Former Governor Makes Statement On Prison Views

Would Pardon About 2,000 Convicts On Records And Good Behavior Then Fix Up Penn Buildings

Is Not Hankering

Moody's Election Branded As "Mistake Of Sending Boy To Mill" By Impached State Executive

(By Associated Press) AUSTIN, Oct. 22.—Hunting that he might become a candidate for governor next year, former governor James E. Ferguson declared in a statement today that should be chosen chief executive, he would spend \$500,000 "fixing up" the penitentiary buildings at Huntsville and pardon "about 2,000 of the convicts for good records and good behavior."

He declared that "from many parts of the state my wife and I are getting many letters suggesting that one of us announce for governor." However, he does not mention his wife, Mrs. Miriam A. Ferguson, former governor also, after that, but details a platform he would adopt if he should run for governor.

"I am not hankering, but I am willing, if the people want me," he said.

Touching on the penitentiary problem, he said: "If you select me governor, instead of talking about selling the farms and building \$8,000,000 worth of

Robbers Get Haul In Amherst Depot

Articles Awaiting Delivery Taken By Bandits After Forcing Warehouse Locks For Entrance To Building

Officers were securing the South Plains yesterday and last night, for robbers who Sunday night, broke into the Santa Fe depot at Amherst and escaped with \$12.48 in cash, together with several articles awaiting delivery, according to information received here.

Gaining entrance by forcing the locks on the warehouse and ticket office doors, the bandits ransacked the building, taking everything they considered of value and leaving other articles.

The safe yielded \$9.41 in cash of freight, and passenger money while \$2.97 cash was included representing express receipts.

Other loot included six cartons of cigarettes, property of the M. S. System store; a ladies' coat, valued at \$16, belonging to L. J. Grimes; an automobile battery, shipped to C. Turner; a small metal package, addressed to G. G. Williams and valued at \$10; two suit cases, one belonging to William Strickland and the other to M. T. Hoes.

Reports stated that the depot at Amherst also was burglarized but no items were missing.

Special Santa Fe officers have conducted an investigation but last night no clues had been located.

LOANS IMPROVED

Farm Board Okes More Than Million Dollars

WASHINGTON, Oct. 22. (AP)—Three loans, totaling more than a million dollars, were approved today by the federal farm board as it moved to carry out its announced plan to help bring about more orderly marketing.

The wheat loan provided the announcement of a definite plan of relief for that commodity, although the board in discussing the cotton situation yesterday said that it also had in mind the wheat situation and was working on a scheme to improve it.

Two of the loans approved today \$500,000 to the Mississippi Cotton cooperative association, at Jackson, Mississippi, and \$500,000 to the Southwest Co-operative Wheat Growers association, Kansas City—were commodity loans. They will enable the two organizations to make larger advances to grower members. Both loans are supplemental to those from federal intermediate credit banks.

The third was a facilities loan of \$200,000 to the Texas Farm Bureau Cotton association, at Dallas, Texas.

Winter's Breath Felt By Lubbock

The first cold breath of winter swept down from the north Tuesday enveloping Lubbock and the South Plains in the coldest norther of the year. The mercury was sent hurtling downward, dropping steadily throughout the day until at a late hour last night the red mark stood at 40 degrees and was threatening to fall lower toward freezing.

Overcoats were much in evidence on the streets while Lubbock citizens could be seen to wrap themselves further into the folds of outer garments in an attempt to shut out the penetrating air. Smoke hung heavily over the city from chimneys belching forth black clouds as steam was circulated in pipes for the first time of the season. Winter's fingertips could be felt while a cold and driving wind indicated that his firm grasp would be felt later.

Fugitives Caught After Two Breaks From Prison Farm

Exchange Of Shots Climax To Three Convicts' Bid For Liberty After Guard Is Overpowered And Tied

(By Associated Press) HUNTSVILLE, Oct. 22.—Two attempts to flee the Texas prison system within a few hours of each other resulted in the recapture of the five fugitives.

One of the bids for freedom, made by three prisoners on the Eastern farm, 20 miles northwest here, late yesterday, was climaxed today with an exchange of shots between the convicts and a posse of guards, led by bloodhounds, near Madisonville. The trio finally surrendered. No one was injured.

