Next Week Designated As Clean-Up Week By Health Committee

A committee recently appointed, known as the Dawson County Health Committee, has as its function the cooperation with the State Board of Health and the County and City Health officials for the promotion of better health and more sanitary living conditions in the county and city."

A recent partial inspection of the conditions of Lamesa revealed the fact that many people are negligent in regard to cleanliness of yards and lots and especially places where stock are kept. At a recent meeting of the committee, it was voted to ask the cooperation of the citizenship of the town in the matter of cleaning up all backyards and lots. The week beginning Monday, July 20 and ending Saturday, July 25 was declared as clean-up week. During this week, all residents are asked to cut weeds from their vacant lots, rake and burn them, to dispose of all useless and unsightly rubbish, to use lime or Croset or some other disinfectant in stock lots, outdoor toilets, and other places where flies breed. People are also urged to make a practice of disposing of garbage in some manner as to make it inaccessible to flies by either burning, burying, or keeping in tightly covered cans."

Flies were discussed as being one of the greatest menaces and dangers to the health of any other thing in the city and will continue to be so until steps are taken to eradicate their breeding places. Visitors to our city have commented upon the large number of flies existing and such a condition does not speak well for either our sanitary condition or our intelligence. Owners of stock lots are urged to use lime, sprays, or fly traps. Fly traps are inexpensive either to make or purchase and if enough of them are used many flies can be caught."

The committee noticed uncovered garbage cans at back of business houses containing banana peels and other garbage which attracted flies. Every person in Lamesa is urged to cooperate in helping to remove these and other unsanitary conditions. It is proposed by the committee to give attention to cleanliness first and other problems later. Let's clean up during clean-up week and stay clean up."

The committee is composed of Mrs. M. C. Lindsey, Chairman, Mrs. Guy Weeks, Mrs. I. J. Daniels, Owen C. Fisher and G. M. Roberts.
