## Southwestern Bell Seeks Rate Increase

Southwestern Bell has submitted a request to the Public Utility Commission (PUC) in Austin for a rate increase.

Announcement of the rate increase request was made locally by Jay Allen of Midland. Allen is public relations manager for the Mitchell County area.

He said currently the customer who is renting the cheapest available phone is paying \$8.40 a month and it is costing the company \$16 a month for the service. No mention was made of increased services available from the company.

If the rate increase is granted in full, the cost

will be \$13 monthly, an increase of \$4.60 across the board in Texas for all residential rates.

Business rate increases will be according to the rate group they are in added, Allen.

He said Southwestern Bell, in accordance with the rules of the PUC of Texas, has given notice of their intent to implement a new rate schedule in Texas that would become effective July 27 of this year, unless otherwise determined by the Commission.

Allen stated the requested rate schedule will furnish 13.4 percent increase in the companies intrastate revenues.

## New Ruling Has Little Effect On CISD Schools

The Federal Supreme Court passed a ruling that school systems had to accept illegal aliens. The ruling passed with a five to four vote count Tuesday, June 21.

CISD Superintendent Charlie Uselton said that he could only guess how it will affect the school system in Colorado City, but if past records were any indication, he noted, there shouldn't be any problems.

Uselton said there have been two or three incidents a school year, but they usually didn't stay long and there were

no problems. "I really don't know how the ruling will affect us at this time," he commented.

## Local Lake Full After Recent Rains

"For the first time in the history of Lake Champion, water has run over the service spillway. We're in the best shape water-wise that we've ever been in going into the summer," said Bruce Moore, production superintendent at TESCO.

Recent heavy rains have put the water level at 2.4 feet above the full mark. Tuesday's reading level at Lake Champion was 2085.4. The lake rose over 10 foot since Friday, June 18.

At Lake Colorado City, as of Tuesday morning, the lake was still shy of the full mark

by approximately three feet.

The reading previously was 2065.05 feet. The lake rose approximately two feet over the weekend to 2067.8 feet.

The rain gauge report from Loraine for Friday night and Saturday was 5.45, but north of Loraine, it was reported to have rained 7.0 inches.

Westbrook received 2.8 inches of rain over the weekend and Colorado City received 4.9 inches of rain north of Colorado City. R. B. Golden, Jr., reported that they got 5.5 inches of rainfall over the two-day period.

## Economic Disaster

# Storm Hits County

A vicious storm carrying frightening hail with wind and water damage hit Colorado City Friday afternoon and residents are still assessing the damage.

The storm was an economic disaster to Mitchell County farmers. "An estimated 50,000 acres of cotton was either damaged or destroyed," said ASCS executive director Don Stewart. This is about 70 percent of the total of 70,000-72,000 acres planted in the county.

A twister touched down on the Dee Boyd place in the Fairview Community, northwest of Colorado City. This twister was also reported by the National Weather Bureau and the tornado siren was sounded locally.

Damage was principally to some farm equipment and electricity and telephone lines in the area.

Rainfall amounts varied from about two and one-half inches at Spade

to seven inches on the Pete Andrews place south of Loraine. This rainfall brought added havoc to farms which were already soaked from previous rains.

Even farms which escaped hail damage were ravaged by the water which overran ditches and broke through ter-

aces and also silted up and damaged diversions.

Both SCS (Soil Conservation Service) and FmHA (Farmers Home Administration) offices estimated terrace loss at between 100 and 150 miles. David Marion, FmHA county supervisor, flew over the county

both Monday afternoon and Tuesday morning and released these preliminary figures:

-100-150 miles of terraces with major damage to the system.

-an area about 10 miles wide and 15-20 miles long, 150 square miles,

## City Officials Meet With Weather Service

Representatives of the National Weather Service in Abilene and Fort Worth were in Co-

lorado City Tuesday to meet with city officials and several weather spotters to organize a Self Help Flash Flood Program.

Abilene official in charge, Dave Harmon, said the new program was an extension of the present Severe Preparedness Program currently established in the city.

He said they were setting up staff gauges to establish rainfall reports for the new program in the county.

Rick Crowley, civil defense coordinator, was on hand for the meeting and was designated to locate ten persons all over the county to make official reports of rain gauge.