The convicts, Fred Fuller, serving two years for larceny from Montgomery county, and Francis Porch and Tom Walsh, sentenced to five years for burglary from Llano and Wichita counties, respectively, fled from the farm after overpowering Shan Wilson, their guard.

Bloodhounds were immediately set on the fugitives' trail after Shan, stripped of his clothes, was found tied to a tree and his pistol and horse missing.

The other attempt for freedom occurred at the penitentiary here last night after H. H. Janzen and Jim R. Young, employed in a print shop outside the prison walls, slugged and dangerously wounded John Burnett, guard, seized his gun and started for Houston in an automobile. They were overtaken by prison officials, however, and surrendered.

Two Hundred Visitors Are Expected Here For One-Day Convention Of South Plains Churches

To Study Missions

Two College Presidents And Host Of Other Prominent Speakers On Program For Confab Here

APPROXIMATELY two hundred people, the majority from other cities of the South Plains, are expected to arrive in Lubbock early this morning for a one-day convention of the South Plains Christian churches, sponsored by the United Christian Missionary society of Indianapolis, Ind. The visitors will be guests here of the First Christian church, where the sessions will be held, starting at 10 o'clock this morning.

Starje At 10 The first session will be held at 10 o'clock and another is scheduled to begin at 1:30 in the afternoon. At 6:30 in the evening a banquet will be held in the church parlor. Rev. Walter P. Jennings, pastor of the local church, will preside at the business sessions and also act as toastmaster at the banquet.

Several prominent speakers are to appear on the program, including Miss Lois Taylor, Indianapolis; Herbert Kyrasie, New Orleans; Mrs. Berna McCluskey, Fort Worth; Dr. E. M. Wain, president of the Christian university, Fort Worth; Dr. T. T. Roberts, president of Randolph college, Claico; Dr. Ross, Fort Worth, and Jasper Bogue, district secretary of the Panhandle division.

The meeting is one of 200 to be held throughout the United States during October and is the only one to be on the South Plains.

Cotton Advances On Board Report

NEW YORK, Oct. 22. (AP)—The statement of the federal farm board with reference to cotton prices and proposed loans to cooperative marketing associations was reflected by advances of approximately \$2.50 per bale in the cotton market here today. After selling up to 18.40 at the start, December reacted to 18.22 under liquidation, but later advanced to 18.32 on continued covering and more of less general buying. December closed at 18.50 with the general market closing firm at net advances of 48 to 50 points.

The opening was steady at an advance of 23 to 27 points and the active months soon showed net gains of 20 to 28 points on covering together with trade speculation. Buying promoted by the Washington news. This initial demand sent prices up to 18.12 for October and 18.79 for March contracts, but the advance met a good deal of southern selling and the market reacted some to 18 points from the peak later in the morning under liquidation of old long accounts.

"Home Talent" Shooting Is Echo To Trouble

GRAND SALINE, Oct. 22. (AP)—Grand Saline's first blood shed, since the oil boom was launched last week, put Fred Cofer in the hospital, along with bullet wounds in his abdomen and left leg today and Wallace Graves in jail. The shooting was said tonight to be purely a "home talent" affair and not due to the oil boom.

Both men, officials said, lived in Grand Saline before oil was struck. Domestic troubles were said to have caused the shooting.

Heath shot Ash and Sparks and wounded Stillwell before the latter killed him.

Children Witnesses. Stillwell and Sparks' two small children were the only surviving witnesses.

Hoover En Route To Make Speech On Ohio Project

President Will Signalize Improvement Of River For All Year Round Traffic Pittsburgh To Gulf

BY RAYMOND Z. HENLE Associated Press Staff Writer. S. S. GREENBRIER, EN ROUTE TO LOUISVILLE, Oct. 22. (AP)—President Hoover was steaming down the Ohio to Louisville on a trim little light house tender tonight to signalize with a speech in the Kentucky city the improvement of the river for all-year-round traffic from Pittsburgh to the Gulf.

He embarked at Cincinnati to the accompaniment of noisy salutations of hundreds of factory whistles along the wharves, steamers on the river and horns from automobiles of the large crowd of citizens who had come down to bid him adieu.

Party Enthusiastic. A stiff, biting wind swept over the valley and dashed a foaming spray across the boat's prow. But neither the rain nor the cold appeared to dampen the enthusiasm of the reception.

