BAPTISTS TO SHIP PRESENTS FOR ORPHANS

The Cisco Baptist Association tomorrow will load a freight car with gifts for Buckner Orphan home. It has been announced by Rev. E. S. James and Rev. T. J. Sparksman, pastors of Cisco's two Baptist churches.

The car and transportation will be furnished by the Texas and Pacific railroad, and will make only one stop in the association, which includes Eastland, Stephens, and 36 Baptist churches.

The pastors urged members of the churches of this association and friends of the orphans home to bring gifts for the children if possible. They pointed out that they are especially in need of food, clothing, and feed for livestock.

Although the home is maintained by the Baptist of Texas, it is non-denominational as to the children it serves.

Filling of the car by the churches of this association is an annual project. Last year about \$800 worth of merchandise was shipped from the association to the home.

The car represents a gift in food and clothing which the orphans home would not otherwise receive. Rev. Mr. James pointed out.

Italy Resentful At World Over Sanctions

DISORDER AT LEGATIONS IN ROME SHOWN

Italy showed bitter resentment against most of the nations of the world today as the League's sanctions went into effect. Demonstrations by 2,000,000 young Italians around foreign embassies and legations showed the temper of the people, convinced by Mussolini that Italy is being given a raw deal. Mussolini is determined not only to push his campaign in Africa through to success in spite of combined opposition of 32 nations linked in the greatest mass effort in history to stop a nation from making war, but to fight back economically.

To that end Italy will refuse to buy products of nations which apply sanctions against her and even to refuse to pay her debts abroad, which are large.

The Italian people, backing their dictator wholeheartedly, are prepared to make heavy sacrifices and the word from Rome is that Italy can probably go a year before the real pinch of the trade and financial penalties is felt.

By that time, judging by the steady success of the preliminary campaign in Ethiopia, the country can be subjugated.

The real danger lies in the possibility that Britain, backed by the League of nations will not be content to let Mussolini have his way. If they do, the League structure collapses and the nations will be in the position of having let one man defy them and get away with it.

If the League should vote for military penalties, it is safe to assume that Britain will carry out her reiterated pledge to back the League to the limit within the provisions of the covenant.

STATE TO ASK DEATH VERDICT FOR PREACHER

HOUSTON, Nov. 18 — The death penalty will be asked for Rev. Edgar Eskridge, Orange, Baptist minister, charged with murdering his friend, Police Chief Ed J. O'Reilly. Questions to prospective jurors indicated as his trial opened here today.

More than a dozen veniremen were excused, many of them because they objected to infliction of the death penalty. Others were challenged by defense regarding a plea of insanity in murder trial defense.

The defendant smoked cigars incessantly taking no interest in the proceedings. He did not see his wife nor his sister, Mrs. C. M. Chambers, Port Arthur, as they entered the room. Neither spoke to him.

Eskridge was charged with the slaying of O'Reilly at Orange on May 29, the day after the officer met him on the street and took his weapons. Eskridge claimed the incident was a plot against his life.

Girl Faces Trial For Death Of Father Who Tried to Whip Her

WISE, Va., Nov. 18 — In a courtroom noisy with the wailing of babies and the scuffling of mountaineers' boots, a jury was chosen in 30 minutes to try Edith Maxwell, a girl who got "now fangled notions" in the outside world on a charge of murdering her father. He tried to whip her for staying out on a party until midnight.

Into the jury box filed 12 men, their clothes rough and their shoes caked with mud from the trail. Before them sat a black haired girl, a 21-year-old school teacher who had broken the code of the mountain by staying out with her beau, Raymond Meade, hours after the curfew siren sounded its warning.

C. R. MILLER ELECTED NEW LIQUOR HEAD

AUSTIN, Nov. 18 — C. R. Miller, who has been Secretary to Governor James Allred, today was elected liquor administrator for Texas under the new state liquor law.

Miller was chosen by the liquor board today following arrival here of Joseph Williams, Port Arthur, last member of the board to be named by Allred.

