Prairiland CISD Begins Fall Term Monday, Aug. 21

School started Monday but it will probably be two weeks before classes will move into the convenient and attractive new air-conditioned structure. Furnishings are being put in place. Austin. — For the first time in three years, the number of Texas families with dependent children on welfare rolls declined last month.

There are 1,555 fewer AFDC recipients than a month before, the State Department of Public Welfare reported.

Welfare Commissioner Raymond W. Vowell attributed the reversal to a number of factors, including tighter controls on AFDC program eligibility, vocational training and expanded day care programs to help mothers get to work.

The decline was the first in AFDC caseload since July, 1969. Dropoff was from 447,967 recipients to 446,412.

A steady increase in recent years has been attributed to liberalized eligibility standards as ordered by federal courts and altered federal regulations. In late 1970 and early 1971, AFDC rolls swelled at a rate of 10,000 to 12,000 recipients a month. Growth slowed significantly in recent months.

Vowell directed caseworkers to return to the practice of holding personal interviews with AFDC applicants and recipients, verifying income, child support, domicile, household composition, and other factors affecting eligibility and the amount of assistance granted.

A massive recertification effort also has been ordered by which AFDC cases are being checked individually to determine whether a family situation has changed so as to affect the monthly assistance payment. A new policy also has been instituted requiring applicants to provide documentary evidence of child eligibility by birth or baptismal certificate or hospital record.

Fraud detection efforts have been stepped up, and 130 of 205 suspected cases have been referred to local prosecutors or grand juries.

PWD REORGANIZED — A far-reaching reshuffling of Parks and Wildlife Department divisions was ordered by new Executive Director Clayton T. Garrison. Garrison named six new directors to head statewide divisions under a new structure.

The new directors are James E. Dickinson, 30, finance; Stetson G. Reed, 39, law enforcement; Robert J. Kemp Jr., 46, fish and wildlife; Paul E. Schlimper, 32, parks; Clayton G. Rutter, 38, engineering; and Bobby E. Bradley, 37, administration. Richard A. McCune will remain as director of information and education.

Garrison said the reorganization is a "move to get back to the basic responsibilities of the department." Each of the six new divisions will be the headquarters unit for administration of all field activities. PWD personnel will report to appropriate directors and divisions in Austin.

HIGHWAY CONTEST FINALISTS NAMED — Five State Highway Department foremen and construction supervisors are finalists for this year's Lady Bird Johnson award for highway beautification work.

They are Milton C. Campbell of Ralls, Cullen Luttrell of Sonora, Herbert H. Smith of Rusk, Melvin E. Bayless of LaGrange, and Rinaldo Rivera of Falfurrias.

Mrs. Johnson will make the awards October 11 at the Lyndon B. Johnson State Park near Stonewall. First-place winner will receive a cash award of \$1,000, and the runnerup will get \$500. An additional award of \$500 will go to the newspaper writer who does the best job on highway beautification coverage, and an identical prize will go to the best radio-television effort in the field.

OFFICERS CREDITED — Additional auto insurance reductions may result from intensive law enforcement efforts that curb accidents, Southwestern Insurance Information Service said recently.

On the other hand, if enforcement efforts slacken and accident frequency rises, benefits of the recent 11 per cent rate cut (effective September 1) will be lost, the association said.

Police chiefs and sheriffs received a special commendation from the insurance group for efforts to reduce accidents last year — and a request that they continue to concentrate on speeders, drunk drivers, and those without proper licenses.

HIRING COMPLAINTS AIDED — Texas state agencies were warned they don't have enough minority group employees.

Dr. Luther Holcomb, federal Equal Employment Opportunities Commission vice chairman, briefed the agencies on legislation making state governments subject to anti-discrimination regulations.

Six of the state agencies already face hiring complaints under the new law. Practices found discriminatory include asking of questions on job applications about race, religion, or arrest record, use of standardized tests, requirement of a high school diploma and insisting on photographs of job applicants.

RETIRED TEACHERS WANT BREAK — Changes in the teacher retirement system are being requested by retired school personnel who claim their benefits are meager or token.