Before embarking on the Greenbrier, the president took part at Cincinnati in the dedication of a monument in Eden Park commemorating the canalization of the Ohio from Pittsburgh to Cairo, Ill., as in Detroit, he, with Mr. Hoover, again rode through a cold driving rain in an open automobile, along practically the entire route from their downtown hotel to the park.

Finance Matters Are Discussed By Tech Directorate

Directors of Texas Technological college, representing widely separated cities of the state, met in Lubbock Tuesday, sitting from 10 to 5 o'clock in the office of Dr. Paul W. Horn, president, for a discussion of finance matters.

"Due to the shortage of appropriations, the directors are outlining plans today for securing additional funds to meet the college's immediate needs," said Dr. Horn. "We have not arrived upon any definite plan as yet."

To Offer Claims. It is understood that the directors laid plans for presenting the claims of the college before the next gathering of the Texas legislature, to be held either in December or January.

ATTACK PROSECUTION

Albert Fall's Bribery Case Is Nearing Close

WASHINGTON, Oct. 22. (AP)—Council for Albert B. Fall, charged with accepting a bribe from Edward L. Doherty for the Elk Hills oil lease, spent four hours today attacking the government's case and presenting a favorable view of Fall's transactions to the jury.

Frank J. Hogan, chief defense counsel, occupied the entire court day, challenging the documents introduced by the government and criticizing counsel for its presentation of the prosecution. He had been expected to require about two and a half hours and the additional time made it improbable that the case would go to the jury before late tomorrow afternoon, or Thursday morning.

Before court recessed for the day Justice William Hitz announced that the defense would have an hour tomorrow to conclude.

Hope Waning For Recovery Of Car Accident Victim

Wife Of Lubbock Banker Suffers Internal Injuries In Dallas Hospital After Car Crash Monday

REPORTS late last night to the Morning Avalanche from Dallas stated that the condition of Mrs. O. L. Slaton, of Lubbock, wife of the president of the First National bank of this city, was unchanged and that slight hopes were held for her recovery. Mrs. Slaton is in the Methodist hospital at Dallas suffering from internal injuries received in an automobile accident near Grand Prairie Monday afternoon.

A message to Miss Della Wilkinson, 1201 17th street, sister of Mrs. Slaton, at noon yesterday stated that hope for life was waning and that death seemed imminent. Miss Wilkinson left last night for Dallas.

Miss Ruth Slaton, 23, her daughter, sustaining fractures of her pelvis and collarbone and is reported to be seriously hurt, although physicians say she will recover.

O. L. Slaton, Jr., her son, sustained minor bruises and lacerations. The three were removed to the Methodist hospital.

Mr. Slaton left immediately for Dallas late Monday, upon receiving information of the mishap.

The accident, in which five cars were piled in a mass of wreckage, was said to have happened in fast, heavy traffic on the crowded Dallas-Fort Worth highway. According to the reports one car tried to pass another and met a third coming from the opposite direction. Three other autos plunged into the wreck before traffic could be stopped.

Criminal Lawyers Object Of Debate

MEMPHIS, Oct. 22. (AP)—Criminals and the ways of criminals and the education of lawyers who defend and prosecute them kept the sectional meetings of the American bar association in debate today.

A speech by Justin Miller, dean of the University of Southern California law school and chairman of the section on criminal law in which he said "local option with sentiment behind it succeeds—national prohibition does not," kept the liquor problem before the sections and strengthened consensus of many delegates that prohibition eventually would be the association's biggest fight.

Mr. Miller recommended a "cafeteria court" for bootleggers on the "pay as you enter" plan. He said the average liquor violations should be treated as a misdemeanor and that bootlegging should be placed in the third criminal category for which there would be no jury trial. He recommended to the bar association that psychiatric service be available to every criminal and juvenile court and that no criminal be sentenced for any felony in which the judge has any discretion as to the sentence until a psychiatric report is filed.

Negro Question Facing England

LONDON, Oct. 22. (AP)—The question of the color bar against negroes in England is being raised for the first time in acute form. The annual invasion of American tourists is blamed by many persons for the exclusion of negroes from some restaurants and hotels recently.