With Miller's assistance, the board immediately began a search for office space, expected to be settled by afternoon and issuance the first liquor license. The first application came from San Antonio.

Miller, 50, a former merchant of Taylor, was later president of the First National Bank, Electric, and city councilman there. He became chief enforcement officer of the attorney general's department when Allred was elected attorney general.

When Allred became governor, Miller was appointed second secretary. The liquor board appointed by Governor Allred consists of D. B. Benson of Bowie, a dry, chairman; J. W. Williams, Port Arthur, a liberal; and D. J. Decherd of Flatonia, a wet.

It will be three or four days before liquor licenses can be issued, it has been indicated.

Governor Allred signed the liquor bill last week and immediately began appointment of the board members.

Flood Control In Valley Is Planned

SAN BENITO, Nov. 18 — Plans for expenditure of \$1,280,000 PWA funds for dredging and flood control projects on the Rio Grande are being drafted by the International Boundary commission.

J. L. Lytel, commission engineer, said plans call for the dredging of the North Floodway in the Mercedes district to lower the flood level, and for levee work in Cameron county and near Brownsville.

The government of Mexico also is planning extensive flood control work, including an irrigation and storage dam on the San Juan river and a system of levees in the Matamoros area.

DENY CHARGES AS MCDONALD'S TRIAL STARTS

AUSTIN, Nov. 18 — General denial of all charges made against J. E. McDonald, state agriculture commissioner and specific denial of each of 11 allegations against him were made today as the house opened an impeachment hearing to determine if he shall be removed from office.

The denials were announced by counsel immediately after the charges had been read by the house reading clerk. The answer will be filed in written form at an afternoon session.

The hearing proceeded with rival attorneys sitting at tables each provided with a microphone. Two other microphones will carry the rulings of Chairman Franklin Spears, San Antonio, and testimony of witnesses to all parts of the house of representatives hall.

Spears announced he would rule on admissibility of evidence as it shall be presented. He said precedent permits a variation from the strict rules of evidence fixed for civil and criminal trials but announced a feeling that those rules should not be far departed from.

135 Dallas Farmers Are In AAA Signup

DALLAS, Nov. 18 — A total of 135 Dallas county wheat farmers have signed applications for the new 1936 AAA wheat contracts, County Agricultural Agent A. B. Jolley reported.

The applications will bind the farmer to control wheat acreage in return for government compensation. Applications do not obligate the farmer to sign the contracts.

FIRST WINTER STORM HITS IN EASTERN U. S.

NEW YORK, Nov. 18 — Snow, sleet, and tumbling temperatures whipped down the Atlantic coast today on a gale that in 24 hours killed 24 persons, swept nine or more men to sea in small boats and caused damage from Canada to North Carolina, probably exceeding \$2,000,000.

Government weather bureau said that the wind, which at times reached a velocity of 80 miles an hour, would abate and shift to the northwest today but temperatures would drop sharply.

Snow drifted heavily over most of New England, New York, Pennsylvania and New Jersey. The heaviest tide in many years piled surf over shore roads and breakwaters. Two coastal ships wallowed toward port under the watchful eyes of coast guard cutters after they had sent out S. O. S. calls.

The north coast of New Jersey and the ocean side of Long Island bore the brunt of the gale. Rain and surf that pounded hundreds of feet beyond normal high tide flooded dozens of towns and damaged hundreds of buildings.

Fossil Water Snake Found by Scientist

DALLAS, Nov. 18 — Dr. Barnum Brown, curator of reptilian paleontology for the American Museum of Natural History in New York, has reported the finding of fossil remains of a plesiosauros of "water snake" near Cedar Hill, Dallas county.

The fossil remains are 19 feet one inch long. The head of the creature was 17 inches long.

George W. Tidwell, who discovered the fossil, sold it to W. Q. Seale, who announced he would exhibit it during the Texas Centennial central exposition in Dallas next year.