The retired teachers want benefits raised to the standard provided in 1971 legislation — based on the best five-year average and boosting the percentage factor. An example was cited of a teacher with 29 years' service who gets \$189 a month after retirement seven years ago. A teacher who retired last year with 19 years' service, under the example quoted, draws \$245 a month.

Humble Oil Co. Fireflooding At Talco Field

An experimental tertiary recovery project, using a method known as fireflooding, has been initiated by Humble Oil & Refining Company's Tyler Production District in the Talco Field located in northwestern Titus and northeastern Franklin counties, Texas.

An article in the August issue of the employee publication HUMBLE NEWS refers to the "in situ combustion" pilot project as the third stage in a program to coax extra barrels of "lost oil" out of a reluctant reservoir. As U. S. oil reserves continue to decline, getting part of the 70 percent of the oil that, on the average, is left in place in a reservoir is becoming an urgent need.

After initial production volume had fallen off drastically, the present test site at Talco was waterflooded in 1967 and production increased. It is hoped the fireflood will result in even more reserves being recovered.

Phase one of the fireflood project began the first week of July when a 350-horsepower compressor started pumping 200,000 cubic feet of air per day at 500 pounds pressure per square inch into an injection well which is surrounded by six production wells.

Spontaneous combustion should have taken place about three weeks later when just the right mixture of oxygen, fuel, temperature and pressure occurred.

The firefront, slow - moving bank of heat, breaks the heavy crude into lighter liquids that will flow through the porous rocks. The air pressure keeps the fire banked and slowly pushes the oil ahead to the production wells. A production response is expected in about two months. Direction and efficiency of the firefront is tested by measuring gases, oxygen and carbon dioxide, as well as the oil and water that come out of each well.

Phase two of the project calls for injection of air and water into the input well, either simultaneously or alternately. Heat from the firefront will turn the water to steam, which is a very efficient recovery element. Pure steamflooding is not feasible at Talco due to the 4,200 feet depth of the Paluxy reservoir, although it has proved quite effective in shallower sands on the West Coast.

By the end of 1970, the amount of oil discovered and documented in the U. S. was about 425 billion barrels in place. Using present recovery techniques, 293 billion barrels will be left in the ground. However, studies indicate that two-thirds of this "lost" oil is in producing areas generally favorable to tertiary recovery methods. However, the research required to perfect such advance methods will be expensive and slow.

Success of Humble's experimental thermal recovery project at Talco will not be determined until the latter part of 1973.

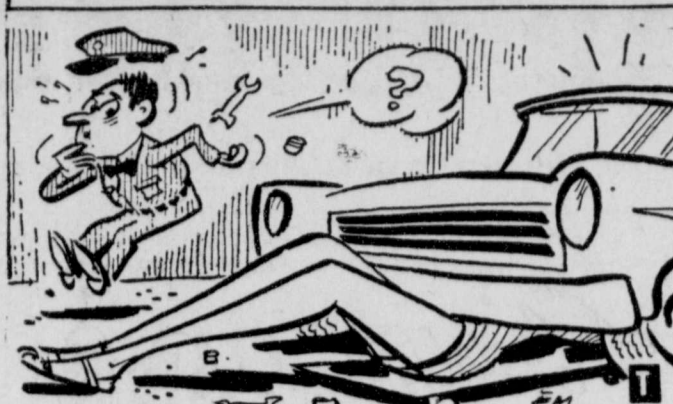

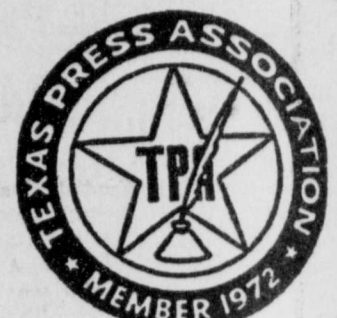

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER 6 ON THE BALLOT (SJR. 7)
General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article VIII, Section 1-b, of the Texas Constitution, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 1-b. (a) Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) of the assessed taxable value of all residence homesteads as now defined by law shall be exempt from all taxation for all State purposes.