A sensation was caused today at a meeting of the Society of Friends (Quakers) by the receipt of a letter from the celebrated American negro singer Paul Robeson, stating he and his wife recently had been refused admittance to the dining hall and grill room of a leading London hotel despite the fact they were being entertained by white friends.

Robeson has been singing in London and playing in "Show Boat" for nearly two years.

Pantages Denies Charges Brought By Young Dancer

Millionaire Theater Head Takes Stand In His Own Defense In Statutory Trial; Frame-Up Claimed

(By Associated Press) LOS ANGELES, Oct. 22.—Alexander Pantages, gray haired multi-millionaire theatre man, today answered Eunice Pringle, 17-year-old dancer who alleges he assaulted her with an assertion that the girl "framed" the scene which resulted in his arrest.

Pantages denied from the witness stand in his trial on a statutory charge that he attacked the dancer and declared he was the victim of a deliberate plot.

The runaway youth from a home in Greece who came to America in his early teens and wandered to Alaska in the gold rush to build the cornerstone of his fortune, now estimated at \$50,000,000, appeared as an aged, nervous man eager to tell his story as he fought to save himself from prison.

Pantages' recital was a contradiction of virtually all the circumstances to which Miss Pringle had testified.

Pantages testified the girl attempted to discuss a dance act which she had been attempting to place and when he told her he desired to hear no more about the act, which he said was too suggestive, she exclaimed, "you know what I want," and started tearing his clothing and screaming, after stamping the door.

(By Associated Press) A GOLDEN hind of the skies sailed over the north Atlantic Tuesday carrying in it a man of 40 who named his fragile craft after Sir Francis Drake's staunch galleon. This new golden hind was a small monoplane and the new adventurer, who challenged sky as well as sea, was Urban F. Diteman, Jr., who took off without advance announcement from the airport at Harbor Grace, New Foundland "bound for London."

Ten minutes after the takeoff at 12:45 p. m. (Eastern Standard Time) this Montana livestock buyer soared over Cape St. Francis, 11 miles north of the airport, and disappeared in the east where Dr. James H. Kimball of the New York weather bureau and unofficial starter for trans-Atlantic flights said "fairly favorable" weather awaited him.

Tariff Reduction On Fish Is Asked

Atlantic Coast Fisheries Advocacy Under Probe Of Senate Lobby Committee; Company Head Called

WASHINGTON, Oct. 22. (AP)—Advocacy by the Atlantic coast fisheries corporation of a reduction in the tariff on fish was inquired into today by the senate lobby committee. F. W. Bryce, president of the corporation, was called after the committee had been told that Senator Bingham's assistant, Charles L. Eyanson, representative of the Con-

necticut Manufacturers' association, had urged a decrease in the fish tariff. Bingham, republican member of the senate finance committee, employed Eyanson as his secretary at the time the committee was considering the tariff bill. Bryce testified he had sent out telegrams to fish dealers urging them to wire members of the finance committee to reduce the fish tariff, "in the interests of consumers and dealers." He said he called upon Senator Bingham once.

Edward Cooley, business manager of the Massachusetts Fisheries association, testified yesterday he had been told he would have to "win over" Bingham and Eyanson to succeed in his efforts for retention of the fish tariff.

Mrs. Dougan Presents Six Dishes In Demonstrations

Lecturer To Demonstrate Making Of Gingerbread And Yeast Bread For Wednesday Cooking School Session

Roast Pork Is Used For Company Dinner Given To Large Audience Tuesday

Shipping over a menu from "soup o' nuts." Mrs. Myra Oliver Dougan presented her "company" dinner to more than 900 women at the second session of the sixth annual Avalanche-Journal cooking school, which is being held at the Uptown Dance Palace.

Only in this case, the soup was omitted and the after dinner coffee added to these delicious, palatable dishes prepared before the audience.

Today it's that gingerbread that here's none other like together with quick and yeast breads. She's also going to make a peach pie that's going to be different from any other kind of pie.

The session today, which opened at 2 o'clock, began with the preparation of a roast of pork. In giving instructions in ordering, Mrs. Dougan suggested that the roast be ordered the day before it was to be served and that one chop be ordered for each person served, requesting that the ribs not be left too long and that ends of the bone are sawed off evenly. Each of the bones should be wrapped up in a strip of salt pork to prevent scorching and burning, according to the lecturer. One of the interesting suggestions given by the lecturer was not to cover the ribs with the top of a roaster, but to cover it with two pieces of oiled paper. With this she suggested the serving of a mint sauce, a recipe for which she included in the recipes distributed through the audience.

