## Congressman Parrish Dead at Wichita Falls

Wichita Falls, Texas, March 27.—After a gallant fight against overwhelming odds, Congressman Lucian Walter Parrish, of Henrietta, candidate for the United States Senate, died at a local hospital at 9:50 o'clock tonight as the result of injuries sustained in an automobile accident near Roby on March 15.

Congressman Parrish was a candidate for the Democratic nomination to the United States Senate and was on a campaign speaking tour when an automobile containing him and a companion went off a bridge. Congressman Parrish suffered a fractured jaw in addition to other injuries.

He was brought to a hospital here where attending physicians did not regard his condition as serious. For several days he showed marked improvement, but later his condition was complicated by cerebral meningitis. He then became gradually weaker until his death tonight.

## Methodist Building College at Abilene

Methodists of this community will be interested to hear that the contract for the Administration Building of McMurry Methodist College at Abilene was awarded on the 20th of March.

This building will be one of the best of its kind in the State, and unsurpassed by any save, perhaps, in size. It will accommodate a student body of five hundred. It will be built and equipped at a cost of \$150,000 which is a very low figure for such a building. The contract was awarded on a cash basis from the money subscribed by the citizens of Abilene.

## ANALYZE MISTAKES

WHEN you make a mistake, find out why you made it. Think it over a few minutes. Fix in your mind the manner in which it happened. Be ashamed of it, if it is a bad mistake. Scare yourself about it, if it is a dangerous one.

The child never forgets the mistake he makes when he puts his finger in the fire. That mistake he has to think about for a long time afterward. One of the kind is always enough for him.

Admiral Peary's Eskimo dogs made the mistake of eating all that was given them when they were encamped in the Arctic regions waiting for one of his dashes to the pole. Apparently they remembered that mistake when the food ran out and some of their number had to be eaten.

When the survivors of the pack returned to America they were very sparing of the food that was given them, and buried the remainder. More than that they scoured the neighborhood for food to bury. They had had time to think over their mistakes.

Most people have much the same sort of work to do every working day. Those who do not think over their mistakes continue to make them and

for the most part they always stay where they are. Men who make the same mistakes twice never get the confidence of an employer.

Those who think about their mistakes, and find out ways to eliminate them, are those who get along.

It is better to discover your own mistakes than to wait for the boss to discover them. Discover them early, and you can do without them the next time.

Go over your work. If it is not up to the mark that you ought to make, you have either made important mistakes, or wasted time, which in itself is an important mistake.

Think about that. Let it sink into your soul. Think how it held your work back, and what the repetition of it will do to your life's work.

This may not contribute to your repose the night you are thinking about it, but it will make you sleep better for many a night to come. Perfection is the absence of mistakes. We cannot any of us achieve it, but we can all achieve a pretty fair substitute by cutting mistakes to the minimum.

## YOUR HAND

How to Read Your Characteristics and Tendencies—the Capabilities or Weaknesses That Make for Success or Failure as Shown in Your Palm

### THE FINGER NAILS

WHEN the "moon at the root of the finger nails shows a red color of mixed shading, it is an indication of a combative nature, which delights in contests of bodily strength or mental agility. Note whether the nail of the finger of Saturn, or second finger, bears a white mark. This is held by some authorities to indicate a voyage to be undertaken by the subject. If a nail shows black marks, it is an indication of sorrow and trouble. On the thumb nail the black mark shows a faulty, passionate nature. On the nail of the finger of Mercury, the little finger, a white spot means a successful business enterprise, and a black spot means the opposite, a reverse or disaster in business.

If there is a white, star-shaped mark on the nail, it is a sign of affection that is not reciprocated, except when the mark appears on the thumb nail, when it means the opposite, or requited affection.

Nails of medium length and width, and of a bluish tint, show that the circulation of the blood is faulty, and there is a tendency toward extreme nervousness.

## IMPROVED UNIFORM INTERNATIONAL Sunday School Lesson

(By REV. F. B. FITZWATER, D. D., Teacher of English Bible in the Moody Bible Institute of Chicago.)

### LESSON FOR APRIL 2

#### ASA RELIES ON GOD

LESSON TEXT—II Chronicles 14:1-12. GOLDEN TEXT—Help us, O Lord our God, for we rest on Thee.—II Chron. 14:11. REFERENCE MATERIAL—II Chron. 14:13-16, Isa. 41:10-13. PRIMARY TOPIC—A King Who Trusted God.

JUNIOR TOPIC—God Helping Asa. INTERMEDIATE AND SENIOR TOPIC—A Ruler Who Relied on God. YOUNG PEOPLE AND ADULT TOPIC—The Source of Personal and National Power.

