direct to the discussion of the blackleg and give my reasons for believing it is caused by the heel-fly.

First: As the tick causes the Texas fever, while another variety of tick causes a fatal disease to man known as spotted fever; the mosquito causes the yellow and the malarial fever, the rat or flea the bubonic plague; another species of fly scatters if it does not produce the Charbon, a disease similar to the blackleg, then is it far fetched or unreasonable to attribute the cause of the blackleg to the heel-fly?

Second: It is chiefly if not altogether, the early calves born before April 1st that die the next year with the blackleg. Calves that come after this date when the heel-flies opepedate little or none, are not affected with the blackleg. If those that die are skinned and examined, their backs will be found full of warbles or where warbles have been. Again they die at that date when the warbles are mature and at the most aggravating stage from December to March as a rule. If calves over the disease or is only partially affected it be

comes immune by second year. Hence old cattle never have the black leg.

Third: These warbles cause clotted blood and putrid matter to form around where they make their nest and while in a growing stage the warbles cause this as their food and keep it from entering the blood circulation. But when the warbles become mature and begin to crawl out of the back in great numbers in late winter and early spring, they leave behind masses of this clotted blood and putrid matter, which causes blood poison when nature endeavors to absorb and remove this putrid mass. If the effort is too great for nature to accomplish, the calf dies and we call it blackleg. I am so thoroughly convinced that the heel-fly brings on the blackleg, that I will unreservedly say that if every stockraiser will get the warbles out of the back of his cattle as soon as they begin to make their appearance during July, August and September, will never have another case of blackleg.

### ENTERTAINED.

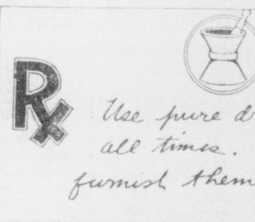