Potatoes were included in the menu, but giving a different appearance from those generally seen. To one half of heavy cream, beaten stiff, she added one half a cup of grated cheese, and spread the mixture over the potatoes, placing the whole dish in the oven until it was evenly browned.

The tip which she gave to the women concerning onions was that when preparing onions for boiling, it was only a fork that turned the trick. When onions are boiled the centers often pop out causing the onions to fall apart. To prevent this, the housewives may just take a handy fork and punch tiny holes in the onions! To those who might be interested in the beauty side of foods, she just added the bit of information that onions had a way of making the eyes sparkle as well as making them cry.

A long cucumber furnished the center for the salad included in the menu, with the plate being garnished with radishes cut in the form of various flowers. Mrs. Dougan demonstrated the making of these flowers and suggested the best way in shaping the inside petals being to cut them with scissors. The cucumber when finished resembled an ear of corn. Topping the whole program in the light of looking good enough to "melt in your mouth" was the Princess Pudding from Denmark.

Highway Commission Likely To Buy Bridge

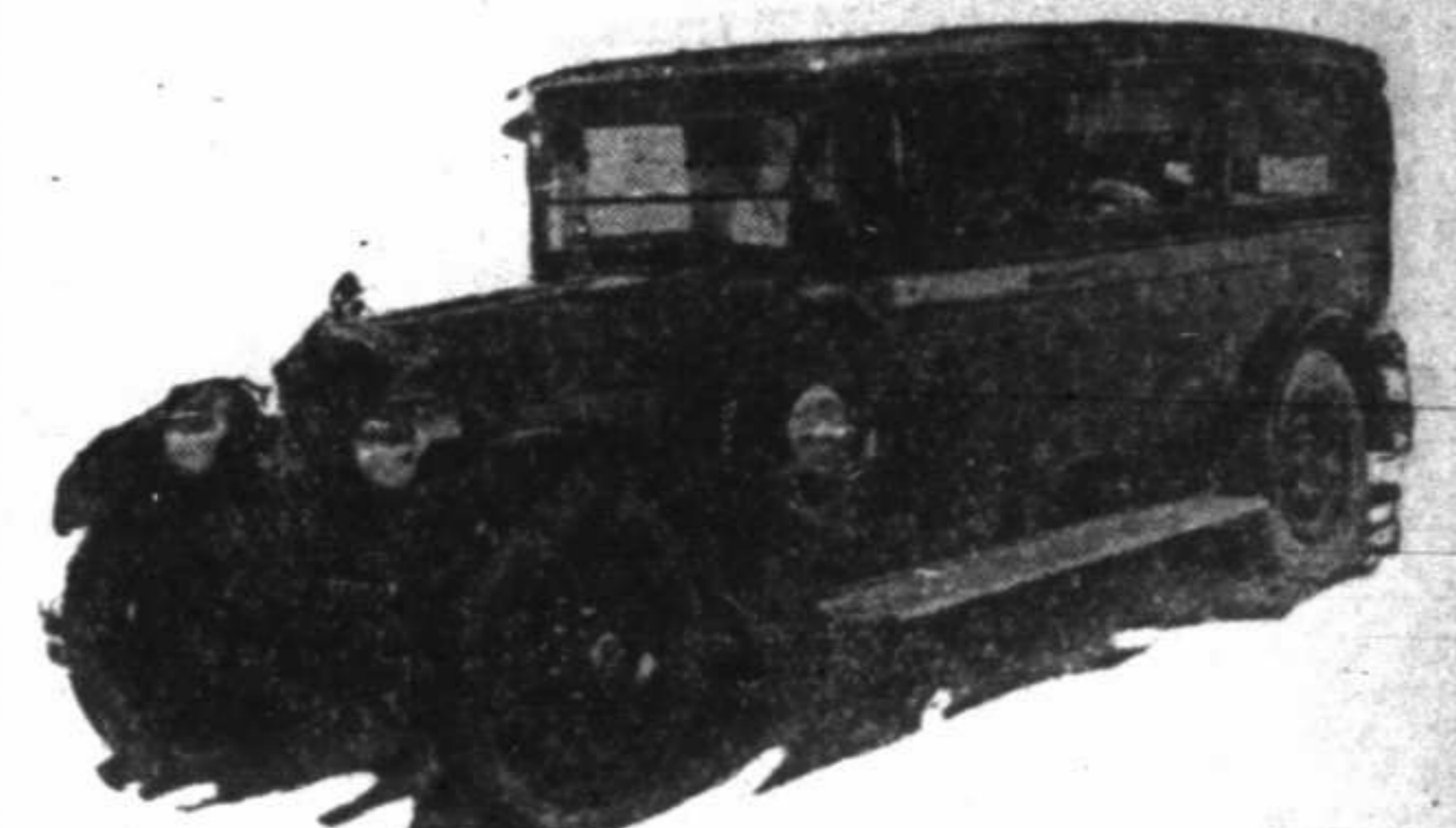

C. U. backs.

TARIFF-FIXING POWER QUESTION WHICH MAY DEADLOCK CONGRESS, THREATENING SPECIAL SESSION

By CHARLES F. STEWART Central Press Staff Writer

WASHINGTON, Oct. 22.—My impression that old Kaspar, on the subject of the battle of Blenheim, had it all over the average American, concerning the recent senate vote on the "flexible tariff" issue.

"It was the English," Kaspar cried, "who put the French to rout." He knew who won, anyway.

Unless one opens directly at the pink section, it is no hard to avoid a fleeting glance at the first page headlines in any newspaper that I imagine most people were aware of a famous flexible tariff victory for someone or other a few days ago, but I have my doubts if many of them could tell off-hand who scored it.

This is too bad, because it really was mighty important—interesting, too, if one is interested in the kind of government he lives under.

Take old Kaspar, for instance. He had no idea what the battle of Blenheim was about, to be sure; nevertheless, it might have altered his circumstances considerably if it had been the French who put the English to rout.