TURNIP GROWS SQUARE

SAINT JOHN, B. C. — A "Kangaroo" turnip, weighing 21 pounds, was grown here. The turnip, resembling a pumpkin, was nearly square and was 33 inches around.

HOWL RAISED OVER TREATY WITH CANADA

WASHINGTON, Nov. 18 — The administration's new reciprocal trade agreement with Canada brought sporadic and generalized complaint today from agriculture and lumber interests.

The agreement to lower tariff barriers on many exports of agricultural goods, manufactured goods of the United States will benefit by similar concessions by Canada.

Lumber and protective agriculture tariffs were lowered to benefit Canadian goods. Manufactured goods of the United States will benefit by similar concessions by Canada.

Capital circles were unusually cautious on their comment today, insisting details must be studied to indicate results of the agreement.

But from farm, labor, and lumber interests of the west came generalized protests, some insisting it would be ruinous to agriculture and other predicting it would lead to grave difficulties in the lumber industry.

WORKERS DUE TO MEET WITH COUNTY HEAD

The annual Red Cross roll call will start here tomorrow morning when volunteers meet at the Chamber of Commerce rooms at 10 o'clock for organization and outline of their work.

Thompson on the Firing Line

E. O. Thompson, chairman of the state railway commission, attended the Los Angeles convention of the American Petroleum Institute. He told of conditions in Texas of the record of the commission which regulates oil production. He flatly stated that Texas had "refused to allow extra production when it was pointed out that the production was for war purposes." He did not say who sought the oil. Chairman Thompson expressed faith in the interstate oil compact and said he believed "we have heard the last of the federal control movement." An ardent champion of states' rights to control conservation and production, the Texan warned, however, that the courts have ruled that compacts cannot legally have as their object price-fixing and have said in effect, "the limit of legislative power is reached in prohibiting physical waste." The interstate compact does not provide for price-fixing. Gov. Allred at the time the state compact was launched, declared against price-fixing.

California is the only state that has failed to ratify the pact. Gov. E. W. Marland of Oklahoma warned the Los Angeles convention that unless oil production states unite in a compact to control production "automobile owners may pay many more times than they pay now for gasoline." Axtell J. Byles, who declared on the opening day of the convention there was no danger of an oil shortage, was sharply criticized for his saying that "an oil shortage was a myth." The governor of Oklahoma countered by saying on the closing day of the convention, "when domestic supply is gone or reasonably diminished, we shall pay dearly for that taken from foreign soil." In other words Gov. Marland would limit foreign imports as a protective measure for the American producers of petroleum and its products.

Is Mob Violence 'Will of the People'?

Two negro boys charged with foul crimes were lynched by a mob at Columbus. They were taken from armed officials and hanged to a live oak tree not far from the home of their victim of a double outrage. O. P. Moore, county attorney, said he would vigorously prosecute "any of the 700 persons, including women, who participated," but added, "I do not consider the persons who executed the negroes a mob. I consider their action an expression of the will of the people." This expression of the prosecutor is said to have drawn protest the state over "as official action lagged." Gov. James V. Allred said, "Lynching is deplorable at any time," and L. G. Phares, head of the department of public safety and Texas rangers added, "I don't believe lynchings are the will of the people and if they are, they certainly ought not to be."

Mob law is said to be the law of the jungle. It overrides the law of organized society. There isn't a chance on earth for a negro charged with the double crime of murder and rape to win a verdict of not guilty in a court of justice.

Behind the Scenes in Washington

WASHINGTON — Although the news may break Gen. Hugh Johnson's heart, the Frankfurter boys have moved in on the Department of Justice.

After the celebrated Dr. Felix Frankfurter of Harvard Law School refused President Roosevelt's offer of the solicitor-generalship in 1933, hardly one of his numerous pupils entered the service of Attorney General Homer Cummings, though they poured into New Deal ranks nearly everywhere else except NRA.