I. Asa's Reformation (vv. 1-5). Asa was the grandson of Rehoboam. Both his grandfather and father favored idolatry, but in spite of this record of his ancestors, Asa had a will of his own, and though young when he came to the throne, inaugurated a campaign of reform which brought great good. He not only had the handicap of the idolatry and immortality fostered by the two former kings, but he had to contend against the influence of his mother who had encouraged immoral worship (I Kings 15:13). In order to carry out his reformatory measures he had to wrest authority from her by deposing her. Asa did that which was good and right in the eyes of the Lord (v. 2).

1. Cleared the land of idolatrous emblems and images (vv. 3, 5). (1) Strange altars. These were the altars devoted to other gods. (2) High places. These were places where unlawful sacrifices were offered. (3) Brought down the images. These were upright stones connected with idolatrous worship. (4) Cut down the groves. These were trees or poles connected with tree worship. He had all these relics of idolatry destroyed in Jerusalem and other cities throughout his kingdom.

2. Commanded Judah to seek the Lord (v. 4). He knew that if the reformation was to be effective it must be by the positive seeking after and worshiping of God, accompanied by obedience to His commandments. Destructive work avails little unless followed by constructive.

II. Asa's Defensive Preparations (vv. 6-8). 1. Built fortified cities (v. 6). The cities are not named, but the meaning, doubtless, is that it was a general system of defense which involved the cities at strategic points.

2. He erected walls about the cities (v. 7). These were usually of stone. Upon the walls were observation towers from which the position and movements of the enemy could be seen, and from which defensive warfare could be waged.

3. Made gates and barred them (v. 7). The reason he assigns for these defensive preparations was that they had sought the Lord God. Those who really trust God will make every effort to provide defense.

4. Had an army of spearmen (v. 8). These spearmen were also protected with large shields. The army was made up of 480,000 brave men. They were prepared to wage an offensive as well as a defensive war.

III. Asa's Victory Over Zerah, the Ethiopian (vv. 9-12).

1. Asa set the battle in array (v. 10). He went out to meet the enemy. He first made a disposition of his means of defense. This was wisdom on his part. Intelligent faith moves the possessor to do first that which is within his power.

2. Asa's prayer (vv. 11, 12). He cried unto the Lord. He sought the source of national power. In this prayer note (1) his conscious helplessness. As he faced the Egyptian army two to one against him, he was clearly conscious of his impotency. The first requisite in obtaining help from God is conscious weakness. The Christian conquers not by self-reliance, but by self-distrust and faith in God. (2) Appeals to God for help. He knew that though they were helpless before the mighty enemy, with God's help they could win the victory. One man with God is a majority. (3) Reposes faith in God. The word "rest" means to lean upon—to cast the entire weight upon. In the measure that we realize our need of support will we lean hard upon God. (4) Advanced courageously. He went forth depending upon God to fight for him. Real faith does not wait until it sees its way clear, but goes forth expecting God to clear the way. (5) Fung himself upon God's arms. "O Lord, thou art our God." His cause was God's cause. If God has taken us for His people, and if we have taken Him for our God, no enemy can prevail against us. May we experimentally say, "Thou art my God," and hear Him say, "I am thy God!"

3. The Egyptians smitten (v. 12). The enemy fled before Israel and could not recover themselves.

## MOTHER'S COOK BOOK

### CANDIES FOR THE CHILDREN

AT ALL times of the year the children clamor for candy, but during the cold weather it is more frequently made in the home.

#### Opera Fondant.

Put two cupsful of sugar and one cupful of heavy cream into a saucepan and stir until the sugar is dissolved and the boiling point is reached, then add one-eighth of a teaspoonful of cream of tartar and boil until the sirup makes a soft ball when dropped into cold water or until the candy thermometer registers 238. Pour at once without scraping the dish on to a marble slab or large platter lightly greased with butter. When cold work with a wooden spoon or broad spatula until it firms a ball. Cover with a damp cloth and leave for half an hour. Then knead and mold with the hands until smooth, adding such flavoring and coloring as desired and pack in a crock. Cover closely and leave until worked.

#### Opera Bonbons.

Divide opera fondant into several portions, flavor each and color, then

add different kinds of chopped fruit. Shape into balls or press into a box lined with waxed paper and when firm cut into cubes.