The tariff—flexible or otherwise—is a tiresome fiscal subject, certainly. For all that, the one we have makes prices what they are. Some say it also makes wages what they are; some dispute it. At any rate, there is no question about prices; all hands admit it.

The trouble with the tariff is, it gets into politics. That is to say, the politicians dope out the rates in such ways as they think will do them the most good when they come up for re-election; not with much regard for the people's best interests.

Congress realizes this. It's conscience pricks it, when it happens to think about it. It had one of these spells back in 1916, and actually tried to do something to remedy the evil.

But there was one defect in the system. When the commission called attention to a tariff rate which evidently was working an injustice somewhere, the only way of changing it was for congress to get busy.

Now, it is notorious that when congress starts to make any particular tariff change, it invariably wants to make a whole lot of changes. The final upshot is that it tears the whole structure of tariff rates wide open, which unsettles business, and, besides, involves so much delay that the especially wanted change may not be made until it is too late to be beneficial.

Consequently, in 1922, the law was changed to enable the president, without consulting congress, to increase or reduce a tariff rate by 50 per cent, if recommended by the commission—thus getting prompt action.

This was the "flexible provision." Rather curiously, nearly all these presidential changes proved to be increases—or maybe not so curiously, considering the strength of our high tariff influence. The president does not have to make changes, even if recommended; he can use his judgment. When reductions were suggested, he has not always made them.

Of late it has been pointed out that it would be handier if the president could appoint the tariff commissioners without regard to the bi-partisan rule; in short, have a sort of a commission he pleased—thus enabling him to make sure of all recommendations he wanted.

The house of representatives, in fact, put such a clause in the tariff bill it passed—and otherwise strengthened the presidential authority.

The senators, however, are not as amenable as the representatives. A number of the former objected to the chief executive. They denounced it as a step in the direction of a dictatorship.