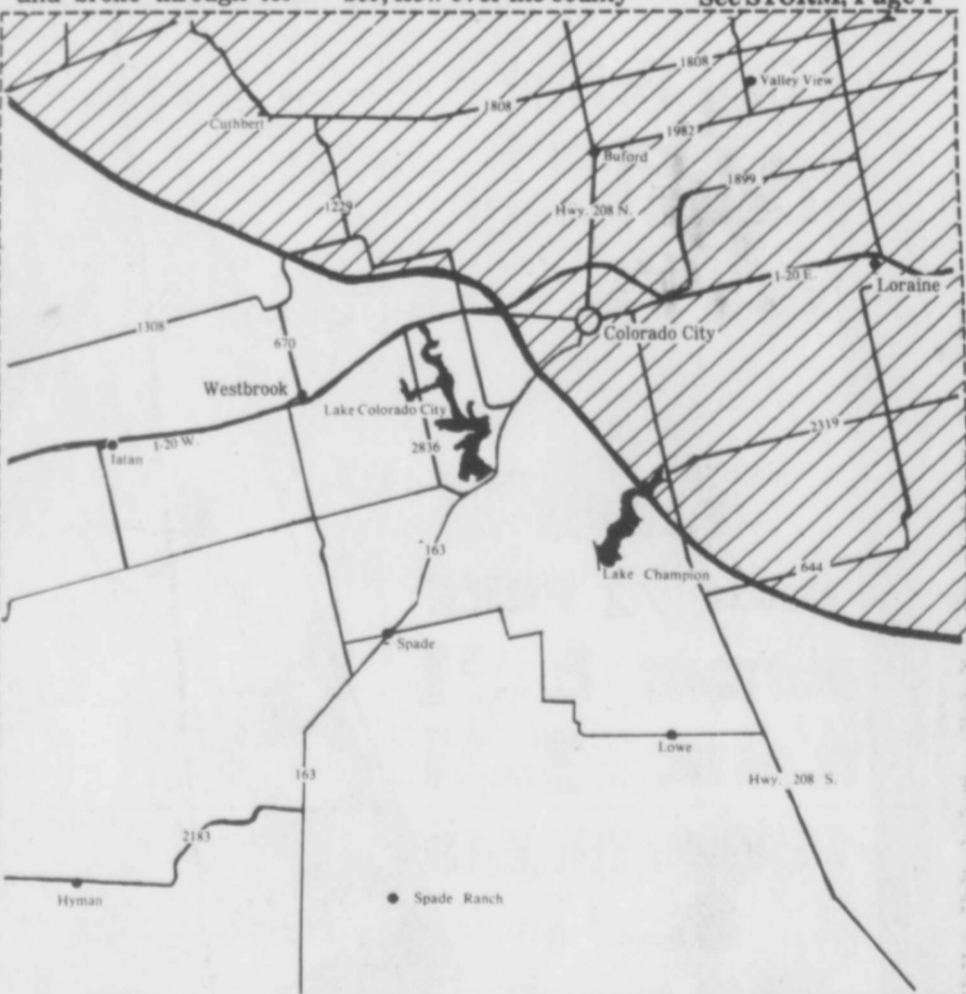
Harmon said that he would meet again with officials in July to examine the progress of the

new program.

Orland McCalip, service hydrologist from Fort Worth, noted that the "watch" alerts released were not issued from the Abilene office, but in fact were released from the National Severe Storm Center in Kansas City.

He said they released their information when their radars detected that all the ingredients were there for formulating of tornados or severe thunderstorms.

Harmon commented that the radar in Abilene was one of the best made, but it still could not detect everything. He said, "radar is a great human tool, but it does not replace the human eyes," in regards to the weather spotters in Mitchell County.

## Grand Jury Returns Eleven Indictments

The Grand Jury handed down nine indictments and two sealed indictments when court convened Friday. Two indictments on second offense DWIs, three drug related indictments, two counts of aggravated assault, one charge involving forgery and one case of burglary were handed down by the jury.

Dixie Rogers, 42 and Tammi Rogers, 18, both of 616 Locust, Colorado City, were indicted for delivery of marijuana, more than four ounces but less than five po-

unds. Also indicted on the same charges was Dean Wesley Pherigo, 22, of 404 N. First Street, Snyder. The charges stemmed from an incident occurring May 5.

Raymond Vasquez, 40, Box 164, Loraine, was indicted on two counts of aggravated assault with a deadly weapon. Manuel Vasquez, 41, Box 421, Loraine, was also indicted for aggravated assault, from an incident occurring May 20.

Stanley Lawrence Thomashide, 30, 3135 North Muskinggam, Odessa,

was indicted on DWI charges, his second offense. Also a second offender indicted on DWI charges was Ralph Eugene Evans, 54, Box 152, Colorado City.

David Oden, 22, Rt. 3 Box 206, Colorado City was indicted on charges of burglary to a vehicle from an incident occurring June 11.