Solicitor General J. Crawford Biggs and his staff sloshed around through the courts, making a sorry showing on nearly all fronts. The Frankfurter boys (whom General Johnson calls the "Happy Hot Dogs"), some of whom had written laws the inept Biggs was trying to defend, alternately jibed and groaned at the spectacle.

Along came Stanley Reed of RFC to be solicitor general and to renovate the staff. In the last few weeks he has picked some of the brightest of the ex-Frankfurter pupils here to help him defend New Deal legislation in a big winter of test cases.

THEIR friends and their enemies will be watching them closely. For they're now on the spot and, although they're more graceful and, arguments will be more graceful and, to the point, it's a question whether they'll have any better luck before the supreme court.

Among the group of Frankfurter's smart young men now working for Reed are:

ALGER HISS, former secretary to the late Justice Oliver Wendell Holmes, former assistant general counsel at AAA and counsel for the Senate munitions committee,

drafter of the Bankhead cotton and Kerr tobacco control acts, now preparing the supreme court brief defending the AAA in the Hoosea case.

PAUL FREUND, former secretary to Justice Brandeis, formerly with RFC, now specializing on TVA and PWA cases.

CHARLES HORSKY, former secretary to Judge Learned Hand of New York, working on defense of the Bankhead act.

ARNOLD RAUM, ex-RFC lawyer, specializing on processing and other tax cases.

One thing about the Frankfurter boys. So many of them have served as secretaries to supreme court and other justices that they ought to have a fairly good picture of the judicial mind.

FEW but the innermost insiders realize even yet how badly Roosevelt was worried up to the time Huey Long's assassination. For fear that Huey would draw a large vote from him by running as a third party candidate. Point was recently given to this fear by evidence that certain interests were willing to provide Long with a large campaign fund.

Roosevelt, it is whispered by one or two of those he consulted about it, was making a personal survey of the vote Huey would be likely to get. He had given up Louisiana and Georgia (where he figured both Huey and Governor Talmadge would work against him), according to this tale, and was disturbed about Arkansas and South Carolina.

At the time of Long's death, the administration was grooming Senator Bilbo of Mississippi, an outstanding rabble-rouser and vote-getter in southern rural regions, to take the stump against Long in the campaign.

in the commonwealth of Texas. Mob law, racial prejudices are as dangerous as a dynamite bomb or as a lighted torch in a powder magazine. The mob who lynched the two negroes near Columbus may be prosecuted but it is safe to predict the leaders will never be convicted of mob violence in the county or adjoining counties which was the scene of the ghastly horror and which called for the condemnation of those who participated in the live oak tree hanging.

Every alleged criminal, regardless of age, color or condition in life is entitled to a fair trial in open court. Then if convicted by a jury of his peers, the punishment should fit the crime.

House Votes For Hickman Probe

On Wednesday before the final close of the session, the house voted down a resolution to investigate the charges of the friends of Capt. M. Hickman, noted ranger. On Thursday, facing final adjournment, the house voted 69 to 57, to reverse its action. Now the Hickman dismissal may become an issue and all who are interested given a hearing. State Commr. of Agriculture McDonald is to be placed on the rack. He has announced ready to face his accusers. Thirty state commissioners of agriculture held a meeting of their national organization in Washington. They endorsed the agricultural policies of the new deal administration, voted the president an expression of confidence and then elected the Texan vice president of their organization.

UNDER THE DOME AT AUSTIN

AUSTIN, Nov. 18—Straight talk to the American Petroleum Institute's convention in Los Angeles last week is bringing congressional messages to the office of Colonel Ernest O. Thompson, chairman of the Texas Railroad Commission.

There may be some reverberations at next Tuesday's oil proration meeting here. Outspoken declarations always rile some, please others. They are bound to clear the atmosphere. Separate pools of the oil industry, oil workers, owners of oil land and the public generally for their views on Colonel Thompson's statements would be interesting—perhaps informative.

How would the vote go on this one?

"Our commission has refused to allow extra oil production on requests for war purposes. Texas does not wish to be made richer through the sale of oil to make war and misery."