Daily Production Of Oil Increases

Daily Average Makes Leap Ahead Of 75,000 Barrels With Proration Temporarily Lifted

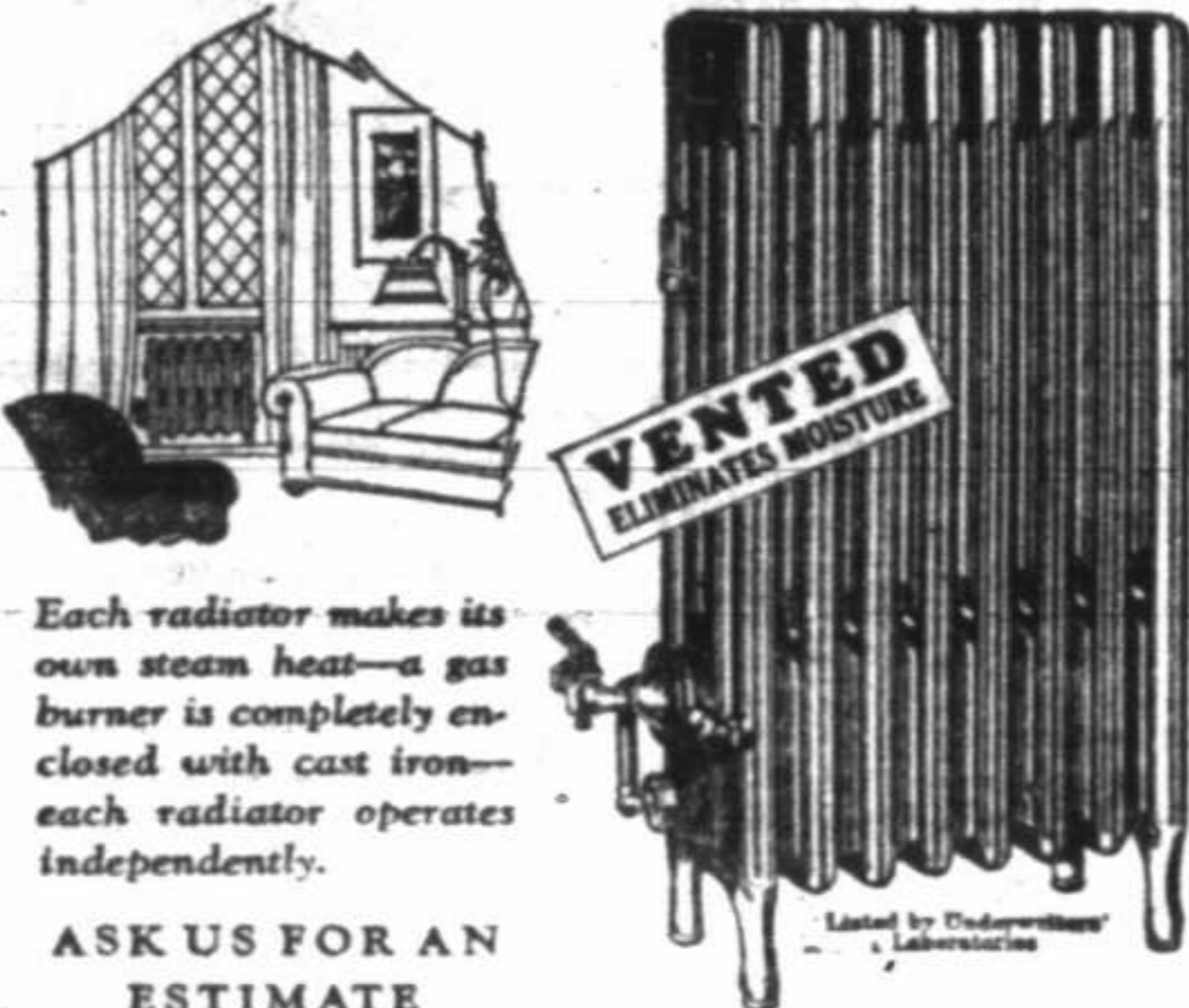
TULSA, Okla., Oct. 22. (AP)—With proration temporarily lifted in that area, daily average production of crude oil in the Oklahoma City basin pool leaped ahead approximately 75,000 barrels during the week ending October 19, while the daily average production of all pools of the United States gained approximately 78,271 barrels. The estimated average daily production for the entire country during the week was 2,909,355 barrels as compared to 2,830,984 for the preceding week. The increase marked the halt of a downward trend marked throughout the past month, according to the Oil and Gas Journal.

deep drilling area in California moved to the front again to boost that state's production in light oil by 5,500 barrels. The light oil increase for the Pacific coast was 5,500 barrels. Heavy oil in the area dropped 4,000 barrels. Under the Oklahoma City forward surge and despite general declines in other areas, the state of Oklahoma totaled a 58,915 barrels increase for the past week. West Texas gained approximately 6,000 barrels. The Mid-Continent area gained 62,446 barrels in light oil and remained virtually constant in heavy oil. The Gulf coast area heavy oil surged ahead 16,099 barrels in its daily average. Southwest Texas declined slightly. The increase in light oil for the entire country was 68,436 barrels. Kansas production was 111,415 as compared to 112,070 for the previous week.