"(b) From and after January 1, 1973, the governing body of any county, city, town, school district, or other political subdivision of the State may exempt by its own action not less than Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) of the assessed value of residence homesteads of persons sixty-five (65) years of age or older from all ad valorem taxes thereafter levied by the political subdivision. As an alternative, upon receipt of a petition signed by twenty percent (20%) of the voters who voted in the last preceding election held by the political subdivision, the governing body of the subdivision shall call an election to determine by majority vote whether an amount not less than Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) as provided in the petition, of the assessed value of residence

homesteads of persons sixty-five (65) years of age or over shall be exempt from ad valorem taxes thereafter levied by the political subdivision. Where any ad valorem tax has theretofore been pledged for the payment of any debt, the taxing officers of the political subdivision shall have authority to continue to levy and collect the tax against the homesteaded property at the same rate as the tax so pledged until the debt is discharged, if the cessation of the levy would impair the obligation of the contract by which the debt was created."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment providing that the various political subdivisions of the State may exempt not less than Three Thousand Dollars (\$3,000) of the value of residence homesteads of all persons sixty-five (65) years of age or older from ad valorem taxes under certain conditions."

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER 12 ON THE BALLOT (SJR. 29)
General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article XVI, Section 33, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 33. The accounting officers in this State shall neither draw nor pay a warrant or check on funds of the State of Texas, whether in the treasury or otherwise, to any person for salary or compensation who holds at the same time more than one civil office of emolument, in violation of Section 40."

Sec. 2. That Article XVI, Section 40, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 40. No person shall hold or exercise at the same time, more than one civil office of emolument, except that of Justice of the Peace, County Commissioner, Notary Public, National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States and enlisted men of the National Guard, the National Guard Reserve, and the Organized Reserves of the United States Army, Air Force, Navy, Marine Corps, and Coast Guard, and retired warrant officers, and retired enlisted men of the United States Army, Air Force, Navy, Marine Corps, and Coast Guard, and the officers and directors of soil and water conservation districts, or otherwise specially provided herein. Provided, that nothing in this Constitution shall be construed to prohibit an officer or enlisted man of the National Guard, and the National Guard Reserve, or an officer in the Officers Reserve Corps of the United States, or an enlisted man in the Organized Reserves of the United States, or retired officers of the United States Army, Air Force, Navy, Marine Corps, and Coast Guard, and retired warrant officers, and retired enlisted men of the United States Army, Air Force, Navy, Marine Corps, and Coast Guard, and officers of the

State soil and water conservation districts, from holding at the same time either office or position of honor, trust or profit, under this State or the United States, or from voting at any election, general, special or primary in this State when otherwise qualified. State employees or other individuals who receive all or part of their compensation either directly or indirectly from funds of the State of Texas and who are not State officers, shall not be barred from serving as members of the governing bodies of school districts, cities, towns, or other local governmental districts; provided, however, that such State employees or other individuals shall receive no salary for serving as members of such governing bodies. It is further provided that a non-elective State officer may hold other non-elective offices under the State or the United States, if the other office is of benefit to the State of Texas or is required by the State or Federal law, and there is no conflict with the original office for which he receives salary or compensation. No member of the Legislature of this State may hold any other office or position of profit under this State, or the United States, except as a notary public if qualified by law."

Sec. 3. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballot shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment permitting State employees, who are not State officers, to serve as members of the governing bodies of school districts, cities, towns, or other local governmental districts, without forfeiting their State salary, and specifying exceptions to the constitutional prohibition against payment of State funds for compensation to any person who holds more than one civil office of emolument."

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER 8 ON THE BALLOT (SJR. 1)
General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article IV, Section 4, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 4. The Governor elected at the general election in 1974, and thereafter, shall be installed on the first Tuesday after the organization of the Legislature, or as soon thereafter as practicable, and shall hold his office for the term of four years, or until his successor shall be duly installed. He shall be at least thirty years of age, a citizen of the United States, and shall have resided in this State at least five years immediately preceding his election."

Sec. 2. That Article IV, Section 22, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 22. The Attorney General elected at the general election in 1974, and thereafter, shall hold office for four years and until his successor is duly qualified. He shall represent the State in all suits and pleas in the Supreme Court of the State in which the State may be a party, and shall especially inquire into the charter rights of all private corporations, and from time to time, in the name of the State, take such action in the courts as may be proper and necessary to prevent any private corporation from exercising any power or demanding or collecting any species of taxes, tolls, freight or wharfage not authorized by law. He shall, whenever sufficient cause exists, seek a judicial forfeiture of such charters, unless otherwise expressly directed by law, and give legal advice in writing to the Governor and other executive officers, when requested by them, and perform such other duties as may be required by law. He shall reside at the seat of government during his continuance in office.