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thing. Neither does it in Gov. James V. Allred's name. At school he was addressed as "Vee." Governor McNutt was the second presidential possibility to visit the Texas legislature. Both he and Jesse H. Jones, Houston, are counted upon as candidates for the democratic nomination after President Roosevelt has another term, which both predict.

Texas taxpayers would be saved a lot of money by frank recognition of an old political maxim: "To the victors belong the spoils."

To get away from the spoils system, boards and commissions have been created with the terms of members overlapping. Terms of a third of the members expire each two years. It requires four years to change the majority of any board or commission.

The object was to prevent sudden changes in department personnel coincident with changes of state administrations. It does that, but it loads the state with a lot of jobs, the necessity for which is doubtful.

When existing jobs were made safe for the job occupants, it did not end the clamor for jobs on the part of campaign workers and followers of successful candidates. To satisfy them, each administration has been active in creating new jobs. Great ingenuity in this respect has been shown at times.

No reduction of state forces has taken place with changes of administrations within the memory of people at Austin. State Treasurer Gregory Hatcher reduced forces in one department. He was at odds with the administration.

Former Governor Pat M. Neff announced that he would go around the capitol like an Indian with a tomahawk and cut off needless jobs. He found that reducing the force just can't be done.

No Changes Seen In Grades of Cotton

There have been no pronounced changes in the proportions representing the principal grades for cotton classed each week from Texas ginneries during the last several weeks. During this period the combined proportion for middling and better grades (white and extra white) has been approximately 59 per cent of the cotton classed each week. From 15 per cent to 20 per cent of the cotton classed each week during the past several weeks has been strict middling and better grades.

During the past several weeks the lengths of staple reported for each week's classing have shown a trend toward longer lengths. For the past six weeks the proportion for 1 1/8 inch and longer lengths has steadily increased from about 2 per cent for the week ending October 10 to over 9 per cent for samples classed this week. For the season up to this time, about 11 per cent has been 1 inch and longer. About 15 per cent of the cotton classed this week is shorter than 7-8 inch. For the several previous weeks

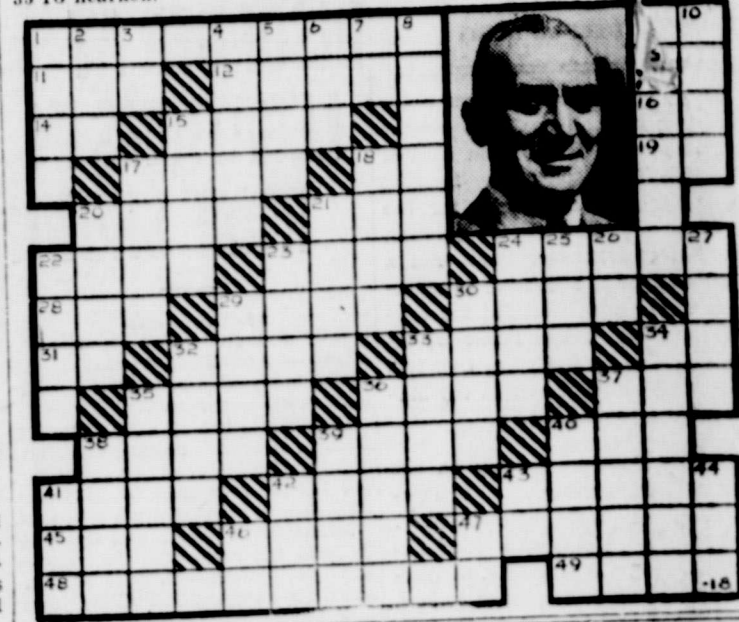

ALL SECTIONS ON NEW YORK'S '36 GRID CARD

NEW YORK, Nov. 18.—One of the most attractive intercollegiate football schedules ever arranged for one city will be played in New York next fall.