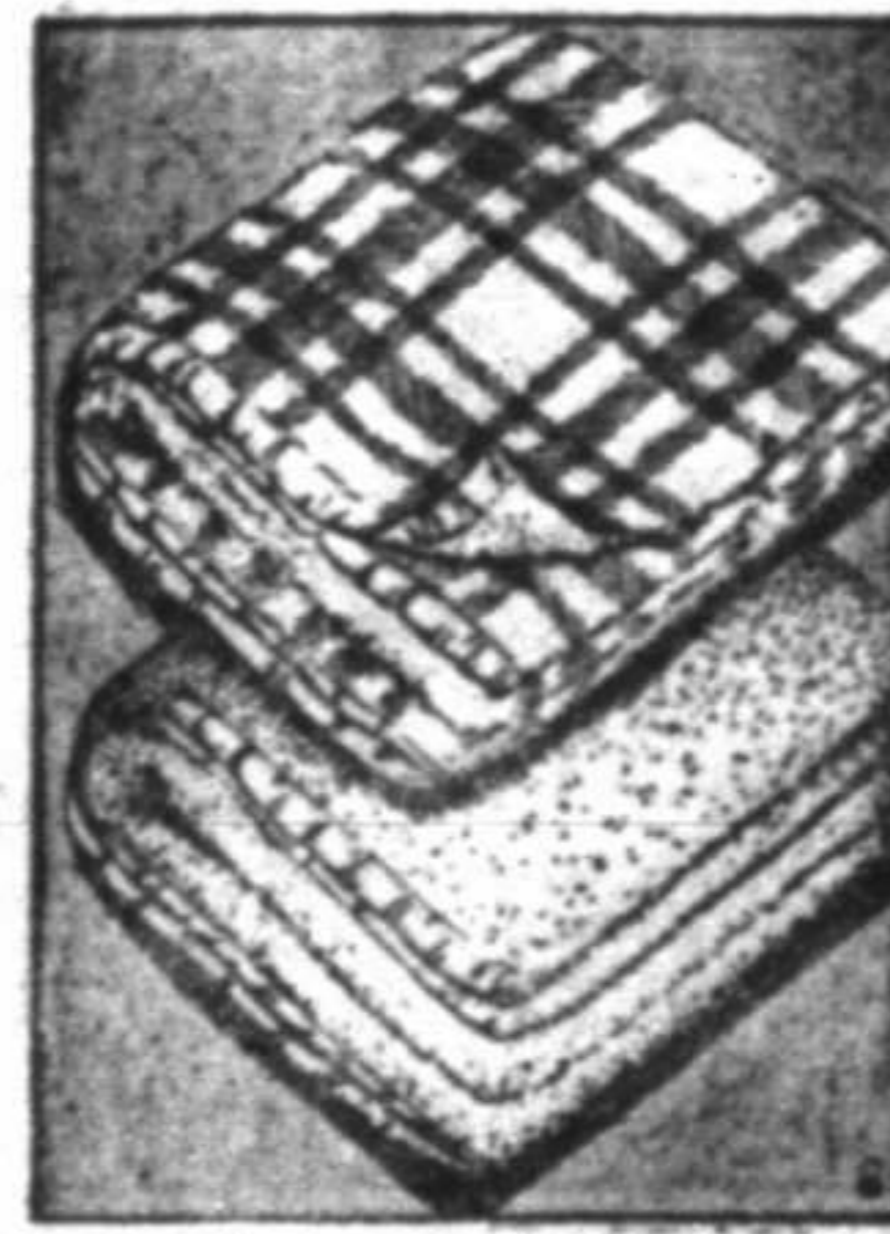