#### Cream Mints.

Put one and one-half cupsful of sugar, one-fourth of a cupful of water and two tablespoonfuls of corn sirup into a saucepan. Boil to the soft ball stage and pour out on a buttered platter to cool. When cool, work with a wooden spoon until creamy. Set away covered with a cloth. When ready to prepare, melt over hot water, add peppermint and drop by teaspoonfuls on waxed paper. Wintergreen patties may be prepared by adding a bit of pink coloring and wintergreen flavoring.

The sheriffs of several Panhandle counties would do well to go to Laredo and imbibe some of the courage of the border sheriff and maybe they would develop some backbone.—Plainview News.

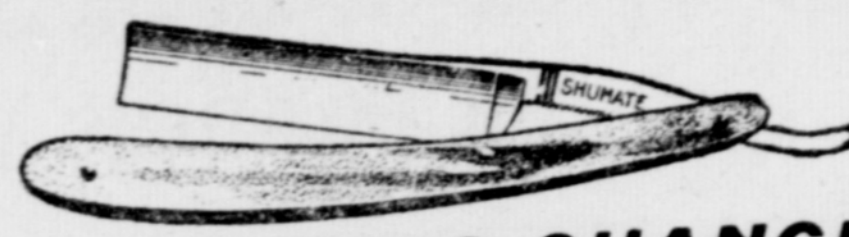

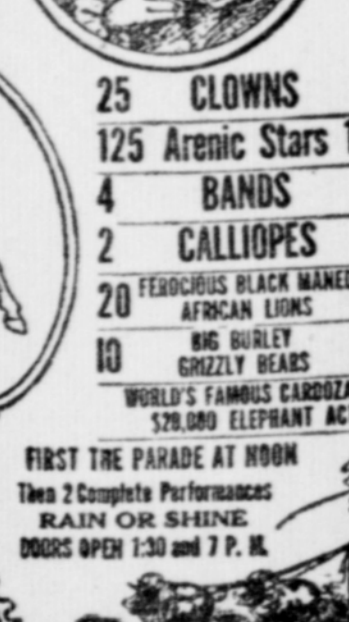

## TIRE PATCH IS FIRST AID TREATMENT ONLY

Permanent Repair Should Follow Soon as Possible.

Reckless Driving Over Glass, Into Curbs and Holes and Against Rocks is Largely Responsible for Loss of Mileage.

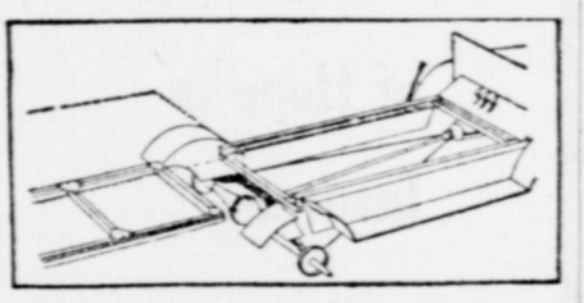
Trying to make a blowout patch do the job of a permanent repair is a good way to ruin tires. The tire patch is a first-aid treatment to meet emergencies, but as soon after the blowout as possible it should be removed and a permanent repair made.

A blowout patch does not unite itself with the rubber stock in a tire. It remains separate, and, during the warping that takes place while the tire is in motion, chafes against the ragged edges of the cut in the casing. In time the hole reaches such proportions that it becomes difficult if not impossible to repair.

When a tread cut is responsible for the blowout, the result is usually a clean-cut hole. Severe bruises ordinarily produce a ragged hole. Where the fabric is raveled or torn apart, fabric separation is often the cause.