Fordham, Columbia, New York U. and Army already have booked eight intercollegiate games with leaders from other sections of the country. Manhattan College, which is gradually developing into a football power under Chick Mehan, is kicking for several intercollegiate games, which will probably increase the invading teams to 10 or more.

Three Southern teams, two from the Midwest, two from the Far West, and one from the Southwest have been scheduled for New York appearances. Fordham has four intercollegiate battles, meeting Southern Methodist, Georgia, Purdue and St. Mary's. Columbia has two, playing V. M. I. and Stanford. New York University has scheduled the U. of North Carolina and may book another intercollegiate foe. As usual, the Notre Dame-Army game will be played at Yankee Stadium.

Stanford to Return

One of the high spots of the 1936 season will be the return of Stanford to New York to meet Columbia. Stanford made its first trans-continental journey in 1928, when the Indians, then coached by Pop Warner, came to New York and conquered Army, 26-0. It will be the second game in history between Columbia and Stanford. The Morningside Lions defeated the Indians in the Rose Bowl game Jan. 1, 1934, by a score of 7-0.

Another colorful team which makes its second New York appearance next fall is Southern Methodist. The Mustangs from Dallas, Texas, again will play Fordham. S. M. U., then under Ray Morrison, made their first metropolitan visit in 1933, when the Dallas eleven handed Fordham one of its worst

defeats under Jimmy Crowley, 26-14.

Army to Play Columbia

In addition to the intercollegiate schedule, several other attractive games involving Eastern teams have been booked for New York. Outstanding in this group is the Army-Columbia game. The last time the Lions played the Cadets was in 1924, when they defeated West Point, 21-7.

ART EXHIBIT PLANNED FOR STATE'S FAIR

DALLAS, Nov. 18.—Robert B. Harsh, director of the Art Institute of Chicago, today was commissioned to assemble a \$50,000 art collection for display at the Texas Centennial Exposition, which opens here in June. Announcing Harsh's appointment, William A. Webb, the exhibition manager, revealed that plans already have been started by the Chicago authority to obtain the loan of famous Old Master paintings from the J. P. Morgan, Havermeyer, Andrew W. Mellon and other famous collections in the United States and abroad. Many of Mr. Mellon's paintings are now in the Corcoran Art Galleries, in Washington, D. C., waiting erection of the proposed National Art galleries there. Others are in the home of the former secretary of the treasury in Pittsburgh, still others in New York. The exposition is appropriated \$100,000 for gathering, installing and insuring the exhibit. Both the Chicago Art Institute and the Metropolitan Museum in New York are expected to loan portions of their rare and valuable collections. The exhibit will be housed in the \$500,000 Hall of Fine Arts, a permanent building made possible through a city of Dallas bond issue. This building, designed by Architect Paul Cret, of Philadelphia, is to be one of the showplaces of the southwest's great fair.

FARMERS KEEP RECORDS UPON PROFITS, LOSS

COLLEGE STATION, Nov. 18.—Approximately 19,000 Texas farmers are putting down their profits and loss on record books according to a recent survey conducted by the extension service under the direction of S. A. McMillan, extension economist in farm management. Of the 19,000 record bookkeepers in Texas, 10,000 are using A.A.A. record books issued through the county agricultural agents.

In comparing totals, it was found that extension district four has the largest number of record keepers this year, which is 4,439.

Extension district two has the unusual record of having 100 per cent coverage. Every county in this district has some records. As an example of one outstanding county, St. Augustine county had a total of 961 AAA record books kept this year. W. L. Knap, county agricultural agent, reports that 75 per cent of this number were contract signers.

The Extension Service, in line with this record keeping, has recently made an application for a WPA project to provide for a thorough summarizing and analysis of farm records kept in Texas this year. S. A. McMillan said. The completion of this project would aid the farmers in each of the 20 types of farming areas of the state to determine the best combination of enterprises and the most efficient size of farm units, thereby aiding them to organize their farms in such a way as to provide the best utilization of their resources and increase farm income," the extension economist in farm management said.