An indictment on forgery charges was handed down on Welvin Edward Ross, 27, 1304 Oak, Colorado City. The incident occurred May 31.

## Re-zoning Plan Accepted By Planning & Zoning Committee

The Planning and Zoning committee Board of Colorado City met Monday night and approved a re-zoning plan presented to them by Jim Scott, owner of Jim's Trucktown Restaurant.

Scott received tentative approval to start plans on a mobile home

park in the area behind Trucktown. Scott proposes to build and landscape an area large enough for at least fifteen 14'x80' mobile homes. Scott also hopes to later on add facilities for overnight camping sites.

The re-zoned land is just north of Trucktown

within 200 yards of the housing project begun some time ago by Earl Hammond.

Hammond also was at the board meeting to explain to the board that he was not opposed to Scott's proposal if underground sewer lines were tied into city sewer lines.

Hammond said that "I'm all for it, if Mr. Scott will sign a deed restriction which states that the mobile home park will be landscaped and kept nice and clean."

Scott agreed to Hammond's proposal saying that "I'll sign one. I wouldn't want to start this in the first place if it wasn't going to be nice. There's no sense in wasting my money on a poor job. If it's done right, it'll be nice. I intend to do it that way."

Things are buzzing around Colorado City, as the count down stage begins with only one week to go until the annual AJRA Rodeo kicks off Wednesday night.

The rodeo performances will be held throughout Saturday, July 3 and will begin at 8 p.m., each night. Scott Stutzman will be the 1982 rodeo announcer.

"With so many farmers depending on All-Risk Crop Insurance, fair efficient loss adjustment is absolutely vital," Nunn declared.

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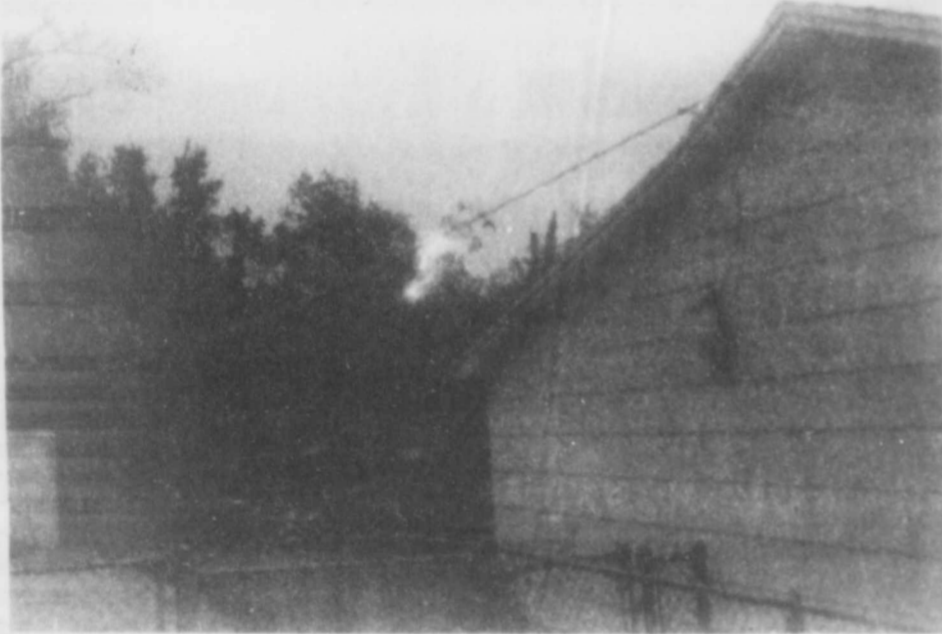

hit with bad hail damage.

-about 50 percent of between 60,000-70,000 acres damaged, about 30,000 acres.

-about 1,800 homes with roof damage.

-about 50 trailer houses damaged.

-one house in Loraine burned when struck by lightning.

Also, there were at least two calves killed. Linton Ray Webb of Loraine lost one when it was struck by lightning, Marion said. R. B. Golden, Jr., of the Buford area lost one three-month old calf killed by hail.

"I've been farming all my life and it's the worst hail damage I've ever seen," said Travis Turner, who farms in the Looney-Seven Wells area, right in the path of the worst damage.

For the first time in history, water ran over the spillway at Lake Champion. That lake is full but Lake Colorado City is about three feet from capacity. Water was still running into the lake from the Morgan Creek watershed which extends to the Big Spring area. Sand Springs was also hit with a deluge and hail and high winds Friday.