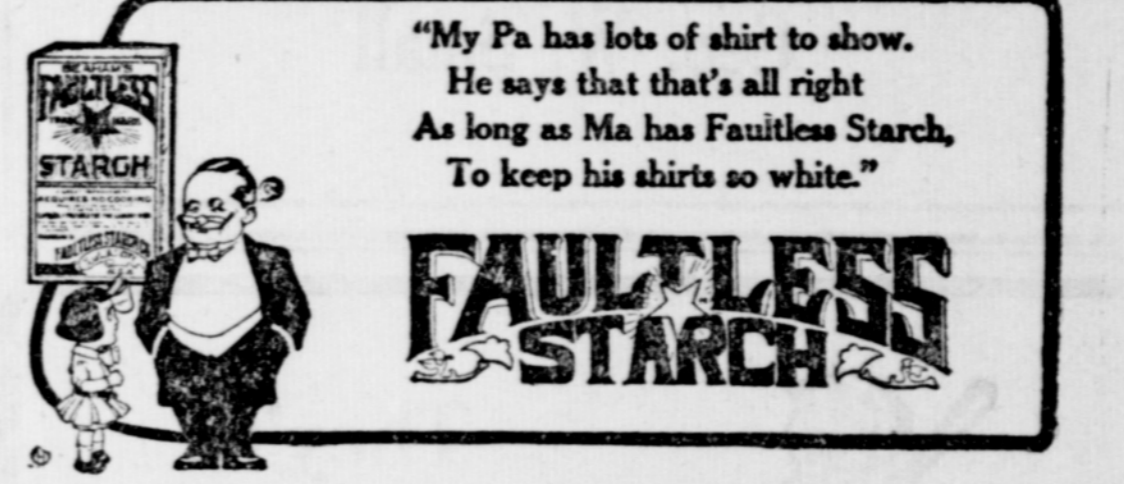

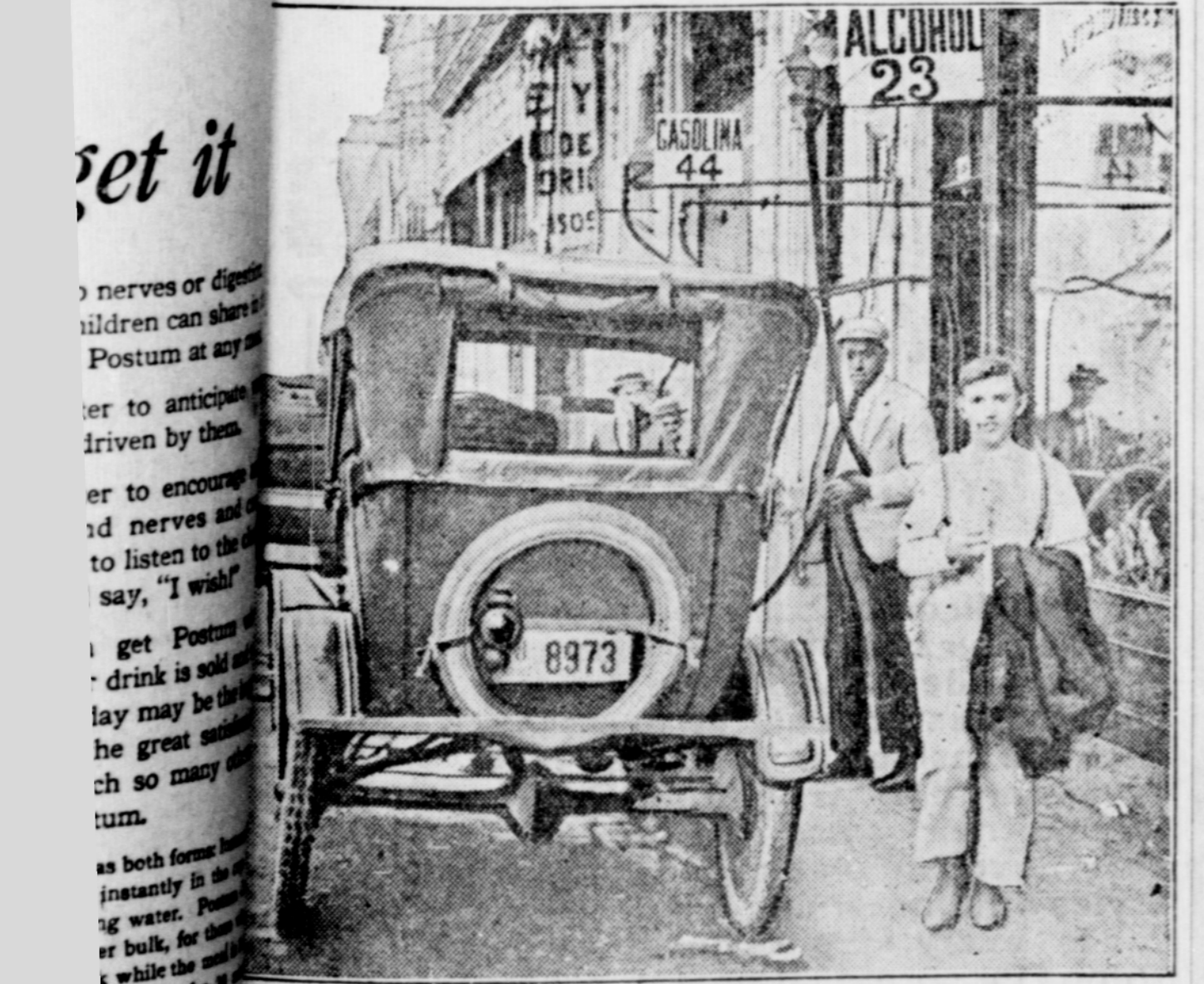