He shall receive for his services an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature."

Sec. 3. That Article IV, Section 23, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended to read as follows:

"Section 23. The Comptroller of Public Accounts, the Treasurer, the Commissioner of the General Land Office, and any statutory state officer who is elected by the electorate of Texas at large, unless a term of office is otherwise specifically provided in this Constitution, shall each hold office for the term of four years and until his successor is qualified. The four-year term applies to those officers who are elected at the general election in 1974 or thereafter. Each shall receive an annual salary in an amount to be fixed by the Legislature; reside at the Capital of the State during his continuance in office, and perform such duties as are or may be required by law. They and the Secretary of State shall not receive to their own use any fees, costs or perquisites of office. All fees that may be payable by law for any service performed by any officer specified in this section or in his office, shall be paid, when received, into the State Treasury."

Sec. 4. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this State at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment to provide a four-year term of office for the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Attorney General, Comptroller of Public Accounts, Treasurer, Commissioner of the General Land Office, Secretary of State, and certain statutory State officers."

PUBLIC NOTICE

Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT
NUMBER 4 ON THE BALLOT (HJR. 61)
General Election November 7, 1972

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Article XVII, Constitution of the State of Texas, be amended by adding a Section 2 to read as follows:

"Section 2. (a) When the Legislature convenes in regular session in January, 1973, it shall provide by concurrent resolution for the establishment of a constitutional revision commission. The legislature shall appropriate money to provide an adequate staff, office space, equipment, and supplies for the commission.

"(b) The commission shall study the need for constitutional change and shall report its recommendations to the members of the legislature not later than November 1, 1973.

"(c) The members of the 63rd Legislature shall be convened as a constitutional convention at noon on the second Tuesday in January, 1974. The lieutenant governor shall preside until a chairman of the convention is elected. The convention shall elect other officers it deems necessary, adopt temporary and permanent rules, and publish a journal of its proceedings. A person elected to fill a vacancy in the 63rd Legislature before dissolution of the convention becomes a member of the convention on taking office as a member of the legislature.

"(d) Members of the convention shall receive compensation, mileage, per diem as determined by a five member committee, to be composed of the Governor, Lieutenant Governor, Speaker of the House, Chief Justice of the Supreme Court, and Chief Justice of the Court of Criminal Appeals. This shall not be held in conflict with Article XVI, Section 33 of the Texas Constitution. The convention may provide for the expenses of its members and for the employment of a staff for the convention, and for these purposes may by resolution appropriate money from the general revenue fund of the state treasury. Warrants

shall be drawn pursuant to vouchers signed by the chairman or by a person authorized by him in writing to sign them.

"(e) The convention, by resolution adopted on the vote of at least two-thirds of its members, may submit for a vote of the qualified electors of this state a new constitution which may contain alternative articles or sections, or may submit revisions of the existing constitution which may contain alternative articles or sections. Each resolution shall specify the date of the election, the form of the ballots, and the method of publicizing the proposals to be voted on. To be adopted, each proposal must receive the favorable vote of the majority of those voting on the proposal. The conduct of the election, the canvassing of the votes, and the reporting of the returns shall be as provided for elections under Section 1 of this article.

"(f) The convention may be dissolved by resolution adopted on the vote of at least two-thirds of its members; but it is automatically dissolved at 11:59 p.m. on May 31, 1974, unless its duration is extended for a period not to exceed 60 days by resolution adopted on the vote of at least two-thirds of its members.

"(g) The Bill of Rights of the present Texas Constitution shall be retained in full."

Sec. 2. The foregoing constitutional amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, 1972, at which election the ballots shall be printed to provide for voting for or against the proposition: "The constitutional amendment providing for a constitutional revision commission which precedes the convening of the members of the 63rd Legislature as a constitutional convention in January, 1974, for the purpose of submitting to the voters a new constitution or revisions of the existing state constitution."