Richard Wichinski, in Colorado City with the Red Cross emergency services office, said that this has been a bad time for people and places to be hit with storms. He said he's been to disasters in Paris, Spur, Monahans, the flood at Wichita Falls and also Sand Springs.

The emergency office will close at 5 p.m. today. During the time it has been open to aid people with windows broken out from the hail who did not have insurance, Wichinski said that at least 25 families had been aided, and maybe more.

Colorado City schools were hard hit. Most damage was to Kelley and the Middle School as Superintendent Charlie Uselton said three-fourths of the windows on the north side of Kelley were knocked out, plus windows on the stair-

wells at Middle School. Also, many of the rooftop air conditioning units sustained damage.

Uselton said that roofs were to be appraised but the high school auditorium was in bad shape.

"Some of the roofs will have to be completely re-done," Uselton said.

Most of the damage in Colorado City was to roofs and from broken windows, with water coming in through the windows.

County Judge Bill Carter said that 17 windows were broken at the courthouse but no documents were ruined.

"We're waiting for an appraisal on the roof," he said.

Hospital business manager Ray Dillard said that the nursing home had seven windows broken but no roof damage. At the hospital, three windows were broken but did not fall out.

Dillard said that hail went through some air conditioner condensers and also that about six inches of water came through the doors in the

basement and flooded the carpets and surgery area. The flooding was due to stopped up drains from the tremendous amount of leaves and debris which built up from the hail.

Several families took shelter in the storm shelter at City Hall when the tornado siren was sounded. Also, the highway patrol, Sheriff's Office, city police and volunteer firemen were busy taking messages to people, getting people out of high-water areas, putting up blockades in flooded areas and trying to see that no one came in contact with any of the numerous power lines which were blown down.

Also, three people on Oak Street had to be helped from their cellar after a large tree blew down and trapped them inside.

One car was washed off the road near Buford with three people inside. They were aided by the volunteer firemen and others were also helped to cross the high-water

area where a diversion crossed the highway there. Jerry Hammond, Fire Chief, said that it was about four feet deep.

Hammond also said that there were two trailer houses and a house fire caused by the storm.

"One was because a pole blew down and two were hit by lightning," he said.

Colorado Country Club was badly damaged by the storm. The golf course was ruined by hail, trees blew down and large branches twisted off, plus damage to the cart sheds and buildings.

The golf tournament which was to be held over the weekend was cancelled with tentative plans to hold it later.

Donnie Phillips, member in charge of the course, said that he is presently following a plan set forth by the Midland greenskeeper to help the bent grass greens recover.

"They've been rolled and mowed and we'll

verticut them and re-sand and re-seed," Phillips said. "You really can't do much with this bent grass until cool weather. Fungus is the real danger now, and we're trying to do everything we can to keep fungus from hitting the greens."

He added that traffic is recommended on the greens to help smooth down and pack down the hail damaged places.

At Colorado City State Park, people might have been scared but they didn't have to worry about the hailstorm since the major effect there was from heavy rains. Lillian Mundy said the park was full of campers but there wasn't any damage from the storm.

"What hinders this, even if there's no rain, is that the terrace damage causes sandbars, a condition that keeps the farmers out of the fields because they can't get through them with their present day large tractors," Stewart explained.

## Larger Checks In Store For Veterans

More than 600,000 veterans and their survivors will be getting larger Veterans Administration pension checks on July 1—the result of a 7.4 percent increase in the government's cost of living index.

Some 1.9 million VA pensioners are affected in some way by the cost of living index.

Pensions are paid to veterans totally and permanently disabled from circumstances unrelated to their military service. They are paid also to survivors of veterans who are in need. Unlike compensation paid to those disabled because of military service, pensions are affected by income from other sources.

The 600,000 who will get increases in June (payable July 1) are those who are receiving benefits under the "improved" VA pension plan inaugurated by Congress in 1979. The plan links VA pension rates to adjustments in social security payments. Before the change, an individual's pension was subject to reduction each time social security increased.

Pensions for veterans and survivors under the "old plan" remain fixed and payable at the rates in effect in 1978.

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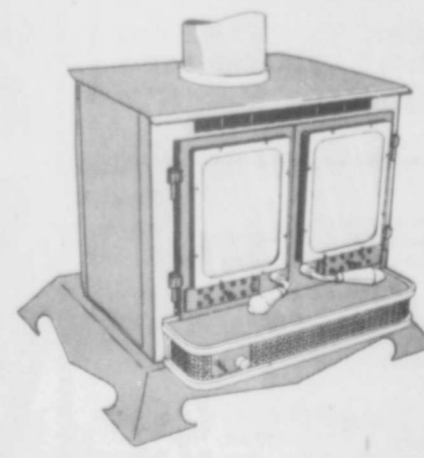

# T.P. Fowler Returns From C.M.E. Church Convention

T. P. Fowler returned recently from Memphis, Tennessee, where he spent ten days in attendance at the 30th General Conference of the Christian Methodist Episcopal (C.M.E.) Church. The C.M.E. Church is a predominantly black denomination, which was established in December, 1870 by the Methodist Episcopal Church South at the request of black members of the Methodist faith.

The church was known by its original name, "Colored Methodist Episcopal Church," until the 1954 General Conference when a resolution to remove the racial designation from the name of the C.M.E. Church was introduced and adopted. After submission to all of the annual conferences in the connection for consideration, the proposal received an affirmative vote of 94.5 percent. Since January 19, 1956, the date the name was officially changed to "Christian Methodist Episcopal Church," no

person has been excluded from participation in the C.M.E. Church on account of race, color or national origin.

Fowler's mother, Mrs. Eula Wallace Fowler Harris, a Colorado City native, was a member of the 1954 General Conference committee which introduced the proposal recommending changing the name of the church. Mrs. Harris, who earned a Master of Arts degree from Northwestern University, is a retired public school and college instructor. She is now president emeritus of the Women's Missionary Connection Council of the C.M.E. Church. In 1951 she was a delegate to the World Methodist Conference in Oxford, England. She is also co-author of a book on the history of C.M.E. Church.

For Fowler, the Memphis convention was his second in a two-month period. While visiting his cousin, Mrs. Vonceil Fowler Muse, earlier this year in Dallas, he

attended the 105th Annual Convention of the Texas & Southwestern Cattle Raisers Association. Although he has held individual TSCRA membership since 1948, Fowler and his cousin also represented the D. W. Wallace Estate, which has held TSCRA membership since the death of their grandfather, D. W. (80 John) Wallace in 1939. Wallace joined the Association about 1900.

Delegates to the C.M.E. General Conference in Memphis approved expansion measures that included erecting a new headquarters building in Memphis; winning 125,000 new members; and reaffirming their commitment to a proposed merger with the African Methodist Episcopal Zion Church in 1986.

# A checklist to help you save energy and money at home.

## Energy Conservation Practices

Electricity is costing more this summer mainly because the fuel to make it is costing more. The following low- or no-cost home conservation practices can help you save energy and money.

- Do not use air conditioner unless absolutely necessary.
- Keep your thermostat set no lower than 80° in the summer. Use ceiling or oscillating fans to circulate the air.
- Check your air conditioner filters each month to see if they need cleaning or changing. And make sure that the outside unit is free of grass, leaves and trash.
- When leaving home, turn off air conditioning. If away for two days or more, turn off water heater.
- If you have a dishwasher, set water heater to 140°; otherwise, set temperature to 120° or lower.
- Use scrap insulation to plug air leaks in attic, around fireplace dampers and window air conditioners.
- Repair water leaks in pipes and faucets, and seal air duct leaks.
- Use drapes, blinds, shades, awnings or plants to block sunlight.
- Try to minimize traffic through outside doors.
- Economize in the kitchen. Plan meals so several dishes can be cooked in the oven at the same time.
- Save when you do laundry. Wash and dry only full loads of clothes.

## Energy Conservation Measures

These home installations and modifications require an investment, but may return their cost to you in the form of savings on utility bills.

- Caulk and weatherstrip around doors and windows to reduce air leaks.
- Add insulation to ceilings, walls and floors.
- Insulate ducts, especially in the attic.
- Insulate hot water pipes in attic.
- Install insulation blankets on water heaters, especially in garage or basement.
- Investigate cost-effectiveness of storm doors and windows.
- Add solar-reflecting materials to doors and windows on east/west exposures.
- Install a clock thermostat to automatically set air conditioner and heating unit to desired temperature. Even when you're away from home, the clock thermostat can control your air conditioner for more economical operation.
- Investigate replacing your central air conditioner, especially if unit is more than five years old, with a new unit that has a Seasonal Energy Efficiency Rating (SEER) of at least 8.5.

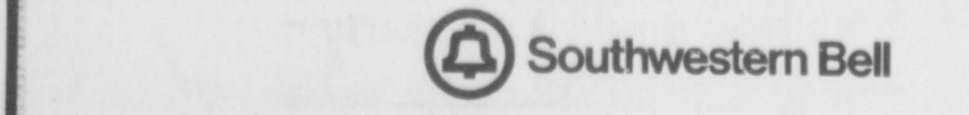
